

King Victor Emmanuel of Italy Receives Nahum Sokolow of Z. O. Executive

Express Regret at Dissolution of Jewish Communities

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Rome, Nov. 1.—The disintegration of Jewish communal life in the smaller towns of Italy is watched with regret by King Victor Emmanuel. "I sign very unwillingly orders for the dissolution of the small Kehillahs in my country", the King told Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the Zionist Executive in London whom he received in audience at the Royal Palace at San Rossore.

The dissolution of the small kehillahs is due to the migration of the Jewish population from the smaller towns to the cities.

The King praised the war record of Italian Jews stating that although the Jewish population of the country amounts to only 40,000 there were 11 Jewish generals in the Italian army. The King also spoke favorably of the achievements of Italian Jews in the colonies like Rhodes and Tripoli.

He expressed his sympathy with the Zionist movement and showed himself conversant with Jewish matters and the situation in Palestine. He recalled distinctly the visit of Theodor Herzl, he said.

KANSAS CITY SYNAGOGUE DESECRATED BY VANDALS

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 1.—The Shearith Israel Synagogue of this city was found desecrated yesterday.

The vandals, believed to be Halloween celebrators, overturned the Holy Scrolls, and stole many of the books. They had gained entry through a window which they broke.

The local authorities are instituting a search for the culprits.

FIRST JEWISH MUSEUM TO BE OPENED IN ODESSA

Moscow, Nov. 1.—The tenth anniversary of the Communist revolution will be the occasion for the inauguration of several Jewish cultural institutions in Russia.

During the celebration the first Jewish museum, the Mendele Mocher Sforim Museum, will be opened in Odessa. During the same period the chairs for Jewish studies at the Ukrainian academies of science in Kiev and Clarkoff will be opened.

INFORMATION SERVICE ON NATIONAL APPEALS ENGAGES COMMITTEE FOR SURVEY

Bureau of Jewish Social Research Will Conduct Nation-Wide Study

The Bureau of Jewish Social Research has been engaged by the Committee on National Appeals Information Service for Jewish Federations to make a complete functional and financial study of all organizations making appeals nationally in the United States, William J. Shroder of Cincinnati, chairman of the committee, announced.

The committee, which was organized last May, met last week in Chicago. Mr. Shroder announced that the Bureau of Jewish Social Research had already begun work under the direction of Samuel A. Goldsmith, and that a preliminary report had been prepared.

The report showed that there are thirty-eight American Jewish organizations making appeals throughout the country at least once a year.

The Bureau also has made a study of twenty-one Palestinian organizations, not including those connected with the Zionist Organization. From figures available it appears that approximately \$500,000 is being sent to Palestine annually by these organizations, that they employ 159 collectors and that they have collection and office expenses ranging from fifteen to forty-five percent.

The following officers of the National Appeals Information Service were elected at the Chicago meeting: Chairman, William J. Shroder; vice-chairman, Louis N. Cahn, of Chicago, for more than twenty years a member of the various boards of Jewish philanthropic activities in Chicago and at present executive director of the Jewish Charities of that city; secretary-treasurer, George W. Rabinoff, of Indianapolis, executive director of the Jewish Federation of that city.

It was announced that the Committee expects \$12,000 from various Federations to carry on the work. A report will be made in May 1928 at the next National Conference of Jewish Social Service.

DR. MOSCOWITZ, LEADER OF ORT, ARRIVES IN RUSSIA

ZIONIST ORGANIZATION IN RUSSIA DESTROYED, IS BOAST OF COMMUNISTS

Aeroplane Built by Jewish Workers Will Make First Flight

Moscow, Nov. 1.—The complete disintegration of Zionist organizations in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics was boasted of in a report submitted by Tchemerinski at the All Union conference of the Yevsektzia, the Jewish section of the Communist Party, which was opened here yesterday.

In reporting this fact Tchemerinski added, however, that "clericalism" still has a strong influence on the Jewish population in Russia and particularly on the younger generation. The process of the industrialization of the Jewish masses in Soviet Russia is very slow. The same is true in the field of agricultural work, Tchemerinski stated.

Twenty thousand more Jewish workers have been drawn into the industries in Russia and 15,000 additional young Jewish men and women were attracted to agricultural work as a result of the economic changes which have been brought about in the situation of Russian Jewry, according to a report submitted by Glasman, secretary of the Yevsektzia.

"Der Yiddischer Horepashnik" (Jewish artisan) is the name of an aeroplane which is now being constructed under the auspices of the Yevsektzia. The aeroplane will make its first flight on November 7 when the tenth anniversary of the Communist revolution will be celebrated. The Emes, Communist daily, states that the aeroplane will cost \$3,500. The fund was raised by collections of pennies from Jewish workers as a symbol of Jewish equal rights and duties in Soviet Russia.

NO MORE STUDENT RIOTS, HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT PROMISES. REPORTS SAY

Vienna, Nov. 1.—An end to the anti-Semitic student riots in the Hungarian universities was in view today, according to a report received from Budapest.

The Budapest message states that the Hungarian government has assured the Juedische Landeskanzlei that it fully guarantees the personal safety of Jewish students in all Hungarian Universities and colleges, beginning Thursday, November 3.

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POLISH CONSUL IN JERUSALEM GIVES HIS VIEWS ON PALESTINE SITUATION

Warsaw, Nov. 1. — The relations between Arabs and Jews in Palestine are satisfactory, single points of friction are of a temporary nature. This was the opinion expressed by M. Zbyszewski, Polish Consul General in Jerusalem, who is here on a visit.

In an interview with the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency the Polish Consul General stated that the assertion that there is danger of Communism spreading in Palestine is unfounded. Even the extreme labor elements of the Jewish population in Palestine stand on the ground of the Jewish National Home idea which has nothing in common with Communism.

The work of the Palestine administration is conducted for the welfare of the country and is obviously in correspondence with the Balfour Declaration. The economic crisis is of a temporary nature and does not contain a danger for the future of the country.

The Polish Jews in Palestine are a great factor for the expansion of the influence of Polish commerce and industry in the Near East. Direct steamship communication between Poland and Palestine will shortly be established.

Zionism is a historic movement and although it is now living through temporary mishaps which are unavoidable the main thing is to continue the work with persistence, he declared.

BAMBERGER'S VALUABLE BOOK COLLECTION GOES TO SEMINARY LIBRARY

A collection of books and records on Jewish life dating from the thirteenth to the eighteenth centuries was presented by Louis Bamberger of Newark to the Jewish Theological Seminary, New York.

The most significant item in the group, in the belief of Dr. Alexander Marx, librarian of the seminary, is a "Pinkas of the Jewish community at Finale, Italy. It covers the years from 1660 to 1693 and gives day by day information of the economic and social conditions of the times and the relations of the Jews and Christians.

berger is an eighteenth century copy of the privileges granted to the Jews of Pisa and Livorno in 1593 by Grand Duke Ferdinand of Toscana. There are also copies of laws dealing with the relationships between the Jews and Christians at the close of the Middle Ages.

A large parchment is occupied with the family tree of the family of Iben Yabia, members of which still live in Italy and Poland. It illustrates graphically how the Jews spread over the world under persecution and how they prospered in their new homes.

There also is a hitherto unknown outline of Aristotle's logic in Hebrew and a number of medical works in Hebrew, including a translation of the Aphorisms of Hippocrates by Shem Tob ben Isaac of Tortosa.

NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP FOR SOCIAL SERVICE WORK ESTABLISHED BY COUNCIL

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 28.—A national scholarship fund of \$30,000, known as the Hannah G. Solomon Scholarship Foundation, to be used in the free college training of young Jewish women in social service work was authorized in resolutions adopted here Tuesday by the National Council of Jewish Juniors in session at the Andrew Jackson Hotel here.

Interest in the proposed fund was given added impetus by the Chicago delegates who pledged \$1,000 to the fund, the money to be available when \$15,000 has been raised by the other locals.

The question of membership of married women in the junior council caused quite a stir at the meeting, with the married members fighting bitterly to retain their standing in the order. Heretofore the age and membership limit in the council had not been determined, but by an amendment to the constitution passed on first reading during the morning session, no more married women were to be taken into the junior council and members who were already married were to be kept on the active list only one year longer. When the amendment came up on second reading it was voted down. Miss Hazel Simon, president of the Nashville chapter of the National Council of Jewish Juniors, was elected president of the national council to succeed Miss May Freedman of Chicago, Ill.

The other officers elected today, were: Miss Minnie Stein of Pittsburgh, Pa., first vice-president; Miss Isabel Bernstein of Oakland, Calif., second vice-president; Miss Jessica Shore, Brooklyn, N. Y., secretary; and Ray Miranda, Boston, Mass., treasurer.

\$250,000 EDUCATION CENTER TO BE BUILT IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Nov. 1.—A campaign to raise a quarter of a million dollars for the erection and maintenance of a centre of Hebrew education has been launched in Montreal. It is proposed to construct a modern Talmud Torah, replacing the inadequate Jewish schools now scattered throughout the city.

Sir Mortimer B. Davis, well-known Canadian philanthropist, has promised to donate twenty per cent of the amount raised by public subscription, to the extent of \$50,000, as his personal contribution.

Ground was broken Sunday, for the \$350,000 Convalescent Home to be erected by the Federation of Jewish Charities on a fifty-acre plot north of Willow Grove. The home will accommodate ninety men and women.

SPIVAK WILL, BEQUEATHING BODY TO SCIENCE, APPEARS AS REMARKABLE DOCUMENT

Denver, Col., Oct. 28.—The text of the will of the late Dr. Charles D. Spivak bequeathing his body to a medical college for scientific research, was made public here. The paragraph dealing with the disposition of his body read:

"I request my wife and heirs to permit of the disposal of my remains after my death in this way:

"The body should be embalmed and shipped to the nearest medical college for an equal number of non-Jewish and Jewish students to carefully dissect. After my body has been dissected the bones should be articulated by an expert and the skeleton shipped to the University of Jerusalem with a request that the same be used for demonstration purposes in the department of anatomy.

"All expenses incident to the embalming, dissection and shipping of my skeleton to Jerusalem University shall be paid by my estate.

"It is my will that the above directions be carried out by the medical advisory board of the Jewish Consumptive Relief Society in the event I die in Denver. If I die in New York City the directions will be cared for by the American Jewish Academy of Science and Arts."

Prefacing the above part of the will, Dr. Spivak wrote:

"It is my will and direction that my funeral shall be conducted in accord with preference for Yehoash's Yiddish monies. It is my will that no addresses or eulogies should be delivered at my funeral. Rites shall be read in Yiddish with preference for Yehoash's Yiddish translation of the Bible."

Members of Dr. Spivak's family were greatly surprised by the contents of the will but after considering the matter decided that it should be carried out to the letter.

Following the funeral services which were held at the Beth Ha'Medrosh Hagodol Synagogue, the body was taken to the Colorado General hospital where it will be dissected by students of the medical school of the University of Colorado.

Dr. Spivak's death resulted from cancer of the liver from which he had been suffering for a number of years.

Rabbi Elliot M. Burstein has been elected to fill the pulpit of Temple Beth Israel, San Francisco, it was announced by Judge Isaac M. Golden, president of the congregation. He will succeed Rabbi Herman Lisauer who resigned some months ago to accept a call to Los Angeles.

Rabbi Burstein's installation has been set for Sunday, November 6. The new rabbi of Beth Israel comes here from Portland where for a year he occupied the pulpit of Temple Ahavai Shalom. Prior to that he was rabbi of Congregation Montefiore in Salt Lake City for three years.

CLEVELAND CONFERENCE BROUGHT ENCOURAGEMENT TO ZIONISTS, "DAY" SAYS

Paper Credits Dr. Stephen Wise with Raising Spirit

The National Conference on Palestine which was held in Cleveland will be termed in the history of Zionism the Conference of Encouragement, is the opinion expressed by the "The Day" in commenting on the results of the conference.

"The Zionist movement in America having lived through a spiritual crisis which threatened to paralyze and cripple forever the best forces on which the entire Palestine work stands, is now stronger, more conscious and more capable of performing the work than ever before. For this thanks is due to the Cleveland conference. It struck a note of confidence which will spread all over the country, creating everywhere an atmosphere for constructive work in behalf of Palestine.

"The main credit for this achievement for the restoration of Zionism will and determination to proceed to new victories is due to Dr. Stephen S. Wise. He, more than any other Zionist in America, has never lost courage. In Cleveland his voice, raised in the name of justice to the Jewish people and against the injustice of England in Palestine, sounded as a herald of new hope.

"The greatest enemy of any popular movement is fear. The source of strength for any popular movement is militant courage. The Zionist movement, whose treasures lie deep in the soul of the masses cannot thrive without the spiritual exaltation which furnishes the key to the soul of the people.

"Of late this exaltation has been dwindling, making room more and more for a feeling of dejection. It was imperative for the Cleveland conference to come and to again bring the Zionist Organization to the Jewish people," the Day says.

PROF. FISHEL SCHNEURSOHN ARRIVES IN UNITED STATES

Dr. Fischel Schneursohn, professor of psychology and pedagogy in the Berlin University, arrived in New York yesterday on the Berengaria. Dr. Schneursohn has come to the United States at the invitation of several American universities. He will deliver a series of lectures on psychology.

Prof. Schneursohn was head of the Psychoneurological Institute at the Kiev University. He was later invited by the Berlin University to lecture on psychology. Prof. Schneursohn is a grandson of the famous Lubawitscher Rebbe, Rabbi Schneursohn.

While in the United States Prof. Schneursohn will also lecture at the Jewish Teachers Seminary.

IF JEWS WILL LEND SUPPORT NATIONAL HOME WILL BE CREATED, LORD BALFOUR STATES

Arthur James, Lord Balfour, who was responsible for the British declaration ten years ago in favor of a Jewish homeland in Palestine, in a message to the National Conference on Palestine held in Cleveland, declared.

"Ten years have now elapsed since the Declaration on Zionism made by me on behalf of the British Government in 1917. Nothing has occurred during that period to suggest the least doubt as to the wisdom of this new departure. The experiment was admittedly a bold one, dealing with a unique situation in a manner wholly without precedent in history. I am, however, convinced that, if it be supported by Jewish communities throughout the world, its success is assured, and that a Home will be secured for the Jewish race in the land which is immemorably associated with their name."

David Lloyd George, former Premier of England, in his message to the conference, said:

"Tested by the events of the past ten years the policy embodied in the Balfour Declaration of 1917 has been amply justified. A regenerated Palestine is in the making, and the Jews are playing their full part in the work of reconstruction. The difficulties have been and will continue to be encountered, difficulties which are inherent in this task which the Jews have undertaken. But what has already been accomplished in Palestine is sufficient to show that they can be and will be surmounted. Under the wise and statesmanlike guidance of Dr. Weizmann, the Zionist movement has already succeeded in laying the foundations of the Jewish National Home. I am convinced that Jews will not falter in work to which they have set their hands, and that in the fullness of time their aspirations in Palestine will be realized.

"The Balfour Declaration, now incorporated in the Mandate for Palestine is a pledge of British sympathy and goodwill. It is a pledge which will be strictly honored. The Declaration is accepted as binding by every party in the State, and no matter what Government may be in power, Great Britain will stand by her word. Let the Jews do their part and Great Britain can be relied upon to do hers."

The \$20,000 mortgage on Temple Emanu-El, Spokane, Wash., will be paid off soon, it was announced. The exterior of the temple, built five years ago at an approximate cost of \$200,000, has been completed. It is expected that the interior work will be finished in the spring.

Dr. Joseph Stolz was elected Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Isaiah Israel, Chicago. Dr. Gerson B. Levi will, upon the retirement of Dr. Stolz on the first of November, take active charge of the congregation.

HIAS OPENS CAMPAIGN FOR \$75,000 IN PHILADELPHIA (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Nov. 1.—The present immigration laws will not be amended by Congress, according to Walter W. Husband, Assistant Secretary of Labor, speaking Sunday night at the opening of the \$75,000 campaign of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigration Aid Society in this district.

Mr. Husband declared that it is his opinion the laws will not be changed and he would advise European Jews to emigrate to South America, where the country is sparsely populated.

Seven hundred and fifty guests were present at the dinner at the Hotel Benjamin Franklin.

The campaign which will continue one week will be carried on under the leadership of Harry Fels, Chairman and Mrs. Reba Shestack, Chairman of the Women's Division. The \$75,000 goal is part of the \$500,000 national quota which Hias is seeking.

Among the speakers at the dinner were Congressman Benjamin F. Goldner, John L. Bernstein, chairman of the Hias campaign and Isidore Hershfield, Hias representative in Washington.

Adolph Kree, 57 years old, of Baltimore, died Tuesday night. Mr. Kree was one of the organizers of the Hebrew Friendly Inn and Adas Home of which he was president for 25 years. For a number of years he was one of the directors of the Associated Jewish Charities. He was a member of most of the Jewish fraternal and charitable organizations in Baltimore and a past grand master of the Independent Order of B'nai Shalom Lodge No. 11, which bears his name.

Rabbi Louis Kuppin will assume his post with Beth El Congregation, Hammond, Ind. this week. He had been rabbi of Temple Emanuel, Duluth, Minn. for the past two years.

A monument to Harry Houdini, erected at his grave in Machpelah Cemetery, Cypress Hills, was unveiled Sunday. Magicians, actors and representatives of fraternal orders took part in the ceremony, which was attended by more than 500 persons.

Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has accepted a position with the Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics. Harry F. Guggenheim, president of the fund announced.

"Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has determined that, for the present, at least, he will not identify himself with any commercial undertaking.

The Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics therefore has retained Colonel Lindbergh in a consulting capacity. Under the arrangement with him he will be free to engage in any activities which will, in his judgment, promote the cause of aviation.

"He will become a member and trustee of the fund and his official headquarters will be at the office of the fund," Mr. Guggenheim announced.

SAMINSKY'S 3d SYMPHONY TO HAVE FIRST AMERICAN PERFORMANCE NOV. THIRD

The New York Symphony announces the first American performance of the 3rd symphony of Lazare Saminsky to be given in Carnegie Hall on November the 3rd and 5th. Its first European performance was conducted by Mr. Saminsky in Paris over a year ago with the Colonne Orchestra.

Mr. Saminsky is a director of the League of Composers and is musical director of Temple Emanu-El and Beth El. Mr. Saminsky conceived his symphony on board ship on his way from Constantinople to Palestine.

BEQUEATHES HIS ESTATE OF \$300,000 TO CHARITY (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 28 — Practically his entire estate, valued at more than \$300,000, is left to charity in the will of the late Samuel Hoiman, filed before Assistant Probate Judge Edward S. Scheffler.

The leading beneficiary is the Chicago Community trust fund, which is to receive \$200,000 in trust immediately and \$145,000 more eventually. Thirty-two charitable and civic organizations are to receive smaller bequests.

Relatives will receive the income from the \$145,000 fund during their lifetime and then it will be turned over to the Chicago Community trust.

The will provides that the Anna Brill Hoffman memorial fund of the Jewish People's Institute be raised to \$5,000. Bequests of \$5,000 are made to the United Charities and to the Jewish Charities.

The cornerstone for the new Bronx Hospital at Fulton Avenue and 169th Street, New York, will be laid on Sunday. Mayor Walker, Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Dean of Hebrew University, Jerusalem, and David A. Brown of Detroit will be the speakers. Alexander Selkin is president of the hospital.

The formal opening and inspection of the new Jewish Communal Home in Binghamton, N. Y. will take place soon. A former residence is being transformed into the Home. Twenty rooms will afford place for meetings and social gatherings. A building will be erected on an adjacent site to be used for a gymnasium and auditorium. It is planned. David Cohen is president of the Communal Home.

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JEWISH SCHOLARS NAMED TO COLORADO PROFESSORSHIP (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Denver, Oct. 28.—The appointment of Dr. I. D. Bronfin, Medical Director of the National Jewish Hospital at Denver, as Assistant Professor in the School of Medicine of the University of Colorado, has been announced by the Board of Regents of the University.

Dr. H. J. Corper, Director of Research for the National Jewish Hospital, who has served as Assistant Professor of Medicine in the University of Colorado for several years, was re-appointed for the year 1927-28, by the Regents of the University.

Dr. Bronfin and Dr. Corper will lecture to senior students of the School of Medicine.

The classes meet in the Assembly Room of the new E'nai Brith Inimury Building at the National Jewish Hospital.

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
