AMERICAN JEWS INVESTED OVER \$67,000,000 IN SYNA-GOGUES SINCE 1925, IS CLAIM Writer Says Value of Jewish Religious Edifices has More than Doubled Since 1919

This sum, according to the article, is more than twice the total value of all the lewish religious edifices in the United States in 1919 when the last religious census was taken. In 1919 the total value of the 874 Jewish religious edifices recorded by the census amounted to \$31,012,576. DINNER TO LORD BALFOUR ON DECLARATION ANNIVER-SARY POSTPONED TO NOV. 10 London Weekly Urges Statesman to

Interpret Document; Disappointment in Present British Policy Voiced (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Nov. 2 .- The dinner which the Anglo-Palestine Club arranged to mark the Tenth Anniversary of the Baliour Declaration, with Lord Balfour as the guest of honor, has been postponed from tonight, the anniversary of the Declaration, to November 10th, so that Dr. Weizmann, who is in Palestine, may attend.

Among those expected to be present at the dinner are the Marquis of Reading. Sir Herbert Samuel, Major Ormsby Gore, Sir Alfred Mond, Sir Gilbert Clayton, Sir Wyndham Deedes, Philip Snowden, Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, Commander Kenworthy and I. L. Garvin editor of the "Observer." James de Rothschild will preside.

Commenting on the dinner in honor of Lord Balfour, the London "Jewish Chronicle" writes:

"The Anglo-Palestinian Club proposes to celebrate the Tenth Anniversary of the Balfour Declaration by entertaining to dinner the author of that historic document. Nothing could be more appropriate, and nothing besides could be more in accord with Jewish sentiment than this mark of appreciation to a Statesman who, approaching the Jewish question from, naturally, the non-Jewish point of view, perceived the anomaly of the present Jewish position and the value to humanity of Jews becoming once again a nation in the political sense. The Union of Jewish Ex-Soldiers stood in the van of the fight against anti-Semitism and for full equal rights for the German Jews. All sections of German Jewry were united in favor of the idea of Jewish land settlement on German soil. Professor Franz Oppenheimer, who

delivered the principal address, said that the German Jews had paid heavily for their German soil. 12,000 Jews had laid down their lives during the war fighting for Germany. The Jewish soldiers went to the front as Germans to defend their native land, but aiter the war hatred of the Jews had grown more intense than ever. The Jews had been settled in Germany longer than the Germans. Whatever the Jews received in Germany, they repaid a thousand-fold in spiritual values. The task for German Jewry now was land settlement. The troubles of the world had arisen as a result of the movement away from the land to industry, and the results were competition and imperialist complications. By settling on the land the Jews would be helping to solve a German problem and also to maintain Judaism. The Jews did not want to die out as people.

ing to states and cities, he writes, "we find New York State heading the list with 77 new houses of worship. Pennsylvania follows with 30; New Jersey with 23; Illinois records 19; Massachusetts 17; Ohio 12; Maryland and Florida each 10; California 9; Connecticut and Virginia each 8; Texas 6; the other states four, three or less.

"Of the cities, New York carries off the honors with 25 new synagogues and temples, Brooklyn, including Long Island, follows next with 22 houses for religious services. Philadelphia comes third with 10, and Baltimore fourth with five. The fifth place is claimed by New Orleans with four temples. The sixth place is shared by a group of cities, none of which had built during this period more than 3 temples or synagogues. In this group, are included Cleveland, O., Stamford, Conn., Los Angeles and San Francisco, Cal., Passaic, N. J., Utica, N. Y., Boston, Mass., Miami and Jacksonville. Fla. The rest of the cities claim only one or two new temples to their record." Of the \$40,180,000 recorded spent on

The London "Morning Post" takes this occasion to continue its anti-Zionist campaign. The "Post" declares that Zionism after ten years. when hopes ran high, is bankrupt, In 1917 the Jews thought that they were becoming an emancipated people in a country where they were the rulers by right and fact. The interval has unfolded a cruel tale of infinite disappointment. Even in 1925 it seemed possible that the Jews would outnumber the Arabs even during the present generation, Sensible Zionists now realize that the Jewish National Home was built on insecure foundations. Resentment is therefore being manifested in Palestine, America and elsewhere against the government which has grantd the Balfour Declaration. Few good words are heard today for the Mandatory power from unofficial Zionists in Palestine. Despair has seized most of the colonists, the paper declares.

Commenting on the editorial of the "Manchester Guardian." Dr. Wise stated to the representative of the lewish Daily Bulletin. "However distressing the whole bus-

iness be, it is satisfying to find that the 'Manchester Guardian,' which, by its great editor, C. P. Scott, and his cooperation with Weizmann, did more than any other organ of public opin-ion in England for the Zionist cause, revealing so clear an understanding of the problems and the perplexities which face the Jewish settlers of Palestine and Zionism throughout the world at this time. I might have cited many illustrations in the course of my address at the Cleveland conference, such as the Syrian Trade Agree-'Manchester ment, to which the Guardian' understandingly and sympathetically refers. The truth is, with respect to the Syrian trade agreement, as was disclosed by a series of sessions of the political commission of the Zionist Congress at Basle, there are only two alternatives, one that the British government is acting wholly without regard to the economic necessities of Palestine and its infant industries or else that our representatives in and out of Palestine have
