

AZOV REGION LAND SURVEY CONCLUDED BY SOVIET COM- MISSION; DATA EXAMINED

Half Million Desiatin May be Made
Available Through Drainage for
Jewish Settlement

Moscow, Nov. 9.—The survey of the Azov Sea region, inaugurated by the Soviet authorities to ascertain the possibilities for Jewish land settlement there, has been concluded.

The data obtained by the survey is now being examined with a view to ascertaining the possibilities of draining the swampy stretch of half a million desiatin land. Eighty specialists with 100 assistants including engineers, topographers, hydro-technicians and geologists, made the survey.

JEWISH UNIT INCLUDED IN SOVIET EXHIBITION

Moscow, Nov. 9.—A Jewish section in the exhibition of art and literature of the national minorities in the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics was opened by the Jewish section of the Communist party in connection with the celebration of the tenth anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution.

The exhibit contains paintings of Jewish life in the new colonies. This unit was organized by the Comzet, the governmental department for settling Jews on the land. Drawings and poems by the children of Jewish colonists and charts of the Yiddish state theatres are included.

RUSSIAN EMIGRES IN CHINA SPREAD ANTI-SEMITISM

Shanghai, Nov. 9.—Anti-Jewish propaganda attended the turbulent demonstrations arranged by the Russian monarchistic emigres here yesterday.

The emigres paraded before the Russian consulate. One person was killed and ten wounded during the riots.

Handbills were distributed urging the Chinese to expel Jews.

WORKER SENTENCED TO DEATH FOR MURDERING TWO JEWS

Berlin, Nov. 9.—M. Pystrzygowski, a Polish land laborer, was sentenced to death by the court of Naumburg, Germany.

Pystrzygowski was found guilty of having murdered two Jews from Leipzig on the highway in 1920. He took 150,000 marks from them.

DEMONSTRATIONS AGAINST JEWISH STUDENTS IN HUNGARIAN COLLEGES CONTINUE

Hungarian Students Must Be 'Protected' Against Jewish Superiority, Turul Manifesto Says

Budapest, Nov. 9.—Notwithstanding the invitation of the government extended to the Jewish students to return to their classes in the University of Budapest and other Hungarian colleges, serenity in the academic institutions has not returned. Demonstrations which nearly ended in riots continued yesterday at the University of Budapest and other institutions. The police were on guard to prevent violence. It was declared today that if no improvement is observed in the situation the university will be closed.

The executive of the students' organization Turul, issued a manifesto declaring that it considers it essential that "the Christian youth be protected against the disproportionate invasion by the traditionally cleverer Jews who are protected by the rich Jews."

The manifesto continues: "For these reasons we will fight any attempt to modify the numerous clauses following the instinct of self-preservation. We appeal to the entire Hungarian public to support us because we are fighting for Christian Hungarian life."

PLUMER CONFERS TITLE ON TRANSJORDANIAN RULER

Amman, Transjordan, Nov. 9. — Emir Abdullah, ruler of Transjordan, was honored by the British Government today when Lord Plumer, High Commissioner of Palestine, conferred upon him the title Knight Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

The ceremony took place in the aerodrome here.

SALONICA UNIVERSITY WILL HAVE JEWISH HISTORY CHAIR

Salonica, Nov. 9.—A chair for the study of Jewish history will be established at the University of Salonica by a decision of the Greek Ministry of Education.

The Ministry announced that Dr. Lazare Belleli, Greek Jewish scholar, will be appointed to head this department. Dr. Belleli is an authority on Jewish history, particularly on the Arabo-Spanish period.

JEWISH COMMUNITIES IN POSEN AND POMERANIA ARE LIQUIDATED DUE TO EXODUS

Emigration Due to Economic and Political Conditions; Chief Rabbi Moves to Preserve Tombstones

Warsaw, Nov. 9.—One hundred and twenty seven Jewish communities in Posen and Pomerania, the two provinces which were taken from Germany following the World war and incorporated in the new Polish Republic, have disappeared. Due to the emigration of the Jewish population from the Posen and Pomeranian towns the kehillahs have been liquidated. The emigration was due to economic pressure and the new political situation.

An effort is now being made by Chief Rabbi Freimann of Posen to preserve the tombstones of the Jewish cemeteries which constitute valuable records of the history of the Jewish communities in this region.

HUNGARIAN ANTI-SEMITES OBJECT TO 'ABIE'S IRISH ROSE'

Budapest, Nov. 9.—The presentation of "Abie's Irish Rose," the play which with its six year run on Broadway exceeded the record of all productions in New York, has encountered difficulties in Hungary's capital.

The play is scheduled to open at the Metropolitan Theatre here. The police, having been informed of the intention of anti-Semitic students to demonstrate against the performance because it depicts Jews in what they regard as a favorable light, announced that special guard will be placed around the theatre on the opening night. In attacking the play the anti-Semitic press asserts that Ann Nichols, the author of the play, is a Jewess.

UKRAINIAN PAPER REBUKES ASCH, NOTED AUTHOR, FOR HONORING SCHWARTZBAR

Lemberg, Nov. 9. — Sholom Asch, well known Jewish novelist, was criticized by the "Dillo," organ of Ukrainian opinion in Eastern Galicia, in connection with the Schwartzbard trial.

The paper expresses astonishment that Mr. Asch attended a banquet in Paris at which it alleges Schwartzbard was the guest of honor. "Jewish solidarity is indeed great," the paper writes, "when such a well known writer honors Schwartzbard, a criminal with a dubious past."
