

NATIONAL MINORITIES IN POLISH REPUBLIC DELIB- RATE ON ELECTION BLOC

**Agudath Israel and Labor Represent-
atives Abstain**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Nov. 18.—The conference of the representatives of national minorities, including the leaders of the Jewish parties, continued all day yesterday, deliberating on the method of forming a bloc of the national minorities at the forthcoming parliamentary elections.

Representatives of the Germans, Ukrainians, White Russians and Lithuanians are participating in the deliberations. The difference between the other national minorities and the Jewish minority lies in the fact that while the other minorities are united among themselves, including the socialists, the conference is attended by representatives of only the Jewish bourgeois parties, with the exception of the Orthodox Agudath Israel. The Jewish labor parties are not represented.

The attack on Deputy Gruenbaum by three unknown men on the night preceding the opening of the conference continues to hold attention. Several high officials have called on Gruenbaum to express their sympathy.

The Warsaw chief of police suspended the policeman who permitted Gruenbaum's assailants to escape. The entire Polish press in commenting upon the incident condemns the method of terror. Gruenbaum is said to be receiving hundreds of letters of sympathy.

BARON DE ROTHSCHILD GIVES £18,000 TO HELP PALESTINE HEBREW SCHOOL SYSTEM

**Condition Attached Stipulates that
Religion Must be Taught**

Jerusalem, Nov. 18.—The crisis in the Hebrew school system of Palestine will be solved this year through the generosity of Baron Edmund de Rothschild, benefactor of the Jewish colonies in Palestine.

The schools were threatened with being closed or some of the classes suspended due to the curtailment in the budget voted for education at the Fifteenth Zionist Congress. It was announced here that Baron Rothschild will contribute the amount of £18,000 on the condition that the instruction in Jewish religion be given a prominent part in the curriculum.

HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT BILL MODIFYING NUMERUS CLAUSUS IS CAMOUFLAGE

**Liberal Press and Jewish Leaders Deeply Disappointed; Government, Anxious
to Maintain Prestige with League, Pushes Bill**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Nov. 18.—Marked disappointment in liberal and Jewish circles in Hungary accompanied the publication of the text of the bill introduced by the government into parliament, which had been heralded as amending the numerus clausus limiting the number of Jewish students in the universities. The bill shows that it does not in fact change the limitations existing which were the subject of international complaint, but rather is an attempt at camouflage.

The provisions of the bill which was made public here, as well as the ordinances giving the government authority to put the bill into effect, divide the applicants for admittance to the colleges and universities into several categories.

It was stated in well informed circles that Count Klebelsberg had secured the passive attitude of the insurgent parties with regard to the passage of this bill after he had shown them that the form which the present bill pro-

poses to give cannot be attacked abroad, while it will not change the internal situation in any material way. It is expected that the passage of the bill will be brought about before December 4. The haste is intended to enable the government to notify the Council of the League of Nations at its forthcoming session of the change which allegedly has been brought about in conformity with Hungary's promise to the League.

The opposition parties have declared that they will conduct a sharp fight against the bill, which they term a farce and which in reality makes the situation worse. Jewish leaders of all shades of opinion in Hungary are deeply disappointed.

The numerus clausus question is today the burning issue in Hungarian political life. The entire liberal press rejects the terms of the bill which it asserts is a tragedy-comedy. The papers declare that the new bill instead of abolishing the numerus clausus fortifies it. This opinion is also expressed in some of the government papers known for liberal tendencies.

The haste with which the new bill is being pressed is explained by the anxiety of the Hungarian leaders not to be charged by the League of Nations with failure to keep their promise. Vice-premier Vasz is said to have declared to the reactionary leaders who are opposed to the bill that "God tolerates the Jews among the peoples of the world; we cannot expel them."

JEWISH CONGREGATIONS CONFERENCE IN RUSSIA IS AGAIN POSTPONED

Riga, Nov. 18.—The conference of Jewish religious congregations in Soviet Russia, which was scheduled to take place in Leningrad this month, has again been postponed, it was learned here today.

The holding of the conference has been postponed several times before. The date now mentioned for the conference is next year. It is understood, however, that the conference will not be held at all because of the opposition to the project voiced in certain Jewish circles and because of the dissent which has arisen among the initiators regarding its advisability.

Riga, Nov. 18.—The status of the Jewish religious institutions in Soviet Russia was the subject of discussion at a conference of Orthodox leaders which took place here with the participation of the Lubawitscher Rebbe, the Gaon of Rogatschow and Dr. Hildesheimer. Resolutions were adopted, the texts of which were not made public.

CONDITION OF UNSKILLED LABOR IN PALESTINE TO BE STUDIED BY COMMISSION

Jerusalem, Nov. 18.—A commission to inquire into the position of unskilled labor in Palestine was appointed by the government, it was learned today.

The task of the commission will be to ascertain the difference in the standard of living of the Arab and Jewish workmen. This is being undertaken in connection with the problem of allotting the contracts for public works instituted by the government on an equitable basis to Jewish and Arab workers. The commission will be assisted by representatives of the Arab and Jewish workers.

DR. WEIZMANN ADDRESSES KAROL HAYESON MEETINGS IN BERLIN AND HAMBURG

Urges New Period of Constructive
Work for Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Nov. 18. — One thousand
guests attended the luncheon given by
the German Karol Hayeson in honor
of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of
the World Zionist Organization, here
last night. Two thousand marks were
raised following an appeal for the
Fund.

Dr. Weizmann, in his address, urged
German Zionists to enable the begin-
ning of a new period of rebuilding
work in Palestine. The mandatory
power and the Palestine government
are sincere in their cooperation in the
upbuilding work. Dr. Weizmann told
the assembly. The Palestine-Syrian
Treaty Agreement has so far not been
put into effect and therefore does not
constitute a danger to the Palestine
industries. The agreement is sched-
uled to go into effect next year.

Prior to his arrival here Dr. Weiz-
mann addressed a Karol Hayeson
banquet in Hamburg. The gathering
was attended by the mayor of the city,
Jewish representatives from Hamburg,
Lubeck and Altona were among the
700 guests. Sixty thousand marks were
contributed to the Fund.

Hartford, Nov. 18.—A Connecticut
Conference in the interests of Jewish
Farm Women and Jewish Life was held

rural work department of the National
Council of Jewish Women. Mrs. Elmer
Edmondson of Newark, N.J. presided.

Delegates were present from every
community in the state and many re-
gional conferences were held during
the session for women of Hartford,
Bridgeport, New Haven, Norwich,
Stamford and Winsted.

Five members of the national council
staff of workers were present. They
spoke on the five fields in which the
council is working, namely American-
ization and education, service, health,
Jewish education and recreation. Miss
Ann C. Seamer of New York, director
of the farm and rural life department,
also spoke and dwelt on the rural life
of the farm women, the labor situation
of farm work and other topics relative
to country life.

She was followed by Robert C. Den-

participate in the King's reception. The
community sent a letter of welcome to
the King the day before Yom Kippur,
the Rabbi said.

ADOLF ROTTE, NOTED SOVIET DIPLOMAT, COMMENTS SUICIDE

Moscow, Nov. 18.—Adolf Rotte, So-
viet diplomat, committed suicide here
yesterday. The cause was said to be
his unbearable suffering from poly-
neuritis.

Rotte was the first president of the
Soviet delegation at the Saint peace
conference. He was also the first So-
viet ambassador to Germany and held
several high positions in the Soviet
government.

The recent New England flood
brought hundreds of Connecticut Jews

and clothing and actual cash sums were
realized and forwarded to the stricken
zones. Hartford's lower east side was
stricken to a large degree and Jews
living in the vicinity were taken into
the homes of others living at a distance
from the flood zones. To some extent
the flood has now receded but the
health departments in Connecticut and
Massachusetts are still cautious
enough to first investigate homes and
other buildings which were inundated
by water before permitting the resi-
dents to return to their homes. Though
health authorities are rather wary with
regard to the possibilities of typhoid
they are permitting the residents of
such sections to return to their homes
a few at a time. Many Jews in Con-
necticut and New England are about
to band together towards seeking leg-
islation to make such deeds impossible
in the future by an appropriation from
the various governmental bodies so that
dikes and other precautionary methods
may be built over a period of years.

The Hartford Community Chest
which has just completed its drive for
\$485,000 will contribute more than
\$25,000 to Jewish Charities including
the Old Peoples Home, The United
Jewish Charities, the Jewish Orphan
Asylum and other Jewish charity or-
ganizations. The Jewish Community
Chest in Hartford has found the Community
Chest of benefit to the various Jewish
organizations to a large degree and

CLEVELAND CENTER LEADERS REPLY TO ORTHODOX CHARGES IN WELL KNOWN CONTROVERSY (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, O. Nov. 18.—A statement refuting the charges of the Orthodox committee against Rabbi Solomon Goldman and the present board of the Jewish Center, which is to be brought to court on November 28, was issued here by S. J. Bialosky president of the congregation and three former presidents, M. D. Shanman, Carl Baden and Louis Sands. The statement reads: "We, the undersigned, members of Congregation Anshe Emeth Beth Tefilo, known as the Jewish Center, beg to declare:

"On November first and second members of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis and the Union of Orthodox Congregations made reply to a series of questions contained in the petition submitted to the Cleveland Court of Common Pleas by a number of dissatisfied members of our Congregation against the congregation and Rabbi Goldman. These questions and answers received wide publicity in the Yiddish press, conveying the impression that the Congregation and Rabbi Goldman are admitting the truth of these charges. In view of the fact that we have been unsuccessful, owing to the

store, Mr. Auerback had been in charge of a large department store founded by his father in Salt Lake City. He was the owner of a newspaper and director of banks in the latter city and at the time of his death was a director of one of the largest banks in Hartford.

interference of the Agudath Harabonim and the Union of Orthodox Congregations to bring about an amicable settlement, these questions will be answered in our behalf in the Cleveland courts. In the meantime, may we be permitted to state the following:

1. "The impression has been given that the Jewish Center has been an Orthodox congregation for fifty years and that Rabbi Goldman, with the assistance of a few newcomers in the congregation, have sought to reform it. "It is true that our congregation was founded sixty years ago, but for more than a quarter of a century it has been moving in the direction of what is generally known as Conservative Judaism. As a matter of history, the Orthodox members deserted the congregation when our building on Thirty-Seventh Street and Woodland Avenue was erected more than thirty years ago. Some twenty years ago we engaged as our spiritual leader the late Rabbi Samuel Margolis, who was known to shave, to eat without a hat, and seldom if ever attended daily services. Our congregation never pretended to be Orthodox. We have had late Friday evening service for more than a decade. We have had religious school and confirmation of boys and girls together for about fifteen years. We were never, for example, identified with the Mizrahi. Rabbi Margolis was known as a general Zionist and the congregation always followed him. Ours was also one of the first congregations to join the United Synagogue of America. In 1921 prior to Rabbi Goldman's coming to our congregation we considered a merger with a well-known Conservative congregation in Cleveland.

"Rabbi Goldman was well-known in the city of Cleveland, where he had occupied the pulpit of the Ben Jeshurun for three years prior to his coming to the Center. He never pretended to be an Orthodox rabbi any more than our Congregation pretended to be an Orthodox congregation.

"To this day, however, we have made no radical innovations in our synagogue ritual.

2. "It has been stated that a large element of the Congregation has brought suit against the Center and Rabbi Goldman.

"This, of course, is equally untrue. The Congregation, which is the largest Conservative congregation in America, consisting of eleven hundred members, is supporting Rabbi Goldman and the Board of Trustees heart and soul. The official list which the opposition has thus far submitted to us consists of thirty-one names. Seven of these are non-members. Of the twenty-four others twelve have returned to the congregation and have ever since attended our services regularly.

NON-ZIONISTS IN CZECHOSLO- VAKIA CREATE FEDERATION Reject Nationalist Doctrine, Disclaim Zionist Representatives (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Nov. 18. — Nationalistic tendencies prevalent among Czechoslovakian Jews were rejected in a series of resolutions adopted at a national conference of non-Zionists who formed a Federation of Czechoslovakian Jews.

The conference took place in Brunn. One of the resolutions declares that the Jews do not constitute a nationality, but must be assimilated by the peoples among whom they dwell.

A second resolution expresses protest against the attempt of Czechoslovakian Zionists to appear at international forums as the representatives of Czechoslovakian Jewry. The executive was authorized to submit a memorandum to the Czechoslovakian government on the subject.

either against Rabbi Goldman or against the Congregation are equally untrue.

"Rabbi Goldman has never ridiculed either Orthodoxy or Orthodox leaders. We have never refrained from inviting lecturers and speakers because of their Orthodoxy. We have not eliminated the saying of grace, the washing of hands at our Congregational dinners. Rabbi Goldman has made no practice of kissing the brides, he does not partake of non-kosher food, he never denied the divine inspiration of the Torah.

4. "It has also been stated that we refused to appear before a Beth Din of the Agudath Harabonim.

"This is true, but our Congregation felt perfectly justified in its action. The summons from the Agudath Harabonim was not sent directly to our Congregation, but to the few opposing members. The summons was photographed and printed as a paid advertisement in the 'Jewish World' of Cleveland. It was only after it appeared in the newspaper that it was delivered to us. We considered this act of the Agudath Harabonim un-Jewish and their Beth-Din prejudicial. Then again, we felt that the opposition should have brought the case either to the Rabbinical Assembly of which body Rabbi Goldman is a member or to the United Synagogue of America of which organization our congregation has been a member for the past nine years."

AMERICAN ARCHITECT DESCRIBES PLAN FOR RE- PLICA OF SOLOMON'S TEMPLE

A plan to erect a replica of Solomon's Temple to be used for exposition purposes was outlined in a lecture at the Jewish Museum by Harvey Wiley Corbett, architect.

If his plan is carried out, Mr. Corbett said, a sixty-seven-acre plot of land will be surrounded with high walls, on the inside of which the landscape around Jerusalem will be painted. Once inside, the visitors, with gowns thrown over their clothing, will walk through streets lined with magnificent buildings, the queen's palace in its flamboyant Assyrian style and brilliantly colored facade, the palace of King Solomon, the Forest of Lebanon Palace in the very temple itself, soaring into the air in a blaze of incense and white marble.

Mr. Corbett said the plan is the result of years of research and study by him, Dr. John W. Kleicher and others. The architect produced working plans, models, drawings and paintings of every phase of the undertaking.

Mr. Corbett described how the plans were formulated by a careful working out in actual model form of all the minute specifications for the Temple given in the Bible. Dr. Kleicher first constructed the separate pieces on a reduced scale, following the Bible measurements, and found they assembled perfectly. All the literature on the subject was studied, the topography of the ground and possible sites.

JAFFA ORANGES SOLD AT HIGH PRICES IN ENGLAND

London, Nov. 18.—The second consignment of Palestine oranges arrived here. The shipment was sold at high prices, reaching 15 shillings per case.

Leading members of the clergy and laity of the Jewish, Catholic and Protestant faiths will participate in a good-fellowship dinner to be held in Baltimore December 12.

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise will be among the speakers.

The dinner is planned as an evidence of good will among the members of the three religious bodies. Rabbi Edward L. Israel, of the Star of David Congregation, and the Very Rev. Albert E. Smith, editor-in-chief of the "Baltimore Catholic Review," are among those associated with Dr. Peter Alshuler in formulating the plan.

The establishment of a sanatorium for consumptives at Lake Hopewell, N. J., is now being contemplated as a result of a gift made to the Jewish Anti-Tuberculosis League of Newark, N. J., by Milton A. Untermyer, of that city, and his associates. Mr. Untermyer has donated nearly 125 acres and valued at more than \$100,000. It is expected that the Tubercular Jewish Consumptive Relief Society will cooperate with the League in the establishment of the Sanatorium.

AUSTRALIA ZIONISTS FORM FEDERATION: ELECT MONASH AS HONORARY PRESIDENT

Melbourne, Oct. 5.—The first Australian Zionist Conference was held here. It was the first Interstate Jewish Conference ever held in Australia.

The Conference was called on the initiative of Dr. Alexander Goldstein, representative of the Zionist World Organization to Australasia. The Zionist Societies of all the States of Australia sent delegates to the Conference. Rabbi I. Brodie, Melbourne, Rabbi S. Masel, Melbourne, and Perry J. Marks, Sydney, were elected to the presidium. Mr. Honig, Melbourne, was elected Secretary.

Following an address by Dr. A. Goldstein on "The formation of an Australian Zionist Federation," it was unanimously agreed to form the Federation with an Executive Committee in Melbourne.

The Conference discussed and accepted the Constitution of the Federation, submitted by Alex. Masel, Melbourne. The general Zionist organization, propaganda activities, the Karen Hayes and National Fund work in Australia were discussed and a number of resolutions relating to the strengthening an co-ordination of this work was adopted.

General Sir John Monash, the Commander-in-Chief of the Australian Army in the War, accepted the position of Honorary President of the Australian Zionist Federation. M. Zelnher was elected president; Rabbi I. Brodie and Rabbi S. Masel vice-presidents; Mr. A. Masel honorary secretary and Mr. L. Ellinson honorary treasurer.

The Conference decided to inscribe Dr. Alexander Goldstein's name in the Golden Book as the founder of the Australian Zionist Federation.

BOOK ON ENGLISH LAW IS PUBLISHED IN HEBREW

Jerusalem, Nov. 17.—A book in Hebrew on English Constitutional law, the first of its kind, has just been published here. The author is S. Tschichin, Palestine lawyer.

Norman Bentwich, the Attorney General of Palestine, has written a preface in which he deals with the position of Palestine, as mandated territory, in the constitutional system of England. Mr. Bentwich stresses the point that the Crown exercises sovereign power in Palestine, but always subject to the laws existing at present.
