ZIONIST EXILES IN RUSSIA CAN LEAVE FOR PALESTINE UNTIL DECEMBER FIRST

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Nov. 25.—Russian Zionists now in exile will lose their permission to go to Palestine if they do not exercise it before December 1, a despatch from Moscow to the "Davar." Hebrew labor daily here states.

According to the despatch the exiled Zionists were informed by the Ogpu, the Soviet political police, to hasten their departure for Palestine before the permission expires.

FRITSCH STILL CONTENDS FORD HAS NOT WITHDRAWN

Berlin, Nov. 25 - Theodor Fritsch. translator into German of Henry Ford's "International Jew" and publisher of the book, declared that he will continue its distribution notwithstanding the press reports that Henry Ford had written him a letter ordering him to stop the sale of the book.

Up to the twenty-third of this month the Hammer Verlag had received no communication from Mr. Ford to this effect. As to the press reports, they are not reliable Fritsch stated.

AMERICAN COMMITTEE TO SPONSOR ZANGWILL FUND

GOVERNMENT CANNOT TAKE DRASTIC MEASURES TO STOP ANTI-SEMITIC STUDENT RIOTS

Stormy Session in Hungarian Parliament When Count Klebelsherg Makes This Statement: Opposition Charges Riots are Instigated by Authorities (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Nov. 25-The Hungarian government is in no position to take drastic measures against the students who are perpetrating the anti-Semitic riots but instead will attempt to pacify them by means of persuasion. Should these efforts fail, other measures will he taken.

This statement was made in parliament vesterday by Count Klebeisberg, Minister of Education, when the student riots were the subject of a heated debate.

Deputies Legemenykis, Pakots and Bela Fabian introduced an interpellation charging the government with deliberate weakness in order to create abroad the impression that the modification of the numerus clausus is premature due to the state of mind in the country. Count Klebelsberg declined to offer a reply to this interpellation.

In the lobby the Minister of Education told newspapermen that it was extremely improbable that the numerus clausus bill will pass parliament before the March session of the Council of the League of Nations, although, as it was proven by statistics, the proposed amendment of the numerus clausus bill would increase the number of Jewish students by merely one half of one per cent.

While the debate was going on in parliament, leaders of the Democratic deputies conferred with Deputy Julius Goemboes who undertook the obligation of seeing to it that no further riots take place today or at least as long as parliament debates the question. No new riots occurred today

M. Lewadim is the nom de plume of Dr. J. N. Steinberg, well known Russian Jewish publicist, a nephew of the late Jewish critic, Baal Machshovoth (Dr. Eliaschew). Dr. Steinberg took · leading part in the Russian Revolutionary Party. After the Russian revolation he held the position of Minister

of Justice. In Berlin, where he now lives, he edits a journal "Freie Blaetter," devoted to a discussion of Jewish socialist

problems. The play is highly praised by the German Press.

RABBI NEWMAN CRITICIZES SOFT PEDALING' POLICY ON FILMS OF ANTI-JEWISH BIAS Jewish Daily Bulleting

"The B'nai Brith Anti-Defamation Committee on the Pacific Coast cannot be too severely criticized for their failure to take appropriate action. The honor and safety of the lewish people is at stake.

There is only one Jewish boy in the Industrial School. Cases of juvenile delinquency are very rare among the Jewish boys and girls in the city of Portland. We have no record of any Jewish pauper in any of the state institutions.

FOR RESENTING INSULTS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Berlin, Nov. 10 .- Two students wearing swastika badges went along the market place in Leer on Friday and made insulting remarks to a number of Jewish cattle dealers and molested them. A fight followed, in which several farmers took the part of the students. One student and one farmer were seriously wounded. The Jewish cattle dealers, Jacob de Leuw, Jonas de Vries, Adolf de Vries, Hermann de Vries, Moses de Vries, Isaac de Vries, Siegiried Landsberg, Max Hirschberg, Benjamin de Levie, Benno de Levie, Simon Sachs, and Peter Gelder, were summoned on a charge of breach of the peace.
