

A. F. FUTTERER, AMERICAN EXPLORER, ASCENDS MOUNT NEBO IN SEARCH FOR ARK

Discovered Four Ancient Caves Which
Will Be Further Explored

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Nov. 25.—A. F. Futterer of the Los Angeles Bible Institute, with the hope that he may succeed in finding the Ark of the Covenant, hidden since the destruction of the First Temple, proceeded to Mount Nebo alone. Mr. Futterer was unable to form a search party and undertook the task himself.

In a statement to the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency he declared that he found at Nebo four caves of antique date which will be explored by archaeologists of Jerusalem.

MISSIONARIES PREPARE FOR INTERNATIONAL CON- FERENCE IN JERUSALEM

London, Nov. 26.—Extensive preparations are being made by the workers of the missionary movement carried on under the auspices of the International Missionary Council for the forthcoming international missionary conference which will take place in Jerusalem in 1928.

According to preliminary announcements the missionary conference in Jerusalem will consider what is termed "the Christian responsibility for the relations between races." Steps will also be considered to secure international cooperation among the missionaries. It is expected that delegations from all countries, including the United States, will attend.

FEUCHTWANGER'S 'POWER' TO BE PRODUCED ON SCREEN

Manchester, Nov. 26.—Lion Feuchtwanger's novel "Jud Suss", published in the United States under the title "Power" will be made into a moving picture, it was learned today when it was announced that a company to produce the powerful novel on the screen had been formed.

It was learned that the author received the amount of \$40,000 for the screen rights.

The novel was hailed in Europe and America as an outstanding event in the world of letters, depicting Jewish life in Germany in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. It is rich in dramatic conflict.

PALESTINE-SYRIA PACT ON CUSTOMS TO BE ABRO- GATED, REPORT STATES

Authorities Yield to Zionist Protest
Against Proposed Agreement

Jerusalem, Nov. 26.—Manufacturers and merchants in Palestine today welcomed a report which has not yet been verified that the Palestine government has decided to abandon the new Syria-Palestine trade agreement which was to create a customs barrier between Palestine and Syria.

It was stated in well informed circles that the decision of the Palestine government was taken following the representations made by the Zionist Executive on the basis of the resolutions adopted at the Fifteenth Zionist Congress, at which it was pointed out that the putting into effect of this trade agreement would endanger the existence of several manufacturing industries and prevent the establishment of new industries in Palestine.

HEBREW SCHOOLS REOPENED IN PALESTINE AFTER LAPSE

Municipalities Will Agree to Under-
take Definite Obligation

Jerusalem, Nov. 26.—All the Hebrew schools in Palestine cities and colonies will be opened on Sunday, it was announced today.

An exception will be made with the schools in Tel Aviv and Haifa due to the pending negotiations between the Jerusalem Zionist Executive and the municipalities. The Zionist Executive insists that the municipalities sign an agreement taking a formal obligation concerning their contribution toward the education budget.

It is also learned today that the Palestine government has withdrawn its decision to approve the authorization for the Tel Aviv municipality to impose a progressive education tax upon the population.

ANTI-RELIGIOUS TEACHERS TO BE TRAINED BY SOVIET

Moscow, Nov. 26. — Trained agitators will lead the Soviet fight against religion under the auspices of the Soviet authorities.

On December 15 a centralized institute of anti-religious courses will open here. The institute is to train anti-religious teachers. A number of candidates who are enrolled for this course are Jews.

JEWS DON'T OPPOSE POLICY OF NUMERUS CLAUSUS. IS CLAIM OF ORTHODOX LEADER

Statement Attributed to Vice-Presi-
dent of Budapest Jewish Kanlei

Budapest, Nov. 26.—What is alleged to be support for the numerus clausus policy in Hungary was secured by the Hungarian circles sponsoring the policy in a statement issued by one of the leaders of the Orthodox Jewish community of this city.

Mr. Hartstein, vice-president of the Orthodox Jewish Kanlei, is purported to have declared to the government that the Jewish community agrees on the necessity of a numerus clausus law, objecting merely to the fact that it refers only to Jews, because the Jews are not a separate race but Magyars of the Jewish faith.

LITHUANIAN RABBIS ARE RELUCTANT TO ACCEPT PROSELYTES TO JUDAISM

Kovno, Nov. 26.—A movement among Lithuanians to seek admittance into the fold of Judaism has made itself felt in recent months.

The Rabbinate of Kovno is of late receiving an increasing number of applications from Christians who are desirous of embracing Judaism. In the majority of cases the Rabbinate has declined to act upon these applications, particularly in cases where marriage to a Jew or Jewess was the motive.

During the last ten months five Jews embraced Christianity and five Christians became Jews, figures show.

CLEVELAND JEWISH CENTER CASE IS AGAIN POSTPONED

Cleveland, Nov. 26.—The suit instituted by the Cleveland Orthodox Committee of the Jewish Center against the board of directors of the Center and Rabbi Solomon Goldman was again postponed.

The case was scheduled to be brought to trial on November 28th. It was postponed to December 8.

PALESTINE LABOR BODY DIS- AVOWS MOSCOW DELEGATES

Riga, Nov. 25.—A delegation of five Palestinian workers arrived in Moscow to participate in the tenth anniversary celebrations of the Soviet regime. The delegates who declare they represent the Palestine workers were disavowed by the Histadruth, the Palestine Jewish labor federation.

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**\$500,000 CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED
 BY EDUCATION ASSOCIATION**

Pointing out that only twenty-nine per cent of the Jewish children of school age in Greater New York are receiving religious instruction, the Jewish Education Association, in a statement issued by Israel Unterberg, its president, calls for a fund of \$500,000 to enable it to extend religious education to 10,000 additional Jewish children in the coming year.

The figures given out by Mr. Unterberg place the number of Jewish children of school age in Greater New York at 350,000 and the number receiving a religious education at 100,000. The last figure, Mr. Unterberg stated, would have been 20,000 less, were it not for the efforts of the Jewish Education Association, which pays the tuition of children whose parents are too poor to pay it themselves and distributes prizes to pupils for good scholarship and attendance. The Association also facilitates the construction of school buildings by granting mortgage loans on easy terms.

In his statement Mr. Unterberg says: "The facts with regard to the instruction of Jewish children in the City of New York in the elements of their faith, should give concern to every public-spirited Jewish citizen of the community."

"It is a challenge to them both as Jews and as Americans. American ideals are based on religious freedom, but the religious spirit is inherent in these ideals. For their practice and realization, these ideals require that the rising generation be thoroughly imbued with the religious spirit, which is the most potent factor in strengthening the moral fiber of the individual and insuring the stability of our

**BIGOTRY NO BAR TO JURY DUTY,
 APPELLATE COURT DECIDES**
 Franklin Ford, of Station Whap,
 Reinstated on Jury

The decision of Supreme Court Justice Ford, which upheld the removal of Franklin Ford, manager of Radio Station WHAP, from the jury list because of his anti-Catholic and anti-Jewish utterances over the radio, was reversed by the Appellate Division yesterday. Mr. Ford's name was taken off the jury list by Commissioner of Jurors Frederick O'Bryne at the request of Judge Otto A. Rosalsky.

As section 15 of the Civil Rights Law provides that no citizen shall be disqualified on account of creed, the opinion stated, the only possible basis for Mr. Ford's debarment was that he was not intelligent.

"The facts set forth in the answer of the Commissioner of Jurors made out prima facie evidence that Mr. Ford was a man of violent religious prejudices," the opinion held.

"The question for us is whether this justified the Commissioner in finding him not intelligent. The Court should be astute to preserve the integrity of this portion of the Civil Rights Law and should not approve a definition of 'intelligence' which would exclude a man from jury service by reason of his beliefs.

"Intelligence in the sense used in the judiciary law means 'possessed of ordinary information and reasoning capacity'.

"A man cannot be removed from the jury list merely because of bigotry that runs counter to the fundamentals of religious toleration and freedom. American liberty extends the protection of the law even to those who are false to its principles."

Presiding Justice Dowling and Justices McAvoy, O'Malley, Finch and Proskauer passed on the case. They are, respectively, three Catholics, an Episcopalian and a Jew.

**13,000 ATTEND FUNERAL
 OF LATE H. D. NAUMBERG**

Warsaw, Nov. 25—Thirteen thousand people attended the funeral of H. D. Naumberg, late Jewish novelist. Many delegations arrived from all parts of Poland.

Eighty wreaths were laid at his grave, including one from the J. L. Peretz Jewish Writers Club of New York. Eulogies were delivered by Jewish workers and social workers, including Dr. Szabad of Vilna.

**'TIMES' CENSURES HUNGARY
 FOR ANTI-SEMITIC RIOTS**
 American Public Opinion Looks Askance at Spectacle

Declaring that the anti-Semitic student riots in Hungary do not make a good impression upon American public opinion, the New York Times in an editorial entitled "Jew-Baiting at Budapest," strongly censured the Hungarian authorities for tolerating this state of affairs and urged the leaders of Hungary who disapproved of the riots to raise their voices against them.

"Hungary is loudest among the casualty nations of the war in proclaiming her wrongs before the forum of world opinion," the Times writes. "Her plea for sympathy is certainly not helped by anti-Jewish riots in her universities and colleges. It would be, comparatively speaking, a comfort to think that the Budapest campus pogroms are primarily an effluvia of the same boyish spirits which find expression on Morningside Heights in tearing down grand stands for bonfires. But outbreaks of anti-Semitism are not isolated incidents in Hungary. They are, apparently, the normal expression of a prevailing national temper. Student riots are part of the mood which finds expression in banning Hungary's leading playwright from the stage of the National Theatre and in the avowed aims of powerful political leaders. In the

hard days which the war has brought on the Magyar people the one thing that would seem to be most useful is internal peace. If Hungary is to win her way back to what she considers her proper place, she needs all the educated leadership she can get. Instead, the eyes of too many of her leaders are turned to the past. The memories of defeat are invoked and mobilized in search of a scapegoat. The universities, instead of being employed as instruments of national regeneration, are in danger of being turned into arenas of racial and religious hate.

"No doubt there are leaders of the Hungarian people who disapprove of the Swastika riots or even view them with dismay. It is their duty, then, to make that fact plain to the outside world. American public opinion, which has taken pride in the work that one American, Jeremiah Smith, has done for the economic revival of Hungary under the auspices of the League of Nations, will not be pleasantly affected by the latest incidents.

"The problem is one that affected, in varying degree, many of the new nationalities in Central Europe. American sentiment for 'self-determination' cooled off perceptibly when it was shown that 'unredeemed' nationalities were not above denying redemption to others. Oppressed nationalities, once freed, have shown a pretty talent for oppression on their own account. A great deal should be allowed

UNTERMYER URGES FORD TO WITHDRAW HIS 'INTERNATIONAL JEW' FROM SALE

The insistence of Theodor Fritsch, German translator and publisher of Henry Ford's book, "The International Jew," that he has not yet received Henry Ford's letter ordering him to withdraw the book, as reported in a Jewish Telegraphic Agency despatch from Germany, caused Samuel Untermyer to renew the demand for the withdrawal of the book.

In a letter which he, as counsel for Herman Bernstein, wrote to Clifford B. Longley of Detroit, general counsel of the Ford Motor Company, Mr. Untermyer recalled that Mr. Ford's agreement to stop the sale of the book had been a main reason for Mr. Bernstein's consent to dropping his \$200,000 libel suit against the automobile manufacturer.

The letter after referring to a letter sent to the Leipzig publishers by Mr. Ford, continues:

"We shall expect Mr. Ford to compel them to desist, and I am sure he will, if necessary, seek to do so. The publications continue to do incalculable harm, principally because of the use of his name in connection with the sale of the book.

"I learn also that the book is being sold in other parts of the world and am hoping that everything within reason will be done to put an end to its publication and to assure the complete withdrawal of the book from circulation.

"I had supposed that in the performance of the agreement Mr. Ford would have, immediately after our settlement in July last, communicated with the various publishers continuing these unbelievably infamous libels upon the Jewish race, requiring them to cease selling the book and to surrender the unsold copies, and am rather disappointed that this was not promptly done."

HONGKONG COURT TO DECIDE ON JERUSALEM LEGACY

Jerusalem, Nov. 25—The High Court of Hongkong will decide on the award of a \$450,000 legacy left by a Jewish woman, Mrs. Bellius, of Hongkong, for the "Great Synagogue" of Jerusalem.

The authorities had difficulty in determining which is the "Great Synagogue" of Jerusalem. Both the Sephardic and Ashkenazic communities claim that the legacy rightly belongs to them as theirs is the "Great Synagogue" in the Holy City. Both parties declined a compromise.

Community's Consolidation Progresses as Institutions are Built

(By our San Francisco Correspondent)

San Francisco, Nov. 20—During the last ten years there has been evident in San Francisco and in other large cities of the West a gradual and steady breaking down of the lines between the various elements of Jewry.

So marked has this tendency toward a solidarity in Jewish ranks become that as a result movements are on foot in a score of western cities toward the formation of Jewish centers in which the activities of Orthodox, Conservative and Reform Jews would be consolidated.

Especially is this change noticeable in San Francisco and as San Francisco is typical of all Western United States in this respect, a brief view of conditions here will serve to illustrate the situation.

Ten years ago there were sharp lines between the three groups of San Francisco Jewry. Zionism had barely taken a foothold in the community and the Agudath Zion Society was made-up exclusively of the Orthodox. Then came Rabbi Wolf Gold from Palestine and established a Mizrahi Zionist group. That further drew the lines of demarcation.

B'nai Brithism was in the hands of the Orthodox and a few Conservatives. The Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Association were in the hands of the latter groups.

Slowly but certainly there has worked out a change that presages a solid front in Jewish activities with men and women of all "shades" of Judaism working harmoniously side by side to promote the best interests of their faith, regardless of personal beliefs on forms of worship.

Out of the small group of Orthodox Jews making up the Zionist body has emerged a large powerful Zionist Organization of Northern California comprising Jewish men and women of the Orthodox, Conservative and Reform elements. Group lines have been forgotten and the organization functions as one of the most influential and effective of Zionist bodies in the country.

The same is true of the B'nai Brith. Many prominent Jewish business and professional men — Reform Jews — have enlisted in the Sons of the Covenant. They work side by side with their fellows of orthodox and conservative views, while the differences

N. Y. JEWISH COMMUNAL SURVEY NEARS COMPLETION

Committees Will Hear Reports on Results This Week

The survey of the Jewish communal resources of greater New York, undertaken two years ago by the Bureau of Jewish Social Research at the request of a Citizens' Committee headed by Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, with Dr. Lee K. Frankel as the chairman of the Executive Committee, is nearing completion, it was announced yesterday.

The first of a series of committee meetings of volunteers constituting the various elements of the community in charge of the survey will be held on Wednesday at the Harmonie Club, when the Child Care Committee will meet under the chairmanship of Judge William N. Cohen.

Serving on the Child Care Committee with Judge Cohen are Samuel Strausbourger, Judge Aaron J. Levy, Judge Gustave Hartman, Sam A. Lewisohn, Mrs. Sylvan Stix, Herman W. Block, Max Blumberg, Judge Algeron I. Nova, Walter N. Rothschild, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Col. Herbert H. Lehman, Benjamin F. Feiner, Eli Winkler, Roger W. Straus, Edmund E. Wise, Mrs. Myron L. Borg and Alfred F. Hess.

The survey has two goals in view, according to the announcement. The first of these is to acquaint the Jewish community with the nature and extent of its problems in the field of Jewish communal work, and second, to outline a plan for the future of Jewish community effort.

The survey will show how the Jewish population is distributed throughout the city and how it is distributed in various age groups; what its death rate and health rate is and what have been the principal causes of death among Jews. Insofar as Jewish philanthropic work is concerned, the study embraces investigation of the 4,500 Jewish children under care in various orphan asylums, and institutions. A study also is being made of the thousands of Jewish families that are dependent; of the recreational and cultural work that is being done among Jews; a study of what facilities for bringing health to the Jewish community may exist and of what the needs are in behalf of the aged, the chronically sick and the acutely sick.

Other problems which the research workers are concerning themselves with are: delinquency among Jews and the extent of Jewish education being fostered. The survey includes every type of Jewish communal work both within the New York and Brooklyn Federations of Jewish Charities and in organizations not affiliated.

TROTZKY'S NAME TAKEN

FROM CITY BY SOVIET

Moscow, Nov. 26.—Leon Trotzky was stripped of the last honor conferred upon him by the Soviet leaders when the name of the town Gatchina, which had been renamed Trotzky, was again changed to Krasnarmysk.

The members of Congregation Shearith Israel, San Francisco, of which Rabbi Jacob Nieto is spiritual leader, have decided to erect a large Temple House adjoining their temple in which to carry on the educational, recreational and social activities of the congregation.

This follows the lead set by Temple Emanu-El, which has a well equipped Temple House adjoining its Temple. Harry E. Wolf has been appointed chairman of a committee to engage architects and secure the necessary plans.

Jewish and Christian congregations of Nassau County joined in a union service on Thanksgiving Day at St. James M. E. Church, Lindbrook, N. Y. Rabbi George J. Benedict preached the sermon, taking for his topic "Galilean and Patrioticism." Six churches and Temple Emanu-El participated in the service.

MONTREAL FEDERATION HAS CAMPAIGN FOR \$250,000

Montreal, Nov. 27.—The Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of Montreal launched a campaign for \$250,000 tonight at the Mount Royal Hotel.

The honorary chairman of the campaign is Mark Workman and general campaign chairman is Michael Morris.

The budget for 1937 called for expenditures of \$228,000 which will be increased to \$250,000 for the year 1938. The Federation has under its wing fourteen constituent societies, an orphan's home, a family welfare department, a juvenile aid society, a legal aid department, a sheltering and old people's home and the Herzl Dispensary. A new building for the sheltering and old people's home is at present being constructed at a cost of \$130,000.

For war psychology, for the rush of the wine of freedom to heads long bent under the yoke, for the inevitable trials and nervous exasperations connected with nation-building or rebuilding. But nearly ten years after the armistice is a fairly long time. Hungary might imitate the example of other post-war nationalities in the matter of substituting self-control for neurosis."

Rabbi Isaac Leadman, the Rev. Henry C. Dulhoff, the Rev. William A. Sparks, the Rev. Dr. J. Milton Thompson and Rabbi Norman Salt participated in the services.

The Congregation Shearith Israel, Jacksonville, Fla., has inaugurated a drive for funds for the construction of a new synagogue. J. Sufer is president of the congregation. The sum of \$18,700 was pledged at the meeting inaugurating the drive.

The will of George McCarthy of Brookline, Mass., a Catholic, contains a bequest of \$1,000 to the Beth Israel Hospital, Boston. Gifts were made to various charities including Catholic, Protestant and Jewish.
