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## ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT PROCEEDS TO PUNISH PER- PETRATORS OF POGROMS

120 Tried by Court Martial; Govern-  
ment Commission Appointed to  
Estimate Damage

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Dec. 14—Vigorous meas-  
ures to punish the perpetrators of the  
anti-Jewish pogroms in Transylvanian  
towns and in Jassy were taken by the  
Roumanian government, it was learned  
today.

In an official statement issued by the  
Council of Ministers it was declared  
that the chiefs of police in Grossward-  
ein and Clausenburg were dismissed.  
Eighty students and forty other per-  
sons who participated in the riots will  
be tried by a court martial before which  
proceedings were started.

The measures taken by the govern-  
ment, however, have not brought the  
leaders of the anti-Semitic movement  
to a state of calm. A twenty-four hour  
strike of the students throughout the  
country has been called by the lead-  
ers of the student movement to protest  
against the arrest of the culprits and  
their trial.

The government also announced that  
a special commission was appointed to  
inquire into the extent of the damage  
suffered by the victims of the riots.  
A bill will be introduced into parlia-

## MOND WILL VISIT PALESTINE TO MAKE EXTENSIVE STUDY

## DR. ZEVI PEREZ CHAJES, CHIEF RABBI OF VIENNA, DIES AT THE AGE OF 51

Won Distinction For Achievements in Field of Jewish Learning; Leaders  
Pay Tribute to Noted Scholar

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Dec. 14 — Dr. Zevi Perez  
Chajes, Chief Rabbi of Vienna, one of  
the outstanding Jewish scholars in Eu-  
rope and prominent Zionist leader,  
died last night. His death was as-  
cribed to heart failure. He was 51  
years old.

Vienna, Dec. 14—Funeral services  
for the late Dr. Z. P. Chajes will take  
place at noon on Friday. Dr. Leo  
Motzkin, chairman of the Zionist Ac-  
tions Committee, is expected to arrive  
here to represent the committee at the  
services. It is also possible that Dr.  
Chaim Weizmann or Nahum Sokolow  
will arrive.

London, Dec. 14—A memorial meet-  
ing to the late Dr. Z. P. Chajes was  
held here today at the headquarters of  
the World Zionist Organization. Chief  
Rabbi Dr. Joseph H. Hertz, Dr. M.  
D. Eder, Leo Motzkin and Dr. Judah  
L. Magnes paid tribute to the late  
scholar and Zionist leader.

Jerusalem, Dec. 14 — Messages of  
condolence at the death of Dr. Z. P.  
Chajes in Vienna were telegraphed by  
the Zionist Executive here, the Vaad  
Leumi, national Council of Palestine  
Jews and the Hebrew University.

Dr. Chajes was born in Brody,  
Galicia, October 13, 1876. He was the  
scion of one of the prominent Jewish  
families in Eastern Europe which has  
given a large number of religious lead-  
ers and scholars to the world. His  
grandfather, Zevi Hirsch Chajes, was  
the author of the "Attereth Zvi" and  
of "Introduction to the Talmud" and  
other works.

Dr. Z. P. Chajes gained fame at an  
early age as an "Talmid" (lad of excep-  
tional ability). His education was ex-  
tensive both in Jewish and secular  
studies, having graduated from the  
University of Vienna and the Jewish  
Theological Seminary there. As a stu-  
dent he published two works, one on  
medieval Jewish literature and the other  
on the New Testament. He specialized  
in the critical exegesis of the Bible,  
being one of the strongest opponents  
of the "high criticism" methods em-  
ployed by many non-Jewish scholars  
in Germany. As soon as he graduated

from the Vienna Seminary he was in-  
vited to serve as professor of Hebrew  
at the University of Florence and to a  
post at the Rabbinical Seminary in  
that city. He later became Chief Rabbi  
of Trieste where he also held the post  
of professor at the University of Tri-  
este.

Following the death of Dr. Moses  
Gidemann, Chief Rabbi of Vienna, Dr.  
Chajes was called to the Chief Rabbi-  
ate of Austria.

His call to this position by the  
Vienna Kehillah, in which non-Zionists  
and non-nationalists were in power, not-  
withstanding Dr. Chajes' affiliation  
with the Zionist movement, was con-  
sidered a high tribute to his leader-  
ship. In accepting this post Dr. Chajes  
made the condition that he should be  
freed from the functions usually de-  
manded of the rabbi, such as attend-  
ing weddings and funerals, leaving him  
free to pursue his studies and com-  
munal work. Among his many activi-  
ties, Rabbi Chajes established the Jew-  
ish Institute of Pedagogy in Vienna.

Besides his research work in the  
field of Jewish learning, Dr. Chajes  
was a devoted champion of Zionism  
and an outstanding orator. He took a  
leading part in relief work during and  
after the war, in the work of the  
Committee of Jewish Delegations at the  
World Peace Conference and was  
most active in the councils of the in-  
ternational Zionist movement. For  
several years he held the position of  
chairman of the Zionist Actions Com-  
mittee. He was a member of the Board  
of Governors of the Hebrew Universi-  
ty, taking particular interest in the  
Institute of Jewish Studies. Dr. Chajes  
was a member of the international com-  
mittee of the Kohut Foundation. He  
visited the United States twice, his  
last visit being in 1924.

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# PALESTINE COLONIZATION WILL BE SUCCESS, SIR JOHN, JEWISH AGENCY EXPERT, SAYS

Noted Soil Expert Leaves Jerusalem  
After Extensive Survey

Jerusalem, Dec. 14.—Sir John Campbell, leading British soil expert and member of the Jewish Agency Commission, left Jerusalem today, following an extensive study on behalf of the Commission.

Jewish colonization in Palestine will be a success if the necessary funds and machinery will be secured, he declared in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. "I found in the country human material which is of extremely high character. I found a good spirit among the colonists, both old and young, notwithstanding the prevailing crisis. Health conditions are satisfactory, especially reflected in the high birth rate"

Sir John will present his full report to the London Zionist Executive at the end of December.

# U. S. PUBLIC HEALTH BUREAU EXPLAINS INTELLIGENCE TESTS TO IMMIGRANTS

Replies to Congressman Celler's Inquiry; Immigration Act Requires Tests be made

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D.C., Dec. 14.—An explanation of the intelligence tests applied by the United States Consuls in Poland before granting visas to applicants was given by H. S. Cumming, Surgeon General of the Bureau of Public Health Service, in reply to an inquiry addressed to Secretary of State Frank B. Kellogg by Congressman Emanuel Celler.

Congressman Celler inquired as to whether the questions submitted by the American Consuls to the applicants are the usual type of questions on the basis of regulations issued by the United States Government and whether or not the Department has sanctioned the application of intelligence tests. Mr. Celler cited an instance where the mother of an American citizen, residing in Mladzow, Vilna, was asked upon application for a visa to answer the following questions:

"How many feathers has a goose more than a duck?" "What is the difference between a man and a woman?" "How many legs have three people and two chickens?" The examiner gave the woman a piece of wood and asked her to carve something therefrom. He gave her a pencil and paper and asked her to draw something.

To Mr. Celler's questions the Surgeon General replied:

"With reference to questions that are being propounded to aliens abroad as a part of the test of their fitness to come to this country, it is advised that questions of the general type as those contained in the list submitted are usually asked of those aliens who are selected for intensive mental examination. All aliens are not subjected to such intensive examination; only those are so subjected who are suspected of being mentally defective and the propounding of questions of this type is a part of their psychiatric examination. Considered as identities, these questions are manifestly ridiculous and readily recognized as such by people of normal intelligence. The psychiatric interest in propounding such questions principally

# GOVERNMENT OF LATVIA. CONSTITUTED WITH MI- NORITIES' AID, RESIGNS

Riga, Dec. 14.—A new political situation was created in Latvia today when the government headed by Skujenieks, Socialist, resigned.

This government was created last year with the aid of the national minorities in the country and took a favorable attitude in the question of the naturalization law, upon which the status of many Jewish families in the country depended.

# FELIX M. WARBURG GIVES \$10,000 GIFT TO JEWISH EDUCATION ASSOCIATION

A gift of \$10,000 was made by Felix M. Warburg to the Jewish Education Association, which is conducting a campaign for \$500,000 for its work during the coming year in providing facilities for Jewish education.

In a letter accompanying his gift, Mr. Warburg said: "It is wrong for parents to suppose that by providing their children with luxuries they are furnishing them with the principles of life which they need. Any effort to open more school-rooms in the instruction of religion, be it in the Reform or Orthodox Wing, ought to be encouraged in every possible way."

The sixth annual dinner of the association will be held next Sunday at the Waldorf-Astoria, marking the conclusion of the \$500,000 drive, of which Jonah J. Goldstein is chairman. Joseph Leblang is chairman of the dinner committee. The function will be in the nature of a Chanukah festival.

attaches to the reaction that the questions produce in the alien's mind, with due regard as to its actual absurdity. The literal meaning of such questions is entirely overshadowed by the mental reaction that they are designed to produce. The propounding of questions of this type constitutes but a minor one of many phases of psychiatric investigation necessary to the proper determination of mental stability or lack of stability. Taken alone, they are of very slight import, but considered as part of a whole in psychiatric work, they fulfill a certain requirement.

"It is not possible to furnish you with a list of questions propounded to aliens under the above conditions. The various psychiatric examiners propound questions of this general type, varying the questions among themselves and from day to day. There are no such definitely worded questions prescribed by law or regulation, but the use of questions of this general type is prescribed as a part of special mental examination applied to aliens suspected of being mentally defective.

"The mental and physical examination of immigrants is prescribed under sections 3, 16, and 23 of the Immigration Act of 1917, approved February 5, 1917, and the conduct of such examinations is governed by the Regulations Governing the Medical Inspection of Aliens, 1927."

"The Immigration Act of 1924, approved May 26, 1924, prescribes the general procedure to be applied in the selection of intending immigrants abroad."

was celebrated in Europe and America on October 13, 1926.

The news of the death of Dr. Z. P. Chajes caused deep mourning among Jewish scholars, Zionists and among his many admirers.

"It is with deepest sorrow that I learn of the death of the Chief Rabbi of Vienna, Rabbi Z. P. Chajes," Dr. Stephen S. Wise declared. "Dr. Chajes was for so many years one of my dear friends, that I cannot, at this moment, bring myself to write an objective appraisal of the man. But this is true,—he was one of the great Jews of his generation. His scholarship was vast and accurate. His love for his people, their life, their traditions, their learning was his distinction. I know of no Jew of his generation, who gave himself more completely, with more utter unselfishness and great-heartedness, to every interest of his people, its life, its language, its land. He loved and served them all.

"It was only yesterday that his dearest friend in America, Dr. George Alexander Kohut, and I were considering how we might bring him to the Jewish Institute of Religion for at least a year, or a part of a year. Of the Institute he has from the beginning been a sympathetic and helpful counsellor. Not only the Jewry of Vienna and Austria, but world-Israel is bereft by the passing of this sage, with incredible learning, and with the heart of a child! His place was Palestine. There he should have lived and taught and led, for there his heart was. His dust, too, must be gathered up and laid to rest in the land which he understood and loved and served as few men," Dr. Wise said.

Dr. George Alexander Kohut said: "The passing of Dr. Z. H. Chajes, Chief Rabbi of Austria, gives to me a sense of personal loss especially as we were devoted friends for the past decade and have planned together important work for the furtherance of Jewish learning.

"In honor of his fiftieth anniversary, I established the Chajes Foundation which has just now issued two volumes. No doubt scholars will respond to an appeal to bring out a memorial volume containing learned papers and devoted to his memory.

"His greatest achievement, quite apart from his early career in Italy, where he served as Professor of Hebrew at the State University, was the establishment of a Jewish Institute of Pedagogy in Vienna which has rallied hundreds of young people to the cause of Jewish education. It is due to Dr.

### St. Louis Jewry Records Lively Communal Activities

(By Our St. Louis Correspondent)

St. Louis, Dec. 11 — Two notable gifts in Jewish philanthropy within recent weeks have brought Jewish communal life in St. Louis to the newspaper headlines—Mark Steinberg's gift of \$100,000 to the "Y," and Sydney M. Shoenberg's gift of \$300,000 to the Jewish Hospital.

The St. Louis Jewish Hospital is one of the most up-to-date hospitals in the country and has on its staff the best known physicians in St. Louis. It has a Kosher kitchen which has become the sine qua non in Jewish institutions. Rabbi Abraham E. Halpern, of the B'nai Amoono Congregation, supervises the Kashruth. The "Y" is under the direction of Gilbert Harris.

The Hebrew schools system in St. Louis, along modern lines with the support of the Federation, is a recent movement here, much younger than the systems in Cleveland, Chicago, Philadelphia. The result is that we cannot as yet claim a consistent educational policy.

Dr. Leon Harrison, outstanding Reform Rabbi, has just completed thirty-five years in Temple Israel, which was the occasion of a testimonial dinner in his honor, attended by five hundred guests.

The Midwest Conference on Palestine was held in St. Louis. Representatives from nine states came together to form the Midwest Region for Zionist work. In essence it was a union of forces between the Chicago and St. Louis Zionists, or to put it on a personal basis, a rapprochement between Prof. Gustave Klausner, of St. Louis, and Max Shulman, of Chicago. The interests of the Zionist Organization, the United Palestine Appeal, and the Jewish National Fund will be directed more intensively from these two cities. A quota of three-quarter million dollars has been adopted.

The third United Palestine Appeal campaign in St. Louis is scheduled for the month of March. Dr. Chaim Weizmann has been invited as the guest of the St. Louis Zionists. The campaign will be given four weeks. Gustave Klausner, Samucl Kransberg, M. J. Slonim will direct the campaign.

### RELATIONS OF TENANTS AND LANDOWNERS IN PALESTINE TO BE REGULATED

Jerusalem, Dec. 14 — Recommendations to regulate the relation between tenants cultivating the land under lease and the owners who desire to sell the land were made by the Jerusalem Committee for the Protection of Agricultural Tenants.

The committee in its report which was published today suggests that the landlord be required to give one year's notice if he wishes the tenant to leave the land. The landlords are also to be required to compensate the tenant for improvements made on the land and to pay damages if the eviction causes any disturbance. It was stated that the recommendations of the committee are soon to be incorporated in a government ordinance.

### AGUDAH COUNCIL TO MEET IN BERLIN ON DECEMBER 27

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 14—The Central Council of the Agudath Israel, Orthodox Jewish world organization, will open its session here on December 27.

One of the points on the agenda is the convocation of the second general congress of rabbis and Agudah leaders, known as the K'nessioh Gdollah. The first K'nessioh was held in Vienna in 1923 and it was decided to convene it again within five years.

One thousand young men representing twenty-eight temple clubs and Brotherhoods will hold a rally at the Hotel Astor on Sunday evening, December 18th, to celebrate the Festival of Chanukah. Leaders of Reform Judaism, rabbis and laymen, will speak at the rally.

"Celebrating a great event in Jewish history, and having no other motive," Roger W. Straus, president of the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods declared in making public plans for the dinner and rally, "this meeting will demonstrate that the spirit of the Maccabees still lives in us. While our forefathers fought the tyrants and oppressors of their times, we will fight the tyrants of crass materialism and indifference which is striving to smother our religious fervor and love of the higher aspects of Jewish life and life in general." Mr. Straus is cooperating in the plans for the dinner with a committee composed of Charles P. Kraemer, Abraham N. Davis, Dr. Jesse Cohen, Abraham Epstein, Dr. Jacques Kohn, Sydney Davis, and I. Walter Godnick.

The film "King of Kings" was withdrawn from the moving picture theatres in Detroit, Mich., following a protest. Bookings for the picture to run for several months in Detroit have been cancelled.

ment by the government asking for an authorization of the amount of 88,000,000 lei for the payment of damages, it was stated.

The Jewish communities in Roumania are still under the effect of the events of the past week. A call issued by Chief Rabbi Niemewer, member of the Roumanian Senate as the representative of the Jewish religion, ordered the setting aside of a day of mourning by the Jewish communities throughout the country because of the desecration of the synagogues and the Holy Scrolls.

The regrets of the Regency Council which is the supreme power in Roumania since the death of King Ferdinand were expressed to Dr. William Filderman, president of the Union of Roumanian Jews, at an audience granted by the Regents to the leader of Roumanian Jews. Dr. Filderman was authorized to declare on behalf of the Regents that they disapprove of the anti-Semitic riots.

An Associated Press despatch from Bucharest states that the prompt investigation by the Roumanian authorities of the beating of Wilfred N. Keller, American citizen, at Oradea, has made it unnecessary for William S. Culbertson, American Minister, to make a trip to that place to investigate the incident. Foreign Minister Titulescu has promised Mr. Culbertson that full reparation will be made to Keller for personal injuries and business losses.

## I. O. B. B. \$300,000 BUDGET APPROVED BY EXECUTIVE (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Dec. 14 — A budget of \$300,000 for the activities of the Independent Order B'nai Brith during 1928 was approved by the Executive Committee of the Constitution Grand Lodge at a meeting held yesterday.

Plans were made for the organization of a speakers' bureau. A considerable amount was voted for the Leo N. Levi Memorial Hospital at Hot Springs, Ark. to make it possible for that institution to erect a clinic.

The activities of the I. O. B. B. include the Hillel Foundations, the A Z A Junior Order of the B'nai Brith, the bureau in Mexico and the Anti-Defamation League. The A Z A has sixty-four chapters functioning in the United States.

In recognition of his generosity to French institutions George Blumenthal, New York banker, has been promoted to the rank of Commander of the Legion of Honor, it was announced by the French government.

Mr. Blumenthal was elected to the Legion in 1920. Two years ago he gave 1,000,000 francs to the faculty of Letters and Science at the Sorbonne. Previously he had given 7,000,000 francs to the Sorbonne. Last year he gave 1,500,000 francs to a Paris clinic for the treatment of children's throat diseases.

Madame Rachel Yenait Ben Zvi, head of the Chaluash training school in Jerusalem, arrived in the United States on the steamer Berengaria. Madame Ben Zvi has come to the United States in the interest of the organized women workers in Palestine.

Steps towards unifying the curriculum in the elementary Hebrew Schools and Talmud Torahs in Greater New York, with the view of raising the standards in elementary Jewish education, were taken at the initiative of the Yeshiva, according to an announcement made public by Dr. Reuel, President of the faculty of the Yeshiva. The first group of five of the leading Talmud Torahs in Greater New York have entered into an arrangement with the Teachers' Institute of the Yeshiva by which graduates of these schools will be given preference in admittance to the Teachers' Institute.

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
