ZIONIST REPRESENTATIVES ARRIVE IN VIENNA TO AT- TEND FUNERAL OF CHAJES

Delegations From Poland, Germany, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Roumania and Hungary Gather in Vienna
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Dec. 15.—Delegations representing various Zionist societies and many representative Jews from Poland, Germany, Italy, Czechoslovakia, Roumania and Hungary will arrive here Friday to attend the funeral services for the late Dr. Zevi Perez Chajes.

The Federation of Austrian Zionists, as well as the Vienna Kehillah, have issued a call for memorial meetings in honor of the late leader.

Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the Zionist Executive, is expected to arrive here Friday.

A message of condolence was received today by the family of the late Dr. Chajes from Dr. Chaim Weizmann who is now in Paris on his way back from Roumania. Messages of condolence are being received from many parts of the world.

LONDON PUBLIC CRITICIZES 'KING OF KINGS' PRODUCTION (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Dec. 15.—The first showing in England of the Cecil de Mille production, "King of Kings" at Covent Garden Opera House has called forth overwhelming critical opinion. The majority of those who have witnessed the film declare that they consider it a dull presentation, historically inaccurate and greatly distorted.

Many prominent London Jews who saw the film declare that it contains unfriendly features.

The "lie of lies" is the epithet used by the "Jewish World" to describe the picture. It is striking that all the unfavorable figures are presented as Semites, while the saintly and devout are depicted as Aryans.

ROUMANIAN OFFICIALS BAR JEWISH PROTEST MEETING (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Dec. 15.—A protest meeting called under the auspices of the Union of Roumanian Jews was prohibited today by the Bucharest police.

The meeting was called in connection with the day of mourning, proclaimed by the Rabbinate because of the desecration of synagogues and Holy Scrolls in the anti-Jewish riots.

LAY ROUMANIAN POGROMS TO ANTI-SEMITIC INTERNATIONAL, UNDER MAGYAR DIRECTION

Hungarian Nationalists Said To Have
Provoked Roumanian Riots For
Double Purpose

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Dec. 15.—The theory that the anti-Jewish pogroms in Roumania are to be traced to the activities of the anti-Semitic International, working this time mainly through the channel of the Hungarian anti-Semitic organizations, striving to accomplish two purposes, to hurt the Jews and to promote the political interests of Hungary, was forwarded here as an explanation of the events of the past week.

It is stated that this anti-Semitic organization hired agent provocateurs who worked among the Roumanian nationalistic students, inciting them to the outrages against the Jews. The funds came, it is asserted here, from European sources, the same sources which lent financial support to the recent riots in the Hungarian universities against the Jewish students.

The Hungarian Nationalists are declared to have a double purpose in creating anti-Jewish demonstrations in neighboring states. They are doing this partly so that the Hungarian student outrages do not stand out alone, but their more subtle political purpose is to make both the Magyar and Jewish populations in Transylvania regret more bitterly their detachment from Hungary.

Agents of this organization are said to be under arrest among those taken.

The National Association of Hungarian College Students has issued an official challenge to Roumanian students to meet them in duels, a despatch from Budapest to the "New York Times" states. The Hungarians propose reviving the ancient Roman custom of choosing several leading fighters to meet the Roumanian leaders, preferably in Switzerland.

The Hungarians conclude their challenge with the words: "We hope that the Roumanian university men who attacked unarmed civilians will not prove themselves cowards when it comes to meeting equally armed men in combat."

Budapest papers say that the challenge would sound better had not the students attacked Jewish students bloodily two weeks ago.

ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT TO REBUILD SYNAGOGUES DE- STROYED IN POGROM CITIES

Allots \$2,000 Fund for This Purpose;
356 of 430 Arrested Persons Are
Released

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Dec. 15.—The Roumanian government has set aside a fund of \$2,000 to rebuild the synagogues in Grosswardin and Clausenburg destroyed during the anti-Jewish riots in Transylvanian cities last week.

It was learned today that the British government will not make any presentations to the Roumanian government in connection with the Transylvanian excesses, it having been established that no British subject was among the victims.

Concerning the incident with the British flag, it was brought out that a local storekeeper, a Roumanian Jew, hoisted the Union Jack in the hope that the British flag would keep away the rioters.

Dr. William Fielderman, president of the Union of Roumanian Jews, in a statement issued today following his audience with the Regents Council declared that the members of the Council condemned in outspoken terms the barbaric acts committed in Oradea-mare, Cluj and Jassy and that he is convinced the government will take measures to punish those who are guilty.

Of the 400 persons arrested, 356 were released. Forty-four are still detained. Thirty-three of the students and other persons who actively participated in the riots are being court martialled on the charges of committing violence, plundering and stealing.

MANY SEEK POST OFFERED BY JERUSALEM MUNICIPALITY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 15.—A score of offers have been received from England and Palestine in reply to the contest for the post of Chief Engineer to the Jerusalem Municipality proclaimed six months ago. Nine offers were selected for consideration and a special commission composed of representatives of the Government and the Municipal Council will decide to whom the post should be offered.

The Municipal Council has prorogued for another six months the office of the chief accountant appointed by the Government six months ago in connection with the grant in aid extended to the Municipality this year.

PROTEST TO PRESIDENT
AT ROUMANIAN POGROMS

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Utica, N. Y., Dec. 15—A resolution protesting against the treatment of Jews in Roumania, adopted by the Harmony Club of this city, was forwarded to President Coolidge, to Secretary of State Kellogg and the American diplomatic corps in Roumania.

The resolution read: "Whereas Harmony Club of Utica is reliably informed that the Roumanian government is permitting violent persecutions and is taking no measures to prevent barbarous and cruel treatment of innocent Jewish adults and children, and whereas the Harmony Club is composed of representative American citizens of Jewish faith, this resolution protesting against the cruel and inhuman treatment is adopted and the President is urged to use his influence to alleviate the persecution of the Jews in Roumania according to the precedent set by the late Theodore Roosevelt."

The conference of Jewish organizations called by the American Jewish Congress to arrange a mass meeting to protest against the anti-Jewish riots in Roumania will be held on Sunday, December 18 at the Town Hall Club. The committee in charge consists of Dr. A. J. Rongy, Louis Lande, Max L. Hollander and Leo Wolfson.

NEW TREATY BETWEEN GREAT
BRITAIN AND IRAQ SIGNED;

MANDATE TO LAST TILL 1932

London, Dec. 15—The British Mandate over Iraq will not expire next year as was demanded by the Arab nationalists in Iraq, it was learned today when it was announced that a new treaty regulating the relations between Great Britain and Iraq was signed.

The treaty was signed by Major Ormsby Gore in behalf of the Colonial Office and by General Jafar Pasha el Askari, Prime Minister and Minister of Foreign Affairs in the Iraq government.

Prior to the affixing of the signatures to the treaty a conflict arose resulting in the hurried departure of the Iraqi Prime Minister. Negotiations were then conducted directly between King Feisal and the members of the British Cabinet. After a compromise had been reached, the Prime Minister was summoned to return to London from Marseilles where he was already on his way back to Iraq. It is understood that one of the stipulations in the new treaty is that Great Britain will support the government of Iraq's application for admission into the membership of the League of Nations in the year 1932, which means that until that date, the British Mandate over the country will continue.

RABBINICAL ASSEMBLY

URGES WITHDRAWAL OF

'KING OF KINGS' PICTURE

A resolution urging the withdrawal of the film "King of Kings" was adopted by the Executive Council of the Rabbinical Assembly at its meeting yesterday.

The resolution read: "Resolved that the Rabbinical Assembly register its protest against the public exhibition of the motion picture, 'The King of Kings,' on the ground that the showing of such a film is conducive to a feeling of prejudice by Christians against Jews,

"And that the Rabbinical Assembly request the Synagogue Council to ask Christian bodies engaged in the effort of promoting good-will between Jews and Christians, to use their offices toward the withdrawal of that film."

N.Y. STUDENT COMMITTEES OR-
GANIZE PROTEST AT ROUMA-
NIAN AND HUNGARIAN RIOTS

Dr. Frederick B. Robinson, of the College of the City of New York, will preside at a protest meeting against the riots in Roumania and in Hungary to be held on Sunday, December 18, at 2 P. M. at Cooper Union. The meeting is being arranged by the students committee, composed of representatives from various colleges and universities in New York City organized for the purpose of protesting against the anti-Semitic activities of students in European countries.

The speakers announced are Louis Marshall, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Congressman William I. Sirovich, Nathan D. Perlman, Bishop Paul Jones, Max D. Steuer, Norman Thomas, Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan, B. C. Vladeck, and Senator Royal S. Copeland.

In a communication to the Students Committee Dr. Robinson wrote: "I express sentiments in favor of fair play to all people regardless of race or creed. Educators cannot properly discriminate against Jewish students, nor should their fellow-students prosecute them because of race or creed. All liberal minded people should do whatever they can with propriety and effectiveness to spread the gospel of fair play. Nothing is more out of keeping with the American spirit than the persecution of a person or group because of race, creed or color. Furthermore, there is no field of altruistic human endeavor in which complete tolerance and open minded fairness is more essential than education. It is the function of the educator to transmit the race heritage to all. He cannot properly discriminate in his ministrations against any group. Education of all levels should be available to all men who by character and scholarship are fit to receive it. Certainly the Jews, in all ages, have demonstrated their capacity for scholarship."

The officers of the Students Committee are: Andrew Wagner, chairman, John Salater, treasurer, Albert Lorain and Arthur Mayerson, secretary.

A testimonial dinner was given last night at the Hotel Pennsylvania to Harry L. Gluckman, executive director of the Jewish Welfare Board, on the occasion of his ten years of work with the Board. Mr. Gluckman came to the Jewish Welfare Board in December 1917 as assistant executive director and in July 1919 was appointed to his present post. Louis Kraft, director of Jewish Center Activities of the Board, presided.

Mr. Gluckman is a member of the Board of Directors of the 92nd Street Y.M.H.A. a member of the executive committees of the National Conference of Jewish Social Work and the National Association of Jewish Center Workers. He is also a member of the School for Jewish Social Work.

MIZRACHI LEADERS, RABBIS BERLIN, UZIEL RECEIVED BY PRESIDENT COOLIDGE

Washington, Dec. 15.—Rabbi Meyer Berlin and Rabbi Ben Zion Uziel, Chief Rabbi of Jaffa and Tel Aviv, were received by President Coolidge.

The President expressed the hope that the Jews will succeed in Palestine as well as they have in the United States. He also expressed pleasure at the gift of John D. Rockefeller, Jr., of \$2,000,000 for the museum in Jerusalem.

Rabbi Berlin and Rabbi Uziel extended greetings to the President on behalf of the Mizrahi. Rabbi Louis J. Schwefel of Washington accompanied the delegation. They expressed their appreciation for the friendly attitude of the American Government toward the Zionist movement. Rabbi Uziel also expressed his gratitude for the assistance America gave to the Jews in Palestine during the war.

The delegation was introduced to the president by Sir Adrian Baillie of the British Embassy.

Rabbi Berlin and Rabbi Uziel also called on Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador to the United States. The delegation laid particular stress on the labor situation in Palestine and expressed hope that the Jews will be given proper recognition with regard to employment in connection with the Dead Sea and Haifa projects and that wages would be paid in accordance with the Jewish standard of living.

AMERICAN MIZRACHI WILL HAVE CONVENTION IN BOSTON

Boston, Dec. 15.—The annual convention of the Mizrahi, the Orthodox Zionist organization, will take place here the beginning of January, it was announced.

Three days, January 8, 9 and 10, will be devoted to the sessions. Several hundred delegates are expected to attend to hear the reports from Palestine of the Mizrahi delegation consisting of Rabbi Meyer Berlin, Rabbi Ben Zion Uziel, Chief Rabbi of Jaffa and Tel Aviv, Rabbi J. L. Fishman and Herman Struck.

Rabbi Samuel Rosenblatt, son of Cantor Josef Rosenblatt, of New York, was installed as rabbi of Beth Tfiloh Congregation, Baltimore, Md.

Prof. Moses Hyamson, of the Jewish Theological Seminary, delivered the principal address at the ceremony. Harry T. Kellman, president of the congregation, formally introduced the new rabbi. Rabbi William Rosenau, of the Eastview Place Temple; Cantor Bernard Imer, of the Beth Tfiloh Congregation, and Joseph Allen also took part in the installation.

San Francisco Jewry Seeks New Ways of Awakening Jewish Consciousness in New Generation

(By Our San Francisco Correspondent)

San Francisco, Dec. 9.—If this be the age of youth, the Jewish child by no means has been overlooked.

In San Francisco as in other Jewish communities of the West, every effort of organized Judaism is being exerted today toward awakening a Jewish consciousness in the boy and girl that the coming generation may be equipped to assume the responsibilities of Israel a few years hence.

Recreational groups, clubs, athletic teams, Bible study circles, and the like—all catering to the varied interests of the modern Jewish boy and girl—are being conducted under the supervision of congregation authorities, with the sponsorship of Jewish leaders.

The whole modern tendency of infusing religious interest in the heart and mind of young Jewry by linking the synagogue with the diversified outside interests of the present-day boy and girl reached an impressive climax during the high holy days.

For the first time in the history of western Jewry, special children's services were held in the afternoon of Yom Kippur at Temple Emanu-El, with Rabbi Louis I. Newman in the pulpit. And the sermon that he preached to the children was as much an inspirational message to the parents as it was to the boys and girls who occupied a specially reserved section in the front pews of the colossal new temple.

While children's services have been conducted successfully in New York for sometime, they were new to San Francisco and the impression that they made upon the young worshippers now is a subject of comment at Jewish gatherings in the western communities and of discussion in the western Jewish press.

Small girls sang in the choir. Boys took part in the service and read from the Torah. When the youngsters finally filed out there was a general feeling among the worshippers who represent the leaders of San Francisco Jewry that here was the last word in all that has been done in America to infuse a true love of Judaism and interest in Jewish affairs in the young of the present day.

There is no doubt but that the "experiment" of Yom Kippur not only will be continued as a permanent thing in San Francisco but will be copied by many other congregations in the West.

BROWN WILL TOUR U. S. TO STIMULATE UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN COLLECTIONS

A tour of the United States to stimulate the collection of \$7,000,000 to enable the Joint Distribution Committee to carry out its reconstruction program will be made by David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign. This will be the fifth tour of the country by Mr. Brown since he became chairman of the United Jewish Campaign in June, 1925.

Mr. Brown's tour is a result of the Constructive Relief Conference of the United Jewish Campaign and the Joint Distribution Committee in Chicago when it was pointed out by Felix Warburg, Paul Baerwald, Herbert H. Lehman, and other officers of the Joint Distribution Committee, and by Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, head of that body's agricultural work in Russia, that unless at least \$7,500,000 more in cash was secured for the purposes of relief and reconstructive work overseas by the end of 1928, the J.D.C. would be unable to carry out its program.

DEDICATE ORPHANAGE IN CAPITAL OF BULGARIA

The Orphanage will house Jewish boys and girls whose fathers fell fighting for Bulgaria in the Great War. The Chief Rabbi, Dr. Hananel, Colonel Tadjer, President of the Jewish Consistory, and representatives of Jewish communities and organizations throughout the country were present.

GERMAN-JEWISH PUBLISHING HOUSE MARKS 25 YEARS WORK

Berlin, Dec. 15.—The publishing house, "Juedische Verlag" here is celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of its activity.

The firm was established by Dr. Martin Buber, Dr. Berthold Feiwel, E. M. Lilien and David Trietsch. Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Mr. Leo Motzkin, and Dr. Alfred Nossig were also associated in its establishment.

The Juedische Verlag was the first house to start the publication of Jewish books in modern format. It commenced its activity with the issue of the Jewish Almanach, which contained contributions by the leading Jewish poets and artists of Western and Eastern Europe. Its pamphlet, "A Jewish High School" was the first call for the establishment of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. It then published German translations of selected essays by Achad Ha'am, translations of stories by I. L. Peretz, a collection of monographs on Joseph Israels, Max Liebermann, E. M. Lilien, Lesser Ury, Jehuda Epstein, and Solomon J. Solomon, a collection of lyrics by the younger Jewish poets, the Zionist writings of Theodor Herzl and Max Nordau, the sociological writings of Dr. Arthur Ruppin, translations from Bialik, David Pinski, Sholom Asch, works by Dr. Martin Buber, David Bergelson, and others.

In 1920 it started the publication of Dr. Martin Buber's periodical, "Der Jude." It has also issued a German edition of the works of Mendele Mocher Seforim, the diaries of Dr. Herzl, the diaries and letters of Joseph Trumpeldor, Bialik's essays, a number of biographical works, and much literature for the young. At present it is preparing the ten volume work on the World History of the Jewish People, by Professor Simon Dubnov, and a four-volume Jewish lexicon, prepared by Dr. Herlitz and Dr. Kirschnier with the collaboration of 230 Jewish scholars and writers. Both works will be ready by the end of 1928.

Miss Ettalene M. Grice, assistant professor of Assyriology and Babylonian literature at Yale University, died at her home in New Haven last week. Miss Grice was also assistant curator of the Babylonian collection at Yale, and a noted archaeologist. She had been associated with Yale since receiving her Ph.D. degree there in 1917. At the late Professor Albert Clay as a special student, research fellow, lecturer and assistant in care of the Babylonian collection. From 1919 to 1925 as holder of the Kohut Fellowship in Assyriological research she made many contributions to that field of research. She recently completed an Assyriological dictionary to appear under the Alexander Kohut Foundation and to be printed by the Yale Press.

Miss Grice was a graduate at the Western College for Women and began her Semitic studies at Bryn Mawr College in 1912. She was born in Portsmouth, Ohio, in 1887.

BOSTON ATTORNEY CREATES \$100,000 FUND FOR NEWSBOYS

Boston, Mass., Dec. 13.—A \$100,000 fund to aid newsboys who desire to obtain a college education was established by Harry E. Burroughs, Boston attorney.

The establishment of the newsboys' foundation was announced by Mrs. Burroughs yesterday at the Boston City Club before a gathering of 1,500 newsboys.

The speakers at the meeting were Governor Alvan T. Fuller, Judge Michael J. Murray; Joseph G. Brin, Dean Omer Albers of Boston University Law School; Mrs. Jennie Loitman Barron, member of the Boston School Committee.

The Advisory members of the foundation includes: Governor Alvan T. Fuller, Judge William C. Wait of the Mass. Supreme Court, Roger W. Babson, Rabbi Harry Levi, Christopher L. Bullman of the National Shawmut Bank and Dr. George W. Coleman.

JEWISH SCHOLAR IS FETED ON SEVENTIETH BIRTHDAY

Prague, Dec. 15.—Professor Samuel Steinherr, well known Jewish scholar, formerly dean of the German University at Prague, was the recipient of many congratulatory messages today on the occasion of his seventieth anniversary.

Professor Steinherr resigned from the University because of an anti-Semitic campaign conducted against him. He is a member of the Czechoslovakian lodge of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith and takes an active interest in Jewish communal affairs.

New York State Superintendent of Insurance James A. Beha confirmed a report that his office has had under investigation the financial affairs of the United States Grand Lodge of the Order Brith Abraham, sixty-eight-year-old Jewish fraternal and benevolent organization with 62,000 members in 200 subordinate lodges. The organization is reported by an examiner of the State Insurance Department to be able to pay its creditors at least 40 per cent. on its debts, but officers of the lodge stated that it was on the verge of dissolution. The cause is given as low insurance rates and a high mortality among members of the organization.

The Order Brith Abraham has no connection with the Independent Order Brith Abraham.

The will of Louis J. Block, author and educator, who died in Chicago of injuries sustained in an automobile accident provides a perpetual trust fund of \$4,000 to be used as a scholarship for the outstanding pupil of each eighth grade class of the John Marshall High School, of which Mr. Block was the head for thirty-one years.

JEWISH STUDIES SOCIETY IS FORMED IN ROUMANIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Dec. 15.—A Society for Jewish Studies was formed in Roumania, the members including Senator Dr. Niemirow, Chief Rabbi of Bucharest, Rabbi Zirelson, Chief Rabbi of Bessarabia, Dr. A. J. Mark, Chief Rabbi of Czernowitz, Dr. M. Eisner, Chief Rabbi of Cluj, and Dr. I. Singer, Chief Rabbi of Temesvar.

The Society is concentrating mainly on the history and folklore of the Jews in Old Roumania and the new Roumanian provinces. The first volume of proceedings of the Society will soon be published.

Rabbi Abraham J. Feldman, of Congregation Beth Israel, of Hartford, will deliver on Monday evening with Dr. Lothrop Stoddard of Boston on the question of "Has Immigration of the Last Fifty Years Been an Asset or Liability to the United States" at a meeting of the Hartford Get-Together Club of which State Commissioner of Education Dr. A. B. Meredith is president. Dr. Stoddard is the author of several books stressing the "Nordic" theory, such as "The Rising Tide of Color."

The presiding officer of this debate will be Professor G. A. Kleene, of Trinity College.

Edward C. Stokes, former Governor of New Jersey, Frederick W. Donnelly, Mayor of Trenton, Superintendent of Trenton Schools William J.
