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PALESTINE MOST PEACEFUL COUNTRY IN BRITISH EMPIRE BISHOP KEAN DECLARES

Considers Lull in Jewish Immigration as Transitory

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Dec. 30.—There is now less tension in Palestine between Jew and Arab, the Right Rev. Godric Kean, Bishop-Auxiliary and Vicar General of the Latin Patriarchate, Jerusalem, who is on a visit to Manchester, said in the course of an interview with the "Manchester Guardian".

He praised the energy of the Jewish immigrants, and dismissed the present arrest in Jewish immigration as a transitory phase.

Bishop Kean has been in Palestine during the whole period of the British mandate.

"Lord Plumer is one of the most valuable servants that the British Empire has today," Bishop Kean said, "and that is saying a great deal. He is a man of consummate tact and is bent on securing fair-play and justice for all classes. And so he has won the confidence of everybody. That is a matter of some importance in a place like Palestine where you have people of so many nationalities, representing a number of religions and opposing interests, each determined to

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AGUDAH PROCLAIMS FAST DAY AS PROTEST AGAINST PALESTINE COMMUNITIES ORDINANCE

Jerusalem, Dec. 30.—January 1, the day when the Palestine Communities Ordinance will be promulgated in the Official Gazette of the Palestine government was declared by the Agudah leaders here as a day of fast and prayer.

This measure was taken by the Agudah to express the sentiment of the Ultra-Orthodox who are objecting to the Communities Ordinance.

GENEVA STUDENTS CONDEMN ROUMANIAN OUTBREAKS

Geneva, Dec. 30.—A protest on behalf of Swiss students against the anti-Semitic outbreaks in Roumania as casting reflection upon students in general was adopted by the Students Committee of the University of Geneva.

The non-Jewish students decided to request the International Confederation of Students to transmit this protest to the Roumanian student body.

RITUAL MURDER STORIES SPREAD IN CLAUSENBERG

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Clausenburg, Dec. 30.—The ritual murder tale was exploited by the Roumanian anti-Semites in an effort to counteract the impression of the recent outbreaks. A pupil of the Clausenburg high school, named Muresant, who was accused of having plundered a synagogue during the riots, disappeared following charges brought against him by the local rabbi.

The anti-Semitic newspaper "Notiunea" accused the Clausenburg rabbis of having committed a ritual murder against the boy. The school authorities supported the charge and in communication addressed to the Rabbinate, urged that the boy be returned. If the boy were not returned, the ritual murder charge would be substantiated, the communication stated.

Fortunately, the police found the boy hiding at the home of his uncle in a neighboring village.

The Jewish community felt relieved of an impending danger when the boy was found. The central authorities have instituted an investigation against the school authorities.

COL. AMERY TO VISIT CANADA IN JANUARY

Montreal, Dec. 30.—Colonel Leopold L. Amery, Secretary of State for the Colonies in the British Government, is scheduled to arrive in Canada on January 6th. He will remain here until February 3rd, when he will sail from St. John, N.B.

The visit of the British Minister is of particular interest to Canadian Zionists. Mr. Amery is scheduled to address several meetings, including Canadian and Empire Club luncheons and Board of Trade gatherings in the larger cities and it is also expected that Canadian Zionists will be given an opportunity to hear him.

ROUMANIAN STUDENTS OBJECT TO PUNISHMENT OF RIOTERS

Bucharest, Dec. 30.—A manifesto protesting against the prison sentences imposed by the court martial against the students guilty of the anti-Semitic riots was issued by the League of Christian Students.

The manifesto terms these sentences unjust and urges the entire Roumanian student body to observe "national mourning."

DAVIS WOULD CLOSE DOORS TO RUSSIAN, CZECHO-SLOVAKIAN AND LATVIAN IMMIGRANTS

Objects to Non-Acceptance of Deportees

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Dec. 30.—On behalf of Secretary of Labor Davis it was officially denied here that he had disclaimed responsibility, as reported in a Washington dispatch, for the statement recently published in which he recommended that Congress suspend or restrict immigration to such countries as refused to accept alien deportees.

"The Secretary positively did and still so recommends", it was categorically stated. In this connection attention was called to the fact that besides the recommendation recently published in the press, Secretary Davis had officially recommended this in his recent annual report in Congress. The recommendation is contained on page 191 of that report, and read as follows:

"In a number of instances the department has been unable to effect deportation of undesirable aliens because of passport complications and the refusal of foreign Governments to accept from the United States aliens who should be deported to those countries. These refusals involve criminal and mental defective cases, as well as those who for other reasons have become a burden upon public beneficence. Frequently the foreign Governments decline the responsibility

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ANTI-SEMITIC OUTBREAKS WILL INFLUENCE ELECTIONS

Bucharest, Dec. 30.—The anti-Semitic outbreaks in Transylvania and Jassy will not pass without affecting the political constellation in the Roumanian parliament.

The majority of the members of the Lupu party lift the government bloc as a protest against Minister Lupu for not resigning from the cabinet while Tatarescu, accused of complicity in the riots, remained.

The metropolitan newspapers ridiculed Cuza's address before the court martial during the trial of the students. In his plea Cuza asserted that Senator Borah and Lord Rothmere are Jews and that their real name is Baruch. Both are advocating a change in the peace treaty which would be unfavorable to Roumania. This is the reason that the Roumanian students have to take revenge on the Jews, Cuza declared.

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PREPARE TO CELEBRATE MONTEFIORE BIRTHDAY

London, Dec. 30—Leading circles of the Anglo-Jewish community are preparing to celebrate the seventieth birthday of Claude Montefiore, outstanding leader of Liberal Judaism in England.

The renowned scholar will attain his seventieth birthday in a few weeks. The "Jewish Chronicle," commenting editorially on the forthcoming event, suggests that a Montefiore Scroll be created similar to the Golden Book of the Jewish National Fund. In the scroll would be inscribed the names of Jews throughout the Empire who are deemed worthy. The proceeds of the inscriptions would be used for the creation of a fund to be put at the disposal of Mr. Montefiore for any public purpose that he selects.

DR. ADLER HONORED BY WITTENBERG UNIVERSITY

Vienna, Dec. 30—Dr. Alfred Adler, well known psychologist, was honored by Wittenberg University of Springfield, Ohio.

The University conferred upon Dr. Adler the honorary degree of Doctor in recognition of his lectures in the United States during his recent visit.

ROUMANIAN AND HUNGARIAN EXCESSES CONDEMNED AT LARGE MASS MEETING Roumania Denounced for Student Outrages

A mass meeting to protest against the anti-Jewish excesses in Roumania and Hungary was held Thursday night in Cooper Union Hall under the auspices of the Independent Order Brith Abraham. Nine hundred persons were present.

Aiter listening to addresses by Dr. Arthur J. Brown, chairman of the American Committee on the Rights of Religious Minorities, the Rev. John A. Lathrop, member of the deputation sent by the Religious Minorities Committee to investigate conditions in Roumania, Congressman F. H. LaGuardia, Congressman Samuel Dickstein, Dr. Stephen S. Wise, Judge Gustave Hartman, Dr. S. Margoshes and Nathan D. Perlman, the meeting adopted a protest resolution which will be forwarded to the President of the United States, to the Vice-President as presiding officer of the Senate, to the Speaker of the House of Representatives and to the Roumanian and Hungarian Ministers at Washington.

The Roumanian Minister at Washington, who issued a denial of the preliminary report of the deputation of the American Committee on the Rights of Religious Minorities, was attacked by Dr. Brown in his address. "It is asserted that the function of a diplomat sent abroad is to lie for his country; the Roumanian diplomatic officers in this country in their denials of the existence of the conditions described in the preliminary report, have lied cruelly and clumsily," the chairman of the American Committee on the Rights of Religious Minorities declared. The resolution as adopted read:

"The Jews in Roumania and Hungary are being subjected to cruel and relentless persecution and oppression, they are being unjustly discriminated against and inhumanely treated; terrible assaults of violence and unbridled fury are being made upon their property and very lives, their synagogues are being desecrated and the sacred scrolls defiled; Jewish students are being brutally attacked by anti-Semitic mobs led by Christian students and are otherwise being prevented from pursuing their education in the universities and colleges by various harsh and unfair restrictions, while the entire Jewish population in these lands lives in a constant state of dread and suspense of impending disaster and ruin.

"Therefore, the Independent Order Brith Abraham of the United States of America, the largest national Jewish fraternal organization in the world, in mass meeting assembled, at Cooper Union, New York City, this Thursday Evening, December 29th, 1927, protests against these outrages inflicted upon our fellow-Jews in Roumania and Hungary and calls upon the Governments of these two coun-

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YIDDISH CHAIR ACCEPTED FOR HEBREW UNIVERSITY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Mainz, Dec. 30—The chair for the study of the Yiddish language and literature at the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus, offered by David Schapiro, publisher of "The Day," New York daily, and accepted by Dr. Judah L. Magnes, will be accepted by the University, the Governing Council of the institute of Jewish Studies decided at its session here. The acceptance of the chair was objected to by the Jerusalem Committee of the Institute of Jewish Studies.

Dr. Judah L. Magnes left for Palestine after the conclusion of the session. Grand Rabbi Israel Levi of Paris, who at first opposed the acceptance of the chair, voted in its favor. Among those present at the session were Dr. Magnes, Grand Rabbi Levi, Dr. Joseph H. Hertz, Chief Rabbi of Great Britain, Professor Adolph Buechler, dean of Jews' College, London, Dr. Martin Euber, Professor M. M. Balaban and Chief Rabbi Dr. Schor of Warsaw.

DIAMANT, INSANE CHURCH WRECKER, ARRESTED (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 30—Jacob Diamant, the mentally unbalanced Warsaw Jew who invaded St. Paul's Church during Christmas services, wrecking the altar while exclaiming "Revenge for the Roumanian excesses," was placed under arrest by an order of the District Attorney. It was originally stated that because of his mental condition, Diamant would be placed in an insane asylum.

Simultaneously an investigation was started by the authorities against 70 Warsaw Jews, including the well known Chassidic Rabbi of Radzin. It was alleged that Diamant had stated that the Rabbi had established a secret Jewish revenge organization under the name, Maccabee, and that this organization had ordered him to execute the act of revenge.

The incident has aroused wide interest in the capital, and has created a painful situation for the leaders of the Jewish Community here. The Rabbinate of Warsaw has decided to express its regrets to the Catholic Church authorities. A delegation representing the Rabbinate was received yesterday by Archbishop Kakowski. The delegation, including Rabbis Michelson and Kahane, expresses regret to the church dignitary over the unfortunate incident. The Rabbinate has also despatched a letter of appreciation to the priest of St. Paul's Church for his calming influence on his congregation, thus preventing what might have turned into mob violence.

Worcester Jewish Activities in Full Swing

(By our Worcester Correspondent)

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 30.—The United Jewish Charities is a member of the Worcester Welfare Federation, and receives \$17,500 annually from the community fund, for the furtherance of its work. The rest of its budget is supplied by the Jewish citizens themselves. Besides the family relief work, the Charities carries on two baby clinics a week for all East Side residents regardless of race, creed, or color, and conducts the only annual Better Baby Contest of the city.

The only Hebrew Free school is supported by it. A Sunday school, evening classes for the young people in the neighborhood under the direction of the social service department, and special holiday relief are among its other services. The social service chairman is Samuel Beeber, who is an assistant principal of a high school. Mrs. Anna B. Seder is the executive worker. Archibald Hillman prominent in the B'nai Brith, is the president.

According to a survey made under the auspices of the Worcester Chapter, Council of Jewish Women, the Jewish community here numbers 10,000. The first Jewish settlers came about 75 years ago and were of German origin. The first influx of Polish, Lithuanian and Ukrainian Jews, came fifty years ago. These make up the bulk of the community.

The first Jewish immigrants made their living by peddling, which was the basis of the large wholesale drygoods business which they have built up here. Now they are found in all the trades and professions of the community. Being a county seat, there are a large number of lawyers.

The business and professional men are banded together in a Jewish weekly luncheon club, the Avoda club. This club held its second annual "Christian Pal" meeting on Wednesday. Each member brought as his guest a non-Jewish friend. The guests of honor and speakers were Rabbi Julius H. Gordon, of the Reform Temple; Rev. Michael Earis, S.J., of Holy Cross College, and Rev. Dr. Vincent E. Tomlinson, pastor of the First Universalist church.

Rabbi Gordon is the spiritual head of Temple Emanuel, which is housed in a building purchased from a private school. The Temple is situated on the West Side, which is now the fashionable district of the city. Several small orthodox congregations have been set up here also, although the larger number have remained on the East side. These congregations are small, none of them approaching the size of the reform temple which has a membership of about 250 families.

Tuesday is club day for the Jewish women. The Council meets regularly the

first Tuesday in the month, under the direction of Mrs. Hyde Smith, the president, who is also an officer of the New England Regional conference of the National Council. The second Tuesday is taken by the Temple Sisterhood, under Mrs. Lewis Fielding; the third by the Ladies Auxiliary to the Jewish Home for the Aged and Orphans, under Miss Edythe Rome, and the fourth by the Worcester Unit. Senior Hadassah, under Mrs. Max Robbins.

The Junior Hadassah, the second largest unit in New England, meets one night a month. In February it will celebrate its fifth birthday. Its leader is Miss Esther Levy, who was last year president of the New England Regional Conference of the National Junior Hadassah. Its quota to the National Fund this year will be \$1500.

The Ladies Auxiliary devoted its efforts to raising money for the Home in which there are at present, 10 aged, and 25 orphans. It has a building of its own but is now in need of larger quarters.

The survey made by the Council was done under the direction of Mrs. Joseph Talamo, daughter of one of the settlers of 50 years ago. Mrs. Talamo was instrumental in the establishment of Americanization classes for women adults in the Worcester public school system. The first class of its kind in the country was established in Worcester in 1915, with a registration of 42 immigrant mothers. The registration now runs to 250 mothers, in 12 different classes which meet three times a week.

Samuel Caplan was elected president of the I.O.B.B. at a meeting held Tuesday. Wilfred Feiga is in charge of the A.Z.A. work in the New England district. This junior B'nai Brith organization was recently established in Worcester.

The Avoda club is headed by Joseph Talamo, actively identified with Zionist work in this section, and one of the leading lawyers of the city. The Temple Emanuel Brotherhood is this year headed by Jacob Asher, the only Jewish municipal court Judge in the city. The Temple congregation is headed by David B. Isenberg, Jacob Reed is founder of the Worcester Navy club, and active in other veteran organizations.

Among the Jewish men who were born in Worcester and who have attained more than local fame are Isidore Lubin, professor of economics at the Institute of Economics in Washington D.C., whose recent work, "The British Coal Dilemma," has attracted favorable comment. Sam Behrman, former press agent for Jed Harris, whose play "The Second Man," was presented by the New York Theater Guild last spring and Rabbi Israel Mattuck, head of the Reform Movement in England.

MONOPOLY CONCESSIONS ORDINANCE POSTPONED (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Dec. 30.—Thousands of Jewish families throughout the Republic of Poland felt relieved from impending economic ruin when the government promulgated an ordinance today postponing the annulment of the monopoly concessions. It was scheduled to go into effect January 1, 1928, the last date set for the measure and was the subject of long drawn out negotiations between the government and the Jewish leaders.

The present ordinance postpones the date until July 1, 1928. The concessions for the sale of tobacco and spirits were to have been withdrawn from the Jewish holders and turned over to Polish war veterans.

COMMISSION TO PROTECT MIGRANTS FORMED IN PARIS (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Dec. 30.—A National Commission for Co-ordinating the Work for the Protection of Migrants has been formed here for the purpose of organizing all the private bodies engaged in the protection and assistance of migrants. At the first meeting of the Commission, Professor Oualid explained the program of the Commission, which will keep in touch with the organizations dependent on the League of Nations at Geneva. Mme. Elle Chevalley, president of the Immigration Section of the National Committee of Women, is president of this Commission, and Mr. Olchanski Treasurer.

The campaign of the United Jewish Appeal in Baltimore, Md., will be opened on January 8 at a mass meeting.

Judge Eli Frank will preside at the meeting. The speakers will be Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Providence, R. I. and Dr. Henry Moskowitz.

The quota adopted for Baltimore is \$750,000, and the drive will be conducted from January 15 to January 23.

Dr. Elias A. Pofcher, prominent in Democratic politics, and superintendent of the National Hebrew School Iryiah, was welcomed by the old members at the annual dinner on Wednesday.

The other Jewish member is Wilfred Feiga, who is active in the Jewish charitable and social organizations. Appointment to the board is made by the city council for a term of four years, two people being chosen each year. Mr. Feiga's term ends in 1932, and Dr. Pofcher's in 1934 Dr. Pofcher was recently defeated for the office of alderman-at-large. His appointment to the library board was recognition of his standing in the Democratic party which was conceded the right to one of the vacancies on the board.

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tries to right the wrongs committed against a peaceful and unoffending people, to bring to justice the perpetrators of these crimes and to afford their Jewish inhabitants every protection and security from future harm and to observe inviolate all the political, civic and religious rights and liberties fully guaranteed to them by the Treaty of Versailles in 1919, and be it further

"Resolved, that we appeal to the bar of public opinion and the conscience of the entire civilized world for justice and human treatment for our Jewish brethren in Roumania and Hungary and for all other minorities who suffer with them and earnestly entreat the President and both Houses of the Congress of the United States to take all such steps as may be deemed necessary and proper to bring to an end all these horrible injustices and help save hundreds of thousands of innocent human beings from untold sufferings."

The Reverend John A. Lathrop declared, "The facts the committee returned to this country with disclose that the situation in Roumania affects all of the minorities, of which the Jewish is most conspicuous because of the greater cruelty which they suffer. I wish to point out that the Baptists, Unitarians, Roman Catholics and other minority faiths are suffering grievously. We learned that a Roumanian official acting on orders from Bucharest with the aid of the police compelled men, women and children affiliated with a local Baptist church to wade waist high into a river one cold Sunday morning and remain there for four hours. Afterward they were put into the local jail where inhuman and brutal treatment was administered them."

"Throughout Roumania one finds the leaders of the Jewish community, Rabbis and laymen, terrorized with fear, a fear of bodily injury, because they answered our questions.

"The Roumanian universities are organized after the method of the English universities. By this I mean that students work in dormitories and once a year come for annual examinations before their professors. This is usually a time of trepidation for students for unless they take this examination they lose credit for the entire year. It was during such an examination that the committee found itself in Bucharest. The Christian students patrolled the university buildings where the examinations were to take place, and as Jews entered the grounds a number of Christian students were detailed to beset them. In this manner a great number were brutally assaulted and sent to hospitals. They were unable to report for the examinations and thereby lost their standing for that year.

"It is by such methods that Roumanian

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solely on the grounds that by absence from the homeland the alien has become expatriated. In all such cases, however, it should be pointed out, the alien has not actually acquired any other nationality; if he had, naturally the deportation order would be to the country of such alien's allegiance.

"This situation seems to me to require legislative action, and it is suggested that suitable enactment be made whereby immigration shall be suspended or further restricted from countries which refuse to accept back deportable aliens or unreasonably delay issuance of passports for those whose last allegiance was to their Governments. This action is recommended also as to nationals of such countries from which it is impracticable to obtain passports through the usual channels."

It is learned that in addition to Russia and Czecho-Slovakia, Latvia is another country which would be affected if Secretary Davis' recommendation is accepted. Latvia is one of the countries which takes the position that after its nationals have been absent abroad for a certain number of years, or if they were not actually residents in Latvia at the time its citizenship law was passed, such nationals are considered expatriated and the Government refuses to issue passports to such aliens. For this reason the United States is unable to report a number of Latvian nationals who are held in this country for deportation. A number of other countries, it is understood, have adopted a similar policy which would bring them within the purview of Secretary Davis' recommendation if it is adopted by Congress.

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assert its rights and privileges.

"The first-fruit of British administration," he went on, "has been the settlement of the country. Security of life and property has been established everywhere. Not many years ago," the Bishop said, "you took your life in your hands if you went outside the walls of Jerusalem. Now robbery and violence are almost unknown. There are magnificent roads, the country is well policed, and the people of Palestine are enjoying a sense of safety they have never known before. Moreover, an even-handed justice has superseded the old poisoned judicial system of the Turkish regime. It is a triumph of the British genius for fair play, and has inspired confidence and even admiration among Christians, Jews, and Moslems.

"The country is also undergoing a transformation agriculturally. New villages are springing up everywhere, putting to shame the mud villages of the Arabs; acres and acres of land are coming under cultivation that once were marshlands serving no better purpose than to propagate the malaria mosquito. Afforestation is also being pressed forward. And there is need for it. The trees of Palestine have been wasted by the passage of armies and by misrule. Thy head is as Carmel, was the Biblical allusion to the once wooded mountain. The long mountain ranges are innocent of trees now".

Progress is also being made in education, and elementary schools are being set up in most of the villages. The Moslems were at first afraid that the schools might become proselytising grounds for the Christians, but they are becoming reassured as they find the administration pursuing a policy of complete religious toleration and ready to provide Moslem as well as Christian schools. The health of the population is also improving and the malaria mosquito, once the curse of the country, is on the way to being eliminated.

"I regard Palestine", the Bishop concluded, "as one of the most peaceful places within the British Empire, and I consider the outlook for the country very hopeful indeed".

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
