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GALICIAN RABBIS OPPOSE NATIONAL MINORITIES BLOC Considered Move Against Nationalist Groups

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lemberg, Dec. 31.—Although called for a purely religious purpose the conference of Galician rabbis, in which 200 spiritual leaders participated, closed Friday with the adoption of a resolution of a political nature.

The resolution, quoting the Talmudic dictum "to pray for the peace of the state" urges the Jewish population to cast their votes only for state loyal candidates in the forthcoming elections. This step is considered as a move against the propaganda of the national minorities bloc, organized in Congress Poland and joined in by the nationalist groups under the leadership of Deputy Gruenbaum.

The sessions of the conference were attended by high government officials and representatives of the municipality as well as assimilationist leaders who welcomed the rabbis' assembly. The conference also despatched messages to Ignacy Moscicki, president of the Republic and to Marshal Pilsudski.

SYNAGOGUE MEMBER LEAVES REQUEST FOR ATHEISM Will To Be Contested (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Camden, N. J., Dec. 31.—A bequest of \$50,000 for "the purpose of enlightening the public on atheism" is included in the will of Aaron S. Cades, wealthy apartment house owner of this city. Cades was a member of Beth-El Synagogue, of Camden, and his two sons are active in the congregation. The bequest came as a surprise to his friends and family, as his atheistic views were not known. He died in Atlantic City, December 14, and his will was drawn as he lay ill three days previously.

The legacy is to be paid in the sum of \$2,000 yearly for 25 years. The will names specifically "the Atheist Society" but as no such organization is known to exist, a legal fight upon the terms of the will is forecast by friends of the family.

Mr. Cades left bequests of \$25,000 each for "educational institutions providing same as non-sectarian and do not teach religion" for charitable purposes, providing same are not for religious purposes and intents," and for support of hospital institutions. All bequests are to run over a period of 25 years.

DAVID SCHAPIRO UNDERTAKES TO PROVIDE ENTIRE FUND FOR YIDDISH CHAIR

Announcement Made Following De-
cision of Council at Mainz

The \$100,000 fund created by David Schapiro, publisher of "The Day", New York Yiddish daily, for the establishment and maintenance of a chair for the study of the Yiddish language and literature at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem will be subscribed by Mr. Schapiro himself without an appeal to any group or the Jewish public in general. This announcement was made in an editorial of "The Day", commenting upon the receipt of the report of the proceedings of the Governing Council of the Institute of Jewish Studies at its session in Mainz, at which the offer to establish the chair was accepted, overruling the objections of the Jerusalem Committee of the Institute and some leading Hebrewists.

The opposition argued that the establishment at this time of a chair for the study of the Yiddish language at the Hebrew University might jeopardize the Hebrew character of the institution.

"The Day" is proud of the fact that the Yiddish chair has met with the heartfelt desires of all who are interested in the growth and development of Jewish culture in all of its forms. The newspaper is particularly proud of the fact that the founder and initiator of the Yiddish chair in the Hebrew University is the publisher of "The Day", Mr. David Schapiro. PALESTINE GOVERNMENT PUTS JEWISH UNEMPLOYED TO WORK (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 31.—Five hundred Jewish workers will find employment in the government afforestation work as a result of an order issued by High Commissioner Lord Plumer.

A memorandum concerning the recent events in Petach Tikvah where a clash between Arab and Jewish workers occurred was submitted by Petach Tikvah colonists to the High Commissioner.

A change in the composition of the Histiadruth, Palestine Jewish labor federation, was effected by the withdrawal from the organization of the Left Wing of the Hapoel Ha'mizrachi, the Orthodox labor group. The left group has rejoined the Hapoel Ha'mizrachi, establishing unity in the Mizrachi ranks.

ANTI-JEWISH DISTURBANCES IN CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Anti-Romanian Protest Prohibited
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Dec. 31.—A request of Jewish leaders in Mungacz, Carpatho-Russia, for permission to hold a meeting to protest against the Romanian anti-Jewish excesses was refused by the authorities.

In declining to grant the permission the authorities stated that they cannot permit the holding of a protest meeting against a government which is an ally of the Czechoslovakian government.

Reports of serious anti-Jewish disturbances at Selesz, a Czechoslovakian frontier town, were received here. With the slogan, "Jews and Hungarians must leave Slovakia", bands of hooligans attacked cafes, mistreating many Jewish patrons.

ARAB AGITATOR FINED IN JERUSALEM COURT (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 31.—The Jerusalem Court of Appeals upheld the decision of the lower court in imposing a fine upon Bustani, Arab attorney and anti-Zionist agitator who has charged with complicity in the attack of Arab villagers upon the Pica plantations at Cesarea a year ago. The villagers, angered by a land dispute, uprooted a large number of eucalyptus trees planted by the Pica. The court of appeals however ruled that Bustani's fine be reduced to £25.

MISSIONARIES TO DEDICATE BIBLE HOUSE IN JERUSALEM (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 31.—The dedication of the Bible House which is being erected by the British Foreign Bible Society, a missionary organization, will take place during the latter part of March.

The exercises will coincide with the conference of the International Missionary Council which will meet here March 24 to May 8.

TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF POALE ZION PARTY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Dec. 31.—Leaders of the Poale Zion, Zionist Socialist party, which has a considerable following among Jewish labor groups in Eastern and Central Europe and in the United States are preparing to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the party.

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UNION EXECUTIVE BOARD TO MEET IN DETROIT

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 31.—The annual meeting of the Executive Board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations will be held in Detroit on Sunday, January 22nd. Following a short session in the morning, the members of the Board will attend Sunday morning services at the Temple, and will be guests at a luncheon to be given by the Detroit Jewish Community. A dinner will also be held in the evening.

Reports of the officers and the work of the various departments of the Union will be submitted at the meeting. Ludwig Vogelstein, chairman of the Board, will review the progress made by the Union during the past twelve months. David A. Brown, chairman of the Finance Board of the Union will tell of the accomplishments of the Flying Squadron in its efforts to raise funds for the budgetary needs of the Union. There will also be reports on the Hebrew Union College and the Department of Synagogue and School Extension.

An estate valued at more than \$50,000 was left by the late Rabbi Benjamin Frankel who died in Champaign, Ill. last week, it became known with the appointment of his widow as administratrix. Personal property is valued at \$8,000 with life insurance exceeding \$50,000. The rabbi also had real estate holdings in Peoria county.

ANTI-SHECHITA BILL IN N. Y. STATE LEGISLATURE

When the New York state legislature will be opened next week a bill aiming at the prohibition of the Shechita in the state will be introduced, it was stated yesterday. The bill will be sponsored by the Animal Welfare Legislation League, said to be located at 690 Riverside Drive, New York. Miss Gertrude Brahan is the Executive Secretary and first vice-president of the League.

The League was established three years ago and recruits its membership mainly among socially prominent women. In a statement issued by the League it is asserted that "Americans must be ashamed of the fact that they maintain an attitude in the manner of slaughtering animals similar to that of the Dark Ages, Norway, Finland, and Switzerland have long since prohibited the old Jewish barbaric method. The time has arrived for America to do likewise."

The bill will aim at making the stunning of animals before slaughter obligatory. According to Miss Brahan, over 110,000 animals are slaughtered annually in the United States. Of this number only 13,000,000 are stunned before slaughter and it often takes from two to three and a half minutes before the animal loses consciousness after slaughter.

JEWESS MADE PRUSSIAN GOVERNMENT COUNCILLOR

Berlin, Dec. 31.—Miss Kaete Rosenheim was appointed government councillor, being the first woman to receive such an appointment.

Miss Rosenheim has held the position of political secretary in the Prussian Ministry since 1919.

JEWISH POLICE OFFICER IN PALESTINE RESIGNS

Jerusalem, Dec. 31.—M. Krishevsky, who has served since the British occupation of Palestine, was district officer of the Northern Frontier area. He stated that the reason for his resignation was dissatisfaction with the treatment accorded him in the service.

Three hundred men and women representing seventy-five Jewish communities which constitute the Region will attend the sixth annual conference of Region No. 4 of the United Palestine Appeal. The sessions will take place Sunday and Monday in Atlantic City. This is the first meeting of the Region since the Reorganization Plan which merged all Zionist agencies was made effective.

Senator King of Utah will be one of the speakers. Messages will be delivered by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Judge William M. Lewis, National Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal.

Simultaneous with the U.P.A. Conference, the Hadassah districts of the Region will meet.

NEW YORK RABBIS OBJECT TO FILM, 'KING OF KINGS'

A protest against the film "King of Kings" on the ground that the showing of the film "is conducive to a feeling of prejudice by Christians against Jews" was voiced in a resolution adopted by the New York Board of Jewish Ministers. The resolution, which will be sent to David L. Miller, producer of the picture, and to motion picture exhibitors and booking agencies, declared:

"Be it resolved that the New York Board of Jewish Ministers register its protest against the public exhibition of the motion picture, 'The King of Kings', on the ground that the showing of this film is conducive to a feeling of prejudice by Christians against Jews."

"And that the New York Board of Jewish Ministers urge upon the producer the withdrawal of the film, and urge upon exhibitors and booking agencies, the cessation of the film from their listings for the sake of American Good. Will among races and creeds."

SEVENTY JEWISH IMMIGRANTS ENTER MEXICO IN DECEMBER

Mexico City, Dec. 31.—Seventy Jewish immigrants arrived at Vera Cruz on the 25th and 26th of this month. During November 90 immigrants arrived in the country.

The Jewish community of Mexico City will hold delegation services for the new secretary in February.

HEBREW UNIVERSITY LIBRARY BUILDING TO BE ERECTED

The Hague, Dec. 31.—The erection of a building for the Jewish National Library as a part of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus was decided upon at a meeting of the Council of the David Wolffsohn Foundation which met here.

Dr. Judah L. Magnes, chancellor of the University, participated in the Council's session. The building which will be of iron and beton construction is expected to be completed during 1928.

Oakland, Dec. 25 — One hundred thousand dollars has thus far been contributed to charity by Albert S. Lavenson of this city since he was lost in the mountains some time ago while spending a vacation at a resort. Mr. Lavenson nearly perished from exposure and lack of food and water before he was rescued. On returning to Oakland he announced that his adventure had been a wonderful spiritual experience to him and that he would devote himself more assiduously to good works. This decision was made despite the fact that he had been associated with virtually every civic movement for betterment and uplift. He is one of the leaders in the Community Chest organization here.

Jewish activities in Oakland are centered around the Oakland Jewish Federation, its constituent function—the Jewish Community Center, Free Loan, Fruit and Flower Mission, Daughters of Israel Relief, Memory Fund; Temple Sinai with a sisterhood, Men's Club and Religious School of large membership; B'nai Brith with a membership of 700, a women's auxiliary with a membership of 150, in A. Z. A. Chapter; a Council of Jewish Women and a Council of Jewish Juniors; Beth Jacob Synagogue with a membership of 200; a Talmud Torah with an enrollment of 110 children.

Berkeley, Alameda, and San Leandro have synagogues and religious schools and other organizations connected with them. A Conservative Synagogue is contemplated by a group. Oakland has a Zionist group which meets at the Community Center. Hadassah, with a growing membership, meets at Temple Sinai. The Jewish Community Center recently dedicated an addition.

constantly engaged in the rehabilitation of discharged prisoners, the insane, the blind and other unfortunates. During 1927 more than \$14,000 was raised and expended in this way and hundreds of persons aided, according to Harry J. Sapper, executive director of the Oakland Jewish Federation. While the service primarily is for Jews, the organization conducting it, the Jewish Committee for Personal Service in State Institution, does not refuse aid to any worthy person, if there is no other helping hand extended to him. No other group in the United States, it is believed, sponsors exactly the same activity.

The Jewish Federation, in addition to supporting its own activities, lends it financial aid to the Committee for Personal Service.

The Jewish National Welfare Fund established by the Federation, has a budget of more than \$30,000 annually.

There are about 5,000 Jews in the several cities occupying the eastern shore of San Francisco Bay, Oakland, Berkeley, Alameda, Richmond, Piedmont, San Leandro and others.

ARRANGE EXHIBIT OF CENTER AND SYNAGOGUE BUILDINGS

An exhibit of synagogue buildings, centers and facilities of congregations affiliated with the United Synagogue of America will be shown at the next annual convention of the United Synagogue which will be held in April. The exhibit will include photographs of various buildings, rooms, plans of structure and costs.

The exhibit is being arranged with a view to helping congregations which plan to erect new buildings or introduce new facilities.

The next meeting of the Executive Council of the United Synagogue will be held in Boston January 29th.

A special meeting of the Executive Council of the Mid-West Branch of the United Synagogue will be held in Chicago on January 5th.

\$20,000 GIVEN FOR PALESTINE EDUCATION

In order to relieve in some measure the serious educational crisis in Palestine, the Mid-Winter Conference of Junior Hadassah decided to cable immediately to Palestine the \$20,000 surplus raised by Junior Hadassah last year. Miss Henrietta Szold has been named as trustee of this fund.

The Junior Hadassah at its session held in New York last week voted to adopt as its second project in Palestine, the support of the Nurses' Training School requiring a yearly budget of \$17,000. Junior Hadassah's maintenance of the Nurses' Training School will begin as of January 1, 1928.

Jews contributed a goodly share of the \$3,937,734 given to various charitable purposes in Baltimore, Md. in the year 1927 in the form of cash or pledges, according to final figures for the year made public here.

To the Associated Jewish Charities, which distributes its funds through the medium of sixteen various organizations, was given \$423,000.

A sum of \$30,000 was given by Mrs. Helen R. Goldman and Mrs. Leon Rice, of New York, in memory of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Rosen, for the construction of the children's pavilion at the Sinai Hospital.

In addition, \$80,000 was given by Julius Rosenwald, of Chicago, to the Provident Hospital for colored people.

Jews also contributed proportionately to the Community Fund, Mississippi Flood Relief Fund, of the Red Cross, Membership Roll Call of the Red Cross, Maryland Tuberculosis Association for Christmas sales, Babies' Hospital, Weather Fund, South Baltimore General Hospital and West Baltimore General Hospital.

Congregation Temple Emanu-El, Westmount, Montreal, dedicated its Temple House on Sunday, December 25. This community house will serve for Religious School, and social purposes.

At the dedicatory exercises, the principal addresses were delivered by Maxwell Gold-Emanu-stein, D. C., Honorary President Temple Emanu-El; Rabbi Harry J. Stern, the spiritual leader of the congregation; D. A. Bercovitch presided during the ceremonies, and prayer was offered by Rabbi Julius Bergeman of the Zion Congregation, Temple Emanu-El is the only Reform Synagogue in the city of Montreal.

VIENNA JEWISH COMMUNITY ASKS GOVERNMENT SUPPORT

Vienna, Dec. 30.—Neither the Federal Government nor the Vienna Municipality have ever contributed toward the cost of the Vienna Jewish Community, although both the Federal Government and the Municipality are by law obliged to contribute to the Jewish Religious Community out of the State and municipal funds.

The Board of the Vienna Jewish Community has taken up this question and is now engaged in collecting material on the subject, with a view to submitting a demand to the Government and the Municipality, that in future such contributions should be included in the budgets of the Government and the municipality to meet the needs of the religious, social and cultural institutions of the Jewish community.

self the entire financial obligation for the establishment and maintenance of the Yiddish chair in the Hebrew University, without the participation of friends or the assistance of the public at large," writes "The Day".

"It is to be expected", the paper continues, "that even the most zealous opponents of Yiddish in Palestine will from now on see that the Yiddish chair at the Hebrew University is being established not for the purpose of warfare, but to help bring about peace in our embittered and useless fight of languages and that in addition to all other purposes of furthering Jewish learning, the chair for the Yiddish language and literature will also serve the great purpose of erecting in the country of the Jewish past and the Jewish future, a bridge to the Jewish present.

"What will most gladden the hearts of Jews everywhere is the unanimity with which the decision concerning the Yiddish chair was adopted. This unanimity in itself is, as it were, an indication of what may be expected in the near future in Palestine concerning the study of Yiddish at the Hebrew University.

"The Yiddish chair is now a fact. It is provided for permanently. Another important creative center for the Jewish spirit is now added in the country which is the creative center of the Jewish people," the paper declares.
