AGUDATH ISRAEL TO HAVE CONGRESS IN VIENNA IN AUG.

Vienna, Jan. 17.—The second world congress of the Agudath Israel, Orthodox Jewish organization, will be held here, according to an announcement made by Dr. Pinchas Kohn, president of the organization.

The congress, which is known by its Hebrew name, K'nessiah Geddoleh, will be convened in August of this year.

RASKIN, FIRST PUBLISHER OF JEWISH CALENDAR, DIES

Warsaw, Jan. 17.—Ephraim Raskin, first publisher of Jewish calendars, died here at the age of 80.

The Raskin calendar has for many decades been a permanent fixture in Jewish households in Eastern Europe. The Raskin calendars gave the date not only according to the Gregorian and Julian reckonings but also according to the Jewish calendar. In addition to the dates, the daily leaves contained references to historic events in Jewish life and a certain number of proverbs and folk sayings and stories.

The late publisher was a boyhood friend of Peretz Smolenski, the Hebrew writer. He was also one of the pioneers of the Chovevei Zion movement, being one of the founders of the Agudath Ha'eleff.

CLEVELAND JEWISH CENTER CASE THROWN OUT OF COURT BY RULING OF JUDGE POWELL

Has no Jurisdiction over Purely Religious
Matter, Judge Says
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, Jan. 17.—A ruling by Chief Justice Powell of the Court of Common Pleas ended the celebrated Cleveland Jewish Center case, which attracted wide attention throughout the United States and abroad.

Upon the motion of Mr. Matthews, representing Rabbi Solomon Goldman and the Cleveland Jewish Center Board, the case was thrown out of court when the Chief Justice declared the civil court to be out of jurisdiction in a purely religious matter.

The case, which was considered to be a test case bringing to a head the friction obtaining in many congregations throughout the country between the Orthodox and the Conservative elements in the modern congregations, has been pending for the last three years. The suit was initiated by a committee of Orthodox members of the Jewish Center, including A. A. Katz, A. A. Lifkowitz, M. Sobel and J. Scheinbart. The Jewish Center was built by the Congregation Anshe Emeth Beth Tephilah. The Orthodox Committee bought the suit against Rabbi Goldman and the Board of Directors for deviating from the constitution of the congregation, providing that it must adhere to the Orthodox ritual as long as ten members insist on it.

In preparing for the case, Walter J. Hamilton, representing the plaintiffs, presided over the taking of depositions in New York from witnesses called by both parties to determine what is Orthodox. Mr. Matthews, also a non-Jew, represented the defendants. Israel Gombrow of Baltimore represented the Union of Orthodox Congregations.

LOCAL POLITICS CAUSES GALICIAN ZIONISTS' SPLIT

Lemberg, Jan. 17.—A split in the ranks of the Zionist Organization in Eastern Galicia was brought about due to the increasing friction between the two wings of the organization on the question of the local politics in connection with the forthcoming parliamentary elections.

SUPREME COURT OF CRIMEA SENTENCES CHALUZIM COL- ONY LEADERS TO PRISON

Charged with Aiding Exiled Zionists
to Proceed to Palestine
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Jan. 17.—Heavy sentences were imposed by the Supreme Court of Crimea upon three members of the administrative committee of the Chaluzim colony, Tel Chai. The three, Zirlin, Kossenko and Friedman, were arrested with eighteen other members of the colony on the charge brought against them by the Ogpu, Soviet secret police, that they were guilty of contra-revolutionary activity. The Ogpu claimed that it had discovered a secret Zionist conference which took place in the colony, that the Tel Chai colony had raised money to aid exiled Zionists to proceed to Palestine, that 2,000 roubles had been sent to Palestine by the colony and that members of the colony who became Communists were expelled from the settlement.

The local court sentenced the arrested to several months imprisonment. The case was appealed to the supreme court, which increased the sentences. Zirlin was sentenced to three years imprisonment, to be followed by banishment from Crimea. Kossenko and Friedman received sentences of two

LEAGUE TO AID 750 JEWISH REFUGEES TO SETTLE ON PALESTINE STATE LAND

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Jan. 17.—The League of Nations will aid a certain number of Jewish refugees stranded in Constantinople to settle in Palestine, it was disclosed at the Jewish Emigration Conference in session here, called at the initiative of the European branches of the Hebrew Immigrant Aid and Sheltering Society of America and the Emig-direkt.

This information was imparted by Z. Ebersson in his report submitted to the conference. He stated that the director of the League of Nations Fund to Aid Refugees has proposed to aid 750 Jewish refugees in Constantinople to settle on state land in Palestine. The Fund is willing to defray a part of the expenses necessary to colonize these refugees expecting Jewish organizations to contribute the rest. Fridjhof Nansen, League of Nations Commissioner for the refugee work, has agreed to this plan.

MARSHALL TELLS OF FORD'S CALL; ASSESS HIS RELIEF FORD IS ENTIRELY SINCERE Cameron is no Longer Editor of the "Dearborn Independent"

When Henry Ford called on Louis Marshall at his law office last week, he gave concrete assurances that the anti-Semitic campaign of "The Dearborn Independent" had been stopped and that he would do all in his power to undo whatever harm it may have caused. Louis Marshall declared in an interview with a representative of the New York Times, Mr. Marshall said that Mr. Ford's visit had been primarily a courtesy call.

"Mr. Ford told me personally how deeply sorry he was for what had taken place," said Mr. Marshall. "He said that while 'The Dearborn Independent' was conducting its campaign, he had been unaware of it."

"Since his published retraction, Mr. Ford told me he has been doing everything he could to remedy the harm these attacks had caused. He gave me specific instances of the effort he was making. He told me that 'The Dearborn Independent' no longer exists as a magazine; that its editor is no longer in the employ of the Ford organization. Furthermore, Mr. Ford said to me he had destroyed every copy of the pamphlet, 'The International Jew,' which he could find."

CONY ISLAND COMMUNITY CENTER ADOPTS NEW PLAN TO RAISE BUILDING FUND

Issues Bonds Instead of Appealing for Contributions

A novel plan for financing a Jewish community institution, diverging from the usual appeal for charitable contributions, has been adopted by the Jewish Community Center of Coney Island.

The center, seeking an amount of \$200,000, has placed on the market mortgage bonds, bearing an interest of six per cent, payable from January 1, 1931. The bonds are guaranteed as a second mortgage on the property held by the Public National Bank and Trust Company as trustees. The interest will be paid from the income of the building.

A number of financial institutions in Brooklyn have recognized the bonds as sound investment.

Members of the congregation have bought over \$50,000 worth of the bonds.

The Coney Island branch of the State Bank has taken \$2,000 worth through E. A. Wepman. The Bank of Coney Island has purchased \$3,000 through George V. McLaughlin, former Police Commissioner, president of the bank, and William J. Ward, former president of the bank, each of whom has purchased \$1,500 worth. The Guardian National Bank of Sheepshead Bay has purchased \$1,500 worth of bonds through Edward J. Whalen, its president.

Levin S. Kaser, principal of Public School 188 is chairman of the drive.

NOT EMIGRATION EXCEEDS IMMIGRATION IN PALESTINE Jewish Telegraphic Agency

Jerusalem, Jan. 17—Emigration from Palestine during the month of November exceeded the immigration to the country.

During November 305 Jews, 26 Christians and 26 Moslems entered the country. Four hundred and seven Jews, 46 Christians and 126 Moslems left the country.

Official announcement of the police return program for Coney was made by Rabbi Henry Cohen of Gevelson, a member of the Council of Jewish Deputies, in a statement of the educational and welfare committee which framed the program.

OVER \$1,000,000 IN CASH HAS BEEN RECEIVED BY UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN SINCE OCT. Payment of Pledges in 25 States Will Be Sought

Over a million dollars in cash has been received for the rehabilitation of European Jewry since the Constructive Relief Conference of the United Jewish Campaign and the Joint Distribution Committee, which was held in Chicago on October 22 and 23. David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, announced. That makes a total of over \$1,000,000, or almost fifty per cent of the \$2,000,000 pledged for a three year period.

Mr. Brown will begin shortly a tour of the United States and Canada to report on the work being done in Europe and what has been accomplished so far with the funds raised. He will assist state and local leaders of the communities in the collection of pledges. This will be Mr. Brown's fifth transcontinental tour since he accepted the chairmanship of the campaign.

Twenty-eight states have already expressed the desire to arrange conferences to be addressed by Mr. Brown. These include Alabama, Arkansas, California, Connecticut, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, New Jersey, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Washington, and Wisconsin.

The funds decided upon for the coming year will be disbursed by the Joint Distribution Committee to continue the land settlement and agricultural work in Russia; to assist the loan kesnes or mutual credit organizations, to help maintain schools and for medical and health work in Russia; to pay its obligations to the Ort (Society for the promotion of agriculture and handicraft among the Jews of Eastern and Central Europe) for the work in Russia in farming, and in Eastern Europe for trade schools in Poland, Latvia, Lithuania, Rumania, and other countries of Central and Eastern Europe; to subsidize loan kesnes, medical and health work, also care of orphans, and to combine the cultural work which is under the auspices of a committee in America of which Dr. Cyrus Adler is chairman. The Committee will pay the further installments due to the Palestine Economic Council for its credit work in Palestine. Mr. Brown announced.

The one hundred and fourth anniversary of Rochdale Avenue Temple, Cincinnati, will be celebrated on January 25 at a dinner at the Blvd. Arms. The annual meeting of the congregation will also be held at this time.

Rabbi Abbe Eliezer Silver will be the principal speaker. Dr. David Phillips, Julius Reich, president of the congregation, Meyer Murray, Vice-president, a member of the congregation, and Rabbi Victor Emmanuel Reicher will also address the gathering.

RAISE \$25,000 TOWARD HOME FOR EAST SIDE CHILDREN

The sum of \$25,000 for the summer home at Wauson, N. J. of the Rabbi Jacob Joseph School was raised at the annual dinner of the school, attended by over 700 guests who paid \$50 a plate.

Samuel H. Golding, president of the Home declared that 125 pupils of the school, which is located in one of the most congested areas of the East Side, were given a vacation of two weeks at the summer home of the school last year.

Mayor James J. Walker in his address said: "I hope the time will not be far distant when the unhealthy and dilapidated tenements of the East Side, which create conditions in the health of the people requiring such remedies as vacation camps, will be wiped out. New York State with its Child Welfare, Widow's Compensation laws is meeting the problem courageously. The demolition of the unhealthy tenements will follow and I hope that within five years this work will have been completed."

Doctor Louis I. Harris, Commissioner of Health, Judge Otto H. Rosalysky, Judge Max S. Levine and Charles A. Lewis addressed the gathering. Among those present were Eddie Cannon, George Axel, Joseph Durst, Signor Benjamin Gold, Judge Morris Koenig, Samuel C. Hebrew University Expedition Throws Light on Origin of Manna

(By Our Jerusalem Correspondent)

Jerusalem, Dec. 26.—The report of the Hebrew University expedition to investigate the origin and substance of manna, the food of the Israelites during their forty years' wandering in the desert, has been published.

The expedition, consisting of Dr. F. Bodenheimer, director of the ethnological department of the station in Tel Aviv, Dr. Carmin and Dr. Theodore, Associate Professor in the Microbiological Department of the Hebrew University, conducted the investigation on the Sinai Peninsula.

The formation of manna was observed on the tress and it was seen to fall to the ground, covering it in the morning like a thin layer of hail, exactly as mentioned in the Biblical descriptions.

Bedouin tribes were consulted as to the time and collection of manna and the quantity obtained. It was learned that manna must be gathered at break of day, even as the first rays of the sun are breaking through in the east, otherwise it becomes useless and usually disappears.

The expedition spent twenty-five days in the desert, watching the formation of manna under all sorts of atmospheric conditions.

The scientists found that manna is a secretion of small "occidial" insects—mainly bugs and scaly insects—which exude from their bodies a very clear juice which falls to the ground in drops and which hardens and assumes a glistening aspect.

The quantity of these secretions depended largely upon atmospheric conditions and the conditions under which the insects themselves obtain their food.

Often, so states the report of the Hebrew University expedition, when conditions were very favorable, the drops that fell upon the ground hardened and lay like white sugar grains of varied length—sometimes very small, often as big as lentils.

There are good seasons and bad seasons. Some twelve years ago, the Bedouins told the expedition members, there was such a good season that one man could gather as much as three pounds per day. This amount was put through some cooking process and made into cakes or loaves, just as the Israelites did it 4,000 years ago.

Manna of one sort or another was found all along the route of the expedition. At times it varied in color and also in chemical composition, therefore in taste. But it was encountered all the way.

Large quantities, gathered in various spots, differing in color, weight and appearance, gathered under varied atmos-

SENATOR ANTIN'S BILL SEEKS TO BAR ALIEN REGISTRATION

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 17.—Condemning the bill now before United States Congress providing for the registration of aliens as contrary to the traditions of the nation, Senator Benjamin Antin introduced in the State Senate a bill that the Legislature of New York memorialize Congress to prevent the passage of such a bill.

Senator Antin's resolution read: "Whereas, There is now in Congress a bill providing for the finger printing and registration of aliens, which if enacted into law, would be retroactive, and contrary to the traditions of this nation, therefore, be it

"Resolved (If the Assembly concur) That the Legislature of the State of New York do hereby memorialize the Congress of the United States to prevent passage of such bill on the ground that it is un-American in principle and introduces into American life the discredited Russian and Prussian imperial system of espionage and be it further

"Resolved (If the Assembly concur) that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Clerk of the United States Senate and to the Clerk of the House of Representatives and to each Senator and representative in congress from this state."

phic conditions, were taken back by the expedition to Jerusalem for chemical analysis in the laboratories.

A general report is to be issued in the near future. The limit has been found tends to prove that the full significance of the heavenly food that has mystified scientists for centuries and that has been the subject of a good deal of scepticism and scoffing by unbelievers, may soon be realized. In addition to chemical and possibly commercial value, manna is of the greatest significance in the development of certain marked characteristics of the desert tribes.

The problem of the origin of the manna was raised early in the nineteenth century. It was after the explorer, Parrot-hardt, observed in the Jordan Valley, lying on the leaves of a tree like a popular matter resembling a gum, which was of a brown or grayish color and dropped to the ground, that scholars began to speculate whether this might be the food recorded in the Bible.

MAUSOLEUM TO HAVE JEWISH AISLE, SUPREME COURT RULES

An injunction restraining the New York Mausoleum Association from making contracts in the future with persons who are not of Jewish faith for purchase of crypts in Aisle C of the association's mausoleum at Cypress Hills Cemetery will be granted by Supreme Court Justice Callaghan on application of Henry M. Israel, Justice Callaghan stated.

Mr. Israel said that he signed a contract for the purchase of two crypts in Aisle C of the mausoleum, and that the contract contained a clause to the effect that the aisle was to be reserved "for Jewish people only." Later, he alleged, the association refused to include such a clause in his deed to the crypts.

Lee A. Holley, vice president of the association, said in an affidavit that the contract containing the disputed clause was executed by the association through inadvertence, and that the clause was not called to its attention at the time. Stock in the mausoleum enterprise, he said, was sold with the distinct understanding that the mausoleum was to be conducted on non-sectarian lines.

Dr. Leon Reich, president of the East Galician Zionists, who is opposed to the Gruenbaum plan of a national minorities bloc, including the territory of Eastern Galicia, was fought by a group led by former Deputy Hilsner. The group controls thirty per cent. of the members of the party council.

Dr. Reich, in his opposition to the minorities bloc, has decided to keep the bloc out of Eastern Galicia and urged the Jewish population to vote for a special Jewish list of candidates, independent of the bloc. The opposition led by former Deputy Hilsner insists that Eastern Galicia is to be included in the national minorities bloc and that to ask the Jewish population to vote for a special Jewish list will lose the Jewish vote.

As the conflict reached its height, the Hilsner group seceded from the party council, declaring that until a national convention is called, the Zionists of Eastern Galicia should submit to the decision of the Zionist Organization in Congress Poland which is sponsoring the bloc. The split was hastened by the action of the Reich group which has seized control of the party organ, "Der Morgen" which was until recently the mouthpiece of the opposition.

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MINORITY LEADER IN N. Y. SENATE INTRODUCES RESOLUTION AGAINST ROUMANIA

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 17.—A resolution calling upon United States Congress to protest against the treatment accorded by Roumania to its Jewish population and other religious minorities and to take steps for the severance of diplomatic relations with Roumania unless she "mends her ways," was introduced in the State Senate by Bernard Downing, minority leader. The resolution declares that the conduct of Roumania stigmatizes her as "an outlaw among nations."

Senator Downing wanted immediate consideration of his resolution, but President pro tem. Knight made objection, and it was sent to the Judiciary Committee under the rule.

Senator Downing's resolution to memorialize Congress in favor of modification of the immigration laws to permit the admission outside of the quota of wives and children of aliens who reside in this country and have declared their intention of becoming citizens, was also referred to the committee.

years imprisonment. Evidence submitted to the court tended to show that the Chalizum colony systematically expelled members who became Communists. The local court had ordered the readmittance of the expelled members. During the proceedings speeches were delivered against the Chalizum

The proposal made by pastors of four Duluth, (Minn.) churches for a religious hour for public school children one day a week, which is to be presented to the board of education for approval was attacked by Rabbi Harvey E. Wessel, Rabbi of Temple Emanuel of that city.

Rabbi Wessel declared that the attempts being made to have children attend religious hours was wholly unnecessary. It was stated recently that definite plans for a religious hour had not been worked out and the board of education had not yet been asked to pass on the proposal. The plan was to have Protestant children, whose parents desired, attend services at a Protestant church for about an hour one day each week.

There is no covering law in the state. The action of a Virginia (Minn.) school board permitting the reading of the Bible in the schools of that district was carried on test to the State Supreme Court in a case known as Max Kaplan vs. Independent School District of Virginia. A majority opinion approved the action in the decision handed down on April 22, 1922. The dissenting opinion was written by Chief Justice Wilson.

Word was received by Dr. Nathan Krass, Rabbi of Temple Emanuel, of the death of his father, Paul Krass, in Chicago. Mr. Krass was 84 years old.

INDIANA ATTORNEY GENERAL WANTS KLAN SECRETS BARED

Indianapolis, Jan. 17.—Disclosure of the secrets of the Ku Klux Klan was demanded by Attorney Gilliom, who asked the Marion County Circuit Court to mandate the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan Corporation to produce facts relative to its finances, total membership, distribution of funds, political activities and policy regarding religion.

The Attorney General listed 119 questions which he petitioned the court to compel Hiram W. Evans of Atlanta, Ga., Imperial Wizard of the Klan, and Joe M. Huffington of Evansville, Ind., Grand Dragon of Indiana, to answer.

Attorney General Gilliom recently filed suit in the Circuit Court to enjoin the Klan from operating in the State and asking that a receiver be appointed. He charged the organization had failed to pay taxes and was operating illegally.

The Klan's influence in Indiana politics; whom it supported in the last Governorship race; the ranking of the various National and State officers and the pay they receive; the limits of their authority; for what monies have been expended after salaries were met, and other data are requested through answers to the questions.

Gilliom also wanted to know whether Thomas Heffin, United States Senator from Alabama, was procured by the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, or Klansmen in Indiana, to make speeches within the State in 1922 "for the purpose of creating sentiment among Democratic voters against the nomination of Alfred E. Smith for President by the next Democratic National Convention."
