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## GERMAN NATIONALISTS OF ALL SHADES FORM ELECTION BLOCK, LAUNCH CAMPAIGN

'Fight Against Jews and Catholics' is  
Their Slogan

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Jan. 23.—A bloc of anti-Semitic parties, having as its slogan: "Fight against Judaism and Catholicism," was formed today.

The bloc will consist of the various groups of the Voelkische party, including the Deutschnazionale-voelkische, the Hitlerites, the Deutschsoziale, and the Bauern-voelkische. The campaign has already been initiated by the "Deutsches Tageblatt" and its sister organs, the slogan being, "To protect the German people against International Jewry and Catholicism."

Ludendorff's weekly published an appeal today by Mathilda Ludendorff, the German war lord's wife. In this appeal, Madam Ludendorff charges the Christian church with failure to carry out Luther's demand to expel from Germany the "Satan Jews" and to destroy the synagogues. "The hundred fold fledged Jews are in control of the church chancelleries in Germany and are subject to the secret orders of the chief rabbi," Madam Ludendorff asserts. She further urges the followers of the Voelkische party who go to church to prevent the reading of the Old Testament.

## STRAUS HEALTH HOME TO BE ERECTED IN TEL AVIV

Tel Aviv, Jan. 23.—A health center donated by Nathan Straus will be erected in Tel Aviv. The center will be known as the Nathan and Lina Straus Health Home.

The cornerstone laying exercises will take place on January 31. The Tel Aviv municipality has decided on this occasion to rename the street on which the home will be erected, calling it Straus Street.

## TEDESCHI, ITALIAN JEWISH FINANCIAL EXPERT, DIES

Rome, Jan. 23.—Attilio Tedeschi, one of the best known financial experts in Italy, died here. Until his death Tedeschi occupied the post of Inspector in the Finance Ministry. Following the conclusion of the world war he was given the administrative financial direction of the new Italian territories.

## PALESTINE GOVERNMENT WILL TAKE MEASURES TO END UNEMPLOYMENT, DR. WEIZMANN DECLARES

Colonial Office Gives Advance Approval of Plans; Weizmann May Postpone  
Trip to U. S., Going to South Africa Instead

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Jan. 23.—The Palestine government will soon take effective measures to relieve the unemployment situation in Palestine, declared Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, in an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Asked when he will proceed to the United States, Dr. Weizmann said that he was not certain of the date of his sailing.

The Colonial office, Dr. Weizmann stated, has given its advance approval for providing funds to immediately execute the public works outlined in the draft estimates of the Palestine government for the present year. At the request of High Commissioner Lord Plumer, the Colonial Office has also given its advance approval to certain other items including the afforestation work. The Colonial Office has promised to give favorable consideration to any similar request of the High Commissioner.

The Palestine Administration is now examining the project worked out by Major Campbell regarding the arrangement of loans to the orange and wine growers in order to relieve the unemployment situation, Dr. Weizmann stated.

## VIENNA HAKENKREUZLER, IN STREET DEMONSTRATION, DE- NOUNCE AMERICAN CULTURE Negro Play Gives Rise to Anti-Semitic Protest

Vienna, Jan. 23.—An anti-Semitic demonstration which lasted several hours in front of the Opera House accompanied the opening performance of a drama of negro life entitled "Jenny."

The Vienna Hakenkreuzler press, in reviewing the play, injected race hatred into the criticism, declaring that the drama of negro life is an expression of the "triumph of America's powerful alliance with Jewry over Germanism."

Hundreds of demonstrators marched through the square singing anti-Semitic songs and denouncing what they termed "America's negro culture and Jewish negro taste." The police restored order, arresting many of the demonstrators.

## GERMAN COURT ACQUITS ANTI-SEMITES CHARGED WITH OFFENSIVE WRITING

Calumnies Against Jews, Not Jewish  
Religion, is Basis of Verdict

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Jan. 23.—Four anti-Semitic agitators who asserted in their publication that ritual murder is a command of the Talmud and is being practiced today were acquitted of charges brought against them by representatives of the Jewish community that they had offended the Jewish religion.

Those acquitted were Stuermer, the publisher of the paper, Streicher, a member of the Bavarian Diet, and city councillor Holz and Dietrich, members of the editorial staff.

The acquittal was ordered by the Nuremberg court on the ground that the writers of the articles did not mean the Jewish religion but the Jewish people. The verdict called forth criticism in German Democratic circles.

The Nuremberg court previously acquitted the same agitators when Stuermer's paper published articles in which it was alleged that the Jewish soldiers in the German army during the war were but "swine keepers." At that time the court based its acquittal on the ground that it could not be established who was the author of the article.

## POPE BESTOWS DECORATION ON LEVI, AFGHANISTAN JEW

Rome, Jan. 23.—The decoration of the Order of Pope Gregory the Great was conferred upon Rene Levi, secretary of the Afghanistan Embassy in Rome, by order of Pope Pius XI.

The honor was bestowed upon the representative in connection with the visit here of Amanullah Khan, ruler of Afghanistan.

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## ROSENWALD IS HONORED FOR HUMANITARIAN WORK

Julius Rosenwald was named to receive the Harmon Foundation Award for Distinguished Work in Race Relations for outstanding contribution toward improving relations between white and Negro people in America.

A special gold medal award will be conferred upon Mr. Rosenwald for his gifts toward Negro Y. M. C. A. buildings and his provisions for improving Southern rural schools for colored children. James Hardy Dillard, president of the James Fund and the John F. Slater Fund, both dedicated to educational work among negroes will receive \$500 and a gold medal from the Foundation.

Public presentation will be made at the First Congregational Church of Washington, D. C. Feb. 21, under the direction of Dr. Amos Phelps Seigler, Chairman of the Inter-Racial Committee of Washington.

## TOURIST AIR SERVICE TO PALESTINE ESTABLISHED

## \$300,000 QUOTA IS ADOPTED BY OHIO FOR UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL FOR THIS YEAR

Leader Criticizes Defeatist Spirit in  
Zionist Ranks

Toledo, O., Jan. 23.—A quota of \$300,000 for this year was adopted at the Ohio Regional conference of the United Palestine Appeal held at the Commodore Perry Hotel here yesterday.

Rabbi Barnett A. Brickner of Cleveland was re-elected president of the state organization. The vice-presidents chosen were: Harry Levinson, Toledo; Max Saar, Akron; Darwin Lantz, Canton; Oscar Berman, Cincinnati; Benjamin Duberstein, Dayton; Max Bogatin, Columbus and Oscar Abshinler, Youngstown. Nathan Engelman was elected secretary and Jacob Gusman, treasurer.

The creation of a cultural committee to develop a program of cultural endeavor was a feature of the conference.

Following his election, Rabbi Brickner appealed to the delegates to discontinue the spirit of defeatism which is insistently creeping into the cause and to realize that the movement is on a stronger basis psychologically and sociologically in addition to having achieved results which should stimulate and encourage.

Louis Lipsky, Rabbi Irving Miller and Jacob R. Geoffrey, regional director, addressed the sessions.

In his address Mr. Lipsky made an attack on the attitude of those who seek to hamper the endeavors of the United Palestine Appeal.

"Many persons adversely criticize the movement in an attempt to prevent the progressive efforts of the United Palestine Appeal," Mr. Lipsky said.

## TRIAL OF JASSY STUDENTS FOR RIOTS AGAIN PUT OFF

Jassy, Jan. 23.—The trial of the anti-Semitic Roumanian students for complicity in the anti-Jewish riots has been postponed for the second time.

Mystery surrounds the decision of the court. One of the judges was suddenly arrested and suspended from his post. No official statement was issued, but it was noted that his arrest was due to an address delivered by him at an anti-Semitic banquet in favor of Crown Prince Carol.

## RABBI SCHMELKESS, MIZRACHI LEADER IN GALICIA, DIES

Warsaw, Jan. 23.—Rabbi Gedaliah Schmלקess, Rabbi of Przemyśl, died yesterday at the age of 75.

Rabbi Schmלקess was the founder of the Mizrahi Organization in Galicia.

## LODZ CITY COUNCIL TO SUBSIDIZE YIDDISH SCHOOLS; DISCRIMINATION CHARGED

Lodz, Jan. 21.—Discrimination is favor of one group of the Jewish population against another was manifested in the resolution of the Lodz city council concerning allotments for school needs.

In the city council Socialist deputies have a majority. By this majority, the council allotted a subsidy of 51,000 Zlotys for the Yiddish schools maintained by the labor parties Bund and Poale Zion. The council declined to allow a subsidy for the schools maintained by the Jewish middle class, the Orthodox Chedortim and the Zwi's Tarbut schools.

## JEWISH LABORERS TO GET WORK IN PETACH TIKVAH

Jerusalem, Jan. 23.—An increasing number of Jewish workers are finding employment in Petach Tikvah, the colony where a row between Arab and Jewish workers in the orange groves occurred recently.

Fifty Jewish workers are now engaged. The Arab lessees of the orange groves have decided to hire Jewish labor and it is expected that 200 will be engaged during the next few days.

A group of Arab workers in Jerusalem have applied to the Egyptian labor leader, Deputy Sabath, for advice as to how to establish a labor organization.

## LEMBERG AUTHORITIES STOP STUDENT MEETING

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Lemberg, Jan. 23.—A meeting of Polish students at the Lemberg University, called to consider measures against Jewish and Ukrainian students, was prohibited by the authorities in order to safeguard public safety. The police simultaneously issued an order to confiscate all pamphlets of an inciting nature issued by the student organization.

The row among the students had its origin in a controversy over the insignia of the student organization, the Polish students thinking that students of non-Polish origin, principally Jews and Ukrainians, should not be permitted to wear the insignia.

## VIEW REFORM JUDAISM DOMINANT IN NEXT GENERATION OF AMERICAN JEWRY

Board of American Hebrew Congregations Meets in Detroit; Regrouping of Jewish Community Elements Imminent; Vogelstein, Brown, Cohen, Rabbis Philipson and Zepin Submit Reports Showing Growth

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 23.—The viewpoint of the American Jew of the future will be a Judaism which "accepts the new truth of scientific discovery, and modifies its viewpoint accordingly," was the prediction made by Ludwig Vogelstein, of New York, chairman of the Executive Board of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, at its annual meeting held at Temple Beth-El here on Sunday. The visitors were guests at Sunday morning services at the Temple, and were entertained by the Detroit Jewish Community at a luncheon which preceded the business sessions of Sunday afternoon.

In his report Mr. Vogelstein reviewed the progress made by Reform Judaism in this country since it was founded here fifty-five years ago by the late Isaac M. Wise, and stated that it is because of the adoption of these modern ideas by the Reform wing of Judaism that the liberal congregations of America are increasing in membership and number. The next generation of Jews, he declared, "will witness a regrouping of Jewish elements, and that synagogue which is willing to adapt itself to modern ideas and liberal outlook will gain many recruits from the ranks of the other two religious parties—Orthodox and Conservative."

Emphasis was laid by Mr. Vogelstein on the need of adequate financial support for the work of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. The budgetary demands of this organization, now exceed a half million dollars. During the past year the organization had to work on a large deficit. Mr. Vogelstein pointed out that the annual budget in 1908 was \$51,000; in 1927, it was \$565,000. The Union now has 282 congregations, against a membership of 28 congregations when it was first organized.

Touching on the question of the Judaism of the future, Mr. Vogelstein said:

"When Isaac M. Wise organized the Union there were not over 250,000 Jews in this country. The large majority of these favored a liberal interpretation of Judaism. In fact, a number belonged to the so-called free thinkers of certain schools of philosophy of Germany. These afterwards formed a nucleus for the Ethical Culture movement. With the arrival of our Polish, Russian, Roumanian and other East European brethren, the small nucleus of Orthodox Jews expanded into a powerful group overwhelming in numbers and constantly growing in impor-

ance and influence. I think we are justified in estimating that out of the three and a half million Jews in this country nearly three millions are of recent Orthodox antecedents, and of present Conservative leanings. This truth is not altered by the fact that a very large number of them have emancipated themselves from Orthodox ritualistic observances. There are leaders of the Conservative group who are advising their own party to adopt more modern views or face the danger of sacrificing the future of their movement. An Orthodox rabbi of standing and learning bewailed the fact that in fifty years from now there would be none able to study the Talmud in the Hebrew.

"Certain leaders of Conservative Judaism claim to see in the readjustment of party lines a movement in the direction of Conservatism. Even a casual glance at the religious development of the last one hundred and fifty years in all denominations of Western Europe and America shows clearly that the future belongs to the party which frankly accepts the new truths of scientific discovery, and modifies its viewpoint accordingly, which puts a new interpretation on Shulchan Aruch separatism in the new light of modern democratic thought, and which takes cognizance of the great upheavals in the social order of our day. We are not interested in converts to Judaism, but the adoption of these ideas by our Reform Congregations accounts for the presence in our pews of many thoughtful persons, both Jewish and non-Jewish. The vision of Isaiah and Amos encompassed a religion not fettered by ancient dogmas nor inviolable, sacerdotal rites but a united humanity striving merely to do justice and love mercy and walk humbly with God.

"The membership of our Reform Synagogues is constantly being increased by accessions from the Conservative group. One does not need to be an astute prophet to foresee that the next generation is going to witness a regrouping of Jewish elements and that the Synagogue which is willing to adapt itself to modern ideas and liberal outlook will gain many recruits from the ranks of the two other parties."

David A. Brown, chairman of the Board of Finance of the Union, told of the work of the Finance Board, stating that Reform Jewry throughout the country was being organized in a way that would bring adequate funds to the Union. The country was divided into eleven zones, each under the supervision of a Zone Chairman, who had cooperating

with them thirty-nine State Chairmen, covering the States where the Union has member congregations. Reporting the results of the tour of the flying squadron of 164 Rabbis and laymen he stated that 279 mass meetings were held and considerable interest was aroused in behalf of the Union among Reform Congregations throughout the country.

Rabbi George Zepin, executive secretary of the Union, reported that the Union has grown to 282 congregations with an individual membership of 59,961. The total amount expended for all activities of the Union during 1927 was \$506,501, as compared with \$504,048 spent the year previous. The amount expended during 1927 was in excess of \$74,416 over the amount of money received.

Alfred M. Cohen, Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Hebrew Union College, presented a report on the progress made by that institution during the past year. The college now has a student body of 117, the largest enrollment in the history of the institution. Mr. Cohen told of the efforts made by Adolph S. Ochs of New York, in endeavoring to secure a \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund for the college, and announced that over a million and a half has been raised toward this endowment. The budget is now \$281,408, as compared with \$69,000 which was used in 1918.

A report on the work of the Department of Synagogue and School Extension was submitted by Julius W. Freiberg, chairman. He announced that 142 cities were visited during the past year where religious work was undertaken.

Henry M. Toch, chairman of the New York Executive Committee of the Union, presented the annual report of the work of the New York Committee for School Extension, which maintains seven religious schools with a total enrollment of 1,200 children. The schools are located in the various boroughs of Greater New York, and Jewish educational work is carried on.

Rabbi David Philipson, chairman of the Commission on Jewish Education, reported on the progress made by his department, through which textbooks, curricula, and other plans are developed to aid in giving Jewish and religious instruction to children throughout the country. Seven new publications were issued during the past year, and five manuscripts have been accepted for publication during the coming year. Rabbi Philipson then told of the work undertaken by his Commission in urging the establishment of Jewish Normal Schools throughout the country for the training of religious school teachers. There are at present, he stated, 36 such normal schools, 25 of which reported a total registration of 881 students. The normal schools are using a new syllabus on Educational

## HAIFA JEWS AND ARABS JOIN IN HONORING POLISH CONSUL

## GIVES \$100,000 TO HOSPITAL BUILDING IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Jan. 23.—Max Epstein who endowed one of the clinics of the University of Chicago, has donated \$100,000 more to be used in the building of the new Lying-in hospital on the university's medical campus. The fund is to finance an out-patient department.

"I am especially desirous that this department shall foster the prevention of infant mortality," Mr. Epstein stated in the letter announcing his gift.

Prof. Rollo G. Reynolds, the Provost of Teachers College Columbia University, will have personal supervision of the Center Academy of the Brooklyn Jewish Center, it was announced. The Center Academy is to be opened on February 1.

Miss Ellen Ballou, well known Canadian Jewish pianist, is offering a scholarship to the Faculty of Music of McGill University. The proceeds of her recital, to be given on February 14th, at the Mount Royal Hotel, will be devoted to this scholarship which will entitle the winner to study music in Europe.

Hyman Rockmaker, of Allentown, Pa., was appointed as United States Commissioner of Lehigh County by William H. Kirkpatrick, Federal Judge of Pennsylvania.

The funeral of the late Charles N. Pollak, who died on Thursday, was held yesterday morning.
