EMANCIPATION OF HUNGARIAN JEWS HAS BEEN ABOLISHED, JEWISH DEPUTY CHARGES GOVERNMENT IN PARLIAMENT DEBATE

Discussion Continues in House on Government Bill to Change Form of Discriminatory Measure; Statements of Deputy Sandor Create Profound Impression

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Feb. 23.—The emancipation of Hungarian Jews under which in year-day days they enjoyed the benefits of citizenship and equality before the law, is no longer in existence in the country today, Deputy Paul Sandor, staunch Hungarian patriot and leader of the conservative Jewish group in Budapest, charged the Government in an address he delivered in parliament as the discussion on the numerus clausus was continued yesterday.

Although no official decree was issued abolishing the emancipation of Jews, the official anti-Semitism of the Government authorities has nullified this. Deputy Sandor's charge made a tremendous impression in the House, particularly in view of the fact that it came from the leader of the assimilationist group.

State offices, both in the cities and the villages, are closed to Jews, he said. Jews cannot receive licenses for the sale of tobacco and spirits or even to engage in the crafts. Now Hungarian Jews, through the numerus clausus measure, are being barred from the professions. All this is done in dis-

regard of the fact that under the constitution of Hungary, Jews are equal to non-Jews before the law and Jews have been natives of Hungary since time immemorial.

The statements of Deputy Sandor that the wife of King Arpad was a princess of the Khazarian court, Jewish rulers, and that King Arpad's mother was of Jewish persuasion caused excitement in the Right wing of the House. "Emperor Franz Josef or Karl would never have permitted the exclusion of Jewish war heroes from the Hungarian War Heroes order," Deputy Sandor exclaimed.

George Lukacs, former member of the Government, in declaring his opposition to the principle of the numerus clausus, stated that he will vote for the government bill because it marks a departure from that principle, although it

PALESTINE AGAIN ROCKED BY EARTHQUAKE; HOUSES DAMAGED, NO CASUALTIES

Two Shocks, Second One Severe, Felt Throughout Country (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Feb. 23.—Two earthquake shocks were felt here yesterday. The first tremor which occurred at 3 A. M. was slight; the second at 7:50 P. M. was much stronger but not as severe as the earthquake of July, 1927.

The shock was felt throughout Palestine. Houses were damaged in Jerusalem, Jericho, Tel Aviv and other cities. Several walls of the buildings of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus were cracked. The Allenby Bridge across the Jordan was damaged. Traffic across the bridge was stopped.

No casualties have so far been reported.

Jerusalem, Feb. 23.—Reports which were just received at Government headquarters in Jerusalem indicate that the earthquake was felt in Hebron, Haifa, Afulah, Acre, Ludd, Jericho, Tiberias, Nazareth, Nablus, Ramleh. Everywhere many houses, including muni-

SOVIET GOVERNMENT CONFIRMS GRANT OF SIBERIA LAND FOR JEWISH COLONIZATION

Commission Completes Settlement Plan for Bureya; New Grants of 20,000 Hectares Allocated in Ukraine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Feb. 23.—The decision of the Comzet, the governmental department for settling Jews on the land, to set aside the Bureya region for an extensive Jewish colonization undertaking there was confirmed by the All Soviet Committee on Transmigration.

Kalinin, president of the Union of Socialist Soviet Republics, who is the chairman of the Transmigrants Committee, the highest authority on questions of transmigration, confirmed the decision.

Riga, Feb. 23.—Opposition to the plan of starting Jewish colonization work in Siberia was voiced at a stormy meeting of the Ozet, the society for settling Jews on the land, held in Moscow, according to a report of the Yiddish Communist paper, "Emes."

Representatives of the Left Poale Zion party, Ensen and Finkelstein, sharply criticized the project of Jewish colonization in Siberia. The Jews abroad will not support this plan, they

contended. The only place for extensive Jewish colonization is Palestine, they declared, being applauded by many of the audience who sang the Zionist hymn "Hatikvah."

Following this incident the meeting passed a resolution protesting against "the Zionist move." The "Emes" in commenting upon the occurrence asked the authorities how long they will endure such elements.

Moscow, Feb. 23.—The commission appointed by the Ozet to prepare a plan of colonization in the Bureya region, Siberia, has completed its work, it was announced here.

A special book on the Bureya plan, containing the report of the expert investigation prepared by Pro. Brook, chief agronomist of the Comzet, will be published by this body.

According to the plan of the commission, which consisted of Samuel Weizmann and Messrs. Robinson and Rashkes, 1,000 men are to be settled

NEW ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES IN BUCHAREST, AUTHORITIES TAKE FIRM MEASURES

Oradea Victims Got no Compensation, Roumanian Paper Says (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Feb. 23.—Anti-Jewish student excesses broke out this morning in Bucharest. The authorities, however, immediately took strong measures to suppress the disturbances, a despatch from Bucharest received here declares.

Details are not yet available but it is known that inciting manifestos were distributed in the Roumanian capital.

At a conference called immediately by General Nicolescu, the Chief of Police and the Royal Commissioner, Carafanca, it was decided to take the severest measures to suppress the disturbances.

Bucharest, Feb. 23.—The assertion

**LAPOWSKI, WAR VETERAN,
DIES IN EL PASO; BURIED
WITH MILITARY HONORS**
Was Uncle of Clarence Dillon, Noted
New York Banker
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

El Paso, Texas, Feb. 23.—Military
honors were accorded Col. Nathan La-
powski, 65, Spanish-American and
World War veteran, uncle of Clarence
Dillon of Dillon, Read and Company,
New York, at funeral services held on
Sunday.

Col. Lapowski died on Friday. The
funeral was said to have been the
largest in El Paso since that of former
Mayor Dudley.

Service were held in Temple Mt.
Sinai. The crowd which filled the
temple and flowed out into the street,
included Jew and Gentile.

The body was taken at 2 o'clock
from the chapel of the Hartford com-
pany, where it had lain in state for two
days and been viewed by thousands.
It was accompanied by the Eighth
Cavalry band and large delegations
from the American Legion, Spanish-
American Veterans and the Veterans
of Foreign Wars.

Rabbi Martin Zielonka paid tribute
to the record of Colonel Lapowski.

**POLISH ELECTION CAMPAIGN
FOR PARLIAMENT REACHES
ITS PEAK IN LAST TEN DAYS**
Government Organ Quotes Waldman's
Report to Refute Minority Leaders'
Claims; 1 Killed at Meeting
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Feb. 23.—The rivalry of
parties in the pre-election campaign is
reaching its peak as the day when the
votes will be cast for the election of
the third Polish Sejm is only ten days
off.

The elections will take place on Sun-
day, March 4. A vigorous activity is
being carried on by the pro-Pilsudski
election committee, the Polish Socialist
Party, the anti-Semitic National Democ-
rats, the Witos peasant party and the
Communists. It is predicted here that
the pro-Government list will have an
overwhelming victory at the expense
of the anti-Semitic groups.

In Jewish quarters the rivalry among
the various parties is intense. Here
the Gruenbaum group of the national
minorities bloc, the Agudah and Vol-
kist bloc, the Bund and the Poale Zion
are carrying on heavy battles at the
campaign meetings. Leaders of the
minorities bloc continue to charge the
authorities with hindering them in their
campaign by refusing permission to
hold mass meetings, while it is stated
that the Agudah-Volkist bloc is per-
mitted to carry on its campaign un-
hampered. In several districts the lists
of the national minorities bloc were
annulled.

The mass meetings which are being
called by the various parties to pro-
pagate their platforms are in many cases
so intense that frequent disorders
break out. Isaac Paker, Agudah mem-
ber, was killed at a mass meeting
called in the town Dobromil, East
Galicia, when a fight broke out be-
tween the Agudists and their adver-
saries. This casualty, however, is the
single instance where a life was lost.

The hopeless split of Polish Jewry
will undoubtedly result in a consider-
able decrease in the number of Jewish
representatives in the third Sejm. Each
party still asserts that victory will be
its. In Galicia the fight is on between
the Zionists under the leadership of
Dr. Leon Reich and the Orthodox
Agudah Israel. The group of Zion-
ists which sided with the minorities
bloc and the Reich list has withdrawn
its opposition.

The report of Morris D. Waldman,
prominent American Jewish social
worker, submitted to the Constructive
Relief Conference in Chicago, on con-
ditions in Poland following a survey
made by him there, was quoted yester-
day by the "Glos Prawdy," the official
organ of the Pilsudski Government.

The newspaper, in replying to the
charges made by the Jewish repre-

**Roumanian Minister Urges American
Jews to Have Confidence in His
Government's Decision to
Punish Guilty**
(Communication to the Editor)

Sir:
My attention has been called to
telegram from Bucharest published in
your issue of February 12, to the ef-
fect that the Bucharest University Sen-
ate and the Court of Appeal had short-
ened the terms of punishment of the
students found guilty in the anti-Jew-
ish riots in Transylvania.

In order to establish the exact facts
of the case, I cabled the above news
to my Government and to-day I have
received a telegram, which is quoted
below in translation:

"In reply to your telegram, the Uni-
versity Senate has not reduced any
punishment. The Jassy Court of Ap-
peal has reduced two or three terms
of punishment. The Bucharest Courts
of Cassation and Justice have rejected
the students' appeal, while at Cluj the
Court Martial continues giving sen-
tences and has brought to trial sev-
eral other students. The Jews in
America should rest assured that it
is not in our interest to leave un-
punished the Oradea Mare riots and
that the Government will see that real
sanctions are applied. They must not
be alarmed by every little incident and
all kinds of rumors but must have
confidence in the decisions of the Govern-
ment."

In order to correct any wrong im-
pression which the above news as tele-
graphed from Bucharest may have
conveyed to your readers as to the
attitude of the Roumanian Govern-
ment in this connection, I should feel obliged
if you would publish this letter in
your next issue.

Mr. Waldman's opinion. Thereupon
the Polish Telegraphic Agency broad-
cast widely Mr. Waldman's report
wherein it is stated that the position
of the Jews in Poland has improved
immensely since the advent of the
Pilsudski regime. The Agency quotes
Mr. Waldman as speaking enthusiastically
of the Pilsudski Government and
warning American Jewry against anti-
Polish propaganda. Mr. Waldman,
during his stay in Poland, interviewed
over a hundred Jewish personages and
all agreed that the Pilsudski Govern-
ment guaranteed to the Jews all polit-
ical freedom, the Polish Telegraphic
Agency despatch states.

The "Glos Prawdy" adds that Jewish
nationalist leaders in Poland were very
much angered by Mr. Waldman's re-
port.

ALFRED MOND DEDICATES BALFOUR FOREST, PLANTS FIRST TREE AT JINJAR

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Feb. 23.—The first tree of the Balfour Forest, planted in the Jewish colony, Jinjar, in the valley of Jezreel, was set in place by Sir Alfred Mond. The forest is being planted by the Jewish National Fund in honor of the author of the Balfour Declaration as a part of the Fund's afforestation program in Palestine.

A message from Lord Balfour was read at the exercises attending the planting of the first tree.

"It is unnecessary for me to express any sense of the honor conferred upon me by naming the forest after me," Lord Balfour stated in his message. "The feeling of personal gratification is trifling compared with the satisfaction with which I view this important step in the economic development of Palestine. Afforestation is naturally a slow business, but an important one. Although I cannot hope to live to see the results, I am confident of the immense benefit to the future of the country this afforestation program will bring."

Sir Herbert Samuel, former High Commissioner of Palestine, sent a message in which he stated: "May the Balfour forest endure as his name will endure."

David Lloyd George in his message stated: "I rejoice that so lasting and beneficent a tribute from British Jewry was initiated in honor of the distinguished British statesman whose name it bears. His name will ever be associated with the historic declaration by the government of which I was the head."

The decision to plant the Balfour Forest was announced by Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the Zionist Executive, at a dinner given in London to Lord Balfour to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the Balfour Declaration. Lord Balfour and Sir Alfred Mond were among those present.

The Jewish National Fund, Mr. Sokolow said, had decided to arrange for the planting of a Balfour Forest, consisting of 50,000 trees, as a permanent mark of appreciation to the author of the historic charter.

ANTI-SEMITIC TRANSLATION OF TALMUD BEFORE COURT

Budapest, Feb. 23.—The accuracy of an anti-Semitic Talmud translation into the Hungarian language, made by Baron Luszinsky, has come up before the Budapest Court of Appeals, in a libel case which is now pending before the court.

The court ordered that proof be produced that passages in the Talmud command Jews to commit ritual murders, whether the Talmud permits Jews to defraud non-Jews and to charge usurious rates on loans.

LOS ANGELES JEWS DECIDE TO CREATE KEHILLAH, NAME PROVISIONAL COMMITTEE

Lipsky Called by Zionists to Smooth Out Differences

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Los Angeles, Feb. 23.—A decision to organize a Kehillah to represent the Jewish population in Los Angeles on the basis of a broad, democratic platform, was taken at a mass meeting held here.

A provisional committee was elected for a term of six months charged with the task of preparing a constitution for the organization. One hundred and sixty-three delegates representing 21 congregations, 5 Zionist societies, 6 charitable institutions, 5 business men's associations, 4 social organizations and 5 newspapers were present at the meeting which was presided over by M. I. Grossman.

This move, which was opposed by certain elements in the Los Angeles Jewish community, is the third attempt made here to organize what is termed a Kehillah. The first attempt was made nine years ago; the second four years ago. And agitation for the organization of the Kehillah as the spokesman of the Jewish population was carried on by a number of leading Los Angeles Zionists and was sponsored vigorously by the "California Jewish Review". During the campaign which preceded the holding of the mass meeting, it was frequently charged that the Federation of Jewish Welfare societies of Los Angeles was opposed to the plan.

The provisional committee elected at the mass meeting consists of Dr. George I. Sayling, president, Dr. L. G. Reynolds, J. A. Rosencrantz, Moses Tanenbaum, Aaron Shapiro, Mrs. A. Melinkoff, vice-president, and A. Fisch, treasurer.

The fight around the Kehillah issue which divided many groups also had its repercussions in the Zionist group which as a whole appeared to be the sponsor of the movement. Because of these differences, difficulties developed in the organization of this year's United Palestine Appeal in Los Angeles. Here the fight was on as to whether the United Jewish Appeal embraced the Palestine cause, the European relief and local funds. To straighten out these difficulties and to pave the way for the organization of the United Palestine Appeal, the Los Angeles Zionists appealed to Louis Linsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, to come here to restore harmony. He is on his way here now.

The controversy which developed here was precipitated by the differences of opinion which arose in the Jewish community over the issue of Cecil de Mille's production, "King of Kings", which has agitated the leaders of the various groups here for the last few months.

does not go as far as it should. The numerus clausus measure is unconstitutional since the Jews are merely a religious group and not a national minority, he said. The numerus clausus practiced in Hungary is being used by the states which have gained control of Hungarian territories by virtue of the peace treaty as a weapon against Hungary. The speaker demanded that the Government recognize unconditionally the diplomas of those students who studied abroad, because of the bar set up against them by the numerus clausus.

Deputy Esztergalyos, Socialist, in declaring himself against the numerus clausus stated that the consideration of Jews as a nationality is "the Socialism of the fools".

Deputy Ludwig Szilagyi declared he will vote against the government bill since he considers both the old and the proposed numerus clausus laws equally bad. The contention that the numerus clausus is not directed against Jews is a farce. This discriminatory piece of legislation is damaging the movement to obtain a revision of the Treaty of Trianon, he stated.

The legalization of the Zionist movement by the Hungarian government came up in the discussion of the numerus clausus when Deputy Sandor introduced an interpellation to the government as to why it has approved the statutes of the Zionist Organization. He contended that the motive of the government was to provide a weapon for those who question the patriotism of Hungarian Jews. Deputy Sandor stated that he had intervened everywhere against granting such recognition, but he was unsuccessful.

HUNGARIAN STUDENTS DUEL OVER NUMERUS CLAUSUS

Budapest, Feb. 23.—Two Christian Hungarian students fought a duel over the numerus clausus question.

One of the students who fought the duel was among those who, during the recent strike proclaimed by the students organization in protest against the government bill, ignored the strike call and attended his lectures in the medical college. He was attacked by one of the strikers for ignoring the call. The faithful student thereupon challenged the other to a duel in which the striker was injured.

WARSAW RABBIS URGE PEACE IN JERUSALEM COMMUNITY

that, contrary to promises, the Roumanian Government has not paid a single penny compensation to the victims of the devastations in Ordeamare and Cluj, is made by the Roumanian newspaper "Dimineata."

When the world press published numerous telegrams concerning the devastations and when foreign correspondents came to Ordeamare by aeroplane, the Government declared that it would compensate all of the victims, the paper writes. There was even talk about eighty million lei being allocated for this purpose and the anti-Semitic press has since been conducting a vigorous agitation on the ground that the Jews received eighty million lei. The fact is that not a single penny was given to the Jewish victims. Five million lei were given for rebuilding the devastated synagogue and compensation was given to a few foreign subjects, but to no one else. Premier Vintila Bratianu, who is also Minister of Finance, is putting such formalities and obstacles in the way that it seems no compensation will ever be obtained.

The only hope lies in the expected return of Foreign Minister Titulescu, who is now abroad, the paper states. Upon his return Titulescu may prevail upon the Premier by explaining to him the feeling abroad. Besides, Minister Titulescu assumed certain definite obligations in this regard, the paper adds.

during 1928 to prepare the land and erect buildings so that their families may be brought over in the spring of 1929. The employment of machinery, powerful tractors and road building machines on a large scale is envisaged in the plan. A body of agronomists and engineers was enlisted to prepare the details.

An additional area of 20,000 hectares for Jewish land settlement was allocated by the Ukrainian Ministry of Agriculture on representations made by the Ukrainian Comzet.

The new grants are in Cherson, where 6,000 hectares were allotted, and in Melitopol, where 14,000 hectares were granted. The land is situated within the Agro-joint's sphere of activity and was previously investigated by expert agronomists representing the Agro-joint and the Comzet.

PEASANTS KIDNAP JEWISH GIRL FOR CONVERSION

Lemberg, Feb. 23.—Gittel Rips, sixteen year old daughter of Mendel Rips, the only Jewish resident in the village of Markowa, Eastern Galicia, was kidnapped yesterday by peasants of the neighborhood.

It was disclosed that efforts were made by certain peasant leaders to persuade the girl to embrace Christianity. When these efforts failed, a host of peasants surrounded Rips' house and carried off the girl by force. The police attempted to ascertain the whereabouts of the kidnapped girl, but have not succeeded. It is believed that the kidnapers lodged their victim in a convent.
