TWO MORE EARTHQUAKE TREMORS FELT IN PALESTINE, CAUSE NO DAMAGE

Heavy Snowfall in Jerusalem Causes Population to Worry

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Feb. 27. — Two more earthquake tremors were felt here Sunday.

The Government and municipal buildings were rapidly vacated. No damage was caused.

Jerusalem, Feb. 27.—Heavy snow fell, covering the streets of Jerusalem, during Friday and Saturday.

The snow fall reached considerable height in certain quarters. The population was fearful of the damage which the snow may cause to houses which were not built to withstand heavy weather.

During the last heavy snowfall, which occurred several years ago the roofs of many houses collapsed because of the burden.

DR. KOTCHNIK WILL SEEK TO CREATE PEACE BETWEEN POLISH AND JEWISH STUDENTS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Feb. 27.—Dr. Kotchnik, Director of the International Students Federation, who is now on a visit to Poland, will endeavor to bring about an understanding between the Polish and Jewish students. Speaking at the Jewish Students' Home here at a reception arranged in honor of his visit, Dr. Kotchnik said that he would do everything possible in order to bring about an understanding between the Polish and Jewish student youth. But he was alive to the difficulties of the situation and it was necessary to proceed slowly and cautiously.

Turning to conditions in other countries, he said that the Federation had in the early years of the Soviet regime done a great deal of work in Russia, spending about 1½ million dollars on behalf of the Russian Students' Organizations. The Soviet Government had, however, insisted on having the distribution of the funds in its own hands, and the Federation had for that reason withdrawn from Russia. As for Roumania, the Roumanian Students' Organization was not officially a part of the International Federation. The International Federation condemned the excesses in Roumania and had published a special volume dealing with the subject.

BACK TO LAND MOVEMENT STARTS AMONG JEWISH POPULATION OF MOROCCO

Moroccan Government Views Project Favorably, May Give Help

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Feb. 27.—The progress of Jewish colonization work in Russia, Argentina and Palestine has called forth a movement among the Jewish population in Morocco to settle on the land.

The movement is being sponsored by the Moroccan Jews who received their education in the schools of the Alliance Israelite Universelle. The project was taken up at a meeting of the Association of former pupils of the Alliance schools.

One of the speakers, Mr. Nahon, declared that trade no longer provided a livelihood for Moroccan Jews. The general population of Morocco is now moving towards agriculture. The Jews must do likewise. What Jewish farmers have accomplished in Argentina, Russia and Palestine can be an inspiring example for the Moroccan Jews.

A Jewish trade school is now in existence in Casablanca. Steps are now being taken to organize there a Jewish agricultural school.

The Moroccan Government, it was stated, views the project favorably and is willing to lend it assistance.

PLAN BLOC OF NATIONAL MINORITIES IN ROUMANIA

Vienna, Feb. 27.—A plan to create a bloc of National Minorities in Roumania with the view of securing a larger representation of the Minorities in the forthcoming parliamentary election, was formulated in Bucharest, reports received here state.

It was learned that leaders of the German and Hungarian Minorities in Roumania have approached the Jewish and Ukrainian leaders to join such a bloc. The political purpose of the bloc is to be the demand for cultural autonomy of National Minorities in Roumania, particularly in the field of education.

Jewish leaders have not yet formulated their attitude to the proposition.

SIR ALFRED MOND APPEALS TO WORLD JEWRY TO LEND PALESTINE CAUSE SUPPORT

Sees Remarkable Progress in Country Notwithstanding Crisis

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Feb. 27.—Sir Alfred Mond, one of the commissioners of the Non-Partisan Survey of the Jewish Agency, who has just completed his tour of Palestine, has issued a message to the Jews of the world. Sir Alfred will leave Palestine this week. His message is as follows:

"I am convinced that the cause of the Jewish national home deserves continuous and intensive support on the part of all Jews. The general conditions in Palestine are sound and are capable of producing progress. In addition to the work of the Keren Hayesod and the Jewish National Fund, private investments in agriculture and industry are essential. All that Palestine needs is financial assistance which, the sooner it is given, the greater benefit can it be."

In an interview with Palestine press representatives, Sir Alfred summed up his impressions as being "excellent." The Spring will provide new work which will alleviate the position of the unemployed. He was surprised to find so much progress everywhere, even in Tel Aviv, where the majority of the factories are enlarging their work. He was glad to notice the expansion in the dairy, cattle breeding and artificial fertilization work. Nowhere in the world could people without agricultural experience, without a land grant, and without financial assistance from the Government, have succeeded more than have the people in Palestine, Sir Alfred Mond stated.

Progress in respect to electrification has exceeded all his expectations. All power stations are overworked. The Jordan plan will be completed in 1929. The Mosul pipe line and the Bagdad

ANTI-SEMITIC TERRORISTS GET JAIL TERM IN GERMANY

Berlin, Feb. 27.—Six anti-Semitic leaders, members of the National Socialist Party, were sentenced to prison terms of from five to seven months for terrorizing the Jewish population of Chemnitz, by the District Court of that city.

The group was active during the terror of the Hitlerites. The Jewish merchant Bedass, who was seriously injured, was one of the victims.

JEWISH PRESS CRITICIZES SENATOR JAMES REED FOR STATEMENT ON FORD TRIAL

The statement made by Senator James Reed of Missouri that he regretted that Ford had withdrawn from the Sapiro libel suit is severely criticized by the Jewish press.

"Senator Reed seems to resent strongly the fact that Henry Ford has recanted. Simply speaking, it means that the Senator is sorry that the libels against the Jews were withdrawn and that all of the accusations were proved to be without any foundation. This, in our opinion, is inconceivable. It is the more so uncomprehensible in the mind of a man who intends to run for the presidency of our country which has always held in high esteem the principles of liberty and tolerance. A man who declares publicly that he resents the fact that the truth concerning a people was proven beyond a doubt to public opinion, is not fit to be a candidate for the presidency of the United States," declared the "Jewish Daily News."

The "Jewish Morning Journal" in commenting upon Senator Reed's statement writes, "Senator Reed tells us frankly that he resents the fact that Henry Ford had apologized to the Jews and settled the case. We may indeed thank Senator Reed for his sincerity. Should he receive the Democratic nomination the Jewish citizens will know how to express their opinion of him."

JEWISH WOMEN COUNCILS SPREAD IN AUSTRALIA

The organization of Councils of Jewish Women in Queensland and Victoria, Australia, has been announced by Mrs. Nathaniel E. Harris of Bradford, Pa., Chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations, of the National Council of Jewish Women. Previous to the organization of these two councils, there was but one Australian Council of Jewish Women in New South Wales.

The Jewish women of Australia have patterned their organizations after the National Council of Jewish Women of America, stating that its program affords them opportunities for broader and larger fields of activity.

Plans are being made for extending the Council of Jewish Women into every State of Australia.

UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL CONFERENCES IN BOSTON, RICHMOND, ADOPT QUOTAS

Boston, Feb. 27.—\$80,000 was subscribed toward the New England quota of \$450,000 for the United Palestine Appeal at a dinner held here last Wednesday night in the Chamber of Commerce. Over 700 persons attended the gathering.

Judge William M. Lewis, National Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, delivered an address in the absence of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, who was scheduled to be the main speaker and who was prevented from attending because of his illness.

Preceding the official launching of the campaign in Greater Boston, an emergency conference was held at the Chamber of Commerce where representatives from all parts of New England were present. Morris Rothenberg, National Chairman of the Board of Directors of the United Palestine Appeal, was the principal speaker. Elihu D. Stone presided.

Richmond, Va. Feb. 27.—Quotas for 35 cities in the United Palestine Appeal in the Seaboard region were adopted at a conference opened here Sunday at the Richmond Hotel. Five hundred delegates were present. The conference was addressed by Mr. Morris Rothenberg and Rabbi Wolf Gold.

FEDERATION OF UKRAINIAN JEWS HOLDS CONVENTION

The annual convention of the Federation of Ukrainian Jews was held Sunday at Pythian Temple. One hundred delegates representing 76 societies attended the meeting. It was opened by Mr. Irving Rosenzweig. The report for the year was submitted by Dr. A. Coralnik, president of the Federation.

An extensive program for the forthcoming year's work was adopted, including a proposal to bring about a Federation of all of the Jewish landsmanschaft Societies of New York City. This body, according to the plan, is to be the spokesman of those American Jews of East European origin.

The convention was addressed by Dr. Heinrich Sliosberg, who spoke on present day conditions in Ukraine, Joseph Baroness, Benjamin Winter, Abraham Goldberg and others. Dr. A. Coralnik was reelected president and Joseph Baroness, honorary president.

City Attorney William D. Saltiel of Chicago has been named a member of the executive council of Mayor William Hale Thompson's America First Foundation. He is the only Jew on the board.

NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED IN PALESTINE REDUCED; 965 GET WORK IN JANUARY

Jerusalem, Feb. 2.—In the month of January 965 Jewish unemployed were given work in various parts of the country, including 325 in afforestation work, 495 in road construction and repair and 130 in the old colonies; 575 of these workmen are from Tel Aviv, the remainder coming from Haifa, Afula and Tiberias.

With the means of the Keren Hayesod the following works have been undertaken: Reclamation of urban plots at Bet Hakerem in Jerusalem, employing 100 men and involving an expenditure of £1,469; amelioration works in the new commercial centre in Jerusalem employing 50 men, with an expenditure of £2,000; road construction in the commercial centre of Jerusalem, employing 40 men, at a cost of £2,100; construction of main road to Beit Vegan, a new suburban quarter near Jerusalem, employing 90 men at a cost of £2,000.

In addition loans were granted from Keren Hayesod monies to the amount of £7,275 for constructive works to employ 230 workmen. This amount includes the sum of £3,975 lent to the Jewish National Fund to expedite water installation in Kiriat Anavim and Ataroth, agricultural settlements near Jerusalem maintained by the Keren Hayesod on Jewish National Fund land.

In addition, a contract is being concluded with the Public Works Department of the Government under which another 300 or 350 unemployed from Jerusalem and Tel Aviv will be engaged in road construction in the vicinity of Jericho. In Jerusalem 60 workmen—half of them Jews—are being employed in repairing the High Commissioner's residence.

The erection of the Tel Aviv Health Centre, for which Nathan Straus gave \$12,000, is commencing this month and will also aid in relieving unemployment.

The Palestine Zionist Executive is exploring various methods for the abolition of unemployment and a plan of works is under consideration which will absorb all but 300 of the unemployed in Tel Aviv, thus permitting the cessation of the dole. This plan will necessitate a loan of £15,000 on the part of the Government and some £35,000 from the Palestine Zionist Executive.

\$25,000 was pledged to be raised in the campaign of the Yeshiva College Building Fund in Passaic, at a meeting of the campaign committee at the offices of the Hobart Trust Company. Harry W. Weinberger, vice-president of the Jersey State Campaign Committee and chairman of the Passaic, presided. \$10,000 was raised at the meeting.

The Jewish Communities in North Dakota

(By our Fargo Correspondent)

Fargo, N. Dakota, Feb. 24.—North Dakota is a new State, admitted to the Union in 1889. Its principal industry is agriculture. It is very difficult to give an accurate estimate of how many Jews there are in the State.

In the city of Fargo, the largest and cosmopolitan center of the State, there are about ninety Jewish families. One learns that the Jews have come here in the territorial days. The oldest Jewish family, the Sterns, are very influential. Alex Stern, who has been in the State for over forty years, is the head of one of the largest banks and trust companies in the city, and with multitudinous interests of an industrial character all over the State. On several occasions, he has been honored with public office, and at one time he was a trustee of the North Dakota Agricultural College. He was also in the State Legislature. About ten years or so ago, when they changed the city form of government in the City of Fargo from the aldermanic to that of the commission, he was elected as the first financial commissioner and later became the Mayor of the city.

Fargo has several Jewish organizations—the B'nai Brith being the outstanding one. It has a synagogue, an Orthodox Rabbi, and during the past two years a Sunday School has been organized through the efforts of the local Jewish Women's Council. There is also a strong Zionist Organization in the City. Recently a small group in this community have successfully organized a Community Center. The Center was dedicated several days ago.

The City of Grand Forks is next in line of importance. This city is one of the oldest in the State. The Jewish population consists of about fifty families, with a Zionist Organization, a Sunday School and a B'nai Brith Lodge. Their synagogue is the oldest in the State. Max Rabinovich, Isadore Papermaster and Louis Rosoff, are among the outstanding community leaders. Mr. Rabinovich was, for several years, a member of the Park Board of that City, and at one time on the Governor's Staff. Louis Rosoff has been time and again elected as a member of the school board, and Isadore Papermaster is one of the most active and enthusiastic workers for Jewish causes.

In the Northwestern part of the State, is the city of Minot, where there are about thirty Jewish families. Every Jew there is a member of the B'nai Brith and every Jewess is a member of the organization's ladies auxiliary. The instruction of the children is not overlooked. It can be justly stated that where

VIEWS COLONIZATION IN BUREYA, SIBERIA, AS NECESSITY FOR RUSSIAN JEWS

Riga, Feb. 6.—The fact that the Bureya region is so far away will not prevent Jews going there, Mr. Weizmann, one of the leading workers in the Jewish colonization movement in Russia, declared reporting on the Bureya scheme to the plenary meeting of the Jewish Colonization Society (Ozet) in Charkoff. The people, he said, will go to Bureya, and not merely for the sake of the journey, but because economic conditions compel them to go. Private trade is dying out. Co-operation and State trading compelled the Luftmensch to take to productive work.

If we want the first migrants to arrive in the Bureya region in the spring of 1929, he went on, we must start the preparatory work this summer, for it is a gigantic work which is ahead of us, The Bureya region is neither Cherson nor the Crimea. The work in Bureya must be conducted along entirely different lines. Roads must be built from the railway to the colonization areas. Without these it is impossible to supply the colonists with building materials, machinery, etc. The building of the roads will also be a help in draining the land. There are no marshes in Bureya as there are in White Russia, but in several places it will be essential to drain off water.

It will not be possible to put up the settlers in barracks. The Bureya region is not the Crimea and people cannot live there in mud huts in the winter. And it is too far away for the settlers to be able to return to their native towns over the winter. It will be necessary to make preparations for their permanent residence. Houses must be provided on a centralized method and stables must be provided. The settlers arriving in Bureya in 1929 must find a thousand houses and stables ready for occupation. The land which has never yet been cultivated must for eight months previously be turned over and allowed to lie idle before it can be sown. We expect a thousand families to be settled in Bureya in 1929 and we must therefore turn over this summer five thousand desiatin of land. We must prepare a thousand farms for 1929 and a further two thousand farms for 1930. The first settlers must be sent to Bureya in June or July of this year to inspect the land and return at the end of the summer in order to prepare everything that is necessary for their settlement in the spring of 1929. The work requires this year a million roubles, which we expect to obtain from the State budget. In the course of five years we intend to settle ten thousand families. That will cost about 22 million roubles. We hope to obtain this from the State budget, from the Bank of Social Organizations, etc.

Haifa Railway are not yet finally decided upon, but the plans involve an expense of \$15,000,000. These plans therefore require exhaustive examination, he added.

Jews, Catholics and Protestants of Chicago met under one roof to discuss the problems of promoting good will among their fellow men, at the annual social good will meeting of the Chicago Forum at the Adelphi theater.

Speakers addressed the meeting on the subject of "Jews, Catholics, Protestants—Neighbors." Rev. Russell Wilbur, eminent Catholic priest of St. Louis and formerly of Chicago, presented the point of view of his co-religionists. Rabbi Harry Levi of Boston, one of the famous Jewish leaders of this country, noted as a civic and religious leader, spoke for the Jews, and Paul Jones of New York City, formerly Episcopal and now of the diocese of Utah, and now leader of the Fellowship of Reconciliation, rounded out the trio of speakers.

The management of the Chicago Forum includes among others, leaders representatives of Jews, Catholics and Protestants.

Miss Judith Wolfert, the seventeen-year-old Brooklyn girl who won the Young Jewish National Oratorical Contest, sailed on February 21 on the Cunarder Mauretania for Palestine, where she will stay for three months. A free round trip to Palestine as well as all expenses during her sojourn in Palestine constitutes first prize.

A conference of United Jewish Campaign workers to stimulate collections was held last Sunday at New Haven, Conn. David A. Brown, national chairman, addressed the conference which was called to facilitate the completion of the \$250,000 campaign. Abraham S. Ullman of New Haven presided. A check of \$6,500 was presented to Mr. Brown by Alexander Cahn, treasurer of the campaign committee.

you will find a handful of Jews in this prairie state, there you will find a little synagogue with a Rabbi. It would appear that it is a hardship on a good many of these smaller communities to maintain their religious institutions, still they seem to meet with no difficulties in that respect. Take for instance, the capital of the State, Bismarck—there are only about twenty Jewish families there and they are just as well organized Jewishly as in some of the biggest cities of the country. Many Jewish families are scattered in different parts of the State. In the early days of statehood, a number of Jews in North Dakota homesteaded and in the course of time, gave up their farms and settled in the cities, where they went into business. There are still a scattered few farming in the southern part of the State.

Many North Dakota Jews have achieved political honors, enjoying a high standing in this far western part of the country. Several Jews have been in the Legislature in addition to Mr. Stern. Herbert Mackoff, a lawyer of Dickinson, North Dakota, was an influential member of the State Legislature a few years ago. At one time, Julius Sgutt of Harvey was also a member. David Schwartz of Golden Valley was the State's Attorney of Mercer County for two terms. William Stern of Fargo was one of the Vice Commanders of the National American Legion. Several years ago Harry Lashkowitz, of Fargo, was offered the nomination for Attorney General but he refused. Last fall he was aspiring for the office of State's Attorney of Cass County and succeeded in eliminating the Klan candidate in the primaries.

When we speak of drives here in North Dakota, we always think of the name of David Natfalin of Fargo. He has been Chairman of several of them. Since 1915 this handful of North Dakota Jews raised over two hundred forty thousand dollars for the Joint Distribution Committee. In the campaign for the Infirmary Building of the National Jewish Hospital at Denver, they raised five thousand dollars. The B'nai Brith Wider Scope Campaign is now on, with Harry Lashkowitz as its Chairman, and it is expected that the sum of ten thousand dollars will be raised in the State. Approximately eleven thousand dollars has been raised for the United Palestine Appeal since 1917.

Dr. Nathan Sinal, for five years professor of hygiene and public health at the University of Michigan, will leave March 1 for Washington, where he will begin a study of medical economics being made by a special committee on the cost of medical care.

Professor Sinal was also in charge of the State educational health program during the past three years.
