ANTI-SEMITIC EXCESSES AGAIN THREATEN ROUMANIAN JEWS

Government, Warned by Filderman's Interpellation, Considers Question, Issues Strict Orders; Geneva Council Raises Roumanian Jewish Problem at International Meeting; Roumanian Government's Compensation to Jews Less than Seven Per Cent of Damages

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Mar. 16.—A new wave of anti-Semitic excesses is threatening Jewish students in Roumanian colleges and universities, unless the authorities take immediate adequate measures to prevent the occurrence of such outbreaks.

This was the gist of an alarming interpellation introduced into the House of Parliament by Deputy William Filderman, president of the Union of Roumanian Jews.

In his interpellation Dr. Filderman declared that reports at hand show that wide-flung preparations have been made by the Roumanian nationalist student bodies for large scale anti-Jewish excesses.

In reply to this interpellation, the Minister of Education declared that the Government will secure safety and order and will take the strictest measures to prevent such outbreaks.

It was learned that at the meeting of the Council of Ministers held Thursday, the threatening renewal of the anti-Semitic student terror was the subject of a thorough discussion. It was declared that the Council of Ministers decided to issue strict instructions to the authorities to prevent the outbreaks. The police was ordered to immediately arrest and bring to trial before the military court all those students who will by acts of violence attempt to prevent the Jewish students from attending the lectures at the universities.

PALESTINE WILL ABSORB THREE TO FOUR MILLION PEOPLE, SIR ALFRED, BACK IN LONDON, STATES

Mond Will Advocate More Liberal Policy by British Government in Regard to Palestine; Plumer Promises Government Loan to Relieve Unemployment

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Mar. 16.—Sir Alfred Mond reiterated his optimistic view for the future of Palestine in an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency upon his return to London following his visit to Palestine.

He will, Sir Alfred stated, advocate a more liberal policy on the part of the British government with regard to Palestine, since the country will ultimately be able to absorb according to expert opinion, three to four million people.

SCHWARTZBARD IS BARRED FROM PALESTINE AND SYRIA; VAAD LEUMI PLEA REFUSED

Jerusalem, Mar. 16. — Sholom Schwartzbard, who was on his way from Paris to Jerusalem, landing at Beirut, was refused admittance to Syria by an order of the French authorities in Paris.

Schwartzbard had planned to visit in Syria for permission to enter Palestine, visa having been refused him. Barred from Palestine and Syria he was compelled to return to France.

Jerusalem, Mar. 16.—The petition of the Vaad Leumi, National Council of Palestine Jews, asking that Sholom Schwartzbard be permitted to enter Palestine was rejected by the Palestine Government.

The Government declared that Schwartzbard cannot be admitted to the country, since he has not "complied with the immigration regulations."

It was learned from reliable sources that the real reason for the Palestine Government's refusal to admit Schwartzbard was the fear that his arrival might arouse excitement. It was stated that Schwartzbard may be permitted to enter the country at a later date when his case will have been forgotten.

The labor delegation asked that the Palestine government grant a loan of \$15,000 to the municipality of Tel Aviv for the completion of public works which will end the unemployment situation in the city. The delegation declared that there are now 2,750 unemployed in Tel Aviv.

DWINSK POLICE CHIEF GETS PRISON SENTENCE FOR TORTURING JEWISH PRISONERS

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Riga, Mar. 4.—The head of the political police in Dwinsk, M. Bredis, has been sentenced to six months' imprisonment and five of his officers have been sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from two weeks to three months, on a charge of torturing 35 Jewish boys and girls from the town of Kreslowke who are under arrest on a charge of Communist activity. The young people are all members of the local Jewish Culture League and were arrested during a search conducted in the Club.

For several days in succession they were submitted to torture in order to force a confession out of them. Several have been crippled for life by the maltreatment to which they were subjected.

The 55 young Jews have been released until their trial on the charge of Communist activity, which will be opened on March 16th. They all deny having any association with Communism, and contend that a number of red flags and proclamations found in the vicinity of their club were deposited there by agents-provocateurs.

HENRYK GLICENSTEIN, WORLD FAMOUS JEWISH ARTIST, ARRIVES IN UNITED STATES

Exhibition of His Works is Sponsored by Many Notables

Henryk Glicenstein, internationally known Jewish sculptor, arrived on Friday on the steamer Duilio. An exhibition of the artist's work will be held under the patronage of the Italian Ambassador, Nobile Giacomo de Martino, and the Hon. Jan Ciechanowski, Polish Minister, at the Anderson Galleries from March 26 to April 7.

The sculptor, who has never before been to America, has come as the "Art Ambassador" of Italy, and brought an official letter from Prince Potensiani, Governor of Rome, to Mayor Walker, who will receive him at City Hall. He will be received Sunday by the Italian Ambassador, and will leave Monday for a reception in Washington given by the Polish Minister.

Henryk Glicenstein, was born in Turek, Poland, on May 24, 1870. His early education was at the Academy of Art in Munich, after which he won the "Prix de Rome," and settled in Italy. At a recent exhibition of his works in Rome, he was acclaimed Italy's greatest living sculptor. At that time, the King of Italy conferred upon him the Order of Cavalier of the Crown of Italy.

Miss Sarah Fisher, former Montreal Jewish girl, a prima donna at the Opera Comique in Paris, has been named an Associate of the Royal College of Music in London. Miss Fisher has been chosen to play the leading role in Mozart's "Figaro," at the Mozart festival which is to be held in Paris this May.

PROTEST MEETING AGAINST HORTHY REGIME AS KOSSUTH MONUMENT IS UNVEILED

5,000 Jews and Workers Were Victims of Horthy Terror, is Charge

About 1,000 persons at a protest meeting held in the Central Opera House under the auspices of the Anti-Horthy League on Friday night voted to send a delegation to President Coolidge to ask him not to receive the Hungarian Kossuth delegation. The Anti-Horthy League will picket the White House if the delegation is not received, it was declared.

The meeting was held after the unveiling of the Kossuth memorial which took place under strong police protection. No disturbances occurred.

Emil Balint, Secretary of the Executive Committee of the Anti-Horthy League, declared at the protest meeting: "To these agents of the Horthy Bethlen regime we liberal Hungarians say—you are guilty of the murder of 5,000 Jews and workers; you are guilty of the incarceration of tens of thousands; you are guilty of driving 20,000 people from Hungary; you are guilty of the outrages which have resulted in 3,000 innocent people rotting in your dungeons."

Other speakers were Hugo Gell, Dr. Samuel Buchler, John Dos Epos, Edward Francis Farago and Arthur Garfield Hays.

LOUIS MARSHALL DECLARES FOR HOOVER'S CANDIDACY

Louis Marshall declared himself favoring Herbert Hoover's nomination for Republican candidate for president in a letter to William H. Hill, chairman of the New York State Hoover-for-President Committee.

"From personal observation and familiarity with his outstanding achievements," Mr. Marshall wrote, "I am convinced—now that President Coolidge is unwilling to be a candidate for re-election—that Mr. Hoover is best qualified for the Republican nomination for the Presidency.

"There are but few who have such a thorough training in so many fields of action as have commanded his attention or whose record has been such a triumph of efficiency. It would be a cause for rejoicing were he able to continue the policies exemplified by President Coolidge."

J. D. C. REPRESENTATIVE,
SAILS FOR RUSSIA, POLAND**
Hebrew Institute, Under His Direction, Shows Progress

Rabbi I. M. Kovalsky, formerly representative of the Joint Distribution Committee in East European countries, now Executive Director of the Hebrew Institute of Borough Park, 13th Avenue and 50th Street, Brooklyn, is sailing Tuesday for an extended trip to Poland and Russia.

Prior to his departure Rabbi Kovalsky was given a farewell reception at the Institute, which is one of the leading Jewish parochial schools in the United States.

With an enrollment of 652 pupils, the Hebrew Institute has made considerable progress in the last two years, it was reported recently at the annual banquet of the institution which is presided over by G. S. Roth, honorary president and M. Eisenstock, president.

The Institute, which has the status of a grammar and high school, provides a secular education blended with a thorough Jewish education. The Jewish subjects are taught in the Hebrew language. Bible and Talmud are also a part of the curriculum in the high school classes.

The financial report for the past year showed that the Institute received \$75,000 in tuition fees. The applications of two hundred new pupils had to be declined at the new school year because of the lack of further facilities.

**DR. SPEISER IS NAMED TO
PENN. UNIVERSITY FACULTY**

Philadelphia, Mar. 16.—Dr. Ephraim A. Speiser has been elected assistant professor in semitics at the University of Pennsylvania, according to an announcement in the Bulletin of the American Schools of Oriental Research. Dr. Speiser will succeed Professor Chiera. Doctor Speiser will also attend the Oxford Congregation of Orientalists, being one of the representatives of the University of Pennsylvania.

Doctor Speiser is twenty-six years old. He is a graduate of the Gymnasium at Lemberg; was a Fellow and Ph.D. of Dropsie College in 1925; held a Harrison research Fellowship at the University of Pennsylvania and was twice in succession awarded a Guggenheim Fellowship. He engaged in archaeological work in the neighborhood of Bagdad. Many of his finds will be sent to the Dropsie College, the funds for the excavations having been contributed through friends of the college.

Jewish Family Conflict in Russia on Religious Grounds

(By our Moscow Correspondent)

Moscow, Feb. 24.—A slice of Jewish life in Soviet Russia is presented in a report in the press here, of a case which has just been heard in a law court in the Crimea.

The case arose out of an incident which took place some time ago, when a journalist on the staff of the local Russian newspaper "Red Crimea", passing through a street at night heard cries for help from a courtyard. On entering the courtyard he found an old man complaining that his sons were beating him because he was saying his evening prayers. The journalist went away and wrote an article in his paper headed "How we conduct anti-religious propaganda".

Out of this incident, the old man, Isaac Ginsburg, brought an action against his wife, Rachel Ginsburg and their two sons, Abraham Ginsburg a worker and a Young Communist, and Jacob Ginsburg a demobilized Red Army soldier, now a militiaman. The father accused the sons of persecuting him because he observed the Jewish religious laws. The mother, he said, sided with the sons. "If I sit down to read the Psalms or I say my prayers," he declared, "there is at once shouting and whistling, and it generally ends with them beating me."

The Court found the defendants not guilty and acquitted them, declaring that Isaac Ginsburg had provoked them by his actions. The defendants pleaded that they had not interfered with his observance of Jewish ritual but that he caused scenes when he found milk and meat dishes together. He was annoyed when they refused to stand up when he said Kiddush. He refused to see his oldest daughter, who had married a non-Jewish Communist, and he said that he did not want any Gentile grandchildren.

A grandchild, a young schoolgirl, belonging to the Communist pioneers, gave evidence that on Saturdays her grandfather had always tried to prevent her going to school and had stolen her out of the house to go with him to synagogue. Often she had run away during the service and gone to school. He was always very angry with her when that happened. Now that her uncle had come home from the Red Army, her grandfather was afraid of him and no longer forced her to go to synagogue.

At the end of the proceedings after the defendants were acquitted, the wife, Rachel Ginsburg, asked the Court to make an order compelling her husband to leave the house because she wanted to live with her sons and he was a disturbing element. She produced a decree of divorce from the Soviet Court.

The old man protested. He knew nothing of any divorce, he said. "We

SENATE COMMITTEE VOTES TO POSTPONE NATIONAL ORIGIN BILL ANOTHER YEAR

New Bills on Immigration and Naturalization Introduced
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., Mar. 16.—The Immigration Committee of the United States Senate yesterday went on record as favoring the postponement of the national origins plan which was due to become effective July 1, 1928 by a proclamation of the President on April 1.

It is believed that President Coolidge, in deference to the Committee's action, will refrain from issuing the proclamation putting into effect the national origins provision. It is also believed that the Senate will soon approve the Committee's report on the bill which will then go to the House.

After half an hour's testimony by Doctor Hill of the Commerce Department, who was assigned by the Government to compile estimated quotas, the Senate committee voted to report favorably the bill of Senator Hiram Johnson, chairman of the Committee, to postpone the going into effect of the national origins provision until April 1, 1929.

This action was decided upon, it is understood, because the figures on which Dr. Hill stated he made his estimates were considered so poor that the committee felt another year's research will be necessary. Dr. Hill's testimony was given in an executive session.

Washington, March 16.—A bill legalizing the admittance and permanent stay of aliens who entered the United States illegally before July 1, 1924, provided they have continued to reside in America since the date of such entry, was introduced by Senator Wheeler of Montana.

Congressman Kelly of Pennsylvania introduced a bill requiring aliens, before filing petitions for naturalization, to have an intelligent reading and speaking knowledge of the English language and a reasonable understanding of American history, institutions and ideals before being granted citizenship. Such knowledge and understanding would have to be certified by diplomas issued by public school authorities in accordance with standards and regulations prescribed by the Secretary of Labor with the cooperation of the Secretary of the Interior. In view of such diploma, a written examination, based upon these standards and regulations, conducted by the naturalization examiner would have to be passed.

tion Committee, introduced a bill to constitute one-half of the present immigration quotas as a "families quota" to be available for the unmarried children under twenty-one, the parents and husbands of citizens of the United States, the unmarried children under twenty-one, husbands and wives of declarants admitted to America prior to July 1, 1924 and subsequent to June 2, 1921 and of residents in America prior to June 3, 1921 lawfully admitted or if such admittance is satisfactorily proved even if it does not appear upon the immigration records.

Congressman Dickstein served notice upon the House Immigration Committee that he intends to insist upon definite action regarding relief for separated families and that he is not satisfied with either the Reed bill recently passed by the Senate giving certain limited preferences or the bill of Senator Watson of Indiana, recently introduced. He informed the Committee he will ask much more substantial relief.

WOMEN'S VOTE STIRS UNITED SYNAGOGUE IN ENGLAND; LEADERS IN CONTROVERSY

London, Mar. 2.—Sir Robert Waley-Cohen and other honorary officers of the United Synagogue, Samuel Moses, Frank D. Benjamin, Isidore Salmon, Nathaniel S. Lucas, Frank Samuel, Joseph Prag and Lawrence Levy have written to Lionel de Rothschild, President of the United Synagogue, stating that they are not prepared to continue in office unless arrangements can be made to maintain the Constitution of the United Synagogue.

A special meeting of the Council of the United Synagogue was convoked to deal with the situation.

"The situation," says the "Jewish Chronicle" "is an aftermath of the determination of the Council, subject to the decision of a conjoint meeting to be held presently for the purpose of confirming it, to grant to women the right to vote at Synagogal elections for Boards of Management and Wardens. In the view of some, the proposal, even in these days of the 'flapper' vote urged by a Conservative Government, is considered dangerously revolutionary. Others think that the moderate nature of the franchise extension is its chief objection, and that there is no valid reason why women should not themselves be eligible for such offices as those in question, always providing, of course, that no breach of Jewish Law or traditional practice is involved."

The "Jewish Chronicle" suggests that a round table conference before the meeting might tend to resolve the critical position that has arisen, and trusts Mr. de Rothschild to do all in his power to effect an understanding between the opposing parties. "We think," it says, "that the motive of those who carried the resolution that has caused the trouble is sincere and well-meant, though utterly mistaken and absurdly groundless. On the other hand the step taken by the honorary officers, though with the very highest of purpose in view, is not, we believe, one in respect to which they will carry much general approval."

LEAGUE COMMISSION SEEKS TO SOLVE REFUGEE QUESTION

Geneva, Mar. 15.—The question of the settlement of some of the Russian and Armenian refugees in Bolivia, Peru, France and Tunis and of settling Armenian refugees in Syria was dealt with at the session of the Refugees Commission of the International Labor Office of the League of Nations held here.

The commission has, in accordance with the decision adopted by the last session of the governing body of the International Labor Office, become a permanent body. The question of the Refugees' Department's budget for 1929 was also dealt with at the meeting.

Damage is estimated to cover less than seven percent of the actual amount of damage done to Jewish property during the disturbances. The Jewish population is greatly dissatisfied at the inadequacy of the compensation allowed them by the Government.

It is pointed out that the American citizen, Captain Keller, who was injured during the disturbances, was given almost as much in compensation for himself as is now being allocated for all the Jewish sufferers combined.

Recently the "Dimineatza" complained that the Government has failed to carry out its pledges to pay compensation to the victims of the anti-Jewish devastations in Transylvania. Not a single penny, it declared, has been paid out in compensation. Five million lei have been given for the rebuilding of the devastated synagogues and schools. Compensation was given to a few foreign subjects, but that is all. No one else has received anything, the paper stated.
