DR. CHAIM WEIZMANN, HEAD OF WORLD ZIONIST ORGANIZA- TION, ARRIVES IN NEW YORK

Zionist Leader Here on Fifth Visit,
in Interest of Nation-wide
Campaign

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, arrived in the United States late yesterday afternoon on the steamer Aquitania.

On his fifth visit to the United States the Zionist leader was welcomed at the pier by a delegation representing the Zionist Organization of America and the United Palestine Appeal.

The welcoming committee, which was composed of representatives of all Zionist districts, U.P.A. sections, Hadassah, the Jewish National Fund, Women's Division and youth organizations, was headed by Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, Morris Rottenberg, chairman of the board of directors of the United Palestine Appeal, Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, chairman of the U.P.A. in New York and Judge Grover Moscowitz, chairman of the Brooklyn U. P. A.

The first public appearance of Dr. Weizmann will be Thursday, March 22, at a reception in his honor at the Astor Hotel. On Sunday, April 1, Dr. Weizmann will speak at Temple Emanu-El before the men's club of the congregation on the subject: "Palestine, Its Value to the Jew and the World."

The week of March 22 to 29 was declared as Weizmann Week of the United Palestine Appeal. Dr. Weizmann will be the guest of honor at five dinners in Brooklyn and Long Island during the (Continued on page 4)

NO INCREASE IN LIQUOR SALE IN PALESTINE, AL- THOUGH POPULATION GREW

London, Mar. 20.—Notwithstanding the very considerable increase in the population of Palestine since 1924, the number of licenses for the sale of alcoholic liquors has not been proportionately increased, Colonel Leopold Amery, British Colonial Secretary, declared in the House of Commons.

The secretary replied to the question of the Rev. James Barr, Laborite, as to what was the precise increase in the number of places selling alcoholic liquors in Palestine. Col. Amery stated that in 1922, 363 licenses had been issued; 493 in 1923; 513 in 1924; 565 in 1925; 861 in 1926 and 541 in 1927. No action in this direction has been considered necessary, the secretary stated.

LEAGUE COUNCIL CONSIDERS NUMERUS CLAUSUS QUES- TION CLOSED, HUNGARIAN GOVERNMENT REPORTS

Foreign Minister Valko Makes Statement Before Foreign Relations Com-
mittee of Hungarian Senate; Matter Has Reached 'Resting
Point,' He Declares

Budapest, Mar. 20.—The assertion that the Council of the League of Nations, to whom the Joint Foreign Committee of the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Board of Jewish Deputies, as well as the Alliance Israelite Universelle have appealed against the anti-Jewish discriminatory measure, now considers the question of the numerus clausus as ended, was made by the Minister of Foreign Affairs, Valko, in a statement before the Foreign Relations Committee of the Senate.

After accepting the report of the Hungarian Government in reply to the Jewish complaints, the Council of the League of Nations declared the numerus clausus question as closed. This matter has thus finally reached a "resting point," Minister Valko declared.

Budapest, Mar. 20. — Despatches from Paris to the Budapest newspapers report from Geneva that the Council of the League of Nations has decided to postpone the reconsideration of the numerus clausus question since the new bill modifying the numerus clausus law was adopted.

The Council also decided to postpone consideration of the new petition submitted to it by the Alliance Israelite Universelle with regard to the matter.

POGROM LEADER, ONE TIME PETLURA AID, EXECUTED

Moscow, Mar. 20.—Medinsky, Petlura's commandant in Heissin, Ukraine, during the anti-Jewish pogroms, was executed, in accordance with the death sentence pronounced upon him.

Medinsky was found guilty of the pogrom in the town in 1919, when 30 Jews were massacred.

BUCHAREST JEWISH QUARTER UNDER STRONG PATROL GUARD

Bucharest, Mar. 20.—The Jewish quarter in the city was guarded by strong patrols Sunday night.

The extraordinary measures were taken to prevent the outbreak of anti-Semitic attacks which were threatened.

RABBI MEIR DON PLOTZKI, FAMOUS POLISH GAON, ILL

Warsaw, Mar. 20.—Rabbi Meir Don Plotzki, famous Talmudic scholar known as the Gaon of Ostrow, who visited the United States last year, was taken seriously ill. He will have to undergo an operation, physicians declare.

This decision of the Council is hailed by the Hungarian press as very significant. The newspapers comment that by this decision the Council of the League of Nations expressed its view that its role in the numerus clausus question has been ended.

NEW JEWISH GROUPS SEEK TO BE SETTLED ON LAND, AS TOWNS FACE CRISIS

Swampy Region in White Russia to be
Drained for Extending Jewish
Colonization

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Mar. 20.—An urge to settle on the land, recalling the 1923 spontaneous back-to-the-land movement among Russian Jews, is manifesting itself in various parts of Russia.

An increasing number of Jewish families are arriving in Crimea, seeking an opportunity to settle on the land. This movement is said to be the result of the renewed economic crisis in the Jewish towns and villages.

Notwithstanding the approaching Passover holidays, 255 families arrived in Evpatoria today seeking to settle on the land immediately.

Moscow, Mar. 20.—The swamp region in White Russia is to be drained to provide land for extending Jewish colonization work in that region, according to a decision adopted today by the praesidium of the National Minorities Council of the Zik, central executive committee.

The resolution declares that although there is a dearth of land in White Russia, Jewish colonization work is highly important and the White Russian Government is urged to immediately start (Continued on Page 4)

PRUSSIAN DIET ASKS FOR RESTRICTION ON SCHECHITA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Mar. 20—A numerus clausus on the Schechita, the Jewish method of slaughtering animals, was asked in a resolution passed by the agricultural committee of the Prussian Diet.

The Government was urged to introduce a bill prohibiting the slaughtering of animals according to schechita methods in a number larger than the proportion of the Jewish population in the country. The resolution also urged the introduction of stunning by electricity, even for Jewish consumption, if the Jewish religion permits this.

JERUSALEM DEMONSTRATION LEADER WILL BE DEPORTED

Jerusalem, Mar. 20—Ben Simon, Jewish worker who came here from Russia seven years ago, was sentenced to three months imprisonment followed by deportation for his part in a recent anti-Government demonstration.

During the demonstration, which was called to protest against the alleged flogging of political prisoners, Ben Simon, it was charged, urged the demonstrators not to disperse but to resist the police.

Four members of the Anti-Horthy League, bearing placards reading: "Hejjas a Mass Murderer," "They Dishonored Kossuth," "Perenyi, a Hapsburg Lackey," were arrested outside the White House when the Kossuth memorial Delegation was received by President Coolidge.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE RITES AT FUNERAL OF NORA BAYES, NOTED STAGE ENTERTAINER

'Aleph Bays,' Manager Recited;
'That's it,' She Said Choosing Name

Christian Science rites will be followed at the funeral services of Nora Bayes, famous American entertainer and singer, who died Monday at the Brooklyn Jewish Hospital, following an operation. She was forty-seven years old and had been ill for several years, although this was known only to her husband Benjamin L. Friedland.

Miss Bayes, who was considered one of the first American comedienues, for twenty-three years delighted two continents with her songs and humor. It was Miss Bayes whom George M. Cohan entrusted with the first public rendition of the American World War song, "Over There."

The famous comedienne was born in Joliet, Ill., the daughter of a Jewish family, as Dora Goldberg. At the beginning of her career, she chose the name of Nora Bayes. A curious story about the origin of this stage name is current in theatrical circles.

When told that Dora Goldberg was no name with which to make a success on the stage, she consulted her first manager, who was Jewish. The change from Dora to Nora was easily arrived at. As to the surname, the manager suggested choosing a name by going through the alphabet. As he started to recite the alphabet in Hebrew with the Ashkenazic pronunciation, uttering: Aleph, Bays (Beth), she interrupted, exclaiming: "That's it, Bayes."

Miss Bayes' affiliation with the Christian Science church is said to date back to 1914 when she was so ill that her life was despaired of. She later attributed her restoration to health to her having practiced Christian Science methods. She is survived by her husband and three adopted children, Norman, Lea Nora and Peter Bayes.

JEWS IN EASTERN GALICIA URGED TO WAGE FIGHT FOR THEIR ECONOMIC RIGHTS

Lemberg, Mar. 20—The Jewish population in Eastern Galicia was urged to continue its fight for economic equality and for securing its "national and cultural interests" in an appeal issued jointly by the executive committee of the Zionist Organization in this region and by the newly elected Jewish deputies, Dr. Leon Reich and Lesser.

"Notwithstanding the considerable improvement in the economic situation of the country, the Jewish masses of Eastern Galicia continue in their miserable condition, being unaided in their attempt at economic rehabilitation," the appeal states.

WRITER SAYS HATVANY CASE HAS NO RELATION TO JEW- ISH QUESTION IN HUNGARY Declares Baptised Baron Made Vicious Attacks on Jews

A protest against the attempt to associate the Hatvany case with the Jewish question in Hungary was voiced by Anton Kaufman, writing in the Newark "Jewish Chronicle." Mr. Kaufman, who is of Hungarian birth, declares:

"There is at present functioning in the United States an organization known as the Anti-Horthy League, which is trying to create the impression that the recent sentencing of Baron Ludwig von Hatvany in Hungary is an example of anti-Semitism."

"This attitude is absolutely false, as I can prove, and is fostered for the self-advertisement of a few men."

"The most obvious reason why Baron von Hatvany is not persecuted as a Jew is that he is no longer one, and is, in fact, as determined an anti-Semite as any one could be."

"He was converted after the death of his father, Alexander von Deutsch de Hatvany, with several of his brothers, all of whom, with the exception of one, Charles, have returned to Judaism."

"In addition, Baron von Hatvany has written three books in which he attacks the Jews viciously. These books, published in 1924, 1925 and 1926, contain the biography of his family, and are called 'Sigmund in the Family,' 'Sigmund's Rise' and 'Sigmund in Business.'"

"In one place, the baron says that the Jews never worked or produced anything," and that "for the last 2,000 years they have lived on usury."

"Certainly no one who publishes such statements after having been brought up in the home of a man who was president of the executive board of the Francis Joseph Rabbinical Seminary of Budapest, and was generally active in Jewish affairs, can be regarded now as the victim of anti-Semitic prejudices."

"His father was a great enough man to be an example to him. His father was made a noble with the title of Hatvany in 1885 and a member of the House of Magnates because of his establishment of the sugar industry in Hungary."

"It was during the Karolyi revolution in 1920 that the younger Hatvany, a radical in his college days, took an active part in political affairs. He went to Vienna afterwards and from there wrote articles against Hungary."

"He was found guilty not only by the Government, as the general impression is, but by an independent tribunal of justice."

CANADIAN ZIONISTS START CAMPAIGN FOR \$500,000, RAISE \$75,000 AT OPENING BANQUET (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Montreal, Mar. 20.—The United Palestine Appeal in Canada, which will seek to raise \$500,000, was launched Sunday night at a banquet at the Windsor Hotel.

A large and enthusiastic gathering witnessed the raising of \$75,000 within an hour, many persons present doubling and tripling their usual subscriptions. Canadian Zionists have undertaken to redeem 50,000 dunams of land in the plain of Sharon.

Montreal's quota of \$125,000 is expected to be realized this week.

A. J. Freiman, president of the Canadian Zionists contributed \$10,000, the Montreal Hadassah pledged \$10,000, A. Levin, \$5,000 and Robert A. Darwin, \$3,000; the Bronfman Company and B. Aaron, \$5,000 each; H. Leon, \$2,000; S. Levinson, \$1,500; the Montreal Junior Hadassah, \$1,000 and the Zionist Order, Habonim, \$4,500.

A. Levin and R. A. Darwin are the Dominion campaign chairmen.

Dr. Schmarya Levin and Mrs. Archibald Silverman were the principal speakers at the banquet. A. J. Freiman, A. Levin, Dr. Herman Abramowitz and Louis Fitch also addressed the gathering.

At a mass meeting held in the afternoon addressed by Dr. Schmarya Levin and Mrs. Silverman, \$2,000 was subscribed.

JUDGE STERN MADE TRUSTEE OF PENNSYLVANIA UNIVERSITY (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., Mar. 20.—Judge Horace Stern of the Court of Common Pleas was elected a trustee of the University of Pennsylvania for a period of ten years.

Judge Stern, who was formerly president of the Federation of Jewish Charities, is a member of the Board of Governors of Dropsie College. He is the first Jew to be named a trustee of the University.

Baltimore Jews to Aid in Erecting Houses for Jewish Students at Two Universities

(By our Baltimore Correspondent)

Baltimore, Mar. 20.—Pledging aid to the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America in establishing a house for Jewish students in Baltimore, and another, perhaps at College Park, Md., resolutions were adopted Sunday, March 18, by the Woman's Branch and the Council of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of Baltimore. The University of Maryland is located at College Park.

A letter from Dr. Frank J. Goodnow, president of the Johns Hopkins University, expressing sympathy with the movement was read.

"I am greatly in sympathy with the movement," Dr. Goodnow said, in part, "and believe that if it were generally adopted it would solve some of the perplexing questions which arise with regard to religious teachings in institutions which are strictly nondenominational in character."

Conferences will be held with the authorities of the Johns Hopkins University and the University of Maryland to see to the best location for the houses, which will be planned as centers for social and religious activities of Jewish students, including religious study groups and services.

Establishment of a five-day week throughout the United States also was advocated in a resolution by the Baltimore council. Edward F. McGrady, legislative representative in Washington of the American Federation of Labor, in an address advocated a five-day work week as a help toward relieving unemployment in the country.

Opposition to organizations designed for the express purpose of evangelizing Jews was expressed Sunday, March 18, by Dr. John W. Herring, chairman of the National Conference of Jews and Christians, in an address at the Har Sinai Temple.

Dr. Herring said he was not opposed to persons endeavoring to bring others to "see the light as they saw it," but that he was opposed to the singling out of any group for evangelization, or the "looking down" upon any group, which, he added, "was an insult to the Divine Father."

He further maintained that evangelization should not be hidden under the guise of social work, in which efforts would be made through "ice cream parties" to evangelize. He called such methods "profoundly unfair."

HOUSE COMMITTEE TO HOLD HEARING TUESDAY ON UNITING SEPARATED FAMILIES (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Mar. 20.—The House Immigration Committee will grant hearings for one day only on the proposed amendments to the immigration law providing for uniting separated families. Hearings on the amendments will be held next Tuesday.

Shortly following the hearings, it is understood a sub-committee, dealing with this subject and headed by Chairman Johnson, will make its report to the main committee.

On next Thursday the Committee will meet in executive session to consider the national origins plan. At today's meeting it was decided to postpone action on the bill for refunding the visa fees paid by aliens to American consuls, although the aliens were refused admittance because the visas had been issued by the consuls, unaware that the quotas had already been exhausted. The so-called immigrant refugees are considered chiefly entitled to these refunds.

Plans are being prepared for the erection of a new synagogue for the Agudas Achim Anshe Spheard Congregation, Baltimore, Md. Bids for the edifice will be asked as soon as the plans are completed, with the intention of beginning construction immediately. Jacob Mizen is president of the congregation.

The congregation, which has been worshipping in a remodeled dwelling for a number of years, will build a new synagogue on its present site. The edifice will be limestone and brick structure, having a seating capacity of from 1,000 to 1,200, and costing approximately \$200,000, it was said.

New regulations for the distribution of sacramental wine by rabbis have been put into effect, according to an announcement by John F. J. Herbert, Federal Prohibition Administrator for Maryland and the District of Columbia.

In the matter of permits to withdraw wine from Government-controlled storage warehouses, Mr. Herbert said, the regulations have been liberalized, but in the distribution the regulations tend to place responsibility for "leaks" upon the permittee.

This latter phase, Mr. Herbert explained, makes it incumbent upon the rabbi, to whom it is permitted to sell and distribute sacramental wines, to store the wines in the synagogue or his own home. No one except the rabbi in person, or some individual of the congregation delegated officially by him, is allowed to dispense wines, he added.

Mrs. Irma Lindheim, national president of Hadassah, will also speak. Added features will be the showing of the new Palestine films. John L. Liebowitz is chairman of the \$60,000 Far Rockaway campaign of the United Palestine Appeal and Charles P. Kramer is chairman of the dinner committee.

More than 500 Williamsburg residents are expected to greet Dr. Weizmann at the dinner arranged in his honor at the Willowgibb Mansion. Max Blumberg, president of the Williamsburg Division who recently contributed \$25,000 to the campaign, announced that several leading organizations would send delegations to the dinner.

Eastern Parkway has arranged a dinner to Dr. Weizmann for Wednesday, March 28, at the Brooklyn Jewish Center, to inaugurate its \$100,000 campaign, of which Jacob Geell is chairman, in this section. Nathan D. Shapiro is chairman of the dinner committee. Dr. Weizmann will speak at the Jewish Community House of Bensonhurst. Judge Grover M. Moscovitz chairman of the Brooklyn Division of the campaign, will also speak at the banquet. Samuel Kramer is chairman of the Bensonhurst Division and Leon Luft heads the dinner committee.

Various charities will receive bequests according to the will of the late Edgar Guggenheim of New York, disposing of an estate of approximately \$300,000.

A life estate of \$150,000 is created for Mrs. Ryo T. Guggenheim, the widow, who also receives \$15,000 outright. When she dies one-half of the principal of the trust fund will be distributed to relatives and to the following institutions: The National Jewish Hospital for Consumptives and the Jewish Consolative Relief Society, both of Denver, \$10,000 each; \$5,000 to the Jewish orphan asylum in Cleveland caring for the largest number of children; \$5,000 each to some public hospitals in Gilligen and Buchen, Germany, respectively, and \$10,000 to charitable organizations in New York devoted to the care of orphaned children. These institutions are to be selected by the trustees of the estate.

the amelioration work.

A report submitted to the National Minorities Council shows that the number of Jewish merchants in the region has decreased. Thirty percent of the small town Jewish population has been transformed into workers. The Jews in White Russia constitute 8 percent of the general population which numbers 5,000,000.

Two hundred and sixty Jewish families from the town Smilovitch will be settled on land in the neighborhood, according to a decision of the district Sovnarkom, Government agency.

Rabbi Isaac Landman, Chairman of the Special Committee of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and Dr. Cyrus Adler have addressed a letter to the Rabbis of America in behalf of the annual Passover appeal for the American Pro-Palestine Committee and its school for the Falasha in Abyssinia, Hyman J. Reik, chairman of the American Pro-Palestine Committee announced.

The Council of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods and the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America are also making the annual Passover appropriations for the Falasha program. Mr. Reik stated.

The Young People's League of the United Synagogue of America has again undertaken to provide college students who are away from home, strangers in the city, and young people who have no other Seder to attend, with a Seder Service.

The Communal Passover service will be held on Wednesday and Thursday evenings, April 4th and 5th. Communications should be addressed to the Students' House, 523 West 113th Street, New York City.

The second National Oratorical Contest of Young Judea has been started in the Young Judea clubs throughout the country.

The subject of this year's contest is "Palestine and American Jewry."

All Young Judea members between between the ages of 15 and 18 are eligible for the contest. Preliminary contests will be held by club representatives in the various districts. 3 COMMUNISTS OUSTED FROM PARTY FOR ANTI-SEMITISM

Riga, Mar. 20—Three Communists, Choldok, Stezenko and Ryabura, were excluded from the party for engaging in anti-Jewish propaganda.

During the elections to the Workers Cooperative in Bachmatsk, Crimea, the three distributed anti-Semitic pamphlets urging the workers to boycott the Jewish candidates.

Plans are now being prepared for the \$20,000 synagogue which members of congregation Beth Israel of the Rio Grande Valley will erect in Mercedes, Texas.
