EAST EUROPEAN JEWS ARE ELIGIBLE FOR ELECTION IN GERMAN KEHILLAHS

All Factions of Prussian Jewry United at 'Peace Conference

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Berlin, March 27-All factions in Prussian Jewry have united on the text of a bill which is to be presented to the Government for promulgating the reorganization of the Jewish communities as a result of a "peace comference" which ended here today.

The peace was arrived at during the convention of the Federation of Jewish communities in Prussia which met

to discuss the matter.

The outstanding feature of the convention was the agreement of the liberals that East European Jews, resident in Prussia, are eligible for election to the communal boards. The text of the bill was then unanimously adopted.

PALESTINE FRONTIER IS DEFINED IN NEW TREATY WITH TRANSJORDANIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, March 27 .- The line defining the frontier between Palestine and Transjordania is described in the new agreement between Great Britain and

Transjordania published here today as a White Paper.

In the agreement the Palestine area is defined as that portion of the mandated area lying west of a line drawn from a point two miles west of Akaba, through the center of Wady Araba, the Dead Sea, the Jordan to its junction with the River Yarmuk, thence through the center of Yarmuk to the Syrian frontier.

LONDON SHELTER REPORTS ON FATE OF IMMIGRANTS STRANDED THRU U.S. QUOTA

27 Admitted to U. S., 1006 Went to S. A., 137 Still in England

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, March 27-What has happened to the group of Jewish immi-grants stranded in Eastleigh, England, since 1925 was described in the annual report of Otto Schiff, president of the Jews' Shelter, presented to the annual meeting.

Four of the stranded immigrants died during last year at the Emigrants Hostel in Eastleigh, the report stated. Twenty-seven received visas and proceeded to the United States, being admitted within the quota. Two returned to Russia leaving 137 stranded in Eng-

The United States Consulate notified the shelter that several of this number would be able to proceed to the United States during the coming

One thousand and six proceeded to South Africa, 35 to Australia and 38 to South America, the president reported.

CONFIDENCE IN BRITISH JUSTICE KEPT HIM ALIVE

Glasgow, March 27-"I await the retrial of my case with the confidence in British justice which kept me alive for eighteen and a half years," declared Oscar Slater, who spent eighteen and a half years in Peterhead prison on the charge of having murdered an aged Glasgow woman. Slater was released following a decision by a parliamentary committee that the evidence had been insufficient.

CATHOLICS TOO FRIENDLY TO JEWS, HITLER COMPLAINS: WOULD RESTORE INQUISITION Jesus was Pioneer in Fight Against Judaism. He says

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Munich, March 27,-"In Rome under the domination of the church, Jews occupied a position which we would be satisfied to see restored," Adolf Hitler, notorious Jew-baiter, declared at a mass meeting here last night. "The church used every weapon

against the Jews, even the inquisition. Christ himself was a pioneer in the fight against Judaism," Hitler declared. "I as a German Catholic ask only what is permitted the Polish Catholics. To be anti-Semitic is not to be anti-Catholic

"The Catholic political parties are going the wrong road," Hitler continued. "Wirth is pursuing methods leading to Marxism, Chancellor Erzberger has instigated revolution. Pestalozza, the Bavarian Catholic leader, is violating the cross in being a close friend of the Jews.

"Prussia, under Centrist domination allows Jews to poison the minds of Germans in the cinemas, theatres and press. Jews even dominate the state theatre and the director, Leopold Jessner, is a Jew. A similar situation exists in Austria under Chancellor Seipel In Italy the Catholic party has failed to stop Bolshevism and Fascism has succeeded. PHILADELPHIA KEHILLAH, RECENTLY ORGANIZED, IS NOW SEEKING A CHARTER (Jewish Daily , Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., Mar. 27-Steps to incorporate the Vaad Ha'ir, the executive committee of the Philadelphia Kehillah, will be taken in accordance with a decision taken at a meeting of 65 representatives of Jewish organizations held here in the Brith Sholom Auditorium Sunday. Judge William M. Lewis, national charman of the United Palestine Appeal, who presided is to be the head of the kehillah.

The agitation for establishing a kehillah in Philadelphia has been going on for some time, deriving its main impetus from the kosher meat question.

It was declared that after a charter will be obtained, several committees are to be appointed to deal with the various phases of Jewish communal life in the city. In addition to a kosher meat supervising board, a Jewish court of arbitration is to be established to deal with purely Jewish questions such conflicts between congregations. rabbis and cantors and other cases peculiar to Jewish life. A judge, a rabbi and a businessman are to constitute the court.

Senator and Congressman Debate National Origins Plan

(By our Washington correspondent) Washington, March 27-A debate on

"Immigration and American Ideals" between Senator David A. Reed of Pennsylvania, father of the National Origins plan, and Representative Samuel Dickstein, New York Jewish Congressman, has appeared in the last two numbers of the "Docket," a legal magazine widely read by attorneys, published by West Publishing Company, St. Paul. Minn.

"There is a marked tendency on the part of some elements of our nation at this time, when the effect of our immigration law is commanding considerable attention, to think less for the future of America than for the immediate convenience of some European country from which they or their fathers came to make their homes here," Senator Reed writes, and continues:

"There is unquestionably a population problem in many of the countries of Europe, and it is perhaps only natural that their natives in America should seek to alleviate the possible consequences in the countries of their origin by maintaining the largest possible outlet for this surplus here. But what, if their will is to prevail, will happen to America? As the situation stands at present, we are confronted with a mass of alienage, accumulated durng the past three decades, that will tax the capacity of our Americanization agencies for years to come. Moreover, the time is not far distant, probably not more than a generation or two at the most, when this country itself will have to solve a surplus population problem similar to that now harrying Europe. It is the concensus of eminent biologists that the population of the United States, without any outside additions whatever, will double in sixty years. That means a population of two hundred twenty million by 1950, plus the very considerable additions even now entering the country annual-

MEIR PLOTZKI. LEADING POLISH RABBI, DIES AT 61 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, March 27-Rabbi Meir Don Plotzki, vice-president of the Union of Rabbis in Poland, and one of the leading Talmudic authorities in Eastern Europe, died this morning at the age of 61.

Rabbi Plotzki, was taken ill last week. Death was due to cancer, it was stated He was known throughout Eastern Europe as the Gaon of Ostrowiec. He visited the United States last year in the countries surrounding the Mediterthe interest of a Yeshiva in Warsaw.

"It is hard for us to realize, we of the twentieth century, that in the first two hundred fifty years after Columbus came there were only eighty thousand immigrants to the territory that is now called the United States. It is hard for us to realize that even during the famine in Ireland and the political upheaval in Germany, which caused the great migrations of the middle of the last century, the decade that preceded the Civil War, we received only about three million immigrants, because in our lifetime the flood has come so

much more rapidly.

"The statistics show that, beginning with 1890, and running down cease-lessly, until the World War interrupted it, we took over seventeen million aliens into this country, and the moment the Armistice came, and it became possible for men to migrate here, again we took in five million before we put up the bars in 1924; twenty-two million and a half, almost a quarter of the present population of the United States, born outside of the United States, and most of them in countries in which there is not today even a semblance of selfgovernment.

"Is it a wonder that thoughtful men began to feel that, if that process continued, the bulk of the population in America would cease to know how to govern itself? Is it a wonder that people began to tremble for the presevvation of what we know as American standards, American conceptions of right living conditions and right civic conditions? It is only when we think of those portentous figures that we realize what the problem was when we began to set up our restrictive legislation.

"Think what it means to the material welfare of America. If we attempt to uphold a wage level where a common laborer receives about five dollars a day, if we are to interpose no barrier, except the cost of a steamship ticket, against those countries where common labor is paid, as it is today, about seventy cents a day in South Europe and Eastern Europe, it is perfectly obvious, from the simplest laws of hydrawlies, that their masses are going to flow to our rich country. It is perfectly obvious that, when they come, they will take the places now occupied by Americans, or by their competition for those places will drive down the American wage levels.

"On the first day of this year there were one million five hundred thousand applicants for admission to the United States registered with our European consulates. Imagine the effect upon American life if we were suddealy to permit this tremendous migration from Jugoslavia, Greece, and

SENATOR FAVORS SEVERING RELATIONS WITH ROUMANIA (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Camden, N. J., March 27.—United States Senator Edward I. Edwards of New Jersey, declared himself in favor of breaking diplomatic relations with Roumania if the mistreatment of Jews continues, in the address he delivered at the sixth annual banquet of the Camden B'nai Brith.

"If this inexcusable persecution and discrimination is not immediately ended. I would go so far as to favor the severance of diplomatic relations, as was practically done with Russia following the Kishineff massacre," the Senator said.

"All over this country we should protest against the unholy desecration of temples and discrimination against the Jewish race and insist that the laws enacted in Roumania be something more than a scrap of paper. As a U. S. Senator from New Jersey I would heartily support any dignified protest against the barbaric treatment of the Jews in Roumania, which apparently has the consent of the Government."

ranean, from Russia, Hungary, and other countries.

"Somebody owns this country, Either we own it, or they do; and we got here first. We must realize that the America of the future, the America of our grandchildren, cannot exist in the form in which America stands today, unless we will keep America for the Americans and suffice ourselves with the adequate population we have here today. We have tasks enough, without introducing vast groups, who are alien to our language, alien to our political institutions, alien to our habits of life, alien to everything that we hold dear, and, if we depart from that system. then I think that more than in any other way we will jeopardize that America for our grandchildren," Senator Reed decares.

Congressman Dickstein in his reply attacks the theories of Senator Reed. "The problem is by no means free from complications, and its solution is by no means as simple as Senator Reed attempts to make it in his article," Dickstein declares.

"In addition to the problem itself, there is always the question of an adjustment to be made by those who by the ties of bood and kinship are related to the immigrant, and the solution of the immigration probem requires principally a full determination as to what effect, if any, our policy can have on those who have a right to humane consideration of their own peculiar position in any matter affecting the welfare of their families.

"I fully agree with Senator Reed's emark that immigration in this country should be limited in some way. The trouble, however, with the existing law is that it seeks to limit immigration into the United States not by quality but by number and particularly it ignores the fact that no particular race or group is in any way superior to any of the classes or groups.

"The obvious purpose of this discrimination is the adoption of an unfounded anthropological theory that the nations which are favored are the progeny of fictitious and hitherto unsuspected Nordic ancestors, while those discriminated against are not classified as belonging to that mythical ancestral stock. No scientific evidence worthy of consideration was introduced to substantiate the pseudoscientific proposition. It is pure fiction and the creation of a journalistic imagination. All we know is that these immigrants are all human beings, and none of them is regarded by the majority of the Committee as undesirable so long as they

"Those who in the past have been admitted into this country, whether born in one part of Europe or another, have been industrious and useful accessions to our population. Many of them have become citizens and have performed their civic duties and during the war entered our Army and Navy in large numbers and were loyal to our Government. It is closing our eyes to known facts to suggest that this country, large sections of which are sparsely populated and whose development has not even begun, can not absorb additional immigrants, and that hereafter only men of certain types or of certain creeds or nationalities may be added to our great army of workers," Congressman Dickstein stated.
