DOLE SYSTEM WILL SOON BE ABOLISHED IN PALESTINE Z. O. EXECUTIVE ANNOUNCES Warburg's and Straus's Contributions Remove Problem

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, April 6 — Passover was celebrated by Palestine Jewry in an atmosphere of greater hope for further progress in the upbuilding work when the announcement was made by the Zionist Executive on the eve of the festival that the dole system will be abolished. The payment of doles to unemployed Jewish workers will be discontinued on April 23.

There were about 3,000 Jewish unemployed in Tel Aviv. The relief will be substituted by the inauguration of public works.

The abolition of the dole system was made possible, it was declared by the Executive in its announcement, by the assistance given to the Executive by two American Jews, Nathan Straus and Felix M. Warburg, who contributed \$50,000 each towards the necessary funds. All unemployed workers will be absorbed in the new enterprises which will also include public works to be undertaken by the Government.

DR. ROSEN, AGRO-JOINT HEAD, SAILS FOR UNITED STATES

Moscow, Apr. 6.—Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, head of the Agro-joint, left for the United States.

Dr. Rosen, who is accompanied by Mr. Grover, one of his assistants, it was stated here, will present the plan of an agro-industrial bank which is to be created with the \$10,000,000 fund of American Jews. Important modifications of the proposed agreement with the Soviet authorities are expected to be made.

AMERICAN JEW HONORED BY FRENCH GOVERNMENT

Paris, April 6—Simon William Straus of Chicago was awarded the Cross of the Legion of Honor by the French Government. The honor was conferred upon Mr. Straus for his benefactions to hospitals and other institutions at Biarritz.

PHILADELPHIA ZIONISTS BACK ADMINISTRATION, DEPLORE RESIGNATIONS

Zionist Controversy Finds Echo in Detroit

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., April 6—The Central Zionist Committee at a regular meeting here voted "as in the past loyally and in the fullest measure" to stand back of the national and international leadership of the Zionist movement and deplored the action of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and others who have resigned from the Zionist Administrative Committee.

William E. Leaf, chairman of the Central Zionist Committee, who presided, reviewed the controversy which had developed and offered the following resolutions which were unanimously adopted.

"We view with keen regret the action taken by certain members of the Zionist Administrative Committee who resigned in the course of last week. We feel nothing has happened in the Zionist movement in this country or abroad to justify this action. What may have been consistent at the convention last June or might be consistent at the convention next June is unwarranted now when the leading Jewish communities of America are in the midst of their annual effort to

RABBI RESIGNS BECAUSE OF INTERMARRIAGE QUESTION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Amsterdam, April 6—Dr. B. L. Ritter, for the past forty years Chief Rabbi of Rotterdam, has resigned from his post.

The Chief Rabbi decided to resign on account of the refusal of the board of the Rotterdam Jewish Community, by eleven votes against three, to include in the statutes of the Jewish community clauses withholding rites from Jews who marry out of the faith.

Chief Rabbi Ritter is an active member of the Agudath Israel. His resignation became effective on April 1.

20,000 FAMILIES APPLY FOR PASSOVER AID IN WARSAW

Warsaw, April 6—Twenty thousand Jewish families received Passover aid here.

The relief, in the form of packages of Matzos and other Kosher articles, was provided by the Kehillah and welfare organizations.

MOSCOW 'EMES' ATTACKS JOINT DISTRIBUTION COM- MITTEE; WANTS REPORT

Claims Russia Received Too Little From Proceeds of U. J. C.

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, April 6—An attack on the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee was made today in an editorial in the Yiddish Communist daily, "Emes," signed by Merezhin, head of the Jewish section of the Communist party.

Under the headline "J. D. C. Must Publish Report," the editorial demands that the Committee give an account on the following points: First, How much was so far collected in the United States on account of the \$25,000,000 United Jewish Campaign; second, how were the collected funds divided among the different countries.

The editorial emphasizes that the criticism is directed not against the Agro-Joint, the agency of the J. D. C. in Russia, but against the Joint Distribution Committee, which, it claims, carried on the United Jewish Campaign under the slogan, "Colonization in Crimea," but "gives the money to Palestine and other countries."

Quoting David A. Brown's alleged statement that the United Jewish Campaign is entirely completed, Merezhin asks "why then has Russia received only \$5,000,000 of the \$25,000,000? We cannot remain without an answer on this point. Upon this answer, our further negotiations with the J. D. C. depend. The answer is also important at the present time when the Joint Distribution Committee has practically entered into an ideological bloc with the Zionist Executive," Merezhin writes.

LONDON ZIONIST EXECUTIVE REFUTES RUMORS REGARDING LEAGUE OF NATIONS LOAN

London Apr. 6—Various rumors current in the European press concerning the proposed loan to the Zionist Executive under the auspices of the League of Nations were refuted by the Executive today.

In a statement issued the Zionist Executive states that it accepts no responsibility for the press statements regarding an international Zionist loan. The reports are only partially correct, the Executive declares, and consequently are misleading and calculated to raise hopes, overlooking the attending difficulties. No authoritative information has been given out to the press, including Zionist papers.

**ANTI-SEMITISM IN SOVIET
 THEATRES BECOMES PROMI-
 NENT ISSUE IN MOSCOW PRESS**
**Famous Violinist, Krein, Commits
 Suicide Because of Ostracism**
 (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, April 6—Anti-Semitism in Soviet Government theatres in Russia's capital is a prominent issue in the Soviet press today.

Interest centers around the practice in the Bolshoy Moskovski Government theatre where the well known violinist, Krein, most prominent member of the orchestra, committed suicide, driven by the anti-Semitic attitude of Golovanov, the director.

The "Svechernya Gazeta" relates today that Golovanov refused to produce an opera entitled "The Son of the Sun," because a Jew, Galperin, wrote the libretto. Golovanov did not permit the Jewish conductor, Pozovski, to present the Russian opera, Boris Godunov, declaring that only a Russian is qualified for the task, adding "soon, we will get rid of many Jews."

The "Komsomolskaia Pravda" states that many Jews were compelled to quit the theatre because of the anti-Semitic atmosphere that prevails there. The paper urges the authorities to put an end to "Golovanovism."

**AMERICAN JEWS, SINCE 1914,
 RAISED ½ BILLION FOR WEL-
 FARE WORK, HOME, ABROAD**

The amount of five hundred million dollars was raised by American Jews in social, religious and philanthropic efforts for the needs of their own communities here and for foreign assistance to the stricken Jews of Europe and other lands, since the inception of the War Relief Campaign, fourteen years ago. Of this amount through the Joint Distribution Committee alone, about seventy-five million dollars was so far spent for relief work abroad.

This statement was made by David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, at the conference held last week in Boston.

Plans are also being made for a mass-meeting with Dr. Shmarya Levin.

**WARSAW JEWISH CONTRACTOR
 OUT ON 100,000 ZLOTY BAIL**

Warsaw, April 6—Adolph Weissblatt, Jewish communal leader who was arrested following the collapse of a building he erected for the city government, was released on bail today. A bond of 100,000 Zlotys was imposed. One of the engineers, Lichtenbaum, was also released.

They will be defended by Leon Berenson, formerly first secretary to the Polish Embassy at Washington.

**WIDER SCOPE CAMPAIGN
 SPREADS THROUGHOUT
 METROPOLITAN SECTION**

Contributions and pledges totalling nearly \$5,000 were made toward the work of the Hillel Foundations of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith at a luncheon to Judge Grover M. Moscovitz, of Brooklyn, given by Hugo Piesen at the Hotel Granada.

Judge Moscovitz in his address stated that the Hillel Foundations were breaking up prejudices of Jews against other Jews, and causing Jewish students proudly to acknowledge their origin.

Other speakers at the luncheon were Hugo H. Piesen, Dr. Alexander Lyons, Maurice P. Davidson, chairman of the New York Wider Scope Committee of the I.O.B.B., Professor A. Broderick Cohen, chairman of the Brooklyn Joint Committee, and Dr. Boris D. Bogen, executive secretary of the I.O.B.B. The honorary chairman for Brooklyn is Judge Edward Lazansky.

Maurice P. Davidson, chairman of the New York Wider Scope Committee, announced yesterday that B'nai B'rith lodges, and women's auxiliaries in the Metropolitan area are making treasury contributions to the Wider Scope Fund.

New York Lodge No. 1, voted \$2,500 on motion of Judge Myron Sulzberger, following an address by Rabbi Leo Jung on the work of Hillel Foundations. The Women's Auxiliary of New York Lodge, at a subsequent meeting, voted \$1,000.

Organization of a Bronx Committee of the Wider Scope Campaign of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith has been effected. The committee was formed at a dinner given by Judge Albert Cohn to a group of Jewish leaders of that borough at the Concordia Plaza Hotel. RELATIVES IMMIGRATION BILL IS REPORTED FAVORABLY BY HOUSE COMMITTEE

Washington, Apr. 6.—The House Immigration Committee voted on Wednesday to report the Jenkins bill embodying the points tentatively decided upon at the Committee's last meeting.

Congressman Sabath of Chicago reserved the privilege of submitting to the Committee a plan whereby the quotas of countries which remain unfilled at the end of each year be allotted to unite separated families and alternate other cases of extreme hardship. It is understood Congressman Sabath will press this proposal.

The Jenkins bill would reserve 50 per cent of the quota allotments for the fiscal year of 1929 and 1930 for admission of wives, children and relatives of foreign-born citizens and declarants for citizenship.

The measure, which has the support of various religious, welfare and civic organizations, provides that if the full amount of the 50 per cent allotment is not used in either year the remainder shall be exhausted in the regular quota manner.

RITUAL MURDER ACCUSATION ABSENT THIS YEAR IN AUSTRIA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, April 6.—The ritual murder accusation, repeated in past years at every Passover season, was totally absent this year in the anti-Semitic press.

This was ascribed here to the gradual disappearance of the Hakenkreuzler movement, which has taken a sharp downward turn since the retraction by Hemy Ford of his anti-Semitic charges. The press organs of the Hakenkreuzler movement are losing influence and ceasing publication.

Although business conditions in Vienna have recently improved somewhat due to the influx of American tourists, a great section of the Jewish population of Vienna was in sore need of material assistance as the Passover season approached. Thousands of families applied for aid to the Vienna Kehillah. They were supplied with Matzos and Kosher foodstuffs.

Jews are Placed on Black List of D. A. R.

Boston, Mass., April 6.—Cecil B. DeMille's "King of Kings" will be presented in Boston beginning next Monday night according to an announcement made by the management. No protests have been made by any of the Jewish organizations here.

The publication of the Black List by the Daughters of the American Revolution in addition to the threat of closing the Ford Hall Forum has aroused great interest in the Jewish community of Boston. Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, Professor Felix Frankfurter who assisted in an advisory capacity in the Sacco-Vanzetti case, Rabbi Harry Levi of Boston, are some of the prominent Jews black listed by the D. A. R. In addition to these prominent names, among the Jewish organizations who are on the black list, it was made known, are the Council of Jewish Women and the League of Jewish Women. The purpose of this list, according to Miss Helen Tufts Bailie, is to keep certain speakers out of the D. A. R. meetings in Massachusetts.

The discussion, as to the closing of the Ford Hall Forum has even aroused greater interest among a large section of the Boston Jewish community. Hundreds of Jewish men and women, have filled Ford Hall on Sunday nights which has become the Mecca for those who have sought an opportunity for hearing discussions on various problems. It is no secret that the majority of the attendance at Ford Hall are Jews. The funds for the forum in the past have been provided for by the Baptist Social Union. The leader of the forum, George W. Coleman, is at present on a world tour and in his absence David K. Niles is making a brave fight for the life of the forum. A number of prominent Jews are on the Forum Advisory Board.

The Moscow Habimah appeared here last night at the Boston Opera House in "Jacob's Dream," a play in three acts. It was the only performance given in Boston, held under the auspices of the Boston Junior Hadassah. Prominent Jews and non-Jews attended the performance which netted several thousand dollars for the Junior Hadassah. Miss Frances Lesser, president, expressed appreciation to the community for the support given for making possible Habimah's appearance in this city. Nachum Zernach appeared as Adam and Art Kutal as Jacob. In

COMMITTEE TO FURTHER BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT AMONG JEWISH YOUTH IS ORGANIZED

With Dr. Cyrus Adler, President of Dropsie College of Philadelphia and Acting President of the Jewish Theological Seminary in New York City, as Chairman, a National Jewish Boy Scout Committee has been organized, according to an announcement from the National Offices of the Boy Scouts of America. The aim of the Jewish Committee on Scouting will be to promote the formation and administration of Scout Troops in Synagogues, Jewish Centres and other Jewish institutions, and to stimulate community interest in Scouting among Jewish boys.

The Jewish Committee on Scouting was initiated by Mortimer L. Schiff, who is also the International Scout Commissioner and Vice President of the Boy Scouts of America. The officers of the Jewish Committee on Scouting, as chosen by the Committee, are: Chairman Dr. Cyrus Adler; Treasurer, Judge Edgar A. Lauer of New York City; Secretary, Mr. Harry M. Glusman, National Jewish Welfare Board; and Vice-Chairman, Rabbi Israel Goldstein, of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue of America; Dr. deSola Pool, of the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations and Dr. Alexander Lyons of the Central Conference of American Rabbis.

A pamphlet, "Scouting for the Jewish Boy," has been prepared for the use of Jewish Scouts, and to interest people of the Jewish faith in Scouting. It will be the purpose of the Jewish Committee on Scouting to keep in touch with all Scouting work among Jewish boys throughout the United States.

DID NOT ENDORSE ENGLISH TALMUD TRANSLATION.

Communication to the Editor:

Sir: In response to inquiries from many cities, may I state through your columns that I know nothing of Rabbi Jerome Widley's proposed translation of the Talmud. I am advised to say the same for Mr. Louis Hurwich, Superintendent of the Boston Bureau of Jewish Education. According to some of these inquiries, we are represented as members of a committee to raise funds for this purpose. The representation, if made, is false.

Rabbi Widley's name, with some proof sheets of an entirely different work with me for comment and advice. I wrote him a letter encouraging him to go ahead, at the same time pointing out the difficulties involved in the task. I am now informed that this letter has been reproduced without my consent in his and continued to be used, as to indicate to the casual reader that it is intended as a critical approval of the finished work. An order for the book from Mr. Hurwich is similarly misused. I have written to the Rabbi forbidding the further use of my letter, but failing to hear from him and continuing to receive new inquiries and complaints, I am forced to make this public statement.

raise the money necessary to meet the Palestine budget. Coming as these resignations did on the arrival of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, in this country, they are being construed as an attempt to interfere with his mission to consummate the organization of the Jewish Agency. This we deplore and consider as deserving of the severest censure.

"We also take this means of making clear to our national and international leaders that the Philadelphia Zionists will as in the past support loyally and in the fullest measure all the policies adopted at the Zionist congresses and conventions and will now redouble their efforts to help carry these policies into effect."

Detroit, April 6—The controversy in Zionist ranks re-echoed in Detroit, at the dinner given in honor of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice H. Zackheim and Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Shetzer, Detroit Zionists, prior to their departure for a visit to Palestine.

Robert Marwil, president of the Zionist District of Detroit, who was first speaker of the evening, declared that "any one who opposes the administration is a traitor to Zionism."

Mrs. Joseph H. Ehrlich, president of Detroit Hadassah, who was also a speaker of the evening, resented the statement, claiming the right of free criticism, and declaring that she is ready to line up with such "trait rs."

In his Passover sermon at Temple Emanu-El, Rabbi Samuel Schulman expressed the encouragement of non-Zionists for the administration of Dr. Weizmann.

Although he did not mention the controversy within Zionist ranks, the "New York Times" states, Dr. Schulman declared that Dr. Weizmann has the confidence of the non-Zionists, who, he announced were ready to cooperate for the rehabilitation of Palestine through the Jewish Agency, now in process of formation. He pointed out that he had little sympathy for Jewish nationalism and could see a larger field for the realization of Jewish ideals in America, but that he still wished to smooth the path in Palestine.

LONDON LIBERAL SYNAGOGUE HAS GAIN IN MEMBERSHIP

(J. T. A. Mall Service)

London, Mar. 20.—The year has shown a continuation of progress, states the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, in its annual report which has just been issued.

"Ever since its foundation, our Synagogue has moved on and forward, sometimes slowly, at other times rapidly, but it has not stood still," the report states. "That is due to the fact that it is the chief representative in this country of a kind of Judaism which has in it the power of growth. The membership has grown by 72, making a total at the end of the year of 1,491 (110 new members having joined during the year, while 26 resigned and 12 died.)"

"The Religion Classes show only a slight increase in enrollment. We had hoped for more, but until parents have been educated to realize the importance of Jewish knowledge for their children (and themselves), the education of the children will lag behind. The school has grown by 8, so that it has now an enrollment of 37 in the Sunday Classes and 44 in the Correspondence Classes."

SYNAGOGUE FEDERATION ELECTS NEW PRESIDENT

London, March 20—M. H. Davis was elected president of the Federation of Synagogues at a meeting held here tonight. He succeeds the late Lord Swaythling.

A number of delegates objected that the motion was unconstitutional since Councillor Davis is treasurer and the two offices should not be held by one person. The objection was defeated by a majority of 24, and he was elected president of the Federation and treasurer of the Burial Society.

Councillor Davis, who then occupied the chair, said that he was proud that they had broken down the tradition which existed previously that they should be ruled by people of position, wealth and title. They were now ruling themselves. The Federation, he said, would identify itself with the work of Zionism. It would also take up the Schechita question. Their program would in addition contain social services in the form of lectures, which would be arranged for the Jewish youth in the East End.

WOMEN'S COUNCIL CREATES SOCIAL SERVICE FELLOWSHIP

A \$1,500 maintenance fellowship to the Training School for Jewish Social Work, New York City, has been made available by the National Council of Jewish Women, according to an announcement by Maurice J. Karpf, director of the school.

The award of this fellowship which includes tuition, is limited to qualified candidates who will pledge themselves to work in the various social service activities of the National Council of Jewish Women for a minimum period of two years after graduation.

"The fellowship will enable the successful candidate to prepare himself for the type of social service activities carried by the National Council of Jewish Women," declared Mr. Karpf.
