TEXAS ZIONISTS ADOPT CONFIDENCE RESOLUTION IN Z. O. WORLD EXECUTIVE

Delegation to Detroit Convention Un-
instructed on American Issues
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Galveston, April 17—Confidence in the World Zionist Executive and an open mind on the American issues in the present Zionist controversy was the attitude formulated by the Texas Zionists in resolutions adopted at their convention which concluded here yesterday.

The resolution expressing confidence in Dr. Weizmann's administration read: "We, the delegates of the Texas Zionist Association and the Texas Federation of Hadassah, in convention assembled at Galveston, Texas, extend our heartiest welcome to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, upon his recent arrival in the United States.

"We extend to him the assurance of our loyal support in his great and noble task of carrying through the program and policies entrusted to him by the last Zionist Congress and we wish him speedy success in his negotiations for the final perfection of the Jewish Agency and in his efforts in behalf of

VANDERVELDE IMPRESSED BY PALESTINE'S PROGRESS, VOICES GREAT ADMIRATION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, April 17—Emil Vandervelde, socialist and leading Belgian statesman, summarized his impressions of Palestine in an exclusive interview with the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here.

Before coming to Palestine, Mr. Vandervelde stated, he had read much about the Jewish colonization, but only on the spot can the difficulties be understood and the achievements in transforming the desert and swamps into flourishing colonies be appreciated. The old colonies and the new settlements impressed themselves equally upon him. He admired the great collective experiment of labor and colonization.

Tel Aviv, he declared, is a marvelous expression of the Jewish upbuilding force. Industries in Haifa and Tel Aviv are well established. The Labor Federation has obtained results, some of which the Belgian workers have not yet attained, he declared.

Zionism, with its upbuilding work and its fraternal tendencies toward the

PAUL AXELROD, FAMOUS RUSSIAN JEWISH SOCIAL- IST, DIES IN BERLIN AT 78

Founded Russian Social Democratic
Party; Was Bitter Foe of Bolsheviks

Berlin, Apr. 17.—Paul Axelrod, founder and leader of the Russian Social Democratic movement and a bitter foe of the Bolshevik regime, died here today at the age of 78.

The death of Axelrod in exile occasioned deep mourning among the Russian Socialists abroad who continue their fight against the Bolshevik government.

He was born in 1850, the son of a poor Jewish family. His parents were unable to provide him with a proper education. At an early age he was attracted to the movement for social justice and became a member of the group of five which established the socialist movement in Russia. Together with other socialist leaders, he circulated among the Russian peasants about fifty years ago a proclamation alleged to have been issued by the Czar distributing the land to the peasants. Active in various directions, Axelrod spent a great deal of his life among the Russian mouzhiks, spreading among them the gospel of freedom and literacy.

He was one of the early members of the party "Narodniki." Known as one of the best educated Socialist leaders in Russia, he was the father of Menshevism. Axelrod was a bitter foe of the Bolsheviks, and he continued his opposition up to the time of his death. He left Russia after the Bolsheviks came into power.

REPORT OF ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES IN CRIMEA COL- ONY PROVES TO BE FALSE

Moscow, April 17—A report circulated in several American newspapers that anti-Jewish excesses took place in a Jewish colony near Simferopol, Crimea, has no foundation in fact. No Jewish farmer was killed and no house burned, as the report stated.

The report probably originated in an incident which took place in the village Aibary, near Jankoy, where six drunken hooligans smashed the windows and broke the doors of the house of a Jewish settler. This occurred on April 12. The hooligans were immediately arrested.

The headquarters of the United Jewish Campaign in New York City received a similar reply to their inquiry concerning the report from the headquarters of the Agro-joint in Moscow.

LEADER OF PEASANT PARTY STARTS ANTI-SEMITIC CAM- PAIGN IN JUGO-SLAVIA

Move Based on Opposition To
Proposed Foreign Loan
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Zagreb, April 17—Because the peasant party in Jugoslavia, as well as other democratic groups, are opposed to the Jugoslav Government's efforts to secure a foreign loan in England, an anti-Semitic campaign was started by Radic, peasant leader.

According to reports circulated here, the London house of Rothschild and Kuhn, Loeb and Company, are negotiating the loan.

The loan is opposed by the peasant party because of internal politics, one of the arguments being that the loan will benefit only the industry and commerce of the towns and will weaken the influence of the peasants. The peasant party leaders openly declared that in case the Government will ignore their protest, they will embark on the anti-Semitic issue.

Today, Radic, in a public address, attacked the Government members for "crawling before the Jewish bankers." He announced that he will institute a movement in the villages to boycott Jewish merchants.

Bucharest, Mar. 31.—Four Roumanian students, Sirbulesca, Georgescu, Jonescu, and Theodoresco, have been arrested and are to be tried by court martial for distributing anti-Semitic proclamations.

Six students, Michaelesco, Kronc, Sirbulescu, Vitriescu, Scarescu, and Barbu, will be tried by court martial for holding a meeting without the permission of the military or the university authorities and delivering inflammatory speeches inciting acts of violence against the Jews.

AMERICAN JEWS JOIN FUND TO HONOR MONTEFIORE, HEAD OF BRITISH LIBERAL JUDAISM

A group of prominent American Jews, headed by A. Leo Weil of Pittsburgh and Felix M. Warburg, have joined the London Committee to honor Claude G. Montefiore, outstanding leader of Liberal Judaism in England, on the occasion of his seventieth birthday in June.

Contributions by American Jews are sought for a fund which is being raised to present to Mr. Montefiore for whatever charitable or cultural purpose he may choose. Remittances may be made directly to the "Montefiore Fund" case

ANGLO-JEWISH LEADERS HONOR LUCIEN WOLF FOR WORK IN BEHALF OF RACE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, April 17.—Lucien Wolf, secretary of the Joint Foreign Committee, the agency of Anglo-Jewry to deal with the problem of protecting the rights of the Jewish groups in Europe, was honored at the monthly session of the Board of Jewish Deputies. In recognition of the completion of thirty-one years of service in this work, Mr. Wolf was presented with a check and bonds amounting to \$5,000.

D'Avigdor Goldsmid in his presentation address stated that wherever Jews are persecuted and oppressed, Lucien Wolf has been untiring in his efforts. He is always ready to go on long journeys in their behalf, despite physical infirmities. Foreign statesmen greatly esteem Mr. Wolf for his service in Jewish interests. Besides his humanitarian work, Mr. Wolf is known as a scholar and a historian.

In his address following the presentation, Mr. Wolf said his labors and achievements were not isolated, but the work of a lifetime and precious to him. People frequently ask what the Joint Foreign Committee has done to improve the position of East European Jews. In reply, Mr. Wolf compared the position before the war and the present situation.

Thanks to the energy of Jewish committees throughout the world, particularly the Joint Foreign Committee, he declared, the oppressed Jews in Eastern Europe have been released from bondage and are now recognized as citizens of their countries. There is no parliament in Eastern Europe where the Jews are

'KILL JEWS—SAVE RUSSIA,' AGAIN BECOMES SLOGAN OF RUSSIAN ANTI-SEMITES

Moscow, April 14—"Kill the Jews, save Russia" has long become the slogan of the Russian anti-Semites, even among the workmen, according to revelations made in the Soviet organ, "Pravda."

In urging the authorities to increase the fight against anti-Semitism, the newspaper devotes two columns to detailing facts of the anti-Semitic activity.

In Leningrad, the paper states, even the Jewish Communists in the factories are beaten. At the factory "Lit," anti-Semites surrounded the Jewish workers shouting "Zhidys," and insulted the Jewish workers by measuring their noses. They inscribed on the factory walls the slogan "Fight Zhids, save Russia." Similar cases took place in other factories.

In Charkoff, three Communists, leaders of the cooperative, issued a shameful proclamation against the Jews. In Moscow the Communist official, Kolbasin, in a letter to his Jewish neighbor, Rosenbaum, openly stated: "You remember the old pogroms, be careful."

Citing numerous other incidents the paper states: "We know that anti-Semitism is the result of the economic situation and competition in private commerce, also unemployment in offices were there are numerous Jewish workers. It is also due to the housing shortage. Anti-Semitism must be fought because it damages not only the Jews but the prestige of the Government as well."

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS BUY KARL MARX HOME IN TRIER

Berlin, April 17.—The house where Karl Marx was born has been purchased by the German Social Democratic party.

Located at Trier, Rheinland, the house has been preserved in its original condition. It will be kept as a socialist museum.

FUR CHEST RAISES \$460,000 TOWARD 1928 ALLOCATIONS; ENGEL ELECTED PRESIDENT

Pledges thus far secured toward the 1928 allocations of the Charity Chest of the Fur Industry exceed \$460,000, Michael Hollander declared in his annual report at the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Chest held at the Fur Merchants Club.

Mr. Hollander was unanimously elected honorary president of the Charity Chest after he had declined reelection as president, declaring that he did not think it proper for one man to monopolize the honor. He had served as president since the inception of the Chest in 1925. Adolph Engel was elected president to succeed Mr. Hollander.

In his report Mr. Hollander declared that although business for 1928 is not yet normal, the pledges already received are promising of a successful budget for the social welfare institutions.

TORONTO AND KANSAS CITY LAUNCH U.P.A. CAMPAIGNS

Toronto, Ont., April 17.—Fifty thousand dollars was raised at a banquet inaugurating the United Palestine Appeal here. Dr. Chaim Weizmann was the guest of honor at the banquet held Sunday night. Toronto's objective in this year's campaign is \$75,000.

Dr. Weizmann was received by the Lieutenant Governor at the Government House on Monday.

Kansas City, Mo., April 17.—Kansas City's drive to raise its 1928 quota of \$30,000 for the United Palestine Appeal was launched Sunday night. Maurice Samuel was the principal speaker at the dinner inaugurating the campaign.

Pledges amounting to \$75,000 have already been announced, among them \$10,000 from Sigmund Harzfeld, Frank C. Niles, a prominent non-Jew, has contributed \$500.

Jacob A. Harzfeld is general chairman of the campaign. The drive will be concluded with a mass meeting on Thursday evening, when Dr. Weizmann is expected to arrive in this city.

JEWISH SOCIALIST TO HEAD POLISH PARTY'S COUNCIL

Warsaw, April 17.—Herman Diamand, well known Polish Jewish economist and one of the outstanding leaders of the Polish Socialist Party in Galicia, was chosen president of the party's supreme council.

Mr. Diamand, who played a prominent part in the Polish labor movement for many decades, succeeds Ignac Daszynski, the socialist leader, who was recently elected speaker of the Sejm, over the protest of Marshal Pilsudski.

ARBITRATION COMMITTEE ORDERS RIVINGTON STREET INSTITUTION TO BE CLOSED

Jewish Education Association Intervenes in Controversy

The controversy in the Rivington Street institution known as the Hebrew Orphan Free School, which had been the subject of court proceedings, will be ended as a result of the verdict of an arbitration committee to close the institution.

The arbitration committee was chosen as the result of the intervention of the Jewish Education Association and was composed of Jonah J. Goldstein, campaign chairman of the Association, Congressman Isaac Siegel and Judge Morris Koenig, the latter serving as an advisory member.

Both factions which had carried on the litigation involving charges of waste and inefficiency agreed to abide by the arbitration committee's decision.

Israel Chipkin, educational director of the Jewish Educational Association, in announcing the decision of the arbitrators, stated that following an investigation it was found that the sanitary and other conditions of the building jeopardized the lives and health of the children, that the financial conditions of the institution prevent its further proper administration and that both factions had been deprived of the public's confidence. The committee also found that there are other Jewish institutions in the neighborhood which can provide for the children.

The Jewish Education Association has undertaken to look after the Jewish education, the clothing and feeding of the orphans.

The personal grievances that arose out of the conflict will be looked into after the institution has been closed, the arbitrators decided. The persons involved in the controversy are Abraham K. Leef, president of the Hebrew Orphan Free School, Max Oelbaum, former president, N. Rosenthal, manager; Rabbi S. Sossower, former manager, Irwin Isaacs and M. Ingber.

Representatives of several national Jewish women organizations will attend the annual meeting of the Conference Committee of National Jewish Women's Organizations which will be held at the Hotel Stevens, Chicago, on May 1st. The Conference will be held during the convention of the Women's League of the United Synagogue of America.

The officers of the Conference Committee are Mrs. Maurice Steinfield, of St. Louis, Acting Chairman, and Mrs. Estelle M. Sternberger of New York City, Secretary-Treasurer.

A women's division of the Hillel Foundations campaign of the Independent Order of B'nai B'rith has been organized under the leadership of Mrs. Max Rubinstein.

Isaac Rubinstein and Prof. A. Broderick Cohen, Brooklyn Chairmen of the Campaign, addressed the organization meeting.

Jewish Hospital Week is Observed in

500 Cities

(By our Denver Correspondent)

Denver, April 16.—National Jewish Hospital Week, now being observed in 500 cities throughout the United States marks the 29th year of the National Jewish Hospital for Consumptives in Denver, pioneer national charity institution for the treatment of tuberculosis.

Since the inception of the hospital in Denver in December, 1899, other similar institutions have been established, including the Jewish Consumptives' Relief Society also in Denver, until a network of institutions cares for the tuberculous in several other spots conducive to the necessary treatment.

Statistics show the effectiveness of the work, in the reduction of the death rate of tubercular persons. Last year it was less than half of what it was before 1899.

The long waiting list of applicants from all over the United States is an indication of the need for the 14 buildings which now comprise the institution.

A growth in capacity so that now the hospital accommodates 300 patients, increase in the scope of the research department, and the added expense of maintaining the new Infirmary Building have made it necessary to issue the Health and Friendship bonds during each National Jewish Hospital week.

The second issue will be on sale to contributors the week of April 15-21. Outside of that assistance the hospital is supported by individual subscribers.

Inspiration for the institution was first received 36 years ago when Dr. William S. Friedman, rabbi of Temple Emanuel, preached a sermon that stirred members of his congregation to action on behalf of the poverty-stricken tuberculous sufferers who come to Denver from all parts of the country, seeking a cure.

The first building was completed in 1893, but its doors remained closed six years until the Independent Order B'nai B'rith, at the instigation of District Grand Lodge No. 2 raised sufficient funds to insure operation of the institution.

Since the hospital has opened more than 5500 patients, men, women and children, have been treated, 70% of whom have left the hospital either recovered or greatly improved.

During the past 10 years since the World War, 80% of the patients have been far-advanced cases. To accommodate the increasing number of such cases, the B'nai B'rith Infirmary building was erected. It was dedicated Sept. 2, 1926, and in addition to laboratory equipment and sun parlors, includes 100 private rooms.

The research department of the hospital, established for more than eight

REV. HOLMES SEES THREE POINTS OF JUDAISM'S SUPER- IORITY TO CHRISTIANITY

Emphasizes Concepts of Righteousness, Life and Society

Three points on which he believes Judaism is superior to Christianity were outlined by Rev. John Haynes Holmes in his sermon Sunday morning at the Community Church.

"First, Judaism is superior to Christianity in its emphasis upon the moral law as the heart of spiritual experience," said Dr. Holmes. "Christianity is inclined to concern itself primarily with matters of theological belief, whereas Judaism does not hesitate to concern itself primarily with matters of ethical precept and example.

"What the creed is supposed to mean to the Christian the moral law is supposed to mean to the Jew. If I were to sum up all that Judaism means to itself and has ever meant to the world, I would speak that one mighty word, 'Righteousness.'

"A second point of superiority of Judaism over Christianity is the fact that Judaism is concerned with life upon this side of the grave, whereas, Christianity has been predominantly concerned with life upon the other side of the grave. Judaism emphasizes present need and responsibility; Christianity emphasizes future home and expectation. Judaism has a noble hope in immortality, but it has never allowed this hope to obscure and destroy the challenge of present life as Christianity has.

"Thirdly, Judaism is superior to Christianity in its emphasis upon society as contrasted with Christianity's persistent and perpetual emphasis upon the individual. It is the tribal consciousness of the Jew which has saved him from the error of isolating the individual's soul from the great body of humanity, and undertaking its single and exclusive salvation. It is with the Jew as a family or group, and with all men as members of God's universal family, that Judaism has been concerned. Christianity, however, has in all ages, down to our own, forgotten the cause of humanity for the petty and picaresque cause of saving the individual man.

"It may be answered that all the merits here emphasized are characteristic of Christianity as well as Judaism. This is true to a certain extent. To this same extent, however, Christianity is only another embodiment of the essential Jewish faith," Dr. Holmes said.

Arabs, is an important factor toward international peace, Mr. Vandervelde declared in his first lecture at the Hebrew University. For the sake of true international peace, he declared, it will be necessary to revise the Versailles Treaty.

Tel Aviv, April 17—A mass meeting to welcome Emil Vandervelde on his arrival was held here yesterday.

In his address Mr. Vandervelde greeted the Jewish labor federation of Palestine on behalf of the Amsterdam International and expressed the wish that they become a bridge between the western and eastern workers, but not in the manner of the Bolsheviks who exploit the awakening nations. The Belgian socialist leader praised the Jewish workers for their policy of friendship toward the Arab workers who are thus helped in their process of emancipation.

The Jewish workers in Palestine were the first in the entire world to organize agricultural colonization on a socialist basis, he declared. There is no contradiction between Zionism and European democracy, he added.

The fourth annual convention of the Sigma Alpha Rho, Jewish fraternity, was held at the Bellevue Stratford Hotel, in Philadelphia, the city where the fraternity was formed. Benjamin Horwitz was elected to head the fraternity for the coming year.

American Medical Association, and is under the direction of Dr. H. J. Corper.

Unique preventative work is being accomplished in the Hofheimer Preventorium which houses 38 children with either a predisposition to tuberculosis or tuberculous infections of the bones. While in the Preventorium, children attend a school operated on the hospital grounds, and conducted by the hospital. Work is recognized by the Denver Board of Education, and pupils finishing in the eighth grade are accredited to enter the Denver school ninth grades. Instruction in Hebrew and choral work is also included.

Adults are given the opportunity to learn stenography, typing, accounting, and other phases of work so that they can support themselves following their discharge from the hospital.

The original hospital building opened in 1899 was later dedicated to Dr. William S. Friedman and called the Friedman building.

Another building, erected in 1902, called the Guggenheim building was the gift of the Guggenheim family.

The women's pavilion, which was built in 1905, was dedicated recently to Mrs. Seraphine Pisko, executive secretary of the hospital for the last 16 years, who has been associated with its work ever since its inception.

The Schoenberg Memorial building, completed in 1913, was dedicated to the memory of Joseph E. Schoenberg by his children.

The Grabfelder building, built a year later, was the gift of Samuel Grabfelder.

The Hoffheimer Children's Preventorium was the gift of Nathan and Helena Hoffheimer in 1921.

The Louis Beaumont Home for Nurses was built in 1922, as a memorial to Dudley C. Schoenberg. The Adolph Lewison chapel was erected in 1906 by Lewison.

The B'nai Brith Infirmary, the newest building, which was dedicated in September, 1926, was the gift of Districts 2 and 6 of the B'nai Brith.

Friedman of Denver, vice president; Morton May, of St. Louis, vice president; Harmon August, of New York, vice president; Berthold Flesher, of Denver, vice president; Charles H. **AMERICAN COOPERATION IN
JEWISH PRESS PAVILION
AT COLOGNE IS SOUGHT**

Efforts to organize an American section in the Jewish pavilion of the International Press Exhibition, which will be held in Cologne, Germany, from May 12 to October, 1928 are now being made.

Meer Grossman, a member of the Executive Board of the Jewish Press Exhibition, is now in the United States to enlist the interest of American Jewish editors and publishers in the exhibition.

The Jewish pavilion will include exhibits of the Jewish press in English, Hebrew, Yiddish and the many other languages in which papers are published for the Jewish reading public.

A building to house the Jewish pavilion is now being erected on one of the main roads of the exhibition grounds. The material so far collected, it was stated, provides an impressive picture of the wide-flung religious, cultural and political influence of the Jewish press. The Jewish pavilion will also demonstrate the progress of the Jewish press in the last few decades in all parts of the world. Dr. M. Bodenheimer is the chairman of the Executive Board at Cologne and Prof. M. Sobernheim of the German foreign office is chairman of the Berlin committee sponsoring the Jewish pavilion in the International Press Exhibition.
