HENRY FORD PRAISES JEWS IN LONDON INTERVIEW

Many Don't Believe It, But He Has Great Admiration for Them, He Says, Lauding Devotion to Duty and High Principles

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, April 19—Henry Ford testified to his change of mind with regard to the Jewish people in an interview he granted today to a representative of the "Jewish Youth Magazine," a London weekly newspaper.

"Although some people don't believe it, the fact of the matter is that I have the greatest admiration for the Jewish people," Henry Ford declared. "The Jewish people have great merchants and captains of industry who have kept the world's business going. People are often lazy and when Jews' initiative easily causes them to reach the ladder's top, by devotion to duty and high principles, their neighbors are jealous and prejudice grows."

"The Zionist movement will play a

great part," Mr. Ford stated in reply to a question about the Palestine work. "I do not believe that the whole Jewish people desires to return to Palestine, but it will be the home of the Jews who are persecuted in backward countries and an inspiration to Jews everywhere. The Jews should, in my opinion, keep firmly to their faith and render their full service to the business life of the world," he said.

ALUMNI IN GERMANY DEMAND NUMERUS CLAUSUS FOR JEWS

Berlin, April 19—A resolution demanding the introduction of a numerus clausus limiting the number of Jewish students in German colleges and universities was adopted at the third annual convention of the alumni of various universities now in session in Elberfeld.

The body represents those who are affiliated with the anti-Semitic Voelkische party.

The convention also voted to institute a survey with a view to determining the number of Jews in the free professions.

CATHOLIC ANTI-SEMITES IN AUSTRIA EMBARRASSED BY POPE'S DECREE

Catholic Press Did Not Publish Denunciation of Race Hatred

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, April 19—The Papal decree denouncing racial hatred and anti-Semitism caused great embarrassment to the Catholic anti-Semites in Austria. The Hakenkreuzler organs comment on the Pope's decree in an indignant tone. Editorials ask whether the Catholic anti-Semites will obey the order of the Holy See. What will the Catholic parties do with their anti-Semitic program, when the Pope prohibits every anti-Semitic activity, even such as is directed "to defend the fatherland against the demoralization of Judas?"

The Hakenkreuzler organs point to the fact that the Catholic press has ignored the decree and has not even published its text.

CHILDREN TO LOSE LEGACY IF THEY LEAVE PALESTINE

Jerusalem, April 19—Professor Jacob Doljansky, noted surgeon who died here yesterday, bequeathed his body to the medical faculty of the Hebrew University.

According to his will, any of his sons or daughters who leave Palestine will be deprived of their legacy.

DR. ROSEN, AGROJOINT HEAD, ARRIVES TODAY FROM RUSSIA Brings New Projects for Extending Colonization Work

Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, head of the Agrojoint, the agency of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee in Russia, is arriving today on the steamer "Berengaria." He is accompanied by Dr. Ezekiel Grower, legal adviser of the Agrojoint in Moscow.

It was learned that Dr. Rosen's visit to the United States is connected with the further extension of the Jewish colonization work in Crimea and various parts of the Ukraine. He is said to be bringing with him projects of colonization work in new areas which the Russian government is offering for Jewish settlement in the vicinity of the present J. D. C. colonies. A series of conferences with the leaders of the Joint Distribution Committee will be held.

ORGANIZE FRENCH BRANCH OF ANTI-POGROM LEAGUE

Paris, April 19—A French branch of the International Anti-Pogrom League which was established here in March with the support of Professor Albert Einstein, H. G. Wells, Professor Sigmund Freud, M. Henri Torres, and others, was constituted here last night.

A presidium including many professors and clergymen, Catholic and Protestant, was chosen.

WALL STREET BANKERS TO GRANT \$3,000,000 ZIONIST LOAN, LOUIS LIPSKY ANNOUNCES

Dr. Weizmann is Conducting Negotiations; League of Nations Loan Also Makes Progress, Philadelphia U. P. A. Leaders are Told

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Philadelphia, Pa., April 19 — Louis Lipsky, president of the Zionist Organization of America, last night officially confirmed reports that negotiations with Wall Street bankers are going forward for a loan to the World Zionist Organization.

"I am pleased to announce," Mr. Lipsky said, "that our negotiations with several of the leading banking concerns in Wall street for a loan to the World Zionist Organization, in an amount running between \$2,500,000 and \$3,250,000 is making satisfactory progress. Dr. Chaim Weizmann is arranging for the details connected with this work. Samuel Untermyer of New York is representing the Zionist organization in this matter in a legal capacity.

"I may also add that a loan to the Jewish Agency by the League of Nations has reached the state of public

discussion in England and France," Mr. Lipsky continued. "The idea is to provide the Jewish Agency with means to carry on a long range program of colonization. These loans will in no way, however, lessen the financial responsibility towards Palestine which rests upon Jewry the world over.

"In order to get a maximum of benefit out of these loans, we, the Jews of America, will have to make good the quota assigned to us. Thus far, I have every reason to be satisfied with the progress we are making in this direction" he declared.

Mr. Lipsky was the principal speaker at a rally of captains and lieutenants in the United Palestine Appeal campaign which is to be launched in this city on May 6. Rabbi Max D. Klein is chairman of the committee. The quota is \$300,000.

CONGRESS COMMITTEE ASKS NEW TREATIES TO PROTECT NATURALIZED CITIZENS

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., April 19.—The House Committee on Foreign Affairs reported favorably the Kelly Resolution requesting the President to negotiate with the nations with which there is no such agreement treaties for the protection of American citizens of foreign birth, or parentage, from liability to military service in such countries.

The resolution, as reported stated: "House J. R. 268 requesting the President to negotiate with the nations with which there is no such agreement treaties for the protection of American citizens of foreign birth, or parentage, from liability to military service in such nations.

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the President be, and he is hereby, respectfully requested to endeavor as soon as possible to negotiate treaties with the remaining nations with which we have no such agreement, providing that persons born in the United States of foreign parentage, and naturalized American citizens shall not be held liable for military service or any other act of allegiance during a stay in the territory subject to the jurisdiction of any such nation, while citizens of the United States of America under the laws thereof."

LARGE REQUESTS FOR JEWISH AND GENERAL CHARITIES IN SIR MORTIMER DAVIS' WILL

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Montreal, April 19.—Four specific bequests of one hundred thousand dollars each to the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, the Young Men's Hebrew Association, the Montreal General Hospital and the Notre Dame Hospital, are the late Sir Mortimer B. Davis. Lady Davis and Mortimer Davis, Jr., are to share on an equal basis in the net annual revenues from the estate.

The \$100,000 donation to the Young Men's Hebrew Association is an extra endowment outside of the \$350,000, promised by Sir Mortimer to the "Y" for the erection of a new building. According to M. H. Weinstein, director of the "Y," the new building will be erected as planned by Sir Mortimer and will be paid for by the Sir Mortimer B. Davis, Incorporated. Ground will be broken for the new building in May and it is expected that the building will be completed by January first of next year.

The executors of the estate are Lady Davis, the Rt. Hon. Lord Shaugnessy, K.C., and A. M. Reaper, secretary-treasurer of the Sir Mortimer Davis Incorporated. The executors are given wide powers, notably in winding up the estate, which is to be concluded in fifty years. If in that time Mortimer Davis, Jr. dies, and Lady Davis dies, without issue of her marriage to Sir Mortimer, specific provision is made for the disposal of the residue under a plan whereby seventy-five per cent will be used to build a general hospital in Montreal, the majority of whose management shall be of Jewish faith. The hospital, however, will be open to all sects and creeds. Of the remaining twenty-five per cent, half is to go to the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies, and half will go to non-secular Jewish charitable institutions in the Province of Quebec, as selected by his executors.

The will of Sir Mortimer was drawn up in London, England.

PALESTINE PILGRIMAGE SOCIETY ESTABLISHED BY AGUDATH ISRAEL

Berlin, Apr. 19.—A Palestine pilgrimage society, "Ole Regel," has been founded by the Palestine Central Office of the Agudath Israel.

The Society will endeavor to enable people who cannot afford a visit to Palestine to make at least one pilgrimage to the country. Ten per cent of the members will be chosen by lot each year to join in the pilgrimage. Members of the Society will be required to contribute a sum of two shillings weekly for a period of ten years. The Society is administered by the Palestine Central Office of the Agudath Israel, which is situated in Frankfurt.

NON-ZIONISTS IN CHICAGO JOIN RECEPTION COMMITTEE FOR DR. CHAIM WEIZMANN

Chicago, Ill., April 19.—That non-Zionists are participating in the Chicago United Palestine Appeal is evidenced by the appearance on the Dr. Chaim Weizmann Reception Committee of James H. Becker, M. E. Greenbaum and James Davis. These three men, active in Jewish philanthropic circles in Chicago, have never before been identified with Zionist activities. Other members of the reception committee are Judge Joseph B. David, Herman Ellenbogen, Judge Harry M. Fisher, A. Z. Halperin, chairman of the U. P. A. drive; B. Horwich, Judge Hugo Pam, Samuel Philipson, H. J. Rosenblatt, Judge Joseph Sabbath, Max Shulman and H. Steinberg.

Dr. Weizmann is expected here on April 25. On April 29, he will be tendered a farewell reception.

Detroit, Mich., April 19.—Dr. Chaim Weizmann will open the Detroit United Palestine Appeal for \$110,000 at the banquet at Hotel Statler, Sunday evening.

The Detroit campaign is headed by Joseph H. Ehrlich. Fred M. Butzel is the honorary chairman.

ABRAHAM HERMAN, HIAS PRESIDENT, REELECTED

Abraham Herman, president of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America, was re-elected to that post for a third term at a meeting of the Board of Directors held last night.

The officers elected were Vice-Presidents Leon Kamaiky, Albert Rosenblatt, Max Myerson and Morris Weinberg of New York, Adolph Copeland, President of the Chicago Branch, Howard S. Levy, President of the Philadelphia Branch, Harris Poorvu, President of the Boston Branch, Leo S. Schwabacher, President of the Seattle Branch, Israel Silberstein, President of the Baltimore Branch and Harry K. Wolff, President of the San Francisco Branch; Treasurer, Harry Fischel, and Honorary Secretary Aaron Benjamin.

Among the new members of the Board of Directors are Louis Fabricant and Nathan Zvirin.

\$100,000 GIFT FOR JEWISH THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

A contribution of \$100,000 toward the erection of the proposed buildings of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America was made by William Prager, one of the directors of the Seminary.

Mr. Prager made the contribution on the occasion of his seventieth birthday. In recognition of his generosity the Board of Directors of the Seminary proposes to name one of the chairs of the faculty for him.

HONOR JASTROW ON GOLDEN JUBILEE OF HIS DOCTORATE

Berlin, April 4—A deputation from Berlin University, the Faculty of Philosophy and from his pupils visited Professor Ignaz Jastrow at his home to congratulate him on the Golden Jubilee of his doctorate. The Pro-Rector, Professor Pompecki spoke in praise of Professor Jastrow's achievements as an economist and historian. The Dean of the Faculty of Philosophy presented Professor Jastrow with a duplicate of the doctorate diploma, which was issued to him fifty years ago.

Professor Jastrow is 72 years old. He was born at Nakel on September 13, 1855. His works include "The Penal Position of Slaves among the Germans and Anglo-Saxons," and "The Number of the Population in the German Towns at the End of the Middle Ages and the Beginning of the New Epoch." He was appointed lecturer at Berlin University in 1885, but owing to the fact that he is a Jew, he was for many years unable to obtain his professorship in spite of his great reputation.

James F. Malone, president of Pittsburgh city council, Sol B. Friedman, rabbi of the congregation, Adolph Greenberger, president, Mr. B. A. Mendoza, sisterhood president, and Mrs. M. Schwartz and Bernath Weiss, chairmen of the building and finance committees, gave the principal addresses at ground breaking ceremonies of the new Pittsburgh Poale Zedeck synagogue, Sunday afternoon. The new synagogue will cost approximately \$170,000 when completed.

The edifice will have an auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,000, school rooms, office and facilities of a modern Orthodox synagogue. Work will be started immediately to insure occupancy of the new building for the coming holidays.

Congregation Poale Zedeck is one of the oldest congregations in the city, having been organized in 1881 with 12 charter members, of whom Max Friedman is the only survivor. Those in charge of the building program are Adolph Edlis, Henry Lawrence, John M. Schwartz, Isadore Ungler, Jacob Weinberger, Max Friedman, Samuel Heinstman, Bernath Weiss, the Greenberger, Louis Lawrence, Leo Fisher, Joseph Klein, and Jacob Gold.

Benji Sol B. Friedman has been the spiritual leader of the congregation since 1920.

Plans for the fifth annual convention of the Aleph Zadek Aleph, junior organization of the B'nai B'rith, which will be held in New York City, July 13, 14, 15, and bring between 300 and 400 delegates from all over the United States, are going forward rapidly.

Samuel M. Goldberg, chairman of the Denver advisory committee, is directing the preparations. Charles Rosenbaum and Simon Weist will serve on the committee.

Harry Miller is president of the Denver A. L. A.

Dear Leonard of St. Louis, Mo. has sent the hundred additional volumes to the National Library of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. About two years ago, Mr. Leonard presented his economic and sociologic library to the Hebrew University, constituting the nucleus of the Oscar and Leah Leonard Foundation.

HEBREW UNION COLLEGE ENDOWMENT FUND RAISES \$1,600,000, OCHS ANNOUNCES

S. R. Guggenheim Gives \$50,000; Three Non-Jews Subscribe

Contributions from non-Jews as well as Jews have helped to raise nearly \$1,600,000 toward the Five Million Dollar Endowment Fund for Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati, it was announced yesterday by Adolph S. Ochs, publisher of the New York Times, and chairman of the campaign, in a report to Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president of the college.

In making public the total of \$1,600,000 Mr. Ochs announced that S. R. Guggenheim, of New York, had sent him a check for \$50,000 for the Endowment Fund. This was the third contribution of \$50,000 to be made by a member of the Guggenheim family. Daniel Guggenheim and Murry Guggenheim had previously each given \$50,000, and Murry Guggenheim had pledged himself to give an additional contribution of \$50,000 at any time that such an amount would bring the total fund up to \$2,000,000.

Among the contributions that have been received from non-Jews are \$5,000 from Charles B. Taft, of Cincinnati, brother of William Howard Taft, former President of the United States; \$1,000 each from Crawford Johnson and Robert R. Meyer, of Birmingham, Ala.

Mr. Ochs announced a gift of \$25,000 from Ike Adler of Birmingham, Ala.; \$5,000 from Moses Tanenbaum of New York; \$10,000 from Col. Fred Levy of Louisville, Ky.; and \$1,000 from Louis Witley of New York. In addition, the Fund will also receive an amount equal to \$150,000 from the estate of Louis Heineman of Jamestown, N. Y.

Mrs. Rosa Brown, of San Francisco and New York, provided bequests for seventeen institutions under terms of her will disposing of an estate of approximately \$650,000. Mrs. Brown, who died in San Francisco April 6, was the widow of Ralph Brown and a sister-in-law of the late Sir Mortimer Davis.

The institutional bequests include the American Red Cross Association, hospitals, synagogues and orphan asylums here and in California.

A campaign for \$100,000 to erect a new Y. M. H. A. building in Hackensack, will be launched in Bergen County on April 30. The new structure to be erected on the site of the present "Y" will include an auditorium, a library, class rooms, club rooms, gymnasium and swimming pool.

The campaign is under the direction of the Jewish Welfare Board.

Clem Plager is the president of the Bergen County Y. M. H. A. and William N. Weinberg is executive secretary.

NEW ICA COLONIES SHOW PROGRESS IN ARGENTINA

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, April 18—The report of an agronomist of the Jewish Colonization Association in the Argentine who has been visiting the colonies established there by the Ica in recent years was made public here. In the district of Santa Isabel, he visited 34 of the newly settled families, 13 of whom were established during 1927.

Sixteen of these families in training are now to be permanent colonists. They have paid off their debts for renting, completed their inventory and in general have shown themselves capable land workers. Many of these colonists have increased their stock considerably. There is one colonist who, established in October, 1927, has already acquired 6 horses, 5 cows, and 1 separator. Another colonist, established in February, 1926, has acquired at his own expense 5 cows, 3 horses, 1 wagon and 1 pough.

The new colonists have successfully taken up the plantation of mandarin orange trees. One colonist established in July, 1926, has planted a hundred orange trees and has already obtained a good income from them. He has also planted a garden which brings him in a sum of 100 to 125 pesos a month by the sale of the vegetables.

A dinner in behalf of the scholarship fund of the Jewish Education Association will be held on April 22d at the Brooklyn Jewish Center. The scholarship fund of the Jewish Education Association is devoted to the payment of the tuition of Jewish religious schools for children of the poor.

Justice Edward Lazansky is Honorary Chairman and Jacob H. Cohen is Chairman of the arrangements committee.

Figures bearing on the religious education of Jewish children in Brooklyn made public by Mr. Samuel Rotenberg, reveal that only one in every five of the Jewish children of school age in the Borough is receiving such an education. There are 163,213 Jewish children of school age in the Borough of Brooklyn and a close estimate of those in attendance at Talmud Torahs and other Jewish religious schools places the number at 32,500 or 20 per cent of the total.

A comparison of the situation in Brooklyn with that in Greater New York as a whole, shows that borough considerably behind, the percentage for the whole city being 23.

An association of Religious School Teachers of the States of Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin will be organized according to a decision taken at a meeting in Chicago of representatives of the Chicago Rabbinical Association, the Board of Jewish Education of Chicago, the Chicago Conference of Conservative Rabbis, and the Department of Synagogue and School Extension of Cincinnati.

It was further decided to hold a convention in Chicago on April 23-25, at the Stevens Hotel.

Problems of the curriculum of the Jewish school and of methods of teaching will be discussed.

Alexander M. Dushkin, Solomon B. Freehof, Felix Jacob S. Gium, Max Kadushin, Gerson B. Levi, Felix A. Levy, Louis L. Mann, George Zepin were named on the committee on arrangements.

**ANTI-SEMITIC AGITATION
IN GERMANY MENACES GER-
MAN MINORITIES ABROAD**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Apr. 19.—The Nationalist anti-Semitic propaganda in Germany is a danger to the German minorities in Poland and other countries, it was urged at a meeting held here of the Republican Federation of Berlin. The speakers included Deputy Breitscheid, the Social Democratic leader. The German minority in Poland, it was pointed out, joined in the last parliamentary elections in Poland with the Jewish National Minority and found the combination advantageous. If the German Nationalist Party, which claims to be the special guardian of the Germans living abroad, continues its anti-Semitic agitation, it will make impossible any further co-operation between Jews and Germans in Poland, and will thus be damaging the interests of the German minorities.

**LIBERAL JEWS WILL HOLD
WORLD CONFERENCE IN AUG.**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, April 18.—The World Union of Progressive Judaism will hold its biennial conference in Berlin from August 18 to 21.

Representatives will attend from all countries where there are liberal synagogues, and some are expected from countries where there are indications of need for the establishment of such synagogues. The program will include addresses and discussions dealing with practical aspects of Liberal or Progressive Judaism.
