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SCHECHITA NOT AN ISSUE. EUROPEAN CAPITALS TELL WARSAW CITY COMMISSION Cities Declare Schechita Practice Causes No Complications

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, April 20. — The schechita, the method of slaughtering animals prescribed by the Jewish religion, is no problem to the population or the civic administration in the majority of European capitals, the Warsaw city government commission was told in reply to its inquiry broadcast as a result of anti-schechita agitation here.

The city government commission received to date fifteen replies to the twenty inquiries directed to cities and towns in Poland and twenty-seven replies from leading cities in other countries. Antwerp, Prague, Reval and other leading cities declared in their communications that the practice of schechita has brought about no complications.

YIDDISH BUT A CORRUPTED GERMAN DIALECT, WARSAW KEHILLAH EXECUTIVE SAYS Vote to Retain Polish as Language of Instruction

Warsaw, April 20. — A motion to change the language of instruction in the schools maintained by the Warsaw Kehillah was defeated by a majority vote at yesterday's session of the Kehillah executive.

The motion aimed at substituting Yiddish or Hebrew for Polish.

Eight Agudists and Mizrachists joined to oppose the measure which had the support of the three other members of the executive, a Bundist, Volkist and a Zionist.

In opposing the resolution, the Agudists and Mizrachists argued that Yiddish is a corrupted German dialect and cannot therefore be accepted as the language in the Kehillah schools, while the use of Hebrew in the Diaspora is impractical.

BLACK LIST UP BEFORE D.A.R. CONVENTION COMMITTEE; DIS- CUSSION ON FLOOR BARRED D.A.R. Pamphlet Gave Excerpts from 'Protocols of Elders' (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, April 20.—Mrs. Helen Tufts Baile and Mrs. St. Omer Roy of Kansas, delegate to the convention of the Daughters of the American Revolution in session here and local secretary of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, will appear before the Resolutions Committee of the D. A. R. convention today in support of a resolution introduced by Mrs. Roy, providing for a referendum to all chapters on questions of "national importance" and the exercise of their own discretion by chapters in selecting speakers. The latter resolutions involves the D. A. R. Black List which includes the names of a number of Jews and is now the main bone of contention between the Committee of Protest and the present administration. Mrs. Roy sought to introduce the resolutions from the floor but Mrs. Alfred J. Brosseau, president general, ruled (Continued on page 3)

BERNARD BARON GAVE OVER \$6,000,000 TOWARD CHARITY; SAYS I WILL GIVE MORE

London, April 20.—Bernard Baron, former Jewish immigrant boy in the United States, and now leading tobacco manufacturer and philanthropist in England, has distributed up to the present an amount of over \$1,250,000 (\$2,250,000) for charitable purposes.

"I live for the next two or three years I will do more than this," Mr. Baron stated at a luncheon he addressed at Brighton inaugurating a drive for local hospitals.

DR. KOHS TO BE DIRECTOR OF BROOKLYN CHARITIES

San Francisco, April 20.—Dr. Samuel C. Kohs resigned as social service superintendent of the Eureka Benevolent Society.

Dr. Kohs tendered his resignation to become Executive Director of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities. He will leave here the end of May.

SAMUEL WESZEL, CHIEF RABBI OF BOSNIA, DIES

Sarajevo, April 20.—Dr. Samuel Weszel, chief rabbi of the Ashkenazic community in Bosnia, died here today at the age of 70.

Dr. Weszel, who was a native of Rotterdam, Holland, occupied the position of Ashkenazic Chief Rabbi of Bosnia, for thirty years.

EASIER TO COLLECT \$1,000,000 IN U. S. THAN \$5,000 IN ENGLAND

London, April 20.—That it is easier to collect \$1,000,000 among the Jews of America than £1,000 among Jews in England was asserted by Dr. D. Jochelman, chairman of the Federation of Ukrainian Jews in London.

At a meeting arranged by the Executive Committee of the United Jewish Relief Federation, to welcome Dr. Jochelman on his return from the United States, he paid tribute to the work of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee which he termed the most powerful Jewish relief organization. Notwithstanding the present business conditions in America, the Jews still subscribe generously for relief.

A plan of cooperation with the American Federation of Ukrainian Jews was decided upon by the executive.

67 JEWISH CANDIDATES IN FRENCH ELECTIONS

Paris, April 20.—Sixty-seven French Jews are candidates in the national elections which will be held on Sunday.

Internationally Known French Jewish leaders are among those seeking public office. The list includes Maurice Bokanowski, Leon Blum, Maurice Rothschild, Henri Torres, M. Corcos and M. Mirtil, chairman of the Jewish National Fund of France.

JEWS SUFFER IN BULGARIAN QUAKE, MANY BELIEVED HURT

Sofia, April 20.—The homes of hundreds of Jewish families were destroyed in the cities of Tchirpan and Philippopolis. One Jewish child was killed in Borissovgrad in the earthquake which rocked Bulgaria on Wednesday, April 18.

No accurate estimate of the damage and loss of life can be obtained, due to the fact that communication has been interrupted.

MANY JEWS AMONG VICTIMS HIT BY BORISOFF FLOOD

Moscow, April 20.—Hundreds of Jewish families who suffered in the flood in Borisoff last week are appealing for aid. The number of flood victims is increasing as the water is causing further damage to the houses.

The city is organizing relief, but it is insufficient for the number of victims. Many Jewish houses have been totally destroyed.

MARK 10th ANNIVERSARY OF PALESTINE PIONEER BODY

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RELIEF WORK LEADERS ARE
CALLED TO URGENT MEETING
IN NEW YORK, ON APRIL 29

A joint meeting of the leaders of the United Jewish Campaign and of the Joint Distribution Committee will take place on Sunday, April 29, at the Biltmore Hotel, New York.

An urgent call for the meeting was issued by David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, to consider ways and means for securing the normal continuation of the relief and reconstruction work of the J. D. C. during the summer months. With an almost empty treasury and an indebtedness exceeding \$700,000 the Committee faces the danger of interrupting its work if collection of the pledges, which usually slows up during the summer, does not provide the necessary funds in time.

It is expected that the United Jewish Campaign leaders in the Eastern states will be present at the meeting. Felix M. Warburg, Louis Marshall, Herbert Lehman, James N. Rosenberg and Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, who arrived on Friday from Russia, will speak on the present situation.

Launching the \$600,000 building fund campaign for the Cleveland Jewish Orphan Home in District No. 6, Independent Order B'nai B'rith, at the Chicago Alumni Association dinner held at the Covenant Club, Chicago, graduates of the home residing here announced \$38,600 contributed by their members toward their \$100,000 goal. Speakers included Judge Harry M. Fisher, Fred Lazarus, Jr. president of the home; George I. Wirtzel of Cleveland, and president of the alumni association; Harry Simon, of St. Louis. Gustave M. Pomeroy presided at the dinner.

JEWISH WORKERS IN POLAND
TO CELEBRATE SEPARATELY,
POLISH SOCIALISTS RULE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, April 20—The international solidarity of the proletariat, asserted and preached by the Socialist movement, does not hold good in the relation between the Polish and Jewish workers.

As in previous years the celebration of May 1 by the working class is a significant event in the Republic of Poland. The celebration culminates in huge street demonstrations, during which banners of the Socialist parties are carried and Socialist hymns sung.

These demonstrations, however, have to be divided into purely Polish and purely Jewish sections due to the unwillingness of the members of the Polish Socialist Party (P.P.S.) to march with the members of the Jewish Socialist parties, Bund, Poale Zion and others.

The division goes even further than this. Negotiations which have been conducted between the Jewish labor parties Bund and Poale Zion, to unite in the holding of a joint demonstration on May 1, have also failed.

JEWS OF LITHUANIAN ORIGIN
URGED TO VISIT COUNTRY

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, April 20—An invitation to American Jews of Lithuanian origin to visit the country and participate in the celebration of Lithuania's independence on May 15, was issued by General Nagewitsch, chairman of the celebration committee. The general cabled the Lithuanian Minister at Washington to extend an official invitation to Lithuanian Jews in America.

P. Zadeikis, Consul General of Lithuania in New York, in extending the invitation of General Nagewitsch, stated in a communication to the Jewish Daily Bulletin that a Jewish committee in contact with the Lithuanian committee, headed by Chief Rabbi Sapiro, has been formed to receive the guests.

CORRECTION:

In the Jewish Daily Bulletin of April 17 an error occurred in the report of the action of the Massachusetts legislature in overriding the Governor's veto of the Rosh Hashanah bill. It was stated that the provision will have application on rare occasions, no more frequent than once in six years. It is learned that from now to the end of the twentieth century, that is, a matter of 72 years Rosh Hashanah will fall on a Monday 34 times and Yom Kippur will fall on a Monday 24 times. Therefore, the provisions of the bill will have application 56 out of 72 years, 7 out of every 9 years.

CANTORS' REGISTRY AIMED
AT RAISING PRESTIGE OF
PROFESSION IS PLANNED

A cantors' registry with the function of recommending cantors to congregations will be created at the forthcoming convention of the United Synagogue of America which will take place in Chicago from April 29 to May 1.

The Jewish Ministers-Cantors Association, the Modern Cantors Association and the United Synagogue are to combine in an effort to eliminate the present conditions under which, it is stated, the position of the cantors has been degraded.

The registry is to insist that only those cantors who are religiously, ethically, culturally and musically qualified are to be engaged by congregations or permitted to officiate at religious services. This work is to be conducted on a nation-wide scale. Examining committees are to be set up to pass on the qualifications of applicants to the registry. The cantors registry is to function under the direction of a committee composed of representatives of the three bodies.

Boston, Mass., April 20—The Moham of Boston have been organized to wage war against Jewish and non-Jewish physicians who perform the rite of circumcision.

A circular has been issued by the leading rabbis here denouncing what is termed "shocking inroads" in Judaism. Rabbis Louis M. Epstein, Benjamin Birnbaum and Samuel J. Abrams have issued statements, appealing to the Boston Jewish Community to assist in eliminating the practice.

JACOB FRANKS, CHICAGO
MILLIONAIRE, DIES AT 72

Chicago, April 20—Jacob Franks, father of Bobbie Franks, for whose death Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb are serving life sentences in Joliet Penitentiary, died yesterday in his suite at the Drake Hotel. He was seventy two years old.

The funeral was held today. Interment was at Roschill Cemetery.

TO STUDY JEWISH CONDITION
IN SMALL UKRAINIAN TOWNS

Moscow, April 20—Because of the situation of the Jewish population of the Ukrainian small towns is growing worse, the presidium of the Ukrainian Zik, central executive committee, decided to send a commission to the various small towns.

The commission will seek to ascertain what can be done to improve the Jewish situation in the small towns.

DR. JOHN SLAWSON CHOSEN NEW DIRECTOR DETROIT JEW- ISH WELFARE FEDERATION (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Detroit, Apr. 20.—Dr. John Slawson has been elected managing director of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Detroit, his term of office to begin Sept. 1, it was announced on Thursday morning. Dr. Slawson succeeds Morris D. Waldman, who resigned to become executive secretary of the American Jewish Committee.

Dr. Slawson was investigator and psychologist of the New York State Board of Charities for four years, and for another four years was director of research and community organizations of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Cleveland.

Prior to his holding the position with the New York State Board of Charities, he was for one year instructor at the College of the City of New York and was research assistant of the Department of Education in New York City.

Dr. Slawson is the author of "The Delinquent Boy," a standard book on juvenile delinquency.

HOUSE COMMITTEE GETS NEW PROPOSALS ON IMMIGRATION (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Apr. 20.—A bill to admit as non-quota immigrants professors under contract with American educational institutions, irrespective of whether or not they have been serving abroad as professors, was referred by the Immigrant Committee to a sub-committee at its meeting yesterday. Under the present law, the non-quota status is applied only to those professors under contract who have served as professors abroad for two years prior to their application for entry to the United States. The sub-committee is composed of Congressmen Vincent, Rutherford and Bachmann.

A bill to issue certificates of arrival, so that naturalization may be secured by aliens who entered the United States lawfully but regarding whose entry there is no official record, was also discussed. The matter will be taken up further at the Committee's next meeting on Saturday morning.

A limited number of copies of the Prayer-book for the Jewish blind, printed in Braille by the National Council of Jewish Women, is available for free distribution, according to an announcement made by Mrs. Max Bloomstein, 5608 Blackstone ave., Chicago, National Chairman of the Council's Committee on Work for the Blind and Sight Conservation, to whom all applications for these copies are to be addressed. A free distribution of a number of copies is made possible through the gifts of Council sections in whose communities there are no Jewish blind.

Mrs. Bloomstein made the statement that Council sections are using Braille machines to make other literature available for the blind.

Rabbi Solomon Goldman of Cleveland, accompanied by his family, sailed on the steamer Providence for Palestine. During his trip abroad Rabbi Goldman will visit Russia. He will be gone until the fall.

Oakland Prepares for Annual National Welfare Fund Drive (By our Oakland correspondent)

Oakland, Calif., April 19.—The annual campaign to raise a budget, this year totalling \$35,775, for the Jewish National Welfare fund of Oakland will begin May 4 and continue until May 14, it is announced by A. S. Lavenson, chairman.

The advance gifts committee of which Joseph Meltzer is chairman, is now conducting an effort to obtain \$20,000 toward the total.

The budget provides for national Jewish organizations in the United States, as well the United Jewish Campaign and the United Palestine Appeal.

Charles Kushins is campaign director. The executive committee of the fund consists of Joseph Frankel, Michael Grodin, Charles Kushins, A. S. Lavenson, B. L. Mosbacher, Harry J. Sapper, Jacob Simon, Bernard Silverstein, and Lionel Wachs.

The contest for a slogan for use in the campaign resulted in the selection of the phrase: "Judaism Will Live—If You Give."

Although the Jews of Alameda County contribute liberally to the general Community Chest, and local Jewish charities, they maintain the Welfare Fund. In a separate appeal, without solicitation among the non-Jewish population funds are collected for the aiding of 55 organizations carrying on relief and other work.

This fund was established in 1926. In 1927 about \$23,000 was raised.

Lionel Wachs has been president of the organization since its inception. Besides the United Jewish Campaign and the United Palestine Appeal, the Fund includes the Jewish Consumptive Relief Association of Duarte, Calif., the Jewish Consumptive Relief Society of Denver, the National Jewish Hospital at Denver and the Ex-Patients' Homes at Los Angeles and Denver; the Denver National Home for Children.

Other charitable organizations in Oakland include the Daughters of Israel Relief Committee, which began to function about fifty years ago, caring for needy Jews here and in the sections adjacent.

As the years passed its activities grew and other organizations came into being to share its work and responsibilities. They formed a group of efficient bodies that have made this community one of the best equipped in this respect in the country.

In 1915 these groups, though retain-

that the resolutions must be referred to the committee of which Mrs. Henry B. Joy is chairman. Mrs. Joy, chairman of the committee, in a subsequent press conference denied reports that she had said the resolution would be smothered by the committee.

The Washington Council on International Relations, a group of prominent educators, religious leaders and social workers, launched an attack upon Mrs. Brosseau, president general of the D. A. R., scoring the Black List as "baseless and unintelligent" and accusing Mrs. Brosseau of "aligning the D. A. R. with Fred R. Marvin and other 'commercial heresy hunters' against the Federal Council of Christian Churches, the National Welfare Council, Y. M. C. A., Y. W. C. A., President Faunce of Brown University, President Neilson of Smith College, President Mary E. Woolley of Mount Holyoke College and other educators; Rev. Harry Emerson Fosdick, Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and other ministers, and all other men and women of light and learning, of peace and good will who believe that international differences can be settled by conference and other peaceful means."

Mrs. Baile declared in a statement to the Jewish Daily Bulletin correspondent here that, within her knowledge the D. A. R. has never issued literature reprinting or quoting from the Protocols of the Elders of Zion. What she and the Committee of Protest did call attention to, however, was the fact that in a D. A. R. pamphlet called "The Common Enemy," references and excerpts were contained from a book by Mrs. Nesta Webster, and English woman, entitled "World Revolution." This book, Mrs. Baile stated, contains material from the Protocols of the Elders of Zion. Mrs. Webster published this material in the anti-Semitic London "Morning Post."

The fact that the D. A. R. used material from such a book in one of its official publications is sufficient indication of the mistaken policy of the present administration, she said.

Mrs. Baile also declared that Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Bernard G. Richards had protested to E. P. Dutton against a book by the same author.

Laz Baomer will be observed this year on May 8. The Jewish Welfare Board has issued bulletins on the observance of this festival in the Jewish Centers and "Y's" affiliated with it. A bulletin has also been issued for the observance of Mother's Day on May 13.

Shavuot, the Festival of Weeks, will occur on May 25 and 26. A set of twenty questions and answers on the observance of this holiday has been prepared by the Jewish Welfare Board. Literature for Memorial Day on May 30 and Flag Day on June 14 is also available.

13,000 JEWISH ORPHANS IN POLAND NEED J.D.C. AID, U.J.C. REPORTS INDICATE

The number of orphan children toward whose support the Joint Distribution Committee will have to contribute in Poland alone during the year 1922 will be from 13,000 to 14,000, according to reports recently received by David A. Brown, National Chairman of the United Jewish Campaign. Even though the Union of Jewish Orphan Committees, in which all the elements of Polish Jewry are represented, is taking immediate care of the children and provides about 50 per cent of the budget, the Joint Distribution Committee will have to furnish the other 50 per cent of the funds necessary for the maintenance, health preservation, and the general Jewish and trade education of these children.

The reports received by Mr. Brown show that on July 1, 1921, the Union of Orphan Committees operated in 317 localities, and, with 51,843 dues-paying members throughout Poland, had under its care 14,847 orphans. In the course of the following three months, 1,114 children left the institutions, having either become self-supporting or having been taken by relatives. During the same period, 187 new children had to be added to the lists so that by October 1, 1921, the total number of orphans being cared for was 13,920. On the basis of these figures, the average for this year can be estimated at not less than 13,000.

Of this total, only 4,566 were maintained in the 117 institutions, the rest, under the supervision of the committees, were placed with relatives or with families in private homes.

For the present, a larger number of orphans will be cared for in private homes than will be provided for in institutions.

Of the total 13,920 children, 9,920 are attending schools. Three thousand three hundred and ninety children attend the Government school. Over a thousand children are receiving their training in Yiddish schools and the remainder are divided among Hebrew schools of the Tarbut type and the old type Chedorim and Talmud Torahs. Of the children not attending school, 1,100 are under school age; 3,268 are youngsters who are receiving their general education along with their trade or manual instruction; and a number of children are unable to attend school because of sickness.

The number of children who are of an age to learn a trade, far exceeds the actual number of students in the trade schools, and over 1,600 children have no access to the schools. Many of them get their trade education with private masters, but there is still a considerable number for whom no facilities for learning a trade are available.

SEEK TO GET ONE MILLION DOLLAR ENDOWMENT FUND FOR NEW JEWISH COLLEGE Will Ask Ten Thousand to Contribute \$100

A \$1,000,000 Endowment Fund to secure a stable income for the maintenance of the Yeshiva College, the first under-graduate college to be conducted under Jewish auspices, will be raised during this summer prior to the opening of the college, Samuel Levy, chairman of the Executive Committee of the Yeshiva College Building Fund, announced.

The decision to undertake the raising of the new fund was reached at a joint meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary and the Executive Committee of the Yeshiva College Building Fund.

To raise the fund, a Yeshiva College National Guardians League will be formed. Ten thousand Jewish men and women in all parts of the country will be asked to subscribe at least \$100 which will entitle them to membership in the National Guardians League.

The fund was started with the contribution of \$50,000 by Mendel Gottesman, \$15,000 by the Harris Altshul Estate, Jersey City, \$10,000 by Julius and Etta G. Levy, \$10,000 by Susie A. Selz, \$250 by Jacob Minsky and \$250 by Joseph Barondess.

A number of prominent rabbis and workers for the cause of Jewish education, and Harris L. Selig, Executive Director of the Yeshiva College Building Fund, will tour the country to enlist the supporters of the Yeshiva College in the National League.

The immediate future of these children is dependent upon the extension of the trade school system throughout Poland. To this matter the Joint Distribution Committee's European office is directing its attention.

During these last three years, the report states, 2,811 children have become self-supporting and are now making a living as productive young members of their communities.

ing their individual identities, were merged into a united organization known as the Oakland Jewish Federation. A Jewish community center containing an auditorium, meeting rooms, offices, kitchen, gymnasium and baths, was built. Since then this building has served as the center of Jewish relief, educational, recreational and cultural activities.

The head of the Federation is S. J. Freudenthal, who directed the erection of an addition to the center, which houses the federation offices and the educational and recreational facilities. The dedication of this addition was held recently.

The congregations in Oakland include Temple Sinai, Reform, Beth Jacob Synagogue, East Bay Jewish Alliance, Beth Abraham, Beth Israel, B'nai Isaac, and Zema'eh Zedek synagogues, the Berkeley Hebrew Center, Alameda Hebrew Temple and San Leandro Synagogue.

B'nai Brith has a membership of about 700 in the county and meets in Temple Sinai. There is also the Aleph Zadik Aleph, junior B'nai Brith, which held its Pacific Coast conference in Oakland. There are about 5,000 Jews in Alameda County.

Dr. Rudolph I. Coffee, rabbi of Temple Sinai, is president of the Jewish Committee for Personal Service in State Institutions, where he has served for four years.

There are more than 600 Jewish students in the University of California at Berkeley. About 300 are active in the Hillel Foundation's affairs which are directed by Rabbi B. B. Goldstein.

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
