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## UNITED SYNAGOGUE \$500,000 CAMPAIGN IS LAUNCHED AS ANNUAL CONVENTION ENDS

### Resolution Urges Women's Equality In Congregation Work

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, May 2.—A campaign for \$500,000 to provide for a three year period to carry out the program of the United Synagogue was launched at the annual banquet held last night following the close of the United Synagogue convention. Dr. Cyrus Adler acted as toastmaster.

S. Herbert Golden of New York was reelected President of the organization.

The convention reaffirmed its stand in favor of a five day industrial week. A resolution was also adopted urging the congregations affiliated with the United Synagogue of America to give representation in the congregational boards to the women and the Young People organization.

\$6,700,000 SUBSCRIBED TO

\$10,000,000 RUSSIAN FUND

The sum of \$6,700,000 has already been subscribed towards the \$10,000,000 fund initiated by Julius Rosenwald, to be applied toward the extension of Jewish colonization work in Soviet Russia, under the new agreement.

In addition to the subscriptions of Mr. Rosenwald, Mr. Warburg and Mr. Marshall, subscriptions have been made by Paul Baerwald, Treasurer of the Joint Distribution Committee, \$200,000; Herbert Lehman, \$100,000 and \$100,000 has been subscribed anonymously.

## LITHUANIA POLICE RAID JEWISH ORGANIZATION

Kovno, May 2.—The Lithuanian police invaded and searched the offices of the Zionist Organization in Lithuania and of the Palestine Restoration Fund yesterday.

No documents were confiscated. The offices of the Kovno Yiddish newspaper "The Yiddische Stimme" were also raided.

By an order of the authorities the Ica Hitachluti, the Zionist Labor Party, was dissolved.

## QUARTER MILLION DOLLARS RAISED IN S. A. FOR PALESTINE

Johannesburg, S.A., May 2.—The Keren Hayesod campaign in South Africa has so far resulted in the collection of £50,000. Col. Frederick H. Kisch, member of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem, participated in the campaign. The campaign for the Zionist Organization funds is progressing satisfactorily.

## NON-JEWISH GROUP FIGHTS AGAINST ANTI-SEMITISM AS ISSUE IN GERMAN ELECTION

### 'Abwehr Blaetter' Points to Jewish Contribution to Country's Progress

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, May 2.—Anti-Semitism as an issue in the present election campaign in Germany was decried by the 'Abwehr Blaetter', the organ of the Union for Combatting Anti-Semitism, a non-Jewish body, which published a special election issue to expose the anti-Semitic campaign of falsehoods.

The newspaper warns the German electorate against the attempts of the German anti-Semites to exploit racial hatred in the campaign and to make the Jews in Germany the scape-goats of their own mistakes.

"It is unfair to blame the Jews because they are engaged in specific occupations due to the restrictions of Ghetto conditions which have been imposed upon them by the Gentiles and were only recently abolished. The attacks upon the Old Testament have been refuted by leading Christian theologians," the paper declares.

"The anti-Semites ignore the achievements of the Jews in German culture and business. They forget the 12,000 Jewish heroes who fell during the World War. Hatred, pogroms, desecration of synagogues and cemeteries are the weapons of anti-Semitism which cannot help Germany but will only cause unrest and disorder, harming the nation," the paper states.

## COMMUNIST YOUTHS IN TEL-AVIV GET JAIL TERM

Tel-Aviv, May 2.—Seventeen Jewish youths were sentenced to various terms of imprisonment on charges of participating in a Communist Youth Conference. Twenty youths were arrested while the Conference was in session. Two of the seventeen will be deported after serving their term. Three boys who were under 16 were released on the condition that their parents guarantee their behavior.

## DEMAND PALESTINE ADMIT SHOLOM SCHWARTZBAR

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, May 2.—A petition to the Palestine Government to admit Shalom Schwartzbard, the acquitted slayer of Semion Petura to the country will be submitted by a special committee formed here.

The committee is now engaged in collecting thousands of signatures to the petition.

## 350 JEWISH WORKERS INJURED. SEVERAL KILLED IN WARSAW STREET DEMONSTRATIONS

### Many Fatalities Mark May Day; In- vestigation Ordered

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 2.—Two Jewish workmen were killed and nearly 200 wounded as a result of street fighting during the May Day street demonstrations here.

The fighting started when the demonstration of the Polish Socialist Party and the group marching under the Communist banner, met at City Hall Square. Three were killed, two of whom were Jews, and 200, mostly Jewish workers, were wounded.

The demonstrations of the Jewish labor parties, Bund and Poale Zion, marched separately, mainly within the Jewish quarter. At City Hall Square the Bund demonstration and the demonstration of the P.P.S. (Polish Socialist Party) met and exchanged greetings. When the Bund demonstration was about to disband, a gun was fired which lead to a panic during which several persons were injured.

The demonstration of the Poale Zion was interfered with by the police who dispersed the marching groups. Several scores of the workers were injured. It was explained later that the action of the police was the result of a misunderstanding as the demonstration of the Poale Zion was held with the permission of the authorities.

Reports received from other parts of the country indicate that the day passed without serious disturbances.

Later reports show that during the May Day demonstrations yesterday 400 persons were injured, of which 350 were Jewish workers. Forty-one persons received serious injuries. Three were killed instantly and four died as a result or their injuries.

Sixty Jewish workers were injured during the demonstration of the Poale Zion party. Twenty were injured when the police raided the headquarters of the Jew labor party Bund.

An investigation was ordered by the government today to inquire into the causes of the fighting.

## FOUR POLISH SYNAGOGUES RAZED IN CONFLAGRATION

Warsaw, May 2.—Several lives were lost and four synagogues destroyed in a fire which swept over Ratno, district of Kowel, last night.

Eighty Jewish families remained roofless as a result of the fire.

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### RARE BIBLE MANUSCRIPT ON DISPLAY AT MCGILL

Montreal, May 2.—An interesting Hebrew exhibit is now on display at McGill University, where a complete manuscript of the five Books of Moses in the original Hebrew, is being shown in the special exhibition of Hebrew manuscripts arranged in the Reidpath Library of the University.

Written on a scroll of goatskin 49 lines to a column, the roll is 30 inches wide by 93 2-3 feet long. It was written in Bagdad about 15 A.D. The scroll was presented to McGill University through the Macabean Circle by a number of leading Montreal Jews. The exhibit also includes a roll of the Book of Esther written in the eighteenth century and a manuscript of the Samaritan Pentateuch of the nineteenth century.

### JERUSALEM SOON TO HAVE ELECTRIC LIGHT SYSTEM

Jerusalem, May 2.—Work on the electrification of Jerusalem may be started here within three weeks following the arrival of Engineer Mavromatis, a Greek, who held the original concession.

Mr. Mavromatis is accompanied by two British engineers. In a press interview Mr. Mavromatis stated that all controversies with the British government were settled and there are now no obstacles for carrying out the project. The plans will be concluded within three weeks when work may begin.

### Philadelphia Community United for Palestine Appeal

(By Our Philadelphia Correspondent)

Philadelphia, May 2.—Let united Philadelphia answer the United Palestine Appeal!

Behind this slogan, inscribed in large red and blue letters emanating from an open book, the size of a store-window on South Broad street—Philadelphia's leading thoroughfare—is a challenge to the Jewish community of this city. The identity of the author of this slogan has not been divulged. It is said to have been written by an outstanding personality, one who is persona grata in every camp in the local community, and is anxious to bring home an important message to the entire community.

The significance of this slogan was enhanced when Rabbi Max D. Klein of congregation Adath Jeshurun consented to act as general chairman of the campaign. The same underlying motive governed both the choice of the chairmanship and the slogan. The moment the two were agreed upon—the chairman and the slogan—it became evident the campaign this year will differ in many respects from its six predecessors.

The campaign will open on May 6. Two new features characterize this year's campaign.

In the first place the appeal will be made not only on behalf of Palestine but also on behalf of a united local community. To the outsider this may mean little. To the Jewish community of Philadelphia, this is not only of the deepest significance, but is fraught with a certain element of uncertainty, not to say danger.

Unity and communal solidarity have been a strong selling point in this community. For a number of years this word unity was used as a sort of Tetragrammaton. It was because the leaders appealed for a united community that the Federation—the second or the third largest of its kind in the country—was enabled to spend more than two million dollars a year in maintenance and new buildings. To the credit of Mr. Jacob Billikopf, executive director of the Federation, it should be said, he was the first to sound this new keynote when he came to this city more than seven years ago. It was the same keynote sounded two and one half years ago by the late Jules E. Mastbaum that brought four millions of dollars in pledges for an elaborate building program for the same Federation. It was responsible for the expansion of the Y. M. and Y. W. H. A. from a small, compar-

Rabbi Zirelsohn delivered a patriotic address in honor of the occasion. In his reply the Minister of Labor, Lupu, praised Bessarabian Jews and stated that they may look forward to a bright future under Roumanian rule.

A children's parade was held after the services. The children carried Roumanian and Zionist flags.

tively insignificant building on one of the side streets, to an imposing edifice—one of the largest and finest of its kind in the country—on the corner of Broad and Pine streets, in the very center of the city.

It is an open secret that in the past this spirit of unity was invoked in every city-wide endeavor except in the interest of Palestine. As in any other community, there are those who are not interested in the Zionist movement or in Palestine. But then these people are not vitally interested in each and every one of the other agencies for which they are constantly asked to contribute and to which they give considerable sums of money. These contributions they make quite frankly on the basis of unity and community solidarity. Why should Palestine be the exception? In Zionist circles this question is being repeated quite frequently. If a response to the Palestine Appeal is not essential to the unity and the solidarity of the community, then the Palestine groups may be found similarly indifferent when the next community appeal is made.

This is not a new feeling. It has been cumulating over a period of eight years and the slogan this year is not only an indication of this feeling but to some extent also in the nature of a challenge.

The choice of Rabbi Klein for the chairmanship is in keeping with this feeling. Spiritual leader of a congregation—Adath Jeshurun one of the oldest in the city—that is not particularly Zionist; a director of the Federation of Jewish Charities; next to Albert H. Lieberman, chairman of the United Jewish Campaign for Eastern Pennsylvania, one of the most devoted workers in the Foreign Relief Campaign; held in the highest esteem in every element in the community.

## GRIEVANCES AGAINST Z. O. ADMINISTRATION STATED BY LAWRENCE BERENSON Gives Details of American Zion Commonwealth Situation

The grievances of the two members of the Administrative Committee of the Zionist Organization of America, Mr. Lawrence Berenson and Mr. Samuel Rosensohn who resigned from their positions recently, were stated by Mr. Berenson in his address before the Washington Opposition conference last Sunday. In view of the unusual interest in these grievances, displayed in many Zionist quarters, the Jewish Daily Bulletin quotes below a considerable part of the address which constituted the main attack on the Lipsky administration.

"I was one of the members of the administrative committee," Mr. Berenson stated, "who, together with Mr. Rosensohn and Dr. Wise, resigned recently from the organization. My resignation from the organization reminds me somewhat of the story of the poor Jew who tried to get into a 'schul' on Yom Kippur without a ticket. He was met at the door by the 'Shames' (sexton), who asked him for his ticket. He said he had none. The 'Shames' told him he couldn't get in. The poor Jew then said he had some very important business with a man named Cohen. After some discussion the 'Shames' said 'I'll let you go in and talk business with Cohen but if I catch you praying I'll break your neck. That was the position that Mr. Rosensohn and I found ourselves in after some months of service on the administrative committee and that's why we resigned—because we dared practice Zionism—because we dared to aid the administration out of its difficulties and put the organization on a proper financial basis.

"A campaign of attack, first quietly and subsequently openly, was made against us with the result that our position as members of the administrative committee became practically useless. There are several of you here

Rabbi Klein was agreed upon as the one who could appeal to the entire community.

The quota set for the current year is three hundred thousand dollars, which is considerably less than last year. The reason for the reduction is this:—Rabbi Klein made it clear under no condition would he permit any inflation of returns—a weakness from which most campaign suffer. The Jewish community, Rabbi Klein declared at one of the very first public meetings, shall know the whole truth whether it be to its shame or to its glory. The campaign is about to be launched. What are the chances? May 16—the date set for the closing of the campaign—will furnish the answer.

who attended the Atlantic City Convention last June and you recall the bomb-shell that was exploded by Zeldin in his attack on affairs of the organization. As a result of that disclosure of that expose of things that the administration had done up to that time there was a clamor for a change in administration—for a business administration—a clamor that men be invited to participate in affairs of the administration who would help clean up the financial difficulties of the organization and try to restore confidence of the Zionists in the country in the organization of it. As a result of that clamor Mr. Rosensohn, Mr. Lindheim and I were invited to become members of the committee and to participate in the work—to help clean up the difficulties of the organization—and we started out immediately after the convention. One of the first things we did was to create a thing theretofore unknown to the organization, a balanced budget—a budget whereby the organization could never spend or create an invented necessity for sums in excess of the budget. We found the organization with a deficit of \$175,000—a deficit the large part of which had been created under the leadership of Mr. Lipsky in the year or two prior to the Atlantic City Convention. That budget is exclusive of guarantees. It is an actual deficit of the organization itself. In the creation of that balanced budget it became necessary to eliminate a lot of expenditures that had been made by the organization in other years. Reduction of subsidies and elimination of compensation to favored individuals.

"Another thing that we undertook to do was to eliminate that deficit by a special measure, namely, the creation of a live membership for the organization. We planned a campaign to raise \$200,000 by selling live memberships at \$100 each. I was appointed chairman of that committee to undertake that task and on we went with work, but as we went along we found that this whispering to which I have referred kept growing louder and louder and louder, until it broke out in meetings of the executive committee, where the president of the organization in open hostility to those who had done the work in bringing about this budget, attacked us. Our influence soon came to count for naught. It is an amazing thing that the president should have undertaken the task—the unfavorable task—of driving out of the organization those men who are trying to put it on its feet. You heard Mr. Zeldin state that a note in the Mercantile Bank in New York was endorsed by the organization for the American Zion Commonwealth to the tune of \$285,000. That American Zion Commonwealth situation we have not heard the end of, the Lord knows I am very fearful of the outcome of the American Zion Common-

wealth. I am wondering if it will ever pull out of the mess that it is in. A petition of bankruptcy has been filed against the American Zion Commonwealth in Palestine. An attempt is now being made to save the Commonwealth and to raise \$200,000. That is futile because in my opinion the liabilities are overwhelming. The liability is \$1,068,000—that is the indebtedness. The assets consist of approximately \$400,000 of accounts receivable and of doubtful value, because those accounts receivable are money owed by American purchasers of the lands in Palestine, and those sums, in my opinion, will not be paid until deeds are produced for American purchases, and as things look those deeds will not be produced, so that the assets are of doubtful value. The remaining asset is land in Palestine. There have been various estimates placed on the value of the lands. That land was purchased in the land boom and speculation which went on in Palestine a few years ago. In part the moneys which were received were used instead of for the purpose of acquiring titles to the land, were used to purchase additional lands. The American Zion Commonwealth attempted to build a hotel, this was a great loss and the project was abandoned. The value of the Haifa Bay development is extremely doubtful. It is, therefore, difficult to judge just how much the land is worth, because, as I stated, it was purchased in land boom time. The boom is over and the Zion Commonwealth has these other contingent liabilities in connection with that land. If the Arabs do undertake to foreclose, as they threaten to do, on vast tracts of land, owned by the Commonwealth, there won't be much land left for the landowners who are about 2,000 in number.

"One of the obligations of the Zionist Organization of America was the endorsement on this note on the Central Mercantile Bank of New York of \$285,000. President Weinstein and Rosenblatt were largely participant in that work. They were the two prime movers in the land speculation. When the speculation was rife and it seemed as though the American Zion Commonwealth was going to make lots of money Mr. Lipsky—a man without any business experience whatsoever endorsed the American Zion Commonwealth as an American Zionist Institution—placed the moral support of the organization behind that of the institution—ran all sorts of editorials and articles in the New Palestine and the other Zionist Organization publications, and was largely responsible for inducing American purchasers to make deposits for the acquisition of lands for the American Zion Commonwealth. Because of that the Zionists of the country took the position—the leadership of the organization having taken the

position—that the American Zion Commonwealth is an American Zionist institution. Because of that and the clamor of the land purchasers of the organization, the United Palestine Appeal was compelled to advance in cash on account of the American Zion Commonwealth—instead of this amount going to Palestine—a sum of \$320,000, and an additional sum of about \$125,000 more of the United Palestine Appeal money which couldn't go to Palestine and which was raised for this purpose, had to be used to pull the American Zion Commonwealth out of its difficulty."

In reply to a question by Mr. Friedman as to whether Mr. Lipsky endorsed the note without the authorization of the committee the speaker declared: "That endorsement was placed upon that note by Mr. Lipsky without the knowledge, without the consent, without the authority, without the approval of anybody of the Zionist Organization of America."

Questioned by Dr. Wolfe of St. Louis, Mr. Berenson stated: "The United Palestine Appeal found it necessary to advance these sums of money. The situation of the American Zion Commonwealth was so critical and the criticism throughout the country was so great and the feeling among the land purchasers spreading from one to the other got so bad that there was grave danger to the whole United Palestine Appeal Campaign, danger of the collapse of the entire Zionist Organization and of American Zion Commonwealth being placed in a much worse light. In order to save the United Palestine Appeal Campaign and the Zionist Organization of America it was found necessary to advance these sums of money in order that the whole campaign might not be smashed to bits."

### POLISH ZIONISTS FORM PROVISIONAL COUNCIL

 Lodz, May 2.—Greater unity among Polish Zionists may result from action taken here at a session of representatives of the various Zionist Organizations existing in the Republic of Poland.

A provisional Party Council to establish contact between Zionist groups in Congress Poland and Galicia was formed. Some discussion developed as to the jurisdiction of the Party Council. Representatives of the Lemberg Zionists demanded that the Party Council should not interfere with the local politics, but limit its action to matters of Zionist and Palestine importance.

The Provisional Council will act until a National Conference of all Polish Zionists will be called.

The Council consists of seven representatives of Warsaw Zionists, four of Lemberg and three of Cracow.

### \$68,000 RAISED FOR JEWISH EDUCATION IN CLEVELAND

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, May 2.—The sum of \$68,000 was raised in Cleveland in this year's campaign of the Bureau of Jewish Education for the subsidy of ten week-day afternoon Hebrew schools with a total enrollment of 2,300 children; seven Saturday and Sunday schools, with an enrollment of 1,400 children; a Jewish Teachers Institute for the training of Sunday school and Hebrew school teachers, with an enrollment of 170; summer camp work, neighborhood holiday celebrations, and other educational activities conducted by the Bureau of Jewish Education.

This year's campaign was the fourth annual campaign of the Bureau. Prior to the organization of the Bureau of Jewish Education in 1924, the total community support for Jewish Education was only \$10,000 a year. The first campaign of the Bureau in 1925 netted a cash income of \$39,000, its second campaign netted \$53,000, and last year's campaign brought in \$65,000. The contributors list grew in these four years from 900 to 3,500.

The schools subsidized by the Bureau of Jewish Education also have an independent income from tuition fee received from those parents who are able to pay either the full or partial per capita cost of instruction. All direct appeals for funds to the community are made by the Bureau. The Cleveland Bureau of Jewish Education was organized in 1924 on the recommendation made in a survey report prepared by the Bureau of Jewish Social Research on the invitation of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Cleveland. The Board of Trustees of the Cleveland Bureau consists of representatives of the Jewish religious and educational institutions in the city.

Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver is president of the Board, Mr. Alfred H. Sachs, executive director, and Mr. A. H. Friedland, educational director.
