CHRISTIAN STUDENTS' LEAGUE IN ROUMANIA DEFIES ORDER OF GOVERNMENT TO DISBAND Sees Jewish Problem Solved by Loan

Agreement and New Policy (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Bucharest, May 26.-The Union of

Christian Students, under the leader-ship of Alexander Cuza, has issued a statement declaring that as the representative of 28,000 students, it refuses to lay down its arms.

The Rectorate, it contends, had no right to dissolve the Union, which includes the student organizations of all the university towns. The students, it says, are just as good patriots as the representatives of the authorities. The Union, the statement concludes, will stop its activity only when this is demanded by the students who elected

The Government decision to dissolve the Union of the Christian Students, the "Diminiatza" here states was made for the following reasons:

The participants in the Congress of Oradeamare included, in addition to a large number of students, the delegates of various student organizations, some of which have been recognized and some of which have not been recognized by the University Senates. Fol-

LODZ JEWISH WEAVERS TAUGHT TO USE MODERN MACHINES

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Warsaw, May 14. - Steps directed PHILIPOPOLIS JEWS, QUAKE toward transferring the Jewish weavers of Lodz, the textile center of Poland from hand weaving to power weaving have been decided on at a Conference of Jewish social workers held in Lodz, representatives being present from the Joint Distribution Committee office in Warsaw.

A sum of money has been allocated for the purpose. The decision is of tremendous importance for the hundreds of thousands of Jews in Lodz who are engaged in the textile industry. In recent years, with the increase in the use of power machines in the textile industry in Poland, large numbers of Jewish weavers, who are able to work only the hand looms, have been thrown out of employment. The initiators of the new movement will set up classes to teach the Jewish hand weavers to adapt themselves to working the power machines.

BUREYA REGION UNFIT FOR COLONIZATION, MILIUKOV SAYS IN N. Y. INTERVIEW

Attributes Growth of Anti-Semitism in Russia to Soviet Policy

The Bureya region, now boomed in Russia as a district for extensive Jewish colonization, sponsored by the Comzet the government department, is unfit for such a project, Pavel N. Miliukov, Russian liberal leader, former Minister of Foreign Affairs in the Provisional Government and Soviet foe, declared in an interview with the representative of the

Jewish Daily Bulletin. Professor Miliukov, the outstanding leader of the Russian Constitutional Democratic Party (Ka-Dets), who is now on a lecture tour in this country, is a resident of Paris where he publishes the Russian emigres paper, "Poslednia

Novosti"

"The Bureva district is unsuited for settlement on a large scale because of the region's topographic characteristics. During the Czarist regime, when I was a member of the Duma, the Bureya district was considered as a possible region for new settlement. Experts sent to investigate the territory discovered, however, that the area available is a strip of land under the surface of which there is a heavy layer of ice which never melts and which prevents plantations from taking proper root," he stated.

Discussing present condition in Russia, particularly the recent decision of the Soviet government to inaugurate a vigorous campaign against anti-Semitism,

VICTIMS. APPEAL FOR AID (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Sofia, May 26 .- Scores of Jewish families are still in dire need as a result of the earthquake devastation in Philipopolis, one of the cities affected.

Representatives of the community who came to the capital asked the corrspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agncy here to present their plea to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee to grant them long term loans at low interest, in order that they may be able to rebuild the houses and synagogues. The aid given up to now is like a drop in the ocean, they stated.

Many families are compelled to roam about the streets for lack of housing facilities, many children are wandering about without shoes and with little clothing. They are suffering from hunger.

DEAD SEA CONCESSION THE SUBJECT OF A LENGTHY DEBATE IN HOUSE OF LORDS

Details of Negotiations Cannot be

Discussed Now Says Lord Lovat (Jewish Telegraphic Agency) London, May 26 .- A lengthy debate

on the concession to exploit the salts of the Dead Sea took place in the House of Lords on Tuesday. Lord Islington asked what progress

had been made toward settlement, while Lord Thomson complained of the long delay in granting the con-

cession.

Lord Lovat, Under-Secretary of the Dominions, replied that the delay was unavoidable and that negotiations must be conducted step by step. The Colonial Secretary is awaiting reports from the Palestine and Transfordanian governments. Meanwhile, it is inadvisable to report on them. The government considers the financial support behind Novomeiski and Tulloch satisfactory, he stated.

Viscount Haldane said that the Colonial Office had been dilatory. Lord Gainsford urged that British interests be safeguarded when the concession is granted, while Lord Dansford demanded that the terms of the concession be submitted to parliament.

Lord Birkenhead replied that the government is ready to submit to par-

100 REPRESENTATIVES OF POALE ZION IN GOVERNMENT (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, May 26 .- The Jewish labor party, Left Poale Zion, has 100 representatives in 33 Polish city governments, it was reported at a convention of Jewish aldermen belonging to that party, which opened here yesterday at City Hall.

Zerubabel, one of the leaders of the party, reviewing the progress of the past ten years recalled that in 1917. when the first communal elections were held in Poland, the party succeeded in electing only one representative to a city council.

POGROM LEADER SENTENCED TO PRISON BY SOVIET COURT (Jewish Telegraphie Agency)

Moscow, May 26.-Stepan Miltchuk, leader in the Proskurov pogrom of 1920, was sentenced today by the Soviet court.

He will have to serve a term of eight years in prison, the court ruled.

(Continued from Page 1) Professor Miliukov, interviewed at the Park Avenue apartment of Mr. Charles Crane, attributed the present spread of anti-Semitism in Russia directly to the Soviet's "policy of nationalism" and charged that Joseph Stalin, Soviet dictator, is an anti-Semite.

The Jew, he says, has nothing for which to thank the Soviet. The only contribution the Soviet Government has made to the Jews is a gift of economic distress and social hatred, "Juridical and political equality were gifts bestowed upon the lew by the Provisional Government and simply carried over by the Soviet as a heritam."

While economically, the lews have no problem which can be separated from the general Russian problem, socially their position is aggravated by anti-Sem-

itism, says Miliakov.

The anti-Semitism of Soviet Russia differs radically from the anti-Semitism in the days of the Czar, he points out. In those days, anti-Semitism was a slogan, fostered by the Czar, but fought by the intellectual classes. Today anti-Semitism has infected the intellectual classes and is fostered even by Soviet officials themselves. "My personal impression is that Stalin, General Secretary of the Communist Party and virtual Dictator of Russia, is an anti-Semite. The virus of anti-Semitism is seeping through the working classes as well as members of the Communist party."

Hatred of the Jews is further propagated by the Soviet's policy of nationalism. Hatred of everything not Russian is the crex of the Soviet's so-called "international" philosophy. The Jews are the first victims of this philosophy, he The Soviet Government's strong armed methods of suppressing anti-Semitism, in his opinion, cannot succeed so long as it negates the fight itself by its philosophy of hatreds and its complete sizes of a free areas.

lowing the disturbances which took place at Oradeamare, the University Senates punished the guilty students in accordance with the findings of the Inquiry Commissions. In university circles it was thought that this punishment would result in the students preserving order and devoting themselves to their studies.

The student organizations of the capital, however, continued to carry on their agitation, only this time under

the pretext that they were seeking to obtain the release of their imprisoned colleagues. The University Senate thereupon decided to reconsider the sentences. Several of the students were released, beause it was found that they were innocent. But the Senate soon realized that this did not restore order. The Bucharest student organizations continued to hold their inilammatory meetings.

The Rectorate, the "Diminiatza" states, therefore decided to dissolve them. As for the Union of Christian Students, it functioned hitherto without the permission of the University Senate, and it was therefore dissolved by the Ministry of the Interior. If the students attempt to continue their agitation they will be dealt with by the courts martial.

The 22 students who are under arrest are kept in the fortress of Szilagy. Their leaders, Sirbulescu and Theodorescu, are to be put on trial for breaking into the residence of the Rector, Dr. Pangrati. The others will be tried for disturbing the peace. The offices of the Union have been sealed up and have been placed under military guard.

The recent statement of the United Roumanian Jews of America, favoring the \$60,000,000 loan being sought in the United States by the Roumanian Government, was viewed as marking the conclusion of an entente cordial between the Roumanian Government and the Jews of Roumania in a news item which appeared in Saturday morn-
