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## MARSHALL AND FRANKEL SAIL TO ATTEND SESSIONS OF AGENCY COMMISSION

Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee, and signatory in behalf of the non-Zionists to the agreement concerning the creation of the Jewish Agency, and Dr. Lee K. Frankel, American Commissioner of the Non-Partisan Palestine Survey Commission or the Jewish Agency sailed for London at midnight on Friday on the steamer Majestic.

With Felix M. Warburg, who sailed last week with Dr. Weizmann, Dr. Frankel and Mr. Marshall will be the guests of Sir Alfred Mond at his country estate, where the sessions of the Agency Commission will begin on June 9.

Jerusalem, June 1.—Harry Sacher, member of the Jerusalem Executive, and Arthur Ruppin, colonization expert and former member of the Executive, left here today for London. The purpose of their trip is to participate in the sessions of the Non-Partisan Palestine Survey Commission of the Jewish Agency.

## PALESTINE COMMUNISTS ORDERED DEPORTED

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 1.—Chaim Shlesinger and Joseph Baskin of Jaffa were sentenced to two months imprisonment to be followed by deportation. The charge brought against them was that they belonged to the Communist party.

Eleven Communists detained in the Jerusalem prison awaiting deportation have declared a hunger strike. The prisoners demand that they be accorded better treatment.

## AUSTRIAN CHANCELLOR TO VISIT PALESTINE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, June 1.—Monsignor Seipel, Chancellor of Austria, will leave for Palestine the beginning of August. Mgr. Seipel will spend two weeks in the Holy Land and will be accompanied by a group of 100, including many clergymen from various countries and university professors.

The Chancellor's visit to Palestine has aroused the ire of the social democratic deputies who insist that Austria cannot be "administered via Jerusalem."

## JEWSH DEPUTIES CRITICISE POLISH GOVERNMENT; WILL NOT VOTE AGAINST BUDGET

Gruenbaum and Reich in New Conflict  
Over Political Course

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, June 1.—The votes of the Jewish Deputies within the Polish Sejm, will not be cast against the Pilsudski government in the vote on the proposed state budget.

This was indicated today during the budget discussion in an address delivered by Dr. Leon Reich in behalf of the Club of Jewish Deputies. Although he severely criticised the Pilsudski government for its failure to meet the demands of the Jewish population in the Republic of Poland, he did not say that the Club of Jewish Deputies will vote against the budget, nor did he say that the Club will take a favorable attitude toward the government.

The address of Dr. Reich followed a bitter struggle which occurred within the Club and led to a sharp encounter between him and Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, who demanded that the Club vote against the budget and proceed to the opposition. The conflict between Reich and Gruenbaum, which assumed a personal character, was referred to a Court of Honor.

In his address in the Sejm, Deputy Reich pointed out that the Pilsudski revolution of May, 1926 contributed to the betterment of the situation of the Jews in Poland only in a negative way. The May revolution and the ensuing Pilsudski regime have brought consternation into the camp of the anti-Semites, have lessened racial antagonism within the

## ROUMANIA DECORATES REAR ADMIRAL JOSEPHAL

New Rochelle, June 1.—Rear Admiral Louis M. Josephthal received the decoration of the Grand Military Order of Roumania from George Cretziano, Roumanian Minister to the United States, at a dinner given at the Admiral's home last night.

An escort of New York policemen accompanied the Minister to the home of Admiral Josephthal, commander of the New York State Militia, where he was met by Lieutenant Commander Kenneth Gundlach of the Naval Militia.

The decoration was bestowed upon Admiral Josephthal for services to Roumania. He was chairman of Governor Smith's committee to welcome Queen Marie on her visit to this country.

## SIR GILBERT CLAYTON DENIES HE MAY BE PALESTINE'S NEXT HIGH COMMISSIONER

Is Expert on Near East; Was Civil  
Secretary for Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 1.—Rumors to the effect that Sir Gilbert Clayton, British expert on Near East affairs and at one time Civil Secretary of the Palestine government, would be the next High Commissioner of Palestine after Lord Plumer's retirement was denied by Sir Gilbert who arrived here today from the Arabian peninsula.

Sir Gilbert just returned from Jeddah where he conferred with Ibn Saud, Sultan of Nejd and King of Hedjaz. In an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, he stated that he knows nothing concerning the rumors of his appointment to succeed Lord Plumer and that he thinks this unlikely.

Sir Gilbert attended the session of the Vaad Leumi, National Council of Palestine Jews, which asked him to take an interest in the outstanding Palestine problems.

He stated that he will renew negotiations with Ibn Saud in July. The question of the Akaba Hedjaz railway was not discussed, he stated.

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# UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN RECEIVES \$425,000 OF ITS \$3,100,000 EMERGENCY FUND

Communities Heed 'Borrow and Advance' Slogan of David A. Brown

Over \$423,000 has already been received by the United Jewish Campaign in response to the appeal of David A. Brown to "borrow and advance" a share of the \$3,100,000 emergency fund required by the Joint Distribution Committee for the continuation of its work during the summer months.

Following the lead of Chicago, the first to respond with its advance of \$250,000, the Montreal Committee forwarded a check for \$20,000; \$20,000 was received from the Committee of Portland, Oregon, and \$20,000 came from the Jewish National Welfare Fund of San Francisco. The remainder making up the total of \$425,000 was received in smaller amounts from various other communities.

While every effort is being made throughout the country to collect in advance the minimum budget of \$3,100,000 from the funds already pledged, reports received at the national headquarters of the United Jewish Campaign indicate that many communities which have not as yet subscribed their full quotas are launching their new campaigns.

## ANNUAL SPEECH DAY OBSERVED AT JEWS COLLEGE

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

London, May 21.—The annual Speech Day of Jews' College was observed here yesterday. Elkan N. Adler, who presided, said that the whole of his family had been connected with the college since its inception in 1885. Jews' College had been treated as Cinderella, he said, but he was delighted to see what a high place this institution was now occupying in the minds of British Jewry.

Speaking of the standard of the colleges and yeshivahs in different countries, Mr. Adler said that the yeshivah had come to be of primary importance in keeping the ghetto alive and modern Jewry saw the need of educating its rabbis to be not only talmudists but academists.

Chief Rabbi, Dr. J. H. Hertz, said that although they had a very adequate staff, they were still in need of lecturers in Jewish theology and philosophy of Jewish religion. They were finding it very difficult to fill these positions. Dr. Hertz spoke of the asset that the college possessed in its library which was one of the four largest in Europe.

Professor A. Buechler, the principal, said that if Jews' College were more fully staffed, they would be in a position to extend their work outside the premises of the college. They could even arrange a series of lectures, on the university standard, to be delivered in the evenings. The staff was often called upon to deliver lectures to outside bodies, but their time was fully occupied by the work of the college and they could not therefore comply with these requests.

Mr. S. Japhet said that Mr. Adler who was the son of the founder of Jews' College and himself a pupil of the college, was also a great scholar and traveller of renown.

## SENATOR METCALF GIVES \$500 TO PALESTINE FUND

A Contribution of \$500 to the United Palestine Appeal was made by Senator Jesse H. Metcalf of Rhode Island, according to an announcement issued by Morris Rothenberg, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the United Palestine Appeal.

Senator Metcalf's check was sent to Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Providence, R. I., with whom he has spoken at several United Palestine Appeal banquets in the New England Region.

Commenting on the contribution of Senator Metcalf, who has been prominently identified with support for the rebuilding of Palestine, Mr. Rothenberg characterized it as "a most gratifying sign of interest in the rebuilding of the Jewish Homeland, on the part of so prominent a non-Jewish national leader."

## JEWISH IMMIGRATION TO MEXICO CONTINUES

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Mexico, City, June 1.—Jewish immigration to Mexico continued during the month of May.

One hundred and sixty-six Jewish immigrants, the majority of whom come from the Ukraine and Poland, arrived here. During the month three immigrants returned to their old home.

According to information received by the immigrants from their relatives abroad, it is predicted that a greater number of Ukrainian Jews is planning to leave for Mexico. The economic situation here is unsatisfactory and immigrants who arrive here without funds or who do not come to relatives, find it difficult to gain a livelihood.

## COPELAND TO STUDY THE WORK OF HIAS IN EUROPE

Adolph Copeland, president of the Chicago Branch of Hias, has been appointed special commissioner to Europe to study the Hias work there, according to an announcement made by Mr. Abraham Herman, president of Hias.

Mr. Copeland who will be accompanied by Mrs. Copeland, will sail from New York on the Republic on June 8. Mr. Copeland has been president of the Chicago Hias branch for over a decade.

Prior to their leaving Chicago, Mr. and Mrs. Copeland were tendered dinners at the Covenant Club and the Temple B'nai Israel of which Mr. Copeland is president.

# FOURTEEN RABBIS GRADUATED FROM HEBREW UNION COLLEGE AT ANNUAL EXERCISES

Honorary Degrees for Distinguished Service to American Jewry Conferred on Dr. Lee K. Frankel and David Brown; Impressive Ceremonies Mark Graduation

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, O., June 2.—Dr. Lee K. Frankel of New York and David A. Brown of Detroit were given the honorary degree of Doctor of Hebrew Law by the Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati at its annual graduation exercises held today in the chapel of the institution. Th honorary degrees were conferred on Dr. Frankel and Mr. Brown by Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president of the college, in recognition of "distinguished service to American Jewry and American Judaism." The degree was conferred on Mr. Brown in person, and Dr. Frankel in absentia, he having sailed Friday night for London to attend the session of the Non-Partisan Survey Commission of the Jewish Agency.

Fourteen members of the graduating class were ordained as Rabbis by Dr. Morgenstern. The students come from nine cities, five being residents of Cincinnati, two of Cleveland, one of New Orleans, one of Louisville, and others of St. Louis, Providence, Chicago, Troy, and New York City. The graduates are: Gus F. Falk, New Orleans; Hirsch L. Freund, Cincinnati; Milton Greenwald, Louisville; Israel Harburg, Cincinnati; Eugene E. Hibbsman, Cleveland; Philip W. Jaffa, Cleveland; Lawrence E. B. Kahn, Cincinnati; Julius Kerman, St. Louis; Max Lasker, Providence; Irving M. Levey, Chicago; Jacob J. Ogel, Cincinnati; Efraim M. Rosensweig, Cincinnati; Herman Eliot Snyder, Troy; Sidney E. Unger, New York City.

Eight of the graduates have already been called to pulpits throughout the country, two joining the staff of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations as regional rabbis.

On Dr. Frankel the degree was conferred "in recognition of abundant and fruitful service to Israel and mankind." The formal statement by Dr. Morgenstern declared:

"As a devoted and far-seeing pioneer in the field of Jewish social service he helped to formulate its basic principles, to develop its aims and methods and to lay the foundations of many of its most important institutions. He has deservedly become the foremost figure in America in the promotion of systematic public health service. Through him, the lives of thousands of American citizens of today and tomorrow have been prolonged, their environmental conditions immeasurably improved, their welfare and happiness increased, and the standard of living of our American people appreciably elevated. He has been called

to labor for many causes and has never failed to respond. He has filled high and responsible positions in general as well as in Jewish service, with dignity and honor and likewise with high idealism and worthy achievement. He has borne himself ever as a Jew, proud of his heritage and eager to enrich it through his own works. He has ever sought to emphasize the spiritual content of Judaism and interpret this to his fellow Jews as an active force in their daily lives. Through his aspiration, planning and building, Judaism has been strengthened, Israel has been honored, mankind has been blessed, and the name of God has been truly sacrificed."

In conferring the honorary degree on Mr. Brown, Dr. Morgenstern declared that it was presented to him "in recognition of valuable, life-long service to Israel and mankind."

"As a loyal citizen," Dr. Morgenstern continued, "he has labored for many years on behalf of every worthy cause in his home city and contributed materially to the welfare and social progress of its people. As a faithful Jew he has always been a generous supporter of and ardent worker for every constructive project in his own congregation and in the larger Jewish community."

"Since 1919 he has been an able and indefatigable leader in the pressing task of alleviating the sufferings and needs of his fellow-Jews in Eastern Europe and Palestine. At great personal sacrifice, and with unsurpassed zeal he has literally given himself to this task."

"He has spared neither means, time nor strength in this high cause. He has traveled through all lands where Jews dwell and with warm fellowship and understanding sympathy, with keen observation and constructive effort he has met and labored with and ministered to his Jewish brethren at all stations and opinions."

"He has investigated, planned and built wisely and with vision, so that throughout the world Israel might again raise its head in peace and walk with self-respect and dignity and that Judaism might live and grow and serve in ever larger measure and with more and more bounteous blessing. Among the Jewish leaders of this age he stands deservedly in the foremost rank."

Both Dr. Frankel and Mr. Brown have been active in the Jewish cause, taking leading parts in all important Jewish movements. Mr. Brown is identified

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# RABBIS PROCLAIM 'CHERIM' AGAINST COMMUNIST LIBRARY IN RUSSIA

'Emes' Complains Hundreds of Jewish Religious Schools Function in Ukraine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, June 1.—The struggle between the Orthodox Jews and Communists in the township Zhukevka, District of Briansk, reached its climax when the local rabbis proclaimed a "Cherem" against the Communist reading room, excommunicating all who enter there.

The activity of the rabbis in spreading religion in the Ukraine is giving much annoyance to the Jewish communists. Their official organ, the "Emes," again complains that hundreds of Jewish religious schools and Yeshivas are functioning in the Ukraine. Cantors travel through the villages, rendering Jewish religious songs. Jewish traditional charity organizations including the Hachnasath Kalleh, which provides dowries for poor brides; the Lechem L'Eviyonim, which gives bread to the poor, are functioning openly. The villages and towns are flooded with religious books, rabbis render decisions on questions of ritual and books are issued urging the continuance of traditional Jewish purity of family life, the newspaper complains, urging the authorities to suppress these activities.

The Communist Charkov daily "Der Stern," reports a number of cases where Batei Midrashim, houses of study, were converted into workmen's clubs. In Ushomir, Volhynia, the synagogue was transformed into an artisan club.

# 22 STUDENTS TO BE TRIED FOR ROUMANIAN RIOTS

Bucharest, June 1.—Nine of the 22 students who were arrested on May 6 for demonstrating outside the home of the Rector of Bucharest University, Professor Pangrati, have been released till the trial is opened.

The inquiry into the case has just been completed. The ringleaders, Sirbulescu, President of the Bucharest Christian Students' Organization, Dimitrescu and Constantinescu, remain under arrest. The charges against them include breaking into the home of the Rector and resisting the authorities. All, the registers of the Union of Christian Students have been confiscated by the authorities.

# METEOR PASSES OVER PALESTINE, DROPS INTO SEA

The Pilsudski government, however, has done nothing positive to meet the demands of the Jewish population. The government has continued in its refusal to recognize the rights of Polish Jews to obtain work. Jewish applicants were not admitted to government posts. This example of the government was followed by the municipalities. The Jewish population has continued to suffer from the compulsory Sunday rest law and was the most affected by the heavy taxation burden which rests upon the urban population, he declared.

## COMMUNICATION TO THE EDITOR

Sir:

There has come to the knowledge of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America the fact that there is in existence what purports to be a Diploma of the Seminary issued to Abraham I. Goldberg, under the date of May 31, 1921, and containing pretended signatures of Cyrus Adler as acting president, and Louis Ginsberg, together with the names of other persons who were at no time members of the teaching staff of the Seminary. The imitated signatures of Doctor Adler and Professor Ginsberg respectively are both forgeries. No person by the name of Abraham I. Goldberg has ever graduated by the Seminary. The diploma moreover bears a supposed seal which was at no time the seal of the Seminary Corporation. It is understood that Abraham I. Goldberg has at various times officiated as a rabbi and teacher in various congregations in Texas and Arizona. All persons are warned that the claim of the said Abraham I. Goldberg to be a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America is fraudulent. In general, congregations are advised that it is in their interest when persons claiming to be graduates of the seminary apply to them for posts to write to the seminary for information concerning such applicants.
