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MARQUIS OF READING WILL PARTICIPATE IN THE WORK OF JEWISH AGENCY COMMISSION

Zionist Executive Believes Agency Must Aim at Continuous Immigration to Palestine
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, June 7.—The Marquis of Reading will participate in the proceedings of the Jewish Agency Commission at the sessions which will open on June 9. The Marquis was invited by Lord Mond to attend the sessions to meet with Felix M. Warburg, Dr. Lee K. Frankel, and Herr Oscar Wassermann, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, when the best minds of American and European Jewry will take counsel on the economic problems which are connected with the upbuilding of Palestine.

A radiogram was despatched by Lord Mond to Mr. Marshall and Dr. Frankel, who are now on the high seas, inviting them to come directly to his country house near Southampton, instead of going first to London.

A meeting of the Zionist Executive took place today. No official statement was issued as to the decisions of the Executive, but it was understood that the agenda included a consideration of the resolutions adopted by the last Zionist Congress in Basle concerning the extension of the Jewish Agency and setting forth the Zionist principles which are to be guarded in the Agency work.

The Congress resolutions specified that the activities of the Jewish Agency must aim at a continuous increase of Jewish immigration into Palestine, the redemption of the land as Jewish public property, that the colonization work must be based on Jewish labor and that the development of the Hebrew language and culture in Palestine be safeguarded.

It was also stated that the question whether a definite financial obligation is to be asked of the non-Zionists was one of the topics discussed.

MAX ADLER PRESENTS \$500,000 GIFT FOR CONSTRUCTION OF PLANETARIUM IN CHICAGO

Brother-in-Law of Julius Rosenwald Will go Abroad to Study Similar Plants in Europe
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Ill., June 7.—A gift of \$500,000 from Max Adler, former vice-president of Sears Roebuck and Co. and brother-in-law of Julius Rosenwald, for the construction of a planetarium on the lake front island east of the Field Museum was made known by President Edward J. Kelly of the South Park Board of Chicago.

The apparatus and instruments of the planetarium, which were perfected by Carl Zeiss of Jena, Germany, and which were first established in Munich two years ago, will be installed in a domed building.

The order for the manufacture of the instruments has already been given to Zeiss and delivery has been promised for the fall of 1929. Excavations for the building are scheduled to start this fall when the design is selected and completion is expected by the time of delivery of the apparatus. Rising upon an elevation at the north end of the island, the first of five which are projected as the center of activities for the 1933 World's Fair, the planetarium, according to preliminary plans, will be 200 feet wide 70 feet high, and capped with a dome of 100 feet in diameter.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE RULING GOES TO PRIVY COUNCIL

Tel Aviv, June 7.—An appeal against the ruling of the Palestine Supreme Court upholding the decision of the Jaffa District Court that the Tel Aviv municipality cannot under the mandate enforce a municipal ordinance for the observance of the Sabbath will be brought to the Privy Council in London.

The Tel Aviv municipality adopted a resolution today to carry the appeal to the highest tribunal in the British Empire.

The city council also adopted a resolution protesting against the flogging of prisoners in Palestine jails and against the deportation of ten Jewish workers accused of belonging to the Communist party.

The first Jewish city in Palestine will soon have new elections. The present party relations within the city government have shaken the coalition basis.

POLISH ORTHODOX JEWRY TO FIGHT TO KEEP RELIGIOUS CHARACTER OF KEHILLAH'S

Stern Guardians of the Law and Chassidic Rabbis Unite to Combat Secularism
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, June 7.—Orthodox Jewry in the Republic of Poland, split into various factions due to geographic and other influences, will unite to put up a desperate fight for maintaining the religious character of the Kehillahs, the time honored institutions functioning as the executive organs of the Jewish communities in Poland.

In this fight which is to develop soon in connection with the forthcoming Kehillah elections in Galicia and in the Eastern provinces of Poland, recently included in the Kehillah statute of Congress Poland, Orthodox rabbis of the Eastern provinces, the stern guardians of the letter of the law, will unite with the Chassidic rabbis of Galicia and Central Poland, with whom they are often at variance.

A national conference of Orthodox rabbis, Chassidic rabbis and Orthodox lay leaders will convene here shortly. The convention will be called "Moazat Gdolei Ha'torah," Council of Torah Authorities. Rabbis of the eastern

AGITATE FOR NUMERUS CLAUSUS IN LITHUANIA

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JEWISH STUDENTS WIN

DISTINCTION AT MCGILL

Montreal, June 7.—Prizes in all departments were won by Jewish students at the convocation of McGill University held here last week. Of the 480 students who received degrees, 109 were Jewish young men and women.

Among the winners of special prizes and scholarships was Jacob Harold Blumenstein, who was awarded the Elizabeth Torrance Gold Medal for highest standing in the final examinations, the Macdonald Travelling Scholarship and the Montreal Bar Association Prize for Commercial Law.

Abraham Edel is the first Jewish student to hold the Moyse Travelling Scholarship. Mr. Edel is the youngest Master of Arts at McGill University. Winners of economics fellowships and medals in the Department of Economics and Political Science at McGill included the following Jewish students: Abraham Kirshberg, Hyman Carl Goldenberg, and Morton Myer Mendels. Vera Weinfield, a Jewish girl, who received her licentiate in music at McGill Conservatorium, also won the Lieutenant-Governor's Bronze Medal for highest standing in the junior year. Other Jewish students who won distinctive honors at McGill this year were: Samuel Greenberg, Archie Benjamin, Jacob Hiam Feiner, Samuel Bruker, Samuel Lyon Caplan, Maurice Brodie and Melvyn Moe Berling. The only girl to graduate in four years from the Faculty of Law was a Jewish girl, Miss Sadie Lazarovitz, of Quebec City.

SONS SUE FATHER TO ANNUL TEN YEAR OLD SISTER'S MARRIAGE TO MOSLEM ARAB Aged Jew Surprises Court, Says He Became Moslem

Haifa, June 6.—An interdenominational tangle developed in the trial of Aaron Natan, aged father of a ten year old girl, in the attempt of the girl's two brothers to annul her marriage to a Moslem Arab.

The intermarriage of the Jewish girl to the Arab attracted wide attention in Palestine when it became known that the 91 year old father, a resident of Acre, sold his ten year old daughter for \$30 in accordance with the custom prevailing among the Arabs, to the Moslem storekeeper, Assadi, as a bride for his son. One of the brothers of the brothers of the bride instituted proceedings with the Chief Rabbinate of Palestine, claiming that his father was mentally unbalanced and seeking guardianship of the child to prevent her marriage. Before the formalities were completed, the marriage was consummated.

The case came up today before the District Court of Haifa. The father sprang a surprise on his sons when he testified that he was no longer a Jew, having embraced the Moslem religion 26 years ago. Counsel for the sons maintained that the father was still within the Jewish faith. The proceedings were adjourned by an order of the court for an investigation at Acre. If it is found that Aaron Natan had embraced Mohammedanism, the case will have to be transferred to the Moslem court.

GUGGENHEIM HONORED BY NEW YORK UNIVERSITY

Daniel Guggenheim, founder of the Daniel Guggenheim Foundation for the Promotion of Aeronautics received the degree of Doctor of Commercial Science from New York University at the commencement exercises held on Wednesday.

In conferring the degree Chancellor Elmer Ellsworth Brown said: "Daniel Guggenheim, after spending your younger manhood penetrating the depths of the earth for valuable metal you are directing the thought of your more mature years to the clouds and the stars."

Hundreds of Jewish students were among the 2,759 who were graduated from the various colleges of the university.

More than \$500,000 was received by the United Jewish Campaign during the month of May toward the Emergency Fund of \$3,000,000. David A. Brown, national chairman, announced. Checks have been received from twenty states in response to the appeal to "Borrow and Advance" to help the Joint Distribution Committee continue its work without interruption during the summer months.

RUSSIAN PRESS DESCRIBES ANTI-SEMITISM IN SOVIET SCHOOLS AND LABOR GROUPS Tell of Jewish Carpenter Driven In- sane by Chicanery

Moscow, June 7.—The Soviet press carries today a number of stories describing the growth of anti-Semitism in Soviet schools of various rank and in labor organizations.

Reuben Garber, a Berditchev carpenter who served in the Red Army, was driven insane by the anti-Semitic chicaneries of the officials of the labor exchange.

Garber, who was unemployed, came to the labor exchange daily in search of work. He was tormented by the officials. When he became insane he was taken to the Kieff asylum, where he died.

How the workers in a Moscow factory tormented the Jewish worker, Machlin, throwing him into a vat of hot water, was told today in the "Komsomolskaya Pravda." The incident is discussed throughout the press.

"We are passive in fighting anti-Semitism," declared Krinitzki, speaking on behalf of the Communist Central Committee, at a conference of workers held here. Krinitzki demanded that party members and institutions which are indifferent toward anti-Semitism, become active fighters against it.

"We do not want to sit with 'Zhids,'" replied a group of school children of Werchne-Dneprovsk, when the teacher asked why they avoided the Communist pioneer club.

"We would like to see the Jews beaten by Machno again," declared another group.

The local paper in reporting the incidents asked why the teachers are indifferent to anti-Semitism in the school.

The story of anti-Semitic practices in the Minsk technical schools was told at the graduation exercises by a Jewish student who, receiving his diploma, instead of expressing his thanks declared:

"I am now going to tell the truth of the sufferings in our school. In the dormitories one Jewish student wanted to commit suicide because of the anti-Semitic practices." The graduate declared that the school administration was despotic.

Golovanov, director of the Moscow State Opera, who was dismissed from his post because of his anti-Semitic practices, will officially leave the theatre tomorrow.

Surprise was expressed in Jewish circles here at the report of the government investigating commission, which stated that Golovanov's anti-Semitic practices were not proven. It was pointed out that the labor union investigating commission had proved his guilt several weeks ago.

ARABS AND JEWS IN ADEN QUARREL OVER SOUL WHILE JEWISH PATIENT DIES Death Does Not End Quarrel in Land of Religious Fanaticism (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Aden, June 6.—The fanaticism of religious zealots over the soul of a sick Jew indulging in a quarrel instead of giving him medical aid, led to the death of Said Jacob, a Jewish merchant who came from another part of Arabia to Aden, the principal commercial center, under British protectorate.

Jacob who was suddenly taken ill was offered the hospitality of an Arab judge who endeavored to convert him to Mohammedanism. Members of the Jewish community who learned of this attempt, demanded that Jacob be removed from the Arab's home to a hospital, contending that the patient was not of a sound mind and that it was unfair to impose upon him an alien religious affiliation while he was in that state.

The Arab judge refused to surrender the patient. An Arab mob guarded the house, demonstrating against the Jews and seeking to remove the patient to a place beyond the reach of the Jews, so that the conversion might be completed.

Leaders of the Jewish community informed the police authorities that the sick man had a contagious disease, whereupon the patient was taken to the Jewish quarantine ward, where he died.

The trouble, however, did not end with the death of the patient. When the Jews were preparing to bury Jacob in the Jewish cemetery, an Arab mob assembled, demanding that internment be in a Moslem cemetery. Using sticks, knives and clubs they overcame the Jews. The District Magistrate issued orders that the Jews were permitted to bury Jacob in the Jewish cemetery and sent the police to enforce the order, but the Arab mob outnumbered the police and carried off the coffin for burial in the Moslem cemetery.

The Jewish population has appealed to the government.

JEWS IN RUSSIAN TOWNS AFFECTED BY FLOOD (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, June 7.—Many Jewish houses were washed away in the flood which has caused great damage in Vitebsk and Mosir.

The damage to Jewish property is estimated to be great. No casualties have been reported.

The Atereth Zion congregation of Chicago is erecting a synagogue at a cost of \$160,000. The structure will contain schoolrooms, meeting halls, a vestry room, and an auditorium with a capacity of 1,100 seats. Edward Steinborn is the architect.

Worcester Fails to Reach Goal in Joint Jewish Campaign

(By our Worcester Correspondent)

Worcester, June 2.—The Joint Jewish Campaign for \$30,000 conducted in this city fell short of its mark by \$20,000. Although the city raised \$40,000 for the United Palestine Appeal and the Joint Distribution committee three years ago, it obtained pledges for only \$10,000 this year. Efforts were made to put off the campaign on the grounds of the poor business conditions. The local committee consisted of Max Corash chairman, and Barnard Wolkowitch as secretary. The two largest individual contributions were \$500 each and were made by John Kane, chairman of the opening banquet committee, and Bernard Press, the treasurer who also donated the use of an office in his building for the managers.

The speakers at the opening banquet were Bernard B. Given of Syracuse, N. Y., chairman of the New York State United Palestine Appeal committee; Mrs. Archibald Silverman, Alderman Victor Hillman as representative of Mayor O'Hara; Rabbi Irving J. Miller and Rabbi Julius H. Gordon of the local Reform temple. Joseph Talamo, for years chairman of the local United Palestine Appeal campaigns was the toastmaster.

The seven labor groups of the city pledged themselves to give \$5,000, as a body, toward the campaign. This is in addition to the \$2,000 the seven groups donated earlier in the season for the benefit of labor groups in Palestine.

On Memorial Day, the local B'nai lodge dedicated a chapel in its cemetery. The chapel represents the work of two years, on the part of a committee of members of the B'nai B'rith cemetery corporation, under the joint chairmanship of Jacob Reed and Adolph Hirsch. The dedicatory exercises began with the ceremony of the opening of the chapel door, which privilege was given to Samuel Lainer.

Samuel R. Caplan, president of the Worcester lodge, delivered an address. Mr. Reed presented the building, and Adolph Hirsch as president of the corporation accepted it. The chapel seats about 100 persons. The interior of the round dome is decorated with a mural painting. Portions of the chapel have been purchased by Worcester people in memory of their departed relatives.

A concert and a meeting were held in Mechanics Hall here to celebrate the tenth anniversary of the founding of the Workmen's Circle Cooperative Bakery, and the opening of its new model quarters. David Fishman, of the board of directors of the National Workmen's Circle was the principal speaker.

The bakery is said to be one of the best examples of a cooperative shop in the country. Nathan Sumner, president of the board of directors was chairman

JEWSH COLONISTS ASK FOR FURTHER CREDITS AND ADDITIONAL HOUSES

Far Eastern Soviet Offers Better Land in Bureya

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, June 7.—Further credits and more houses were demanded by the delegates from the Jewish colonies to the All Ukrainian Agricultural Collective's convention which was opened in Charkoff.

"We cannot develop our farms without sufficient houses and without long term loans," the Jewish delegate stated.

The Far Eastern Soviet has offered the Jewish pioneers in Bureya several hundred desiatin rice plantations located near Yekaterina-Nikolsk. The land is well cultivated and the Amur government is willing to transfer to the colonists the entire inventory, including the live-stock and American machinery.

If the offer is accepted, the pioneers will be settled in the better parts of Bureya where they will encounter less difficulties.

At a meeting of 300 settlers, it was decided to send 34 investigators, including Merezhin and Raskhes, to the plantations.

American Jews can better help their relatives in the small towns of Soviet Russia by sending implements instead of money, states "Der Stern," Charkoff daily. Declaring that the small towns are receiving much relief from American relatives, the paper states that the money is spent for food and clothing, while with implements they would be able to organize workmen's cooperatives and become artisans.

The Communist newspaper complains that the Jewish settlements are not adopting the collectivist form of organization, which the government seeks to establish. The paper asks the Comzet and the Ozet why they do not undertake measures to put the collective program into effect.

Two hundred and ten Jewish workers in the Cherkass district have been given work in the sugar factories.

Moscow, June 7.—Abraham Bragin, one of the first sponsors of the Jewish colonization movement in Soviet Russia was not ousted from the Ozet, the society sponsoring the colonization, as was reported by the Jewish Morning Journal of New York.

The correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was authorized by the Ozet to state that Bragin is still vice-chairman of the Ozet's Central Committee.

Goldberg, who will now head the combined organizations. The women's auxiliary has hitherto provided the funds for a summer camp and contributed largely to its sinking fund.

KISHINEFF URGES CHIEF**RABBI ZIRELSON TO REMAIN**

Kishineff, June 6. — Chief Rabbi Zirelson has received a call to Lublin, Poland. The Board of Jewish Community here has unanimously decided to urge Rabbi Zirelson not to leave Kishineff. A resolution was adopted expressing the community's appreciation of the Rabbi's efforts and achievements on behalf of Bessarabian Jewry. A delegation has been appointed to visit him and urge him to remain in Kishineff.

"In giving the planetarium to Chicago," Mr. Adler said, "I have a three fold conception: scientific, popular, and philosophical. One is to further the progress of science. The second is to enable the people to observe the action of the heavenly bodies as heretofore only astronomers have been able to do. The third is to emphasize that all mankind, rich and poor, powerful and weak, as well as all nations, here and abroad, constitute part of one universe, and that under the great celestial firmament there is no division or cleavage but rather interdependence and unity."

Mr. Adler will spend the summer in Europe inspecting similar plans.

The planetarium, according to its description by the inventor, is a device designed to give a view of an imitation of the Heavens showing more than 4,500 planets, planetoids, and stars in orbital motion." It shows the position of the planet on any day or minute as the old Egyptians saw them 4,000 years ago, or as posterity may see them 14,000 years in the future. It is capable of showing the workings of the Heavens for a day, a minute, a year, or a cycle of years."

ADLOW BOOMED AS ATTORNEY GENERAL FOR MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, June 7. — Elijah Adlow, special assistant corporation counsel of Boston, who was unsuccessful candidate for attorney general of Massachusetts is being prominently mentioned as a possible successor to Arthur K. The successor under the law must be named by both the House of Representative and the Senate. Following the resignation of Reading, a movement for Adlow was launched. Two other prominent lawyers are candidates. The resignation of Reading is still pending.

Adlow is a member of the Republican party and will receive support from many quarters.

provinces will sit in counsel together with the Chassidic rebbes of Gura Kalwarja, of Radzin, Snochaczow, Belz and Bobow. Ways and means will be sought to create a united front of Orthodox Jewry at the forthcoming elections.

The plan has been put forward to ask for the establishment of separate Orthodox Kehillahs in case the elections will prove that the process of secularizing the Kehillahs and turning them into institutions of an anti-religious character cannot be halted.

The secularization of the Kehillah institutions is a plank in the program of Polish Zionists. The situation has become more aggravating to the Orthodox Jews, since the Jewish labor parties Bund and Poale Zion, have decided to participate in the Kehillah elections and to "bores from within" with a view to undermining the authority and the influence of the rabbinate.

Vilna, June 7.—A conference of Orthodox leaders who have recently formed a new organization under the name Achduth Israel, was opened here yesterday. The conference will consider the issues of the forthcoming Kehillah elections.

"The Unity of Israel" organization is composed of Orthodox Jews who are in opposition to the policies of the Agudath Israel. Members of the Agudath and the Mizrachi, Orthodox Zionist organization, were not invited to this conference.
