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## HADASSAH CONVENTION PRESENTS PLATFORM FOR ZIONIST REFORM

Present Administration Nominated  
for Re-Election  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Pittsburgh, Pa., June 30.—The platform adopted by the National Board of Hadassah, calling for the establishment of a commission form of government for the Zionist Organization of America, the election of a body of seven administrators, none of whom is to receive a salary from Zionist sources and the appointment by the Administrative Committee of an editorial board, also non-paid, to outline the principles and policies of all Zionist publications, that the Zionist Organization of America reaffirm the status of Zionist membership; that contribution to Zionist causes alone does not entitle contributors to membership in the Zionist Organization of America and that prospective members must adhere to the Basle program, will be advocated by a majority of the Hadassah delegates to the convention of the Zionist Organization of America.

The presentation of this platform at Friday's session of the Hadassah convention, caused a lengthy discussion among the delegates. In speaking for it, Mrs. Anna Moskowitz Kross, member of the National Board of Hadassah, said that in drafting the platform, Hadassah had no intention of dictating to the Zionist Organization of America, but feels that changes must come about. The accusation against Hadassah that its point of view is Nordic is unjustified, she said.

Dr. Anna Mintz of Boston opposed the adoption of the platform, which was adopted by a majority vote with but sixty delegates dissenting.

It became apparent at the conclusion of the nominations, when the session was stopped because of the Sabbath, that Miss Henrietta Szold will be re-elected honorary president and Mrs. Nathan Straus, honorary vice-president, with Mrs. Irma Lindheim

## CENTRAL CONFERENCE OF RABBIS ADVOCATES INDUSTRIAL REFORMS

Endorse Five Day Week, Unemployment Insurance, Old Age Pensions  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Chicago, Ill., June 30.—A thorough study in the life and problems of the laboring class with the desire to better their home and working conditions was the feature of yesterday's session of the Central Conference of American Rabbis at the Hotel Shoreland, when Rabbi Edward L. Israel of Baltimore, presented the report of the Social Justice Commission.

The Commission remains the only authoritative body expressing the point of view on matters of social justice of the Jewish people whose ethical philosophy is founded in this ideal, Rabbi Israel declared. This is due to the fact that the Social Justice Commission of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations was dissolved.

"We recognize the imperative need in the present circumstances for the enlargement of the functions of the conference's commission."

"It is incumbent upon all men to study the ills of the existing social order and to form an opinion on the problem of social reconstruction. Instead of questioning God's goodness because of the evils in individual communal life, we should address God—given intelligence to the extermination of those circumstances which allow slums, vice, feeble mindedness, poverty, degeneracy and the like to continue with only palliative efforts for their improvement," he declared.

On the distribution and responsibilities of wealth, the report says: "Inequalities of wealth can find no moral justification in a society where poverty

## TO COMBAT BOYCOTT AGAINST JEWISH WORKERS

## EUROPEAN PRESS COMMENTS ON REPORT OF JEWISH AGENCY COMMISSION

Opinions Vary Along Party Lines;  
English Papers Divided  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, June 29.—The Anglo-Jewish press commented in its issues of today on the report of the Jewish Agency Commission. The editorial of the "Jewish Guardian," entitled "A Great Survey," declares that the Commission's report is a document demanding the most serious attention of all Jews concerned in the upbuilding of Palestine. Its decisions on many controversial questions combine Jewish idealism with the practical necessities of the situation, it states.

Perfect harmony was reached between the Zionist and non-Zionist members of the Commission, the paper proceeds, which was possible because the survey dealt not with political questions and opinions, but the hard realities of economic facts. The Guardian emphasizes the Commission's bold declaration regarding Jewish immigration to Palestine, its friendly but pointed recommendations concerning the responsibilities attached to the Mandatory and the necessity of world Jewry to contribute a minimum of a million pounds yearly, if the great experiment in Palestine is to be justified in the eyes of the world.

"The road for the cooperation of Zionists and non-Zionists in upbuilding Palestine is open," the paper declares.

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ANNOUNCE FURTHER GIFTS  
TO ROSENWALD FUND

A subscription of \$25,000 by Ben Selling, of Portland, Oregon, to the \$10,000,000 being raised for Jewish farm settlement work in Russia, was announced last night by James N. Rosenberg, chairman of the American Jewish Joint Agricultural Corporation.

"The growing response throughout the country to Julius Rosenwald's challenging subscription of \$5,000,000 is evidenced by voluntary subscriptions coming in from various states," said Mr. Rosenberg. Max Senior of Cincinnati has sent in a subscription for \$10,000; Messrs. Meir and Frank of Portland, Oregon, have subscribed \$5,000; and A. S. Lavenson of Oakland, California, telegraphed an outright contribution of \$5,000 toward a Julius Rosenwald Honor Fund for the promotion of Jewish agriculture in Russia.

"We are not conducting a campaign," concluded Mr. Rosenberg. "We are confident that the American Jews, inspired by Mr. Rosenwald's great act, will follow his leadership and complete the fund in the near future."

Jewish Consumptive Relief Association of California celebrated its fifteenth anniversary at a reception Sunday night. The annual convention of the Sanatorium, will open in Los Angeles today.

The convention will discuss problems of maintenance and of possible extension of facilities.

PALESTINE COMMUNISTS SEND  
ANTI ZIONIST MEMORANDUM  
TO THE ARAB CONGRESS

Urge Fight Against Zionism as  
Worst Enemy of Jew and Arab

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, June 30.—A memorandum presented to the Arab Congress by Palestine Jewish Communists is published today in the Arab press.

The Communists, who term themselves non-partisans, urge in their memorandum an "Arab fight against Zionism as the worst enemy of the Arabs and the Jews. The Jews have no more right in Palestine than the Arab in Andalusia," the memorandum declares. "A fight is also necessary against Great Britain, which is backing Zionism."

"Workers and peasants all over the world are friends," the memorandum continues, "The Arabs fight for freedom and this fight can succeed only if Arab workers and peasants participate, as was shown by the Russian and Chinese examples. Only an alliance of Arab and Jewish workers can prevent repetition of the disturbances of 1921, which were arranged by the Britishers," the memorandum declares.

## TRIAL OF OSCAR SLATER

William A. Goodhart, Baltimore lawyer, Hugh Gordon Miller, member of the Supreme Court in Washington and Deputy Pinkley of New York sailed Thursday night, on the Olympic for Scotland where a special appeal of the case of Oscar Slater will be heard July 9. Mr. Goodhart was attorney in the case more than 18 years ago, when Slater was committed to prison and after having served 18 years was released on evidence gathered by Sir Arthur Conan Doyle.

Slater was released last November. The result of the present appeal is to vindicate him of the charge of murdering and robbing an aged Glasgow woman.

Mr. Miller and Mr. Goodhart are going at their own expense, believing that the interests of justice require their presence at the hearing.

PRO-FALASHA COMMITTEE  
FORMED IN PALESTINE

Jerusalem, June 14.—The formation of a Palestine organization to establish contact with the primitive Jews in Abyssinia, Heibar, in Nejd, where it is said there is a Nomadic tribe of Jews, and in other places, was decided on at a dinner given in Tel Aviv by Dr. Hausner, the commercial representative of the Polish Government in Palestine, in honor of Dr. Faitlovich, of the Pro-Falasha Committee. Chaim Nachman Bialik, Mr. Bloch, the Mayor of Tel Aviv, Dr. Hausner and Chief Rabbi Usiel have been charged with the establishment of the organization.

"The Falashas," Dr. Faitlovich stated, "are Caucasians. Their features are Semitic, but they are somewhat darker than the Jews of India." As a result of Dr. Faitlovich's activity, pro-Falasha committees have been formed in America and other countries to raise funds for work among the Falashas and to enable some of the younger Falashas to obtain scholarships in Palestine and other countries to be trained as leaders and teachers in Abyssinia.

The "Jewish Chronicle" does not take such an optimistic attitude toward the report, which, it states was published under the auspices of the Zionist Organization and with the concurrence of the Zionist leader, yet contains no word promoting and encouraging the Jewish national idea, but only philanthropy with its demeaning implications. It must have the effect of further dangerously de-souling the Zionist idea.

It seems the assistance of non-Zionists is purchasable only by the abnegation of the very purposes for which the movement was established, the Chronicle proceeds. The report of the Commission is concerned with the mere upbuilding of Palestine, while Zionism is concerned with the upbuilding of Palestine as a Jewish land.

The "Near East," said to express the opinion of the Colonial Office, says that the experiences in recent years have shown that Palestine is peculiarly susceptible to the changes in world trade. It has already had two periods of severe economic depression, demonstrating the limited scope of Palestine for certain classes of settlers. In the initial stages of development, traders must be restricted, the "Near East" states. Their opportunity will come when the foundations of the country are well laid.

The Commission's optimism of further development depends mainly on finance, the paper proceeds. A million pounds is a substantial sum, but considering the number of wealthy Jews in the world, it is not impossible to attain, if the Jews as a whole are imbued with enthusiasm for the progress of the country with which they are indelibly associated.

Warsaw, June 28. — The "Hajnt," Warsaw Zionist daily, carries three articles in its issue today welcoming the report of the Jewish Agency Commission.

Isaac Gruenbaum says in his article that a million pound budget is not higher than the budget of the Zionist Organization, the Keren Hayesod, the Keren Kayemet and the Hadassah.

The report is too sober, he complains, and takes away the romantic idealism of Zionism and the opportunity of youth to search for an ideal. The movement is not based on rationalism, but on idealism.

A. Goldberg, editor of the "Hajnt" declares: The report is an historic event for Zionism. There is no danger in taking in the non-Zionist element. Its appeal to the Jewish people proves the victory of Zionism.

## MISSIONARY SCHOOL HAS 98% JEWISH PUPILS

Budapest, June 16.—The conversionists in Hungary are extremely active in the last few months.

The "Magyar Sion," which they recently published as their organ, is conducting a very vigorous propaganda. The editor of the paper is an ex-Jewish teacher, who was some time ago sentenced to a year's imprisonment for his outspoken articles against anti-Semitism in "Mult es Jovoe." At the girls' school maintained by the Scotch Mission, 98 per cent. of the pupils are Jewish. The parents of the girls all have to sign a statement before admission giving their consent to their children taking Bible study. The girls are required to take part in Christian services.

again named president. The following were nominated vice-presidents, Mrs. Zip F. Szold of New York, Miss Pearl Franklin of Chicago and Mrs. David de Sola Pool of New York. Mrs. Judith Epstein of New York was named for the position of secretary.

The nomination for re-election as treasurer of Hadassah of Mrs. Dorothy Lefkowitz of Stamford, Conn., who figured prominently in the inquiry by the judges committee, as the maker of the two thousand dollar note endorsed by Louis Lipsky, cited as evidence against the administration of the Zionist Organization of America, aroused some opposition among the delegates. At the close of the session it was declared that leaders of the Philadelphia chapter of Hadassah stated its chapter will consider other channels than Hadassah for their Zionist work if Mrs. Lefkowitz is re-elected.

A tumultuous period during the nominations occurred when Mrs. Archibald Silverman, who was nominated for the presidency from the floor by a minority group opposed to the Hadassah National Board policies and in sympathy with the present Z. O. A. administration, declined the nomination for this or any other office in Hadassah.

Miss Pearl Franklin submitted the report on finance, stating that a budget of \$60,000 for administration use was outlined for 1928-9. It was resolved that a drive for \$150,000 during the summer months, which Hadassah launched last year, will be repeated this year in order to meet the needs of the budget. Efforts will also be made to obtain United Palestine Appeal outstanding commitments. The finance report was accepted.

Election of officers and an administrative board is to be continued at the Saturday evening and Sunday sessions.

## BUDAPEST NEOLOG GROUP FACES LARGE DEFICIT

Budapest, June 16.—There is a deficit of five milliard Hungarian Kronen in the budget of the Budapest Jewish Reform (Neolog) Community, it was reported at the last meeting of the Budget Commission of the Community. A large number of officials of the community will be dismissed for economy reasons. The constitution and official recognition of the "status quo" Community is causing much anxiety in the Neolog Community. Many members who wished to avoid paying the community tax are joining the new community.

and want, due to exploitation, exist. We sympathize with measures designed to prevent private monopoly. We regard all ownership as a social trust implying the responsibility of administration for the good of all mankind. We maintain that unrestrained and unlimited exercise of the right of private ownership without regard for social results is morally untenable.

"The solution of ills which beset our social order," the report says in its discussion of industrial democracy, "are to be found not in any class conscious struggle, but in the triumph of sound humanitarian principles which regard mankind as one. We also uphold a religious philosophy of life and cannot sanction the practice of regarding labor as a mass in which the personality of the individual is lost or is not considered. It is a tendency which leads to the treatment of labor merely as an instrument.

"The same rights of organization which rest with employers rest also with those whom they employ and workers have the same inalienable right to organize according to their own plan for their common good."

The report deprecates the policy of the State Department to support the claims of investors in foreign countries by force of arms and denounces the attitude of investors in foreign countries who refuse to abide by the laws of the country in which their investment is made.

The right to a living wage is emphasized in the report. "Society must guarantee each of its members the chance to labor and earn a living wage. The adoption by business, State and Nation of some form of unemployment insurance as well as some system of nationally interlocking employment agencies and vocational guidance agencies, which will intelligently direct labor and aid in averting crisis of unemployment is advocated."

The report recorded its endorsement of pensions for old age and of mother's pensions and of special protection for the worker from industrial disease and the rehabilitation of industrial cripples under the direction of the State.

The committee stands for the reduction of the hours of labor to the lowest possible point consistent with physical, mental and moral good with a maximum of eight hours per day, and a reduction of the working week to five instead of six days a week. Women in industry must be protected from the nerve racking and debilitating effects of industrial excesses.

"We urge unqualified adherence to

civil liberties, especially with regard to the freedom of the press, speech and peaceful assemblage. We believe in the outlawry of war by all nations and support all movements which conscientiously and honestly strive to that end."

Discussing the historic attitude of Judaism to labor, Rabbi Louis Wolsey of Philadelphia, said: "Jewish law represents the insistent genius of the Hebrew people to deal humanely and progressively with an unhappy fact. True to their religious nature, they attempted legislation to right the difficulties inherent in the very nature of the industrial problem. Conceiving of labor as a dignified and even divine calling the Talmud records many enactments that guarantee a just relationship between the free laborer and his employer, and it is evident that it was in the spirit of the Talmud to provide work for the unemployed. But it must be understood that the Talmud perceives no serious problem in the relationship between the employee and employer or lets humanitarianism run riot in the desire to favor the employee."

The Baltimore Hebrew College and Teachers' Training School held its sixth annual commencement exercises in the concert hall of the Peabody Conservatory of Music. Twenty-seven students completed courses in the five departments of the school. The principal address was delivered by Dr. David E. Wegelin, Superintendent of the Public Schools of Baltimore. Israel Silberstein, president and Dr. Israel Eizen, dean of the school, presented the diplomas.

Israel I. Adler, Hebrew educator, underwent a serious operation in Mount Sinai Hospital, New York. Dr. A. A. Berg, the surgeon, pronounced the operation successful. Mr. Adler, who has been an instructor at the Hebrew Teachers College in Boston since 1923, plans to return to Palestine as soon as he has fully recovered.

I. Irving Lipsitch, Executive Director of the Federation Jewish Welfare Organization of Los Angeles, has been appointed Chairman of the Agency Co-operative Committee of the Community Chest.

The committee is expected to secure the cooperation of those interested in the social welfare programs of Los Angeles in connection with the next Community Chest campaign for \$2,750,000.

The Hannah B. Solomon fellowship for professional training in social work at the Training School for Jewish Social Work, Hannah B. Solomon, founder of the National Council of Jewish Women, has been awarded by the National Council of Jewish Women Texas, according to an announcement by Maurice K. Karpf, director of the school.

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# COMMUNITIES IN SOUTHERN JUGO-SLAVIA ORGANIZE (J. T. A. Mail Service)

Belgrade, June 13.—The Sephardic Jewish communities in the southern parts of ugo-Slavia, South Serbia and Serbian Macedonia, which have until now been practically isolated from the rest of the Jewish world, are being linked up with the more advanced and organized Jewry of Jugoslavia, following a conference of Jewish leaders from Belgrade, Zagreb, South Serbia and Serbian Macedonia, which has just been held at Skopje.

A number of resolutions were adopted aiming at the improvement of the economic, cultural and political position of the Jews of Southern Serbia and Serbian Macedonia. The Jews of these districts are extremely Orthodox. To a certain extent they still live in Ghettos.

Louis M. Singer of Toronto, has been elected third vice-president of District Grand Lodge No. 1 of the Independent Order E'nai Brith.

Mr. Singer's election is the first occasion upon which a Canadian member has been chosen for this office. He has served as president of the Toronto lodge and as president of the conference of Canadian lodges for two years.

Israel S. Chipkin, Educational Director of the Jewish Education Association, and Jacob Wener, Chairman of the Committee of One Hundred of the Association, were the guests of honor at a banquet tendered by the Committee. The occasion was the departure for Europe and Palestine by Mr. Chipkin and Mr. Wener.

Israel Unterberg, president of the Jewish Education Association, was toastmaster.

The contract for the erection of the Jewish Hospital Nurses' Home, St. Louis, Mo., to be known as the Moses Shoenberg Memorial, established by the widow and heirs of the late Moses Shoenberg, with a fund of \$300,000 was awarded to the Selden-Ereck Construction Company. Ground for the building has already been prepared and the work of construction will begin at once. The building will have accommodations for 200 student nurses and space for classrooms and laboratories of the school of instruction.

A political office of the Poale Zion World Federation has been opened in London under the charge of Mr. Dov Hov, one of the leaders of Palestine Labor. The office will keep in touch with British labor in connection with the developments in Palestine.

Possibility that the nominees of both major parties for Governor of New York State will be Jewish is being widely discussed. Republicans will almost certainly nominate Albert Ottinger, Attorney General, it is pointed out. Supreme Court Justice Joseph P. Frankfurter of New York City is being prominently mentioned as Democratic nominee.
