TO SEND NEW PIONEER PARTY OF 400 FAMILIES TO BUREYA IN FALL 1,300 of New Settlers to be Assigned

to Forest Work; 100 to be Artisans (Jewish Telegraphic Agency,

Moscow, Aug. 20. - An order will soon be issued for four hundred more families to go to Bureya in October, a report in the "Emes," Moscow Yiddish Communist daily, states.

Three hundred of the new settlers will be assigned to forest work. One hundred of the party will be artisans. A report received here from the re-

gion visted by the floods following the cyclone state that the waters are receding in the Far East district, but they are continuing to rise gradually in the Chabarovsk district.

The damage suffered by Jewish settlers in Bureya from the flood amounted to 65,000, according to the latest estimate received from Rashkes, representative of the Ozet, the society sponsoring the Bureya settlement The population in Chabarovsk has been mobilized to salvage foodstuffs and products.

An investigating commission composed of three Jews and two non-Jews, sent by the White Russian University to Bira-Bidzhan, returned with an unfavorable report. The experiment at Bira is unscientific, they found. Of the seven areas for Jewish colonization, only five are connected with Bira, while the others are without road connection and for this reason their situation is extremely bad.

It is difficult to say whether the twenty-eight organized artisan cooperatives can remain as collectives, the commission stated in its report. The building materials and the system of construction is unsatisfactory and expensive, the report continues. Most of the horses are unbroken and the livestock is of bad quality. Another hundred settlers may have to return home because they are not yet established on the soil. They have been earning a living at various occupations.

Climatic conditions in the district seem suitable for colonization, the report added.

BERLIN CONFERENCE ADOPTS CONSTITUTION FOR WORLD UNION PROGRESSIVE JUDAISM Will Raise Funds for Propaganda. Vogelstein Asks Next Conference be in U. S.

Berlin, Aug. 20. — The framework for the organizing of the Federation of Liberal Congregations, professing Reform Judaism, into the World Union for Progressive Judaism was laid at the Union's second annual conference in session here, with the adoption Sunday afternoon of a con-stitution. The Federations of American Reform Congregations, Great Britain, France, Germany and other countries are to constitute the Union which is to

elected annually at the conference. In addition to the Board of Governors a General Council is to be created composed of delegates designated by the federations of each country. The conference of the leaders of Reform congregations also voted to create a fund to be used for the purpose of propagating the ideals and doctrines of Liberal Judaism among the Jewish population in such countries where the liberal interpretation of Judaism has taken root. Paris, Aug. 20 .- The delegation of English students, who had presented a resolution asking for the exclusion of the Roumanian students from the International Students Federation because of the anti-Jewish excesses in Oradeamare, will have its way in the matter,

The resolution as previously presented was rejected by the International Students Congress in session here on a motion supported by the French and Polish students delegations that the Congress is not to deal with "international questions."

The English delegation then introduced a resolution which was adopted today, "instructing the incoming executive to deal with questions pertaining to national controversies," which means that the student body will intervene in the matter of the anti-Jewish numerus clausus in Roumanta.

At previous sessions the view of the Roumanian delegation that the Congress deal only with questions between various national student bodies and not between students within any country was taken.

2 JEWISH DEPUTIES ELECTED

TO GREEK PARLIAMENT (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Salonica, Aug. 20.-Two Jewish deputies were elected on the Zionist ticket in the national Greek elections which will determine the character of the government in Greece, the question being whether Greece is to continue as a republic or become a monarchy.

Early returns of the elections which were held Sunday show that David Matalon, president of the B'uai Brith and lonorary secretary of the Jewish Communal Council of Salonica, as well as former deputy Bessantchi, were elected. They were supported by the Zionists and other leading circles of the Jewish community on a non-partisan litical platform. This list received to votes in Salonica. The three other hats (anti-Venizelist, Venizelist and

Communist) polled a total of 4,400. The election was marked by extreme bitterness and partisan strife. Chaim Nahman, a Jewish Communist, received three revolver shots at the hands of David Catan , manager of the Ava Paraskevi houses, belonging to the government and occupied by two hundred Jewish families. The shooting followed a quarrel over the elections.

The Zionist, Communist, Venizelist and anti-Venizelist dailies conducted a bitter campaign. The principal rivals

were the Zionists and the Communists, In an appeal for support of Premier Eleutherios Venizelos, General Condily declared: "Israelites, lend your support to your fatherland's savior; vote for the Venizelos list."

U. S. INTERVENES IN KOSHER CHICKEN MARKET SCANDALS IN NEW YORK Home of Brownsville Chicken Dealer Bombed

Several persons received injuries Sunday morning when a bomb exploded in the home of Joseph Hosenprats, 920 uDmont Avenue, Brownsville, Brooklyn. Hosenprats, who is a dealer in kosher pourtry, his wife, his nine year old daughter Bertha, his neighbor, Abraham Herscher, and the neighbor's daughter Clara, were the victims of the explosion which destroyed the walls. of the twostory house, doing much damage to the property and furniture.

Hosenprats declared to the police that he was certain the bomb was placed by agents of the kosher chicken trust, because of his opposition to the trust. A warning to this effect was given to him some time ago. The trust was said to be an operation to keep prices on kosher chickens high.

The incident has attracted wide attention to the conditions now prevailing in the New York kosher chicken market, in which the Federal authorities intervened several days ago. Walter L. Rice, Assistant United States Attorney General, who is now in Philadelphia, is investi-

DEMOCRATS MAY CHOOSE COL. LEHMAN FOR GOVERNOR

The name of Col. Herbert H. Lehman, director of finance of the Democratic National Committee, is being mentioned as gubernatorial candidate in New York State.

Col. Lehman has been prominent in Jewish charitable work, both in this country and abroad. He is a Vice Chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee, a trustee of the Hebrew Sheltering Guardian Orphan Asylum, the Henry Street Settlemnt, and other welfare organizations. His contributions

have been generous.

Col. Lehman is fifty years old. He was graduated from Williams College in 1899. Recently he donated \$50,000 to his Alma Mater. He is a member of the firm of Lehman Brothers, investment bankers.

In 1912 Col. Lehman was appointed a member of the State Banking Commission, which revised the banking laws. At the outbreak of the World War he was commissioned a Captain. He rose through the grades to the rank of Colonel. He was attached to Gen. Pershing's staff overseas.

SOVIET EMBASSY DENIES COMMUNIST PAPER'S REPORT OF ANTI-JWISH RIOTS

Denial Follows Follows Inquiry by "International League Against

Pogroms' (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Aug. 20.—The Charge d'Affairs of the Soviet Embassy in Paris denied the veracity of the report of the Moscow Communist Youth organ, "Comsomolskaya Pravda" regarding anti-jewish riots which occurred in Mohiley several months ago but which were suppressed until recently.

The denial was made as the result of an inquiry directed to the Embassy by the "International League Against Pogroms." The Embassy official de-clared that the report was "absolutely

devoid of any foundation."

The report concerning the riots was carried not only by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency but also by the Associated Press. The cable was transmitted from Moscow by the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, who based it on an extensive report published in the "Comsomolskava Pravda" which devoted five columns to the matter after it had made an investigation on the spot. The Communist youth organ on that occasion reproached other Communist newspapers for suppressing the news and urged that the editor of the Communist newspaper in Velikoluki, from where the rioters came to Mohilev, who sup- ODESSA TO HAVE CITY DEPT. pressed the report, he tried by a court.

Budapest, Aug. 20.-The sad history of Jewish apostates turning against their former people and religion is repeating itself in Hungary. A number of apostates who have, by their desertion of Judaism, gained access to the nobility, now have adopted the doctine of the anti-Semites and are preaching hatred and economic discrimination against Jews.

In the last issue of the "Magyar Szemle," Hungarian political and literary magazine, there appear three articles from the pens of descendants of Jewish families who are baptised and members of the nobility. In these articles the idea that it is necessary to intrench a spirit of "Christian conservatism" in the fields of politics, economics and literature and that for that purpose the "destruction of the Jewish spirit" is necessary is advocated.

The author of one of thh articles is a baptised baron, whose father was vice-president of the Liberal Jewish Congregation in Budapest; another is a convert whose father was professor at the Budapest Jewish Theological Seminary; the brother of the third is a tormer Jewish communal leader and member of the Budapest Kehillah Board.

Mr. Leo Weil, Pittsburgh attorney, and active leader of the Union of Amerian Hebrew Congregations, Dr. Claude G. Montefiore of London and Mr. Peyser delivered addresses

Dr. Claude G. Montesiore, who presided over the sessions, in deference to the hosts delivered his opening address in German, while Herr Heinrich Stern, president of the German Liberal Congregations Federation, in respect for the delegates from English speaking countries, spoke in English. Dr. Montefiore, who recently celebrated his seventieth birthday, was honored by the German delegates by the presen-tation of a specially prepared de luxe edition of a book containing essays and treatises concerning the work of Reform movement in Germany, Montefiore for Liberal Judaism. Montesiore was also presented with the title of honorary member of the German Liberal Synagogue.

In responding to the presentation, the leader of Liberal Judaism in England recalled his visit to Berlin fortyfive years ago, when he sat at the feet of the fathers of Liberal Judaism. Maybaum, Zunz and Steinschneider, "Germany," he stated, "was the birth-

Dr. Philipson paid tribute to the German pioneers of the Liberal movement, notably Abraham Geiger. He referred to Chassidism as another instance of the protest of individual religion against the legalism of official, codified Judaism. "Although entirely dissimilar, Chassidism and Liberal Judaism arose from a similar impetus, the longing of the individual for spiritual expression," he said.

Liberal Judaism in Poland is making rapid progress and a formal delegation will be sent to the next conference of the Union, declared Leon Bregman of Warsaw, reporting on the status of Liberal Judaism in Poland.

Surveying Jewish religious develop-ment in Poland, Mr. Bregman characterized Chassidism as the first movement for freedom, representing a mass movement with almost revolutionary forms. The division of Poland into three parts prevented Polish Jewry from participating in the Reform movement in the nineteenth century, although a few rabbis like Akiba, Eger and Lisz participated and Polish Jews like Abraham Geiger and Samuel Hodheim contributed to the

The Russian revolution of 1905 secured relative political freedom, but it was accompanied with the propagation of atheism. The masses distrusted every reform, rejecting western culture as Christian, he stated.

Dr. Fritz Seifter in a report he presented stated that few Liberal congregations exist in the former Austrian part of Silesia, which recently formed the Union of Democratic Jews of Polish Silesia. He reported interesting developments in the town Kongshutte, where immigrating Jews from Galicia and Congress Poland obtained a majority at last Kehillah elections, taking by force possession of two synagogues and ousting the Liberals who were compelled to hire a hall for their services until an understanding was reached recently.

The situation in Posen and Western Prussia resembles ruins, it was reported. Most cities have been deserted by Jews, the synagogues were closed and the Kehillahs dissolved. In the whole territory, which was once populated by many Jews, only one rabbi functions in the town of Posen. His sad function is to liquidate the Kehillahs.
