JASCHA HEIFETZ DECLINES TO ANSWER QUESTIONS ON INTERMARRIAGE His Marriage Private and Sacred Thing to Him He Says

Jewish Daily Bulleting Los Angeles, California, Sept. 5 .- Jascha Heifetz, internationally known Jewish violinist, after having arrived here wth his bride, the former Mrs. Florence Vidor, motion picture actress, declined to comment on the question of his marriage to a non-Jewess. His marriage was his private concern, he declared.

"As an artist I feel that I must answer to my public for the quality of my art. Certain things are expected of me, I realize, and my actions must therefore bear public scrutiny. But I am also a private citizen", Mr. Heifetz declared in an exclusive interview granted the correspondent of the Jewish Daily Bulletin. Mr. and Mrs. Heifetz, who eluded newspapermen and photographers by leaving their train in a small town outside of Los Angeles, spent the Labor Day weekend on a yacht cruise. Following his return, Mr. Heifetz pleaded for less interest...in-his private affairs.

In reply to questions of the correspondent regarding his marriage, Mr. Heifetz said: "Some things in life are purely private and sacred in their nature. Unless this were so life would hardly be worth living. The facts of our marriage and acquaintanceship over a period of years are known. There is no addi-(Continued on page 4)

HURRICANE, ATTENDED BY FLOODS, HITS CRIMEA

NON-PARTISAN CONFERENCE TO CONSIDER AGENCY RECOMMENDATIONS WILL BE HELD OCTOBER 20

Expect Call to Conference to be Issued Within a Few Days, City Not Yet Designated; Dr. Lee K. Frankel, Back from Europe, Says Future Action Now Up to Marshall and Weizmann

The Non-Partisan Conference on mission. Palestine, which will consider the recommendations formulated by the Joint Palestine Survey Commission for the guidance of the enlarged Jewish Agency to consist of Zionists and non-Zionists, will be held on October 20, the Jewish Daily Bulletin learns on good author-The city in which the conference will be held has not yet been designated

It is expected that the call to the conference will be issued by Mr. Louis To Conform with Actual Prospects of Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee, in behalf of the non-Zionists, within a few days. Mr. Marshall will present to the sessions of the conference the recommendations of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission. It is expected that Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, will arrive in the United States in time to address the conference.

The finding of the facts in the situation of Palestine was the aim of the Joint Paletsine Survey Commission, said Dr. Lee K. Frankel, American member of the Commission who re-turned to New York several days ago from a visit to Europe.

When asked by the representative of the Jewish Daily Bulletin to comment on the outcome of the deliberations of the Zionist General Council in Berlin, Dr. Frankel declared that he has no comment to make at this time.

"The Joint Palestine Survey Commission no longer exists," he said "The Commission after having completed its work submitted its conclusions and recommendations to Mr. Louis Marshall and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, who had jointly appointed it. The matter now rests with Mr. Marshall and Dr. Weizmann who will take whatever steps they may deem necessary for carrying out the Commission's recommendations.

"The Commission was earnestly as objectively as possible. It based its recommendations upon a careful. scientific and thorough examination of the conditions in Palestine as seen by

The Commission took for granted the idealism behind the Palestinian movement. It was our sincere aim to view conditions in Palestine from an impartial angle, and to offer constructive plans how Palestine could be built up most effectively. To what extent we have succeeded, it is not for me to say."

ZIONIST EXECUTIVE IN JERUSALEM OUTLINES 1929 FINANCIAL POLICY

Fund Raising; Curtailment Necessary

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 5. - A statement outlining the financial policy of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem during the coming Jewish year, 5689, was issued today by the Zionist Executive in the form of a Rosh Hashanah message to the various Zionist groups. The statement declares that in re-

gard to the anticipated revenue and expenditure in the coming year, the situation is viewed as more difficult now than before the last session of the Zionist General Council in Berlin.

Further budget reductions may be made, the Executive declares, stating that it is framing the budget accord-ing to the actual prospects of funds to be received. The Keren Hayesod has informed the Executive that an increase in the previous estimate of its income is unlikely. The question now arises as to how to make the necessary reductions, which it is impossible to do in a mechanical proportion because it would involve a new deficit, since certain items cannot be further reduced. The Executive is therefore forced to revert approximately to its budget proposed in Berlin, resolving, however, to assign £2,500 for the cultural committee of the labor federation, which was struck out from the original budget, and to assign proportionate allocations for the cultural committees of the Mizrachi and the striving to view conditionss in Palestine Yemenite laborers in addition to £1,200 voted by the Actions Committee for covering the labor cultural deficit.

URGE ROUMANIA TO EXEMPT JEWISH SCHOOL CHILDREN FROM SABBATH WRITING

Petition Signed by 150,000 Jews Submitted to Minister of Education
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Sept. 5.—A petition bearing the signatures of 150,000 Roumanian Jews was submitted to Minister of Education Angelescu asking that Jewish children attending public schools be exempt from writing on Saturday.

When Chief Rabbi Schorr presented, the petition to Angelescu, the Minister remarked that he cannot agree to the opinion that the request is justified, since "Senator Eli Berkowitz, the president of the Jewish community, keeps his bank open on the Sabbath, compelling his clerks to work on that day."

At the Rabbi's insistence the Minister promised to present this matter for discussion at the school conference which will take place today.

BAUER FAILS TO GET FRANKFURT RABBINIC POST

Frankfurt, Sept. 5.—The sensational result of the community vote for the choice of a rabbi to the most important Orthodox Jewish community in Germany has called forth wide interest

The members of the Franklurt community were called upon to decide on the candidacy of Dr. Raphael Breuer, the son of the late Dr. Solomon Breuer, who served as rabbi of the community and was widely known as an outstanding leader of the Orthodox world organization, Agudath Israel. Dr. Rabhael Breuer was defeated by a majority of 600 to 390 votes.

GERMAN JEWISH FEDERATION BEGINS WELFARE WORK

Berlin, Sept. 5.—First steps toward formulating a program for the joint action of what might be termed a Federation of Jewish Federations in the German Republic were made at a conference of representatives of the state federations of Jewish communities held

In accordance with recent decisions, representatives of the various state federations met to discuss the method and procedure of the planned 'Arbeits-gemeinschaft.' The conference decided to establish an agricultural colony to provide employment for a considerable number of Jewish immigrant workers in Germany who are at present without work. The Prussian Federation of Jewish Communities allotted for this purpose the sum of 30,000 Mark. It was also decided to start the publication of a journal in the German language for articles and essays in Jewish research work.

BOOM CONGRESSMAN JACOB-STEIN FOR N. Y. GOVERNOR (Jewish Daily Bulletta)

Rochester, N. Y., Sept. 5.—Congressman Meyer Jacobstein is the fourth leading Jew in New York State prominently mentioned for nomination as Governor on the two major party tickets during the current campaign.

His friends look at his possible nomination optimistically, especially because of a statement by United States Senator Robert F. South African Jews Take up Problem of Jewish Education (By our Johannesburg Correspondent)

Johannesburg, Aug. 1.-The main problem of Hebrew education in South Africa is the same as that in any other country in the Diaspora. Here, like in other countries, the leaders of the Jewish community have been grappling with the problem and have convened a conference on Hebrew education for August 26 and 27.

A. M. Abrahams, president of the South African Zionist Federation, S. Raphaelsy, president of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies, J. L. Landau, chairman and D. Mierowsky, secretary, of the organizing committee, were the signatories to a manifesto convening the conference.

The problems with which the organization to be established will have to occupy itself include: (a) The utter indifference of the Jewish masses towards Hebrew education and their poor conception of the same; (b) the preoccupation of Jewish children through an overburdened curriculum, generally supplemented by additional subjects such as music, dancing, drill, sports, etc.; (c) the deplorable lack of trained teachers; (d) the lack of text-books; (e) the absence of any co-ordinate organization throughout the country; (f) the irregular attendance at school.

The manifesto read:

"Throughout the centuries, the greatest factor in the life of the Jewish people has been Education-the dissemination of knowledge. Ever since the time when political Jerusalem gave place to cultural Jamnia, the one aim of our nation-an aim pursued with an intense passion-has been for knowledge, for the education of the masses.

"Throughout the ages our social structure has been based not upon wordly possessions, but upon mental and moral attainments. We have justly prided ourselves upon being known as "a people of the book."

"In this consideration it must be borne in mind that the greatest concern of the Jewish people has ever been the education of the child. In all their wanderings, wherever even a handful of Jewish people have set foot, they have established seats of learning-Chadorim, Batei-Midrash and Yeshibahs. Even the poorest Jew living in an isolated, remote spot, has not failed to provide for the education of his children.

"This intense passion for learning abated during the nineteenth century under the influence of Jewish social and political emancipation; but has been revived and intensified by our National

JERUSALEM JEWS DEMAND ELBOW ROOM AT WAILING WALL DURING HIGH HOLIDAYS

Want Square, now Obstructed by Arab Houses, Enlarged (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 5 .- "Elbow room" for the large number of Jewish worshippers who gather at the Western Wall of the Temple, commonly known as the Wailing Wall, was demanded by Tewish Orthodox leaders in connection with the approaching High Holidays, when the attendance at the Wall reaches its height.

In an appeal issued today to Jewish organizations, it is pointed out that in order to assure the safety of the worshippers and the thousands of visitors who flock to Jerusalem for the holidays, it is necessary to enlarge the square in front of the Wailing Wall. The approach to the wall is now obstructed by Arab houses. The appeal urges that the surrounding houses be removed and that their owners he compensated. This plan should be carried out by the Jerusalem authorities, under the provisions of the recently promulgated government ordinance for the expropriation of property for public purposes, the appeal urges. The question of clearing the way to

the Wailing Wall was raised some time ago during the tenure of office of former High Commissioner Sir Herbert Samuel but no action was taken at that time.

HITLERITES TO CONTINUE ANTI-JEWISH PROPAGANDA (Jewish Telegraphic Agency,

Munich, Sept. 5 .- The Hitlerites in Bawaria will continue their rabid anti-Semitic propaganda until "the Jewish question is solved" according to decisions adopted at the convention of the Bavarian Anti-Semitic Hitlerite party just concluded here.

Adolf Hitler, the leader of the party, in his address before the convention boasted that the party now has a membership of 100,000, having doubled dur-ing the past two years. Catholic and Protestants will join hands against "the Jewish deadly enemy" and they will not rest until the Jewish question is solved, he predicted.

At yesterday's session the representative of the German Frauenbund, women's association, informed the delegates that this body has reorganized itself under the name the Red Swastika, to carry on parallel work with that of the Red Cross. This action was necessary, she declared, to provide assistance during the "national battle" since all Red Cross stations are filled with Jewish physicians.
