BRAZILIAN CONSUL IN BREMEN, MISTAKEN FOR JEW, ATTACKED BY ANTI-SEMITES

Diplomatic Action by Brazilian Government May Follow
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, September 22.—Senior Paranhos, Brazilian Consul at Bremen, is now in a Bremen hospital where he was taken in an unconscious state because anti-Semitic ringleaders did not know of the adage that appearances are often misleading.

Senior Paranhos was attacked several nights ago in one of the streets in Bremen by a group of Hakenkreuzler who believed him to be a Jew. Of late Bremen streets were unsafe during the night time for all brunettes who may be mistaken for Jews. The youth who was arrested for attacking the Consul pleaded to the police that he had carried out the order of the organization which he has sworn to obey. It is predicted here that the outrage committed on the Consul will have diplomatic consequences.

The same evening a score of persons who appeared to the Hakenkreuzler to be Jews were attacked in the streets of Bremen.

During the Tolstoi Centenary celebration a disturbance was caused by a group of rowdies who attacked one of the speakers, Prof. Lessing, a Jew. Some of the persons arrested by the police frankly admitted that the attack was carried out at the order of the National Social Party.

JUGO-SLAV BISHOPS ISSUE EPISTLE AGAINST RITUAL MURDER AGITATION

Authorities Plan Further Arrests of Agitators

Zagreb, Sept. 22.—The heads of the Greek Orthodox Church in Yugoslavia are preparing to issue an epistle to the members of the Church against the ritual murder agitation. It is understood that the message will declare that there is no foundation for the belief that the Jews may be accused of using Christian blood for ritual purposes. This measure was deemed necessary to pacify the still excited peasant population.

It was further stated today that the Attorney General at Novi Sad has issued further summonses to many inhabitants of Petrovo Selo who are suspected of having caused the agitation with a view of bringing about anti-Jewish violence.

NEW TRIAL OF HOOLIGANS IN THE KAUFMAN CASE OPENS IN MOSCOW

Three New Defendants Held For Torturing Aged Jew
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 22.—The courtroom of the People's Court was crowded when the retrial of the hooligans who tortured the aged Jew, Kaufman, was opened.

The three new defendants, A. Lubimov, I. Zheleznov and A. Zhelesnov, pleaded not guilty and disclaimed their anti-Semitism. When questioned, they admitted they were accessories in the tortures perpetrated on Kaufman.

Golovkin, Lubimov and Lichomanov reiterated the testimony of their previous trial that they were only teasing their Jewish neighbor.

Kaufman in testifying related a touching story of the abuse inflicted on him. He described the events of the night of May 19, when the hooligans bound him with wires about his body and neck, nearly strangling him, and demanded that he turn over to them his daughter.

The neighbor who saw the tortures, testified that Kaufman was afraid to inform the police under threat of his torturers. The witness and two other neighbors were the ones who informed the Ogpu, political police. Further witnesses will be called tomorrow.

The judge of the court is a woman, a former worker. The trial is arousing city wide interest.

JABOTINSKY SAYS LONDON NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR HIS VISA TROUBLES

Will Continue Journalistic and Public Activities

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Paris, Sept. 22.—Declaring himself fully satisfied that at no stage of his endeavor to secure a visa to settle in Palestine did the London authorities attempt to prevent him from doing so, Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the League of Zionist Revisionists, commented on the difficulties he encountered in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent.

Mr. Jabotinsky intends to devote himself to the work of the Judea Life Insurance Company, Ltd, which, he started, embodies the favorite Herzlian idea for insurance funds for Palestine.

A special agreement with the Judea grants him absolute freedom for his journalistic, literary and public activities which he intends to continue energetically, Mr. Jabotinsky stated.

ANTI-JEWISH DISORDERS THREATEN TO EXTEND THROUGHOUT BESSARABIA

Bad Crop Supplies Fertile Soil to Agitators

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Sept. 22.—Serious danger of the extension of anti-Jewish disorders, which began several days ago in Ismail, Bessarabia, to other parts of the province is threatening, according to a despatch from Roumania to the "Neues Wiener Tageblatt."

"Anti-Semitic agitators find fertile soil in view of the bad crop which has affected the peasantry in the province.

A large part of Bessarabia is in danger of a famine, owing to the failure of the harvest and the local social workers are in a state of anxiety. The failure of the harvest has affected five districts. Ackermann, Kaluh and Ismail are severely affected and Kishineff and Bender less severely.

SMALL ATTENDANCE POSTPONES CONFERENCE TO COMBAT ANTI-SEMITISM

Was Called by Organ of Communal Youth

Moscow, Sept. 22.—Due to the small attendance, a conference called by the "Comsomolskaya Pravda," Communist youth organ, to combat anti-Semitism among young workers, was postponed.

Representatives of Communist youth organizations were called to the conference to discuss methods of combatting anti-Semitism in the factories.

The main synagogue of Kertch will be converted into a workman's club in accordance with a resolution adopted by the synagogue members, records the "Krasnaya Kertch." According to the paper, 149 members were present when the resolution was adopted. Only 23 synagogues to the resolution are given.

UNEARTH WALLS OF ANCIENT PALESTINE FORTRESS

Jerusalem, Sept. 22.—The walls of the ancient Palestine fortress, Hazor, a strategic fortification which played an important part in Joshua's campaign for the conquest of Palestine were unearthed during the excavations carried on there. The archaeologists are of the belief that the walls date back to the bronze age, and that the site known as El Tell is the Hazor mentioned in the Book of Joshua.

MICHELSON'S NEW TESTS PROVE HIS SPEED OF LIGHT THEORY

Original Theory Recognized As Basis For Einstein Relativity Theory

The Michelson tests of the speed of light have been substantiated in new experiments just completed at Pasadena, California, Professor Albert A. Michelson, of the University of Chicago, has announced, an Associated Press despatch from Pasadena states.

News of the experiments came as Professor Michelson prepared to leave next Saturday for Chicago, where he will resume his lecture courses at the University of Chicago on October 1.

The speed of light was estimated by the physicist to be approximately 186,284 miles a second. Had the accuracy of the original experiments here two years ago been known then, further tests never would have been necessary, Professor Michelson said.

The scientist came here about a month and a half ago to carry on new experiments. The exact methods of these tests were not revealed.

The original Michelson theory of the speed of light generally has been recognized as the basis for the Einstein theory of relativity. About a year ago other scientists reported tests which tended to contradict Michelson's experiments.

LATVIAN ARMY OFFICER EMBRACES JUDAISM

Riga, Sept. 22.—The Latvian army war officer who received the highest decorations during the war for his country's independence has embraced Judaism. He will soon marry a Jewish girl.

During Rosh Hashanah he attended synagogue here.

IRMA L. LINDHEIM RESIGNS AS PRESIDENT OF NATIONAL HADASSAH

Step Forced by Ill Health, To Remain Abroad a Year

The resignation of Mrs. Irma L. Lindheim from the presidency of Hadassah due to ill health was announced by the organization. Mrs. Lindheim sailed for Europe early in June under doctor's orders.

The Hadassah convention, held a few weeks later, reelected her to the presidency by a large majority.

Mrs. Lindheim returned for a short stay in this country to wind up her affairs and left on September on the S. S. Tuscania for Europe with her family to take up a year's residence in Munich.

MANDATES SYSTEM SATIS- FACTORY SIXTH COMMISSION REPORTS TO LEAGUE ASSEMBLY Public Interest in Development Duly Noted

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Sept. 22.—The Mandates system evolved by the League Covenant for the administration of under developed territories under the guidance of world powers who are entrusted with the administration of these territories as a "trust," works satisfactorily, according to the report submitted to the League of Nations Assembly by the Sixth Commission.

The Commission expressed satisfaction with the general mandates system. It noted the interest displayed by the public in the affairs of the mandated territories. The A and B categories of the mandated territories are to undergo a regime of complete economic equality, the report emphasizes. The Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations is urged in the report to furnish further detailed information concerning the administrations of these territories, so that their problems and difficulties may be solved. With the help of the respective governments, it is hoped that a perfect organization of the mandates system will be completed the Sixth Commission declares.

TO COMPILE STATISTICS ON INTERMARRIAGE AND BAPTISM

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Sept. 22.—Accurate information concerning the number of intermarriages and baptisms among German Jews will be available in the future.

At a meeting of the Berlin Kehillah held Thursday a sum was voted for the establishment of a Kehillah Department of Jewish Vital Statistics, with a special view of combating intermarriage and baptism.

The Council also voted subventions to the Association for the Protection of the Schechita, the Association of Eastern Jews and to the Ort.

TEN DISMISSED IN POULTRY WAR INVESTIGATION WHEN WITNESSES REMAIN SILENT

Intimidation Said To Be Cause of Witnesses' Refusal to Speak

Lack of evidence due to alleged intimidation of witnesses led to the discharge in Gates Avenue court, Brooklyn, of ten men accused by the police of complicity in the bombing of the home of Joseph Hasenfratz, an independent poultry dealer, on August 19. The men were freed by Magistrate Louis H. Reynolds, before whom they were arraigned on charges of malicious mischief.

Both the magistrate and Sylvester Sabatino, Assistant District Attorney, remarked on the intimidation of Hasenfratz and his witnesses by gangsters said to be in the employ of the "poultry trust." Hasenfratz and six witnesses refused to testify against the ten men when they were brought before the court, saying that their lives would be endangered if they did so.

The men who were freed were David Dickman, David Hirshon, Arthur Herbert, Charles Herbert, Joseph Wiener, Meyer Shapiro, Max Kestin, Sidney Rosenstein, Julius Rosenstein and David Kaufman.

ANTI-SEMITES IN GERMAN AVIATION SCHOOL DISCIPLINED

Berlin, Sept. 22.—Those responsible for anti-Semitic actions in regard to their Jewish fellow students in the aviation school under the auspices of the Federal Ministry of Communication were disciplined, declares a statement issued by the department.

Disclosure of the anti-Semitic disturbances in the school was made several days ago by the Socialist organ, *Forwärts*. In reply to numerous press inquiries, the Ministry declared that the mistreatment of Jewish students in the aviation school occurred at the end of June, at which time two of the anti-Semitic ringleaders were dismissed for their action, two left the school voluntarily and several others were suspended for a long time.

INVITE AMERICAN TO ZIONIST "COLONIZATION DEPARTMENT"

Jerusalem, Aug. 28.—It is stated that the Zionist Executive in London has invited Mr. Kreuzer, Prof. Elwood Mead's assistant, to become temporary head of the Zionist Colonization Department in Jerusalem, in order to carry out the consolidation scheme in the new Jewish settlements. Mr. Kreuzer is now Director of Reclamation Economics at the Agricultural Bureau of the United States Government.

The Palestine Zionist Executive has not yet approved this appointment it was learned.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON PALESTINE CALLED IN BOSTON FOR NOVEMBER 11

Dr. Weizmann to be Principal Speaker, Lord Melchett May Be Guest of Honor

The National Conference on Palestine will be held in Boston on Saturday evening, November 10 and Sunday, November 11, according to an announcement issued yesterday by Morris Rothenberg, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the United Palestine Appeal, at headquarters at 111 Fifth Avenue, New York City. Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, who will come here next month for the purpose of forming the Jewish Agency, will be principal speaker at the Armistice Day meeting which will devote itself to a discussion of the problems facing the Jews of America in the upbuilding of Palestine as the Jewish National Home.

It is expected that the Conference will be of great significance in its bearing on the Zionist movement in this country. In addition to Dr. Weizmann, it is said that Lord Melchett will be guest of honor on the occasion, Lord Melchett, who is President of the English Zionist Federation, is Chairman of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission, which recently rendered an exhaustive report on the situation in Palestine.

Harry Sacher, Chairman of the Palestine Zionist Executive, who is in this country for preliminary negotiations with regard to the Jewish Agency will also be present at the Conference to report on the latest conditions in the Jewish Homeland.

Boston was chosen the place for the conference at a meeting of the Board of Directors of the United Palestine Appeal. The delegation from the New England States who urged Boston as the conference city included Elishu D. Stone, Chairman of the National Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization; Louis Shapiro, Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal of New Hampshire; Alex Wagman; Nathan E. Goldstein, Chairman of the United Palestine Appeal for Western Massachusetts, and Robert Silverman, of Boston.

The Boston delegation brought a special invitation for the United Palestine Appeal to hold its conference in Boston from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Boston will open its United Palestine Appeal Campaign on October 28, which will be in full swing at the time the National Conference on Palestine opens.

The conference is expected to take up many important problems affecting reconstruction work in Palestine. It will be the occasion for the election of a new administration, including a Board of Directors, for the United

Southern Notes

(By our Charleston Correspondent)

Charleston, S. C., Sept. 20.—Charleston is a unique "city by the sea." In it the old still predominates over the ever aggressive yet not quite pervasive new order of things. Its citizenry still prefers to walk in the paths of old, figuratively as well as literally. It is claimed to be "the most historic city in the United States," and one hears frequently the proud boast that ours is the "city of beginnings," where many a modern educational and philanthropic institution was cradled or had its prototype.

The same is applicable to those of its citizens who are members of the House of Israel. The Jewish community consists of about 2,500 souls. Nor is their pride without a foundation in fact. Charleston is the only city in the United States in which Jews settled almost contemporaneously with non-Jews; its oldest congregation, K. K. Beth Elohim, organized in 1750, is the only one which has worshipped in one spot for over a hundred and fifty years; its Hebrew benevolent society, which dates back to 1784, and its Hebrew orphan society, founded in 1801, which function to this day, were the first of their kind in American Jewry; and the introduction of English prayers in the ritual and the modification of the Orthodox Sephardic prayerbook as early as 1824, entitles it to the distinction of going down in history as "the cradle of Reform Judaism in America."

The Jewish pioneers, most of whom hailed from England, and were of Spanish and Portuguese extraction, were quickly assimilated by their environment, and left behind them a long and glorious record of achievement in the economic, social and political life of their community. They contributed greatly to its prosperity as traders and planters. They fought in every war before and after the Revolution. They served in every capacity, not excluding that of Governor, their city and state. They participated in every movement for the benefit of their fellow-citizens. It was largely due to their initiative that the Masonic Supreme Grand Lodge of Perfection was founded in 1783 and that Charleston became the "See City" and "Mother Council of the Masonic world." The names of Moses Lindo, Inspector-General of Indigo during the Provincial period; Francis Salvador, the hero of the Revolution; Mordecai Manuel Noah, Judah P. Benjamin, Raphael J. Moses and Peninah Moses, and several others, will ever shine in the annals of American Israel. In the early part of the nineteenth century it was claimed that Charleston possessed "the largest, the most cultured, and the

JEWISH YOUTH THIRSTY FOR KNOWLEDGE KNOCKS IN VAIN AT UNIVERSITY DOORS

250 Refused in Riga; 300 Medical Students Rejected in Lemberg
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, Sept. 22.—Two hundred and fifty students who applied for admittance to the University of Riga were rejected. The cause of their rejection was said to be their insufficient mastery of the Lettish language, one of the several folk languages in Europe which have gained the status of university discipline since the World War.

Ninety Jewish students were admitted to the university.

Lemberg, Sept. 22.—Three hundred applicants, nearly all Jewish, for admission to the medical school of the University of Lemberg were rejected at the beginning of this semester. Of the 120 students admitted, ten are Jewish.

To the law school of the University 541 students were admitted, of whom 126 are Jewish; in the Department of Natural Sciences 227 students were admitted, of whom 55 were Jews.

DUESSELDORF CONTRIBUTES TO HEINE MEMORIAL

Berlin, Sept. 22.—Duesseldorf, Heinrich Heine's birthplace, where the erection of a memorial to the poet was prohibited during the regime of Wilhelm II, has today finally conferred recognition upon its distinguished son.

The City Council in session today voted the first allotment toward the fund necessary for the erection of a Heine memorial in the city.

TO PRESERVE CEMETERIES WHERE COMMUNITIES EXTINCT

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Sept. 12.—A list of all Jewish cemeteries in places where there is a dwindling Jewish population and where there are no longer any Jews left, is to be drawn up, with a view to their preservation, according to a decision adopted at a meeting of the Committee for the Preservation of Jewish Monuments, held here under the chairmanship of Professor Dr. Elbogen. Representatives were present from various parts of the country.

The work will be carried on with the co-operation of the Federation of Jewish Teachers' Organizations. The work will in future be conducted also in close contact with the Archives of the German Jews, the Society for Jewish Monuments in Frankfurt and the various existing Jewish museums. A circular will be sent to the Jewish communities asking them to supply a list of all important monuments and other articles in their possession, with photographs and descriptions. It is intended to issue a volume on the basis of this information.

DEBORAH SANITARIUM TO APPEAL FROM BOARD OF HEALTH DECISION

Case May Go to Supreme Court of
New Jersey for Disposition

Newark, N. J., Sept. 22.—The Supreme Court of New Jersey may be called upon to review judgment of the State Board of Health last week when it denied an application to build the new Deborah Sanitarium for Consumptives in Hopatcong Borough, according to a statement issued yesterday by City Tax Commissioner Louis A. Fast who represented the Deborah Society at the two hearings before the Health Board.

Mr. Fast, in his statement, brought out that satisfactory evidence was offered that the new institution would be built in accordance with the latest methods, that special safeguards would be used in order to insure the health of the surrounding community and furthermore that "the establishment of such institution would not have a serious detrimental effect on the reputation of the community but that rather it would have a reverse effect."

"The Courts of New Jersey," stated Mr. Fast, "have held that a tuberculosis sanitarium is not a menace or a nuisance. We feel certain that with the record as it now stands, that we owe it to Society to present the evidence of the findings of the State Board of Health to the proper tribunal for action. A special meeting of the board of directors of the institution has been called for the early part of next week, at which time it is expected that authority will be given to take this matter to the Supreme Court, where we know that the sinister hands of politicians will have no effect and that the court will see that justice is done.

"Confidently, we expect that the sanitarium will be established at Hopatcong, upon the site so generously donated by Milton M. Unger and his associates. We do not believe that the proceedings will interfere with the plans of the directors."

Mr. Fast cited the fact that T. B. Kidner, reputedly an international authority on tuberculosis sanitarium inspected the site and plans and presented the evidence showing their practicability.

wealthiest Jewish community in America."

To this glory that was Charleston only the beautiful "Hasell Street Synagogue" and the ancient cemetery on Coming Street, both of which attract many sightseeing tourists, still testify. The proud Sephardic community never recovered from the severe blow dealt by the war between the states. Death and removal, celibacy and intermarriage—the "four horsemen" of many a Spanish community—caused drastic changes in the communal life of Charleston Jewry. Until the Civil War, Charleston was the one place where it was a disadvantage to be a German Jew. Thereafter, the proud Kaal Kadosh Beth Elohim found itself compelled to admit into its portals members of the German coreligionists and sometimes even to sanction their becoming members of their thoroughly Americanized homes. These in turn could not long resist the steady invasion of their more ambitious brethren of Russia and Poland. So that now the only distinction between K. K. Beth Elohim of pre-Revolutionary time and its sister congregation Brith Shalom of ante-Civil War days, and even Beth Israel which is a recent offshoot of the latter, is that the former is really Reform and the latter are officially Orthodox.

Though it is no longer what it used to be, Charleston Jewish religious life is by no means dormant. With its three synagogues representing as many shades of Judaism, it has its Temple Sisterhood, its Daughters of Israel, its Jewish Community Center, Local Council of Jewish Women, Dan Lodge of the I. O. B. B., Ladies Hebrew Benevolent Society, Happy Workers, Zionist and Hadassah organizations, a Mizrahi and an Independent Kalmshiner Society, which provide spiritual and when necessary material assistance in times of need, for the local community.

It also exerts a religious influence on the many smaller Jewish settlements up-State. Jews travel hundreds of miles from all over to attend its services at its synagogues during the serv-days, or to enjoy themselves at the annual Purim ball, the proceeds from which go to charity.

Due to the efforts of Dr. Jacob S. Raisin, the Rabbi of K. K. Beth Elohim, numerous congregations have come into being throughout the State, where services and Sunday Schools are conducted every Sunday, and children are confirmed either locally or by going all the way to Beth Elohim, which they regard as the "Cathedral Synagogue" of South Carolina. Charleston is still "a city and a mother in Israel."

And Charleston can still boast a number of Jews who are not unknown to

ANTI-SEMITIC STUDENTS OF ROUMANIA WARN GOVERNMENT AGAINST UNION SUPPRESSION

League of Christian Students Demands Reinstatement

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Bucharest, Sept. 8.—The continued suppression of the League of Roumanian Christian Students by the Government is a constant cause of dissatisfaction, which might well have manifested itself in violent demonstrations at the beginning of the school year, states an official communication which has been issued here by the Central Council of the League, following its recent Congress.

The Council, it proceeds, therefore demands the Government should withdraw the repressive measures against the League, the leading students' organization in the country. The Council, it states, has further decided to enforce the resolution adopted at the Oradeo Mare Congress, according to which members of the Committees of the students' organizations must not, after October 1st, act as members of political parties, and may enrol only in such nationalist organizations which include in their program the demands of the Christian student bodies.

The statement expresses the satisfaction of the Council with the success achieved by the Roumanian delegation at the International Students' Congress in Paris, and thanks the Roumanian delegation and the other delegations which supported it for their efforts.

ENTIRE VILLAGE OF JUDAIZING SECT TO EMBRACE JUDAISM
