BRITISH POLICE INTERFERE WITH JEWISH WORSHIP AT WAILING WALL, YOM KIPPUR

Forcibly Remove Screen Separating
Men and Women Worshipers
Several Injured

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 25.—Palestine Jewry felt highly indignant today as the news spread throughout the country that in the midst of the Yom Kippur prayers before the Western Wall of the Temple, commonly known as the Wailing Wall, the British police of Jerusalem appeared at the Wall and interfered with the services.

Several persons were hurt, including an American Jewish woman, when the worshippers withstood the attempt of Police Inspector Duff, on duty at the Wailing Wall, to remove the screen put up for the services so as to separate the men and women worshippers in accordance with Jewish custom. The congregation assembled before the Wall, a thousand strong, protested against the unexplainable order and clung tenaciously to the screen, as it was forcibly removed. The screen was torn. The interference caused great excitement and the news spread rapidly throughout the Holy City.

Dr. Judah L. Magnes, formerly Rabbi of Temple Emanu-El, New York City, and now Chancellor of the Hebrew University on Mount Scopus, and Mr. Ben Zvi, labor leader, visited the District Commissioner of Jerusalem, Keith Roach, asking for an explanation.

The University dean, in a statement to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, gave as an explanation the lack of space in the laboratories. In other departments of the university, Jews are well represented, he said.

MARCUS SUSSMAN, ZIONIST WRITER, DIES

Berlin, Sept. 25.—Dr. Marcus Sussman, editor of the Zionist news service, Ziko, here, died today at the age of forty-seven.

Death was the result of heart failure. Wide mourning in Zionist and journalistic circles followed the passing of Dr. Sussman.

ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES IN OPPENHEIM, GERMANY, ON KOL NIDRE NIGHT Houses and Stores Attacked; Many Injured

Berlin, Sept. 25.—A pogrom in the Russian manner was perpetrated by a band of 300 Hitlerites upon the Jewish community of Oppenheim Sunday evening when the Jewish population was assembled in the synagogues to usher in the Day of Atonement.

The Hitlerites in trucks passed through Oppenheim, near Mainz. Windows in Jewish stores and homes were broken. The worshippers, who were just leaving the synagogues were attacked and severely beaten. Many were injured, two severely wounded when they were stabbed. The police remained passive, permitting the hooligans to leave the town after perpetrating the outrage.

MOSCOW COURT INCREASES SENTENCES FOR HOOLIGANS IN KAUFMAN CASE

Friends of Defendants Stage Demonstration in Court Room

Moscow, Sept. 25.—Increased sentences were imposed by the Moscow People's Court upon the hooligans who were originally tried in July for the tortures perpetrated on the aged Jewish resident of Moscow, Kaufman.

Following three hours deliberation the court increased the sentence of Lichomanof and Ivan Golovkin from nine months to two years imprisonment; Georgi Lubimov from six months to one year; Alexej Zheleznov and Alexej Lubimov, two of the new defendants, were sentenced to three months at hard labor. Ivan Zheleznov was acquitted.

The defense sought to prove in the trial that the acts were not anti-Semitic but merely hooliganism. The courtroom was crowded with friends and relatives of the defendants. The judge threatened to clear the room if the demonstration staged by the friends of the defendants would be repeated.

During the testimony of Kaufman's wife, when she described the persecution of her husband, she wept and on concluding fainted.

RABBI TROP, DEAN OF RADIN YESHIVAH, DIES

Warsaw, Sept. 25.—Rabbi Naftali Trop, outstanding Talmudic scholar and dean of the Talmudic academy of Radin, died yesterday.

COUNT KLEBELSBERG PLEDGES FURTHER MODIFICATION OF NUMERUS CLAUSUS Promises to Make Law Less Stringent in Budapest and Investigate Abuses of Jews

Budapest, Sept. 25.—Another promise to modify further the practice of the numerus clausus law in the colleges of Budapest was made by Minister of Education Count Klebelsberg to the Hungarian Jewish Liberal Deputy, Pakots.

Deputy Pakots, who was received by Count Klebelsberg to present to the Minister of Education the unanimous resolution of the Budapest City Council asking for the repeal of the numerus clausus law in so far as the capital is concerned, urged that no discrimination be made on grounds of religion.

The Minister promised to make the law less stringent and to institute an inquiry into the reported abuses against applicants of the Jewish faith. In addition, the Minister stated, the soon to be inaugurated liberal education policy will do away with the numerus clausus question.

75 JEWISH FAMILIES IN WEST PALM BEACH DESTITUTE

West Palm Beach, Fla., Sept. 25.—Approximately seventy-five Jewish families are completely destitute as a result of the recent hurricane which swept this section of the country.

The families are now being cared for by a local committee formed for the purpose of again placing them in a position to establish themselves. Funds are needed immediately to assist in the work. H. Gold is treasurer of the Jewish Rehabilitation Committee of Congregation Beth El.

POLICE STOP ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS IN HANOVER

Berlin, Sept. 25.—Anti-Jewish riots started in Hanover Friday night were stopped due to the intervention of the police.

A band of Hakenkreuzler, armed with iron bars and clubs, attacked Jewish passersby, injuring many. The police arrested fifty of the Hakenkreuzler hooligans.

LORD MELCHETT ARRIVES ON HOMERIC TODAY FOR AMERICAN VISIT

**Says Agency Should Confine Itself to
Political Work Only**

Lord Melchett, formerly Sir Alfred Mond, member of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission, will arrive today in New York on the steamer Homeric.

In an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on board the steamer Lord Melchett expressed his opinion that if and when the Jewish Agency is created "its functions are to be confined to strictly political matters. It should not take over executive obligations similar to those now held by the Zionist Executive.

"It is always important to remember," Lord Melchett continued, "that the future of the Jewish Agency depends mainly on the attitude of the British Government."

Speaking on the question of the recommendations of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission, Lord Melchett stated that he believes that these recommendations should be carried into effect immediately, without waiting for the consummation of the Jewish Agency.

WAR INVALIDS INVITE SCHWARTZBAR TO POLAND

Lemberg, Sept. 25. — Sholom Schwartzbard was invited by the Executive Committee of the Union of Jewish War Invalids to visit Poland in connection with its proposal to establish a world union of Jewish war veterans.

A congress of similar bodies in other countries is being planned for the summer of 1929.

SYNAGOGUES OVERCROWDED IN MOSCOW FOR YOM KIPPUR SERVICES

Communist Press Reports Anti-Religious Meetings

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Sept. 25. — While the Yiddish Communist press reports that anti-religious meetings were held throughout the country prior and during Yom Kippur, the synagogues in Soviet Russia's capital were filled to capacity on the Day of Atonement.

Hundreds of Jews stood on the steps and in the street surrounding the Main Synagogue in Moscow, unable to gain admittance to the overcrowded synagogue. Young men and women were much in evidence among the worshippers. The Communist press complains that in many towns the Jewish sections of the Communist party were inactive and some members of the section even attended synagogue.

In Lubavitch, for instance, the papers report, a cantor arranged for a concert of religious songs which was attended by many, including the secretary of the local Communist party, a non-Jew.

WORSHIPPERS AT BUDAPEST SYNAGOGUE IN PANIC

Budapest, Sept. 25. — The large congregation assembled in the Main Synagogue here on Tabakgasse was overcome by panic when, in the solemn atmosphere of the Kol Nidre service, a voice was heard shouting "Seek ye refuge, I am dying."

The worshippers, panic stricken, made a rush for the doors, many women fainting in the aisles. The policeman on guard in the street rushed to the scene and apprehended Ernest Klausner, a retired tax collector who had emitted the cry. It was found that in the midst of the services Klausner had suddenly gone insane. He was taken to an insane asylum.

When order was restored in the synagogue, Chief Rabbi Fischer resumed the services.

COMMUNIST AND ORTHODOX CLASH ON YOM KIPPUR

Lemberg, Sept. 25. — Several arrests were made by the police Sunday evening when a group of Jewish Communists attempted to hold a mass meeting in the neighborhood of a synagogue to campaign against Yom Kippur.

The Orthodox resented the affront and a clash occurred. The meeting was dispersed.

On Monday at noon the Communists made an attempt to interfere with the services in the synagogue and a free for all fight again developed. The police again intervened, arresting several. The synagogues in the city were guarded by policemen during the remainder of the day.

CONGRESSMAN JACOBSTEIN LAUDS SMITH'S STAND ON IMMIGRATION Says Extension of Immigration Would Not Harm Labor

A statement by Congressman Meyer Jacobstein, praising Governor Smith's stand on immigration in this acceptance address, was issued by Democratic national headquarters in New York City. The statement read:

"Governor Smith is a red-blooded American but has a background and a heart which enable him to appreciate and understand the immigrant. He is a statesman and therefore recognizes the importance of protecting labor by placing restrictions on competitive labor that desires to migrate to this country. Placing American interests above all others he naturally must accept the principle of selective as well as restrictive immigration.

"Governor Smith, however, correctly criticizes the present immigration act on the ground that it arbitrarily and unfairly discriminates against certain nationalities. Governor Smith is absolutely sound in condemning the use of the 1890 Census as a basis for admitting immigrants into this country.

"Starting from this position Governor Smith must necessarily throw into the rubbish heap that provision of the present law which would accentuate the discrimination by the position. This absurd immigration policy foisted upon the American people during a Republican administration was so full of dynamite that Mr. Hoover himself has been forced to repudiate it. The fact that this repudiation came during a national campaign suggests that it was done for vote catching purposes. As Secretary of Commerce and as a member of a committee appointed by the President to make recommendations to the President, Mr. Hoover had four years in which to protest against this obnoxious provision of the law.

"Governor Smith, known for his broad sympathies, can be trusted to amend the Immigration Law so as to reduce to a minimum the unnecessary hardships in the administration of this Act.

"Governor Smith's deep interest in Labor's welfare is the only assurance we need that he will do nothing on Immigration or the Tariff which might in any degree lower the standard of living of the American worker."

REPORT SITUATION IN ODESSA DISTRICT IMPROVED

Moscow, Sept. 25. — The situation of the Jewish colonies in the Odessa region is improving, according to a report of the Ort.

The crisis has been passed and despite difficulties ninety new houses have been built. The Soviet government has furnished seed to every settler and a large quantity of food products and forage, the report states.

PRIVATE INVESTMENTS, HOPE OF PALESTINE, DECLARES HARRY SACHER

Reports Increasing Cooperation on
Part of Britain

Optimism for the immediate future of Palestinian upbuilding and praise for the co-operation of the Jewish labor organizations in Palestine in restoring settled conditions were the principal comments made by Harry Sacher, member of the Palestine Zionist Executive, on his arrival here last week for the purpose of conducting preliminary negotiations for the formation of the Jewish Agency.

Discounting talk of disagreements between so-called capital and labor in Palestine, Mr. Sacher emphasized the important part played by the labor organizations in rescuing the Jewish National Homeland from the crisis which had gripped it for two years.

The Palestine Zionist Executive could not have stopped the unemployment without the cooperation of labor. The labor organizations really have authority over their people, and their genuine interest in the progress of the country was shown in their strenuous efforts to solve the unemployment problem, Mr. Sacher said.

Increasing co-operation on the part of the Mandatory Power and a larger interest in economic investments in Palestine by private investors are the causes for the revival of industry in the Homeland together with the efforts of the Zionist organization, according to Mr. Sacher.

"Great Britain has definitely increased its cooperation, in two very important ways. In regard to relief measures, it has been very active. Under Lord Plumer's regime, public projects were inaugurated which provided employment for many Jewish workers.

"One of the causes of the improve-

INCLUDE FUND FOR TRAINING UNEMPLOYED JEWISH WORKERS IN THE SOVIET BUDGET

Moscow, Sept. 25.—An allotment in the Soviet government budget for 1928-1929 to combat unemployment was decided upon at a meeting of the All Russian Praesidium.

Acting on the proposal of the Comzet, the governmental department of Jewish land settlement, the Praesidium decided to assign funds in the budget to train unemployed Jewish workers, particularly in the Western region.

Moscow, Sept. 25.—The efforts of German Jews to aid Jewish colonization in Russia was reported to the Executive of the Ozet, the Jewish land settlement society, by A. Chashin who returned from Germany.

It was decided to send a delegation to Germany in the hope of organizing a delegation of German Jews to Russia to study the Jewish colonization work.

Pittsburgh Notes

Pittsburgh, Sept. 25.—Edgar J. Kaufmann, president of Kaufmann's department store, has been named chairman of the publicity committee of the Welfare Fund of Pittsburgh. He will personally direct the information activities in the campaign for the co-operative financing of more than a score of the leading social agencies in the Pittsburgh district. Assisting Mr. Kaufmann in his county-wide project will be Leo Lehman, a member of the publicity committee.

Pittsburgh will be the meeting site of the next international convention of Aleph Zadek Aleph, junior auxiliary of the Independent Order of the B'nai Brith, according to Meyer Umansky, president of the Pittsburgh section of the A. Z. A., newest chapter of the order.

Swinging into its third year of existence, the Isaac Seder Educational Center of the local Y. M. H. A., headed by Mr. William Kolodney, announces the addition of eighteen new courses to its program and seven new instructors to its faculty. Registrations for the classes, which now number over 100, are now being made, and the semester proper will begin October 1.

Maurice Schneirov, Pittsburgh attorney, has recently been appointed assistant director of the Irene Kaufmann Settlement, one of the oldest social and community centers in the city. He will assist Sidney Teller, resident director.

"The Lando," the first permanent Yiddish Theatre in the city, will officially open Friday evening, September 28, with the showing of "His Jewish Girl," in which William Schwartz, plays a leading role.

Professor Alexander Silverman, head of the department of chemistry at the University of Pittsburgh and one of the leading authorities on glass in this country, returned last week from a three months tour of France, Italy, Germany, Holland, England, Czechoslovakia, Belgium and Scotland, in each of which countries he addressed chemical societies on recent progress made in the manufacture of glass. While abroad Professor Silverman purchased numerous specimens of the glassmakers' art for his own private collection which has been in the making for almost twenty-five years.

OFFICIAL REPORT CONCEALED ANTI-SEMITIC OUTRAGES IN GERMAN AVIATION SCHOOL Berlin Newspaper Makes Public Further Details

Berlin, Sept. 25.—The official report of the German Federal Ministry of Communication concerning the mistreatment of Jewish students in the aviation school concealed the fact, is the charge made yesterday in the newspaper "Montag Morgen."

The newspaper discloses that aviation students belonging to the Voelkische party dragged their Jewish fellow students from their beds at night, bound them hand and foot and subjected them to shameful indignities. The newspaper asks why those responsible for the outrages were punished only by enforced absence of eight days from the school which really amounted to nothing more than a vacation. According to the newspaper the responsibility for the anti-Semitic atmosphere in the school rests with Major Keller, who is a director of the school, and Lieutenant Zeisig. These two have made it a condition for applicants to prove that they are of Aryan origin, but, in order to ward off criticism, have admitted several Jewish students who were the object of the attacks.

LEGAL FIGHT LOOMS OVER \$50,000 REQUEST TO PROPAGATE ATHEISM

Camden, N. J., Sept. 25.—A long legal fight looms over the \$50,000 bequest of the late Aaron Cades, wealthy Atlantic City and Camden, N. J., real estate dealer, for the propagation of atheism. The will left \$2,000 yearly for twenty-five years to "the Atheist Society," or "for the purpose of enlightening the public on atheism."

Both the American Association for the Advancement of Atheism and the Free Thinkers Association have put in a claim for the money. Lewis Liberman, attorney and Edwin Cades, son of the testator, who are co-executors of the estate, have announced that they will not pay the money to either of the societies except under court order, because of the "vagueness" of the bequest.

Aaron Cades died December 14, 1927. His bequest was a surprise, as he was not known as an atheist. His family is active in Beth-El Synagogue, Camden.

JOINT FOUNDATION ASSIGNS NEW CREDITS

Warsaw, Sept. 25.—New allotments for credit aid in Poland were made by the Joint-Foundation.

The amount of \$150,000 was allotted for the Jewish cooperative societies, \$30,000 for the Jewish cooperative bank in Vilna and \$20,000 for the Jewish labor consumers cooperative.

tion of the interference. The Commissioner declared that the police acted at his order, because "the arrangements to convert the Wailing Wall into a synagogue is in contradiction to an existing agreement."

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent learns that the attempt to remove the screen was due to the protest of the Moslem Supreme Council, a religious body which looks askance at Jewish access to the sacred wall.

Col. Frederick H. Kisch, political representative of the Zionist Executive in Jerusalem, called on the Acting High Commissioner H. C. Luke, Monday evening after sunset and lodged a formal protest against the action of the police. The Acting High Commissioner promised to order an inquiry upon receipt of a report from the District Commissioner.

Jerusalem, Sept. 25.—The Chief of Police in Jerusalem, when interviewed this morning by the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency expressed his profound regret at the incident which occurred Yom Kippur morning at the Wailing Wall.

"The police only carried out the order of the District Commissioner. They were compelled to use force because the crowd opposed them. I regret that some persons were hurt," he stated.

The Executive Committee of the Vaad Leumi, National Council of Palestine Jews, has convened a special meeting to consider the matter. A protest was also issued this morning by the Chief Rabbi of Palestine.

SEEKS \$100,000 INDEMNITY FOR STOLEN MANUSCRIPT

Baltimore, Md., Sept. 25.—Loss of an original manuscript on sheepskin, known as "The Seventh Book of Moses," was alleged in a suit asking \$100,000 damages filed Saturday, Sept. 22, in the Superior Court against an insurance company which had issued a policy on the parchment. The suit was brought by Abram J. Mallick against the Sun Insurance Company, Limited of London.

Mr. Mallick's suit alleged that a \$75,000 policy was written about a year ago on the manuscript which consisted of eleven rolls of parchment. According to the declaration, the manuscript was stolen February 10 last from Mr. Mallick's home, 2730 St. Paul Street. It was stated the loss was "by theft, growing out of a burglarious or felonious entry."

The police and the insurance company were notified of the loss, it was asserted, but the company has failed to pay the insurance.

COMMUNIST YIDDISH STATE THEATRE ABANDONS PERFORM- ANCE ON KOL NIDRE NIGHT

Vienna, Sept. 25.—The performance of the Yiddish State Theatre of Moscow, now on tour here, scheduled for Sunday evening, Kol Nidre night, was cancelled at the last moment due to the intervention of the Jewish community of Vienna.

The troupe originally planned a performance for Sunday midday, but later announced that the performance would take place on Sunday evening, it being declared here that the troupe, in accordance with instructions from the Jewish section of the Communist Party, was asked to "behave abroad as they would in Russia."

On the intervention of the leaders of the Jewish community the performance was cancelled. A few persons who turned up at the theatre were surprised to find the doors closed.

ment in the Palestinian situation is the development of industries. Toward this end, tariffs have been adjusted. A really healthy industry is now on its way.

Special praise for those men who are now investing in Palestine after considering the needs and resources of Palestine was given by Mr. Sacher, mentioning two in particular, Mr. Asher Pierce of Montreal, Canada, and Lord Melchett, of England.

"Mr. Pierce represents just that type of person needed in Jerusalem, where, allied with Lord Melchett, he is putting in substantial sums of money, which will not only provide labor with work, but will prove a sound investment. The business reputation of both these men is ample security for this statement."

"The number of Jews on the land is increasing, declares Mr. Sacher, asserting that they are absorbed from the unemployed, whose number is practically depleted. Mr. Sacher also predicted that within a very short time, there would be a shortage of 750 workers, which is a significant figure for Palestine, and which definitely indicates Palestine's recovery."

"Much of the criticism lodged against the British Government is not well informed," Mr. Sacher declared. "It is dangerous to criticize the Government on the premise of wrong principles. It is impracticable to say to the British taxpayer, who is now groaning under the burden of taxes, that the Jews, considered among the richest people in the world, cannot build their own Homeland, and that therefore the British taxpayers should help pay."

The theory that 100 per cent of the immigrants admitted to Palestine should be successful, was characterized as rubbish by Mr. Sacher, who said that the authorities "should admit anybody who has a reasonable chance to win."

Mr. Sacher expressed optimism with regard to the formation of the Jewish Agency, declaring that the Survey Commissioners considered the reconstruction of Palestine "something worth doing" and that they were making every effort to do it.

Asked what were the prospects for additional immigration within the near future, Mr. Sacher stated that the Palestine Zionist Executive had made a request of the Palestine Government for 1,000 certificates for Chaltzim to be distributed over a period of the next six months.
