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THREATEN TO EXPEL LARGE NUMBER OF JEWS FROM CONSTANTINOPLE

Matter Brought to Notice of League of Nations

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Geneva, Sept. 27.—A large number of Jewish residents in Constantinople are threatened with expulsion if they do not voluntarily leave prior to February 6, 1929, it was learned following the discussion by the League of Nations Assembly of the question of the new refugees from Turkey.

The matter was referred to the Nansen Commission for the preparation of a plan. It appears that Kemal Pasha, carrying out his slogan of "Turkey for the Turks," gave notice to all non-Turks who are residents of Constantinople to leave the city before February 6, 1929. A large number of those affected by the order are Jews. The distribution of these refugees among other countries presents a very difficult problem, especially in regard to the Jewish refugees, who were engaged in trade and the professions but are not agriculturists or land workers who might be easily placed elsewhere.

ISMAIL ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES NOT SERIOUS SAYS OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Official Communiqué Says Incident Was of Minor Importance

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Sept. 27.—The anti-Jewish excesses which occurred last week in Ismail, Bessarabia, were not of a serious character, states an official government communiqué issued here.

The events are described as an incident of minor importance. Several drunken peasants broke into the synagogue, attempting to rob the synagogue of valuables. They were, however, halted by other peasants and by the intervention of the police.

NEW LAND PURCHASES NEAR HAIFA MADE BY JEWS

Jerusalem, Sept. 27.—An area of 35,000 dunam in the district of Tul Keren was purchased by Jews, states a report in the Arab newspaper, "Meraat Al Shark." The Jews are becoming the dominating factor along the Jaffa-Haifa coast, the paper complains.

NON-ZIONIST CONFERENCE ON PALESTINE WILL BE HELD IN NEW YORK, OCT. 20, 21

Representatives of American Jewish Will Act on Report of Joint Palestine Survey Commission

The national Non-Zionist Conference Concerning Palestine will be held at the Hotel Biltmore, New York City, on October 20-21, according to an announcement made last night by Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee.

The main purpose of the Conference is to determine the participation of American non-Zionists in the enlarged Jewish Agency, in accordance with the terms of the Mandate for Palestine held by the British Government.

The Conference will act upon the report of the Palestine Survey Commission which was created by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, and Mr. Louis Marshall, representing the non-Zionist elements, for the purpose of framing a comprehensive and systematic program for the future upbuilding of Palestine and for the guidance of a reorganized Jewish Agency.

The commission responsible for the experts' report submitted in London last June was a bi-partisan body consisting of Felix M. Warburg, Lord Melchett (Sir Alfred Mond), Dr. good K. Frankel, and Oscar Wasserdatter, president of the Deutsche Bauhe Berlin.

At the forthcoming Conference one of the Biltmore there will be reprobate of the leading elements of America's Jewish community not actively identified with the Zionist movement. Lord Melchett, Lucien Alfred Mond, who arrived in Foreign country, will in all probability participate in the Conference.

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, is expected to arrive here from Haifa on October 1 and will participate in the Conference.

PALESTINE JEWRY PLANS UNITED ACTION ON THE WAILING WALL INCIDENT

Government Issues Official Explanation; Protest to League

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 27.—United action on behalf of Palestine Jews to deal with the problem of Jewish access to the Western Wall of the Temple, known as the Wailing Wall, accentuated by the Yom Kippur incident, will be the result of a joint meeting of the Zionist Executive, the National Council of Palestine Jews, the Ashkenazic and Sephardic Chief Rabbis and representatives of the Kehillahs in Jerusalem, Haifa, Tel Aviv, and other towns held here today. A special committee to deal with the problem was appointed.

A protest to the Secretariat of the League of Nations at Geneva was despatched following the meeting.

The meeting also decided to issue a call for mass meetings to be held throughout the country today at 5 p.m. when work is to be suspended.

An official statement issued by the government today explains that the Moslems protested against the screen as well as the placing of other articles of furniture by the worshippers at the wall, "contradicting an existing law against the government Western Wall, but against the sense and national sensibilities of the Jews of the world. Whatever the official explanation may be, there is no escape from the fact that an official whose sense of duty is so obtuse as to invade a sacred place while it is being used for a sacred purpose is not fit to occupy a public office. There is no room in the Jewish National Home for such an official."

OVERSUBSCRIBE SAN FRANCISCO WELFARE FUND

San Francisco, Sept. 27.—The Jewish National Welfare Fund of San Francisco, incorporating the annual contribution of the San Francisco Jewish community to national and international Jewish philanthropic and cultural agencies, exceeded its \$260,000 campaign by ten percent. It was declared at the conclusion of the drive yesterday. This was termed the most successful effort of Jewish character in the past four years.

Leon Sloss, Jr. was director and Richard Gutstadt, assistant director, of the campaign. The fund represents all Jewish organized effort in this community and includes rabbinical seminaries, the B'nai Brith Wider Scope Campaign, national hospitals and other beneficiaries.

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DEMOCRATS MAY CHOOSE N. STRAUS, JR. FOR LT. GOVERNOR

Nathan Straus, Jr., former New York State Senator, is likely to be nominated by the Democratic Party as candidate for the Lieutenant Governorship for New York, it was said yesterday in Democratic party circles.

The likelihood for his nomination will be increased in case the Gubernatorial candidate of the party is not a Jew.

It is felt that Mr. Starn was chosen in the Main Synagogue of Bucharest.

A boom has been started by Democrats for Philip B. Perlman for Mayor of Baltimore in 1931.

Mr. Perlman's work as City Solicitor in the administration of Howard W. Jackson, former Mayor, following a term by the former as Secretary of State of Maryland makes him an ideal candidate for the Mayoralty, his supporters urge.

The amount of \$15,600 was raised for the new synagogue planned by the Beth Israel Congregation of Worcester, Mass., at a special meeting. Samuel Grace is president of the congregation. The required amount is estimated at about \$75,000.

It is planned that the new building will house an assembly hall, smaller meeting rooms, class rooms for a Hebrew School and a large main synagogue room.

The first week of the campaign in Detroit for \$100,000 for the Cleveland Jewish Orphan Home brought \$62,000. Adolph Finsterwald, chairman of the drive, expressed confidence that the entire sum will be raised.

The drive was endorsed by Fred M. Butzel and George W. Gurnea, both of whom are members of the campaign committee.

Charles A. Smith is secretary of the campaign committee. Adolph "Daddy" Freund, who has been a member of the board of directors of the Cleveland Orphan Home for many years, is the honorary chairman of the campaign.

**CITY APPROVES SITE
AND MODEL FOR HAYM
SALOMON MONUMENT**

Life Size Statue of Polish Jewish Patriot to be Chief Figure

Final approval of the model of the monument to Haym Salomon, of the Polish-Jewish patriot of the American Revolution, has been given by the Art Commission of New York City, it was announced by Benjamin Winter, president of the Federation of Polish Jews. Mr. Winter also announced that Parks Commissioner Herrick has approved the site at Broadway and Sixty-sixth Street which has been selected for the location of the statue.

The monument will follow the design submitted by Anton Schaaf, New York sculptor. The main figure of the memorial will be a life-size statue of Salomon. A semi-circular exetera, depicting with six bas reliefs in allegory the historical period in which the American-Jewish Revolutionary patriot lived, will complete the figure.

"The sanction of the Park Commission and Arts Commission," Mr. Winter stated, "marks the culmination of efforts stretching over nearly a century to honor this great patriot. As far back as 1850, a bill was introduced in Congress asking that governmental recognition be given to the service rendered by Salomon in helping to grow the Revolution. UKRAINIAN AGRICULTURE
MINISTER CONTRADICTS
REPORTS OF STARVATION

Jews Not Starving in the Ukraine, He Insists

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

London, Sept. 14. — M. Schlichter, the Ukrainian People's Commissary for Agriculture and chairman of the All-Ukrainian Committee for Jewish Land Settlement, has in a statement circulated by the Soviet News Agency "Tass," categorically denied the statement made at the London Conference of the Federation of Jewish Relief Organizations alleging that the Jewish population of the Ukraine is suffering to such an extent that it is dying of hunger.

"The bad crop in the Steppes of the Ukraine," Schlichter declares, the "Tass" says, "has left the population of the Jewish localities almost entirely untouched."

"As regards Jewish agriculturists living in the Steppes of the Ukraine, the relief measures taken by the Ukrainian Government entirely guarantees them not only from the danger of hunger but from economic desolation. The Government has allotted a sufficient quantity of seed, and I can say quite definitely that the sowing of winter crops in the famine districts, including those occupied by Jewish agriculturists, will not be less than last year.

"Food and forage relief is given to Jewish agriculturists and, first of all, the new settlers, for which purpose the Government has assigned scores of millions of roubles."

The All-Ukrainian Committee for Jewish Land Settlement also categorically declares that no danger of famine threatens the Jewish population and still less the Jewish colonies of the Southern Ukraine.

The report referred to was circulated by the Federation of Ukrainian Jews in London on the basis of a memorandum by A. Bragin of Moscow, a prominent figure in Moscow government circles.

LORD MELCHETT IN U. S. ISSUES STATEMENT ON THE JEWISH AGENCY

Says Membership in Survey Commission Does Not Bind Him to Join Agency

Upon the arrival of Lord Melchett on the steamer Homeric Wednesday afternoon, the full text of his authorized statement to the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on board the steamer was available. The statement read:

"I am not sure whether I shall enter the Jewish Agency if such is formed. The Joint Palestine Survey Commission of which I was chairman is a matter different from the Jewish Agency. It should, therefore, not be assumed that by signing the Commission's report, I also considered myself obliged to participate in the Agency.

"The constitution of the Agency has never been officially put before me and I was never consulted on it, so I actually don't even know its constitutional functions and purposes. However, it is my definite opinion that if a Jewish Agency is created, it should limit itself as a diplomatic body only and should not undertake any executive obligations similar to those of the Zionist Executive.

"The most important thing to remember is that the future of the Agency depends mainly upon the attitude of the British Government toward it. The development of Palestine is going quickly and will continue faster due to private undertakings in which many non-Jews are also interested," Lord Melchett declared.

ZIONIST EXECUTIVE ISSUES STATEMENT ON WALL INCIDENT

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 27.—The Zionist Executive here issued the following statement on the incident at the Wailing Wall on Yom Kippur.

"The entire Jewish world learns with profound regret of the disturbances which occurred in Jerusalem. These deplorable incidents speak for themselves." The Executive reserves further comment pending the receipt of fuller information.

Two years ago, the statement goes on, the whole question, involving deep Jewish sentiments, was brought to the notice of the mandatory power of the League of Nations. The Executive expresses hope that means will be found to put an end by common consent to the position which is now causing great concern. It earnestly trusts that the question will receive serious consideration.

When the Nations Assemble Minorities Present their Needs and Views

(By our Geneva Correspondent)

Geneva, Sept. 12.—An important step in the right direction seems to have been taken by the League of Nations in its treatment of the problem of National Minorities. The question has received a great deal of attention at the ninth ordinary session of the Assembly of the League now being held at Geneva, and it is not at all unlikely that the suggestion of establishing a Permanent Minorities Commission under the League of Nations will bear fruit and lead to the creation of such an organ within the near future.

Mr. Zahle, who was elected President of this session of the Assembly, received a deputation of representatives of the International Federation of League of Nations Unions, who urged him to sponsor the creation of a permanent commission to deal with the minorities question coming before the League of Nations. The deputation was headed by Professor Aulard, the noted French historian, Sir Willoughby Dickinson, the Chairman of the Minorities Commission of the Federation, and Professor Ruysen, the Secretary-General of the Federation. After Prof. Aulard had submitted the resolution adopted by the Federation at its convention last July in The Hague, Mr. Zahle expressed his appreciation of the work accomplished by the Federation and his readiness to have the more important resolutions of that organization published in the official journal of the League of Nations Assembly.

While there is reason to hope for good results from the work of the Federation in the near future, as far as all the national minorities are concerned, the problem of the Jewish minorities presents one difficulty which was made the subject of a memorandum presented to Sir Eric Drummond, the Secretary-General of the League of Nations, by Mr. Lucien Wolf on behalf of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Board of Deputies of British Jews and the Anglo-Jewish Association. The memorandum points out that up to 1923 national associations found the same access to the Council of the League, when presenting petitions, as international associations; but that recently imposed limitations had narrowed down considerably the scope of petitions relating to the execution of minorities treaties, which could be addressed to the Council; and that Jewish minorities were consequently deprived of many opportunities to make known to the Council whatever grievances should be brought to its attention. This was due mainly to the fact that the Jews had no international organization as a community, and that practically all the leading Jewish societies interested in the work of the League are local and national, i.e., either British, or German, or whatever other national.

ZIONIST ORGAN TERMS WAILING WALL INCIDENT UNPARDONABLE OFFENSE

New Palestine Calls Police Interference Act of Brutality; Asks for Dismissals

The "New Palestine," organ of the Zionist Organization of America, protests strongly against the action of the Jerusalem police at the Wailing Wall on Yom Kippur in an editorial headed "An Unpardonable Offense," in its issue which will appear today. The editorial states:

"The interference of the Jerusalem police with the Yom Kippur services at the Western Wall was an act of brutality, and the official responsible for the disturbance should be removed from his post forthwith. It is irrelevant to discuss whether technically the Police Commissioner had the right to order the removal of the screen which separated the women from the men worshippers at the Kotel Ma'aravi. It is irrelevant to adduce an old statute that the Wall should not be used as a synagogue. The roughness which attended the execution of the Police Commissioner's order on the most sacred day in the Jewish calendar, in the capital of the Jewish National Home, was an indecent act which has outraged the sensibilities of every Jew throughout the world.

"The Western Wall has been used by Jews as a place of worship since time immemorial. The most sacred Jewish memories are associated with this historic site. To defile the place on Yom Kippur was an offense not only against the worshippers at the Western Wall, but against the religious and national sensibilities of the Jews of the world. Whatever the official explanation may be, there is no escape from the fact that an official whose sense of duty is so obtuse as to invade a sacred place while it is being used for a sacred purpose is not fit to occupy a public office. There is no room in the Jewish National Home for such an official."

pursuant to the Mandate which shall consist of a Council and an Executive Committee in both of which bodies there shall be substantial non-Zionist representation of responsible American Jewish organizations.

The next step was the designation by Dr. Weizmann and Mr. Marshall in June, 1927, of a body of experts under the leadership of four commissioners. The experts, who conducted an extensive investigation of the resources and economic conditions of Palestine, included Sir John Campbell, formerly vice-chairman of the Greek Refugee Settlement Commission; Dr. Elwood Mead, United States Commissioner of Reclamation; Professor J. G. Lipman, director of the New Jersey State Agricultural Experiment Station; Professor Frank Adams, of the University of California; Mr. C. Q. Henriques, late of the Public Works Department of the Government of India, an authority on irrigation; Mr. Knowles Ryerson, Horticultural Adviser to the Government of Haiti; Mr. A. T. Strahorn, of the Bureau of Soil, U. S. Department of Agriculture; Dr. Leo Wolman, Labor Adviser to the Amalgamated Clothing Workers' Union; Professor Milton J. Rosenau, director of the School of Public Health at Harvard University; and Dr. Charles F. Winsky, Deputy Commissioner of Health of the City of Boston.

"This gathering of representative non-Zionists from all over the country," declared Mr. Marshall, when interviewed on the subject of the Conference, "is a momentous event in the history of American Jewry. It is the culmination of five years of negotiations between leading non-Zionists and Zionists.

"The hour has come for the Jews of this country to adopt a definite course of action concerning Palestine," continued Mr. Marshall. "The problem of the Holy Land has long since passed the stage of theoretical discussion. The status of Palestine has been politically defined through the British Mandate and the action of the Great Powers. It will be recalled that in 1922 the Congress of the United States unanimously endorsed the British Mandate for Palestine, favoring the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people.

"The enlarged Jewish Agency is not a matter of speculation or of aspiration. The Mandate for Palestine, provisionally recognizing the Zionist Organization as the Jewish Agency, specifically provides that 'it shall take steps in the consultation with His Britannic Majesty's Government to secure the cooperation of all Jews who are willing to assist in the establish-

ionality the or that particular Jewish minority happens to be identified with.

The memorandum expresses the hope that the Council will restore the equality of the national and international associations in the matter of access to the Council. It seems now as if the generally serious attention paid to the minorities problem by the present session of the Assembly will result sooner or later in the realization of this hope.

Mr. Beelaers van Blokland of Holland addressing the fourth plenary meeting of the Assembly on the 5th of September, made the following remarks about the problem of the minorities:

"A proposal for the institution of a Permanent Minorities Commission deserves consideration. An organization of this kind would involve certain risks, but in view of the manner in which the Permanent Mandates Commission had fulfilled its task in dealing with petitions, it might be possible to set up a similar organization and to surround it with the necessary guarantees."

Mr. Motta, representing Switzerland at the Assembly, declared that the Swiss delegation would follow with great sympathy any movement which followed the suggestions of the Dutch delegate. Switzerland rejoiced, he said, when she found in the peace treaties concluded after the World War guarantees for minorities. Respect for religious convictions, for language and customs, was something sacred. Though minorities might be required to show wisdom and moderation, minorities must equally be required to display equity and justice. As a citizen of a country where majority and minority had cooperated on the most perfect footing of equality, he felt that he was perhaps justified in saying that the impartial application of the treaties concerning the rights and guarantees of minorities was and remained a central problem for all those who sought to achieve the higher objects of the League of Nations.

Dr. Seipel, the Austrian Chancellor, who participates in the deliberations of the present session of the Assembly, declared that the formal right of minorities as introduced into the system of international law by the treaties after the War was of a rudimentary and im-

"The non-Zionist Jews of America have been called upon to lend their cooperation in the work of upbuilding Palestine. It will be the task of the Conference next month to define our responsibility in unmistakable terms and in accord with our position as loyal American citizens. The Jews of America who are not Zionists have a right and a duty to say what we shall do with regard to Palestine and its development, and the Conference next month will say it with authority."

A solemn procession of Jews to the Wailing Wall is being planned for next Tuesday. It is expected that thousands will take part in the march.

adequate character, and that the minorities question has therefore assumed now an international scope. It was essential, he said, that the rights of minorities, such as the right to remain attached to their mother-tongue and to the manners and customs of their ancestors, and to the origins of their special civilization, and the right to live openly and with impunity as members of their own race, should definitely enter into the universal conscience of mankind, whether they were fixed by treaties or not, and that they should receive sanctions in accordance with the normal procedures of international law.

In spite of the discordant note struck at the same meeting by Mr. Zaleski, the Polish delegate, there is reason to believe that the present session of the Assembly has taken a long step in advancing towards a more satisfactory solution of the minorities problem, in so far as it lies within the power of the League of Nations.

The Jewish aspect of the problem has been championed, among others, by Dr. Leo Motzkin, who has always insisted upon the needs of a Permanent Minorities Commission under the League of Nations.

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
