PALESTINE JEWRY PROTESTS WAILING WALL INCIDENT BY CESSATION OF WORK

Demand Return of Holy Site to Jewish People

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Sept. 29.—Fifteen thousand men and women in Tel Aviv and 10,000 here participated in the street demonstrations which took place Thursday afternoon to protest against the action of the Jerusalem police, interfering with the Jewish worshippers at the Wailing Wall on Yom Kippur, and to demand that the Wall held in reverence by Jews throughout the world as the only surviving monument of the Temple, be returned to the Jewish people.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at a joint session the preceding day of the Zionist Executive, the National Council of Palestine Jews, the Chief Rabbinate and other bodies, all work was suspended Thursday at 5 P.M. and traffic was halted by Palestine Jews. Public meetings were held in the towns and colonies, where resolutions were passed demanding of the British Government and of the League of Nations to return the Western Wall to the Jewish people. During the demonstrations, many of the marchers shouted "Down with the police," "Down with the District Commissioner." The notes of "Hatikvah" rang on as the marchers passed in the street.

On Friday delegations of the various mass meetings called on the local authorities to present the text of the resolutions adopted. An impressive scene was enacted at the Jerusalem mass meeting where the Radzimirer Rebbe, Chassidic Rabbi of Poland who is now on a visit here, wept when he ascended the platform to speak on the incident.

Eighteen Arabs were arrested Thursday in the neighborhood of the Jewish colony Nachlat Jacob on charges of assault against two Jewish colonists who were attacked while ploughing. One of the colonists, Shapiro, was gravely injured.

PERMIT HITLER TO SPEAK IN PRUSSIA

Berlin, Sept. 29.—Adolf Hitler, notorious anti-Semitic leader, will again have the opportunity of preaching his gospel of anti-Jewish hatred in Prussia. The government has lifted the ban against Hitler's public appearance which had been imposed since 1923.

ROUMANIAN JEWISH CHILDREN NOT EXEMPT FROM SABBATH WRITING

Government Rejects Petition Signed By 150,000

Bucharest, Sept. 29.—Jewish children attending Roumanian public schools cannot be exempt from writing on Saturday.

Minister of Education Angelescu rejected today the petition submitted to the government by Chief Rabbi Schorr and signed by 150,000 Roumanian Jews, asking for this exemption on the ground that to compel the children to write on their Sabbath is contrary to their religion. Angelescu declared that the observance of the Sabbath is not "a question of conscience but of form."

GREEK GOVERNMENT TO CONTINUE SUBVENTION TO THE JEWISH SCHOOLS 1,200,000 Drachmas is the Present Allotment

Salonica, Sept. 29.—The new Greek cabinet will continue the state subvention to the Jewish schools in Greece, the new Minister of Finance assured a Jewish delegation which called upon him. The Minister readily agreed to the request of the Jewish delegation that the subvention granted the Jewish schools by the previous cabinet be continued. He ordered the immediate payment of 400,000 drachmas on account, the total subvention amounting to 1,200,000 drachmas. An additional 100,000 drachmas will be granted for the Jewish schools in Jannina.

ALBERT OTTINGER NOMI- NATED FOR N. Y. GOVERNOR

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 29.—Albert Ottinger, for the past four years Attorney General for the State of New York, was this afternoon nominated as the Republican candidate for the Governorship of New York State.

The nomination was made by acclamation at the Republican State Convention in session here.

Mr. Ottinger is the first Jew to be nominated for Governor of New York since the late Oscar Straus ran for that office on the Progressive ticket in 1916.

ANGLICAN CHURCH ASKS QUOTA LAW TO REGULATE CANADA IMMIGRATION

Do Not Want Non-British Immigrants to Number More Than 50%

Montreal, Sept. 29.—The Council of the Anglican Church in Canada, at its annual meeting held in Hamilton, adopted a resolution urging the regulation of immigration to Canada in such a way that at no time will the number of non-preferred Continentals bear a greater ratio to the British immigrants to Canada than fifty per cent. In its resolution the Anglican Church endorsed the resolution passed recently by the Social Service Council of Canada at its annual meeting in Montreal, in which it was urged upon the Canadian Government the necessity that the number of immigrants to Canada from non-preferred countries of Europe should be limited to "a reasonable proportion of the British immigrants admitted during the previous year."

Although the application of a quota law in connection with non-British immigration, and particularly immigration from unpreferred countries in Central Europe, was discussed by the Canadian Parliamentary Committee on Agriculture and Colonization some time ago, the report issued in this connection by the Canadian Department of Immigration contained no recommendation in this regard.

Canon D. W. Vernon, general secretary of the Social Service Council of the Anglican Church of Canada, greatly deplored this fact at the annual meeting and urged the adoption of the resolution favoring restriction of non-British immigration.

The Anglican Church in other resolutions voiced its friendship for other religious bodies in Canada and also expressed its desire to aid foreign-born residents of the Dominion.

PROF. ASKENASI TO REPRESENT POLAND AT LEAGUE

Warsaw, Sept. 29.—Professor Simon Askenasi, the famous Polish Jewish historian, will be appointed Poland's representative to the League of Nations.

Prof. Askenasi held this post some time ago by appointment of the Paderewski government. When the National Democrats came into power he was recalled from Geneva because of an anti-Semitic campaign conducted against him.

VISCOUNT ALLENBY

ARRIVES IN NEW YORK FOR AMERICAN VISIT TOMORROW

Luncheon to be Tendered Him by
Jewish Leaders

Field Marshall Viscount Allenby will arrive in New York tomorrow on the Majestic. Viscount Allenby, who is accompanied by Lady Allenby, will be the guest of the American Legion at their annual convention at San Antonio, after which they will make a month's tour of the United States.

Nathan Straus, Rabbi Stephen S. Wise and Judge Julian W. Mack are tendering a luncheon on Thursday, October 4, at the Lawyers Club to Viscount Allenby, conqueror of Palestine.

In addition to the remarks of the hosts and Viscount Allenby, the Hon. John W. Davis, former Ambassador to Great Britain, will speak.

JUDEA TO INCREASE

CAPITAL TO \$5,000,000

The Judea Industrial Corporation of New York which owns and controls the Judea Life Insurance Company of New York, has called a meeting of the stockholders for Wednesday, October 3, for the purpose of voting on a proposition to increase its capital stock.

The present capital of the Judea Industrial Corporation is composed of 40,000 shares at the par value of \$25. It is proposed to increase the number of shares by 160,000, so that the total number of shares will be 200,000, representing a par value of \$5,000,000.

FREDERICK WARBURG HEADS NEW YORK FEDERATION'S CAMPAIGN THIS YEAR

Group Raised Sum of \$87,910,556 in
Twelve Years

Organized Jewish charity, through the affiliated agencies of the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, has spent \$87,910,556 during the twelve years since the Federation was founded, according to a statement yesterday by Frederick M. Warburg, newly appointed associate chairman of the \$5,300,000 campaign to be conducted next month by the organization to meet the 1928 budgetary needs of its ninety-one societies.

Of this sum, Mr. Warburg's report showed, Federation's contribution, which represents the amount raised for the general public, has been \$42,974,450. This amount includes the budgetary allotment of \$4,879,143 for the current year, to secure which it is estimated that \$5,300,000 in pledges must be secured.

Statistical data regarding the part which the Jews of New York have played in the philanthropic affairs of the community will be submitted tomorrow night, at the Hotel Plaza, when councilmen and division heads of the Business Men's Council of the Federation will meet Mr. Warburg at dinner to effect a campaign organization for the forthcoming campaign.

The appointment of Frederick M. Warburg, eldest son of Felix M. Warburg, as associate chairman of the 1928 fund-raising appeal for \$5,300,000 to be made next month by the Federation was announced by Sol M. Stroock, president of the Federation.

As chairman of the campaign, Mr. Warburg will be the youngest man ever selected by the local Jewish community to head a drive of such magnitude. The elder Mr. Warburg, now the chairman of the Federation board, was the first president of the Federation and one of its founders in 1916. His grandfather, the late Jacob H. Schiff, also was a founder of the Federation.

The new chairman is a member of the board of directors of the Jewish Social Service Association and of the Ninety-second Street Young Men's Hebrew Association, both of which are among the ninety-one constituent agencies maintained by the Federation. He is also a member of the board of directors of the Boy Scout Foundation of Greater New York, the National Playground and Recreation, Better Times, Beekman Street Hospital and the International Migration Service.

Mr. Stroock, in commenting on the appointment of Mr. Warburg, said, "Federation, in true Jewish fashion, renews her youth like the eagle. So we have called again upon an outstand-

CATHOLIC MOTHER'S REFUSAL TO GIVE CHILD JEWISH ED- UCATION NO DIVORCE GROUND

Vienja Court Rules in Mixed Mar-
riage Case

Vienna, Sept. 29.—Refusal by a mother to give the child, offspring of a mixed marriage of a Jew and a Catholic, a Jewish education is no ground for divorce; insulting remarks made by the wife in reference to the Jewish origin of her husband are deplorable but are likewise no ground for granting the decree. This was the decision of a Vienna court in a suit which attracted wide attention here.

The husband, Otto, complained that he married his wife Paula when they were both atheists. After the marriage his wife returned to the Catholic faith and had their six year old child baptized against her husband's will. She also repeatedly threw up to him the fact that he was a Jew. The court ruled, however, that on these grounds a divorce could not be granted, as "a Catholic mother is entitled to refuse to grant a Jewish education to Catholic children."

NATHAN STRAUS DECLARES FOR GOVERNOR SMITH

The Democratic National Committee headquarters in New York City made public a letter from Nathan Straus addressed to John J. Raskob, chairman, in which Mr. Straus declares himself as favoring Governor Smith for President. The letter read in part:

"I believe that Governor Smith's election will not only go far to down the evil spirit of un-American intolerance which has been showing its head in this country, but will at the same time insure the re-establishment at Washington of a government that will give first consideration to the health and welfare of the people of the country."

"We in New York, who know him, respect and love Governor Smith. We are proud that the Nation is beginning to know him as we do. Governor Smith has been a symbol of the possibilities of American Democracy to millions of our people, regardless of politics, race or creed. I hope that his splendid career will culminate in his triumphant election to the Presidency of the United States."

U. S. RABBIS CONDEMN YOM KIPPUR INCIDENT AT WAILING WALL

Rabbinical Assembly Asks Mandatory To Protect Jewish Rights

A resolution calling upon the Palestine Government and Great Britain, as the Mandatory Power for Palestine, to exert their efforts in restoring Jewish rights at the Wailing Wall at Jerusalem, was adopted Saturday night at a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly of the Jewish Theological Seminary. The resolution read in part:

"We are profoundly shocked by the reports that have reached this country that the Jerusalem police interfered with the peaceful religious services of the Jews at the Wailing Wall on the Day of Atonement. The space before the Wailing Wall has for centuries been regarded as the most sacred place of prayer for Jews, and we are amazed that the Jerusalem police should have interrupted the services there on the Holy Day of the Jewish year. The Rabbinical Assembly trusts that the Palestine Government and the Mandatory Power will see to it that those responsible for this sacrilege are properly dealt with, and that the rights of the Jews to the space before the Wall be made so explicit that such outrages may never again occur."

The Union of Orthodox Rabbis in the United States and Canada, in a call issued by Rabbi Selzer, Secretary, urged its members to address their Congregations on the Succoth holiday on the Wailing Wall incident and to urge action for the redemption of the Wall.

DR. BLUESTONE RETURNS FROM PALESTINE

Dr. E. M. Bluestone, Director of Hadassah Medical Organization in Palestine, who has been there for three and one-half years returned to New York on the Acquitalia on Friday.

The Hadassah health program in Palestine, which includes four hospitals, eighteen infant welfare stations, eighteen pre-natal and post-natal clinics and a training school for nurses, was under the supervision of Dr. Bluestone. Through him, the newest American methods in school hygiene and general work were introduced into Palestine and the Near East.

Prior to his appointment as director of the Hadassah Medical Organization, he was the assistant director of Mount Sinai Hospital in New York City.

Rabbi Samuel Horowitz, rabbi of the Micklo Kodesch Congregation, Baltimore, for more than forty years, died Wednesday at the Sinai Hospital.

Born in Russia, Rabbi Horowitz, who was 76 years old, came to this country about 45 years ago. One of the first to organize the Micklo Kodesch Congregation, he had been the only rabbi of the congregation.

Court Orders Investigation of Bedouin Claims to Caesarea Land

London, Sept. 19.—The claims of a number of Arab Bedouins to land in Barrat Caesarea, near Haifa, for which the Jewish Colonization Association (Ica) holds a concession from the Palestine Government, are to be enquired into by a Commission which has been appointed by the Haifa Land Court, before which the case came up.

The Arabs claim 32,000 dunams of land, which they say they have been cultivating for fifty years. The Government representative contended, however, that the Arabs cultivated at most an area of only 800 dunam. The Commission appointed by the Court will investigate on the spot the extent of land which has actually been under cultivation by the Arabs, so that the Court should be able to deal with the claim.

The dispute over this land has been dragging for years, and has caused violent disturbances, as in February 1927 when a mob of Arabs led by Vadie el Bustani, a member of the Palestine Arab Executive, uprooted two thousand eucalyptus trees planted by the Ica.

Bustani was afterwards ordered to pay a heavy fine for instigating the attack. It has also repeatedly formed the subject of discussion before the meetings of the Permanent Mandates Commission.

It was as far back as April 1914 that the Ica entered into an agreement with the local authorities concerning the marshes at Athlit and Kabbara, which, according to the Mandatory Power, were registered in the name of the Ottoman Government. The local authorities had approved the project in principle and at the outbreak of war awaited an endorsement by the Government of Constantinople. After the war negotiations were reopened between the Ica and the Palestine Administration.

In November 1921, the Ica was granted the concession under which it obtained on lease from the Palestine Government for a period of 100 years, renewable under certain conditions, the marshes of Athlit and Zor Kabbara, the swamps of Mallaha and the sand-dunes of Caesarea, together with the hills and adjacent lands, pledging itself to commence within the course of three years and to continue within the course of eight years the following works: to drain all swamps; to cultivate all lands which are cultivable; to afforest all hills and stony land. Within the course of twenty years the Ica undertook to reclaim and plant all sand-dunes. All minerals and ores found on these lands belong to the Government. Also the right to exploit the mines and quarries belongs solely to the Government.

For the first 33 years, the Ica is to pay the Government £50 annually for

\$138,000 SHARE OF AMERICAN COMMITTEE IN HEBREW UNIVERSITY BUDGET

To Give Physician's Post Graduate Course Under Dr. Bluestone

A budget of \$138,000 was adopted by the American Advisory Committee as its share of the general budget of the Hebrew University in Palestine. At the meeting of the Board of Governors of the University in London last June, a budget of \$276,000 was adopted for the academic year 1928-29, an increase of \$50,000 over the budget for last year.

At the meeting of the American Advisory Committee, at which Felix M. Warburg, chairman, presided, Mr. Harry Sacher of the Palestine Zionist Executive was present as a guest and reported informally on the progress of the University. Members of the Committee present at the meeting included Dr. Cyrus Adler, Dr. S. Benderly, David Bressler, F. Julius Fohs, Dr. David Kaliski, Dr. S. Lowenstein, Dr. Emanuel Libman, James Marshall, Leon Moisseiff, Samuel Rosensohn, Sol Rosenbohm, Bernard Semel, Dr. Roger Straus, Dr. Israel Straus, Dr. I. S. Wachler.

The Committee announced that a special physicians' post graduate course will be given under the auspices of the Hebrew University and the Hadassah Medical Organization by Dr. E. M. Bluestone, Director of the Hadassah in Jerusalem. The course will be planned for two groups, general practitioners and specialists.

A preliminary announcement of the organization of the new Faculty of Humanities has also just been issued by the Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the University, in preparation for the opening of the fall semester. The Faculty will be composed of the Institute of Jewish Studies, the School of Oriental Studies, and the newly established courses in Philosophy, History and Letters. During 1928-29 instruction will be given in Talmudic Philology, Gaonic, Hebrew Jurisprudence, Modern Hebrew Literature, Palestine Jewish Sociology, Arabic Literature, Islamic History, Islamic

FINLAND MINISTER RAPPOR- TEUR MANDATED TERRITORIES

Geneva, Sept. 29.—Hjalmar Procope, Foreign Minister of Finland, was appointed rapporteur for Mandate questions during the coming year. Minister Procope was chairman of the last session of the League of Nations Assembly.

In an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here, Mr. Procope stated that he has a full understanding of the Zionist idea and sympathizes with the movement. He also mentioned that there is no Jewish question in Finland; where equal rights are accorded all citizens.

Art, and Archaeology, Modern Philosophy and Theory of Knowledge, Hellenistic History, Greek Literature. Preparatory classes in Greek, Latin and Arabic will be organized.

The admission requirements for entrance to these courses will be a matriculation certificate or an equivalent diploma from a recognized secondary school. Further qualifications will be required for admission to particular courses, such as advanced Hebrew knowledge for Jewish Studies. Post-graduate research students are admitted to all departments of the University.

Permits to enter Palestine can be obtained through the University on condition that the application has been accepted as a regular student of the University. He must arrange for a guarantee by a recognized financial institution in Palestine in the amount of \$180 to cover the responsibility for three years incurred on his behalf by the University, towards the Immigration authorities in Palestine, the Committee announced.

ZIONISTS CONSIDER ORGANIZING PROPAGANDA (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Sept. 29.—Carrying out the resolution of the Zionist General Council at its recent Berlin session, the Zionist Executive called a meeting of the Commission on Propaganda and Organization to inquire into organization and propaganda problems. An experts conference will be called, the results of which will serve as a basis for proposals to be submitted to the next Zionist Congress.

Zionist bodies wishing to express their opinions on these matters have been called upon to communicate with the Executive.

DEBORAH SANITARIUM CASE TO BE BROUGHT TO COURT (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Newark, N. J., Sept. 29.—The board of directors of the Deborah Jewish Consumptive Relief Society decided to institute proceedings in the Supreme Court of this State, for a review of the decision reached last week by the State Board of Health denying the application for a new sanitarium at Hopatcong Borough.

This was announced today by City Tax Commissioner Louis A. Fast, who together with Philip T. Scholl'nd and Milton M. Unger, both of this city, was selected to represent the society's interests in the court proceedings. Mr. Unger is one of the donors of the hospital site.

Athlit, £50 annually for Mallaha, £30 annually for Caesarea, and in addition two piastres per annum for every dunam of sand-dunes and five piastres per annum for every dunam of non-sandy land. For the remainder of the lease period (67 years) the Ica is to pay in advance an annual sum to be fixed at the time. Five per cent. of the profits derived from the salt industry in the district belongs to the Government. The Ica will also have to pay all duties, the Ottoman public debt (on salt), land duties, customs.

The total area of the Kabbara Concession is about 10,000 acres. The entire Arab population of the whole area previously consisted of some 170 families comprising 840 persons. Seventy-five families claim that they have been dispossessed without compensation.

The Mandates Commission in its Reports on the claims has found that the statements of both parties (Arabs and Government) are very contradictory and somewhat confused. The representative of the Palestine Government contended that the complaint of the Arabs concerning the manner in which they had been compelled to give up their land in this area was mainly of a political nature. The Government insisted that this work of reclaiming and settlement, which is a heavy burden on the Ica, should be carried out in the general public interest.

DEREE SECOND FAST WHEN TORAH IS DROPPED YOM KIPPUR

Prague, Sept. 29.—The Jewish population in the town Vrable Slovakia, observed a second Yom Kippur on Thursday.

The rabbis decreed a fast day because the Torah Scrolls taken out of the Ark for the reading of the appropriate chapter at the Neila services, were accidentally dropped. Jewish stores were closed all day Thursday and a twenty-four hour fast was observed by the congregation.

B'Nai Jeruhana Community Center of New York City will be formally opened on October 7th. Dr. Israel Goldstein, Rabbi of the Congregation, will officiate.

An art exhibition will be held at the Center during the month of October. During the exhibition a bust of Mayor Walker will be unveiled. The bust is now in preparation by Enrico Glicenstein, who hopes to have it ready for exhibition soon.

Mrs. Nettie Goldsmith Naumburg, widow of the late Aaron Naumburg who died on June 29th at Montecatini, Italy, arrived in New York Friday on the "Roma," with the body, which will be buried in Mount Pleasant Cemetery on October 2nd.

MORRIS SCHINASI LEAVES \$1,000,000 TO FUND HOSPITAL IN SMYRNA

Morris Schinasi, cigarette manufacturer, who died on Sept. 10 leaving \$5,000,000, has bequeathed \$1,300,000 to charity, according to his will filed yesterday.

Of that sum \$1,000,000 will go to establish a hospital at Magnesie, his birthplace, near Smyrna. The institution will be called the Morris Schinasi International Hospital. Of the bequest \$200,000 will go to the cost of erection and the remainder to the upkeep.

He listed bequests also of \$20,000 each to the following hospitals: Beth David, Bronx, Sydenham, Lebanon, Beth Israel, Knickerbocker, St. Vincent's, St. Joseph's, Lenox Hill and St. Elizabeth's.

Bequests of \$10,000 were listed to the following: New York Guild for Jewish Blind, National Association to Prevent Blindness, Beth Abraham Home for Incurables, Lakeview Home for Jewish Unmarried Mothers, Staten Island; Hudson Guild, Columbus Hill Day Nursery Association for the Aid of Crippled Children, Institute for Crippled and Disabled Men, Mary M. Osborne Memorial Home Association and the Institute for the Improved Instruction of Deaf Mutes.

The widow, Mrs. Laurette Schinasi of No. 1165 Park Avenue, New York City and three daughters, get the residue of the estate.

Contributions in the amount of \$23,222 were announced by Mayor Benjamin H. Namm, Chairman of the Pre-Campaign Committee of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities which will soon launch its Twentieth Anniversary Appeal for \$1,035,000.

Among the contributions to the general Pre-Campaign Fund was \$2,500 from Paul Block, publisher of the Brooklyn Standard Union.

A new house of worship for Bnai Zion Congregation is to be erected in Chattanooga at a cost of \$150,000, it was announced following a meeting of the members.

S. H. Frank has been chosen chairman of the committee which has launched a drive for funds to erect the old synagogue.

While it is agreed that the old synagogue property will not be utilized as the site of the new building, no definite decision as to the location of the new one has been reached. Several sites are under consideration.

By the will of Alex. Bernheimer, filed for probate, a trust fund for the benefit of hospitals and orphan asylums in New York is to be created. One bequest of \$10,000 is to revert to the fund. The amount of the residuary estate which will constitute the trust fund was not made known.
