WEIZMANN CONFIDENT JEWISH AGENCY WILL BE FORMED DURING HIS U. S. VISIT

Differences Not Irreconcilable, He Says on Eve of Sailing

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 9.—Confidence that his forthcoming visit to the United States will result in the final consummation of the Jewish Agency was expressed by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, when interviewed by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency on the eve of his departure tomorrow for America.

"I do not regard the differences existing between the decisions of the Zionist General Council and the recommendations of the Palestine Survey Commission as being of an irreconcilable nature. I feel that the American non-Zionists are willing to participate in the work for the upbuilding of Palestine and help toward its success. I hope to settle matters definitely during my present visit to the United States and to finally bring the Jewish Agency into existence," The Zionist leader stated.

Dr. Weizmann added that he intends to call a meeting of the Zionist General Council by the end of December 1928 to act upon the results of his present American trip.

CHANCELLOR POSTPONES PALESTINE ARRIVAL

London, Oct. 9.—Sir John Chancellor, new High Commissioner of Palestine, who was to have assumed his duties this month has postponed his departure for Palestine. He is expected to arrive there next month.

PALESTINE WOMAN PIONEER DIES AT 95

Jerusalem, Oct. 9.—Rachel Lea Gissin, one of the founders of the colony Petach Tikvah, died yesterday. She was 95 years old and was a pioneer settler in Palestine.

COMMUNISTS HOLD CONFERENCE ON ANTI-SEMITISM

Moscow, Oct. 9.—A conference on combating anti-Semitism in Soviet Russia was held at the All Russian Communist Club here.

Judge Stelmachovitch of the Moscow District Court reported to the conference that during 1928 seventy persons were given disciplinary punishment in Moscow for anti-Semitic propaganda. Among the seventy were five members of the Communist party.

CONGRESSMAN CELLER OBJECTS TO MARSHALL'S RECALLING HOOVER'S PART IN PINSK

Marshall Replies; No Jewish Question At Present Campaign Juncture, He Says

Congressman Emanuel Celler in a statement to the Jewish Daily Bulletin took exception to Mr. Marshall's statement recalling the intervention of Herbert Hoover to prevent further bloodshed in connection with the killing of thirty-five Jews by a Polish detachment when it entered the city of Pinsk in 1919. To recall the incident at this juncture, Congressman Celler asserted, "involves the dragging of the misery and suffering of the Jews into the campaign."

Mr. Marshall, commenting upon Mr. Celler's objection, declared that "there is no Jewish question at the present juncture." What he said about Mr. Hoover has been frequently recalled by him, long before the present campaign on other public occasions.

"The statement of Mr. Louis Marshall appearing in the New York Times, through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, which statement is a reproduction of a portion of a radio speech heretofore delivered, in my humble judgment is unfortunate and partisan," Mr. Celler declared. "If Mr. Marshall had made this statement months ago, or after election, he then could not have been charged with partisanship. It is perfectly laudable to praise Mr. Hoover for his excellent work as the head of the American Relief Association, but to do so at this juncture and time it on the eve of an election, involves the dragging of the misery and suffering of the Jews into the campaign."

MOROCCO JEWS CLAIM WAILING WALL AREA

Jerusalem, Oct. 9.—Sensational reports in the Palestinian press added a new angle to the Wailing Wall question which continues to agitate the public mind.

It is claimed that when the Sultan of Morocco purchased the property surrounding the wall, he dedicated it to the whole Moroccan community in Jerusalem, which includes the Moroccan Jews. A group of Moroccan Jews living in Jerusalem have now put in a claim for a part of the area. The service of a noted Arab lawyer was engaged by the group to press its claim.

TEL AVIV APPOINTS COMMISSION TO INVESTIGATE ATTACK ON YIDDISHISTS

City Council Adopts Resolution of Protest

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Oct. 9.—A commission to investigate the attack made on the Poale Zion Club during its celebration of the twentieth anniversary of the Czernowitz conference proclaiming Yiddish as a national language was appointed by the Tel Aviv municipal council. A resolution protesting against the attack was adopted by the City Council.

The attack was made by members of the youth organization, G'dud Magainei Ha'safiah, which has for its purpose the protection of the Hebrew language.

JEWISH TEXTILE WORKERS IN POLAND ON STRIKE

Warsaw, Oct. 9.—A large number of the Jewish textile workers in the district of Lodz went out on strike, demanding an increase of wages. The general number of strikers, including Jewish and Polish workers, is estimated to be 80,000. The Jewish textile unions of Warsaw have declared a sympathy strike, which is extended to other industrial centers. The Warsaw government is taking a hand in the situation in an attempt to settle the dispute.

TO GRANT OR NOT TO GRANT, WELSHMEN'S PROBLEM

London, Oct. 9.—To grant or not to grant a loan to a Jew who has been a resident of Cardiff, Wales, for twenty-five years, is the question which now occupies the attention of the Rural Council of Cardiff.

The Housing Committee failed to agree on the principle involved in granting a building loan to a Jew who has been a resident in Cardiff for twenty-five years and referred it to the Rural Council. Some members of the council stood by the opinion that the applicant was to be considered an alien, while others said it did not matter as long as he was a "decent fellow." Unable to reach a decision the matter was referred back to the Committee.

J. GRONICH, ROUMANIAN JEWISH EDITOR, DIES

Czernowitz, Oct. 9.—J. Gronich, editor of the Czernowitz Jewish weekly, "Der Sotnik," died here yesterday. He was forty-nine years old.

ORIENTALIST CONGRESS

ENDORSED ARABIC CONCORDANCE OF HEBREW UNIVERSITY
Official Recognition Offered Work Prepared under University Aegis

The School of Oriental Studies of the Hebrew University announces that the concordance of classical Arabic poetry which is now being prepared under its direction, was officially recognized by the International Congress of Orientalists, states an announcement of the American Advisory Committee of the Hebrew University, of which Felix M. Warburg is chairman.

The Arabic section of the Congress, at the session held at Oxford passed the following resolution.

"That this section of the Congress has heard with great satisfaction of the progress made by the four scholars appointed by the Hebrew University in the Concordance of Arabic poetry up to the end of the Omayyad period, and wishes the work every success." The Concordance was begun in 1926 and is written in Arabic. References are given in Latin characters, which are familiar to both Moslem and European scholars.

43,581 JEWS LIVE IN

JAFFA AND TEL AVIV
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Oct. 9.—The Jewish population of Tel Aviv and Jaffa numbers 43,581, according to a census taken during the month of September. The population of Tel Aviv proper is 36,574. The number of Jewish men in the two towns is 21,607. There are two centenarians.

According to countries or origin the Jewish population is divided as follows: 33,920 Ashkenazim, 6,256 Sephardim and 3,154 Yemenites.

CLEVELAND U. P. A. DRIVE OPENS OCTOBER 14

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cleveland, O., Oct. 9.—With a quota of \$125,000 as its goal, the United Palestine Appeal will be launched here on October 14. Dr. I. M. Rubinov, executive director of the U. P. A., will be the principal speaker at the opening rally. The campaign is headed by George K. Klein as chairman and S. J. Bialosky, David S. Kohn and Mrs. Edmund Herzog as vice-chairmen. The drive will last ten days and on Oct. 24, the drive will close with a banquet at which Dr. Chaim Weizmann, president of the World Zionist Organization, will be the principal speaker.

In a message issued on the occasion of the opening of the Cleveland drive, W. K. Hopkins, Cleveland City Manager, urged the Jews of the community to participate in the United Palestine Appeal drive, and said:

"Among all the amazing and fascinating movements of our time, none is more striking or appealing than the movement to make Palestine once more a worthy expression of the genius of the Jewish people.

"It is not strange that the mere possibility of such a movement stirred the imagination and commanded the cooperation of scholars and statesmen like Lord Balfour and Lloyd George. No one familiar with the history of religion and civilization can be indifferent to it.

"But to every Jew the Palestine appeal should come as an opportunity to prove himself worthy of his inheritance and to have a full share in the work of establishing for all the world new and visible proof of the great quality of a great people."

"And get it," was chosen as the slogan of the drive.

IMMIGRANT BOY WINS MAYOR'S SCHOLARSHIP

Philadelphia, Oct. 9.—An eighteen-year-old Jewish boy, who arrived from Russia only five years ago, has won the scholarship offered by the Mayor of Philadelphia for four years' free tuition at the University of Pennsylvania, and the State scholarship of \$100 a year during his college years.

The boy is Morris Sander. In one year he completed the fourth, fifth and sixth grades at the elementary school, in another two years he had graduated from Junior high school, receiving the American Legion award, and then he went to Northeast High School, where he won the two scholarships. Now he is taking a pre-engineering course at the university. Simultaneously with his public high school studies he attended Hebrew school, and worked in the afternoons and on Saturdays in his uncle's fruit store.

PROF. BADE TO RESUME PALESTINE EXCAVATIONS

Berkeley, Calif., Oct. 9.—Dr. William F. Bade, director of the Palestine Institute of the Pacific School of Religion, will leave here in December with his party, to resume his excavations at Tell-en-Nasbeh, eight miles north of Jerusalem, where last year he unearthed an ancient city believed to be the Biblical Mizpah of Benjamin. This will be Dr. Bade's third expedition, and he expects to remain until next August.

As the result of Dr. Bade's former expeditions, the Palestine Institute has the most varied single collection of Israel pottery ever found in Palestine. On his last expedition, Dr. Bade uncovered an ancient Israelite temple, built over a still earlier structure which dates from the time of David about 100 to 600 before the Christian era. Ancient wine jars were found in an artificial cave and the handle of one of the jars bore the Hebrew word "Mizpah" which confirmed Dr. Bade's earlier belief that he had discovered the site of Benjamin's Mizpah.

PROFESSOR MANN RETURNS TO HEBREW UNION COLLEGE

After a fifteen month's absence, Dr. Jacob Mann, professor of Jewish history and literature, will return this month to the Hebrew Union College. Dr. Mann was professor at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem and carried on research work in the libraries of St. Petersburg, Moscow and Cairo during his absence from the college.

Dr. Nelson H. Glueck, three times winner of the Mrs. Henry Morgenthau Traveling Scholarship, is the sole adduction to the Hebrew Union College faculty. He will teach Hebrew and Bible. He has been studying in Germany and Palestine since his graduation from the College five years ago.

POLES PLAN AMELIORATION OF PINK MARSH REGION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Oct. 9.—An association for the amelioration of the Pinsk marsh region, constituting one-twelfth of Poland's area, was formed here.

The organizers of the enterprise, which involves great expenditure, are Poles. Jewish leaders are taking little interest in the matter. It is not expected that when ameliorated, the land would be available for Jewish settlement.

On October 12, 13, 14, 1928, Temple Mt. Sinai of El Paso, Texas, of which Rabbi Martin Zelikson is the rabbi, will celebrate the thirtieth anniversary of its charter. Rabbi Edzar F. Marenin of Los Angeles, Calif., will be the guest speaker for the three day celebration, which will end with a conventional dinner. A. Schwartz is president of the congregation.

ISSUES ORDER TO EXPEDITE ADMISSION OF DECLARANTS' WIVES AND CHILDREN

Commissioner of Immigration Makes
Public Text of Order
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Oct. 9.—Steps to expedite the entry into the United States of the wives and children of aliens who have been legally admitted to this country for permanent residence have been taken in an order issued by the Commissioner General of Immigration, Harry E. Hull, under the Immigration Act of 1924, as amended by the Joint Resolution of Congress approved May 29, 1928.

The order, which was made public by Commissioner General Hull, provides that such aliens may have their entry into the United States verified in order to aid American consuls abroad in passing upon applications of the aliens' wives and children for immigration visas.

The full text of the order follows: General Order No. 112. Subject: Verification of arrival of lawfully resident aliens for information of consuls in considering applications of certain relatives for immigration visas.

The Immigration Act of 1924, as amended, provides in part:

(1) That a status as nonquota immigrant extends to the wife and unmarried children under 18 years of age of ministers and professors who were admitted as such, if following to join them.

(2) That a preference in the issuance of immigration visas to persons skilled in agriculture extends to their wives and dependent children under 18 years of age if following to join them.

(3) That a preference extends to the wives and unmarried children under 21 years of age of alien residents of the United States who have been lawfully admitted for permanent residence.

In order to assist American consuls in determining if the husband or father of the above-mentioned classes has been lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, Form No. 575 should be furnished to such husband or father upon application, said form to be filled out by him and mailed to the immigration officer in charge at the port or place of his last entry, accompanied by postage stamp or stamps sufficient to send verification to the American consul designated on the forms.

Immigration officers at the port or place of arrival will check with "X" items that cannot be verified or that are omitted and if such defects or omissions are such as to justify non-verification the notation "not verified" will be placed by means of a rubber stamp in bold letters across the face of the lower part of the form reserved for verification. Bernhard Baron's Trust Fund for
Charities

(By our London Correspondent)
London, Sept. 20.—Bernhard Baron, whose previous benefactions to charities amount to more than a million and a quarter pounds, has transferred the sum of £575,000 four per cent. consolidated loan to trustees, creating "The Bernhard Baron Charitable Trust for Hospitals and Asylums for Orphans and Crippled Children." During a period of twenty years from the present time the trustees shall in every year apply such part of the capital and income of the fund as they shall think fit for the benefit of the institutions described—namely, hospitals of various kinds and homes or institutions established for the care of orphaned or crippled children. The trust fund is so arranged that during the next twenty years the total amount available for distribution shall be approximately the same each year. The annual distribution is to take place on December 5, each year, this date being the anniversary of the birth of Mr. Baron.

Mr. Baron stipulates under the trust deed that the moneys available for distribution shall be applied in the proportion of seventy-five per cent among Christian and undenominational hospitals, homes and asylums, and twenty-five per cent among similar institutions under Jewish control.

The administration of the trust is entrusted to the Marquis of Reading who is to be chairman of the trustees; Mr. Baron's son, Louis B. Baron, who is the vice chairman; Albert I. Belfisha, a director of the Metropolitan Railway and a prominent figure in connection with Jewish charities; W. H. Loudon, and Edward S. Baron, directors of Carreras, Ltd. and H. W. Danbury, secretary of Carreras, Ltd. Mr. Baron's firm. The first distribution of moneys will take place on December 5 next, when Mr. Baron will attain the age of seventy-eight years.

be returned to the applicant without letter of transmittal, together with the stamp or stamps sent. If the form is received without the required stamp or stamps the notation "necessary postage lacking" will be placed thereon, in bold letters, and the form then returned to the applicant without letter of transmittal.

When verification is made the form shall be completed, with appropriate notation if advisable under the heading "remarks," and sent to the American consul at the place designated. The date of verification and the consulate to which it is sent shall be noted on the manifest.

IGNORANCE CAUSED MASSENA INCIDENT SOUTHERN PAPER SAYS

Louisville Times Declares Mayor
Should Leave Office

Commenting upon the Massena incident, the "Louisville (Ky.) Times" wrote editorially:

"The allegation Mr. Hawes appears to have swallowed was propaganda of the Middle Ages, employed to beat up sufficient sentiment to cause wholesale murders of Jews, for robbery and other purposes. Such propaganda has been employed in modern times in parts of Eastern Europe. Its definite purpose in its beginning was promotion of murder. Its effect at all times has been to breed crimes of violence.

"A Mayor irresponsible enough, or ignorant enough to lend himself to the propagation of a charge which is provocative of lynching should get out of office. Failing to get out, he should be put out.

"Massena will suffer grievous and lasting ill advertisement if, assuming that its Mayor cannot combat successfully the charge that he acted on the assumption that Jews require the blood of Christian children for holy day rituals, the Mayor is not removed. The town will become famous as a seat of abysmal ignorance, where the population upholds the Mayor in an exhibition of ignorance which surpassed that of provincial towns in the remotest corners of Russia."

AGRICULTURE BANK EXTENDS CRIMEA SETTLERS' DEBT

Moscow, Oct. 9.—The debts of the Jewish settlers in the Eupatoria region, Crimea, were extended following negotiations between the Comzet, the central governmental department for settling Jews on the land, and the government of Crimea.

Similar negotiations are now being carried on toward extending the time limit on debts of settlers in the regions of Simferopol and Jankoy.

TEL-AVIV SCHOOL NOT RECOGNIZED BY BEIRUT UNIVERSITY

Jerusalem, Oct. 9. — The American University at Beirut has discontinued to admit graduates of the Gymnasia Ivrit, Tel Aviv Hebrew High School, according to a report published today in the "Doar Ha'yom," Palestine Hebrew daily.

JEWISH LABOR GROUPS HOLD SPORT FESTIVAL

Warsaw, Oct. 9.—Eight hundred athletes from thirty cities participated in the sport meet arranged Sunday by the Jewish labor party, Bund. The events took place at the sport field of the Polish Socialist Party in the presence of a large number of spectators. After the games a parade to the Jewish quarter was held.

urally have the effect of inspiring similar statements laudatory of Smith and his splendid service on behalf of the Jews and thereby the so-called 'Jewish question' is squarely in the campaign. That is deplorable and I register the hope that both Democrats and Republicans will refrain from these kind of utterances." Congressman Celler concluded.

Mr. Marshall, in commenting on Congressman Celler's objection, said: "I am surprised that Congressman Celler, who in season and out of season expresses himself with regard to public men and permits his political views to radiate in all directions, should object to my having in the course of a radio speech given testimony to the human qualities of Mr. Hoover as the result of my own observation. What I said regarding his work as the head of the American Relief Administration has been on frequent occasions publicly expressed by me long before the present campaign.

"There is no Jewish question at the present juncture. I have been frequently obliged to take Mr. Celler to task for his attempts to inject Jewish matters into politics. Nobody has objected more strenuously and consistently than I have to the recognition of a Jewish vote, for there is none. I am happy to say that the Jews have always exhibited independence in politics. Does the Congressman mean to infer that I may not speak in favor of the candidate of my party, support his policies and give evidence of my admiration of his character? It would seem from recent occurrences that free speech is to be confined to a selected few."

MOSLEMS SILENT ON WAITING WALL DEMANDS

Jerusalem, Oct. 9.—The members of the Moslem Supreme Council who were received yesterday by Acting High Commissioner Luke to present their demands concerning the status of the Waiting Wall, issued no statement about the results of the interview except to say that they were satisfied.

I. E. Bloch, of Houston, Texas, Secretary of the Texas Zionist Association, has been invited by the general chairman of the American Legion Convention, to join the committee which is to receive and entertain General Allenby, during his visit to San Antonio. Lord Allenby is one of the distinguished guests of the national convention of the American Legion, and will be one of the principal speakers at the opening session. Mr. Bloch, who will welcome General Allenby on behalf of the Zionists of Texas, was a member of the Jewish Legion which fought in the Holy Land under Allenby's command.

recently erected by Carreras, Ltd. It is requested that no appeals should be addressed to Mr. Baron personally, either to his business or home address, as owing to his advanced age he finds it impossible to attend to them.

It was authoritatively estimated lately that Mr. Baron had given to charity more than £1,250,000, so that the present gift probably brings the total close to £2,000,000.

He gave £15,000 last July towards the cost of rebuilding the premises of the Bernhard Baron St. George's Jewish Settlement, the gift being supplementary to one of £50,000 for the same purpose last November, making a total of £65,000. His other benefactions include £11,500 to the Liberal Jewish Synagogue in London, £10,000 to the London Jewish Hospital, £10,000 to the Hebrew University in Jerusalem, £7,000 to the London Jewish Hospital and Orphan Asylum, £5,000 to the Bal-four Forest Fund, £2,500 to the London Jewish Maternity Home, £35,000 to the London Hospital for the Bernhard Baron Pathological Institute, £10,000 each to the Middlesex Hospital, Royal Sussex County Hospital and Royal Westminster Ophthalmic Hospital, £4,500 to the Mansion House Fund for the Relief of Miners' Families, £2,500 each to the Hove Hospital and King's College Hospital, and £2,000 each to Guy's Hospital, St. Thomas's Hospital and St. Bartholomew's Hospital.

For several years past Mr. Baron has celebrated his birthday by making generous gifts to hospitals, orphanages, and other charities, and he has said that he finds the greatest happiness in life in using his wealth in an endeavor to relieve suffering and bring brightness and cheer into the lives of the less fortunate.

He gave, to celebrate his seventy-seventh birthday last year, an extra week's salary to each of his employees, and presented more than £32,000 to 200 philanthropic institutions.
