LORD MELCHETT NOT PREPARED TO COMMIT HIMSELF ON JOINING JEWISH AGENCY Says He Must Await Clear Definition of Agency Function and For- mation of Personnel

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, Oct. 11—While not opposing the creation of the extended Jewish Agency he is not prepared to commit himself as to his becoming personally a member of that body until its functions are clearly defined and until the personnel is indicated, Lord Melchett, who was on a visit here yesterday declared in an interview with the correspondent of the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

The interviewer came to seek light on the attitude of Lord Melchett, who was a member of the Palestine Joint Survey Commission, toward the proposal for the extension of the Jewish Agency, it being at the time understood that the recommendations of the Joint Survey Commission were drafted "for the guidance of the Jewish Agency." The question was prompted by the publication in "The Day," New York Yiddish daily, of an interview with Lord Melchett purporting to be a detailed explanation of the short statement authorized by Lord Melchett on board the steamer Homeric to the representative of the Jewish Daily Bulletin and published in the Jewish Daily Bulletin of September 28. The interview in the "Day" was published under the caption: "Lord Melchett Comes Out Against Jewish Agency," while in the authorized statement he declared "I am not sure whether I shall enter the Jewish Agency if such is formed." The Day's text of the interview also included criticism of the Zionist work in Palestine and of the

HUNGARIAN JEWISH COMMUNITY SUES EX-EMPRESS ZITA FOR SYNAGOGUE SITE Was Promised to Community by the Late Emperor, Franz Josef

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Oct. 11—Zita, the late Empress of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, will be the defendant in a civil suit brought against her by the Jewish community of Promontor, near Budapest, on the basis of a promise made to the community by the late Emperor, Franz Josef.

According to the claim, Franz Josef is said to have twice repeated his promise to grant a site at Promontor for the erection of a synagogue. When the trustees demanded the allocation of the site, the ex-Empress refused to grant it.

In a statement published in the "Wiener Journal," Count Hunyady, chief chamberlain of the former Empress, declares first, that ex-Empress Zita, not being a legal heir to the late Emperor Franz Josef, cannot be held responsible for his estate, and secondly, that the site upon which the community lays its claim, has been sold long ago.

KOSHER QUESTION FURTHER EXCITES LONDON CROWD

London, Oct. 11—A crowd of two thousand Jews were dispersed by mounted police when they gathered in front of Dubovsky's Restaurant in Whitechapel, demonstrating against the alleged sale by the restaurant of non-kosher meat as kosher.

The windows of the restaurant were broken by the mob, the second to storm the restaurant since the charge was brought against it. Mounted police charged through the crowd before they were dispersed.

DISAPPOINTMENT IN DELAY OF NEW IMMIGRATION RULES

Warsaw, Oct. 11—Several hundred applicants for preferential visas within Poland's immigration quota have arrived here from various parts of the country. Wide disappointment was caused when it was learned that the United States Consul in Warsaw has delayed the application of the new immigration regulations, giving preference within the quota to certain relatives of United States citizens and declarants. The applicants believed that the new regulations would come into force on October 1.

SOVIET EDUCATION COMMISSAR ADVISES JEWS TO FUSE IN RUSSIAN MELTING POT Lunatcharsky Contradicts Earlier Statement on Hebrew Language Schools

Moscow, Oct. 11—The advice of Anatol Lunatcharsky, Soviet Commissar of Education, to the Jews in Soviet Russia is simply to fuse themselves in the melting pot of the union of Socialist Soviet Republics.

In a lecture Lunatcharsky gave last night in Leningrad on the question of anti-Semitism, he contradicted his previous statement that the Soviet Government would permit the establishment of schools with Hebrew as the language of instruction if there were agreement among the Jews on the question.

The "Krasnaya Gazeta," Leningrad newspaper, reporting the lecture quotes Lunatcharsky as having said: "The solution of the Jewish problem in Russia lies in the fusion of the Jews in the great melting pot of the peoples who inhabit the Soviet Union. Those members of the Jewish bourgeoisie who desire to leave Soviet Russia for an Anglo-Jewish state can go there.

"We won't permit the opening of schools in Hebrew, a dead language. We will combat the relics of the Middle Ages, the Schneersohnovschina (referring to the religious activities of Lubawitsche Rebbe, Schneersohn, who is now in exile in Latvia). Our path is the fusion of all peoples and the opening of brotherly arms to the Jewish proletariat and intelligencia." Lunatcharsky declared.

Moscow, Oct. 11—The Moscow "Emes," Yiddish Communist daily, published a report several days ago that subsidies for the maintenance of the Yeshiva, Talmudic Academy, at Nevel, Government of Vitebsk are being transmitted to Russia by Jews from abroad through the Lubwattsche Rebbe, Rabbi Schneersohn. This Yeshiva supplies the Jewish communities in Russian towns with rabbis, melamidim and schochetim, even sending some abroad, the paper complains.

JEWESS FIRST WOMAN DISTRICT ATTORNEY IN RUSSIA

Moscow, Oct. 11—V. Zeitlin, a Jewess, was appointed District Attorney for the government of Tula. She is the first woman to be appointed district attorney in Soviet Russia.

TEL-AVIV YIDDISH LECTURE CANCELED DUE TO PROTESTS

Tel Aviv, Oct. 11—A Yiddish lecture announced for today by Zerubabel, labor leader from Poland, was cancelled because of the protests of the G'dud Magginei Ha'Sefah, youth organization for the protection of the Hebrew language.

Members of the organization were charged with the responsibility of an attack made several days ago on a group of Yiddishists in Tel Aviv who gathered to celebrate the twentieth anniversary of the Czernowitz conference at which the claim for the recognition of Yiddish as a Jewish national language was formulated.

DESIGNATING JEWS AS

NATION IS ERROR, SAYS

JACOB WASSERMANN

Famous German Jewish Author Be-
lieves Present State Richer
Than if Nation

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

Berlin, Sept. 17.—It is a basic error to designate the Jews as a nation, Jacob Wassermann, the famous German Jewish author, contended in the course of an address which he has delivered here to the German Federation of State Education.

"They are not that," he said, "they can never again be that. If the Jews succeed today in establishing a state, they will perhaps be a nation, will perhaps be recognized as a people. But they will have ceased to be Jews in the old sense. They will perhaps acquire a state collectiveness, political influence, a place however lowly among the other numerous nationalities, but their historical world mission will be at an end.

"I even go so far as to say that if the Jews were all killed, if their name were expunged from the roll of history, it would be less disastrous to the history of humanity than if the Jews themselves give up the role which they have till now been playing in the history of the world.

"I do not deny the blood stream which flows in me from the great East," Wassermann concluded. "I am proud of it. I believe that it contains great riches, which I can give to the world."

NEW YESHIVA COLLEGE
BUILDINGS WILL BE
DEDICATED DECEMBER 9
\$1,000,000 Endowment Fund Expected
to be Raised at \$1,000 a
Plate Dinner

The Yeshiva College buildings at 186th Street and Amsterdam Avenue, New York, will be formally dedicated on December 9, Samuel Levy, chairman of the Yeshiva College Building Fund, announced yesterday.

The celebration will mark the conclusion of an effort undertaken three years ago by Orthodox Jews in launching a campaign for \$5,000,000 to establish the first college under Jewish auspices in the United States where Jewish studies and secular learning will be combined for the training of rabbis and Jewish community leaders. The freshman year in the Yeshiva College, authorized by the Board of Regents, began this fall with temporary headquarters at the Jewish Center, 131 West 86th Street.

The dedication exercises will last all day, Sunday, December 9, and will be concluded with a \$1,000 a plate dinner in the evening.

It is expected that the proceeds of the dinner will amount to at least \$1,000,000 which will be turned over to the Yeshiva College Endowment Fund for the maintenance of the institution.

JEWISH LAND SETTLEMENT
IN AUSTRALIA EXTENDS

Melbourne, Sept. 15.—The Australian Jewish Land Settlement Trust which is engaged in an attempt to settle Jews on the land in Australia, has received a bequest of \$600 from the executors of the estate of the late Arnold Witner. Endeavors are now being made to organize the movement throughout the Jewish community in New South Wales with the intention of then bringing in the other states to make the Australian Jewish Land Settlement Trust an All-Australian Jewish organization.

Twenty new arrivals who were in distressful circumstances have been placed in the Berwick Settlement of the Trust, where they will assist the settlers, who are at present in need of all the assistance they can obtain on their farms. It has also been decided to employ two expert instructors to visit the Berwick settlers weekly and place their services at their disposal.

The coordination of Jewish immigration activities in Australia, with the formation of local branches of the United Jewish Emigration Committee (Emigdirekt), which would communicate with the Hicem, has been decided on by a meeting of representatives of the various Jewish organizations of Sydney after listening to an address

LITHUANIAN GOVERNMENT
DENIES POGROM OCCURRED
IN WILKOWYSKI
Statement Made to Representatives of
Rights of Jewish Minorities'
Council

Geneva, Sept. 26.—No pogrom took place in the town of Wilkowyski, contrary to the reports carried in certain foreign newspapers, with the intention of injuring Lithuania's good name, the president of the Lithuanian delegation to the League of Nations Assembly, M. Sidzkauskas, declared to Z. Abersson, representative in Geneva of the Council for the Rights of Jewish Minorities.

"What happened in Wilkowyski," he said, "was an extremely regrettable incident, brought about by the scandalous conduct of three drunken minor officials who attacked passersby at night. Several Christians also fell victims to them. The culprits have been arrested and will be given exemplary punishment. The semi-official Lithuanian newspaper published an editorial condemning these activities, which the Government was the first to deplore, and demanding that justice should be meted out to the guilty."

M. Sidzkauskas assured Mr. Abersson that the Government sincerely desires an increasingly close cooperation between the two sections of the Lithuanian population in every field of activity. The present Lithuanian Government, like the previous governments, he said, has never professed anti-Semitic ideas.

The Council for the Rights of Jewish Minorities announced that it has received information from a private source which confirms the declarations made by the Minister regarding the nature of the incidents at Wilkowyski, and the energetic attitude taken up by the Lithuanian Government.

The second Convention of the Pioneer Women's Organization of America and Canada opened in Philadelphia yesterday and will be in session until October 14 at the Hotel Majestic.

SITUATION IN JEWISH COLONIES IN RUSSIA IMPROVING, DR. ROSEN CABLES

Condition of Town Populations Still Bad, National Chairman Says

The situation in the Jewish colonies in Southern Russia which suffered from drought this past Spring, has improved somewhat, but the condition of the Jews in the towns is still very difficult, according to the latest message from Dr. Joseph A. Rosen, Director of the Agro-Joint, released by David A. Brown, National Chairman of the United Jewish Campaign.

Dr. Rosen's message stated: "Conditions in our colonies in the Cherson and Kriwoi Rog districts are much better now than they were several weeks ago. Good August rains have greatly improved forage crops and have made conditions for winter seeding very favorable. Planting of the winter crops is now completed. However the general economic conditions of the Jewish town population is still very difficult. Although the situation is by no means hopeless, it requires considerable additional effort on our part to extend the scope of our reconstructive and social activities in all fields."

"In this message," Mr. Brown declared upon releasing the cable, "Dr. Rosen tends only to confirm information which we already are aware of and which has held our attention for the past several months. Only recently Dr. Rosen was confronted with a situation that compelled him to stop Agro-Joint subsidies to a number of trade schools throughout the Ukraine and White Russia thereby forcing hundreds of pupils whose main source of support was this subsidy, to leave the schools in the face of threatening starvation."

"Telegrams, petitions, heart-rending appeals were immediately addressed to Dr. Rosen to continue these subsidies, but the only course left to him, in view of the lack of funds, was to forward all these appeals to the Joint Distribution Committee and the United Jewish Campaign, with a strong plea on his own part, for further help."

"The condition of the trade schools on which several thousands of young men and women are dependent for their future livelihood, is only one of the many problems of the urban Jew in Russia. The loan societies, the workers' cooperatives, the 'Kustor' shops—all these organizations attempting to reconstruct the economic life of tens of thousands of families, are in the same measure dependent upon our continued support."

"With the present critical situation requiring, as Dr. Rosen points out, increased activity on our part, the need of American support has become even more vital than it has been in past years. But appropriation of funds necessary not only for the extension but also for the continuance of our present activities, is impossible without

Communities Prepare for the Winter Season

Omaha, Oct. 9.—For the Jewish community in Omaha, the new year seems to be beginning with the promise of renewed activities in every branch of work, in private and business affairs, and also in communal enterprises.

One of the movements is the beginning of a concerted effort to bring Omaha a rabbi to found a conservative synagogue. Despite the existence of five orthodox congregations, there has been a feeling that a congregation occupying a middle ground between Orthodox and Reform is needed.

The Nebraska State Conference of Social Work will hold its annual convention in the Jewish Community Center of Omaha on November 11, 12 and 13. Samuel Gerson, executive secretary of the Jewish Community Center and the Jewish Welfare Federation, is chairman of the program committee. Among the speakers to address the conference will be Abraham Epstein, executive secretary of the American Association for Old Age Security.

Local Jews are vitally interested in the success of the annual Community Chest drive which will begin October 15, since a number of Jewish institutions receive sustenance therefrom. The Jewish Welfare Federation is asking for \$45,000 this year, and through its administration, funds will be provided for the Wise Memorial hospital, the Home for the Aged, the Y. M. and Y. W. H. A. and other institutions.

William Holzman, president of the Jewish Welfare Federation, has been made chairman of the special gifts committee, and Henry Rosenthal, president of Temple Israel, chairman of the foreign corporations committee. Harry H. Lapidus, president of the Jewish Community Center, is a major, head of one of the large divisions of teams. A large number of Jewish men and women are scheduled to take part in the campaign. The quota this year is \$446,649.

Judge Irvin Stalmaster has been appointed to a chair of law in the University of Omaha.

Children of local Jewish families will begin the season with much greater opportunities for Jewish instruction than were available at the beginning of last season. Besides the Talmud Torah and the Temple Sunday School, there is now the Sunday school of the Jewish Community Center, organized last year, and the Dundee Talmud Torah, a new branch

AUSTRALIAN JEWISH MEMBER, OF PARLIAMENT, DIES

Sydney, Australia, Oct. 15.—Hyman Goldstein, member of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales, was killed here when he fell from a cliff near his residence. He was fifty-two years old.

A native of London, Mr. Goldstein came to Sydney as a youth. For some time he was Mayor of Randwick and in the state parliament he was known as a fluent orator and distinguished for his public spirit. At the time of his death he was treasurer of the local Jewish effort to assist in East European reconstruction by support of the Ort, Oze and Emigdirekt.

AMERICAN'S ASCENT OF MOUNT NEBO DESCRIBED

Jerusalem, Sept. 10.—"I I don't find the Ark I'll put the first automobile on top of Nebo" said Dr. A. F. Futterer, president of Edendale Bible Institute, Los Angeles, California, who for two years has been engaged in research work in Palestine, trying to find the lost Ark in Nebo. Those who hear the above remark, and had visited Nebo, said, "It can't be done." Dr. Futterer made the ascent without preliminary surveying of the road. He piloted his way through untrodden rock piles, and at 9 A.M. on September 8, stood up in his automobile on top of Nebo waving the Union Jack together with the Stars and Stripes amid a bewildered tribe of wild Bedouins, many of whom had never before seen an automobile. They crowded around it, children climbed upon it, while from the hills around groups of Bedouins could be seen gazing with wonder at this new arrival upon old Nebo. At various stages along the way, while removing rocks and blazing a new trail

Hadassah medical work there.

"Did you see the interview in the New York Times as attributed to you," the correspondent asked Lord Melchett, to which he replied that the statement published on September 28 in the Jewish Daily Bulletin was submitted to him before its publication but, he said, "I did not see the translation that appeared in the New York Yiddish daily and therefore I cannot comment on the interview."

Answering further questions, Lord Melchett emphasized the importance of the fund raising for the upbuilding of the Jewish National Home, mentioning in particular the Keren Hayesod, an activity "indispensable parallel with the need for private investment."

Declaring further that he did not come to the United States "to engage in any warfare on Zionist policy," Lord Melchett speaking on the Jewish Agency stated: "There is much confusion as to the whole scheme of the Jewish Agency. The fact, which is being so much emphasized in so many quarters, that I was the head of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission has been erroneously interpreted to mean that it implied my becoming a member of the Jewish Agency. That is not exactly my position. I am astounded at the amount of confusion that has been created on the whole subject matter. While I realize the special need of appealing to non-Zionists in America, I do not exactly see that it will do for us to replace the functions of the Zionist Organization until we truly understand what is intended by the Jewish Agency as it is interpreted by the Palestine Mandate," he declared.

Under the Mandate, Lord Melchett held, any agency that can be established could not assume an executive character, but must serve as an advisory body to the Palestine government.

Lord Melchett praised Mr. Harry Sacher of the Palestine Zionist Executive as an example of Zionist efficiency and pointed out that what is needed in Palestine is the placing there of executives of the type of Mr. Sacher.

Asked whether he will attend the Non-Zionist Conference on Palestine called by Mr. Marshall for October 20, in New York City, Lord Melchett replied that he cannot answer this question until he receives an invitation to participate in such a conference.

During his stay in Boston, Lord Melchett met with a number of prominent Zionists and non-Zionists. He spoke with great enthusiasm of Palestine's economic possibilities, before the General Chamber of Commerce, an American Jewish company for orange plantations in Palestine. He addressed a dinner of outstanding Jews held at the Ritz Carlton Hotel Tuesday night on the economic phase of the Palestine work.

or the car, Dr. Futterer took moving pictures.

The Mayor of Madaba, the nearest town to Nebo, came later on horseback to Nebo with city officials to congratulate Dr. Futterer. He presented to him a signed letter with official seal stating this to be the first car that ever scaled the heights of Nebo. The mayor stated that he would now apply to the government for a permanent road to open up auto tours to Nebo, thus saving about sixty miles detour.

"Nobody but a pioneer auto-trail-maker paving the way to the greatest historic mountain of Nebo, can realize what inspiration and peculiar sense of victory there was in parking the first auto on Nebo heights for the sake of the many thousands of Bible lovers who will surely follow," says Dr. Futterer. "Moreover, as a Bible representative, I felt it my duty to open up this new auto trail to this great historic mountain, which I certainly believe holds the lost Ark of the Covenant in one of its many hidden caches. I also believe that a properly equipped expedition to excavate Nebo will follow soon. I am satisfied that my work here has been a great success, the future will prove it."

The Bedouin chief of Nebo presented Dr. Futterer with his robe to take to America, as a token of friendship and approval. His last word while shaking hands was "Wahad" meaning he was in sympathy with him in his future Nebo exploits.
