NEW ANTI-JEWISH ATTACKS PERPETRATED IN LITHUANIA AND CZECHO SLOVAKIA

**Hooligans and Military Officers
Guilty of Attacking Jews**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Oct. 10.—Anti-Jewish attacks were reported from the village, Darshinisa, where Jewish passersby in the streets were severely beaten.

Hooligans broke the windows of Jewish houses, and terrorized the Jewish residents of the village.

The police were unable to establish the guilt of the attackers as the Jews, in fear of a repetition refused to testify. There is no police station within twenty miles of the village, and the hooligans were able to perpetrate their attacks without fear of arrest.

Prague, Oct. 16.—Outrages against the Jewish population were perpetrated by military officers, it is reported here. The attack occurred in the frontier village Ahalashovec, during military maneuvers there. A number of officers entered the home of a Jewish resident at midnight. They broke into the bedroom where the wife and daughter of the householder slept. The husband was severely beaten, as was a neighbor who came to his assistance.

Captain Halub, who took part in the attack, called out to his men, "Hit the Jews until they are dead, just as the Russians did."

The next morning when the case was reported to the gendarmerie, Captain Halub was asked whether he recollects what occurred. In reply he said that "last night's happenings will become unimportant in view of what we intend to arrange," the report states.

WARSAW REFUSES PERMIT TO BUILD SYNAGOGUE

Warsaw, Oct. 16.—Permission to build a synagogue at Muranow Square, asked by the Warsaw Kehillah Executive, was denied by the city government.

The proposal was made with the intention of dedicating the synagogue on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of Poland's independence.

PHILADELPHIAN MAKES JOURNEY TO WARSAW TO EMBRACE JUDAISM

**Born a Christian, Lived as Jew 60
Years, Rabbinate Accepts
Application**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Oct. 16.—Born in the Christian faith, which his father embraced to marry the daughter of a Polish landowner, Harry Hirschfeld, 77, of Philadelphia, after having spent a lifetime in the United States living as a Jew, came here to officially embrace the Jewish faith.

After establishing the record of the family, the Rabbinate of Warsaw, agreed to accept Hirschfeld into Judaism.

It appears from the application made by the aged Philadelphian, that he came to the United States at the age of 17, sixty years ago. He was the son of a Polish Jew who embraced Christianity to marry the daughter of a Polish landowner. The father lived in Warsaw, where he conducted a large business, and reared a family of six children in the Christian faith. Harry, coming to Philadelphia as a lad of 17, enjoyed the hospitality of his uncle, a Jew. Forgetting entirely his denominational affiliation, Harry lived as a Jew, marrying a Jewish girl and rearing his children in the Jewish faith.

Advanced in years, his wife dead, his children married, Harry Hirschfeld recalled his official status and was persecuted by the idea that when he dies he may be refused burial according to the Jewish rites. For this reason he made the trip. Mr. Hirschfeld told the Warsaw rabbi.

POSEN JEWS RETURN TO TOWN, FIND SYNAGOGUE SOLD

Posen, Oct. 16.—The Jewish community of Gurnze, Posen, is now in sharp conflict with the municipality over the possession of the synagogue site and building.

During the critical period following the World War, when Posen was transferred from Germany to the Republic of Poland, the small Jewish community of the town emigrated. Later, many of the former residents returned to their old homes and applied to the township for returning the synagogue which had been occupied in their absence. The municipality refused and declared that the building will be put up at public auction.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT REITERATES ITS SYMPATHY WITH ZIONIST AIMS

**Englishmen and Germans United on
Palestine Task, Wedgwood Says**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Oct. 16.—The German government in an official message to the president of the German Keren Hayesod reiterated its sympathy for the aims of Zionism. The message, which was read last night at a huge gathering given by the Keren Hayesod at the Krolltheater, where Col. Josiah Wedgwood was the main speaker, declares that the German government, being a member of the League of Nations, is a co-guarantor of the Palestine Mandate and recognizes the right of Jewry to establish in Palestine a National Home. The government sympathizes with the Palestine reconstruction work, which is a factor for peace, the message stated.

Kurt Blumenfeld presided at the gathering. Prussian Prime Minister Braun and representatives of many Jewish communities and of the Federal government were present. Addresses were delivered by Col. Wedgwood, Franz Oppenheimer, Georg Pernhard, editor of the "Vossische Zeitung," and Willy Dreyfus, banker. The speakers emphasized the duty resting on Great Britain to carry out the promise it made to the Jewish people in the Balfour Declaration. On the other hand, it is the obligation of all Jews to make the greatest efforts to carry out the Palestine reconstruction work.

Col. Wedgwood, in his address, declared that both Germans and Englishmen are united in their willingness to cooperate in the creation of a "new, free people in its national home."

The amount of 100,000 Marks was raised for the Keren Hayesod at the gathering.

BLACK HAND PLUNDERS TRANSYLVANIA SYNAGOGUES

Vienna, Oct. 16.—The plundering of two synagogues in Transylvanian towns is reported here.

Unknown vandals broke into the Jewish temple at Temesvar and the synagogue at Josefstadt, robbing them of all valuables, and breaking open all collection boxes. The damage done was estimated to be at least a quarter of a million lei. A note found read: "Do not interfere with the black hand's work, for all will pay dearly." The police have been unable to find the culprits.

ORTHODOX RABBIS PLAN PROTEST AGAINST RELIGIOUS PERSECUTIONS IN RUSSIA

Mass Meeting and Mourning Services to be Held

Plans to hold a public demonstration to protest against the persecutions of the Jewish religion in Soviet Russia, and particularly against the activities of the Yevsektsia, the Jewish Section of the Communist Party, were formulated at a meeting Sunday morning of the Rabbinical Board of Greater New York, comprising 150 Orthodox Rabbis. The meeting will be held at Cooper Union, Wednesday evening, October 24.

Prior to the Cooper Union demonstration, "mourning services" will be held on Sunday, October 21, in ten different parts of the city, at which rabbis and laymen will speak.

A committee of ten rabbis was named to make arrangements for the Cooper Union demonstration: Rabbi E. Inselbuch, chairman; Rabbi Abraham Miller, Rabbi M. A. Kaplan, Rabbi A. D. Burack, I. Shatland, Rabbi E. Zalmenowitz, Rabbi C. Finkel, Rabbi O. Baumel, Rabbi L. Levine and Rabbi S. Shari.

JABOTINSKY REVIEWS YOUTH GROUP IN TEL AVIV

LEADERS WELCOME THE NON-ZIONIST CONFERENCE ON JEWISH AGENCY

Is Opportunity for All American Jews to Join Reconstruction

The program of the extended Jewish Agency provides an opportunity for those American Jews who are not political Zionists to identify themselves with the practical aspects of the reconstruction work in Palestine, declared Henry Morgenthau, Jr., publisher of the "American Agriculturist," in a statement commenting on the forthcoming Non-Zionist Conference on Palestine.

"The back-to-the-soil movement has become the most important and strongest effort put forth by the Jews all over the world, Mr. Morgenthau stated. "American Jewry has contributed many millions of dollars toward the Jewish colonization work in Russia, conducted under the able leadership of Dr. Rosen. More than 10,000 Jews are settled in the Jewish colonies, having been saved from economic destruction by this great undertaking.

"On October 20 a representative gathering of American Jews will take place in New York, and a new era in the colonization of Palestine will be opened. My father, who recently visited Palestine, has told me how deeply impressed he was at the sight of university bred men and women giving all of their strength to the upbuilding of Palestine. I have no doubt that Palestine will yet give to the world the finest example of the creativeness of Jewish genius.

"The program of this Jewish Agency provides an opportunity to Jews who are not so-called political Zionists to identify themselves with the practical aspects of the reconstruction work in Palestine, in order that the Jews of Eastern Europe, having no other land to which to emigrate, may find an outlet for their labors in a country which

PLEDGES NEW ADMINISTRATION WILL CONFORM TO SPIRIT AND LETTER OF MANDATE

English Zionists Welcome New Palestine High Commissioner

London, Oct. 16.—The administration of Palestine under him will be conducted in accordance with the spirit and the letter of the Palestine Mandate, Sir John Chancellor, new High Commissioner of Palestine, promised a deputation of the English Zionist Federation which he received today.

The deputation conveyed to Sir John the congratulations of English Zionists on his appointment and acquainted him with their views on a number of important problems concerning the administration of Palestine and the Zionist work there.

The new High Commissioner promised to give sympathetic consideration to the representations made and expressed his hope that the work he was privileged to undertake would help the Jewish Agency realize the great ideal to which the Zionists have dedicated themselves.

HARRISBURG PAYS U. J. C. PLEDGES IN FULL

Harrisburg, Pa. Oct. 16.—A check for \$10,000 in full payment of Harrisburg's pledge to the United Jewish Campaign was presented to David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign at the opening of the third annual campaign for the Federation of Jewish Philanthropies of Harrisburg, here last night.

The sum of \$25,000 was pledged; \$10,000 in cash, for the Harrisburg Federation; the goal of \$41,218.50 is expected to be reached in a three day drive.

The collection of pledges was the principal subject under discussion at the meeting. Several methods were suggested and the issuance of notes to be discounted by banks was advocated as a means of liquidating individual indebtedness.

CALL MASS MEETING AGAINST CEMETERY DESECRATIONS

Berlin, Oct. 16.—A mass demonstration against the repeated desecration of Jewish cemeteries throughout Germany will be held in the hall of the former Upper Chamber of the Reichstag under the auspices of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith. The meeting was called for October 18.

In the call to the meeting, the Central Union declares that "this vandalism is a crime against German culture."

KEBELSBERG IN CONFLICT WITH UNIVERSITY SENATE OVER NUMERUS CLAUSUS

Senate Refuses to Admit 30 Additional Jewish Students

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Oct. 16.—A sharp conflict between the Hungarian Minister of Education and the Senate of the University of Budapest has arisen because of the Numerus Clausus.

The Minister of Education addressed a letter to the Senate asking that thirty additional Jewish students who graduated with honors from the secondary school, be admitted to the University. The Senate refused. It was stated in parliamentary circles today that Count Klebelsberg is determined to enforce the admission of the thirty Jewish students.

GOVERNMENT TO ESTABLISH TRACTOR STATION AT CHERSON

A tractor station to aid the farmers in the Cherson district, where many of the Jewish colonies are located, is to be established this year, according to a decision of the Ukrainian Comzet, governmental department for land settlement.

From 200 to 250 tractors will be made available, one for every 200 to 250 desiatin of land. The cost of the station is estimated at 1,500,000 roubles, including the tractors and all necessary expenses.

The decision of the Comzet is a step toward the stabilization of the Jewish land work in Southern Ukraine, where the production methods have been hitherto uncertain due to frequent bad crops. More tractor stations are to be established in the future.

The plan for the station has been submitted to the Central Comzet and to the Agrojoing for approval.

BACK TO LAND MOVEMENT PROGRESSING IN RUSSIA

Moscow, Oct. 16.—Eight hundred transigrants have been placed by the Ukrainian Comzet at forest work in the Cherson District, Odessa and Krivoy Rog.

The land administration in the Krivoy Rog District assigned 792,000 roubles for social work among Jewish transigrants there.

Seven transigrant families arrived in Tichonkova from Smolensk; five arrived at Charabovsk from Zinovievsk. They will proceed to Yekaterina Nikolsk.

Progress in the distribution of machinery to Jewish settlers, paid for by their relatives in America, is reported by the Ort, the society for encouraging trade and agriculture. Some orders have had to be suspended, however, due to misunderstanding on the parts of applicants who ask for the machines priced at \$550, while their relatives are willing to supply only \$200.

Sandor Urges Contact with Jewry Abroad

(By our Budapest Correspondent)

Budapest, Oct. 1.—Hungarian Jewry needs to maintain contact with Jewry abroad, Deputy Paul Sandor writes in an article appearing in the Jewish weekly, "Egyenloeseg" here. "We must maintain contact with the Jews abroad," he says. "The coming of the anti-Semitic regime stimulated the interest of foreign Jewry in our affairs. The Numerus Clausus intensified this interest, and I gratefully acknowledge the great and noble aid which the foreign Jewish bodies, above all the Alliance Israelite in Paris, gave our student youth abroad. In 1925 the Hungarian Jewish Congress repudiated the interference of our Jewish brethren abroad in the Numerus Clausus question."

"Our gesture was received with respect, the interests of our fatherland being what we had in mind. To day the situation is such that the three organizations of Hungarian Jewry, the Neolog, Orthodox, and Status Quo, must form a joint committee in order to maintain contact with foreign Jewry. History shows that hitherto we have utilized our foreign relations exclusively for our Hungarian fatherland."

"We know," Deputy Sandor proceeds, "that foreign Jewry does not constitute a united body. In each country there are clashes in Jewry between parties and movements. These internal conflicts principally affect the questions of Zionism and Palestine. The forces for Zionism in the various countries are the Zionist Federations and the forces fighting against Zionism are the Deutsch-Oesterreichische Union in Austria, the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith in Germany, the Alliance Israelite in France, and the League of British Jews in England. In America, so far as I know, there is outside the official Zionist Organization no Jewish body which stands on Jewish national ground. In this respect we must proceed with extreme caution. If we make concessions to the Jewish national point of view, we shall lose the sympathies of those great organizations of Jews abroad, which I have mentioned. But since Hungarian Jewry in the mass does not stand on Jewish national but on the Hungarian national ground, such a possibility is very remote."

"Coming now to the question of whether we should support the so-called neutral Palestine work, I can only say that so long as there is no improvement in the economic condition of Hungarian Jewry, it is out of the question. Only when our duty towards our own people has been done will it become possible to assist those

EQUALITY OF RELIGIOUS MINORITIES IS CAMPAIGN ISSUE DR. WISE ASSERTS

Praises Smith's Action in Massena Incident

The dominant issue in the present Presidential campaign is the equality of the religious minorities, the non-Protestants in the United States, is the opinion of Dr. Stephen S. Wise, expressed in a radio address, Monday evening, when he spoke on the subject "Religious Intolerance as an American Ideal and Practice."

Referring to a statement recently made by Senator Sanders that "this is a Protestant country and Protestants will see to it that one of their member is to be President," Dr. Wise exclaimed this is "fundamentally if not technically, spiritually if not politically, to disfranchise every non-Protestant group of these United States."

Speaking on anti-Catholic charges alleged to have been made during the campaign, Dr. Wise referred to the Massena incident and praised Governor Smith's action in the matter.

"It lately fell to my lot to protest against a hideous calumny suggested rather than made against the Jews of a New York village—Massena, with regard to the practice of human sacrifice of Jews. This calumny was unequivocally withdrawn after the Governor of this State had gotten into action with the instant vigor which is uniquely his own."

Continuing, Dr. Wise declared: "Something greater than the Presidency is at stake in this hour, American principles and American ideals are in the balance. The question before the American people in this hour is not whether the man or another should be elected President of the United States but whether minority religious groups shall be declared permanently and incurably inferior through substantive and actual violation of that article of the Constitution of these United States, Section 3 of Article VI,

\$250,000 TO ROSENWALD MUSEUM WITHOUT SOLICITATION

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 16.—Gifts valued at more than \$250,000 have been made, without solicitation, to the \$10,000,000 Rosenwald Industrial museum, it was announced by Waldemar Kaempffert, general director, on the eve of his departure for Europe.

Julius Rosenwald, already the donor of \$3,000,000 to equip the museum, and members of the executive committee, discussed final plans with Mr. Kaempffert to hasten the plans for housing the industrial exhibition in the rehabilitated Fine Arts building of Jackson Park.

which reads: "No religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States."

"I voted and I worked for the 18th Amendment to the Constitution. I believed in it then and I believe in it still. But I am not prepared to substitute the 18th Amendment for the VI Article of the Constitution. The present underground, insidious campaign against the election of a non-Protestant as President of the United States is constitutional bootlegging of the most dangerous and empoisoning kind."

"We may, and apparently some of us do, recover from the intoxication which is due to 18th Amendment bootlegging. But we shall never recover from the poison which is being spread throughout the body of American life by the religio-political bootleggers, who are not poisoning the liquor of some of us but the waters of American life for all of us."

outside our frontiers.

"I should welcome the formation of a committee or organization along these lines," Deputy Sandor concludes. "This body would be entitled to represent the whole of Hungarian Jewry officially in regard to foreign opinion. I am painfully aware that in cases where foreign Jewry seeks to come in to contact with us, we have no forum before which it can make itself heard. If they address themselves to the Israeli Chancellery, the Orthodox Chancellery does not hear, if they speak to the Orthodox, then the Status Quo Chancellery does not hear. All three parties must join together, so that we should be able to establish a unified official foreign orientation for Hungarian Jewry, to benefit in the first place our Hungarian nation and secondly because we do not wish to be isolated in respect to foreign Jewry," he concludes.

CENTER NOT IN CONFLICT WITH THE SYNAGOGUE J. W. B. HEAD SAYS

New Jersey 'Y' Federation Holds Convention

Atlantic City, Oct. 16.—"The Jewish Center is not in conflict or even competition with the synagogue," declared Harry L. Glucksman, Executive Director of the Jewish Welfare Board, addressing the seventeenth annual convention of the New Jersey Federation of Y. M. H. A.'s and Y. W. H. A.'s which concluded its sessions here yesterday.

"The synagogue and the center have been and continue to be of enduring value as homes of the Jewish spirit. The Jewish Center also stands for the unity of Israel and co-operates gladly with every agency which shortens the gap between ignorance and knowledge, apathy and Jewish consciousness, materialism and idealism," he declared. Solomon Lowenstein, Executive Director of the New York Federation for the support of Jewish philanthropic societies, principal speaker at the convention luncheon, found character forming institutions such as Jewish centers receiving increasing attention and support. "The effectiveness of our Jewish social service program will depend upon the continuous recruiting of volunteers," said Dr. Lowenstein. "Our young must be trained for leadership and service."

Henry W. Braude, president of the Y. M. H. A. Philadelphia and Harry Cassman, Atlantic City, presided at the educational conferences.

The report of E. J. Londow, field secretary for the New Jersey Jewish Welfare Board covered the activities of thirty-two communities.

Resolutions were adopted favoring a state library week, a junior state convention, extension of Jewish studies in the Y's, training for volunteer service, inter-association, dramatic and musical activities, development of physical education, cooperation with the Jewish Welfare Board and the Jewish committee on scouting and a state department for women's activities.

is so sacred to our religious sentiments. "I believe I express the sentiment of the Jewish farmers of America when I state that it is our hope, which we embody in our felicitations to the Jews of Palestine, that they accurately measure and appraise the role of agriculture in the life of their community by making it their principal endeavor. Jewish agriculture will create a people deeply rooted to the land in which they reside," Mr. Morgenthau concluded.

"The Non-Zionist Conference should pave the way for a new unity among the Jews of this country," declared Alfred Shemaski of Seattle, chairman of the United Jewish Campaign for the State of Washington and Alaska upon his arrival from Europe.

"The forthcoming Non-Zionist Conference," continued Mr. Shemaski, "has aroused intense interest in Jewish circles abroad. As far as the northwest is concerned I feel confident that our Jewish communities regard Mr. Louis Marshall's call as the long awaited call for a new unity, and hope that the meeting under his chairmanship, to be held at the Biltmore Hotel, New York, on October 20-21, will be productive of a comprehensive, harmonious constructive program for the upbuilding of Palestine."

BRITISH LABOR PARTY TO INTERVENE IN THE WAIVING WALL QUESTION

Berlin, Oct. 16.—The British Labor Party will intervene with the British government concerning the Wailing Wall incident, Col. Josiah Wedgwood, Labor member of parliament, stated at a conference of Poale Zion leaders in Germany.

The new High Commissioner for Palestine, Sir John Chancellory, has great colonization ideas, Col. Wedgwood stated.

The Poale Zion conference adopted a protest resolution against the action of the Jerusalem police at the Wailing Wall on Yom Kippur. A resolution demanding free immigration and greater colonization development in Palestine was adopted.
