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ANTI-JEWISH EXCESSES IN DEBRECZIN; LATEST THROUGHOUT THE DAY

American Among Injured; Police Intervention Too Late
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Oct. 23.—Serious anti-Jewish excesses were perpetrated in Debreczin, Hungary, according to a report received here from Budapest today.

A despatch from Budapest relates that 7 Budapest Jews and 12 non-Jewish workmen were sentenced to a fine and to jail terms for beating an anti-Semitic student during the anti-Jewish riots on Friday. They pleaded self-defense.

Vienna, Oct. 23.—Further reports received here from Budapest confirmed early despatches relating details of the anti-Jewish excesses in Debreczin on Monday.

The excesses lasted all day and resulted in injuries to many Jewish students, including one who is a United States citizen. Martin Rainer is the American injured. When attacked he showed his American passport, which his assailants partly tore. It was stated that the American Minister to Budapest will make representations to the Budapest government.

The despatches from Debreczin charge that the police failed to intervene in time. Its action came only at the hour when Jewish stores were threatened with being plundered. The University of Debreczin was closed due to the riots.

Despatches from Budapest relate of new disorders in the colleges, where several Jewish students were attacked and injured.

PALESTINE JEWS OBSERVE FAST AS WALL PROTEST

Jerusalem, Oct. 23.—Thousands of Palestine Jews assembled Monday in the synagogues and before the Wailing Wall to recite psalms prescribed for a fast day proclaimed by the Chief Rabbinate of Palestine.

The fast day was observed as a protest against the interference of British authorities with worshippers at the Wailing Wall on Yom Kippur and the subsequent attacks. Rabbis addressed the congregations in the synagogues on the sanctity of the relic of the Temple.

LONDON JEWS PROTEST AGAINST BRITISH GOVERNMENT IN WALL ISSUE

Chief Rabbi, Zionist Leaders Address Mass Meeting; Britain Promises Status Quo Maintenance
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Oct. 23.—For the first time since the issuance of the Balfour Declaration, London Jews assembled at a mass meeting voiced sharp criticism of the Government of Palestine.

Two thousand persons attended a mass meeting held Monday night at Kingsway Hall to protest against the attitude of the Palestine government in the present dispute between the Moslems and the Jews of Palestine concerning the Western Wall. Dr. M. D. Eder, former member of the Zionist Executive in London, who presided, drew the attention of the audience to the "grave and serious nature" of the action to be taken.

The resolution adopted unanimously deplored "the failure of the administration of Palestine to realize the gravity of the consequences of this insult to the House of Israel," and demanded that "in accordance with the traditional

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ECKENER EXPLAINS WHY DR. BADT LEFT BEHIND

Dr. Badt, Berlin
Martinsburg, West Virginia, Oct. 23.—An explanation of why Dr. Herman Badt, Ministerial Director in the Prussian Government, was left behind when the Graf Zeppelin departed on its historic flight was given by Dr. Hugo Eckener, in response to a query of the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

"The lifting capacity of the airship varies with the temperature and barometric pressure and the altitude, so that the amount of fuel, ballast, etc. cannot be determined exactly until the day of departure," Dr. Eckener stated.

"Dr. Badt was carried on the forty-hour trial flight and was listed as a provisional passenger on the trans-Atlantic flight, in the event that some other passenger would be unable, at the last minute, to go, or specially favorable conditions permitted an additional lift. Unfortunately neither circumstance arose. Dr. Badt is one of our best friends," Dr. Eckener added.

According to a report in the Berlin "Vossische Zeitung," Dr. Badt arrived a few minutes too late to board the Zeppelin, while another version current in Berlin ascribed his being left behind to the pressure of anti-Semites who objected to a Jew being included on the historic flight.

JUGO SLAV JEWS PROTEST AGAINST DISCRIMINATION IN THE ARMY AVIATION

Aviation Schools Ordered Closed to Jewish Officers
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Zagreb, Oct. 23.—A secret ordinance issued by the command of the Army Aviation Corps prohibited the admission of Jewish applicants to the army aviation schools in Jugoslavia. The ordinance also ordered the dismissal of aviators who married Jewish women.

The Federation of Croatian Jews called a public meeting of protest to demand the withdrawal of the anti-constitutional order.

JOINT FOREIGN COMMITTEE CELEBRATES 50th BIRTHDAY

London, Oct. 23.—The fiftieth anniversary of the Joint Foreign Committee of the Anglo-Jewi-h Association and the Board of Jewish Deputies, the body acting in behalf of British Jews for the protection of Jewish rights, was celebrated at the Sunday session of the Board of Jewish Deputies.

Claude G. Montefiore in his address outlined the work of the Committee since 1878, pointing particularly to its work since the World War. He paid tribute to the unceasing efforts and abilities of Lucien Wolf, Secretary, who received an ovation when he rose to reply.

Mr. Wolf said that the Committee had established friendly relations with the League of Nations and with the governments of countries which had not been friendly before. These governments have made valuable concessions for their Jewish populations.

Congratulatory messages were received from the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, the Alliance Israelite Universelle, from Eric Colban, former director of the Minorities Department in the Secretariat of the League of Nations, Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the Zionist Executive, and others.

ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS IN BERLIN; 3 ARRESTED

Berlin, Oct. 23.—Anti-Jewish riots occurred today in East Berlin. Show windows in Jewish stores were smashed and a score of Jewish passersby were severely beaten. The police intervened, arresting three who were identified as members of the anti-Jewish Hitlerite organization.

In Augsburg the anti-Jewish national socialist party held a torchlight demonstration during which many Jews were attacked.

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LORD MELCHETT ATTAINS 60th BIRTHDAY; MAKES GIFT TO HEBREW DICTIONARY FUND Gives \$7,500; Battle on Stock Exchange Incidental to Visit

Lord Melchett, the former Sir Alfred Moritz Mond, who is now on a visit to the United States, celebrated his sixtieth birthday yesterday.

Born in Farnworth, Lancashire, October 23, 1868, the son of Dr. Ludwig Mond, he was made a baronet in 1910. He served as Minister of Health in 1921-1922. His elevation to the peerage was announced in the King's birthday honors on June 3 of this year.

A contribution of \$7,500 by Lord Melchett toward the Ben Yehuda Memorial Trust of Jerusalem for the completion of the Hebrew dictionary begun by the late Ben Yehuda, was announced on the occasion of Lord Melchett's birthday by Rabbi J. Max Weis. This contribution supplements a previous one made by Lord Melchett and, it was stated, will serve to expedite the publication of the remaining volumes of the dictionary.

Other contributors to the fund for the completion of the Hebrew dictionary are Mrs. Jacob Wertheim, Maurice and Albert Wertheim (totaling \$20,000); Felix M. Warburg (\$15,000); Judge Irving Lehman and Louis Marshall.

Despatches from Toronto ascribe the recently effected changes in the control of the nickel production to the visit of Lord Melchett to the United States and Canada. Canadian interests are said to have gained control of the International Nickel by a spectacular battle on the stock exchanges of Toronto, Montreal and New York, it being understood that the American shareholders were bought out. A statement published in the Toronto Mail and Empire termed these transactions "a part of Great Britain's policy to insure world peace by dominating the source of supply of one of the essential implements of war."

The International Nickel went up in price on the New York Stock Exchange at the beginning of the week about five points. This followed sensational gains scored the preceding week, during which the stock advanced from \$179 to \$190, closing at \$179 at the end of the week, described as the most puzzling feature of the preceding week's feverish market.

ADOLPH KRAUS, FORMER B'NAI BRITH PRESIDENT, DIES IN CHICAGO Held Post for 30 Years Noted in Civic and Welfare Work

Chicago, Oct. 23.—Adolf Kraus, civic and welfare leader, for twenty years international president of the Independent Order B'nai Brith, the largest American Jewish fraternal order, died Monday in his sleep. He was seventy-eight years old.

Born in Blowitz, Bohemia (then Austria and now Czechoslovakia) February 26, 1850, he came to the United States at the age of 15. After clerking a few years in small town stores in Ohio, he came to Chicago in 1871, while the city was still in ruins after the great fire. He found a position in a law office, studied for the bar and in 1877 was admitted to practice.

Mr. Kraus was a great interest in local politics, serving on the Board of Education and as Corporation Counsel. For two years he was President of the Board of Education. In 1905 he was a member of the committee of American Jews who conferred at Portsmouth, N. H. with Count Witte, championing the rights of Russian Jews.

Mr. Kraus served as president of the Independent Order B'nai Brith from 1905 to 1925. During his administration the order grew and developed, becoming a power in cultural and welfare work. In 1925 Mr. Kraus resigned from the presidency at the Constitution Grand Lodge convention in Atlantic City, to be succeeded by Alfred M. Cohen of Cincinnati.

In 1927 the B'nai Brith conferred upon Mr. Kraus the Supreme Order of the Covenant, the first officer to receive this honor. On the occasion of his seventieth birthday, Executive President Taft was one of the speakers at a dinner given in his honor at the Hotel La Salle.

Mr. Kraus is survived by his wife, a daughter and three sons. Funeral services will be held Wednesday at Isaiah Temple. Burial will be in Rosehill Cemetery.

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MARSHALL REITERATES INTOLERANCE NO CAMPAIGN ISSUE

Louis Marshall reiterated his view that intolerance does not constitute an issue in the present Presidential campaign in an address he delivered at a luncheon to Herbert Hoover at the Waldorf-Astoria on Monday, attended by Republican party leaders.

Mr. Marshall said that every good American abhorred the thought of any change in the time-honored policy of religious tolerance in this country. He said that neither party and neither candidate had introduced the religious question.

He asked where the issue had arisen and, answering, recalled the Democratic National Convention here in 1924. Citing the allegations of opposition to Governor Smith because of his religion, he traced that opposition back to the 1924 convention.

"During the present campaign, where did the voices which spoke of religious intolerance come from? They came from the so-called Democratic South," he said.

It was the "idiosyncracies" of Southern Democrats which had brought the issue into the campaign and no organized party had taken part in fostering it, he declared.

WARBURG HEADS LEADERS' DELEGATION TO HOOVER

LORD MELCHETT URGES SPEEDY ACTION IN WORK OF REBUILDING PALESTINE

Denies Rumor He Opposed Jewish Agency; Distinction Between Zionists and Non-Zionists Figit of Imagination, He Says; Inspires Audience by Portraying Palestine's Possibilities

Lord Melchett, the former Sir Alfred Mond, who was chairman of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission, was one of the principal speakers at the opening session Saturday night at the Biltmore Hotel of the Non-Zionist Conference Concerning Palestine.

Urging speedy action in the rebuilding work, he appealed to American Jews who are reputed to be in the habit of making decisions quickly to apply their effort to the work of rebuilding Palestine, which has many agricultural and industrial possibilities. "We cannot afford to waste five years discussing questions of representation on agencies. There are steps that must be taken quickly. Take a quick decision here, because if you do not take it, you will be sorry and regret it the rest of your lives and the lives of your children after you," Lord Melchett declared.

In the opening sentences of his address Lord Melchett took occasion to deny the rumor spread recently that he was opposed to the Jewish Agency. This was not accurate, he stated, declaring that he hopes some day to be a member of the Agency.

"This movement is to me the most important, not merely for us, but for the whole world," Lord Melchett declared. "Think back only a few years. Let me take you back to 1913. If I had stood here in 1913 and said to you, come to a conference to discuss the reconstruction of a national home in Palestine, you would have looked upon me as an idle dreamer; even if I had told you in 1913 that the Austrian Archduke would be killed and that out of all that followed would come the chance, the opportunity, the occasion for establishing a national home for the Jews in Palestine. Has it ever occurred to you how remarkable it is that out of the welter of world blood there has arisen this opportunity? Do you really believe that this is an accident? Do you really in your heart believe that we have been led back to Israel by nothing but a fluke? Do you believe there is no great inner meaning to the opportunity we have been given? After 2,000 years of wandering in the wilderness, we have a chance and an opportunity bestowed upon us, and many sit back and say that it is of no interest to them. I wonder if they have thought of that train of circumstances?"

"I am glad to have the opportunity of correcting a few misapprehensions which have seemed to creep into various statements in the press. I always feel rather nervous about speaking on Palestine, although I myself have fairly clear views on the subject, but I don't seem always to be able to convey them to those to whom I am talking. There

was published an interview with me which I have never even seen, containing a number of statements which I have never made. I saw one in which I was attacking my old friend and colleague, Dr. Weizmann, which, of course, as President of the British Zionist Organization, I could not have done. I also saw that I was opposed to the Jewish Agency, a body to which I may some day have the honor to belong. I saw that I was in favor of doing away with everything except private enterprise, because I remarked that private enterprise must have a large share and part in the building of Palestine or any other country in the world. As a matter of fact, the various ideas entering into the development of all countries are complementary. The development of Palestine is not a fancy stunt; it is a proposition absolutely like that of any other country in the world. With this in our minds, a great many of our differences should disappear.

"Something happened to me tonight on entering the hotel. I understand this conference is a non-partisan congress. I asked: 'Where is the congress?' and the doorman said: 'The Zionist Congress is upstairs.' (Laughter.) Gentlemen, may I speak frankly? I assure you that outside our community, the entire Gentile world has never yet been able to understand the difference between Zionist and non-Zionist.

"Jewry is not taking the chance and opportunity which the Mandate has given them to rebuild their home land. Mr. Lloyd George, when I was a member of his Cabinet at the time the Balfour Declaration came into being, said to me one day: 'I can't understand your people. Here we have given them a great opportunity for which they pray every day, an opportunity to return to Palestine. Here is their opportunity and the whole world is watching to see what they can do for themselves, and yet they seem so reluctant and terrified at entering into the heritage which is placed before them.' I endeavored to explain to him the differences between Zionists and non-Zionists. And he said to me: 'Look here, I am a Welshman, I am a British subject, and I am as proud of my little hillside that is Wales as any patriot, and yet I am a loyal British subject.'

"The distinctions between Zionists and non-Zionists don't exist except in the figments of our people's minds. I assure you they don't exist among people outside. The whole world is not judging the Zionist or non-Zionist organization, but the whole of Jewry for what we make out of Palestine. The thousands of tourists going around

N. Y. FEDERATION LAUNCHES \$5,300,000 CAMPAIGN

Ninety-one local philanthropic and communal institutions, through the Federation for the support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, launched a \$5,300,000 campaign to meet their 1928 budgetary needs. At a dinner meeting to 1,500 workers at the Hotel Commodore following meetings of industrial and professional groups it was reported that \$3,610,299 in annual recurrent subscriptions toward the 1928 quota had been received.

Officials of the Federation stated that this left the Federation with a deficit of \$1,778,000 yet to be met, the largest shortage in the twelve-year history of the organization.

Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Federation board, in the principal address of the night meeting, declared that the greatest optimists in the group which helped found the Federation in 1918 did not expect that standards of work would improve so markedly in so short a time.

"That country don't ask about the Zionist Organization or the Commonwealth Organization, but ask me to meet here. They ask: 'What are the Jews doing in this country?' And if we don't do well, it will be a disgrace to our community and our people in every part of the world, and if we do well, it will be a stimulus to new achievements, and a cause of pride. Go to the University of Jerusalem, for which Mr. Warburg has done so much, for which American Jewry has done so much, and the block of magnificent buildings you behold is a pride of ours. Few things come to Palestine, the object of admiration of every Gentile who sees it. They don't see in it an opportunity for a few Jews to contribute funds; they see in it a symbol of Jewish culture, Jewish spirituality, the benefits of which hold good right through this country.

"I was very honored to be Chairman of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission and to be associated with you gentlemen of such international standing and reputation. In a matter of finance or administration, the report of the Commission bearing your names is a prospectus on the strength of which many millions could be gotten in Wall Street in a day. We can't sell this proposition to you, although we can sell any other outside proposition. This document was based on a series of reports which I would say, having been on many large commissions, governmental and otherwise, are almost unqualified in ability and seriousness and clarity. I am sure my fellow commissioners have put in many days and many nights of very heavy work and very serious reflection. We had all we could do to work out a program for the most critical people in the world, the most difficult people to satisfy. We do not claim this document is an inspired book, but we do claim that it is an honest endeavor to lay down

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laws which in the future no one who is responsible for the management of that country should try to ignore. Take one or two fundamental facts of the report, the fact that Palestine has from an agricultural point of view a large number of attractions for people economically, the fact that Palestine is a country in which our people can live, and live in the finest land you have ever seen, multiply and be safe from persecution and safe from oppression and from the feeling that they are not wanted in their own country in which other people would as soon not see them. That is a great deal. Add to it that thing you feel when you go to Palestine. When you walk about a country where you are by right and not by favor, where you live because the nations of the world have told you that you are entitled to establish yourselves there. Every stone you lay, every field you plow, belongs to our community and our people, and when you once feel it, you never can forget it. It is something which induced me to build myself a modest little home on the shores of the Lake Tiberias, which is now nearly finished, and which I am going to see soon.

"Mr. Warburg and I are supposed to be hard business men. Yet neither of us has been able to escape that deep-rooted feeling which seizes you when you first see that sacred soil of Eretz Israel. I can't give you that emotion. Go out and get for yourself. The report of our Commission is a genuine document and I trust it will be carried out. It is merely an outline of the skeleton on which the building is to be erected.

"The Jewish Agency is not merely an economic weapon. It is not merely a body to administer funds or land to colonists; it is a great diplomatic machine which the League of Nations has entrusted to Jewry. I from my experience know, during a period of three High Commissions, that we have to have for that purpose a most unusual assembly of Jews in the world, one that should speak with the greatest possible authority. The problems to be considered are not necessarily Jewish problems. They are problems which affect all countries—the tariff problem of Palestine, the railroad transportation problem of Palestine, the taxation problem of Palestine. They are all big problems which the government of these countries have to deal with and upon the solution of which depends the future economic upbuilding of Palestine.

"I am myself president of the Economic Board for Palestine in Great Britain, and that body constitutes Zionists, members of the ICA, and members of no organizations at all, but men who care about Palestine. People thought we could never work together. Gentlemen, we have never had the slightest difficulty when we have met. We have

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through us—all of humanity.

"In conclusion, I wish to pay my profound respects to the leaders of American Jewry, headed by Louis Marshall, who, by their devotion to and selflessness for Jewish idealism, brought this occasion to pass. Perhaps they deliberated too long. Then, an East European Jew came upon the scene and accelerated the steps toward the unity, for which we have all been praying. I express my thanks and congratulations to that great Western Leader of American Jewry, Louis Marshall, and to his associates. The two outstanding leaders met and, after long proceedings, forged this historic moment. It is an occasion for great pride to those of us who are here and it will, undoubtedly, within the near future, bring good fortune and glory to all of our people." Dr. Levin declared.

never had any division of opinion, never any division on those lines. When you get ten men around a table to discuss a problem, they do not say, 'I am a Zionist; I am a non-Zionist.' They say: 'This is our problem.'

"I hope that the Jewish Agency when it is set up will be a similar body. I sincerely trust that you will put in the very great weight which you have in this country behind this movement. It is worth it. It is not only worth it; it becomes an absolute necessity. And let me tell you, you cannot afford to wait. While we are discussing, other people are acting. Whereas we have reports as to possibilities in Palestine, Gentiles are acquiring land and beginning to take possession of the best things in the country. It seems curious, but I have found it easier to get money from Gentiles for Palestine than from my fellow-Jews. Let me warn you of what is going on. Powerful syndicates are being formed by wealthy men, non-Jews, and this movement is growing rapidly.

"Ladies and gentlemen, this is a proposition which has one great merit, and that is why I am so greatly attached to it. It is one out of which nobody wants to make any money. I regard the upbuilding of Palestine as a privilege. To be able to lay a small stone in the re-erection of the Temple of our people is an honor. It brings a moral force and a moral victory which simply cannot be replaced by anybody else or by anything else, and although perhaps I have received in my life distinctions more than I merited, there is none that I feel a greater one than being privileged to help build up the Land of Israel," Lord Melchett declared.

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British protest for religious conviction, steps be taken to safeguard the traditional right of the Jewish people to its holiest site." The resolution further expressed the demand that the officials of the Palestine administration "show the same scrupulous regard for the sentiments of the Jewish people in dealing with the worship in holy places" as is their policy in regard to other faiths.

Dr. Joseph H. Hertz, Chief Rabbi of the British Empire and Dr. Selig Brodetzky, member of the Zionist Executive, addressed the meeting. Dr. Brodetzky related that the British government had given its promise to maintain the status quo at the Wailing Wall.

Dr. Hertz pointed to the fact that three centuries before Mohammedanism came into existence, the custom among the Jews to repair to the Wall for prayer and lamentation was already practiced. This is attested by the fathers of the Christian church in their writings and by the early Christian pilgrims to Palestine. "The outrage committed at the Wailing Wall diminishes the moral prestige of Great Britain and is a serious setback to civilization and humanity," the Chief Rabbi exclaimed.

Warsaw, Oct. 23.—A huge mass meeting attended by many thousands to protest against the Wailing Wall incident took place here Sunday night. A strong resolution on the action of the Jerusalem authorities was adopted.

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
