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ANTI-SEMITIC AGITATION ACCOMPANIED BY RIOTS CONTINUES IN HUNGARY

4 Colleges Closed; 150 Arrested;
Parliament Sessions Break up
in Disorder
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Budapest, Oct. 24.—Anti-Semitic agitation in Budapest, Debreczin, and Szegedin continued to the accompaniment of anti-Jewish riots perpetrated by the nationalistic students.

The riots compelled the Bethlen government to issue an order closing the universities. One hundred and fifty of the riotous students were arrested late Tuesday afternoon, when parliament was in session deeply engrossed in an unparalleled stormy debate on the question.

The debate followed the introduction of interpellations by the Jewish deputies Bela Fabian, Farkas and the Liberal leader Barkas, who charged the government with tolerating the continuing anti-Jewish excesses directly the Understate Secretary Sztranyavsky in the Ministry of the Interior with responsibility for the riots and even with engendering the disorders. This charge called forth the protest of the Minister of the Interior and the rage of the Opposition deputies. The session was thrown into tumult which lasted until late after midnight when Count Bethlen, the Prime Minister, in-

LEADERS OF EUROPE AND PALESTINE GREET OUTCOME OF NON-ZIONIST CONFERENCE

Send Congratulations to Weizmann;
Press Comments Laudatory
(European Zionist leaders and those in Palestine expressed satisfaction with the results of the Non-Zionist Conference on Palestine in congratulatory messages cabled to Dr. Chaim Weizmann.)

"Congratulations. It is a splendid vindication of your policy. We are delighted," was the message of Miss Henrietta Szold, American member of the Jerusalem Zionist Executive and Col. Frederick H. Kisch. A cablegram from Munich signed by Kurt Blumenfeld, Robert Weltsch and Mr. Rosenbluth read: "Sincerest congratulations." Dr. Arthur Ruppin cabled his felicitations from Jerusalem.

The Zionist Executive in London cabled its heartiest congratulations declaring "Results satisfactory."

Before the adjournment of the Non-Zionist Conference on Sunday the following resolution was proposed by David A. Brown and James N. Rosenberg, and was unanimously adopted: "Resolved that this epoch making Conference expresses its rejoicing at the unanimity of its decisions. We express our gratitude to Mr. Louis Marshall and to Dr. Chaim Weizmann for their statesmanship and patient and successful efforts for concord. We thank the commissioners and their experts for their scholarly reports which we have adopted, and we confidently call on the Jews of the entire world to unite in the sacred task of upbuilding Palestine."

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TO RAISE QUESTION OF WAILING WALL IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

Lt. Commander Kenworthy to Present Matter to Attention of State Secretary

London, Oct. 24.—The question of the Wailing Wall will be raised at the opening session of the House of Commons by Lieutenant Commander Kenworthy, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

Commander Kenworthy will ask if the State Secretary for the Colonies is aware that the Jerusalem Moslems are erecting masonry constructions on top of the Wailing Wall and whether he can explain why this is permitted by the Palestine government, especially when it removed the temporary screens the Jews had placed as infringing on the status quo of the Wall. The Colonial Secretary will also be asked whether he has instructed that the status quo of the Wall be preserved, forbidding new construction over the ancient Wall.

**ALFRED M. COHEN PAYS
TRIBUTE TO FORMER
I. O. B. B. PRESIDENT
Recognizes Services to Humanitarian
and Jewish Causes**
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Oct. 24.—Tribute to the late Adolf Kraus, for twenty years president of the Independent Order B'nai Brith, was paid by Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Order, in a statement issued to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Adolf Kraus, for twenty years president of the Independent Order B'nai Brith, was a remarkable man. He came to the United States as a lad without means, without family prestige and without a great deal of schooling. From humblest employment he passed into mercantile life, all the while preparing himself to ultimately enter the legal profession. His progress as a lawyer, in one of the largest cities in the United States, was phenomenal. He became a foremost leader of the Chicago bar, with an exceptionally lucrative practice.

"At an enormous monetary sacrifice he responded to a call on him to become Corporation Counsel of his city. For many years he was president of the Board of Education in Chicago. In other capacities he served his adopted country and city, always honorably and ably. One starts to think how much Chicago would have lost if through restricted immigration, Adolf Kraus had been denied admission to the United States.

"His service during twenty years incumbency as president of the B'nai Brith was of incalculable benefit to Jewry the world over," Mr. Cohen continued. "He brought to his office a keen and ripened intellect, boundless love for his fellow men and broad sympathy for the oppressed among his people.

"He yielded his personal comfort that he might serve. Long the victim of a consuming illness, he carried on in spite of it and maintained to the very and unflagging interest in the welfare of his coreligionists wherever they might be.

"A great and good man has gone to his reward. God touched his eyelids and he went to sleep. God's will be done."

**LOS ANGELES TO BUILD
\$1,500,000 HOSPITAL**
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Los Angeles, Oct. 24.—By the decision of the Board of Trustees of the Kaspare Cohn Hospital, a \$1,500,000 hospital building will be erected in Los Angeles within 1929.

Acting on the recommendation of its Building Committee, the Board of Trustees approved the preliminary plans, drawn by Claude Beelman, for a 300 bed hospital in addition to a School of Nursing, internes' and resident physicians' quarters, and an Out-patient Department.

The hospital will be erected on a site already acquired and will represent for building and equipment, an expenditure of one and a half million dollars. The site was purchased with part of the proceeds of the Building Fund Campaign conducted by the Federation of Jewish Welfare Organizations in the Fall of 1924. In the campaign, subscriptions amounting to \$800,000 were obtained, payable in five years.

Part of this amount was used for the creation of the Jewish Orphans' Home known as Vista del Mar, and for other building purposes. The cost of campaign and collection was \$9,000 or a little over one percent. About \$625,000 have already been collected from those who subscribed, though the entire period of collection has not yet expired.

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital it was decided that the name of the new hospital will be the Jewish Hospital of Los Angeles.

The Board of Trustees of the Hospital includes Arthur Asher, J. Y. Baruh, Alexander Brick, Aleck Brownstein, Dr. D. W. Edelman, Rabbi Edgar F. Magnin, Tom May, Ben R. Meyer and Emil Olcovich. I. Irving Lipsitch, Executive Director of the Federation of Jewish Welfare Organizations is Secretary of the Board.

**REV. MARLIN EXPLAINS
WHY HE WITHDREW
UNFRIENDLY REMARKS**
'United Presbyterian' Makes Further
Comment
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 24.—Further comment was made by the Rev. H. H. Marlin, editor of the page "Current Event and Comment" in the "United Presbyterian" of this city, in a current issue of the magazine, with regard to the editorial which he wrote in the issue of August 2 on "Adherents of Jewish Faith," which drew forth the criticism of Jewish publications because of unfriendly remarks against the Jews which it contained.

Rev. Marlin, in response to a letter of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, withdrew his unfriendly criticism in a statement he issued for circulation to the Jewish press. In explaining the reasons for the withdrawal of his previous remarks, the Rev. Marlin writes:

"Generally these editorials (criticizing Rev. Marlin for his remarks) were bitter, and some of them were violent. However, we are glad to say that we received some letters relative to this matter which, while criticizing the editorial, breathed the spirit of kindness and courtesy.

"We felt upon reflection, that our article was not wholly just and so, in response to a courteous request on the part of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency for an additional statement, we sent a letter frankly stating that we believed we had not been wholly just to the Jewish race and that we were sorry that we had written it. This statement was printed widely in Jewish papers and some of these papers did not treat us fairly nor generously in their comment on our statement. For instance our article on the Jews may have been somewhat unfortunate, but it certainly was not 'malicious.' In general, also, no recognition was made of the fact that the article of which complaint was made contained sentences which were decidedly laudatory of the Jewish race. Moreover, we were not led to make amends by a 'storm of replies from the Anglo-Jewish press.' When we are convinced we are right we shall stand unmoved where God places us. Our spirit is Scotch, our blood is Irish and our hair red. And while we do not wish to indulge in any mock heroics yet we truly seek a portion of the spirit which once filled a great Jew who, conscious of God with Him, and alive to the perils of His every hour, said: 'None of these things move me.'

"We were led to make amends in the first place because of a beautiful letter which we received from William Z. Spiegelman editor of the Jewish Daily Bulletin. It was a courteous letter and of a kind spirit. He is a

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tervened by declaring that either Fabian or the Understate Secretary will face a prison term, in case the charges are substantiated or repudiated.

Prior to Count Bethlen's intervention the Understate Secretary challenged Deputy Fabian to a duel. When asked to substantiate his charge, Deputy Fabian boldly declared that he is in possession of documents showing that Sztranyavsky was officially informed since April 1927, both orally and in writing, of the names of these anti-Semitic agitators responsible for the bombing at Czongrad. The Understate Secretary suppressed this information and took no action, Fabian declared.

After the breaking up of the session Count Bethlen conferred with the Minister of Justice for over an hour. The Speaker of the House urged Deputy Fabian to submit his proof to the parliamentary committee on deputies' immunity.

Count Klebsberg and the Minister of the Interior Bela Szitovszky declared in parliament that the students responsible for the excesses were liable to the criminal court. In addition the student federations which are responsible for the disorders will be dissolved if they continue to play the role of another government.

REV. MARLIN EXPLAINS WHY HE WITHDREW UNFRIENDLY REMARKS

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Jew whom we are beginning to love. After we had sent him the amplifying statement requested he printed it in his paper in a generous spirit. Moreover he wrote us and said: 'It is only human to err, but it is magnificent to admit the error in as frank and courageous a manner as you have done.' And the second reason for our amplifying statement was upon serious thought we were convinced that we had not been wholly just in our article as it appeared in public prints. We were rather surprised to know however that it had 'attracted nation-wide attention,' and naturally we were very sorry that it had occasioned bitterness in the hearts of our Jewish brothers. We read that editorial again, but this time we read it through Jewish eyes and we clearly saw that it was not generous and that it was not wholly fair. Therefore we regretted it. We were sorry it had been written. We were grieved that we had occasioned bitterness and that we had occasioned wounds. And that is why we gladly stood before the Jewish world to say: 'That article was not wholly fair. It is sincerely regretted.'

DR. RUBINOW EXPLAINS U. P. A. ALLOTMENT

Sir: I was indeed gratified to read my good friend, Robert Sord's denial of the statement concerning the "Executive Director of the Zionist Organization, meaning my humble self whose mental operations are more difficult to understand than anyone I know," This indicates an entirely unnecessary error of personal misunderstanding.

Mr. Sord further refers to "the recent session where the Executive Director, together with the Chairman of the Administrative Committee, made specific recommendations as to a matter of major policy, regarding the financial conditions as to participation by Hadassah in U. P. A. The recommendations were overruled and disregarded."

May I point out that it isn't at all the prerogative of the Executive Director that all his recommendations should be accepted by the Administrative Committee without question. The recommendations referred to, made by Dr. Kaplan and myself did not represent so much our inner convictions as our desire to achieve cooperation with Hadassah at all costs. Subsequent events have demonstrated that such cooperation was possible to achieve on terms mutually satisfactory and much more profitable to Palestine as a whole.

May I at this time point out the inaccuracy of the statement of Mr. Isaac Allen (in the same report of the meeting of the Association for the Secularization of the Zionist Organization) in reference to the budget. It is not true that the Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization appropriated the sum of \$100,000 from the U. P. A. to meet its expenses.

To begin with the Executive Committee of the Zionist Organization can make no appropriation on behalf of the U. P. A. It can only ask of the U. P. A. that such an appropriation be made. In preparing the budget of the Zionist Organization I submitted the same as it appears necessary to furnish 30,000 subscribers to the U. P. A. with copies of The New Palestine, the cost of production of which is over \$2.00 per annum a copy, is only half to charge the U. P. A. At least the actual cost, which means the sum of \$60,000 per annum. The Finance Committee of the U. P. A. has provisionally agreed to this, but that such a final decision will depend on the annual budget that the U. P. A. be requested to make a grant of \$40,000 for general publicity. The total grant is \$100,000, which is \$12,000 less than the demand made by the U. P. A. to the Zionist Organization on behalf of the publications during the year which is quite true. It is quite true that the entire machinery of the Zionist Organization the U. P. A. could not collect the amount it undertakes to collect and the \$40,000 contribution is not a grant, but a compensation for the voluntary relinquishment on the part of the Zionist Organization of the privilege of asking for general contributions above and beyond what is required.

While it is necessary to keep the accounts of the Zionist Organization and the U. P. A. strictly separated it would be idle to erect a wall of work of the U. P. A. and so on understood without the work of the Zionist Organization.

The demand that no part of the receipts of the U. P. A. should be used to create political control for mankind, political parties, after all pretensions, without evidence to substantiate that such a condition exists. The demand that the U. P. A. be wholly divorced from the direct or indirect control of the Zionist Organization leaves the question of the proper control of the U. P. A. entirely in the air. In so far as the U. P. A. is the federation of several agencies making a combined appeal it is obvious that the control of the U. P. A. must be left in the hands of these agencies working together. There may be only a question of participation in the collection drive. It is in this

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pressed that in the adjustment the views given expression to in the resolutions of the Zionist General Council at its Berlin session will be fully considered. The newspapers further express their hope that after "enthusiastic words deeds will follow."

The "Juedische Rundschau," Berlin organ of the German Zionists, in publishing the Jewish Telegraphic Agency despatches from New York, headed the report with across the page caption: "Sternbild Proceedings at Marshall Conference." The newspaper declares that the outcome of the Non-Zionist Conference in New York was a grand demonstration for the Jewish National Home, as well as for the ideal of unity in Jewish life. The differences with regard to the recommendations of the Joint Palestine Survey Commission which have arisen because of the decisions of the Zionist General Council will be smoothed out, in favor of the common work. "Now we are entitled to hope that a new and great turn in the Palestine work and perhaps a new epoch in Jewish development will follow."

NATHAN STRAUS DECLARES FOR COLONEL LEHMAN

Declaring himself for Franklin D. Roosevelt and Colonel Herbert H. Lehman, Democratic nominees for New York Governor and Lieutenant Governor, Nathan Straus addressed a letter to the Citizens Roosevelt-Lehman Committee, pledging his support.
