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RELIGIOUS PERSECUTIONS IN RUSSIA FOLLOW HIGH-HOLIDAY ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS

Two Communists Tried for Participation in Services

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, Nov. 10.—The anti-Jewish persecutions carried on in connection with the High Holidays continue, according to reports received here.

Many labor clubs were closed during the High Holidays, it now becomes known. The clubs, which remained open, were empty on the holidays.

In the village Dukar, two Communists, Cohn and Freed, leaders in the local labor club, will be tried for participation in the holiday services. They will be tried on the charge of having attended religious services. The evidence presented against them by the Yevsektsiya, Jewish Section of the Communist Party, is that they were honored with the reading of passages from "Atho Horeiso" at the Simchas Torah celebration.

The entire Comsomol, Communist Youth organization, in the town Shazk, headed by the manager of the club, will be tried on similar charges.

It is expected that many students of the Pedagogical Institute at Minsk, who went home for the holidays, will be expelled from the Institute, the reports state.

ASK RELIEF FOR JEWISH BAKERS THREATENED BY NEW REGULATIONS

Club of Jewish Deputies Intercedes in Sejm to Modify Ordinance

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Nov. 10.—An appeal against the recent municipal ordinance for the closing of all bakeries not operating with mechanical devices and machines was presented at the Sejm session by the Club of Jewish Deputies.

The carrying into effect of this ordinance would affect two-thirds of all the bakeries. The 2,000 bakeries thus affected could not immediately be substituted by new, machine-equipped bakeries, the Jewish deputies argued.

Many thousands of families would remain without a livelihood if the bakeries are forced to close, they stated.

A suggestion was presented that the government grant subventions to the bakeries, enabling them to install the required machinery.

WARSAW MOHALIM MUST PASS EXAMINATION

Warsaw, Nov. 10.—A new ruling with regard to the granting of licenses to Mohalim, men who perform the rite of circumcision, was adopted by the Warsaw Kehillah.

The Kehillah has definitely decided to require all Mohalim to pass an examination before the Rabbinate and a doctors' commission.

PREPARATIONS PROCEED FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF HAIFA HARBOR

Government Negotiating with Landowners at Harbor Area

Jerusalem, Nov. 10.—The Government is negotiating with the landowners at the harbor area regarding the hiring of a site for establishing barracks for the workers who will be employed in the Haifa harbor construction works. The contract of lease began on November 1.

It is stated that contrary to previous estimates, the harbor construction will incur an additional expenditure of L. P. 250,000. Special messengers are touring the villages of the Jerusalem area and enrolling fellahen for the construction work.

BALTIMORE CHARITIES LAUNCH CAMPAIGN

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 11.—The campaign of the Associated Jewish Charities will open tonight with a banquet at the Lyric.

The quota has been set at \$590,000, representing the minimum amount needed to care adequately for the activities of the Associated Jewish Charities and its 18 constituent organizations next year, Sidney Lansburgh, president of the charities, explained.

About 18,000 prospect cards have been prepared and 700 workers have been enrolled.

Rabbi William Rosenau, of the Eutaw Place Temple, will pronounce the invocation at the banquet. Mr. Lansburgh will start the speaking program and will be followed by Harry Greenstein, executive director of the charities association, and Jacob Blaustein, who will make the formal appeal.

DR. A. J. RONGY RESIGNS AS THE VICE PRESIDENT OF AMERICAN JEWISH CONGRESS

Action a Protest Against Stand of Dr. Wise on Ottinger Candidacy

Dr. A. J. Rongy, Vice-President of the American Jewish Congress and a member of its Administrative Committee, has severed his connections with that organization as a protest against the stand taken by Dr. Stephen S. Wise in connection with the candidacy of Mr. Albert Ottinger for the Governorship of the State of New York.

Dr. Rongy resigned his offices in a letter sent to Mr. Bernard G. Richards, Executive Secretary of the American Jewish Congress, a copy of which he released to the "Jewish Daily Bulletin." His communication to Mr. Richards follows:

Mr. Bernard C. Richards, Secretary, American Jewish Congress, New York, N. Y.

Dear Sir:

I hereby tender my resignation as Vice-President and member of the Administrative Committee of the American Jewish Congress. I feel that the policy pursued by Dr. Stephen S. Wise, President of the Congress, in connection with the candidacy of Mr. Ottinger for the Governorship of the State of New York makes it impossible for me to continue my relationship with the Congress.

I have always been of the opinion that race and religion should be kept out of American political life. Democ-

The meeting will be held to take place in Berlin, December 20th to 24th.

The results toward the consummation of the Jewish Agency achieved in the United States, and progress made in other countries, will be taken up at the Berlin session.

JEWISH SOLDIERS TAKE PART IN MEMORIAL UNVEILING

Paris, Nov. 10.—An invitation to Jewish ex-soldiers to participate in the unveiling of a memorial to the Unknown Soldier at Plessis was extended by Mayor Robinson of that city.

The memorial bears the inscriptions of 42 fallen Jewish soldiers, former students of the Horticulture Hirsch school, who volunteered for service.

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LEHMAN POLLED LARGEST

INDIVIDUAL VOTE IN N. Y.

The largest individual vote of the campaign in the five boroughs of New York was polled by Col. Herbert H. Lehman in his race for the Lieutenant-Governorship, final figures of the election show. His total was 1,167,508. The reason that his pluralism lagged behind that of Senator Copeland, for whom 1,161,212 persons voted in the five boroughs, was that Ambassador Houghton received 620,348 votes in his race against Senator Copeland, while Charles C. Lockwood, Lehman's opponent, received 652,012.

The largest total vote was cast in the Presidential balloting, of course, the total vote for both Smith and Hoover being 1,858,547. The total vote for both of the candidates for the Governorship in the five boroughs was 1,858,130 and that of the Lieutenant Governorship was 1,819,520.

RABBI LAUD OUTCOME OF NON-ZIONIST CONFERENCE ON PALESTINE WORK

Issue Statements in Reply to Jewish Daily Bulletin Inquiry

Praise for outcome of the Non-Zionist Conference on Palestine is expressed by Rabbis in reply to an inquiry initiated by the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

RABBI MAURICE H. HARRIS, Temple Israel, New York City, just as soon as the invitation reached me to attend a meeting in which a modus vivendi was to be brought about between Zionists and non-Zionists in the upbuilding of Palestine, I felt that a historic achievement was imminent.

"The outcome of that notable meeting justified the expectation.

"In the early days of the Zionist movement, at the end of the 19th century, the Jews fell into two groups—Zionists and anti-Zionists. Feeling ran high. In the process of years, the Zionist movement took on a somewhat different aspect and won the adherence of many who had opposed it, by becoming a cultural as well as a nationalist concept. As acrimony died down, the anti-Zionist disappeared and the non-Zionist took his place. Many now came to appreciate the achievement of Zionism in deepening Jewish consciousness where they were not prepared to espouse its theory of a Jewish nation.

"Now, at last, Zionists and non-Zionists are joining hands and planning to work together in the upbuilding of Palestine and for aiding in every way those now settling there. The hatchet is buried. It is now realized that all Israel throughout the world can and should aid in the rehabilitating of the land of our fathers."

HARRY H. LAPIDUS, Omaha, Neb.—"I am thoroughly convinced that the Non-Zionist Conference and the Jewish Congress will prove of tremendous value to the Jews of the world."

RABBI SAMUEL J. LEVINSON, Temple Beth Emeth of Flatbush, Brooklyn, N. Y.—"I have read the proceedings of the Non-Zionist Conference with both care and interest and can arrive at no other conclusion than this, that the result of the proceedings must be what is hoped for—a unification of American Jewry in the task of Palestinian reconstruction. I believe the conference to have been an epoch making event in American Jewish life."

RABBI EDGAR F. MAGNIN, Los Angeles, Cal.—"The Non-Zionist Conference held under the chairmanship of Louis Marshall, and which was attended by some of the most outstanding Jews of America, including both Zionists and non-Zionists, represents a tremendous step forward not only in the development of Palestine, but in Jewish American life. Its significance may be viewed from several angles. To begin with, it is a triumph for Palestine. Palestinian development is not a matter of theory any longer. It is more than a philosophy—it is an actual fact. It has been begun and furthered and we dare not fail to support it now. The reputation of our entire people is at stake. We cannot afford to be

known as quitters; nor is there any necessity that we should be.

"Almost as important, if not of equal significance, is the fact that the Jews of all groups have at last united, for ally and overtly in the furtherance of this great plan. It is a lesson to the world, and what is just as important to ourselves, that Jews can unite where the interests of their people are at stake. One of the most tragic situations we have to confront as Jews is our lack of solidarity. We are a minority people and misunderstood by the entire world and we have not had a sense enough and courage enough to try to understand ourselves or to face the world united. Mr. Marshall and his group are to be congratulated on their bigness of mind and vision; also for their loyalty to their people. The Zionist group is to be congratulated for its reasonableness and diplomacy. Common sense business methods, combined with the finest tact, can alone insure success for Palestine.

"At this time, when we are celebrating the Eleventh Anniversary of the Balfour Declaration, nothing more encouraging could have occurred. It will go down in Jewish history as an important event."

RABBI LOUIS A. MISCHKIND, Congregation Beth Emeth, Wilmington, Del.—"Among the more encouraging angles that were flashed at the Conference held in the Baltimore area, two highly important ones. The first marks the realization that Palestinian reconstruction is a Jewish job, and as such demands the unity of Israel for its accomplishment. From this flows directly another thought: that the non-Zionist rapprochement, and the inevitable Zionist counter-move in the same direction, may be the actual beginning of a more organized Jewish community in America. Certainly, with respect to fund-raising for communal institutions of national scope, that seems not only desirable but, with the ingercence of the two groups, at last feasible."

YIDDISH TALKIES TO BE PRODUCED HERE

The Vocafilm Corporation of America has closed a thirteen year contract with the Maurice Schwartz Yiddish Talking Pictures Corporation for the making of Yiddish talkies.

"Jews everywhere will be able to see and hear Maurice Schwartz and his famous Yiddish Art Theatre Company in talking pictures," David Hochreich, president of the Vocafilm, stated.

Maurice Schwartz's Yiddish Talking Pictures Corporation will make a minimum of six plays each year over the Vocafilm synchronization system. It is planned. Each will be a 1000-Talker adapted from the Yiddish Art Theatre's repertory of stage successes, and to be produced at the Yiddish Art Theatre. In three plays a year, Maurice Schwartz will be starred. All will be supervised by him.

These productions will be played all over the world in Yiddish. The name of the first Vocafilm production to be made by the Maurice Schwartz Yiddish Talking Pictures Corporation will be announced within the next few days.

HERBERT HOOVER'S MESSAGE READ AT UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL CONFERENCE

**President-elect Regrets Inability to
Aid Drive for Palestine Funds**
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Boston, Nov. 11.—A message from Herbert Hoover, President-elect, was read at the United Palestine Appeal Conference which was opened at the Hotel Statler here last night.

"I am heartily in accord with the effort to recognize Palestine and I should like to help the drive for funds," Mr. Hoover's message read. "Unfortunately, my obligations during the next several weeks are such as to make it impossible for me to visit Boston. I regret this very much, and wish your efforts success." This message was sent by President-elect Hoover a few weeks ago but was just made public on the eve of the drive.

Governor-elect Francis S. Allen extended greetings on behalf of Massachusetts at the Sunday morning session, attended by one thousand delegates from all parts of the United States. A regional directors' meeting was held all day Friday, where tentative plans for launching a nation-wide campaign were formulated.

A delegation of Boston Zionists headed by Nathan H. Gordon, Judge David A. Lourie, A. E. Waggon, Elihu D. Stone, Max Shoolman, met Mr. and Mrs. Felix M. Warburg and Dr. and Mrs. Chaim Weizmann upon their arrival in Boston.

DR. S. S. GOLDWATER MAY HEAD N. Y. HOSPITAL DEPT.

Dr. S. S. Goldwater, director of Mount Sinai Hospital and Health Commissioner during the Mitchell Administration, was said to be Mayor Walker's choice for head of the new Department of Hospitals which is to begin functioning Feb. 1 next. The bill creating it was signed by the Mayor on Friday.

Dr. Goldwater is a consulting physician to the Health Department and is regarded as one of the highest authorities on hospital design, construction and administration. There is some doubt whether Dr. Goldwater could be induced to accept the new post, however, as his present salary is considerably more than the city can pay the new Commissioner.

Under the new plan all hospitals controlled by the city will be reorganized. At present several are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Health, others under the Department of Welfare and another group under the trustees of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. The three groups are to pass under one head who will be known as Commissioner, with all the powers of that office.

The Earl of Birkenhead, recently retired as Secretary of State for India, has been appointed to the Board of Directors of Imperial Chemical Industries, Ltd., the \$25,000,000 corporation headed by Lord Melchett, which was created in 1926.

Lord Birkenhead's salary for his new post will be \$10,000 a year plus one per cent of the profits, which is expected will amount to \$100,000.

The position will not take all Lord Birkenhead's time, as he expects to become active in a number of big business undertakings.

Temple Sinai Dedicated in New Orleans

New Orleans, La., Nov. 7.—The dedication of Temple Sinai was celebrated with threefold ceremonies, Friday, Saturday and Sunday. A service for the Congregation, one for the Jewish Community, and a third for the community of New Orleans, were held.

The new Temple was begun under the leadership of Rabbi Max Heller, now Rabbi emeritus, and completed under the leadership of Rabbi Louis Binstock.

Rabbi James K. Heller of Cincinnati, son of Rabbi Max Heller, together with Rabbi William Fine-shreiber of Philadelphia, spoke the words of dedication on Friday evening. Rabbi Leipziger of Touro Synagogue, Silber of the Gates of Prayer, Dr. Fichman of the Jewish Federation, and Rabbi Sol Kory of Vicksburg, also a spiritual son of Sinai, brought greetings on Saturday morning as a prelude to the dedicatory address delivered by Rabbi Max Heller. The program on Sunday morning included addresses by prominent non-Jewish laymen by a Christian pastor and by Rabbi David Lefkowitz of Dallas and Rabbi David Marx of Atlanta. Rabbi Gilbert Peiser also assisted in the ceremonies.

The services were followed by a Congregational Dinner at the Roosevelt Hotel on Sunday night at which representatives of the Brotherhood, Sisterhood, Sabbath School, Congregation, and young people were speakers. Mr. Jacob Blum, president of the Congregation, was praised for his efforts in bringing the project to fruition.

A Menorah Society branch was formed Sunday, November 4, at a meeting attended by 50 students from Texas and Newcomb Colleges. The meeting, held at the Sinai Center, was addressed by Rabbis Lefkowitz and Marx, and by Prof. Etlinger of the Texas State University. Sam Lang was elected president and Miss Hagedorn, vice-president.

Jewish organizations and their representatives are preparing to take active part in the Community Chest Drive, November 12-23, to raise \$953,000 to finance 76 agencies, including those of the Jewish Federation. Edgar B. Stern is president of the Chest and other members of the Jewish Community are active in every department of Chest service.

The Jewish institutions in the Chest are the Touro Infirmary, the Jewish Children's Home, the Y. M. H. A., the Y. W. H. A., the Central Relief Society, the Ladies Aid Society. Since the organization of the Chest, the budget allowances to the Jewish agencies have averaged an increase of about 33 per cent, as compared with pre-Chest budgets.

racism cannot and will not survive unless this is strictly adhered to. Dr. Wise has the right to express his own political views in favor of or against any candidate. But as President of the American Jewish Congress it became him to criticize the Jewishness of Mr. Ottinger or the kind of a Jew he is. As the leader of the Congress movement he had no right to speak with derision of the first Jewish gubernatorial candidate nominated for that high office by the Republican Party of the entire State. It seems to me that if Mr. Ottinger had been elected Governor of the State of New York, and because he is a Jew—maybe not the kind that Dr. Wise or I wish him to be—he would have shown some of the Eastern and Central European countries where Jews are being persecuted, that the position of the Jew in the United States is one of dignity and political security.

I have never had the opportunity of meeting Mr. Ottinger and the basis of my decision in this matter is purely objective and impersonal. With kindest regards, I remain

BROTHERHOOD TO FORM STUDENT CHAPTERS (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Nov. 10.—Student chapters of the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods will be organized at universities and colleges, it was decided by the Brotherhoods Executive Board.

Such an organization as the student-chapter would afford youths "the opportunity to make contacts with our membership in neighboring cities while in college, and elsewhere throughout the country when leaving school," the Committee on Student Activities said. "It would serve to link the young man to the Temple at the completion of his college life."

"Such a method would be a reversal of the usual system where national groups develop from student bodies and their alumni. Here we would go from without the campus to within."

The investigation conducted by the Brotherhood's Committee on Religious Propaganda has been completed, the committee announced. "To question a man on his religious beliefs touches on an exceedingly personal subject," the Committee said. "With this in mind we can justly feel that to have obtained the co-operation of 1,250 men or 7 per cent. of our total membership, is no mean accomplishment." The results of the survey are to be revealed within the next few weeks.

The Committee on Youth Membership plans to add 5,000 to the Brotherhood roster within the next year.

Gustave D. Golding, president of Washington Boulevard Temple Brotherhood, was elected to the Executive Board to succeed the late Herman Selz, Chicago.

N. Y. ELECTION DISPELS MYTH OF JEWISH VOTE

Election results in New York State completely dispelled the myth of a Jewish vote is the comment of the New York Jewish Tribune.

"The voting, taken by and large, definitely punctured the myth of a Jewish vote," the paper writes. "Attorney General Ottinger commanded much staunch support among many Jewish voters as among non-Jewish voters, but the same may be said of Franklin Roosevelt, many of whose chief lieutenants were Jewish and who apparently was not forgotten by many of the Jewish rank and file."

"The comparatively small margin separating Roosevelt and Ottinger plainly showed that if Jewry had voted *en bloc* for Ottinger, this margin would have been wiped out, and the Attorney General would have been elected."

Attorney General Albert Ottinger, Republican candidate for Governor and H. Edmund Machold, Chairman of the Republican State Committee, will wait until after the official canvasses in the various counties of the State next Tuesday before deciding whether or not to concede the election of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Democratic candidate, who has more than 25,000 plurality on the face of the unofficial returns.

Announcement to this effect was made by Mr. Machold after a conference with Mr. Ottinger and the Republican leaders of the five counties in New York City.

It also was learned definitely that there would be no application for a recount, if the canvass should show that Mr. Roosevelt had been elected on the face of the returns and that there would be no attempt to hold up the issuance of a certificate of election to him.

Thence they may pass over Transjordan and 600 miles across the Syrian Desert to Bagdad.

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
