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POLISH DEPUTIES REFUSE TO BELIEVE THAT JEWS PERPETRATED EXCESSES

**Sejm Rejects Accusation of Christian
Democratic Party**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Nov. 16.—Polish deputies in the Sejm refused to believe the allegations of the anti-Semitic Christian Democratic Party representatives, that Jews had perpetrated excesses. This was clear when the Sejm rejected by a majority vote, an urgent motion introduced by the Christian Democratic Party, charging that excesses occurred in the town Lida, where a movie house, Nirvana, owned by a Christian, was demolished.

The motion demanded that the Jewish vice-mayor of the town of Lida be removed from his post and disciplinary proceedings be brought against the local police.

The Jewish deputy, Wybowski, argued against the motion, declaring that the charge was ridiculous. He pointed to the fact that the local court had rejected the suit instituted by the owner of the movie house, Nirvana, against Vice-Mayor Pupke.

The motion was defeated over the vote of the Christian Democrats, the National Democrats and the National Labor Club.

ADMINISTRATION OF OZET CRITICIZED

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Nov. 16.—The Ozet, society for the settlement of Jews on the land was severely criticised at a meeting of the society held here. The charge was brought against the administration that while the membership increased by 2,173, the temper of the work diminished. A deficit of 6,000 roubles is expected to be shown.

The commission which was to investigate the charges brought against the representatives of the Ozet that they mistreated the settlers in Bira-Bidjan was ordered to postpone its work. Reports from Chabaravak, it was declared, claim that most of the charges were false.

BEDOON CHIEFS AGREE TO STOP PALESTINE ATTACKS

Jerusalem, Nov. 16.—Greater prospects for peace and tranquility on the borders of Palestine were in sight as the result of a peace pact concluded between the warring tribes of the Bedouins.

In the presence of representatives of the Governments of Syria and Palestine, the sheiks of the Bedouin in Transjordan, Jebel Druze and Syria, met at Irbid and concluded an agreement to cease all mutual attacks.

WILL GREET REVISIONIST CONGRESS WITH ANTI-SEMITIC RIOTS, PAPER THREATENS

**Revisionist Youth Defense Corps to Be
Organized; Appeal to Authorities**
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Nov. 16.—The conference of the League of Zionist Revisionists, scheduled to be held here the end of December, will be greeted with anti-Semitic riots similar to those which occurred during the Fourth Zionist Congress. This was the threat of the "Voelkische Tageszeitung," anti-Semitic paper published here.

The committee in charge of arrangements for the conference will appeal to the authorities. A Revisionist Youth Defense corps will be organized here.

PALESTINE MOSLEMS DIVIDED ON SUPREME COUNCIL'S POWER

**Opposition Would Reduce Tenure and
Salary of Council President**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Nov. 16.—A sharp controversy between the Moslems of Palestine is now being waged in connection with the Supreme Moslem Council, the highest religious body which recently came into prominence because of the Arab-Jewish dispute over the Wailing Wall.

The Moslem Supreme Council is under the control of the Hussaini family. A Government commission presided over by the Grand Mufti recently drafted a new constitution for the Council, according to which the president is to be elected for a term of nine years. The president may also be re-elected to this office twice. His monthly salary is to be £100.

The opposition, on the other hand, insists that the president of the Council be elected for a term of only four years, that he may be re-elected only once and that this salary is to be £50.

POLISH RABBI GETS HIGHEST GOVERNMENT DECORATION

Warsaw, Nov. 16.—Rabbi Chaim Posner, one of the twelve members of the Warsaw Rabbinate, chaplain and major in the Polish Army, was decorated by the Government on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of Poland's independence.

The order of Polonia Restituta, the highest order of the Republic, was conferred upon the rabbi.

CHAIRS FOR JEWISH HISTORY. YIDDISH AT KOVNO COLLEGE

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Nov. 16.—The University of Kovno intends soon to establish chairs for the instruction of Jewish history and the Yiddish language. Prime Minister Valdemars stated to Jewish representatives here. The chair for Semitic language will continue to function as before.

ZIONIST FEDERATION STARTS LIBEL SUIT AGAINST ANTI-SEMITIC DEPUTY

**Prussian Diet Lifts Immunity to Allow
Proceedings**

Berlin, Nov. 16.—A libel suit against the anti-Semitic deputy in the Prussian Diet, Herr Streicher, was instituted by the Zionist Federation of Germany.

The judicial committee of the Prussian Diet, at the request of the Zionist Federation, voted today to lift the immunity of the deputy in order to permit the proceedings. Streicher some time ago published an article in which he stated that at a "Zionist meeting of German rabbis" German womanhood was insulted.

CAN'T HAVE GOOD TIME WITH- OUT ANTI-SEMITIC SONGS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Nov. 16.—How can a patriotic German enjoy himself on his vacation without singing or hearing sung anti-Semitic songs, was the argument presented at the discussion which occupied the attention of the Municipal Council of Borkum, seaside resort on the North Sea.

The Council had before it a motion introduced by its chairman that beginning with the new season, public singing of the Borkum hymn, internationally famous anti-Semitic song, up to now feature of the entertainment in the resort's public squares, be prohibited.

The prohibition was urgently requested by the owners of the baths, who claimed that the public manifestation of anti-Semitic sentiment is harmful to their business, and reflects no credit on the resort.

Following a long discussion, the motion was defeated by a vote of 9 to 6. The defeated 6 councillors declared following the meeting that they will resign from their posts as they cannot longer bear responsibility for the performance.

PLAN TO SETTLE UNEMPLOYED JEWS IN URAL REGION

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Nov. 16.—A plan to settle Jews from the Ukraine and White Russian who are unemployed, in the Ural industrial sections, is being furthered by the Ort, society for the promotion of trades and agriculture.

The plan is to send unemployed Jews to the sections where there is a shortage of artisans. An artisans' commission is preparing a plan for this settlement work, with the cooperation of the Ozet, society for the settlement of Jews.

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**JEWISH AGENCY ADVOCATED
TWO DECADES AGO**

That the Jewish Agency idea is two decades old is the statement made in answer to the "Jewish Daily Bulletin's" inquiry on the Non-Zionist Conference.

RABBI HENRY COHEN, Galveston, Texas.—"The Jewish Agency is a child of mine, if I may be allowed to say so. Two decades ago, realizing all Jewry's responsibility in the matter I advocated some such organization privately and publicly. Its consummation so far is an earnest idea of of what might accrue as the years pass! All concerned as to be congratulated."

RABBI RAPHAEL H. MELAMED, Congregation Beth Israel, Elizabeth, N. J.—"The Non-Zionist Conference achieved the highest goal in creating unity in Israel both in America and the world over. It was distressing to note that the only bond of union in Israel hitherto known, was negative. It was either anti-Semitism, or the horrors of pogroms. Now we have a positive basis of unity, a common hope and a common ideal."

**UPSTATE REPUBLICAN
COUNTIES DEFEAT OTTINGER**

Albany, Nov. 16.—The up-State Republican counties defeated Attorney General Ottinger for Governor, it was stated here on the basis of official, final returns from a majority of the up-State counties.

In Erie, Monroe, Onondaga, Steuben, Ulster, Schenectady, as well as in Westchester, Nassau and Suffolk, Mr. Ottinger was defeated by thousands of voters, who cast their ballots for Mr. Roosevelt, or did not vote for Governor at all. In Westchester County Mr. Ottinger polled 10,000 fewer votes than did Lockwood, Republican nominee for Lieutenant Governor.

**URGE UNIFICATION OF
ZIONIST WORK IN EUROPE**

Vienna, Oct. 15.—The setting up of a Joint Committee of the Zionist Federations of Europe was the question dealt with at a conference held here yesterday of representatives of the Zionist Federations of Austria, Congress Poland, Eastern Galicia, Western Galicia, Czechoslovakia, Transylvania and Jugoslavia. The Zionist Federations of Germany, France, Old Roumania, Hungary, Lithuania and Switzerland sent messages welcoming the idea of such a Joint Committee. A message was also received from the Zionist Executive.

The President of the Zionist Committee in Austria, Dr. Leo Goldhammer, who opened the conference, outlined the purposes of the proposed Joint Committee. A debate took place in which the various points of view were expressed. A resolution was unanimously adopted welcoming the proposed establishment of a Joint Committee of the Zionist Organizations of Europe, and urging the need of an inter-territorial propaganda activity, to be carried on by means of an exchange of speakers and the application of modern propaganda methods through a central body to be established in agreement with the Zionist Executive.

**SOUTH AFRICA JEWS BUY
LAND IN PALESTINE**

Cape Town, Oct. 19.—Messrs. L. and P. Policansky of Cape Town have purchased 600 dunam of land near the Nes Zion Colony in Judea. An adjoining tract of 300 dunam has been purchased by Messrs. Chaim Jace and Max Gurland, both of Cape Town. The former is now in Palestine.

These two stretches constitute some of the best plantation lands in the country. The Jewish National Fund had been negotiating for the purchase of 300 dunam, part of the area bought by the Brothers Policansky, but owing to lack of funds was unable to acquire it.

Messrs. Policansky have, however, given the Jewish National Fund an option up till the end of the year, of buying the 300 dunam back from them at the same price as they paid, viz: £11 per dunam.

Only Jewish labor will be employed on the plantations.

The Free Synagogue Radio Service is conducted on W. 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the studio of the National Broadcasting Company. These stations include WEAF and WJLB. The service is conducted by Dr. Stephen S. Wise with the assistance of the Free Synagogue quartette under the direction of the Choirmaster, A. W. Binder.

Rabbi Norman Salit of Congregation Shaaray Tefila, Far Rockaway, N. Y., upon the expiration of his contract with the Congregation, declined the trustees' offer for a new contract. Rabbi Salit stated that he intends to enter business or the legal profession. He will become a member of the Congregation which he served as rabbi.

**AARON MAZIA HONORED
IN PALESTINE**

Jerusalem, Nov. 16.—Aaron Mazia, prominent physician and Hebrew linguist, was the guest of honor at a banquet tendered him on the occasion of his seventieth birthday. The event also marked the fortieth anniversary of Dr. Mazia's scientific work.

Chaim Nachman Bialik, Miss Henrietta Szold, Dr. Joseph Klausner, Joseph Mevuchas were among the speakers who praised Dr. Mazia for his "contribution to the spiritual and physical health of the Palestine community."

Dr. Mazia has prepared a medical lexicon in Hebrew, which the speakers urged him to complete and publish.

**JABOTINSKY TO EDIT "DOAR
HAYOM," HEBREW DAILY**

Jerusalem, Nov. 16.—The Doar Hayom, Jerusalem Hebrew daily will for the next two years be under the editorship of Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the League of Zionist Revisionists, according to an agreement concluded today. Itamar Ben-Avi, the present editor, will retire to devote himself to the Palestine Weekly.

A complete new staff will be engaged to work under Mr. Jabotinsky's editorship, it was stated.

**MOSCOW PAPER BOASTS OF
CONVERTS TO COMMUNISM**

Moscow, Nov. 16.—The letters of four members of the former Tel Hai Chalutzim colony in Crimea describing how they were converted to Communism are published by the "Komsomolskaya Pravda," Communist paper published here.

Prior to the liquidation by the government of the colony, the four converts to Communism were persecuted by the Chalutzim, they claim in their letters, and were refused food and bedding.

**FELICITATES POLAND
AND CZECHO-SLOVAKIA**

London, Nov. 16.—A telegram of congratulations on the occasion of the tenth anniversary of Poland's independence was despatched by the Joint Foreign Committee of the Anglo-Jewish Association and the Board of Jewish Deputies. The committee received a reply of thanks from Foreign Minister Zalesky in the name of the Polish Government.

A similar exchange of telegrams took place between the Committee and the Czechoslovakian government on the occasion of Czechoslovakia's independence anniversary.

Philip L. Sykes, Baltimore attorney, has been appointed by Governor Albert C. Ritchie as an associate judge of the Orphans' Court of Baltimore. He will take the position vacated by Harry C. Gaither, who was appointed chief judge following the death recently of Chief Judge Myer J. Block.

LEADERS HONOR WATTENBERG DONOR OF BUILDING TO HEBREW UNIVERSITY

Mount Scopus Was Once Palestine's
Strategic Position of War

About 150 leading members of the Jewish community were present at a dinner given Thursday at the Hotel Astor by the American Advisory Committee of the Hebrew University, to celebrate the dedication of the Wattenberg Hall of the Einstein Institute of Mathematics and Physics.

As toastmaster, James Marshall referred to his visit to Palestine in 1927, and how important he regarded the University in the development of Palestine. He said that there is strong local demand for facilities for higher education in Palestine itself; that a place of study must be provided for the hunted and outcast youth of Jewish descent; entrance to universities in the countries of Eastern Europe; the introduction of modern agriculture; creates problems of water supply, chemistry, and physics which can best be solved on the spot in the laboratories of the University. "The Jews who have benefitted for centuries," said Mr. Marshall, "from the universities of the Western World owe to the world the tribute of a place of higher learning."

Felix M. Warburg, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Louis Lipsky, Dr. Nathan Ratnofsky, Samuel C. Lamport, Mrs. Archibald Silverman of Providence, Judge William M. Lewis and Dr. S. Margoshes were the speakers of the evening who, emphasizing the importance of the Hebrew University, expressed appreciation for Mr. Wattenberg's \$100,000 gift for the erection of

WEDGWOOD'S DOCTRINE SPLITS REVISIONISTS

London, Nov. 16.—The adoption by a Zionist Revisionist conference held in Palestine several days ago of the "Seventh dominion" idea advocated by Col. Josiah Wedgwood, will cause a split in the ranks of the League of Zionist Revisionists, the oppositional group within the Zionist movement.

It was stated here that some of the members of the League are opposed to the idea that Zionists adopt at this time any policy that would commit them permanently to consider Palestine as a dominion within the British Empire, after the twenty-five year period of the Palestine Mandate has expired.

Good Will Furthered in Detroit

Detroit, Mich. Nov. 16.—Meeting on a common ground of good-will and friendly understanding, Catholics, Protestants and Jews joined Tuesday evening in a plea for fellowship at a dinner sponsored by the Men's Club of Temple Beth El, held at the Temple. Having an expression of welcome by Milford Stern, retiring president of Beth El, who was the chairman of the evening, the three speakers, Judge Ernest A. O'Brien, Roger M. Andrews, publisher of the "Detroit Times," and Judge Charles C. Simons spoke respectively for the Catholic, Protestant and Jewish groups.

"The spirit of tolerance is of slow, but solid growth," Judge O'Brien told his audience. "All monuments to progress can be attained by fighting each step of the way, until the light of intelligence, culture and education makes for their attainment—until all men realize that we all come from one common God, that we all are seeking a common purpose, and must work shoulder to shoulder for the attainment of that purpose."

If we can bring to the city—the state and the nation, a part of the spirit that hovers in our souls at this meeting to-night, we shall have achieved the purpose and the end of this new era of tolerance and understanding."

"You have built a monument to true Americanism in these meetings," Mr. Andrews said, "which all can see, and which the public should be made to understand."

"You cannot be a good American until you have sensed the length and breadth of friendship. You cannot be a good American until you're friendly to the country in which you live—to the state, and to the city of Detroit. You cannot be friendly in business unless you make friends with the man with whom you deal. The successful man—the happy man is he who represents in his daily activities the broad view—the friendly view."

"It is as difficult to conceive of Christianity without the New Testament, of Judaism without the Old Testament, of Mohammedanism without the Koran, as it is to conceive of true Americanism without a true interpretation of the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence," said Judge Simons.

"These two documents tell us all there is to know about true Americanism. The preamble of the Constitution begins: 'We, the people.' The Declaration of Independence tells us that 'All men are created free and equal.'"

"But within a few years of the writing of these documents, narrow and intolerant people read new meanings into them. At first, men began to interpolate a new word into the meaning of them: 'We the white people' and 'All white men are created equal.' And then later, many men, if they gave accurate meaning to what they felt, would

ROUMANIAN GOVERNMENT CHANGE NOT TO ADVERSELY AFFECT JEWS, SAYS WOLF Reports to Anglo-Jewish Association Optimistic

(J. T. A. Mail Service)

London, Nov. 4.—Matters in Roumania are quite satisfactory and the change of Government will not make any difference in so far as the relations with the Joint Foreign Committee are concerned, Lucien Wolf said in reporting for the Joint Foreign Committee to-day at the meeting of the Anglo-Jewish Association, Leonard G. Montefiore, the President of the Association, was in the chair. "Our relations with the Peasant Party," he said, "have been very good, although we have differences with both Parties, but we believe we shall settle them amicably. To-day's papers state that M. Titulescu is likely to be Foreign Minister in the new Government. We are specially pleased to hear this since M. Titulescu is an old friend of ours."

Mr. Wolf reported that negotiations had been carried on with the Governments of East European countries concerning the treatment of the Staatenlose. The Joint Foreign Committee also intends to bring the matter before the League of Nations and an important memorandum has been prepared to this effect.

In reply to a question whether the Joint Foreign Committee is likely to renew negotiations with the Russian Government with regard to the treatment of the Jews there, Mr. Wolf replied that this question would be considered at the next meeting of the Joint Foreign Committee, but there was no reason to believe that the situation had been improving lately.

The question of participation in the enlarged Jewish Agency, raised in the letter from the Zionist Executive was not discussed, since the letter states that the Executive will communicate to the Association the results of the New York Jewish Agency Conference. Pending the receipt of this information, the letter was merely noted.

The President made a statement on the work of the Jewish Colonization Association based on the report of M. Louis Oungre, the Director General, on his recent tour of the Ica colonies in the Argentine. The position had improved considerably since 1920; the statement said. Immigration, was quite satisfactory. Considerable difficulty was experienced in finding suitable elements for colonization, but this was partly solved by colonizing the sons of former colonists.

The religious life of the colonists kept pace with the increase of the population and their prosperity. A large new Synagogue was being built, the colonists themselves contributing £5,000 towards the purpose. In Basa Bilaso there were three Synagogues in existence and £1,000 annually were being contributed by the colonists toward their upkeep.

Preparations are being made for the annual banquet of the One Thousand League of the Mizrahi Organization of America, which will take place on Wednesday, December 5, at Broadway Central Hotel, New York City. The chairman of the banquet committee is Gerson Levitas.

the building to house the Einstein Institute of Mathematics and Physics.

Mr. Wattenberg, in responding, stated that since ancient times it was believed that he who obtains control of Mount Scopus, the site of the Hebrew University, dominates Palestine. Until now dominance was sought by impliments of war. The Hebrew University from Mount Scopus will dominate by methods of peace, research and intellectual advancement.

Dr. Weizmann, President of the Hebrew University, said, "The importance of the University, is not only for the development of Palestine, but as a cultural and spiritual center of the Jews throughout the world. It is for this reason that with the restoration of Palestine as a Home Land for the Jews, after the Balfour Declaration, that the cornerstone of the University was laid. The Jews wished to make this gesture to the entire world to indicate that they were again to contribute as they had in earlier days to science and culture of the entire world."

The dedication of the Wattenberg Hall took place on Mount Scopus, Jerusalem, on Oct. 31. Courses leading to a degree were inaugurated at that time. The work of the Mathematics Department was formally opened under the guidance of Dr. Michael Fekete, formerly Privat-Docent at the University of Budapest. Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University, announced that Dr. Frankel of Kiel had been invited by the Board of Governors to become Head of the Mathematics Institute, and it is hoped that he will begin his duties beginning next year.

The officers of the American Advisory Committee, under whose auspices the dinner was given, are Felix M. Warburg, Chairman; Judge Julian W. Mack and Walter E. Meyer, Vice-Chairmen, Maurice Wertheim, Treasurer, and Elisha Friedman, Secretary. Among those present at the dinner were Arthur Lehman, Paul F. Warburg, Louis Wiley, Eugene Untermyer, Hon. Albert Goldman, Dr. Emanuel Libman, and Samuel C. Lamport.

have said: "All men are created equal if they are white, of native stock born in the United States, or sprung from some approved racial stock."

"It is the answer to these false interpolations that this meeting and others that have gone before provide.

"There has been a sounder, more logical interpretation of what was actually meant by the writers of these documents than Abraham Lincoln's Illinois debates with Douglas. In these debates the interpretation is as clear as ringing and as conclusive to the people who misread them now as it was to those who misread them in Lincoln's time. Here is what he said:

"They (the writers) meant to set up a standard maxim, revered by all, looked to by all—augmenting the value and happiness of life to all people of all colors everywhere—liberty not only for the people of this country, but extending a hope to the people of all the world."

"What difference does it make whether we have the same traditions, whether Simons continue? "Everything must be approached from the point of view of Americanism, not from the point of view of petty differences in creed."

"America is in the main free from these poisonous things that we call religious and social and economic prejudices."

"I see a return to traditional influences in regard to my people," said Judge Simon, "a revelation on the part of the Jews of those things that are fine in our traditions."

"Nothing will break down intolerance as far as the Jew is concerned more quickly than the restoration of his self-respect and his dignity; and the day on which the Jew walks out into the market place and in the public streets, not ashamed, but holding high his head with self-respect, the sooner the day will come when the Jew will be accorded dignity and respect that is his due."

BAR KOCBHA MARKS THIRTIETH ANNIVERSARY

Mr. Frieman is president of the Canadian Zionist Organization and Mrs. Freiman is president of Canadian Hadassah.

At the banquet Hadassah will present Mrs. Freiman with an illuminated album containing the names of Canadian Jewish women who have contributed towards a new building for the Canadian Hadassah Girls' Agricultural School at Nahalal, Palestine, to be known as the Lillian Freiman Building.

The National Council of the Zionist Organization of Canada will mark the occasion by presenting Mr. Freiman with a life-size painting of himself by Hermann Struck.

Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Freiman have been prominent in the industrial development and social welfare and relief work in Canada. Both are on the committees of various welfare societies and institutions, Jewish and non-Jewish, and Mrs. Freiman for her work for the war veterans has been presented with a life membership in the Ottawa Association of the Great War Veterans' Association, and she has been honored Zionist activities in Canada were inaugurated by Mrs. Freiman when in 1917 she toured Canada to raise a large fund for Palestine. After the World War Mrs. Freiman went to Ukraina, bringing over to Canada one hundred war orphans, placing them in homes in Canada. Through their representatives, Faiga Hirschmann of Montreal and Ruth Davis of Ottawa, these children will present Mrs. Freiman with a silver loving cup and an illuminated address.

As president of the Zionist Organization of Canada and as Dominion president of Canadian Hadassah respectively, both are known in every Jewish community in this country.

Delegations from all over the Dominion will be present at the banquet. A committee of the National Council of the Zionist Organization of Canada is headed by Dr. David Ben-Gurion, president of the Organization and the Dominion chairman of the Keren Hayesod.

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
