

## LEAGUE COMMISSION ADVISES MOSLEMS AND JEWS TO REACH FRIENDLY AGREEMENT ON WALL ISSUE

**Palestine Government Must Abandon Role of Mediator But Take Steps  
to Reach Settlement; Budapest Newspaper Publishes  
Report of Secret Session**

Budapest, Dec. 1.—The government of Palestine must abandon its present policy of declaring its readiness to act as a mediator between the contending parties and, instead, assume an active role toward bringing about a friendly agreement between the Moslems and the Jews of Palestine concerning their dispute over the Western Wall, commonly known as the Wailing Wall, the relic of Solomon's Temple.

This is the view taken by the Permanent Mandates Commission of the League of Nations which met in Geneva in September and which considered a petition by the Zionist Executive, protests by rabbis and a complaint by Moslem Palestine leaders. The "Pester Lloyd" in a despatch from Geneva claims today that it is in possession of a copy of the observations of the Permanent Mandates Commission, held secret pending their approval by the Council of the League of Nations.

The Mandates Commission considered various legal and positive aspects contained in the petition of the Zionist Organization and in the remarks offered by the British Government, the report states. The Commission was

satisfied that although the complainant and the responsible administration stress different points, no important material differences exist between their positions, which leave no doubt concerning the occurrences. Both also fully agree regarding the best way to improve the present unfortunate situation which wounds religious feelings and is equally unpleasant and inconsistent for the administration which is interested in the maintenance of order and impartial justice amongst contradicting demands by rival religions and races in Palestine.

The Mandates Commission will warmly welcome possibilities for the reaching of an agreement between the Moslem and Jewish communities and will sharply condemn every obstacle or postponement placed in the way of this. The Commission, although condemning the occurrences, refrains from rebuking any persons whose action or non-action accentuated these occurrences. Such occurrences, however, endanger the peace and grieve all to whom Palestine is dear and holy. The Commission hopes, therefore, that no effort will be spared to reach a just and friendly agreement which alone can prevent recurrences.

The Commission does not regard it as sufficient that the part of the government shall be confined to expressing readiness to mediate between the parties. It is absolutely essential that the Palestine government takes definite steps to reach a settlement in which the moral and legal rights of the Jews and Moslems will be fully and equally considered. The Commission expresses the definite hope that no party, through unreasonable demands or unendurable objections, would shoulder the responsibility of forfeiting the possibility of settlement, the report declares.

## PAINEVE DENIES JEWISH DISCRIMINATION IN ARMY

Paris, Dec. 1.—The existence of anti-Jewish discrimination in certain French regiments was alleged and denied when the question was brought up in parliament Friday night during the discussion on the military budget.

Deputy Henri Guernut asked the government why Jews are not admitted to the regiments of the Spahi and the Fusiliers. Minister of War Painleve replied that Jews are admitted to all Zouave regiments and that there is no ostracism whatsoever.

## REICH NEGOTIATES WITH POLISH PRIME MINISTER FOR NEW UNDERSTANDING

**Says Good Will Is Here; Government  
Organ Attacks Gruenbaum Policy**

Warsaw, Dec. 1.—Several of the demands of the Jewish population in the Republic of Poland in relation to its economic and cultural needs will be placed on the agenda of the next session of the Council of Ministers, declared a statement issued Friday by Deputy Leon Reich, representative from Galicia and a staunch opponent of the Gruenbaum policy.

The statement was issued following an audience granted to the deputy by Prime Minister Bartel. Deputy Reich stated that he gained the impression that the government takes a great interest in the demands of the Jewish deputies and has an understanding of their importance. Political importance was ascribed to this communication in view of the recent clash between Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, president of the Club of Jewish Deputies and General Skladkowski, Minister of the Interior, during the budget discussion in the Sejm commission.

The encounter between Deputy Gruenbaum and General Skladkowski is echoing widely through the Polish press. In today's issue, the Cracow newspaper, "Ilustrowany Kurjer Codzienny," a pro-government organ, commenting on the incident declared that "the time has come to put an end to the provocations of the Gruenbaumists and the Litwaks."

## ROUMANIAN STUDENTS WARNED BY GOVERNMENT AGAINST ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS

**Measures Necessary as Opposition  
Parties Increase Campaign**

Bucharest, Dec. 1.—The students of the University of Bucharest were warned against participating in any anti-Jewish attacks or disturbances of the peace, in official announcements placarded at the University. In unmistakable terms the authorities declare that those students who will be found guilty of participating in such attacks will be punished and the University will be closed.

The necessity for such measures was caused by the increasing anti-Semitic campaign which is being carried on by the opposition parties among the student body. The feeling is general that unless immediate action is taken to stop the inciting propaganda, anti-Semitic excesses may follow.

Leaders of the Jewish groups have addressed a petition to the government asking postponement of the Senate elections from the scheduled date which falls on Saturday.

## TROUBLE AGAIN BREWING IN ARAB PENINSULA; EX-KING HUSSEIN PLANS COME-BACK

**Families on the Transjordan-Hedjaz  
Frontier Already Evacuating Homes**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 1.—Trouble is again brewing on the Arab peninsula, as ex-King Hussein, deposed by the victorious leader of the Wahabids, Sultan Ibn Saud, is planning a come-back.

Reports are current here that in connection with the revolt of several Bedouin tribes against the reign of Ibn Ali, in whose favor Hussein abdicated, are now taking measures to regain their rights to the throne. A mission whose members are now at Amman, capital of Transjordan where Hussein's second son, Emir Abdullah, reigns, will proceed to Hedjaz in an attempt to raise a general revolt against Ibn Saud.

Many families who live on the Transjordan-Hedjaz frontier are evacuating their homes as Wahabi raids on the frontier territory are expected in connection with the troublesome political situation.

**B'NAI BRITH LEADERS LEAVE  
FOR TOUR OF CANADA**

Cincinnati, Dec. 1.—Senator Alfred M. Cohen, president of the Independent Order B'nai Brith and Dr. Boris D. Bogen, Executive Secretary of the Order, left for a tour of the principal cities in Canada, to stimulate interest in the Order's educational and cultural work.

President Cohen will deliver an address in Montreal on Sunday, December 2, and in Toronto on December 3. On the way back to the States, Mr. Cohen and Dr. Bogen will pay another visit to Buffalo where the B'nai Brith leaders spoke on Friday night at the Temple before going to Canada.

A conference of the National Wider Scope Committee, the body which is carrying on the \$2,000,000 campaign for the extension of the work of the fraternal order, will be held early in January, it was announced at I. O. B. B. headquarters here. The date and place of the conference will be determined during this month. It is also viewed as possible that a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Constitution Grand Lodge will be held at the same date and place.

New lodges of the I. O. B. B. established during the past six months were announced by the Order's headquarters here. They are: Long Island Lodge, Jamaica, L. I.; Austin Lodge, Chicago; Rockford Lodge, Rockford, Ill.; Monterey County Lodge, Salinas, Cal.; and San Pedro Lodge, San Pedro, Cal.

New lodges abroad are Shanghai Lodge, Shanghai, China; Unitas Lodge, Satu Mare, Roumania and Hillel Lodge, Botosani, Roumania.

**MUSSOLINI TAKES EXCEPTION  
TO TERMINOLOGY USED  
BY ITALIAN ZIONISTS**

Asks Whether Jews Consider Them-  
selves Nationality or Religion

London, Dec. 1.—An article in the "Popolo di Roma", which the London Daily Telegraph attributes to Premier Mussolini, discusses the recent Italian Zionist Congress and takes exception to the terminology employed by Zionists in that country.

Il Duce is surprised to hear the Italian Zionists speak of the Hebrew race, the Hebrew people and the Hebrew nation without referring to religion. He takes exception to this attitude of Italian Zionists regarding nationality and asks sharply whether they consider themselves a nationality or a religion. The object of this question is not to create anti-Semitism, which does not exist in Italy, the writer declares recalling that three Italian premiers were Jews, but for the purpose of being informed as to how things stand and for drawing the proper inference. The article does not suggest what inference the writer intends to draw, but the "Daily Telegraph" thinks the language employed by the Italian Zionists has caused irritation to the Fascist dictator.

**LEHMAN WILL SIT IN  
ROOSEVELT CABINET**

Warm Springs, Ga., Dec. 1.—Col. Herbert H. Lehman, Lieutenant-Governor-elect, will sit in on the cabinet of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Democratic Governor-elect announced here.

In announcing this departure from previous precedent, the Governor-elect stated: "I think it is good business practice, for it will give us the benefit of Col. Lehman's great ability in financial and budget matters."

At tonight's Governor Smith's policy of a cabinet made up of heads of fourteen state departments, Mr. Roosevelt, as he announced, will add a fifteenth member in the person of the Lieutenant Governor.

**WORKERS LEAVE FACTORY  
DUE TO MISTREATMENT**

Riga, Dec. 1.—Fifty Jewish working girls employed in the factory, Dwina, at Witbsk left the plant as a group in protest against anti-Semitic mistreatment, states a report received here from Russia.

When the girls protested to the Commissioner in charge of the factory, he said anything can be done to Jews.

The singer was honored by the Austrian President for her performances in Vienna and the services rendered by her to the Mozart festivals at Salzburg.

**HUNGARIAN SENATE LIFTS IM-  
MUNITY OF JEWISH SENATOR  
TO PERMIT COURT ACTION**

Hungarian Court's Suit Repercussion  
of Recent University Excesses

Budapest, Dec. 1.—The Hungarian Upper Chamber overrode the recommendation of its committee on Senator's immunity and lifted the immunity of Joseph Veszi, life member of the Senate, to allow court action brought against him by Count Teleki, leader of anti-Semitic forces.

The suit sprang out of an article published in the "Pester Lloyd" of which Senator Veszi is publisher, charging Count Teleki with instigating the anti-Semitic student excesses in the universities.

Senator Veszi was appointed life member of the Chamber by a decree of Admiral Horthy, Regent of Hungary, in recognition of the publisher's services to Hungary on the occasion of his fiftieth anniversary as publisher of the influential paper.

**SOVIET GIVES 40,000 ROUBLES  
TO TRAIN JEWISH WORKERS**

Moscow, Dec. 1.—The 40,000 rubles assigned by the Soviet Government for the Comzet for the purpose of training Jewish workers, will be administered by the Ort, the society for the promotion of trades and agriculture among the Jewish population.

The Ort is negotiating with the grain trust toward an agreement whereby 200 Jewish workers will be among the 3,000 needed to operate tractors on the various farms.

**SOKOLOW RECEIVED BY  
DANZIG PRESIDENT**

Danzig, Dec. 1.—Nahum Sokolow, Chairman of the Zionist Executive, was received by the President of the Danzig Senate at an interview on Thursday.

A large pro-Palestine mass meeting was held here on Thursday evening with the participation of Nahum Sokolow and the representative of the German Keren Hayesod Committee, Herr Markus. A message was read from Count von Bernsdorf, Germany's representative at the League of Nations, who is president of the German Pro-Palestine Committee.

**VALDEMARAS GIVES DINNER  
TO JEWISH LEADERS**

Kovno, Dec. 1.—Prime Minister Valdemaras gave a state dinner in honor of a group of Jewish representatives, mainly Zionists.

The occasion was the visit to Kovno of Dr. Alexander Goldstein, delegate of the Keren Hayesod of London. Prime Minister Valdemaras delivered a toast in Hebrew, ending with the word "L'maan Zion" (for Zion's sake).

Dr. Max Switton, superintendent of Home for Hebrew Aged, San Francisco, Calif., died suddenly Thanksgiving morning. Before going to San Francisco in 1924, he was for many years superintendent of the Orthodox Home for Jewish Aged in Chicago.

## \$250,000 REMITTED TO PALESTINE SAVES ZION COMMONWEALTH, LIPSKY ANNOUNCES

Affairs of Palestine Land Buying Agency Being Liquidated; Deeds to American Purchasers Soon Ready for Delivery

The problem of the American Zion Commonwealth, a land-buying and land-developing agency in Palestine which has threatened the progress of the Zionist Organization of America for the past two years and which was largely responsible for the controversy in the American Zionist movement last year has been solved, according to an announcement issued by Louis Lipsky, President of the Zionist Organization of America.

The difficulties in which the American Zion Commonwealth was involved arose out of over-expansion in Palestine and the economic crisis which has lasted for two years. Mr. Lipsky explained. Land purchased on contract could not be sold, mortgages due could not be paid and deeds to land already paid for could not be issued, which in turn brought about a discontinuance of payments on the part of the American land purchasers. As a result of the efforts of a number of leading American Zionists, the sum of \$250,000 in cash has just been despatched to Palestine, which is to be used to re-establish the credit of the American Zion Commonwealth. The title to all the lands purchased by the Commonwealth is now secure as a result of this remittance, which has been placed in the hands of the Palestine Zionist Executive to be used in such a manner as to assure the speedy issuing of deeds to all American purchasers.

According to Mr. Lipsky's statement "conclusive title to the five thousand dunams of Herzlia land now being assured, the Afule mortgage liabilities

having been paid, and the Haifa Bay holdings having been disposed of to Jewish purchasers, it is only a matter of administrative procedure that stands in the way of the actual delivery of deeds to the American purchasers.

"The remittance of the \$250,000 applied in payment of the liabilities and mortgages of the American Zion Commonwealth will have the immediate effect of restoring its financial credit both in Palestine and in America. The definite assurance of deeds for the American purchasers will remove a burden of responsibility from the shoulders of the American Zionist Organization, which assumed the burden as a moral obligation which it was called upon to assume for the protection of the larger interests of the Zionist movement.

"The thanks of the Zionist Organization of America are due to Mr. Bernard Marcus, President of the Bank of the United States, to Mr. Morris Weinberg, vice-president of the Municipal (Continued on Page 4)

## GOVERNMENT ACKNOWLEDGES CHIEF RABBIS' PROTEST TO KING GEORGE ON WALL

London Journal Blames Jews for Present Dispute

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 1.—A cable of protest dispatched by the Chief Rabbi of Palestine to King George on the matter of the Wailing Wall incident was acknowledged by the Chief Secretary of the Palestine Government.

The Secretary has informed the Rabbis that their protest has been transferred by the King to the Colonial Office which is now considering the entire matter.

London, Dec. 1.—Palestine Jews have to blame their own mistakes for the unhappy state of affairs at the Western Wall, is the view of the London magazine, "Near East and India."

The action of the Arabs was organized chiefly for the purpose of counterbalancing the action of the Jews. The paper states that one may wonder whether the Zionists are not regretting the entire affair. It does not seem likely that the Palestine Moslems will waive their "perfect quarrel" with the Jews in favor of the vague, larger quarrel with the British government, as they are advised to do by Mohamed Ali.

## REISIN, YIDDISH NOVELIST, REFUSED ENTRY TO POLAND

Warsaw, Dec. 1.—Abraham Reisin, well known Yiddish novelist, a resident of New York City for many years, was refused permission to enter Poland.

The Polish consular authorities refused to visa his passport on his presence in European tour which will include Russia. Mr. Reisin is not a citizen of the United States.

## BELGIAN COMPANY ACQUIRES 3,000 DUNAMS FOR ORANGE GROVES IN PALESTINE

Great Demand for Palestine Oranges in Belgium Market

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Antwerp, Dec. 1.—An area of 3,000 dunams in the region of Tulkerem, Palestine, for the cultivation of orange groves was acquired by a Belgian company, it was announced here.

The first consignment of Palestine oranges shipped here was well received and sold immediately. There is a great demand for Palestine oranges on the Belgian fruit market.

London, Dec. 1.—The import of Palestine oranges to England will be greater in the coming year than in the preceding one.

The provisional estimate of imports predicts that during 1929 2,000,000 boxes of oranges will be imported to the United Kingdom from Palestine. During the year just ending, 1,750,000 boxes were imported.

## DEMAND CZARISTIC LAWS ON JEWISH RELIGION BE VOIDED

Warsaw, Dec. 1.—The refusal of the Government Commissioner of Warsaw to permit a Roman Catholic citizen to embrace the Jewish religion was made the subject of an interpellation introduced into the Sejm by the Club of Jewish Deputies yesterday.

The Commissioner based his decision on the Czaristic Ukase of April 17, 1905, promulgated by Czar Nicholas II, according to which Christians in Imperial Russia may change their religious affiliation with the Christian faith but may not embrace Judaism or Mohammedanism or any other of the non-Christian faiths.

The Minister of Religion and Education is asked in the interpellation whether the application of the Czaristic Ukase is not in contradiction to the provision of the Polish Constitution which guarantees freedom of conscience to all citizens. The Jewish deputies demand that the Czaristic Ukase be annulled.

## ROCKEFELLER GIVES \$50,000 TO NEW YORK FEDERATION

The New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies received a check for \$50,000 from John D. Rockefeller, Jr., toward its \$5,300,000 budget for the current year.

Mr. Rockefeller's gift, sent to Henry Morgenthau, former United States Ambassador to Turkey, is the third voluntary contribution for a similar amount by Mr. Rockefeller to the local Jewish charities in as many years.

Additional checks totaling \$7,000 beyond contributions previously announced by the Federation on Sunday brought the drive to within \$703,000 of its goal. When the campaign opened October 21 the Federation already had secured \$3,522,000 in regular annual subscriptions and needed \$1,778,000 more to meet the budgetary needs of its agencies. With the latest announcement of contributions, \$1,075,000 has been reported to date.

## ANTI-JEWISH DEMONSTRATIONS IN EAST PRUSSIA

Koenigsberg, Dec. 1.—A sudden rise in anti-Jewish feeling is observable in this city and in other communities in Eastern Prussia. During the past week anti-Jewish demonstrations were arranged almost every evening by the anti-Semitic National Socialist party. The demonstrations carried banners with anti-Jewish inscriptions.

The buildings of Jewish institutions were found marked with swastikas. The Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith has made complaints to the authorities and asked that action be taken.

Berlin, Dec. 1.—Disciplinary proceedings against Landrat Gilsa of the District of Kirschhain Kassel, were ordered by the Prussian Ministry of the Interior with a view to impeaching him, according to a report of the Ullstein news agency.

Gilsa is accused of encouraging the fighting Hakenkreuzler groups to hold meetings every night in military training. The impression is prevalent that these steps were preparatory to the perpetration of an Hakenkreuzler Putsch.

by Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee, on conditions in Poland in which it is declared that the present government is free of anti-Semitism. This is a significant statement, the paper declares, since Mr. Marshall was a co-author of the minorities treaty. The large number of votes polled in the last parliament elections by the Orthodox Jewish groups and by the Reich group in opposition to the Gruenbaum policy, is sufficient evidence of the change in the attitude of the Jews towards the Polish Republic. This makes it more necessary to undertake an energetic fight against the extreme nationalism. Deputy Gruenbaum's comparison of General Skladkowski to the Czarist minister, Stolypin, is perfidious.

The paper, continuing in this vein and presenting the issue as an internal Jewish fight over policy, cites an incident which is alleged to have occurred recently in Vilna where Jewish nationalist students attacked and beat a group of Jewish assimilationist students. "The policy of Gruenbaum in Congress Poland and that of the Vilna Litvaks must be ended. It is incumbent upon the Jewish population itself to liquidate its militant nationalism," the paper says.

## ROSENWALD GIFT INSPIRES GREATER EFFORT FOR COLLEGE

Cincinnati, Dec. 1.—The gift of \$500,000 by Julius Rosenwald to the Hebrew Union College of this city is praised by the "American Israelite" in its current issue.

"Aside from the conditions which he makes, conditions which are eminently fair and will inspire greater effort for the institution, his tender of this vast sum is a matter of the utmost importance to the institution and the cause for which it stands," the paper writes.

"The College is obligated to Jewish education in this country and this generation and to the furtherance through that form of endeavor of the cause of Israel for all countries and for posterity. The gift of Mr. Rosenwald is a substantial and inspiring recognition of the validity of this program.

"The fact that this tender of financial and personal support was made should awaken in men and women throughout the country a realization of the momentous undertaking which lies ready to their hands. If Mr. Rosenwald's money and endorsement should go by default the Alumni of the College, its army of supporters throughout America and the lay leaders of American Judaism will have lost a vital opportunity. We are convinced that such will not be the case. We feel that every man and woman connected with Judaism as a religion in America will be willing and anxious to concentrate on this important work and to insure for the Hebrew Union College a sufficient endowment to carry on its necessary work and a sufficient endorsement to assure its well-earned influence."

### Activities in Worcester

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 1.—The United Jewish Charities of this city will receive \$19,000 from the Worcester Welfare Federation Golden Rule Fund, which closed its annual drive this week, collecting \$451,851. The organization is expected every year to raise its share in the fund by contributions of Jewish members of the community, and has done so.

Because of poor business conditions the Beth Israel Congregation has postponed its campaign for \$75,000 for the building of a new synagogue. The drive started during the High holidays, with a contribution of \$5,000 from Harris Glick. It already has \$26,000 in pledges. The congregation numbers about 250 members, but has no permanent rabbi. For the holidays and special meetings, a leader has generally been invited from New York.

The Jewish Labor groups of the city will this week inaugurate plans for the annual Palestine Labor campaign. Last year the group raised \$5,000. Abraham Hamlin of Boston will meet with the campaign committee, of which the chairman is Samuel Gurwitz, on Tuesday night, Dec. 3. It is hoped to get the drive under way by the first of the year.

The Jewish Home for the Aged and Orphans has recently arranged for the purchase of an estate of six acres and one building in a country district three miles outside the center of the city, to which it will eventually transfer its 36 children and 12 old people.

Title to the land will be taken in February. Shortly afterwards a drive for funds to rehabilitate and add to the place will be made. The institution will need two more buildings, one for the children and one for the aged. The house now on the grounds will be used as an administration building and as living quarters for the superintendent, John Beller, and his wife.

The Home, which is not included in the Welfare Federation of the city, depends entirely on private contributions, and upon proceeds from affairs. The annual entertainment and ball, from which a considerable portion of its budget comes, will be held the night of Dec. 25.

The Ladies' Auxiliary to the Home, an organization of 350 women, has taken over the responsibility for the purchase of the grounds for the new institution. Since the Home's indebtedness will be about \$20,000 this is the largest burden the women have ever shouldered.

Dr. Robert Cohen, who had been in Oxford University, England, three years as a non-collegiate student, was found dead on Friday as a result of a fall from the window of his room. The fact that a dressing table, which interfered with egress from the window, had been moved to one side was taken by authorities as evidence of suicide. There was no note to explain such an action.

Dr. Cohen was specializing in diseases of the eye, nose and throat. His mother is a resident of San Francisco.
