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## LABOR UNIVERSITY IN MINSK NEST OF SYSTEMATIC ANTI-SEMITIC AGITATION

**Two Excluded Following Stormy Debate at Special Meeting**  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Riga, Dec. 7.—The Labor University of Minsk, capital of White Russia, was a nest of a systematic anti-Jewish campaign, it was revealed when the Jewish students submitted a formal complaint to the local committee of the Communist party.

A report from Moscow received here gives a wealth of details of the occurrence. At the labor university hall the anti-Semitic agitators posted an appeal opening with the words: "Bey Zhidov" (beat the Jews). As the result of the complaint of the Jewish students, the local Communist party was instrumental in calling a joint meeting of the students and the professors. A stormy debate ensued in which fifty-five speakers participated. The result what that two of the instigators, Stapanenko and Yschernjakow, members of the Communist youth organization, were expelled from the university.

## BAVARIAN DIET PERMITS SUIT AGAINST ANTI-SEMITES

Munich, Dec. 7.—Deputy Streicher, Member of the Bavarian Diet, will have to defend himself in court for an anti-Jewish libel he published under his signature in the "Stuerner," organ of rabid anti-Semites.

The Diet voted today to lift the immunity of Deputy Streicher. The suit was started because of Streicher's publication of an article in which he asserted that the German student, Daube, for whose murder his chum, another German student is being tried, was the victim of ritual murder of Jews.

## TO UNVEIL MONUMENT TO JOSEPH TRUMPELDOR

Jerusalem, Dec. 7.—The monument over the grave of Joseph Trumpeidor and his comrades who fell in repelling the Arab attack on the labor settlement of Tel Hai in February 1920, will be ready for unveiling on the tenth anniversary of their death, in February 1930, it is stated here by the Joint Committee carrying on the work. The sculptor, Mr. Melnikoff, is planning a monument on a large scale.

## MORE JEWISH CEMETERIES DESECRATED IN GERMANY

Berlin, Dec. 7.—The number of Jewish cemeteries in Germany desecrated during the past three years reached the figure of 69 this week.

Reports received at the capital tell of desecrations committed in the Jewish cemetery of Rosenberg, East Prussia, and of a second vandalistic act in the Jewish cemetery of Fischbach, Bavaria.

## BITTER FIGHT AMONG JEWISH GROUPS MARKS ROUMANIAN ELECTION CAMPAIGN

**Dr. Filderman Complains to Maniu Against Partisan Attacks at Mass Meetings**  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Dec. 7.—The various Jewish parties and groups aligned politically with the contesting parties in the national elections are in the throes of a bitter fight, often leading to high handed measures.

The fight in the final stage of the campaign has assumed an ugly aspect. Meetings called by one party are invaded by opponents and broken up. The fight is particularly sharp between the Jewish members of the Rumanian National Peasant Party, now the government party, and the Zionist students, on one hand, and the adherents of the Union of Rumanian Jews, which is politically allied with the Liberal Party. Several meetings called by the Union of Rumanian Jews, of which Dr. William Filderman is the head, were broken up by invaders from the other parties. The opponents did not permit Dr. Filderman to deliver his campaign address.

It was reported today that as a result of this bitter fight and interference, Dr. Filderman complained to Prime Minister Maniu and to the Regency Council. The leader of the Union of Rumanian Jews has also drawn the attention of the government to the reappearance of the anti-Semitic student organizations. The reply of the authorities has not been made public.

## JEW, THROWN INTO JAIL, BECOMES TEACHER TO AUSTRIAN GRAND DUKE

**Paul Sandor Taught Economics to Josef Franz**

Vienna, Dec. 7.—Economics is not an entertaining subject, but when one finds himself in jail with nothing else to do, one is ever grateful to the man who introduced him to this branch of science.

Thus the Austrian Grand Duke Josef Franz spoke of the days when he, with Paul Sandor, Hungarian Jewish leader and at present a member of parliament, was in jail in Budapest during the Communist regime under Bela Kun.

In an interview with the representative of the "Wiener Journal" the Grand Duke praised the courage of Deputy Sandor who, he declared, had a great share in bringing relief to the Grand Duke and other members of the aristocracy who were imprisoned. "For hours and hours Sandor taught us the principles of economics, providing us with protection from boredom and with enlightenment," the Grand Duke stated.

## HEBREW PRESS WELCOMES HIGH COMMISSIONER ARAB ORGANS STATE DEMANDS

**Hebrew Press Hopeful; Arabs Demand National Government**  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Dec. 7.—Editorial comment in the Hebrew and the Arabic press of Palestine on the occasion of Sir John Chancellor's arrival in Jerusalem to take up his post as High Commissioner, brings out the views of the leaders of the two sections of the Palestine population.

The Hebrew newspapers welcome the new High Commissioner in editorials this morning. Despite the disappointments of the preceding years, the editorials declare, Palestine Jewry looks forward to a new era of prosperity and progress under the brilliant administrator and colonizer. They point to the fact that the new High Commissioner in statements made before his departure for Jerusalem expressed his sympathy with the aims of the Zionist movement and gave the promise to carry on his administration in accordance with the Palestine Mandate.

The new High Commissioner must make it his task to correct the numerous evils that exist in the Palestine situation and to start the fulfillment of the obligations resting upon the Mandatory Power of Palestine, the Hebrew papers declare.

The Arabic papers concentrate mainly on the statement of the new High Commissioner that he will carry on his administration in accordance with the terms of the Palestine Mandate. It will not be sufficient if Sir John will repair the roads, establish hospitals and construct the harbor. The Arabs in Palestine, like those in Syria, Iraq and Egypt, demand a national government, the editorials say.

## ASK JABOTINSKY'S PAPER TO FURNISH SECURITY

Jerusalem, Dec. 7.—The ordinance requiring newspaper publishers in Palestine to furnish \$100 security for the observance of the press regulations was invoked by the Jerusalem authorities against the "Doar Ha'yom" Hebrew daily, when its editorship was turned over to Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the Zionist Revisionists. The publishers' bond is required by an old Ottoman law and has of late not been applied.

**Is Most Important Financial Instrument

Berlin. Dec. 7.—Representatives of the Jewish co-operative movement in Poland have been holding conferences here with the representatives of the American Joint Reconstruction Foundation with regard to the difficult position of the Bank dla Spoldzielni, Bank of Jewish Cooperatives. Deputy Rasser, chairman of the Jewish Co-operative Federation in Poland, Deputy Viszliski, Senator Szeszowski, President of the Bank dla Spoldzielni and member of the Executive Committee of the Council of the Joint Reconstruction Foundation, Dr. Silberschein of Lemberg, Mr. Schalit of Vilna and Mr. F. Finkelkraut of Warsaw, represented the Federation of Jewish Co-operatives in Poland.

The representatives of the Foundation expressed their conviction that Polish Jewry would do everything in its power to keep alive the bank, as the most important financial instrument of the co-operative movement. The future attitude of the Foundation towards the bank, they said, depended on earnest efforts being made in this direction.

# **REPORT AND DENY MELCHETT \$500,000 GIFT TO PALESTINE FINANCIAL CORPORATION**

**Organization New; Announcement Released by Zionist Executive**

London, Dec. 7.—Contradictory reports are current in the London press and in Zionist circles pertaining to an announcement of a \$100,000 subscription by Lord Melchett, former Sir Alfred Mond, to a new Palestine financial corporation.

Following closely the announcement in the press of the subscription, a denial in his behalf appeared yesterday in the London papers in which it is declared that the information handed out by the Zionist Executive offices in London was premature. In Zionist circles it was explained that the denial was due to the use of an inaccurate term in the original announcement where the subscription was termed a gift.

The London "Jewish Chronicle," an oppositional paper, in its issue of today urged the Zionist Executive to issue a statement in explanation of the contradictory reports.

**Strive to Complete \$2,000,000 Quota for  
B'nai Brit Educational Program**

Cincinnati, Dec. 7.—Interest in the Wider Scope Campaign of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith is stimulated by the establishment of the new Hillel Foundation at Cornell University, which will start to function with the next semester, according to reports received at I. O. B. B. headquarters here.

The General Committee of District No. 1, reiterated its endorsement of the Wider Scope Committee effort and Maurice Bloch, President of the District, issued a call to representatives of the various communities to start organization for the immediate launching of the campaigns in their respective territories.

Notwithstanding the fact that District No. 2 has raised in excess of their allotted quota, the leaders are still making an effort to obtain new subscriptions and cover the entire territory. Special efforts are being made to collect the second installment on subscriptions, and a large part of it has already been collected.

In addition to the continuous endeavor of Judge Joseph L. Kun, chairman of the Wider Scope in District No. 3, the newly elected President, Isidor W. Jacobs, is stimulating immediate action toward the launching of the campaign in territories still uncovered. District No. 3, is especially interested in the Hillel Foundation at Morgantown, W. Va., which is now in the process of organization. Morris Sostin is in the field and Rabbi Baron of Uniontown, has assumed the duties of director of this unit. In this district a traveling exhibit of Jewish art, which represents the collection of sixty-eight reproductions of modern Jewish artists, is being exhibited.

Washington, D. C. is conducting an intensive campaign toward the completion of its quota of \$25,000, the I.O. B.B. announcement states. Judge Joseph L. Kun, addressed a joint session of the Argo Lodge and the Brotherhood of the Eighth Street Temple at the Jewish Community Center. He spoke of the necessity for more Hillel Foundations as correctives of the tendency of many young Jews in college to drift to atheism, and thus be lost as leaders in their Jewish communities upon graduation. Joseph A. Wilner, President of District No. 5, issued the following statement: "The Wider Scope movement is more than a campaign for funds. It is, above all, a stimulating influence in the awakening of the Jewish morale. In the clarion call to service it has been a new adventure in the life of the American Jew. It is a challenge to every son of the Covenant. It supplies the stimulus for the perpetuation of Judaism in America."

Rosalsky, Professor H. McCracken, President of Vassar College, Dr. Frederick Robinson, President of New York City College, and others.

Construction on the buildings was begun three years ago.

### Jewish Health Problems

By Our London Correspondent

London, Nov. 30.—A large number of Jewish medical men and others interested in the work of the Jewish Health Organization of Great Britain, which is affiliated with the World Union Oze, were present at the fourth annual meeting of the Organization held at Jews' College, Dr. Redcliffe S. Salaman, the president, being in the chair. Referring to the fact that this was the fourth anniversary of the Organization, Dr. Salaman said that though it was still young, it was growing rapidly and it was healthy. The first budget amounted to £500. Now it was £1,700.

Dr. Salaman discussed Dr. M. Sourasky's research work into visual defect among Jewish children, stressing its great value in indicating that the Jews have a racial failing in the matter of eyes and that the Talmud Torahs, which had been blamed for this, do not make matters worse.

Dr. Salaman also spoke of the importance of the intelligence tests which had been conducted by the Organization and had proved that the Jewish child was not of a lower intelligence than the non-Jewish child, but on the contrary was of a higher intelligence. The third point was the important cancer investigation which had been conducted by Dr. A. Sourasky, and which had shown that cancer has no respect for race and that Jews are neither immune nor specially susceptible to cancer. This was very important in having brought out the value of Jewish purity laws. There was also the question of school supervision which the Council considered so important that they were going to appoint a permanent man for the work. He also emphasized the great value of the child guidance clinic which they had established.

A. H. Levy, the Chairman of the Organization, said that the report had been shown to outsiders who had been greatly impressed by the amount of scientific work which had been done voluntarily by busy medical practitioners. Mr. Levy paid a tribute to Dr. Sourasky's paper on visual defects among Jewish children. It had been well done, he said, and had shown that the Talmud Torahs could cheerfully go on.

Dr. L. Mandel, the Treasurer, pointed out the importance of the work of the Organization to the Jewish community and urged that they should give it a greater amount of financial support to continue their work.

Dr. M. Schwarzman, Vice-Chairman, dwelt on the place of the Jewish Health Organization in the life of the Jewish Community and in relation to the Oze World Union, of which he had been one of the founders.

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## EXPECT HARD FIGHT ON REPEAL OF NATIONAL ORIGINS ACT AS SENATE OPENS DISCUSSION

Preliminary Discussion Reveals Rift

Among Members  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7.—The National Origins Plan, calling for the reapportionment of the immigration quotas on the basis of the racial origins of the United States population, due to become effective July 1, 1929, if not repealed or again postponed, will be the center of a heated controversy in Congress during the short session.

A discussion in the Senate Thursday afternoon revealed the rift on the question, notwithstanding the fact that President-elect Herbert Hoover had in his acceptance speech expressed himself against the National Origins plan, since he, as a member of the commission appointed by President Coolidge to investigate the feasibility of determining the national origins of the United States population, found that no reliable data is available for such a determination. Senator Reed of Pennsylvania, who originally sponsored the National Origins clause when it was enacted, declared that he would oppose its repeal or postponement. On the other hand, Senator Harrison of Mississippi quoted the reference in Mr. Hoover's acceptance speech with regard to his opposition to the National Origins act, and predicted that there would be a movement before next July by the new administration for postponement or repeal.

Senator Shipstead of Minnesota declared that he will renew his opposition to the National Origins act. Senator King of Utah asked whether the movement for putting the act in force is aimed against Mr. Hoover. Senator Shipstead declared that the National Origins act has nothing to do with the immigration restriction, it simply being a method of reckoning the quotas, a method which is both unreliable and discriminating.

The discussion centered around a resolution introduced into the Senate by Senator Reed on behalf of the American Legion, urging that the Na-

Assets and membership of the two organizations will be merged into one new organization, which will be the nucleus for the erection of a new Jewish community center on the site of the present Jewish Center building in Poughkeepsie, N. 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without remuneration to help to establish a sound body for the Jewish community. He was proud of their numbers and the great work they were doing. In his time the number of Jewish doctors in England could be counted on one hand, and now there were this large body giving their time and leisure so idealistically to preserve the health of the Jewish people.

Dr. A. Eicholz, Chief Inspector of Health to the Ministry of Education, paid a tribute to the work of the Organization's child guidance clinic, which was the first in this country. It had done a great work, he said, and had brought glory to the Jews outside the community. It was referred to at scientific and education congresses, and it was a valuable creation in the life of the Jewish community of the country. He mentioned the forthcoming anthropological investigation, and said that he had faith in the strength of the Jewish germ just as he had had faith in the Jewish intelligence in the intelligence tests.

Sir Meyer A. Spielman praised the work of the Jewish Health Organization. In comparison with the work done and the promise it held out, the subscription it received was ridiculous. He spoke in particular of the work of the child guidance clinic and hinted that the work in this respect might soon be extended also to adults. It was a great thing that the Jewish community could take in hand delinquent children and save them from being lost to the community. It would be a greater thing still when they could do this work also for delinquents among adults.

The paper on "Jews and Cancer" read to the International Conference on Cancer held here last July is published in the official report of the Conference which has just been issued, under the editorship of Professor Archibald Leitch, of the Cancer Hospital in London. In the course of a resume of the proceedings of the Conference given in the report, Professor Leitch writes:

"The section devoted to the prevalence and racial distribution of cancer puts us in possession of the recent investigations of the expert medical statisticians of Europe. From time to time some race or other is comparatively free from cancer, and on these supposed facts various hypotheses have been built. A reading of the communications printed in the report reveals that the basis for these assertions is very questionable. The complexity of the statistical position and the difficulties of comparing the cancer mortality from year to year or of one country with another render a definite pronouncement impossible. The facts are set forth in the papers, but the expert statistician is chary of making interpretations. One of the papers, however, should finally dispose of the prevalent idea that the Jewish race is less prone to cancer than the other inhabitants of the countries in which they are found."

## EXPECT HARD FIGHT ON REPEAL OF NATIONAL ORIGINS ACT AS SENATE OPENS DISCUSSION

tional Origins clause be retained. The resolution assailed "the alien blocs" which sought to "mangle and emasculate" the law. It was clearly seen that there will be a sharp fight over the National Origins question. Senator King wanted to know if Mr. Hoover was included in the category of "alien blocs." "I am not sure whether that is aimed at Mr. Hoover or Gov. Smith," returned Senator Reed. Echoes of the recent presidential campaign were a strong feature in the discussion on the matter. Senator Heflin of Alabama accused Gov. Smith of having pretended during the campaign to favor restriction of immigration, when in reality he favored "the opening of the flood gates to hordes of aliens."

Senator Reed declared: "We whose ancestors made this country and fought in every war have a right to be taken into account." He said the most important increase under the National Origins plan would be that of Great Britain, including Wales, from 34,007 to 65,894. Senator Harrison said there was not the slightest chance of letting down the immigration restrictions, despite difference of views as to detail.
