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LOEB, THURINGIAN BANKER, IS REHABILITATED AFTER ANTI-SEMITIC CONSPIRACY

Government Pays Him 35,000 Marks
Damages in Settlement Out of Court
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Dec. 27.—N. Loeb, former president of the Thuringian State Bank, who was ousted from his position and was the object of a prolonged trial, as the result of an anti-Semitic conspiracy, stands today fully rehabilitated.

The government of the State of Thuringia paid the amount of 35,000 Marks to Mr. Loeb today, as compensation for damage to his reputation, in a settlement out of court.

Mr. Loeb was found not guilty of the charges of fraud brought against him in November 1925. Mr. Loeb, who had been the target for anti-Semitic agitators for some time preceding the trial, was accused of mismanagement of the Thuringian State Bank. Dr. Frieder, chief prosecutor against Loeb, was brought up for disciplinary proceedings for formulating false charges against the bank president.

AGENCY DEATH TO ZIONISM SAYS "DAILY EXPRESS"

BELGIAN STATESMEN FORM PRO-PALESTINE GROUP

Brussels, Dec. 27.—A Belgian Pro-Palestine Committee, composed of prominent statesmen and non-Zionist Jewish leaders was formed here today. A manifesto was issued immediately upon formation of the committee, calling for support for the Jewish National Home in Palestine.

Charles Hagnette, president of the Belgian Senate, was elected president of the committee and Prof. de Donder was chosen secretary. Members include Leon Casorel, banker; Senator Louis Debrouckere, labor leader; Deputy Albert Deveze, Liberal leader; Pierre Orts, a member of the Mandates Commission; Comtesse Helena Goblet Dalvia and Emile Vandervelde.

LIPOWSKI, THEATRE DIRECTOR, DIES

Vilna, Dec. 27.—Nahum Lipowski, well known theatre director, died here at the age of 54. Mr. Lipowski was known both in Russia and America for his work. He also was known as a man of phenomenal memory.

EUROPEAN ZIONIST- REVISIONISTS MEET IN VIENNA CONFERENCE

Jabotinsky Charges Palestine Admin-
istered Contrary to Final Aim
of Zionism
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Dec. 27.—About seventy delegates from various European countries were present at the opening session of the conference of the League of Zionist-Revisionists which began here yesterday.

Few delegates are present from Poland and none from Hungary. A praesidium was elected consisting of Richard Lichtheim of Berlin, Vladimir Jabotinsky of Jerusalem, Meer Grossman of London and Messrs. Hoffman and Soskin.

The keynote of the Zionist-Revisionists' program was sounded by Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the League, in an address which lasted two hours. He criticized severely the recent decisions of the Zionist General Council concerning the extension of the Jewish Agency. The Zionist-Revisionists, he declared, will continue to fight the Jewish Agency project until the last trench. The formation of the Jewish Agency means an end of the World Zionist Congress created by Herzl and of the democratic national Jewish renaissance movement.

Despite the decisions taken, the Zionist-Revisionists will not leave the Zionist Organization when the Jewish Agency will come into existence. They are rather determined to continue the fight for the "restoration of the sovereignty of the World Zionist Congress," Mr. Jabotinsky declared. His League does not intend to usurp the prerogatives of the Zionist Executive, but it is the "right and duty of the Zionist-Revisionists to continue through their own channels a campaign of enlightenment of public opinion in the British Empire and throughout the civilized world."

WARSAW DISCRIMINATES AGAINST JEWISH WORKERS

Warsaw, Dec. 27.—A charge that the Warsaw city government is discriminating against Jewish workers was made at the open session of the City Council during the discussion of the budget for the year 1929.

Mr. Ehrlich, councillor representing the Jewish labor party, Bund, pointed out that of the 2,000 workers employed by the city government recently, only fourteen were Jewish. A resolution introduced by Councillor Abraham Lew, representing the Poale Zion, urging the president of the city to "cease the boycott against Jewish workers," was defeated by a majority of 37 to 36.

CHANCELLOR HOPES TERM WILL BRING PROGRESS TO JEWISH NATIONAL HOME

Message in Reply to Congratulations
of Zionist General Council

Berlin, Dec. 27.—Replying to a message of congratulations on behalf of the Zionist General Council which was in session here, Sir John Chancellor, new High Commissioner of Palestine, sent the following telegram to Dr. Chaim Weizmann:

"Please convey to the World Zionist Executive my warm thanks for their kind congratulations on my appointment as High Commissioner of Palestine.

"I share their hope that my term of office will mark a further stage in the establishment of the Jewish National Home and the development of Palestine to the advantage of all its inhabitants."

ELIMINATES REFERENCE TO RELIGION IN OFFICIAL QUERY

Bucharest, Dec. 27.—Erasure of reference to religion in an official inquiry sent out by the Roumanian Ministry of Commerce to the industrialists of the country was ordered by Virgil Madgearu, Commerce Minister.

In the original inquiry sent to the industrialists, a question concerning their religion was asked. Upon learning of this the Commerce Minister telegraphed inspectors throughout the country to inform the industrialists to ignore this question.

INCREASE DUTIES TO AID PALESTINE INDUSTRIES

Jerusalem, Dec. 27.—The import duty on cement, chocolate, spirits and soap was increased, according to an announcement in the Official Gazette. Other products, also produced in the country, have been added to the list of increased duties.

The purpose is to protect home industries, as these products are manufactured in the country.

CONFISCATE LEADING SYNAGOGUE IN MINSK

Riga, Dec. 27.—The leading synagogue in Minsk has been confiscated by the local authorities, according to a report received here from Minsk.

The building which had been erected by the community next to the synagogue, where Rabbi Gluskin resided, was also confiscated.

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"SHATCHEN" CANNOT COLLECT FEES IF COUPLES DO NOT WANT TO PAY

Payment for Mating Contrary to Good Morals, Court Rules

Munkacs, Czechoslovakia, Dec. 27.—A "shatchen," the Jewish professional marriage broker, got the worst of it when he summoned to the local court fifteen happily married couples, whose marriages he had brought about but who had not paid him his fee.

The court handed down a verdict that the marriage brokerage is contra bonos mores (against good morals) and legal action cannot be brought for failure to pay the "shatchen." The judge added that the couples may go on living happily, even though they had not paid the man who led them on the road to their marital bliss.

MOSLEM SUPREME COUNCIL ENTERTAINS CHARLES CRANE

Jerusalem, Dec. 27.—A reception in honor of Charles Crane, former United States Ambassador to China and head of President Wilson's commission to Palestine, was given today by the Moslem Supreme Council.

"Poppa," a play by Bella and Samuel Spewack, opened Monday night at the Biltmore Theatre, New York. The play, produced by H. S. Kraft, is described as a "folk comedy." The leading roles are played by Anna Apple and Jechiel Goldsmith, with a large supporting cast.

"BULLETIN" SEEN AS INSTRUMENT FOR UNITY

The "Jewish Daily Bulletin" is termed an instrument for unity by the "S. A. J. Review," the organ of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism of which Mr. Mordecai M. Kaplan is the leader.

"It is a remarkable fact that much as the multiplication of means of communication has tended to make the world one it has left the Jewish world singularly unaffected," writes the "S. A. J. Review." "The ability to go quickly and easily from one place to another increased the Jewish dispersion, did not lessen it, of course, and the effect has not been noticeably counterbalanced by the multiplication of instruments—like the telegraph—to abolish the distances thus created. So that while our age finds the world at large more nearly one than ever before, it finds the Jewish unity has become our chief preoccupation of the day.

"It becomes increasingly clear that the desired sense of Jewish unity must be made to function not by constant prodding, nor by exercise with a Coue formula, but by the spread of information. No abstract passion about Jewish unity could have united us with, for example, our fellow-Jews in Australia; but a column of information in the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin' works like magic in this respect. The power of the bare word to make for significant change in the feelings of far-flung human beings about one another receives remarkable demonstration with every appearance of the 'Jewish Daily Bulletin.' It should not, in our time, seem disproportionate to speak of a newspaper as the most powerful single agency making for a sense of unity among scattered peoples. It may then with equal justice be said of a Jewish newspaper.

It is certainly our duty to encourage an agency which will perfect the machinery for world-wide Jewish inter-communication. The unity we speak of means, after all, little more than quick and immediate awareness of and interest in our various existences as Jews. The lectures are a part of the Zionist Lecture Series given under the joint auspices of the Avukah, the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, and the Junior Hadassah.

The Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities, now entering upon its twentieth year, will expend \$827,220 during 1929 through its twenty-five affiliated agencies, representing the largest budget in the history of the organization, according to figures made public.

In announcing the 1929 budget, Morris Salzman, Chairman of the Federation's Finance Committee, reported that the approved expenditures for the forthcoming year represent an increase of \$38,802 over the disbursements made in 1928.

BEN SELLING CHOSEN AS PORTLAND'S "FIRST CITIZEN"

Portland, Ore., Dec. 27.—Ben Selling was voted Portland's "first citizen" by members of the Portland Realty Board at their meeting at the Maitland Hotel.

Mr. Selling's record of gifts to charitable and social organizations and agencies, his service in public movements and his long sustained record as an ethical merchant were among contributing factors in the choice as expressed by the realtors. This is the first time the board has ever elected a "first citizen."

EMANUEL LASKER MARKS HIS SIXTIETH BIRTHDAY

Berlin, Dec. 27.—Emanuel Lasker, world famous Jewish chess player who held the world championship before it was won by Capablanca, celebrated his birthday on Monday.

German newspapers devoted editorials to the occasion, highly praising the former champion. They point out that Mr. Lasker is also a poet and scholar.

Mr. Lasker takes an active interest in Jewish affairs and is a member of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith.

CHASSIDIC RABBI ORDERS CONTINUOUS PRAYER FOR KING

Prague, Dec. 27.—Continuous prayers for the speedy recovery of King George of England were ordered by the Munkaczer Rebbe, Chassidic leader. In instituting the prayers, the Chassidic Rabbi stated that the King, by virtue of Great Britain's Mandate over Palestine, is "the patron and protector of Eretz Israel." The action was taken, it was stated, as the result of a telegraphic request from a London rabbinical body.

A four-day celebration, commencing Friday evening, January 4, will mark the seventy-fifth anniversary of Temple B'nai Abraham, Newark, N. J. Among the speakers in the celebration will be Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, of Cleveland; Governor Moore, Governor Clark, Larson and Mayor Conleton. An inter-denominational good-fellowship meeting is being planned in connection with the arrangements. Committee for the celebration: Albert Hollander is president of the congregation and Rabbi Julius Silberfeld, spiritual leader.

Temple B'nai Jehshurun, another Newark Congregation, recently observed the 75th anniversary of the congregation's establishment in New York, and Rabbi P. D. Bookstaber, of Harrisburg, Pa., was the principal speaker at the services commemorating the occasion. Nathaniel King is president of the congregation and Rabbi Solomon Foster, spiritual leader.

Dr. Kurt Wilhelm, chief rabbi of the Free State of Brunswick in Germany, will visit America shortly on a lecture tour. Dr. Wilhelm will be accompanied by his wife who will also lecture to Women's Clubs and Sisterhoods while in America. A decision to make the pilgrimage was reached at a celebration of the Sisterhood marking its twentieth anniversary, held aboard the steamer Olympic.

Morris Engelman is arranging the pilgrimage, which will include a tour of European countries, the members arriving in Palestine for the Passover holiday.

Speakers at the celebration included Rabbi Isaiah Levy, spiritual leader of the congregation, Joseph C. Hyman, secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee, William Weiss, president of the Congregation.

It was announced that persons who are not members of the congregation may join in the pilgrimage.

67 JEWISH IMMIGRANTS SET- TLED ON LAND IN FRANCE

Miscellany from European Capitals

Berlin, Dec. 12.—A plan for the establishment of a Jewish labor colony in Germany has been under consideration for some time by the Central Office for Jewish Migrant Welfare, and has now been approved by the All-German Federation of Jewish Communities.

The Federation has issued an appeal to all organizations of Jewish communities affiliated with it, urging them to help forward the work. "The effort to establish a Jewish labor colony which will provide a productive basis for the migrants' welfare work, is deserving of support," the appeal says. "We are in whole-hearted agreement with this work, aiming to give work to unemployed, especially to released prisoners, and we call upon all the bodies of Jewish communities affiliated with the Federation to assist in this undertaking."

The projected labor colony will be based on the lines of agricultural, horticultural and handicraft activity and will seek to give a fresh chance to persons who have been economically uprooted, and to such who have been broken by society, so that they should be able to re-establish themselves as productive members of society.

How the pro-Palestine work is viewed by the German anti-Semites is gathered from a report in the Hitlerist organ, "Voelkischer Beobachter."

The paper writes:

"Before the war it would have been high treason for a State Official in Germany to help on a Jewish work, the President of Silesia said at a meeting held in Breslau by the German Committee to promote Jewish settlement in Palestine. The Republic, however, he proceeded, stands on new liberal ground which makes for the promotion of all efforts of national revival. He read a letter from the Federal Premier, Herr Mueller, also commending the Palestine work.

"Certainly, it would have been monstrous before the war," comments the "Voelkischer Beobachter," "for a German State Official to help on a foreign Jewish activity. At that time it was understood that officials have to serve their own nation, not alien nations, especially a nation like the Jews, whose members insult Germany every day. Now we must look on while our officials work for an alien Asiatic people."

"The German wireless is monopolized by Jews, and even Christmas carols are broadcast by Jewish singers," Deputy Gieseler, of the German National Party, complained in the Prussian Diet recently. "Germans hardly ever get a chance to speak at the microphone," he said. "I want to ask the Government whether it intends to take any steps to give Ger-

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SELIG, YESHIVA COLLEGE CAMPAIGN DIRECTOR, RE- SIGNS ON COMPLETING TASK

Directed Drive Resulting in \$3,000,000 Fund

Harris L. Selig, Executive Director of the Yeshiva College Building Fund, the organization which is responsible for the planning and the construction of the Yeshiva College recently dedicated in New York City, tendered his resignation to the Campaign Committee to become effective January 1, 1929.

Following a three year effort, which resulted in raising the amount of over \$3,000,000 covering the construction cost of the Yeshiva College buildings at Amsterdam Avenue and 186th St., New York, and an initial fund for endowment and maintenance, Mr. Selig will leave for a trip to Europe and Palestine on January 15th.

The Yeshiva College Campaign Committee accepted Mr. Selig's resignation with regret, expressing recognition for his devotion and zeal in the conduct of the campaign. The committee expressed the hope that upon his return from Europe Mr. Selig will lend his services to the cause of the Yeshiva College when the plans for enlarging the institution and placing it on a sound financial basis will be completed.

The Yeshiva College campaign which was begun three years ago under the direction of Mr. Selig was a most spectacular one. Until that date Orthodox institutions were associated in the public mind with the picture of old, dilapidated and ill-cared-for buildings. Maintenance funds were gathered by poorly organized collections of minor or small amounts. The application of modern methods of campaigning under the direction of Mr. Selig resulted in revolutionizing the outlook on the needs and problems of Jewish higher education.

Outstanding in this record were the "\$1,000 dinners," two of which were held during the campaign; the first on May 24, 1925, resulted in the raising of \$1,000,000, the second held on December 13, 1928, on the occasion of the dedication, was attended by 1,400 persons.

"In winding up the affairs of the campaign, I wish to state that without the whole-hearted and untiring cooperation of the campaign committee headed by Mr. Samuel Levy, these results would not have been possible," Mr. Selig stated.

"It is a matter of public record that in the Yeshiva College campaign a new standard in giving for Jewish educational purposes has been established. Few believed that the ideal of perpetuating Jewish learning under the new incarnation of our people. Those who were convinced of the necessity

ists charged that at present Palestine is administered in a manner contrary to the interest of the ultimate aims of the Zionist movement. "We have to deal not only with an unfriendly local government, as was demonstrated in the Wailing Wall scandal and in the closing of the gates to immigration. The policy is more directly indicated in the economic field. The authorities in Palestine wilfully hamper the Jewish colonization of Palestine. That is why the Zionist-Revisionist movement must insist on the introduction in the country of a Zionist colonizing regime.

"Also, the Zionist movement under its present leadership is being conducted in a manner contrary to the interest of the ultimate aim of the movement. This is demonstrated by the fact that in recent years the leadership has given up the idea of a Jewish state in Palestine and simultaneously Zionists are busy justifying the regime in Palestine. In addition, the Zionist Organization conducts a planless economic policy," Mr. Jabotinsky charged.

Revisionism has succeeded to re-awaken in the Zionist movement the desire for revising the political and economic methods. Even the Palestine government saw itself compelled to grant some concessions, particularly in regard to the protection of industries, he stated. Revisionism is friendly to the Palestine Arabs, Mr. Jabotinsky stated. What it declines to do is to recognize the right of the Arabs to veto Jewish immigration to Palestine. That is the reason why Revisionists are against all attempts to introduce into Palestine parliamentary government and institutions, before the process of Jewish immigration has fully developed.

mans a chance to speak or sing from the wireless stations in Germany."

Vienna, Dec. 11—An exhibition of the work of Professor Max Liebermann, the aged President of the Berlin Academy of Art, will be held in Vienna next February, under the auspices of the Austrian Government.

The Berlin National Gallery, the Hamburg Art Gallery, and many private collections have promised to lend important Liebermann paintings in their possession. The Kaiser Friedrich Museum in Magdeburg has promised to loan its "Judengasse in Amsterdam."

Paris, Dec. 11—M. Leon Daudet, the French Royalist leader who is now in exile in Belgium, denies that he is an anti-Semite. In an article published in his paper, "L'Action Francaise," he declares that he was never under the influence of Drumont, the founder of modern French anti-Semitism.

"L'Univers Israelite" is skeptical about M. Daudet's declaration and points out that his paper "L'Action Francaise" is the only paper in France which defends pogroms and the Numerus Clausus. Perhaps, however, it adds, M. Daudet's declaration is meant as an expression of penitence and a promise for the future. That must be left for the future to show.

Lewis S. Gannett of The Nation, says:
