

## TURKISH REFORMERS LAUNCH DRIVE AGAINST CIRCUMCISION IN MOVE FOR WESTERNIZATION

Jews Will be Compelled to Leave  
Country or to Secret Observance  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Constantinople, Jan. 14—The Abrahamic rite of circumcision, practiced by the Turks for centuries as well as by Jews and Moslems, may soon be discarded and share the fate of the Arabic alphabet which was recently substituted by the Latin A-B-C's, in the campaign for the "westernization" of Turkey.

A group of Turkish extremist reformers, headed by Dr. Nasim Bey, a close friend of Kemal Pasha, has launched a vigorous campaign for the abolition of the biblical rite of circumcision. In literature and newspaper articles, Dr. Nasim Bey declares that the circumcision rite reduces the birth-rate and is a danger to health. He also expresses the doubt whether circumcision is important from the Mohammedan religious law's point of view. The fear was expressed here today that this campaign is being inspired by the dictator of Turkey, although it is clear that both Jews and Mohammedans will vigorously oppose the prohibition.

Jewish leaders were particularly anxious over the development. It was pointed out that all the reforms introduced by Kemal Pasha in present-day Turkey have left the Jewish population untouched. It was declared that in case the prohibition of circumcision is enforced by decree the Jews of Turkey will have to leave the country or practice their rite in secret, as they did under the Roman emperors' reign in the early years of the Christian era.

## 'DYBBUK' PERFORMED BY BUL- GARIAN NATIONAL THEATRE

Sofia, Jan. 14—"The Dybbuk," S. Ansky's famous play, was presented for the first time here by the National Bulgarian Theatre.

Members of the royal family, the Ministers of Education, Justice and Commerce, were present at the performance. The play was highly praised by the press.

## SENTENCE ANTI-SEMITIC EDITOR FOR RITUAL MURDER LIBEL

Berlin, Jan. 14—Herr Kurth, member of the anti-Semitic Voelkische party and editor of an anti-Semitic magazine, was sentenced to two months' imprisonment by the Breslau court.

Kurth published in his magazine an article in connection with the Passover season, in which he asserted that Christian children disappear because Jews need blood."

## RITUAL MURDER AGITA- TION STIRS POPULACE IN BULGARIAN VILLAGE

Authorities Intervene Swiftly; Prevent Pogrom

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Sofia, Jan. 14—Organized anti-Jewish violence against the Jewish population of the village of Haskovo, Bulgaria, on the ground of a ritual murder accusation, was prevented by the energetic intervention of the government authorities.

A Christian woman complained to the police that while passing in the street a Jewish woman pushed a lump of chocolate into her mouth, intending to choke her. The Jewish woman disappeared. At the screams of the Christian woman a large crowd gathered and the rumor spread immediately that "the Jews intended to kill the woman for ritual purposes."

Despite the explanations of the police officials, which was made after an investigation, that the story was ridiculous, the angry crowd assumed a threatening attitude. The energetic intervention of the police averted what might have been a pogrom.

Col. Tadjer, president of the Jewish Consistory in Bulgaria, when interviewed by the correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency stated he was satisfied that the immediate energetic measures taken by Chief of Police Prestavski, prevented riots.

## "SOCIAL ERROR" TO ASK JEWS OUT OF GOLF CLUB, BUT NOT ILLEGAL, COURT RULES

Wisconsin Supreme Court Dismisses  
Case Against Milwaukee Golf Club  
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Milwaukee, Wis., Jan. 14—It may be a "social error" for a golf club to request its Jewish members to resign because they are Jews, but it is not such deprivation of a valuable right that justifies an action at law against the club by the grieved Jewish member.

This is the ruling of the Wisconsin Supreme Court in the law suit brought by Max Polacheck against the Milwaukee Golf Club, which appealed from an order of the Milwaukee Circuit court overruling its contention that the complaint of Mr. Polacheck did not establish grounds for legal remedy. The decision has the effect of dismissing the law suit.

## JEWISH TEACHERS IN BRAZIL HOLD CONFERENCE

Rio de Janeiro, Jan. 14—The first conference of Jewish teachers held in Brazil was opened here under the chairmanship of Rabbi Raffalowitz. Twenty-four teachers, representing 15 Jewish schools in the country, are attending the conference.

Pedagogical courses of one month were decided upon by the conference.

## FUSION OF GERMAN JEWRY WITH EAST EUROPE JEWS HAILED AT CONVENTION

Equal Participation in German Kehillahs Urged

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Jan. 14—The elimination of social differences between native German Jews and those who are of East European origin but resident in the country for many years was stressed at the fourth annual national convention of East European Jewish organizations in Germany.

Messages from the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, the Hilfsverein der Deutschen Juden, the Central Sedaka, the Zionist Federation, the Ort, the Oze and the Emig-direkt, were read, in which it was emphasized that there are no differences between the German and the East European Jews. The amalgamation with the East European Jews was described as a strengthening of German Jewry.

The convention adopted a resolution protesting against recent remarks made by the German Jewish writer, Jacob Wassermann, in which reflections were cast upon Russian and Galician Jews in Germany.

A report on the condition of East European Jews was rendered by Israel Taubes. Markus Hornstein, Kehillah president, submitted a report on the role of East European Jews in the German Kehillahs. The equal participation of East European Jews in the work of the German Kehillahs was urged.

## DISMISSED FOR REFUSAL TO PLAY ANTI-SEMITIC HYMN

Berlin, Jan. 14—The director of the public concert orchestra in the German resort Borkum on the North Sea was dismissed from his position by a decision of the Borkum municipal council.

The dismissal was motivated by the director's refusal to play the anti-Semitic hymn, "Borkum."

## BELGRADE RABBI CALLED TO ARGENTINE CHIEF RABBINATE

Belgrade, Jan. 14—Rabbi D. Sabetai, Dayan (rabbinical judge) of Bitol, was invited to become the Chief Rabbi of the Jewish communities in Argentina. Induction ceremonies will soon take place in the main synagogue of Buenos Aires.

## ZIONIST CANDIDATE IN GREEK SENATE ELECTIONS

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## NO AMENDMENT TO REAPPORTIONMENT BILL

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Jan. 14—The threatened amendment to exclude aliens in the population figures for representation in Congress failed to materialize when the reapportionment bill was adopted on January 10, without a record vote. Congressman La Guardia of New York and other members of Congress recently charged that the Ku Klux Klan was sending out propaganda to bring about such an amendment. However, no such amendment was offered. The purpose of the amendment would have been to reduce the representation of areas largely populated by aliens.

The bill as adopted provides for a reapportionment on the basis of the 1930 census, by a calculation known as major fractions, and maintains the present membership of 435.

## LOUIS P. ALOE, LEADER OF ST. LOUIS, DIES

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 14—Louis P. Aloe, former president of the Board of Aldermen, died here after a long illness. He had been prominent in the community for many years and was a candidate for the Republican nomination for mayor four years ago.

Dormant for almost a year, the Camden, N. J., Y. M. and Y. W. H. A. has been reorganized and has re-declared its renovated building.

The Y. M. and Y. W. H. A. will seek a membership of 1,000. All of the local Jewish organizations have pledged their aid in the campaign. Henry W. Brandes, president of the Philadelphia Y. M. and Y. W. H. A., was the speaker at the exercises. Camden suffers somewhat from its proximity to Philadelphia, which attracts many of the youth of Camden and its suburbs.

## JACOB H. SCHIFF EXTOLLED AT MEMORIAL MEETING IN CENTER NAMED FOR HIM

Mayor Walker, Louis Marshall and Dr. Adler Recall Leader's Life Work

The late Jacob H. Schiff was eulogized Sunday evening at a memorial meeting held on the eighty-second anniversary of his birth.

Eight hundred men and women attended the ceremonies at the Jacob H. Schiff Center, the Bronx, dedicated to the late leader, and witnessed the unveiling of a portrait of Mr. Schiff, painted by Mark O. Jaffe. Dr. Cyrus Adler, President of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and the Dropsie College, whose biography of Mr. Schiff has recently been published, unveiled the portrait.

The Schiff family was represented by Mr. and Mrs. Felix M. Warburg. Sol M. Strock, President of the New York Federation for Jewish Philanthropic Societies and the Metropolitan League was the chairman of the evening. Addresses were delivered by Louis Marshall, Dr. Cyrus Adler, Mayor James J. Walker, Hon. Joseph V. McKee, President of the Board of Aldermen, Samuel Berger, President of the Schiff Center and Rabbi Alexander Basel, spiritual leader of the Center.

Mr. Schiff's contribution to the city, state and nation regardless of creed was extolled by Mayor Walker and Mr. McKee. Mr. Marshall and Dr. Adler painted an intimate picture of the man whose name is the symbol of goods deeds wherever Jews live.

"The life of Jacob H. Schiff," declared Mr. Marshall, "is a life model which we might all pattern after. It can be studied from many points of view. From whichever point we regard it, it was full of beauty, grandeur and inspiration. The youth who came to America friendless and without wealth and died a world figure, achieved his preeminence because he had character, a tremendous natural dignity, was strong in his convictions, his affections, his loyalty, had fundamental principles adopted in his youth, from which he never swerved," he stated.

"His loyalty to our faith was without parallel among men," said Mr. Marshall. "There was no narrowness, no cant or hypocrisy. He was interested in every phase of Judaism. Belonging to two Reform Congregations, it was he who brought about the reorganization of the Jewish Theological Seminary, an orthodox institution, and in all the years of his association, never sought to change its teachings.

"Men loved him because of his all-embracing humanity. He had no pride of wealth. He met every man on the common ground of merit and work. His influence will be felt for generations to come," Mr. Marshall concluded.

The life of Mr. Schiff had left a profound impression on him, Dr. Adler said, because he was the outstanding example of how the American and the Jew could be combined. Mr. Schiff, he said, attained eminence in national and world finance and yet could keep him-

## CHALUZIM EMIGRATION FROM POLAND TO PAL- ESTINE BEGINS ANEW

First Group of 60 Left Yesterday

## ROTHSCHILD MARKS BAR MITZ- VAH IN LONDON SYNAGOGUE

London, Jan. 14—The Bar Mitzvah of Edmund Rothschild, son of Lionel de Rothschild and Mrs. de Rothschild was held on Saturday at the Doh Street Synagogue, where the first Lord Rothschild became Bar Mitzvah seventy-five years ago.

Young Edmund, during the confirmation ceremony, read a chapter in the weekly portion of the Bible. A sermon was delivered by Chief Rabbi, Dr. J. H. Herz. The confirmation exercises were followed by a reception. The London press reported fully the ceremonies which were held in accordance with Jewish traditional custom.

self intact. It is important that we should not talk about being a Jew and an American, but be one, instead," he declared.

The outstanding quality of Mr. Schiff's life, Dr. Adler stated, was that he never had to be asked to do anything he offered to do. In this connection he related the story of his first meeting with Mr. Schiff.

"I was a student in Baltimore, in 1886, trying to get together a modest sum to buy a Hebrew library. I didn't think of going to any one I didn't know. I didn't know Mr. Schiff. One day I received a letter from Mr. Schiff offering me this contribution toward my library, if by that time I hadn't enough money, and, if I had enough, telling me in the future, he wanted to be counted in on such things. With it was an invitation to come to New York to meet him."

In his message of greeting, Mayor Walker said: "I bring you the respect that is in the hearts of those far removed from Jewry. Mr. Schiff's life was a lesson from which not only Jews can profit. A great American and a devoted Jew, he was an outstanding exemplar that wealth, prestige and prominence do not suffice without religion. May his memory continue to inspire a devotion to your religion."

## NON-ZIONISTS ENLIST IN NEW YORK DRIVE FOR UNITED PALESTINE APPEAL

Committee Named to Organize West Side and Yorkville Sections

Plans for enlisting the cooperation of non-Zionists in this year's United Palestine Appeal drive in New York City were formulated at a conference of Reform congregations of the West Side and Yorkville sections of this city held at the Ambassador Hotel Sunday. Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, chairman of the U. P. A. for Greater New York, presided.

Following the announcement of Mr. Warburg's \$50,000 contribution to the United Palestine Appeal, a telegram from Lieut. Governor Herbert H. Lehman was read, in which he declared that he will "be glad to cooperate in working out this program." A telegram was also read from Congressman Sol Bloom.

Committees to organize the residents of West Side and Yorkville were named. Contributions amounting to \$18,000 were announced including \$2,000 from Samuel Rosoff, \$2,500 from John Grossberg, J. D. Morrison \$5,000, A. Liebowitz \$6,500.

Among the speakers at the meeting were Dr. Bernard Drachman, Rabbi Gabriel Schulman, Dr. Joseph Silverman, Isidore D. Morrison, Samuel Rosoff, head of the Rosoff Subway Construction Company and Rev. Dr. Hunt, Director of America's Good Will Union.

Rabbi Joseph Silverman recounted the growth of Zionism in America in the last thirty-five years and Mr. Morrison contrasted Zionism today with that of thirty-one years ago, when he was elected honorary secretary of the Federation of American Zionists at a meeting at Pacific Hall, East Broadway. He pointed out the progress that the movement has made.

Dr. Hunt declared that he was preparing to launch a campaign among Christians to secure funds to buy land in Palestine, which would then be given to Jews "as part payment of the tremendous debt which Christianity and the world owes to the Jews."

In an account of what has taken place in Palestine in the last ten years, Dr. I. M. Rubinow, Executive Director of the United Palestine Appeal, declared that "in reality a paltry sum had been invested in Palestine, but the results were very large and unusually great." He declared that the reconstruction of Palestine is now merely a matter of patience and money.

## HARBIN ESTABLISHES HEBREW HIGH SCHOOL

Harbin, China, Jan. 14.—A high school where Hebrew will be the language of instruction is soon to be established here, under the auspices of the local Jewish community. It will be the first Hebrew high school in the Far East.

### Dr. Rosenau to Make "Flu" Investigation; Boston Faces Adjustment Problems

Boston, Jan. 13.—Dr. Milton J. Rosenau, Charles Wilder Professor of Preventive Medicine at Harvard University, has assumed charge of a field corps which will work in five isolated towns in Massachusetts with a view of obtaining data on the spread of influenza, it was announced here by Harvard University.

This study, it is understood, is not primarily bacteriological, but it is epidemiological. Dr. Rosenau has for a long time made studies on influenza but upon his return from Washington, where he took part in the national conference of leading physicians, he declared that observation of influenza cases show that the disease in no way resembles the severe "pneumonia" type of 1918-19. He admitted that the present spread of the "flu" is puzzling science.

Dr. Rosenau's sixtieth birthday was celebrated a few days ago here. He is the author of the Pan-American Sanitary Code and is former director of the Public Health Laboratories at Washington, D. C. He made the recent survey of sanitary and health conditions in Palestine as a member of the expert commission that was sent to Palestine. Dr. Rosenau is one of the prominent leaders of the Jewish community of Boston.

Five small communities will be put under observation by Dr. Rosenau, who with the expert corps of workers will get first hand information in order to obtain more light on the study of influenza.

The outcome of these studies is being awaited with great interest here and in other parts of the country. Dr. Rosenau stated that the present epidemic is only of a mild form.

The shifting of Jewish population and the adjustments to the newer social needs is a problem that Boston Jews face like other large Jewish centers. The West End was at one time the focal point for a thriving Jewish life. All visitors to the historic Hub will recall the Jewish West End. Here it is estimated a Jewish population numbering over fifty thousand resided. It was from this small area that all that is of Jewish life in Boston today sprang. Hebrew education, the teaching of Hebrew in *Yeshivot* was first started in the West End. From the West End the new system radiated not only to other sections in New England but to the larger cities in the United States. The birth of the Y. M. H. E. A. took place here. Not that the word Y. M. was discovered in the West End but that the growing need for adjustment of a large and active population required a home for the young, thus making the Boston or West End Y. M. H. A. one of the most effective.

What has taken place here is just

## B'NAI BRITH TO ESTABLISH LOAN FUND FOR JEWISH IMMIGRANTS IN MEXICO

Executive Decides on Variety of Cultural and Relief Measures

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Cincinnati, Jan. 14.—A loan fund to aid Jewish immigrants in Mexico in their adjustment to the new environment will be established under the auspices of the Mexican Bureau of the Independent Order B'nei Brith. Authorization for this action was given by the Executive Committee of the fraternal order at its annual meeting which was held here all day Sunday. Alfred M. Cohen, president, presided over the meeting, which was attended by B'nei Brith leaders from all parts of the country. The amount of \$12,500 to institute the loan fund work was received from the Emergency Relief Committee.

The Executive Committee, after approving the reports of Senator Cohen and Dr. Boris D. Bogen, Executive Secretary, acted on a number of proposals of world-wide interest affecting cultural, economic and relief measures.

The work of the Anti-Defamation League, a subsidiary body of the I. O. E. B. functioning for the protection of the good name of the Jew and for the elimination of racial and religious prejudice, was reported on by Sigmund Livingston of Chicago, chairman of the League. The Executive Committee approved the report, which includes a plan whereby the League is cooperating with the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America for removing from the prayer books all texts deprecatory to the Jews.

The Wider Scope Committee, of which Henry Monsky of Omaha, Neb., is chairman, was authorized to continue its work and go into territory not covered by previous campaigns in its effort to make up the sum of \$750,000 short of its recent \$2,000,000 campaign.

## EMIL FUCHS, ARTIST AND SCULPTOR, ENDS LIFE

Emil Fuchs, painter and sculptor, ended his life in his studio apartment, in New York City, by shooting himself through the heart. He was sixty-two years old and had been suffering from cancer for some time. Although he had undergone an operation last year, friends and relatives knew that he had not been cured. He had not been informed of this. However, in his farewell note written to his sister, Renee Fuchs, he stated that he was "going down every day."

Emil Fuchs was born Aug. 9, 1886 in Vienna. He was educated at the Imperial Academy of Fine Arts in Vienna and Berlin. He was a teacher in the Royal Academy in London.

In 1896 he won a gold medal at the Munich exhibition and many other awards. His work is represented in the Metropolitan Museum, the Cleveland Museum, Brooklyn Museum, New York Public Library, the Congressional Library at Washington. He was a member of the National Sculpture Society. His autobiography was entitled "With Pencil, Brush and Chisel."

what has happened in other cities. The walls of the ghetto have crumbled. Jews began to enter the business life of the city and as they grew and prospered they left the West End. These residents built up new Jewish communities in Roxbury, Dorchester, Mattapan and now the tendency is to Brookline. So many Jews have come into the fashionable Brookline that the wealthier are moving further, to Newton. What has remained in the West End is the poorer classes and even they are moving to other parts of the city.

Jewish social workers are beginning to realize the new life and the need of adjustment. A Jewish social centre now established in the West End together with a Y. M. H. A. and several schools are proving to be overproductive for the limited number of Jews left there.

Conferences have been under way among the different social agencies to solve the problem and a survey is under way to determine the actual number of Jews now residing there.

What to do with the Y. M. H. A. building that has a large equity but located up on the hill where Jews in large numbers do not reside is another of the problems to be met. Those engaged in social work point out that the center maintained by the Federation of Jewish Charities also is meeting some difficult problems. Either the Jewish population is very small or else those that are still in the West End do not take the trouble to attend the activities planned by the workers in charge of the center.

The Hebrew schools are also faced with serious difficulties. The "Enviro" Hebrew school, the oldest school in the city, located in the West End, is now facing a crisis. While the late Henry Levenson was alive he did much to maintain the school. Those that were most interested in the financial operation of the school too are gone. The attendance in the school has dwindled and the teaching staff, which was the best in the city, too has left to accept more attractive and lucrative positions. The school is now threatened to be closed and the other schools likewise are having financial difficulties. While apathy and lack of interest exist among those that still reside in the West End, new buildings with high budgets are springing up in other parts of the city. There is expansion and growth in the other sections where former West End residents live. Many of those who for years labored in the West End and did much for its progress are now helping elsewhere.

While adequate data is being gathered, there is talk that a Jewish community center to supplant the present Y. M. H. A. will be erected. For five years now a discussion has taken place as to the advisability of selling the West End Y. M. H. A. and building a large Jewish center in the heart of the city, but no definite plans have yet been announced that this is to take place.

Social engineers have a difficult problem to cope with. While attention is

The leaders of the B'nai B'rith have also approved the action of the Hillel Foundation in establishing new foundations at Cornell University and Morgantown, W. Va. An application for the establishment of a Hillel Foundation was received from Athens, Georgia. All plans submitted by Dr. Bogen for the extension of the educational and cultural work under the auspices of the Order were approved. Under these plans I. O. B. B. lodges will be assured lecturers, musical programs and art exhibitions.

The establishment of an agency for Jewish social work at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, by the Order, is hoped to overcome the serious problem brought about there by the absence of Jewish contacts, an absence that produced such a serious reaction against Jews that the Anti-Defamation League looked into the matter and suggested the forming of the agency, it was stated at the meeting.

The Aleph Zadik Aleph, junior order of the B'nai B'rith, was voted a subvention of \$10,000 to carry on its work.

A study of cultural activities at 947 open meetings of 190 lodges throughout the country showed an enthusiastic response on the part of members. The survey showed an attendance of 189,400, or an average of 200 per meeting, according to the report submitted by Dr. Bogen.

In response to a plea by Dr. David Yellin, former vice-mayor of Jerusalem, the Executive Committee voted a contribution of \$5,000 to the Hebrew Teachers' College, now in process of construction in Jerusalem, of which Dr. Yellin is the head. President Cohen was also authorized to appropriate from the I. O. B. B. funds, raised through the Wider Scope Committee, a sum necessary for the subvention of a library division in the Hebrew University library in the name of the B'nai B'rith.

In the face of this situation, it is hardly possible that the new Jewish Center proposed will get much consideration in the face of the immediate needs.
