Garden City, L. I., Jan. 17—The assertion that many American Jews can be converted to Christianity if "the proper education method" is employed was made by the Rev. Thomas Burwas made by the Rev. Inomas Burgess, secretary of the department of national council, in an address he delivered at the annual Synod of the province of New York, New Jersey and Porto Rico of the Protestant Episcopal Church in convention here.

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INTRODUCE CIVIL MARRIAGE BILL MARYLAND LEGISLATURE Under Present Law, Religious Mar-

riage Compulsory (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Annapolis, Md., Jan. 17—The "Civil Marriage" bill, authorizing the sol-emnization of marriages in Maryland without a religious ceremony, was in-troduced yesterday in the House of Delegates.

The measure authorizes any judge or justice of the peace of the State and the Mayor of any incorporated town to perform marriage ceremonies. Provision is made for either civil or religious ceremonies, giving the option to the contracting parties.

The measure, which was introduced by Delegate Seymour Phillips of the Fourth Legislative district of Baltimore city, is similar to the bill defeat-ed at the last session. It is backed by a number of attorneys, clergymen and

According to the present Maryland laws, a religious ceremony for marriage is compulsory. Maryland, according to Mr. Phillips, is the only state in the Union that does not provide for civil marriage ceremonies.

Chicago, Jan. 17—Professor A. A. Michelson, world-famous Jewish scientist, now 76 years old, has set for himself three tasks which he will perform, he says, before he can consider his life's work completed. These tasks, as he listed them yesterday, are:

1. Measure the speed of light more accurately than it ever has been mea-sured before, thus improving upon his own most celebrated scientific attain-

2. Perfect a method by which the diameter of stars may be measured with greater exactness than heretofore has been possible.

3. Complete a final test of the Einstein theory of relativity, a theory which startled the scientific world some years ago, and which was based upon Michelson's own calculations.

When he has performed these three tasks, any one of which might well be undertaken as a life career by a younger scientist, Professor Michelson may enjoy "a bit of leisure"; he may, but those who have been closest to him predict confidently that he won't.

"While the universe still holds an unsolved riddle," said one of his University of Chicago associates, "Pro-fessor Michelson will keep on work-

His program for the immediate future was outlined by him in an address before the Chicago Woman's Club. He said he would take up the three tasks as soon as he has completed his lecture course at the university, which will be next month. "I shall then re-

turn to the Mt. Wilson Observatory in California," he said, "to resume my investigations." Professor Michelson said he was "almost convinced" that Einstein is of what the scientific world calls the ether. It was only last November that Professor Michelson, speaking before the Optical Society of Chicago, ex-pressed a doubt of the rightness of Einstein on that one point. ORTHODOX RABBIS SEEK AMENDMENT OF EMBALMING LAWS

Present Rules Said to Be in Conflict with Jewish Religious Laws

The Union of Orthodox Rabbis in the United States and Canada will take steps to bring about an amendment of the regulations concerning the embalming of the dead in such states where regulations to this effect have been enacted, Rabbi Israel Rosenberg, president of the Union, announced yesterday.

The regulations, particularly those of the Board of Embalmers of the State of New Jersey, adopted July 1, 1927, when applied to the Jewish dead, it was declared, are a direct violation of the prescriptions of the Jewish religious code in view of the fact that under the regulations the bodies of persons dying of a contagious or infectious disease are to be given an arterial injection of an approved embalming fluid. This involves the cutting of the body and the letting out of blood, which is, in the view of the Jewish religious law, dishonoring the dead, and is prohibited in accordance with paragraph 363, Yorch Deah, and in accordance with the interpretations contained in the Responsa of ancient rabbis.

Embalming is contrary to Jewish religious tradition, Rabbi Selzer, secretary of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis, stated in behalf of the organization. Specific objection is taken to the practice of letting out blood, which requires burial as is specified in paragraph 364. Yoreh Deah, Rabbi Selzer

VAAD LEUMI AND AGUDAH FORM JOINT COMMISSION ON WAILING WALL QUESTION

Vienna, Dec. 30—As a result of negoriations between the Vaad Leumi, National Council of the Jews of Palestine, and the Agudath Israel on the question of joint action in connection with the incident at the Wailing Wall, an agreement has been reached, states the Agudist organ "Juedische Presse," here.

A Commission of eleven members, it proceeds, will be formed of whom seven will represent the Vaad Leumi and four the Agudath Israel, Religious questions will not be decided by a majority vote. On other questions, the majority vote can decide only when at least one member of the other side votes with the majority. 'ine Government will be asked to consider this mixed Commission as the sole represcritative of the Jews on the question of the Wailing Wall. The question of whether the Commission should have competence also in political questions concerning the Wailing Wall was raised, the report adds, but the Vaad Leumi refused to agree to such an extension of the competence of the Commission.

who are unwilling to let themselves be robbed, for Jews who make use of revolvers, knives and other weapons on various occasions, just as the Gentiles do—is that we are 'entitled' to a certain number of criminals. It would be ridiculous to expect that among thousands of Jews who are capable of shedding blood there should not at times appear one with an inclination

to average Jews," the paper states.
"If one wishes to go deeper into the argument one could say that the non-lews are responsible for the acts of violence committed by Jews in cases when they are committed by one Jew against another, as well as in cases similar to those of Schwartzbard and Kolenberg. The enemies of the Jewish people have always wanted to estrange us from Judaism. Even in the time of the worst persecutions, the Jew who was willing to kneel before the cross could remain secure. Now, we can tell them 'You coming like you. Let each leader of a pogrom band expect that a Jew with a non-Jewish psychology may send a bullet through his head or heart."
