

ROUMANIAN CITIES GET REFUGEES FROM FAMINE REGION OF BESSARABIA

Jewish Colonists Hardest Hit; 90 Per Cent Forced to Seek Aid
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Feb. 2.—Jassy, Galatz, Cernowitz and Kishineff are overcrowded with refugees, Jewish men, women and children who fled the Bessarabian famine region, seeking food in the cities.

It is stated that the hardest hit section of the population are the Jewish colonists in Bessarabia. Even such model farms as Volontirovka and Gromanka were badly affected. It is estimated that ninety per cent of the Jewish colonists are compelled to ask for aid. Many have already sold their implements and wagons to obtain bread.

LONDON JEWISH BARBERS MUST REST ON SATURDAY

London, Feb. 2.—Jewish barbers in London will be required to observe Saturday as their day of rest, according to a clause in the new barbers' bill approved yesterday by a parliamentary committee.

On the assumption that Jewish barber shop owners keep their establishments open on Sunday, the bill provides a clause that they should not carry on their business on Saturday. The bill will now be submitted for a third reading in the House of Commons, following which it will go to the House of Lords.

HOFFMANN PERMITTED TO RESIGN HIS POST

Berlin, Feb. 2.—Landesgerichtsdirektor Hoffmann, one of the two investigators of the German Dreyfus case, sentenced this week to disciplinary demotion, was permitted to resign from the bench without a pension, it was announced today.

The Federal Minister of Justice accepted Hoffmann's resignation. It was declared that Hoffmann will resume his law practice, becoming the attorney for Magdeburg firms.

OFFER REWARD FOR ARREST OF TEMPLE DESECRATORS

Berlin, Feb. 2.—The police authorities of Braunschweig and the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith have announced rewards for the apprehension of those guilty of invading and damaging the Jewish temple at Braunschweig.

During the past several weeks the temple was three times entered and damaged. On one occasion the culprits broke open the gates, on another they attempted to set fire to the building.

LUDENDORF HAD 40% INTEREST IN ALCHEMIST PROJECT THAT WAS REVEALED AS FRAUD

Figures Disclosed by Attorney Refute Statement He Had Invested Nothing
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Feb. 2.—Eric von Ludendorff was a part owner to the extent of forty per cent in the alchemist scheme sponsored by him and Herr Tausend, which was revealed as a fraud.

This information was confirmed by Attorney Schramm, who is known as the counsel for German monarchist and anti-Semitic organizations. According to Dr. Schramm, Ludendorff and Tausend each had a forty per cent interest in the project, while the large number of those who gave their money, running into millions of marks, held twenty per cent.

Several days ago Ludendorff declared in a public statement that he had never given a single penny toward the alchemist plan. The treasure which was supposed to have resulted from converting base metal into gold was to be employed in the interests of the German monarchist movement.

JEWISH DEBATE IS BROUGHT TO CONCLUSION IN ROUMANIAN PARLIAMENT

Minister of Justice Calls Goga to Task For Anti-Semitic Conceptions
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Feb. 2.—The "Jewish debate" in the Roumanian parliament came to an end Friday when the House concluded its general discussion on the throne message.

Minister of Justice Junian gave a pointed reply to the charges made in the House by the former Minister of the Interior Octavian Goga, against the Maniu government for its alliance with the Zionists.

Junian stated that Mr. Goga's anti-Semitic conceptions are totally without foundation. The Roumanian students, he declared, wish to pursue their studies peacefully and they do it, if they are not tampered with from other quarters. The Roumanian government has recognized the ineffectiveness of the policy pursued by the previous government, which was cooperating with the Union of Roumanian Jews of Bucharest. The present government decided, therefore, to support the candidates of the Zionist movement, which was endorsed and is being participated in by many outstanding leaders of many countries. "It is comical," the Minister of Justice said, "to see Mr. Goga suddenly in the position of a defender of the Union of Roumanian Jews against the Zionists."

Deputy Josef Fischer, a Zionist, who participated in the debate, lauded the Maniu government for its course. He has determined to treat all citizens on a par, which will also redound to the credit to Roumania abroad, he said.

PENNSYLVANIA MUSEUM EXPEdition MAKES FINDS AT BEISAN

Discover Altar at Which Canaanites Worshipped 3,500 Years Ago

Philadelphia, Feb. 2.—A great stepped altar at which the Canaanites worshipped their god Mekal nearly 3,500 years ago has been found in Beisan, the Biblical Beth-Shan, by the University of Pennsylvania Museum's archaeological expedition to Palestine, it was announced today following receipt of a report from Alan Rowe, director of the expedition.

The altar, built of bricks resting upon a foundation of undressed stones in the Mekal temple, is approximately seventeen feet wide and twelve feet deep and is the most remarkable structure of its kind ever found in western Asia, according to Mr. Rowe.

Adjoining the great altar was discovered a small room containing a low seat and also a sloping socket in which a wooden peg once rested. From its appearance and its strategic position it seems obvious that this room was used by the temple guardian who maintained his vigil assisted by a fierce hunting dog, probably tethered to the peg, the archaeologists declare.

During the course of its excavation of the Thothmes III level at Beisan dating from 1501 to 1447 B. C., the Museum's expedition had previously uncovered the greater part of the vast temple dedicated to the god Mekal, but had not completed the excavation of the western section of the structure. According to the report just received by the Museum from Mr. Rowe which covers the activities of the expedition during the concluding weeks of the 1928-29 season, the excavation of the western section has now been completed and the archaeologists have thus been enabled to obtain for the first time a correct and detailed idea of the temple's general plan.

In addition, the work in this section has resulted in the discovery of many valuable objects, including three gold pendants, one of which bears the figure of the goddess Ashtoreth; bronze arrowheads; an ivory spindle-whorl; and several Syro-Hittite cylinder seals whose presence seems to indicate a northern influence in Beth-Shan in the time of Thothmes III.

BRITISH LIBERALS HAVE NO MONOPOLY ON JEWISH RIGHTS DEFENSE. IS BALFOUR'S VIEW

Cites Palestine Mandate; None of
Cabinets Supporting It Has
Been Liberal

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 2.—The Earl of Balfour having had his attention drawn by Percy Cohen to a leaflet recently issued by the Liberal Publication Department to Jews urging them to vote for the Liberal Party in the coming general elections, Mr. Cohen has received a letter from Mrs. Dugdale, Lord Balfour's niece, in which she writes:

"I have drawn Lord Balfour's attention to the pamphlet 'The Jews and Liberalism' issued by the Liberal Publication Department, and especially to the paragraphs on pages 10 and 11, where the inference seems to be made that the Liberal Party are alone worthy to be trusted to uphold the freedom of Jewish citizens of our State.

"Lord Balfour can hardly suppose that a contention so unsupported by facts could prove of service to the Liberal cause. He observed with interest, not unmingled with amusement, the note of page 1 referring to Lord Beaconsfield which shows that the authors of the pamphlet have decided, after consideration, to refrain from calling their readers' attention to any of those famous passages in the speeches and writings of the conservative prime minister which have done so much to interpret to the people of England the great ideals of the Jewish race.

"The reason given in the footnote to justify the suppression of all mention of Mr. Disraeli's services to the State is that he was baptized before he came to years of discretion. Lord Balfour wonders whether this chain of reason-

PALESTINE ADMINISTRATION COSTS BRITISH EXCHEQUER NOTHING, SAYS ORMSBY-GORE

Transjordan and Iraq Administration
Cost Great Britain \$65,000

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 2.—The Palestine administration involves no charge on the British exchequer, declared Undersecretary of the Colonial Office Ormsby-Gore, in reply to a question put by Percy A. Hurd, Conservative.

The Iraq administration costs Great Britain \$25,000 toward the maintenance of the High Commissioner there. The amount of \$40,000 is paid by Great Britain toward the expenses of the civil administration in Transjordan.

Sir Samuel Hoare, Secretary in the Air Ministry, replied to Mr. Hurd's question that the British forces in Iraq consist of five squadrons of aircraft and one armored car regiment. The Palestinian and Transjordanian air force is made up of one squadron of aircraft and one armored car regiment.

SAYS ENGLAND GIVES JEWS GREAT CHANCE IN PALESTINE

Melbourne, Feb. 2.—Sir Hugo Hirst, director of the General Electric Company, Ltd. of Great Britain, who is now on a visit to Melbourne from England, receiving a delegation of the Zionist Organization of Melbourne declared that England is giving the Jews a big chance in Palestine and "it depends upon the Jews how soon they will make good."

Sir Hugo expressed satisfaction in the progress of the Ruttenberg electrification work in Palestine, with which he himself is connected.

He praised the work of the Hebrew University and the Technicum of Haifa, as educating a suitable class of Palestine citizens. He predicted a brighter economic future for the country with the construction of the Haifa harbor, when Haifa will become the most important commercial center in the Near East. The Mosul pipe lines going through Haifa and the geographic position of the country will make Palestine within one generation the eastern gateway and the principal center of communication with India through Iraq.

KOLENBERG STILL IN PRISON; NO OFFICIAL DATA GIVEN

Moscow, Feb. 2.—The Jewish young man, Kolenberg, who shot and killed the former Czaristic General Slaschoff several weeks ago, is still in prison notwithstanding reports in the foreign press that he had been released on bail.

No official information concerning the progress of the case is available.

PUBLISH PALESTINE MIGRATION FIGURES

Jerusalem, Feb. 2.—Immigration and emigration figures for the month of December were made public here today. During December 216 immigrants, including 187 Jews, entered the country. Of the 178 emigrants, 99 were Jews.

TO ASK CLOSED DOOR TO U.S. IF NATIONAL ORIGINS PROVISO IS POSTPONED

Restrictionist Organ Demands Complete Suspension of Immigration

Washington, Feb. 2.—The "Fellowship Forum," restrictionist paper, in its current issue devotes a great deal of space to the present discussion in Congress as to whether or not the National Origins Provision is to be postponed for another year.

Under a streamer headline: "Hold Immigration Lines and Preserve America for Americans" the newspaper urges that the National Origins provision go into effect this year and threatens that if the present restrictive law is tampered with "American people are expected to retaliate by forcing all immigration to be suspended for several years."

RIGA GIVES \$115,000 FOR JEWISH COMMUNAL NEEDS

Riga, Feb. 2.—The municipality of the Latvian capital voted yesterday to include in the budget the amount of \$115,000 for the year 1929 for Jewish communal needs in the city.

This amount includes \$84,000 for maintaining the school system, \$19,000 for social service work and \$12,000 in subsidies to charitable and cultural institutions.

HEBREW UNION COLLEGE RECEIVES NEW GIFTS

Cincinnati, Feb. 2.—Gifts totaling \$48,515 brought the \$5,000,000 Hebrew Union College Endowment Fund, of which Adolph S. Ochs is chairman, to \$2,800,000.

Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president, announced that Warner Brothers and Bernard K. Marcus of New York, contributed \$10,000 each; Mrs. C. J. Levy of Bay City, Mich., \$10,000, with the stipulation that the sum be used for publishing scientific works of the faculty; Henry J. Bernheim, \$7,500; and Otto Marx of New York, \$1,000; Charles Shohl of Cincinnati, \$2,500; Jonas Weil of Lexington, Ky., \$1,500; Albert Wolf of Philadelphia, \$1,000; Meier Steinbrink of Brooklyn, \$1,000, and Dr. N. Calisch of Richmond, Va., \$500.

ORT LEADER SAILS FOR AMERICA

Berlin, Feb. 2.—Dr. Aaron Singalowsky, social worker and prominent leader of the Ort, the society for the promotion of trade and agriculture among the Jews in Eastern Europe, left here today for America. Mr. Singalowsky will embark on the Majestic and is expected to arrive in New York on February 6.

On his fifteenth anniversary as Rabbi of the Congregation Gates of Prayer of New Orleans, La., Dr. Mendel Silber was elected Rabbi for life. A dinner was given him in honor of the anniversary. S. L. Jacobs, president of the congregation was toastmaster at the dinner which was attended by 200 persons.

SAYS EUROPE'S NON-ZIONISTS NEED U.S. EXAMPLE FOR CO-OPERATION IN JEWISH AGENCY

Jean Fischer, Veteran Belgian Zionist, on Visit Here, Sees Greater Difficulties in Europe

The enlistment of the cooperation of European non-Zionists will be a more difficult and longer process than in the United States, was the view expressed by Jean Fischer, president of the Zionist Federation of Belgium, veteran Zionist leader of Belgium, who sailed on the steamer Anutanika following a visit here.

In an interview with the representative of the Jewish Daily Bulletin, Mr. Fischer, one of the early associates of Theodor Herzl and a well-known representative of political Zionism, expressed his concurrence in the Jewish Agency extension idea, which he stated was not new, as Dr. Herzl had attempted to do the same thing along the same lines, when he approached Baron de Hirsch, Jacob H. Schiff and Rothschild.

"I am more concerned with the attitude of the non-Zionist circles in Europe than the non-Zionists in the United States," said Mr. Fischer. "The European non-Zionists have not yet acquired that tolerance, that broadness of viewpoint which the non-Zionist leaders in the United States possess. The effort to organize the non-Zionists in various European countries in behalf of the Agency will meet with difficulties. I do not expect that the Agency will come into being before the year 1929 has passed. Despite the many handicaps this undertaking is faced with, I sincerely hope it will turn out to be successful and will unify all Jewish forces for the great work of upbuilding our homeland."

"Had we Zionists succeeded in attracting a sufficient number of Jews for the upbuilding of Palestine and had we employed in Palestine effective methods for the colonization of the country, it would not have been necessary to enter into the Agency under the present terms. As we did not sufficiently succeed in these two directions, as we have not been able to attract within the Zionist Organization sufficient funds and great organizers and builders, there is today no doubt in my mind that the Zionist Organization must proceed with the Agency."

"The Agency is not a new idea. Already Theodor Herzl was working on the same lines when he approached Baron Hirsch, Rothschild and Jacob H. Schiff. The Agency is the first attempt to unite Jewry. The fact that Palestine is the basis for this unity is very gratifying. The opposition to the Agency ought to recognize that the decision of the Zionist Congress regarding the Agency must be obeyed—otherwise the Zionist Organization would cease to be taken seriously in any future attempt to interest non-Zionist forces in this work. I deplore the fifty-fifty arrangement. The decisions of the Agency should be taken on the basis of argument and the merits of the issues involved, not according to a division between the Zionists and non-Zionists. I

Memorial Building for Fuld Planned in Newark

Newark, N. J., Feb. 2.—Construction of a memorial building to honor the memory of the late Felix Fuld, philanthropist and merchant of this city who died on January 20, will be recommended to the Welfare Federation of this city by the Conference on Jewish Charities. The proposed building would house general welfare activities and administrative offices of all philanthropic agencies in Newark and funds would be raised by public subscription, it is planned.

The board of delegates of the conference at a meeting this week, considering the manner in which enduring tribute might be paid to Mr. Fuld, reached the decision for the building. A. J. Dimond, president of the Conference, was empowered to appoint a committee to confer with Federation officials.

Another recommendation, unanimously adopted by the delegates, suggested the establishment of a Fuld memorial camp by the State Federation of Y.M.H.A.'s and Y.W.H.A.'s, of which Mr. Fuld was president at the time of his death.

Public memorial services for the late Mr. Fuld will be held on Thursday, February 5, at the First Presbyterian Church, Newark's oldest and most prominent edifice of worship.

The movement for the memorial services was led by the Rev. Dr. William H. Foulkes, pastor of the church. Members of all creeds are supporting the movement and on the committee on arrangements are some of the most distinguished citizens of the city.

An interesting feature of Mr. Fuld's will, which made bequests amounting to \$645,000 to philanthropic institutions of various creeds in this city, was made public yesterday. Mr. Fuld was vice-president and treasurer of L. Bamberger & Company, of which his brother-in-law, Louis Bamberger, is president. Mr. Fuld's will contained the provision that in the event of the accidental death of Mr. Bamberger and himself, that the stock held by him in the firm be sold to the co-workers of the L. Bamberger department store on an easy payment plan.

It is understood that the will of Mr. Bamberger contains a similar clause and that the two original founders of the store were in agreement as to this disposition of their store.

In a codicil to the will made in 1923, Mr. Fuld referred to his purpose to give in his lifetime \$250,000 for the new building and provided that if he did not give that amount in his lifetime that a legacy of that amount should be given the hospital.

In 1927 he cancelled this codicil and wrote another in which he doubled the amount, making it \$500,000. This gift was made during his lifetime.

SEEK CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AGAINST ALIENS' COUNT IN CONGRESS REPRESENTATION

Senator Capper Introduces Resolution to Exclude Aliens from Population Estimate

Washington, Feb. 2.—Senator Capper's bill to exclude aliens from the population estimate for Congressional apportionment which he recently introduced, is in the form of a Senate joint resolution to amend Section 2, Article 14 of the United States Constitution, as his proposal cannot be effected without such Constitutional amendment. The section of the Constitution reads as follows: "Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed." Senator Capper's amendment would add at the end of this sentence, "and aliens," so that it would read "excluding Indians not taxed, and aliens."

Before Senator Capper's resolution can take effect as an amendment to the Constitution, it must be adopted, under Article 5 of the Constitution, by two-thirds vote of both houses of Congress and ratified by the Legislatures of three-fourths of all the States.

A proposal to amend the immigration law so as to grant preference within the quota to expert technicians required by American industries was discussed and referred to a sub-committee headed by Chairman Johnson. Such experts are now being admitted on a temporary status of business visitors and, according to the Labor Department, their continued applications for extensions of stay is creating a problem. A suggestion was considered by the committee to give this class a non-quota status, but the sentiment seemed opposed to it.

If this proposed change in the law is adopted, it will further reduce the quota of preference relatives.

REPORT OF APPOINTMENT PREMATURE, SAYS MAYER

Culver City, Cal., Feb. 2.—Louis B. Mayer, vice-president and manager of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, moving picture producers, termed as premature the report current in New York that he was offered by President-elect Hoover the United States Ambassadorship to Turkey.

In a statement to the correspondent of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," Mr. Mayer said: "I am not a candidate for any public office of any kind. Even were I a candidate, Mr. Hoover is not yet President and until he takes office, to discuss such a thing would be decidedly premature."

Pittsburgh Moves to Eliminate Communal Deficit

Pittsburgh, Feb. 1.—Eighteen of this city's leading philanthropists, representing various social and welfare institutions, met at a dinner recently and pledged \$1250,000, approximately \$70,000 each, as a fund to be used as a nucleus to wipe off all existing debts and mortgages now held by Jewish organizations here. The sum pledged, two-thirds of a goal of \$2,000,000, will hold good in case the remaining sum is obtained.

It was found that the community as a whole does not favor "drives" in succession for the various institutions. A sum of \$2,000,000 is necessary to wipe off the deficit of the Federation and other welfare institutions and it was with this in mind that the eighteen men determined on what is called an "extra-ordinarily ambitious" plan for relieving the institutions of their debts, and at the same time do away with drives. The original pledges totalled \$1,250,000. This was immediately followed by another \$100,000, raising the total sum to \$1,350,000 and leaving the rest of the Jews of the city to make up the necessary \$550,000 to bring the total of the fund to the \$2,000,000 mark.

Those who pledged \$20,000 or more are I. W. Frank and family, \$250,000; Maurice Falk and family, \$250,000; Irvin F. Lehman, Albert C. Lehman, \$75,000; Marcus A. believe the non-Zionists should have a determining influence with regard to the future work in Palestine. I am convinced that they are in a position to make not only a contribution of money but also their vast experience in organizing and administering our work in Palestine. This Agency, in order to be a success, must be entered into with mutual confidence, in a spirit of friendliness and helpfulness.

"Unquestionably those who, against the opposition of the world, carried the burden until now and maintained the Zionist ideal, must remain in the forefront.

"More than ever will it be the task of the Zionists to strengthen the organization and assert, by intensification of their propaganda and loyal adherence to their principle, that predominating influence in the Agency which should be theirs."

FILDERMAN IN ACCORD WITH MANIU GOVERNMENT

Bennett E. Siegelstein, president of the United Rumanian Jews of America, announced he had received a letter from Dr. William Filderman, president of the Union of Rumanian Jews in Bucharest, giving encouraging news from there.

"Mr. Filderman's letter states that he is in accord with the present administration, and is doing everything possible to carry out the recommendations made by our organization, as well as his, for the betterment and improvement of our people," Mr. Siegelstein stated.

In connection with recent discussions as to the practicability of employing Roman characters for literary productions in native Jewish languages, during which it was claimed that through the use of Latin script, the literature in these languages would gain wider recognition in the non-Jewish literary world, the New York Public Library has arranged an edition of specimens of literary productions in Hebrew, Yiddish-German and Yiddish-Spanish printed in Roman characters, illustrative of earlier attempts in this direction. The edition is in the Central Building, 42nd St. and 5th Ave. in New York City, under the second floor, Dr. Joshua Bloch, Chief of the Jewish Division, announced.

Atlantic City has been selected as the meeting place and June 20 to 25 as the date for the next annual meeting of the National Conference of Jewish Social Service, according to a circular from the New York office of the Conference by Hyman Kaplan, secretary of the organization.

A synagogue will be erected on top of a skyscraper in the downtown section, to serve the daily needs of Jewish business men, it was announced. Alexander Bernheim, one of the five members of the committee to carry out the plan, who was working on the edifice, said it would be the first of its kind in the world to be built on top of a skyscraper.

Several buildings between the City Hall and Wall Street have been offered by prominent Jewish business men on which to erect the structure, it was announced.

Contributions for the synagogue have already started and one prominent Jewish community has offered to supply its services free.

Andrew Lin, associated for eighteen years with the Lin Brothers Store, died at his home in Philadelphia at the age of 42. He was a relative of Colonel Samuel D. Lin and Isaac A. Lin, of the department store bearing that name.
