

PRUSSIAN FEDERATION OF JEWISH COMMUNITIES SESSIONS OPEN IN BERLIN May Take Up Question of the Jewish Agency

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Feb. 4.—The participation of German non-Zionists in the extended Jewish Agency for Palestine may come up for discussion and decision at the first annual session of the Federation of Jewish Communities in Prussia which opened here yesterday. Heinrich Stern, leader of German Liberal Jews, is presiding over the sessions.

Kammergerichtsrat Wolff submitted a draft of a bill on Jewish rights similar to the one prepared by the National Federation of German Jews and recommended its adoption for submission to the authorities. He also recommended the issuance of a one million mark loan for the support of the small communities and the establishment of institutes for the training of Jewish religious teachers.

Georg Kareski, newly elected president of the Berlin Kehillah, reported on this year's budget of the Kehillah, which will involve an expenditure of over one million marks.

During the general discussion which developed at the first session, the liberal leader Lilienthal objected to the inclusion in the budget of an item for the support of Chalmuzim, Palestine pioneers. Political questions ought to be eliminated, he stated.

The establishment by German Jewry of a body similar to the Joint Foreign Committee of Anglo-Jewry was advocated by Kurt Blumenfeld, Zionist.

The meeting then discussed the proposal that the Prussian Federation of Communities be recognized by the government as a public legal body. Representatives of the People's Party objected, during the discussion, to the demand of government experts that the right of franchise within the Federation be given only to German Jews. Dr. Ismar Freund explained later that the government had finally withdrawn this demand.

HUNGARIAN LEADERS LAUD JEWISH JOURNALISM

Budapest, Feb. 4.—Minister of Education Klebelsberg and a number of other cabinet ministers, deputies, Bishop Nemes and representatives of science and art, were present at a banquet given by the Hungarian journalists' organization in honor of their president, Max Markus, on the occasion of his fortieth anniversary in journalism.

Admiral Horty, Regent of Hungary, conferred upon Mr. Markus the cross of service. Count Klebelsberg, Minister of Trade and Commerce and Joseph Voss, editor of the "Pester Lloyd," were the speakers.

TO HOLD OPEN HEARINGS ON NATIONAL ORIGINS PLAN POSTPONEMENT

Public Sessions of Senate Committee to Begin Wednesday

Washington, Feb. 4.—The Senate Immigration Committee today decided to hold open hearings on Senator Nye's resolution to postpone operation of the National Origins plan for another year, commencing on Wednesday of this week at 10:30, in view of the fact that so much dispute has arisen regarding this feature of the immigration law.

It is not indicated whether the hearings will extend beyond Wednesday or who will testify at the hearings.

Representatives of the State, Labor and Commerce departments testified at this morning's executive session of the Senate committee. No statement has been issued as yet regarding the nature of their testimony. It is so far unknown whether any Jewish representatives will appear at Wednesday's hearings, called on two days notice.

TROTSKY FOLLOWING GREATER AMONG JEWISH WORKERS THAN NON-JEWS, IS "EMES" PLAINT

Says Jewish Clerks and Intelligentzia, As Well, Susceptible

Moscow, Feb. 4.—Trotsky has a greater following among Jewish workers in Russia than among other elements of the population, complains the Moscow Communist Yiddish daily, "Emes." "It is no secret that Trotskyism has special success among the Jewish workers, clerks and the intelligentzia," the paper writes and quotes a resolution adopted at the recent plenary session of the Yevsektzia, Jewish section of the Communist party, which stated that the Jewish population, having a large number of bourgeoisie, intelligentzia, artisans, clerks and traders in its ranks, is particularly susceptible to the Right wing influence.

"This Jewish environment is equally susceptible to the influence of the Left Trotsky ideas. A number of recent incidents in Moscow, Odessa, Kiev and other cities substantiate this. Hence we must continue to fight the Left front in the Jewish midsts," the paper declares.

SAYS POSITION OF BESSA- RABIA JEWRY CATASTROPHIC

Kishineff, Feb. 4.—An urgent plea for immediate aid to rescue a large section of Bessarabian Jewry was presented by Chief Rabbi Zirelsohn at a press conference held here Friday.

"Aid is needed to save us from starvation. God alone knows what the end of this catastrophe will be. The general economic situation of Bessarabian Jewry is catastrophic," he declared.

POLITICAL PRISONERS' HUNGER STRIKE IN LITHUANIA ENDS AFTER LASTING 8 DAYS Reports of Proclamation of Martial Law Denied

Kovno, Feb. 4.—A report circulated in the press abroad that martial law was proclaimed in the Lithuanian capital has no foundation in fact.

The hunger strike of political prisoners which lasted for eight days was ended today. Among the 350 striking prisoners there were 100 Jews, including many students. The strike was said to have been declared in the Kovno prison because of alleged inhuman treatment. The exact conditions in the jail are not known because of the military censorship. It is stated, however, that a number of prisoners have died during the strike, including four Jewish prisoners among whom was a girl, Sheine Rappaport, who refused to eat for five days.

The prison administration refused to hand over the body of the Jewish girl to the Chevra Kadisha for burial. The case has called forth excitement throughout the city.

FAMINE AFFECTS JEWS IN NORTHERN LITHUANIA (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Kovno, Feb. 4.—Thousands of Jewish families in Northern Lithuania, the region affected by bad crops, are now facing starvation.

The peasant population in the region has already sold its live stock and farm implements to buy food. Small trade in the neighboring towns has ceased completely. A relief committee has been formed with the assistance of the government, it was declared here.

WASSERMANN COMPLETES NOVEL ON COLUMBUS (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Feb. 4.—"Columbus, Don Quixote of the Ocean," is the name of a new novel just completed by Jacob Wassermann, noted German Jewish novelist, who arrived here today on his return from a trip to Egypt.

It was stated that the novel presents a new interpretation of the life and character of the discoverer of America, on the basis of latest studies of the sources.

CHAIR FOR JEWISH STUDIES AT MUNICH UNIVERSITY (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Munich, Feb. 4.—A chair for Jewish studies was established at the University of Munich.

Instruction in the Wissenschaft des Judentums will be given by the well-known Jewish scholar, Dr. Prys, who was appointed to fill the chair with the title of docent.

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**ALFRED K. FOREMAN HEADS
CHICAGO JEWISH CHARITIES**

Chicago, Feb. 4.—Alfred K. Foreman, vice-president of the Foreman Banks of Chicago, was elected president of the Jewish Charities of Chicago at the annual meeting of the Board of Directors. Mr. Foreman has been treasurer of the Jewish Charities for the past ten years. James H. Becker was elected treasurer.

The following officers were re-elected: Julius Rosenwald, honorary president; Sol. Kline and Samuel Phillipson, vice-presidents; Louis M. Cohen, executive director and secretary, and Maxwell Abbell, assistant secretary.

Leo F. Wormser, Julius Rosenwald's attorney, in his nominating speech said that Mr. Foreman, who is 36 years old, is the youngest man to be selected for the post of president of the Jewish Charities. Mr. Rosenwald, in seconding the nomination, said it was an honor to do so for the son of an old friend who had been the first president of the organization.

HEBREW WRITER MARKS

75th BIRTHDAY IN TEL AVIV

Tel Aviv, Feb. 4.—The seventy-fifth birthday of the Hebrew writer Alexander Ziskind Rabinovich was celebrated here. Mr. Rabinovich is a member of the Labor Federation and is beloved by the Jewish youth of the country. He is known for his translations into Hebrew.

The new community center of the Congregation of Ohav Sholem, Bayonne, N. J., will be completed and dedicated on April 6. The center will have classrooms for 300 children, an auditorium with a capacity of 700, a ballroom, a library, reading rooms, clubrooms and a game room.

The Hebrew school of the congregation, formerly held in the vestry room of the synagogue, will be transferred to the new building adjoining. I. Greenberg is president of the congregation.

**YESHIVA COLLEGE MOVES
TO NEW BUILDING**

The departments of the Rabbi Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, located on New York East Side for the past 43 years, were transferred to the new spacious buildings erected at 186th Street and Amsterdam Avenue on Sunday, February 3. The Yeshiva College, recently chartered by the Board of Regents of the New York University, temporarily located at the Jewish Center, 131 West 86th Street, was also transferred to the new buildings, and was the Teachers' Institute and the Talmudic Academy, the Yeshiva high school.

Impressive ceremonies and religious services were held in the old building at 301 East Broadway and in the new buildings when the Holy Scrolls and the sacred books were transferred. A large assembly of the directors, rabbis, teachers and friends of the institution attended the ceremonies.

From the downtown home of the Yeshiva, there moved a procession of automobiles bearing the Holy Scrolls. Arriving at the new buildings on Washington Heights, the ceremonies were continued.

Addresses were delivered by Dr. B. Revel, president of the faculty, Rabbi I. Rosenberg, Rabbi M. S. Margolies and others.

**LAY CORNERSTONE FOR
NEW SYNAGOGUE IN BRAZIL**

Paris, Jan. 20.—The laying of the foundation stone for a new synagogue in Sao Paulo, Brazil, called Beth Israel, took place recently, the headquarters of the Jewish Colonization Association here announce.

Chief Rabbi Raffalovitch, the representative of the Ica who officiated, consecrated the foundation stone in the name of the Jewish Colonization Association, declaring the Ica was the real animating force of Judaism in Brazil and that it had achieved a great deal in promoting Jewish immigration to that country. The entire population, without distinction of creed, took an active interest in the ceremony and the press devoted to it a good deal of space and several articles.

The funds necessary for the construction of the synagogue have already been secured. In addition to the synagogue, the building will include a school house and a large meeting hall. The plan of the building has been drafted by a Jewish architect, S. Roder. The original draft of the plan was exhibited in Paris where it was awarded a prize. Several other Jewish communities in Brazil in which the Jewish Colonization Association is interested are endeavoring to follow the example of the community in Sao Paulo.

**EINSTEIN'S FIELD THEORY
SUBJECT OF MANY SERMONS**

The unitary field theory, linking gravitation with electromagnetism, the latest contribution to science of Prof. Albert Einstein, was the subject of sermons in several New York Christian churches on Sunday.

While a recent editorial in a Jewish daily newspaper ascribed the theory to the monotheistic Jewish conception of God, the Rev. Henry Howard, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church, Dr. Charles Francis Potter of the Church of the Divine Paternity, Dr. Karl Reiland of St. George's Episcopal Church and Louis J. Louis, founder and leader of the Christian Science Liberals, interpreting Einstein's theory as science approaching mysticism, referred to the theory as supporting their religious conceptions.

**PUBLISH SIR JOHN RUSSELL'S
REPORT ON PALESTINE SOIL**

London, Jan. 16.—The report made by Sir John Russell, F.R.S., Director of the Rothamstead Experimental Station, on his visit to Palestine in April, 1928, has just been published here by the Zionist Organization, with the authority of the Empire Marketing Board. Sir John's report on his previous visit to Palestine in April, 1927, was published in that year by the Zionist Organization under the title "Palestine and the Empire Marketing Board."

"The purpose of this visit," Sir John writes, "was to ascertain what soil investigations would be necessary in connection with the calf-rearing experiments to insure the economical production of fodder crops essential for a stable dairy or livestock industry in Palestine. Further, I endeavored to form some opinion as to the extent to which fodder crops would be important in the scheme of Palestine husbandry in view of the great extension now taking place in the cultivation of fruit, and especially citrus fruit. This second visit has confirmed me in the opinion I gained last year that wherever the conditions are suitable, the best line of development for the Jewish colonists will probably be fruit products and vegetables of special quality or earliness, distinctively marketed, since this gives the colonists the high prices necessary to maintain the close settlements at which they are aiming, besides furnishing scope for their power of organized buying and selling."

"The Jewish organizations," Sir John concludes, "that have fostered the colonization in Palestine can congratulate themselves on having re-established their people on the plains and valleys of Palestine. As the result of their efforts, the land has been reclaimed and improved and methods have been devised and are constantly being improved for cultivating it to the best advantage. All this has been done with the minimum of suffering to the colonists and their children, and in consequence a race of young people is springing up inspired by the high purpose of making a Hebrew nation that shall be free from the ills of the lands from where they came."

LABOR GROUPS LAUNCH FIVE-YEAR PROGRAM TO AID DECEASED JEWS IN RUSSIA

\$200,000 to Be Raised Annually for Supplying Tools and Raw Materials; J. D. C. Leaders Support Appeal

A \$1,000,000 national campaign to extend over a period of five-years will be undertaken by the labor groups in the United States, to buy tools and raw materials to aid the 1,000,000 deceased Jews in Soviet Russia.

A call to all labor groups and Landsmanschaften in the United States to participate in the work will be issued under the signatures of the Arbeiter Ring, the United Hebrew Trades, the "Jewish Daily Forward," the Jewish Socialist Verband, the National Jewish Workers Alliance and the Poale Zion. The money, which will be raised in annual quotas of \$200,000, will be administered by both the Ort and the Agro-Joint. The campaign is to be known as the "People's Tool Campaign for the Relief of Jews in Russia."

This action was decided upon at a special relief conference held all day Sunday at Beethoven Hall and attended by 542 delegates, representing 297 labor organizations. The organization of the campaign was placed in the hands of an executive committee of 70 of which B. C. Vladeck, manager of the "Jewish Daily Forward" was named chairman and J. Baskin, treasurer.

Distinguished leaders in American Jewry, active in the work of the Joint Distribution Committee, the Ort and the Agro-Joint, attended the sessions and described in detail the plight of the million Jews in the cities and towns in Soviet Russia, without sustenance and without hope for betterment of their condition unless American Jews place at their disposal the means for becoming a producing element. Eloquent pleas to the labor groups to undertake an extensive program of rehabilitative relief were made by Louis Marshall, president of the American Jewish Committee, Felix M. Warburg, president of the Joint Distribution Committee, James V. Rosenberg, head of the Agro-Joint, Judge Jacob Panken, president of the Ort, Dr. David Lvovitch, European representative of the Ort, Dr. Chaim Zhitlovsky, B. Chanan, B. C. Vladeck, Peter Wiernik, editor of the "Jewish Morning Journal," Dr. Henry Moskowitz, and B. C. Vladeck, who presided over the conference.

The tragedy of the town Jews in Soviet Russia was described by Mr. Warburg from personal observation during the course of his visit to that country. One million Jews, he said, for the most part artisans and small tradesmen, are faced with the direst economic want as well as civil and social strictures because they have no means of becoming a producing element. Deprived of their civil rights, refused the benefits of social welfare agencies maintained by the government, because they are not workers, they are virtually decimated. The one hope remains in supplying them with tools and materials which will enable them to develop home industries. Small machines are the urgent requirement. By making these people self-

respecting and self-supporting, American Jews will be enabling them to take their place in the life of the country.

The Jews of Russia are not looking for charity, he declared. They want to repay and will repay. Those who give should bear this in mind. The work of industrialization, he pointed out, is favored by the Soviet Government, which is making every effort to cooperate. He called upon the labor groups to help relieve the unmitigated dreariness of life in Russia by the sunshine of hope.

Mr. Marshall, in his address, made a spirited plea to the labor groups to take the initiative in placing means of economic independence in the hands of the Russian town Jew. "Raise a fund," he urged, "but don't spend it yourselves. Turn it over to the Joint Distribution

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EMANU-EL DEDICATES 26-ROOM SCHOOL BUILDING

The new school building erected by Congregation Emanu-El, New York City, with 26 rooms and accommodations for 625 pupils, was dedicated on Sunday when over 1,000 parents and children attended the ceremonies. Louis Marshall, president of the congregation, presided. Dr. Nathan Krass delivered the opening prayer. Samuel M. Newburger, chairman of the religious school committee, spoke for the committee. A hymn composed for the occasion by Dr. H. G. Enelow, was sung by the student body.

In his address Mr. Marshall said: "This school will serve to perpetuate the spirit of our ancient people for centuries to come. For fifty centuries we have had a marvelous history. Let us hope that for centuries to come our children will meet here to carry on that spirit. Your heritage will be handed on by you and by succeeding generations. The school should prove a real sanctuary to the children as well as the elders of the congregation. I hope that here you will find inspiration that will make you proud to be a Jew, for it is here that you will be able to form the map of your life."

Twenty-seven teachers are on the staff of the school. During week days it will be occupied by the Hebrew Union College School for Teachers. The auditorium accommodates 800 persons.

The Jewish Community Center of Jersey City, a \$600,000 structure containing a gymnasium, swimming pool, clubrooms and an auditorium seating 1,200 persons, situated at Belmont and Bergen Avenues, Jersey City, was formally dedicated Sunday.

Rabbi Charles Block, of Jersey City, Dr. B. S. Pollak, Harry Goldowsky, chairman of the center, and Mrs. H. B. Levine, representing the women of the center, addressed the gathering. Arthur Pottoner, Jersey City Commissioner, welcomed the new structure to the city.

World Federation of Jewish Artisans Planned

Berlin, Jan. 18—The creation of a World Federation of Jewish Artisans is proposed by the Central Federation of Jewish Artisans in Germany. In a statement it has issued on the subject, the Federation declares:

The economic position of the Jews has in the last decade undergone a very big change in respect to their occupational structure. The course of economic development, the organization of cooperative, etc., are resulting, in practically all countries, in the Jews being pushed out of the economic positions which they have previously held in banking, trading and transport. Large sections of the Jewish middle class are fighting hard for their existence, and are in danger of being proletarianized. However deplorable these appearances are, it must not, however, be overlooked that they bear within them the seeds of economic sanitation. With the realization of the extent to which the Jew is being pushed out of economic life and becoming decimated, comes the recognition that salvation from economic ruin can come about only along the road of productive work. The efforts at agricultural colonization in Russia, and the extensive work of the O. R. T. in Poland and Roumania, are important signs of this recognition.

More powerful and more significant than the transference of Jews to agriculture is the fact that in Central and Western Europe the Jewish youth is seeking in growing numbers to enter artisanship. It is no exaggeration to say that it is already established that artisanship among the Jews will in the coming years mature to an important stage of development. The Jewish artisans who have hitherto held high the idea of productive Jewish work are everywhere found in the van of those who are working actively to promote the productivization of the Jewish population. The position of the Jewish artisans themselves is not yet sufficiently firmly established. They are fighting for their existence, and generally they are in a much worse position than their non-Jewish colleagues in the same profession, because they also have to suffer from the process under which Jewish workers are everywhere being ejected from their economic positions. Non-Jewish contractors rarely employ them, and they are very seldom able to get State or Municipal contracts. The Jewish artisans have long since recognized that for them, too, the only way is along the road of organization, the unification of all their forces in order to assure their existence.

The idea of the organization of Jewish artisanship has in recent years found many friends. In practically all the countries of Jewish settlement in Eastern or Central Europe, powerful Jewish artisanship organizations have been formed. The powerful Jewish ar-

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Committee or Org. or both, as you wish. Lend yourselves to the great work of human reconstruction. You are Jews who are merciful. We are all of the same stock. The Jews of Russia have the same right to live as you have. You have got to help them. The work of reconstruction should not be left entirely to those who are called capitalists. You are all capitalists in strong arms, opportunity, intelligence. You have humanity. I trust Jews to do the right thing when they know what is needed."

There is every reason to believe, Mr. Rosenberg said, that every dollar sent by American Jews to Russia will be doubled by help from the Soviet Government. A message endorsing the projected campaign was received from Lieutenant Governor of New York, Herbert H. Lehman.

According to an agreement entered into with the Soviet Government, the Org. is enabled to bring into Russia machinery and tools duty free, it was stated by the Org. representatives at the conference. The Org. is now in the process of launching a nationwide \$1,000,000 appeal to Americans who have relatives in Russia to extend their aid in the form of tools and machines. The resolution adopted by the conference Sunday adds its voice to this appeal and points out further that, according to the agreement with the Soviet Government, twenty-five per cent of the total number of tools and machines imported must be allotted to those who have no relatives in the United States.

NEW ANTI-JEWISH CONTRA- REVOLUTION CASE IN RUSSIA

Moscow, Jan. 20.—Immediately after the close of the Barshay trial, the Soviet Press and public opinion were taken up with a new anti-Semitic counter-revolutionary affair, which is stated to have important political implications. Revelations are reported to have been made which show that the Dobrovoushka paper factory, which formerly belonged to Prince Paskievitch, has been used as a nest of anti-Semitic propaganda. Three ex-monks have been arrested. The most consisted of gendarmes, ex-politicians, ex-priests, and ex-monks. Meetings used to be held, at which methods of strengthening anti-Semitism were discussed. It has been established that the group distributed large quantities of anti-Semitic leaflets and proclamations.

A special commission which has been investigating the affair has closed down the local Communist Bureau, the Party and also the trade union organ and the factory guild. Nine members of the Communist Party have been expelled and fifteen have been censured. The affair has roused immense interest in the Soviet Press and throughout the country.

isan movement has arisen out of the idea of self-help. The common need and the common suffering of the Jewish artisans in the various countries make it seem necessary that the various Jewish artisan organizations should be concentrated into a World Federation of Jewish Artisanship.

The objects of such a Federation would be: (1) Concentration of all Jewish artisan organizations into a World Federation of Jewish Artisans; (2) representation of the Jewish artisans in all the Jewish organizations and general trade federations, especially those which are engaged in an activity to promote the production of the Jews; (3) creation and extension of credit institutions and co-operatives for Jewish artisans; (4) in various countries through the establishment of credit co-operatives; (5) through the concentration of the various cooperative credit institutions of Jewish artisanship into a big central bank for the purpose of centralized regulation of the credit aid activity of the individual cooperative banks; (6) unified, and therefore cheaper, purchase of machinery and raw materials, and possibly the taking over of the finished articles for the purpose of export; (7) the creation of technical organizations for the purpose of exchanging technical experiences and improving the methods of work; (8) the creation of an advisory office to give economic and technical advice in artisanship; (9) promotion of the work of training apprentices, the study of the economic position of the various branches of handicraft with a view to introducing the Jewish youth into those branches which offer the best prospects; (10) the organization of conferences of Jewish artisans for the purpose of exchanging views and experiences, and the setting up of organizations to establish friendly relations between the artisans of various countries, the statement concludes.

The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, and its affiliated organizations, The Rabbinical Council, The Women's Branch, The Religious Branch and the Education, the Amer-Scholastic League of the Jewish Youth, will hold their national convention on March 16, 17 and 18, in New York. Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, President of the Union, announced. The sessions will be held at the new Yeshiva College Building, Amsterdam Avenue and 136th Street, New York City.

Application for a permit to build a synagogue to be known as the Beth-El Synagogue of Waverbury, Conn., has been filed with the Building Inspector and plans submitted for his approval. The building is expected to cost about \$100,000.

This is the structure for which a \$150,000 drive was conducted several months ago by the Beth-El congregation. The remaining amount, over the cost of the building, was needed for the purchase of the land and furniture to be used in the edifice.

The plans call for a one-story brick structure of large proportions. In the basement will be an assembly room. The first floor will hold the synagogue proper and this will be flanked by a small synagogue.

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
