

POLISH VILLAGE ELECTS JEW SHERIFF; AUTHORITIES BAR HIM ON BASIS CZARISTIC LAW

Jewish Deputies Introduce Interpellation in Parliament, Demand Explanation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Feb. 9.—Solomon Horowitz, resident of the village Siennica in the district of Minsk-Mazowiecki, was elected sheriff of the village on January 25, but was barred from taking office by a decision of the District Governor.

The District Governor refused to confirm Horowitz's election on the basis of an old Czaristic law, according to which Jews are barred from the offices of sheriff or judge in such villages or counties where the population is not entirely Jewish.

The matter has aroused nation-wide attention in view of the persistence of the Club of Jewish Deputies for a number of years for the final abolition of the Czaristic anti-Jewish limitations in the Republic of Poland. Taking this case as further proof of the existence of the Czaristic laws against Jews, the Club of Jewish Deputies introduced an interpellation into parliament today asking the central authorities to overrule the objection of the District Governor as the application of the Czaristic law is contrary to the provisions of the Polish Constitution and to the provisions of the Versailles peace treaty.

The interpellation also points out that the government has repeatedly made assurances in parliament that the Czaristic restrictions against Jews are no longer in existence in the Republic.

Full details concerning the character and number of legal disabilities under which the Jews of Poland still suffer by the application of the old Czaristic laws, as enumerated in a recent interpellation of the Club of Jewish Deputies introduced into parliament, will be published in the issue of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin" of Wednesday morning.

FUCHS, MOSCOW KEHILLAH PRESIDENT, IS ARRESTED

Moscow, Feb. 9.—Albert Fuchs, president of the Moscow Kehillah, was arrested by the Soviet authorities yesterday. His arrest occurred with that of other officials of the "Trud-credit," the largest Jewish artisans co-operative in Soviet Russia. They were charged with mismanagement. His arrest was not in connection with social activities.

CONSTITUTION OF JEWISH AGENCY AS DRAFTED BY ZIONIST EXECUTIVE MADE PUBLIC

Document Deals With Three Agency Organs to Be Created, Council, Standing Committee and Executive; Distribution of 100 Non-Zionist Seats Specified; Keren Hayesod to Be Under Agency Control, While National Fund to Remain Independent; Draft Considered at Berlin Session of Zionist General Council, But Decision Not Announced.

The draft of a constitution for the enlarged Jewish Agency, submitted by the Zionist Executive to the Zionist General Council when it met in Berlin last December, was published in the February issue of "The Vanguard," a New York Jewish monthly published in English under the editorship of Isaac Zaar. The journal is considered the organ of the Zionist labor groups in the United States.

The document, which was the subject of discussion at the Berlin session of the Zionist General Council, has not previously been made public, nor was there any announcement made as to the decision taken by the General Council with regard to the draft. The contents of this draft were, however, the subject of wide conjecture and discussion in the Palestinian and Zionist press.

When interviewed by the representative of the "Jewish Daily Bulletin," the editor of "The Vanguard" stated that the text published is the authentic English version submitted by the Executive. The draft reads in full as follows:

The Constitution of the enlarged Agency must necessarily form the subject of negotiations between the Zionist Organization and the "non-Zionists." It will be incumbent upon the Executive to do their best to give effect to the instructions of the General Council, and the accompanying memorandum sets forth their views as to what these instructions should be. It will, however, be realized that, in view of the variety and complexity of the technical questions involved, it will be necessary for the General Council, having indicated the lines on which it desires the negotiations to be conducted, to leave it to the Executive to secure the best results obtainable in the light of the exchange of views which will follow between the Zionist Organization and representatives of the "non-Zionist" groups.

It will be observed that certain of the recommendations of the Executive deal with questions which, though arising out of the reconstitution of the Agency, concern the Zionist Organization, as distinct from the enlarged Jewish Agency. A case in point is that of the recommendation in which the Zionist members of the Council of the Agency are to be appointed. This and other matters of internal Zionist policy are not within the scope of the Constitution of the Agency, but they are, nevertheless, relevant and important enough to make it desirable to sub-

mit proposals with regard to them. In the accompanying memorandum the recommendations in question are distinguished by an asterisk.

1. Organs of the Agency

The Organs of the Jewish Agency for Palestine shall be: (a) The Council; (b) The Standing Committee; (c) The Executive.

2. The Council

i) The supreme governing body of the Jewish Agency shall be the Council, which shall be the final authority in all matters within the scope of the Agency.

ii) The Council shall meet biennially. Arrangements shall be made by which the Council of the Agency and the Zionist Congress shall meet in the same place and the meeting of the Council shall immediately follow the close of the Congress. An emergency meeting of the Council may be convened either by the Standing Committee or by the Executive, should special circumstances at any time necessitate this.

(iii) The Council when complete,

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COMZET TO SETTLE 38,500 JEWISH FAMILIES IN NEXT FIVE YEARS IN VARIOUS PARTS OF RUSSIA

Settlement to Take Place in Crimea, Ukraine, White Russia, Uzbekistan, Dagestan, Aiserbedjan

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Feb. 9.—A five year program for settling Jews on the land was adopted at the last session of the Executive Committee of the Comzet, the central government commission dealing with the problem of Jewish colonization work.

Under the program 38,500 Jewish families are to be settled on the land in various parts of Russia. The distribution of the families would be as follows: 12,000 families in Bira-Bidan; 15,000 in Crimea; 4,000 in Ukraine; 5,000 in White Russia; 2,500 in Uzbekistan, Dagestan and Aiserbedjan.

An additional 2,500 families are to be settled in suburban districts of White Russia, Ukraine and Russia proper. Concerning the White Russian swamps, the Comzet decided to leave the amelioration work to the White Russian government, thus avoiding what was feared to be a duplication of work. A large portion of the ameliorated swamp land would be used for Jewish settlement work by agreement with the White Russian government.

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PENDING BILL TO GIVE JEWS REPRESENTATION ON SCOTCH GOVERNMENT COUNCILS

Applies to Seats Allotted for Religious
Representatives

London, Feb. 9.—Lord Advocate for
Scotland Watson declared in reply to
a question that Jewish religious rep-
resentatives would be eligible for appoint-
ment on the local government councils
in the seats allotted for religious rep-
resentatives under the Local Govern-
ment for Scotland Bill now pending.

With regard to the government's
proposal for the appointment of local
government councils, which should al-
so include at least two persons inter-
ested in the promotion of religious in-
struction, to be recommended by a con-
ference of representative churches or
denomination bodies within the area
concerned, the question was raised as
to whether Jews will be entitled to rep-
resentation. Lord Advocate Watson re-
plied in the affirmative.

JEWISH COMMITTEE ON SCOUTING TO MEET FEB. 21

The first annual meeting of the Gen-
eral Committee of the Jewish Commit-
tee on Scouting, of which Dr. Cyrus
Adler is the National Chairman, will be
held on Thursday, February 21st at
4:30 p. m., in the Leo Sulzberger Me-
morial Room of the Federation Build-
ing, New York City. It will be pre-
ceded by a meeting of the Executive
Council.

A number of matters affecting na-
tional policies will be discussed. Dr.
Adler will give a resume of the de-
velopment of the Committee's activities,
with special reference to problems
which have been presented to the Com-
mittee for consideration by Jewish com-
munities throughout the United States.

SECOND INTERNATIONAL TO CONSIDER FATE OF RUSSIAN POLITICAL PRISONERS

Fate of Imprisoned Zionists May Also
Be Discussed

London, Feb. 9.—The fate of the sev-
eral hundred Zionists who are held
prisoners by the Soviet authorities may
be a feature in the discussion on the
political prisoners in Russia which was
placed on the agenda of the Executive
Committee of the Second Labor Inter-
national.

The Executive Committee is meeting
this week-end in London under the
chairmanship of Ramsay MacDonald,
former Labor Prime Minister.

Several Jewish Socialist leaders are
among those attending the session. They
are Jarblum, a member of the
Poale Zion, Otto Bauer of Austria,
Modigliani of Italy and Naphtali of
Germany. The last three are members
of the Executive Committee.

ROUMANIAN JEWS IN CHICAGO CELEBRATE POLITICAL CHANGE

Chicago, Feb. 10.—A mass meeting
was held here this afternoon at the
First Roumanian Congregation under
the auspices of the United Roumanian
Jews of America, Chicago branch, to
celebrate the change that has taken
place in the political life of Roumania.
Among the speakers were Judge Harry
Fisher and George Boncescu, Financial
Councillor of the Roumanian Legation
in Washington.

In his address M. Boncescu stated:
"Your thoughtful idea of holding a
special public meeting as a manifesta-
tion of friendship and sympathy for
Mr. Iuliu Maniu and his Government
will, I am sure, produce a deep impres-
sion in official and private circles in
Roumania, and will go a long way to-
wards making the friendship between
America and Roumania an everlasting
structure."

"When I look back about a year or
so and recollect the unfavorable light
in which Roumania was regarded in
this country as a result of the unfor-
tunate occurrences in Transylvania, it
affords me great satisfaction to see that
in this short space of time the situa-
tion has altered to such an extent that
you have thought it advisable to gather
here for the purpose of giving praise
where praise is due."

The United Roumanian Jews of
America in New York tendered a din-
ner to Jacob Rosenthal, newly appoint-
ed Technical Attache to the Roumanian
Legation at Washington at the Hotel
McAlpin last night.

Prince M. R. Sturza and Andre Po-
povici of the Roumanian Legation and
Dr. T. T. T. Wells, Consul General
of Roumania in New York, were pres-
ent. Herman Speier acted as toast-
master.

The Chicago Loop Orthodox synagogue, the

SOVIET PRESS CONTINUES CAMPAIGN AGAINST ANTI- SEMITISM IN RUSSIA

Makes Further Disclosures of Prac-
tices Among Intellectuals

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Leningrad, Feb. 9.—Sensational
charges against Dr. Serednevsky, direc-
tor of the Tchudnovsky Hospital here,
and a member of the Krassin expedi-
tion to rescue the airship Italia, are
made in the Leningrad paper, "Kras-
naya Gazeta." The charge brought
against Dr. Serednevsky is that he
conducted systematic persecution of
Jewish doctors at his institution, com-
pelling several to resign, including the
noted specialist Charshonovsky, who
has a record of many years achieve-
ments.

Dr. Serednevsky was aided by a
group of non-Jewish doctors and nurses
in the hospital. He also spread derog-
atory reports with regard to the Kras-
sin expedition, the paper declares, de-
manding an investigation.

Reports of widespread anti-Semi-
tism among the professors of the Kiev
colleges are carried by the Tass. Soviet
telegraphic news service. The reports
state that Professors Gayevsky,
Popov and Radchenko are particularly
active. Recently Professor Yeselovsky
was discharged because of anti-Jewish
and anti-Soviet propaganda he spread.
The others still hold their professor-
ships at the colleges.

PHILADELPHIA FEDERATION REACHES \$1,750,000 GOAL

Phila., Feb. 9.—The drive for the
annual maintenance fund of the Fed-
eration of Jewish Charities, \$1,750,000
this year, was concluded with a dinner
to the 1,200 members of the various
teams in the Benjamin Franklin Hotel.
Subscriptions and pledges, it was an-
nounced at the beginning of the dinner,
totaled \$1,575,693. The final goal was
achieved, when, after speeches by Jus-
tice P. Allman, chairman of the cam-
paign committee, Jacob Billikopf, ex-
ecutive director of the Federation, and
Joseph J. Greenberg, additional pledges
were forthcoming, team captains prom-
ised to raise additional quotas and the
executive committee underwrote the
balance of \$50,000.

ISSUE APPEAL FOR AID FOR BESSARABIAN JEWS

was called for February 11 to consider
measures to be taken immediately.

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shall have a membership of 200. The membership of the Council at any given time shall be divided equally between representatives of the Zionist Organization and of the "non-Zionists."

(iv) The members of the Zionist Executive and the members of the General Council (both of which bodies shall continue to be directly elected by the Zionist Congress), shall be ex-officio members of the Zionist section of the Council of the Agency. Any vacancies still remaining, up to a maximum of ten, shall be filled by the Congress from a list of nominees to be furnished by the incoming Executive. Any further vacancies shall be filled by persons to be directly elected by the Congress in such manner as it may think fit.

(v) The membership of the "non-Zionist" section of the Council shall be distributed in accordance with the following table, which has been compiled on the principles explained in Part II of this memorandum:

Proposed Distribution of One Hundred "Non-Zionist" Seats on Agency Council

U. S. A.; 40; Poland; 12; Great Britain; 6; Canada; 1; South Africa; 1; Palestine; 2; Germany; 5; Roumania; 5; Austria; 2; Czechoslovakia; 2; France; 2; Belgium; 1; Holland; 1; Italy; 1; Lithuania; 1; 17 other countries or groups of countries; 17.

(vi) The provisional allotment of seats on the "non-Zionist" section of the Council shall be brought before the Council for confirmation at its first meeting, and the allotment shall, at any time thereafter, be open to revision by the Council.

(vii) The Council shall not be convened until the Zionist Organization shall have been notified of the appointment of not less than six "non-Zionist" delegates, with a total membership of not less than sixty-five.

(viii) While the minimum number of countries to be represented on the "non-Zionist" section of the Council is fixed at six, every effort shall be made to ensure that the first meeting of the Council shall contain representatives of as large a number of communities as possible.

1. The Standing Committee

(i) The Standing Committee shall be a body intermediate between the Council and the Executive of the Agency, and occupying a place in the Agency analogous to that occupied by the General Council in the Zionist Organization.

(ii) The Standing Committee shall meet not less than twice a year. The Chairman of the Standing Committee, in consultation with the President of the Agency, shall be empowered to convene an emergency meeting of the Committee at any time, should special circumstances necessitate this.

(iii) The Standing Committee shall have a membership of forty, divided equally between representatives of the

Zionist Organization and of the "non-Zionists." In addition, the members of the Executive of the Agency shall be ex-officio members of the Standing Committee.

(iv) The Zionist members of the Standing Committee (apart from the Executive) shall be appointed by the Zionist members of the Council of the Agency from among their own number.

(v) The "non-Zionist" members of the Standing Committee shall similarly be appointed by the "non-Zionist" members of the Council of the Agency from among their own number.

4. The Executive

(i) The Executive shall be the body conducting the day-to-day business of the Agency, and shall occupy a place in the Agency analogous to the place occupied by the Zionist Executive in the Zionist Organization.

(ii) The Executive shall be divided into a Palestinian section, with its seat in Jerusalem, and an extra-Palestinian section, with its seat in London.

(iii) Subject to the proviso that the seat of the Political Department of the Agency shall be in London, the distribution of functions between Jerusalem and London shall be decided by agreement between the Palestinian and extra-Palestinian sections of the Executive, subject to reference to the Standing Committee, or—in case of need—to the Council of the Agency; in case of any irreconcilable difference of opinion. Any matter concerning both sections of the Executive shall be disposed of by consultation between them subject, in the same manner, to reference to the Standing Committee, or—if necessary—to the Council, in case of any irreconcilable disagreement.

(ix) The Executive of the Agency shall ordinarily sit in Jerusalem or in London as the case may be, but it shall be empowered, in special circumstances, to meet in any other place which it may think convenient.

(v) The membership both of the Palestinian and the extra-Palestinian sections of the Executive shall be equally divided between representatives of the Zionist Organization and of the "non-Zionists."

(vi) The Zionist Executive shall form the Zionist section of the Executive of the Agency.

(vii) The "non-Zionist" members of the Executive of the Agency shall be elected biennially by the "non-Zionist" section of the Council of the Agency, the "non-Zionist" section of the Standing Committee having power to fill casual vacancies.

(viii) The Executive of the Agency may include members not permanently resident either in Jerusalem or in London, provided that no meeting of the Executive shall be held without the personal presence of a specified number of members to be fixed by the Constitution.

(ix) The Palestinian section of the Executive shall consist of eight per-

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BILL IN OHIO LEGISLATURE FOR COMPULSORY BIBLE READING IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Measure Said to Have Klan Support; Similar Bill Vetted by Former Governor

Cleveland, Feb. 9.—A bill aiming to make it compulsory for the teachers in the public schools in the State of Ohio to read ten verses of the Bible daily without comment was introduced into the legislature by Representative Lloyd Weaver of Summit County.

The bill is said to be backed by the Ku Klux Klan and follows closely the Buchanan Bible bill which was passed in 1925 by both branches of the legislature but vetoed by former Governor Donahay.

Those in favor of the new measure are confident of its passage because the present governor, Myers N. Cooper, has been the president of the Ohio Council of Churches for some time. Legislators opposing the bill declare that Governor Cooper is opposed to the policy and that he has so expressed himself.

Determined opposition is expected to come from the members of the Cuyahoga delegation both to the Weaver bill and to a newly introduced Senate bill which bars all who are not citizens from obtaining employment by the state.

The new Bible bill would force teachers under penalty of dismissal to read the Bible in the schools.

DELEGATES ARRIVE FOR UNION CONVENTION OPENING TODAY

San Francisco, Cal. Feb. 9.—Two special trains of twenty-four cars rolled into San Francisco late yesterday afternoon bringing 500 delegates to the convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. They were greeted by a delegation of leaders of local Jewry, headed by Rabbi Louis I. Newman and Rabbi Jacob Nieto of the local Reform congregations.

Special services were held in the synagogues last night and this morning with visiting rabbis in the pulpits. Registration of delegates and meetings of committees will start on Sunday. The Hotel St. Francis is the headquarters for the delegates. The sessions of the convention will be held at Temple Emanu-El.

BARON DE ROTHSCHILD TO MARK PASSOVER IN PALESTINE

Jerusalem, Feb. 9.—Baron Edmund de Rothschild, the father of the old Jewish colonies, is expected to come to Jerusalem for the Passover holidays, according to word received here. He will be accompanied by his son, James.

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sons, and the extra-Palestinian section of ten persons, the membership in each case being equally divided between representatives of the Zionist Organization and of the "non-Zionists."

(x) The whole Executive, including both Zionist and "non-Zionist" members, will be collectively responsible to the Council of the Agency, or to the Standing Committee, as the case may be, but the power of expressing disapproval by a change of personnel will rest with the Zionist Organization in the case of the Zionist members of the Executive, and with the "non-Zionist" section of the Council in the case of the "non-Zionist" members of the Executive.

(xi) The administrative expenses of the Agency, both in Jerusalem and in London, shall be defrayed from Agency funds, provided, however that the remuneration of salaried members of the Executive shall be wholly or partly defrayed, in the case of Zionist members by the Zionist Organization, and in the case of the "non-Zionist" members, by the "non-Zionists."

(xii) The Central Office of the Zionist Organization in London shall continue to be maintained, under the direction of a member or members of the Zionist Executive, for the purpose of dealing with work of a distinctively Zionist character, which will not come within the scope of the Agency, as, for example, organization, cultural work, and Zionist propaganda. The Central Office of the Zionist Organization shall be kept distinct from the London Office of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, and its administrative expenses shall be defrayed from Zionist funds.

5. Methods of Voting

(i) A member of either the Zionist or the "non-Zionist" section of the Council or of the Standing Committee of the Agency, if unable to be personally present at a meeting, shall be entitled either

A) to authorize one of his colleagues to vote on his behalf, or

B) to be represented by a deputy; and a member of either the Zionist or the "non-Zionist" section of the Executive of the Agency shall be entitled to authorize one of his colleagues to vote on his behalf, provided that

1) The right of voting by proxy as under (A) above shall be subject to the limitation that no member of the Council or of the Standing Committee shall be entitled to cast more than four votes in all, including his own.

2) The right of representation by a deputy, as under (B) above, shall be limited as follows:

(a) The deputy must be selected from a list of deputies approved by the same body by which the absent member was himself appointed.

(b) The rule limiting the number of votes which may be cast by any one person shall apply to deputy-members as well as to members.

6. The Keren Hayesod

(i) The whole of the proceeds of the

Keren Hayesod shall be placed at the disposal of the Agency.

(ii) The formal constitution of the Keren Hayesod shall not be changed, but the control of the enlarged Agency shall be secured by an agreement by which the Zionist Executive will bind themselves to nominate as the Directors of the Keren Hayesod such persons as may be selected by the Executive of the Jewish Agency, the Zionist and "non-Zionist" sections of the Executive voting together.

(iii) The Directors of the Keren Hayesod need not necessarily be identical with the members of the Executive of the Agency, but at least one of the Palestine members of the Executive of the Agency shall be given a seat on the Board of the Keren Hayesod.

(iv) The organization and activities of the Keren Hayesod in individual countries shall not be dealt with in the Constitution of the Agency, but shall be left to be settled in each case in accordance with local conditions.

7. The Keren Kayemeth LeYisroel

(i) The Keren Kayemeth shall remain a Zionist institution and shall not be under the control of the Agency, except in so far as it may be entrusted with the expenditure of Agency funds, as distinct from its own separate resources, in accordance with the proposals contained in paragraph 2 of Mr. Marshall's letter of November 20, 1928, to Dr. Weizmann, the effect of these proposals being that lands thus purchased shall be held by the Keren Kayemeth as the inalienable property of the Jewish people, but that the use to be made of them shall be subject to the approval of the Agency.

(ii) The Constitution of the Agency shall provide, in accordance with Mr. Marshall's proposals, that such purchases of land as may be made from Agency funds, shall be made through the medium of the Keren Kayemeth, provided that this shall not be deemed to prevent the Agency from investing a part of its funds in any corporation established, or hereafter to be established, for the purpose of facilitating the purchase of land in Palestine by private individuals.

8. Provisorium

With reference to the resolution adopted by the Fourteenth Zionist Congress, requiring the inclusion in the Constitution of the enlarged Agency of a provision to the effect that such Constitution shall be in force, in the first instance, for a period of three years only, the Congress shall be invited to rescind this resolution, and to substitute the safeguard proposed in the memorandum annexed to Mr. Marshall's letter to Dr. Weizmann of November 20, 1928, subject to the necessary assurances as to the status of the Zionist Organization in the event of the dissolution of the enlarged Agency having first been obtained from the Mandatory Power.

9. Communication to Mandatory Power

It will be necessary for the Mandatory Power to be formally notified of the reconstitution and enlargement of the Agency, and requested to recog-

LONDON JEWS HOLD BENEFIT FOR BESSARABIAN SUFFERERS

London, Feb. 9.—A benefit performance was given at the Yiddish Theatre in London's East End to raise funds to aid the famine stricken Jews in Bessarabia. Nicholas Titulescu, Roumanian Minister to England, attended.

The Community Center was the first of the units planned by the Congregation Knesset Tifereth Israel, the other being the synagogue. The synagogue, when completed will have seating capacity of 900 in the main auditorium and 200 in the balcony.

It is expected that the \$225,000 required to build and furnish the synagogue and to complete the Jewish Center will be raised wholly from the sale of pews, it was declared.

nize the enlarged Agency as the body discharging the functions of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, as defined in Article 4 of the Mandate. This shall be done as soon as the necessary action with regard to the provisorium shall have been taken by the Zionist Congress, and the arrangements for the first meeting of the Council of the enlarged Agency shall have been completed, it being understood that it will be necessary to obtain from the Mandatory Power, in advance of the Congress, a satisfactory assurance with regard to the status of the Zionist Organization under Article 4 of the Palestine Mandate in the event of the dissolution of the enlarged Agency.

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
