Police Force Bedouins to Leave: Murderer Not Apprehended (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Ierusalem, Feb. 13-Another attack on the Hedera colonists was made yesterday by Bedouins while the colonists

were ploughing their fields.

The Bedouins were forced to leave the colony by the intervention of the police.

Jerusalem, Feb. 13-Joseph Ninevitch, a Jewish guard at the colony Rechobot, was killed Monday night. The mur-derer was not apprehended.

EPENCH GOVERNMENT

SUBMITS NOTE TO BRITAIN ON DEAD SEA CONCESSION French Note Under Consideration by Sir Austen Chamberlain (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 13-The French Ambassador yesterday submitted a further note to the British Government on the question of the Dead Sea concession. This note is now under consideration. Austen Chamberlain stated in Com-mons today in reply to a question raised by Col. Bury, who opposes the raised by Col. Bury, who opposes the granting of the concession to the Jew-ish engineer Moses Novomejsky and his associate Major_Tulloch.

The note of the French government points to the concession for the exploitation of the Dead Sea salts granted before the war by the Turkish gov-

ernment to Ottoman subjects.

A French group has acquired this concession, the note points out.

The British government informed the French government last April, in reply to a previous note, of the reasons for its inability to recognize the validity of that concession, Mr. Chamberlain stated.

ZEPPELIN PALESTINE FLIGHT (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Feb. 13—The extreme cold in
Central Europe has caused the postponement of the planned Zeppelin flight to Palestine. Dr. Hugo Eckener, captain of the Graf Zeppelin, an-nounced that he will not leave until March 26.

Pastor of N. Y. Community Church,
Envoy of Nathan Straus, Given
Reception by Tel Aviv (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Tel Aviv, Palestine, Feb. 13-The Christian and the Moslem communities of Palestine were urged to lend their best cooperation to the efforts of the Jewish people in the rebuilding of the Holy Land, by Rev. John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the New York Community Church, who was the guest of honor at a reception given to him Tuesday evening by the municipality of Tel Aviv, the first all-Jewish city in Palestine.

The reception was held at the Tel Aviv city hall in the presence of representatives of all Christian churches in Palestine, the municipal of Jaffa and of numerous Jewish organiza-tions. M. Dizengoff, Mayor of Tel Aviv, welcomed Rev. Holmes as a striking American personality and as a striking American personality and as a minister of God. It was natural, the Mayor declared, for Nathan Straus, the great American philanthropist who believes in the principle of King Solomon that the temple must be a place of worship for all peoples, to choose as his envoy Rev. Holmes, who devotes all of his time to preaching the brotherhood of man, of religions and

Rev. Holmes was also praised by Chaim Nachman Bialik, the leading poet of neo-Hebraic literature. Rev. Holmes in his recent sermon on Judaism before the Community Church displayed an understanding of Judaism which is greater than many Jews pos-sess, Mr. Bialik stated. Nathan Straus's munificence in charitable work is a symbol of Judaism. His activities are directed for the benefit not of one group but for mankind. His deeds are a living testimony to the best ideals.

"From certain points of view I as a Christian," Rev. Holmes stated in his address, "should have stood far from address, "should have stood far from the Zionist movement. Indeed, if the Jews had come to Palestine as crusaders, I would keep away. But the Jews came here not with the sword but with the plough. As Nathan Straus told me before my departure from New York, the Jewish people need the Holy Land to reach their spiritual goal.

"There were two periods in Israel's history—of Kings and of Prophets. The first period was full of bloodshed, murder and tears, like the history of the kings of all the world. Now the Jewish people intend to restore not the period of the kings but of the prophets of history," Dr. Holmes declared.

"All communities here should consider themselves happy as the possi-bility has been rendered them to work (Continued on Page 4)

ANTI-SEMITIC PROPAGANDA UNPUNISHED IN PRUSSIA. SOCIALIST DEPUTY'S PLAINT

Minister of Justice Schmidt Admits Truth of Charges (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Feb. 13-Inciting anti-Semitic propaganda is being carried on in cer-tain localities in Prussia without the authorities taking any action against those guilty. This charge was made in the Prussian Diet by the Socialist deputy, Kuttner.

The Breslau district attorney de-clined to prosecute members of the Hakenkreuzler organization who open-ly incited their followers to "hang the Jews." The Right parties, he stated, busy themselves with spreading the legend that Rudolf Haas, the Jewish merchant of Magdeburg who was acmerchant of Magueous Who was acquitted by the court, is guilty of the murder of his bookkeeper, Helling.

When pressed for an answer, Minister of Justice Schmidt admitted that

in many instances the courts as well in many instances the courts as well as the administration of justice fail. There can be no doubt as to the innocence of Rudolf Haas, he added.

SOCIALIST INTERNATIONAL URGES LEAGUE TO FORM PER-MANENT MINORITIES BODY Lays Emphasis on Protecting Non-Territorial Minorities Such as Jewish (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 13—The Council of the League of Nations which at its March 4th session will consider the national minorities problem was urged by the Executive Committee of the Socialist International in session here to create a permanent organ for dealing with the minorities' problems.

The resolution also lays emphasis on the need of protecting the rights of the non-territorial minorities, such as the Jewish. These minorities, the resolution states, need protection to secure equal rights and the freedom to use their own language in their schools and for the preservation of their culture. Concentrated minorities in certain areas should be guaranteed democratic self-government.

KOHN, LODZ TEXTILE KING, TO LEAVE FOR PALESTINE

Lodz, Feb. 13-Oscar Kohn, Lodz textile king, whose son, Albert, was killed last week by a Polish worker, will leave shortly for Palestine.

It was declared here that Mr. Kohn will study the possibilities of opening a plant in Palestine.

GIVES \$250,000 FOR LONDON MATERNITY HOSPITAL (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Feb. 13-A gift of £50,000 was made by Albert Levy of London for rebuilding the London Maternity Hospital. Mr. Levy gave a like amount to the hospital last year.

EUROPEAN B'NAI B'RITH LEADERS HOLD CON-FERENCE IN PRAGUE

Plan Expansion of Fraternal Order's Activities (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

Prague, Feb. 13-An informal con-ference of the leaders of Independent Order B'nai Br'rith lodges in central and east European countries was just program for expansion and cooperation.

The district lodges were requested to name all new Kraus lodges which will be formed this year in memory of Adolf Kraus, the late president of the

Order. The conference appointed a commit-

tee on cooperation between the various B'nai B'rith lodges. One of the pur-poses of the committee will be to ar-range an inter-territorial symposium on Judaism.

In Poland there are at present four I. O. B. B. lodges in which German is the language of procedure, seven lodges in which Polish is used and two re-cently established lodges in Vilna and Lublin using Yiddish.

TO ISSUE GOLDEN BOOK ON JEWISH SOLDIER DEAD (J. T. A. Mail Service)

Paris. Jan. 25-The Federation Jewish Soldiers in France has decided to issue a Golden Book containing the names of all Jewish soldiers who died fighting for France during the Great War, similar to that compiled by the Federation of Jewish Soldiers in Germany. An appeal has been issued by the Federation which says:

"The French army fortunately knows of no religious distinctions. We therefore ask the relatives of Towish soldiers who fell fighting in the French Army to supply the Federation with the necessary dates and documents."

LESSING GOOD WILL MEETING (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Kenosha, Wis., Feb. 12-Represent-atives of different faiths joined with Dr. Julius Rappaport, Rabbi of Beth Hillel Temple, in the observance of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Gotthold Ephraim Lessing, German dramatist, recognized as the first leader in the fight for religious tolerance.

Among those who participated in the service and joined in the pledge of good will and understanding antong religious beliefs were Father Charles McBride, Catholic priest; Rev. C. Clayton Browne, Baptist minister; Rev. George R. Cady, Congregationalist; Rev. C. C. Briggs, Methodist; Rev. E. H. Muelder, German Methodist mniister: Dr. William Peterson, Methodist, and Rev. Kenneth D. Martin. Episcopalian.

All paid tribute to the leadership of Rabbi Rappaport in sponsoring with his congregation a series of meetings bringing together representatives of other religious denominations.

Montreal, Feb. 11-The second annual goodwill meeting of Catholics, Jews and Protestants, which was in-stituted last year in Montreal by Rabbi Harry J. Stern of the Temple Emanu-El, was held recently in the Temple Hall.

The three principal speakers of the evening, Major George Washington Stephens, John Callaghan, K.C., and Nathan Gordon, K.C., stressed the need of international justice and tolerance and a proper understanding between Jews and Christians. Others who spoke were Rabbi Julius Berger, of the Shaare Zion Synagogue, Rev. Dr. Smyth, president of the Protestant Board of School Commissioners, Rev. T. W. Jones, rector of the United Calvary Church, I. Saxe and Harry Davis.

The West End Synagogue of New York City was host to America's Good-Will Union at its Friday night services. Justice Arthur S. DISCUSS GOD IN LIGHT OF MODERN SCIENCE (J. T. A. Mail Service)

London, Jan. 22-The effect of the cenerally accepted results of modern generally accepted results or modern psychology on the fundamental teach-ings of Christianity and Judaism were dealt with from the Christian and Jewish standpoints at a meeting of the Society of Jews and Christians held at the Liberal Jewish Synagogue.

The Rev. W. Fearon Halliday, lec-

turer in philosophy at the Selly Oak College, Birmingham, speaking from the Christian point of view, said that religion would eventually have to face religion would eventually have to lace an attack from modern psychology al-though the real object of psychology was to observe and describe mind processes and determine the validity of religion. Some psychologists looked upon religion as an illusion, a projection of a subjective Father upon the Universe. But they did not explain how much such an illusion came into being. Psychology, however, was do-ing a great service in ridding religion of servile and fear elements. The the sacred. This sense of the sacred was the origin of all religion and probably of all civilization. It had two grades, the material-sacred and the personal, or spiritual-sacred. All primitive religion felt the need for a material ground-work, but the more advanced the religion, the more abstract it became. The Hebrew prophets in-stinctively experienced this more abstract phase.

Mr. Emanuel Miller, Medical Psychologist to the West End Hospital for Nervous Diseases, discussing the question from the scientific and also the Tewish standpoint, maintained that psychology did not deal in any way with the idea of God innate in the human mind. The only contribution psychology could give to the study of religion was in connection with its his-tory of the processes of the human mind at every stage of development.

Goldsmith, executive director of the Bureau of Social Research, New York, on "Modern Jewish Contributions to So-cial Betterment."

He urged that a committee be appointed to consider a change in methods of teaching Bible history to the young, declaring that "too many fairy stories are being told to the chil-

The convention welcomed with enthusiasm the announcement made by Adolph S. Ochs, publisher of the "New York Times," chairman of the Hebrew Union College \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund, that the fund has reached a total of \$2.807.088 and that additional promises brings the sum to the \$3,000.000 mark. A resolution was adopted thanking Mr. Ochs and Henry Morgenthau for their efforts in touring the country in behalf of the Fund.

Mr. Ochs read a letter from Julius Rosenwald, announcing his gift of \$500,000 to the College, and a letter from the Guggenheim brothers announcing their \$500,000 gift. The let-ter from David, Murry, Solomon and Simon Guggenheim was published recently in the "Jewish Daily Bulletin."

Jewish Immigration to Australia Is

Stopped By Our Australian Correspondents

Melbourne, Dec. 11-As a result of the temporary restrictions imposed by the Australian administration on the issue of permits, there has been an anpreciable falling off in the number of Jews entering the Commonwealth. During October and November the total number of immigrants who came to Australia was thirty-three. Of these, nine disembarked at Perth, twelve at Melbourne, ten at Sydney and two proceeded to New Zealand.

The lull in the immigration stream has resulted in the practical absorp-tion of the large number of Jewish unemployed who have concentrated in both Melbourne and Sydney as a re-sult of the sudden influx of the last two years. Numbers of the new arrivals continue to arrive without passports of any kind. Until recently the needs of the situation were met by Jewish residents here accepting responsibility for these immigrants. Lately the authorities have tightened the regula-tions, and this week a Jewish immigrant who had arrived without his papers was refused permission to land and the shipping company was forced to return him to Port Said where he had embarked.

Melbourne, Jan. 10-The activities of the Victorian Jewish Welcome Society having practically ceased consequent upon the stopping of immigation to Victoria, the Executive of the Society has discussed at length proposals for the disbanding of the Society. It was felt that in the absence of a demand for the services of the Society the expenses for carrying on the office are unwarranted

During the period of the Society's activity, nearly two thousand immigrants have passed through its hands. It was chiefly concerned with meeting the newcomers, placing them in homes and finding them employment. Its only activity today is to conduct classes in English for the instruction of immigrants. For this purpose funds have been found by the Levinson Trustees.

5.700 Jewish Families in Australia Sydney, Jan. 15-The estimated number of Jewish families in Australia is 5,700, according to a statement issued by the State Government statistician by the State Government statistician recently, the figures being as of June 30, last. These figures represent approximately 11,700 and 25,000 persons respectively. They show an increase of 4,000 since the last census in 1921. It is calculated that approximately 2.500 of these have entered Australia during the last eighteen months. In New South Wales there are 2,600 fami-

PALESTINE ASSOCIATION FOR AFFORESTATION FORMED IN JERUSALEM To Seek \$50,000 for Palestine Tree Planting

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) Jerusalem, Feb. 13—A Palestine branch of the Men of Trees Organi-zation was formed here with H. C. Luke, Civil Secretary of the Palestine

Government, as president.

Government officials and leaders of all communities were present at the organization meeting held here with

Mr. Luke presiding Richard Barbe Baker, founder of the organization which has branches throughout the world, in his address stated that many persons in England, America and else-where are interested in the afforestation of Palestine. He is undertaking to raise £10,000 for tree planting in the country.

The vice-presidents of the newly formed association are the Grand Mufti, the Jerusalem Mayor, the Anglican bishop, the Latin Patriarch, Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University, and Col. Frederick H. Kisch of the Zionist Executive. The committee includes officials in the Palestine government, Arabs and Jews. The High Commissioner, Sir John Chancellor, is patron of the association.

together with the Jews. Mr. Straus is interested in a moral revival, in uniting all mankind. His life is a splendid example of rising. All his life he rose, up and up, and these days he has reached the summit possible for man. During scores of years, Mr. Straus achieved great philanthropic works. Now he rose sublimely and is inspired. His only aim is to see the fraternity of all peoples and religions. He sees here not only a solution of the Palestine problem, but also the fulfillment of the ideal of the cooperation of all mankind

"For generations mankind was busy with destruction. Now has come the time of peace and cooperation. It is high time to build one temple for the one superior God. If you here fail one superior God. If you here fail to solve this problem, we abroad will be unable to do anything. If you suc-ceed, a powerful voice for brotherhood will come forth.

"Palestine, is a laboratory for man-kind's unity," Dr. Holmes continued. "What is achieved in this laboratory will be spread to all the world. I see already the commencement here. Hands begin to be drawn to one another as if led by angels. The Jews and the Arabs have a common goal and from the summits of all the mountains, the sun of a new era of one God should rise. Palestine must be the Holy Land not only for the past but also for the future through mutual love and cooperation.

"In your work today and in your future work you are blessed by all mankind," he declared.

"My visit to Palestine is one of the most important moments of my life. I speak here not as the representative I speak here not as the representative of the Community Church but, as the envoy of Nathan Straus, the great man and the great spirit. I shall be happy to convey to Mr. Straus Tel Avivs greetings. While Nathan Straus is a citizen of all the world, he is a force of the Hebrews. Young blood facure of the Hebrews. Young blood flows in his veins. He regards Palestine as a symbol not only of the past but also of the future. Before leaving America I met Mr. Straus frequently. He endeavored to arouse in me a love for Palestine and Tel Aviv, but what I have found here exceeds enormously what I had imagined," Rev. Holmes said.

A cablegram of greetings on behalf of the gathering was despatched to Nathan Straus in New York.

Dr. Cronbach in his address stated that the standard of social service as enunciated in ancient Hebrew books is fully in agreement with the present Hebrew books, he stated, still vocalize the world's most cherished social ideals. Their pronouncements have a way of gripping the heart. The question as to whether poverty is ineradicable, as is declared in the book of Deuteronomy, or whether it is due to laziness, may be debated, but poverty is a bane whatever its cause.

The ancient Jewish writers urged against indiscriminate giving. They considered the imposters, gamblers and maligners and similar types a social problem like the sick. The poor laws in the Bible and Talmud can well be compared to the most modern labor legislation, strongly resembling the public welfare plan of Detroit in 1907, when the unemployed were aided on a large scale. In this regard the Judaism of the past and the finest Judaism of the present are in accord, he stated.
