

HIGH COMMISSIONER ORDERS CULTIVATION STOPPED IN ARAB-JEWISH LAND DISPUTE

Colonists Aroused at Order; Hold
Needs to Disputed Zone

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Feb. 14.—The dispute between Jewish colonists of Hedera and neighboring Bedouins called forth the intervention of the government of Palestine in an effort to stop the skirmishes which occurred daily during the past few days whenever the Jewish settlers started to plough the land.

A high police official arrived in Hedera yesterday from Jerusalem bringing an order from the High Commissioner that until the court decides the dispute between the Jews and the Bedouins over the land, all cultivation of hitherto uncultivated land shall cease. Land cultivated by the colonists before the dispute may continue to be tilled; land cultivated by the Bedouins before the dispute may be tilled by them. The disputed zone must be left alone, the High Commissioner ordered.

The government's order has met with the resentment of the Jewish colonists as they claim that they are in possession of deeds on all the land in the disputed zone, having held it for the past forty years.

A joint meeting of all Jewish representative organizations in Jerusalem was called for Thursday to consider the question.

BRITISH LEADERS LAUNCH MOVEMENT TO LINK PALESTINE PERMANENTLY WITH BRITISH EMPIRE AS ITS SEVENTH DOMINION

Conference Called for February 26 to Form League of Seventh Dominion; Seek to Unite British and Jews in Common Task for Rebuilding Palestine as National Home for Jewish People; Incorporation to Be Voluntary After League of Nations Mandate Period Expires

London, Feb. 14.—A movement for the ultimate linking of Palestine as a permanent part of the British Empire, to be constituted as the Seventh Dominion, after the twenty-five year period of the Mandate, granted to Great Britain over Palestine by the League of Nations, will have expired, was launched here today.

To work for the accomplishment of this purpose a Seventh Dominion League will be formed at a conference which was convened for February 26, under the auspices of a committee of prominent British leaders under the temporary chairmanship of Col. Josiah Wedgwood, Labor M. P. and sponsor of the idea which he enunciated recently in a book entitled "The Seventh Dominion." Cooperating with Col. Wedgwood are Sir Martin Conway, Sir Robert Hamilton, Lord Hartington, Major Hills, Dr. Drummond Shiels, Sir Leslie Scott, Lt. Com. Kenworthy. The members of the committee published in the "London Daily Telegraph" over their signature today, an appeal to British public opinion to support the movement, which has for its aim the establishment of a closer cooperation between the British and the Jews in relation to Palestine. The appeal is entitled "Control of a Vital Corridor."

Membership in the League will be open to all those who sympathize with the idea without distinction of race or creed. Branches of the League are to be created throughout the British Empire and in Palestine for the purpose of propagating the aims of the organization among the British people and the Jews of all countries.

What the attitude of the official leadership of the Zionist Organization is with regard to this proposal is not known, but the Wedgwood idea has been discussed and favorably received by the Zionist Revisionists, oppositional group within the Zionist movement.

The purpose of the League as outlined will be:

1. To promote the progress of Palestine as the National Home of the Jewish people, securing the cooperation of the British people and the British administration of Palestine.

2. This cooperation should be so directed that upon the expiration of the Mandate over Palestine, the conditions should be such as would induce inhabitants of Palestine to choose the status

of a self-governing dominion within the British Commonwealth.

3. To further friendship between the British and the Jewish peoples, based on the principles of justice, common interests and common ideals.

The functions of the League will be to strive to attain all or any of the following objects:

1. Appropriate legislative and administrative measures enabling the adequate settlement of Jews within the ancient borders to an extent sufficient for the realization of their aims.

2. That the Palestine government establish a special colonization department for the purpose of cooperating

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EXECUTIVE MAKES STATEMENT ON DR. WEIZMANN'S HEALTH

Dr. Chaim Weizmann, President of the World Zionist Organization, is suffering from the effects of prolonged and incessant strain, according to an announcement made by the World Zionist Executive, through the Zionist Organization of America. In a cable explaining the state of the Zionist leader's health, the Zionist Executive says:

"The Zionist Executive announces that Dr. Weizmann is suffering from the effects of prolonged and incessant strain.

"He has been medically ordered complete rest and abstention from public work. His condition already shows some improvement and there is every prospect of gradual recovery of strength, leading to complete restoration of health well before the meeting of the Zionist Congress in July, and probably sooner.

The cable from the Executive is in reply to a report as to the seriousness of Dr. Weizmann's condition. Dr. Weizmann is now resting at a health sanatorium in England.

UNITED JEWISH CAMPAIGN RECEIVED CLOSE TO \$14,000,000 IN CASH, BROWN ANNOUNCES

Nation-wide Pledges Total Sum of \$19,700,000

A total of \$13,576,404 has been paid into the treasury of the United Jewish Campaign as of January 15th of this year, against pledges totalling \$19,700,000, according to an official announcement by David A. Brown, National Chairman. Collection drives are in progress in hundreds of communities to secure early payment of outstanding balances, Mr. Brown stated.

This announcement is made in the latest issue of the United Jewish Campaign News, organ of the campaign.

New York City, which pledged \$6,500,000, has already paid in \$5,059,000; Chicago, pledging \$1,000,000, has paid in \$850,000; and Philadelphia, which pledged \$1,222,210, has paid in to date \$730,833.

Sixteen communities pledging over \$1,000 have paid in 100% of their pledges. These are: Columbus, Ohio; Harrisburg, Pa.; Macon, Ga.; Poughkeepsie, N. Y.; Pontiac, Mich.; Sunbury, Pa.; Rome, Ga.; Albany, Ga.; Plattsburg, N. Y.; Greenwich, Conn.; Statesville, N. C.; Gloversville, N. Y.; Tonkawa, Okla.; LaGrange, Ga.; Rocky Mount, N. C.; and Blowing Rock, N. C.

Leading the communities which have collected 100% of their pledges are Columbus, Ohio, with payments of \$55,100 against pledges of \$55,000 and Harrisburg, Pa., whose payments of \$26,000 exceeded its pledges to the campaign by \$1,000.

Seventy-five per cent and more of pledges have been collected by 96 communities where less than \$100,000 but more than \$1,000 were pledged, and by 12 communities where \$100,000 and upward were pledged.

Twenty-four cities pledged \$100,000 and over. Exclusive of New York City, Philadelphia and Chicago, they are: Indianapolis, which has paid in \$140,900, 91.5 per cent of its pledge of \$154,026; New Orleans, \$94,771 or 88.6 per cent of its \$106,920 pledge; Milwaukee, \$149,859, or 82.1 per cent of its pledge of \$182,474; Pittsburgh, Pa., \$350,222, or 81.7 per cent of its pledge (\$Nov. 1926) of \$428,353; Portland, Ore., \$171,500, or 80.5 per cent of its pledge of \$213,064; Kansas City, Mo., \$132,200, or 78.8 per cent of \$167,608; Rochester, N. EMANU-EL OFFERS ITS BUILDING FOR PARK AVE. BAPTIST CHURCH SERVICES

Invitation Offered for Period of New Church's Building, Accepted

The offer of Temple Emanu-El, of which Louis Marshall is president, to the Park Avenue Baptist Congregation, of which Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick is pastor and John D. Rockefeller, Jr. a member, to hold Sunday services in the Temple during the construction of the church, has been accepted.

Beginning October 1, the Park Avenue Baptist Congregation will hold its services in the Temple which was formerly occupied by the Congregation Beth El before its amalgamation with Temple Emanu-El. The new edifice of Temple Emanu-El at Fifth Avenue and Sixty-fifth Street is nearing completion. It is planned to sell the present temple property where the Baptist congregation will worship. Their church, being erected on Riverside Drive, will be ready by the Fall of 1930.

At a meeting of the Baptist congregation the following resolution was adopted.

"Resolved, that the Park Avenue Baptist Church appreciates the generosity of the congregation of Temple Emanu-El in offering the hospitality of its synagogue to our people; that the church accepts this proffer not only as a practical convenience, which we welcome, but as an evidence of fraternal good-will, which we sincerely reciprocate; that the church instructs its responsible officers to convey cordial thanks to the congregation of Temple Emanu-El, and to make such arrangements for the acceptance of the proffered hospitality as shall be of least inconvenience to our hosts."

DECLARES AGENCY TO HAVE FAR-REACHING INFLUENCE

Paris, Feb. 14.—The extension of the Jewish Agency under the present plan will have a far reaching influence on the progress of the rebuilding of Palestine, declares Senator Justin Godart, writing in the "Palestine Review," French Zionist publication.

Declaring he is certain Zionism will succeed, Senator Godart states that what Zionism lacked hitherto was a world wide Jewish base, which will be altogether different from the early beginnings of the Zionist movement when the first Christian Zionists joined the movement's ranks. "The authority of that great Jewish council, the Jewish Agency, will counter balance the extreme Arab influence in the country, making Jewish-Arab peace and co-operation possible," he declares.

SENATE COMMITTEE REJECTS NYE RESOLUTION TO POSTPONE NATIONAL ORIGINS

Smaller Quota Law Differently Allocated Likely to Go into Effect July 1
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Washington, Feb. 14.—The National Origins clause of the 1924 Immigration Act, twice postponed and declared by President-elect Hoover as unworkable and deserving of repeal, will most likely go into effect on July 1, 1929. The Senate Immigration Committee, by a vote of 7 to 4, rejected the resolution introduced by Senator Nye to again postpone the provision for another year. A similar bill was recently introduced into the House by Congressman Chindblom of Illinois. It has not yet been reported by the House Immigration Committee.

The vote was taken following a number of hearings held by the Senate Immigration Committee, during which testimony was heard from the opponents as well as the advocates of the National Origins plan which would reduce the present quotas by 15,000 annually and would bring about a rearrangement in the allocations for the various countries on the basis of the national origins of the United States population as of 1890. The countries whose quotas will be reduced greatly by the application of the National Origins plan are Germany, Ireland, the Scandinavian countries and Roumania. As an example, Ireland, which has a quota under the present law of 28,567, will have a quota of 7,427; Germany, which has a quota of 51,227, will have 24,908; Roumania, with a quota of 603, would have 311. On the other hand, the quotas from Russia and Poland will gain slightly. Russia, which under the present law has a quota of 2,248, will have 3,540; Poland, with 5,982 at present, will have 6,090. The total number of immigrants to be admitted annually to the United States is not to exceed 150,000.

Senator Nye declared, following the vote in the Committee, that he will consider a way of re-introducing his resolution on the floor of the Senate, although under the usual procedure it would be difficult since the Committee has decided to report the resolution unfavorably. He would do so in order to uphold President-elect Hoover, he said. He may move for the discharge of the Committee and ask for a vote by the Senate. It is possible that those Senators who are supporting President-elect Hoover and the Democratic Senators opposing the National Origins plan may muster a majority for the vote.

The Data Sheet of the Key Men of America, published privately by Fred R. Martin, reported extensively the proceedings of the Women's Patriotic Conference on National Defense held in Washington on January 29, at which Senator David A. Reed, of Pennsylvania, author of the National Origins Plan, spoke in favor of the plan. The conference adopted a series of resolutions in favor of restrictive

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ENLISTING JEWISH YOUTH IN JEWISH WORK URGED AT UNION CONVENTION

Dr. Calisch Asks for Sympathetic Attitude Toward Modern Youth
(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

San Francisco, Feb. 14.—"Judaism and the youth of Today" was the topic discussed today during the symposium on "Judaism and the Modern World" conducted by the thirty-first biennial convention of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations in session here. Dr. David W. Edelman of Los Angeles presided and Dr. Edward N. Calisch of Richmond, Va., delivered the key address.

Pleading for a sympathetic attitude toward modern youth, Dr. Calisch urged an effort to create a deeper Jewish consciousness in the young people. He asked that the youth be considered as "fellow voyagers with their elders upon the roadway of life." Referring to the growing spirit of intellectual freedom and frankness in thought and action, Dr. Calisch said that the same spirit should color religious life.

"This generation must have the vision and the courage of Isaac M. Wise. The youth of today has its right to help create its own philosophy of life, to break away from obsolete conceptions, to go pioneering on new paths. Youth has high aspirations of achievement. Let Judaism place before youth, as the highest ideal of human achievement, service for God and man. Let Judaism say to the youth of today: You have full freedom of thought, of interpretation, of expression, of life. But you have also no less an obligation of service. This is the native demand of your humanity and this is the call of your spiritual ancestry."

Rabbi James Heller, of Cincinnati, spoke on "Judaism and the Implications of the Newer Psychological Conceptions of Man." The real conflict, he said, is not between science and religion. "Life is not amenable to science. It resists its methods of treatment. The real dualism is between thought and action. This new mentality is unmindful of its own origins, therefore our age turns upon religion as the first and easiest prey."

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GERMAN PAPER LAUDS JOINT RUSSIAN COLONIZATION FACT

Berlin, Feb. 14.—The agreement concluded with the Soviet Government by the American Society for Jewish Farm Settlements in Russia, Inc., a subsidiary of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, for the extension of Jewish colonization work in Soviet Russia, was praised today by the "Koelnische Zeitung."

The agreement is a model document, the paper says, adding that it is of cardinal importance. The paper suggests that the German organizations interested in aiding Germans in Russia to settle on the land follow its example.

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that this is a period when girls in particular are in need of clear-sighted guidance and help, to keep their balance in this world of swift-changing values. Club activity is one of the most important phases of our work. Social contact between girl and girl and young men and women often present more difficulties than placements in jobs.

"The social problem that confronts us today with our young people who resent chaperonage and desire greater freedom, gives us the keenest and most delicate problem for solution. Heretofore, the girls found the girls' club a satisfactory outlet for her cravings of sociability, but today she demands, quite early, the entrance into a mixed group. We want to direct this demand wholesomely and yet not overshadow the specific contribution that womanhood alone gives to the value of our social fabric."

There were 4,141 calls and 2,313 placements by the Employment Bureau during the year.

"We have housed 573 girls during the last year," Mrs. Warburg continued. "This housing for girls of small wage-earning capacity, is still one of the great problems of the city. There is the tendency today for the self-sufficient and better salaried girl to share an apartment with several others. Some of these ventures have proven very disastrous. Lack of employment, a period of illness soon puts these girls in arrears and they miss the protection and aid that a large congregate household such as the 'Y' can afford. The numbers that need us are still large. Because of our smaller overhead for a large boarding group, we are able to extend the helping and protective hand to the most needy."

3. The development of the interests of the Arabs and their conciliation, so that the Arabs may welcome and profit by the advent of western civilization.

4. The introduction of a specially trained Palestine civil service and the gradual absorption of Jews into the administrative machinery of the country.

The Seventh Dominion League is to spread information concerning conditions in Palestine and make representations to the British Government whenever it will be found necessary concerning the administration of Palestine or proposed legislation.

Freud, like Alexander, Dr. Heller said, "would now psychoanalyze all mankind and cure it of its greatest neurosis, religion."

The sum of \$75,000 was added to the Hebrew Union College Endowment Fund in contributions from the floor of the convention following the report of Adolph S. Ochs, chairman of the Fund, that nearly \$3,000,000 had been raised.

Mr. Ochs stated that on his way to San Francisco, while he and Mr. Morgenstau visited Detroit, they met Henry Ford. "I did not ask him for a contribution to the Hebrew Union College Endowment Fund, but if we are short, we may do so," Mr. Ochs said.

Dr. Lee K. Frankel of New York submitted a report of the Committee on Research at today's session. Rabbi Irving F. Reichert of New York City pronounced the invocation at today's session. At the evening session, presided over by Mrs. M. C. Sloss of San Francisco, Rabbi Morris M. F. Erlitch of Indianapolis, president of the Hebrew Union College Alumni Association, spoke on "Judaism and Personal Religion."

During the visit of the delegates to the University of California yesterday, Dean Monroe E. Deutsch delivered an address of welcome on behalf of President W. W. Campbell.

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immigration measures, including one urging Congress "neither to postpone nor to repeal the national origins provision of the present Immigration Law." It also urged the adoption of a compulsory alien registration measure. It charged that "alien groups and alien-minded organizations are engaged in a persistent and continual assault on our immigration restriction policy."

The National Immigration Restriction Conference, of which John B. Trevor of New York is chairman, conducted an intensive campaign in Washington against the postponement of the National Origins provision. It published full page advertisements in the Washington newspapers urging Senators to block the Nye resolution.

Before the vote of the Committee, Victor Frank Ridder of the "Staatszeitung," New York German daily, appeared at the hearing to oppose the going into effect of the National Origins provision. Three other witnesses favored the plan, opposing the Nye resolution. They were Congressman McCormick of Massachusetts, J. Edward Cassidy and F. H. Kennicutt of Washington.
