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## ANGLO-JEWISH ASSOCIATION VOTES 11 TO 1 TO JOIN AGENCY; LIBERAL SYNAGOGUE REFUSES

Association Names Delegates to Conference, Synagogue Insists on Neutrality to Mandate and Zionism  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

London, Mar. 25.—With only one dissenting vote, the Council of the Anglo-Jewish Association at its meeting Sunday decided to participate in the extended Jewish Agency for Palestine. Four delegates to the forthcoming Jewish Agency conference which will be held at the Scala Theatre on April 21st, were elected. They are Sir Matthew Nathan, Sir Meyer Spielman, Harry Lewis and Elkan Adler.

Leonard Montefiore, president of the Anglo-Jewish Association, declined to serve as a delegate, stating that he cannot undertake new responsibilities. If the Council thinks the president should be a delegate, he is ready to resign, he declared.

Palestine has numerous advantages and enjoys the affection of many people who would otherwise depart from Judaism, Mr. Montefiore declared. He agrees the Association should not stand aside, but asks the Council to realize that non-Zionists are invited to participate in the Agency not for their sympathy or possible political influence, but in order to extend the field of collection for various Zionist funds. Mr. Montefiore said that a member of the Association who would be elected to the Jewish Agency would be expected to help in the collection of funds for the Keren Hayesod.

The only dissenter when the votes was taken on the Association's participation in the Jewish Agency, was Dr. Moses Gaster, head of the Spanish and Portuguese congregations. Dr. Gaster declared that Zionism sacrifices the idea of a rebuilt Jewish national home for the sake of the Jewish Agency. Without minimizing the good will of the non-Zionist philanthropists, Dr. Gaster asked why they are not doing the same as Edmund de Rothschild, and let Zionism go its way.

London, Mar. 25.—Participation of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, the most important Liberal congregation in England, in the forthcoming Anglo-Jewish conference on the Jewish Agency, is precluded since representation at such a conference would indicate the expression of a desire to play a part in giving effect to the British Mandate for Palestine. This was the conclusion of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue of England which, at a meeting held Sunday, decided to inform the Zionist Organization that it would not participate in the conference called by the Board of Jewish Deputies to indicate Anglo-

## ABOLITION OF CZARISTIC RESTRICTIONS POSTPONED AS COMMITTEE DISAGREES

Method of Accomplishing End Is Cause of Dissension  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Mar. 25.—Abolition of the anti-Jewish legal disabilities based on the old Czaristic laws was again postponed when the Constitutional Committee of the Sejm could not agree on the recommendation that a new law be introduced into parliament to annul the limitation measures.

In view of the fact that the Sejm is nearing the conclusion of its sessions, this question will not come up again until the next session.

In the Constitutional Committee today, when the question of abolishing the Czaristic restrictions was discussed, the Socialist deputy Lieberman, the official Speaker on the question, emphasized that according to Article 126 of the Polish Constitution, a special law must be adopted in order to abolish limitation. He therefore urged the introduction of a law annulling the existing national and religious restrictions.

Assistant Minister of Justice Sieczkowski replied that no special law is necessary since the Polish High Court does not recognize the Czaristic restrictions.

Deputy Isaac Gruenbaum, affirming that the High Court does not recognize the restrictions, emphasized that the highest administrative tribunal does recognize them and according to the official statement of the Minister of the Interior, the decisions of the administrative tribunal above the rulings of the High Court.

Prof. Winiarski, National Democrat, proposed that a special judicial committee be named for the purpose of considering the question whether the abolition of the law is necessary. The proposal was rejected by a majority vote. Thereupon the National Democrats in the committee voted against the proposal of the speaker to prepare a law for abolishing the restrictions. This action resulted in postponement.

## MINISTER WARNS AGAINST CEMETERY DESECRATIONS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Mar. 25.—An emphatic warning against agitation, especially that of the anti-Semitic press, leading to desecration of Jewish cemeteries, was issued by Minister of Interior Grzesinski.

The Minister warned radical parties against conducting bitter agitation in their press. Pointing to the cemetery desecrations resulting from the agitation in the anti-Semitic press, the Minister declared he will suppress papers which engender such prejudice.

## MATZOTH APPEAL LEADS TO ATTACK ON RABBIS BY YEVESEKTZIA PRESS

State Declaration Jewish Religion Not Persecuted Meaningless If Appeals Abroad Are Necessary  
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Mar. 25.—The appeal abroad for funds to supply matzoth for the Russian Jews during the coming Passover holiday was the basis for an attack by the press of the Yevsektzia, Jewish section of the Communist Party, on Russian rabbis who are charged with maintaining contact with Jews abroad.

Rabbis abroad made their appeal for matzoth on the plea of Russian rabbis, declares the "Emes," Moscow Communist Yiddish daily. The White Russian Rabbis have twice signed a declaration denying alleged persecution of the Jewish religion in the Soviet Union, but even these two declarations are meaningless when it comes to a "mitzvah," the good deed of supplying Russian Jews with matzoth.

The "Oktiabr" demands how contact is established between Russian rabbis and organizations of Jewish believers abroad, and why appeals abroad mentioned the pleas of Russian rabbis to save religion in the Soviet Union.

Minsk, Mar. 25.—Three Beth Hamedrashim, houses of prayer, were confiscated in this city.

## ASK EQUAL RIGHTS FOR MINORITY SCHOOLS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Bucharest, Mar. 25.—A demand that the minority schools in Roumania be regarded on an equal basis with the government schools on questions of budget and public rights, was presented to Minister of Education Costachescu by a delegation of minority representatives whom he received.

The delegation, composed of German, Hungarian, Ukrainian and Jewish representatives, asked amendment of the school law which ruins the minority schools. The Minister promised to study the question closely.

## ECONOMIST WARNS AUSTRIAN JEWRY OF ECONOMIC RUIN

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vienna, Mar. 25.—Austrian Jewry is on the road to economic ruin, declared Professor Bredt, German economist, in an article he published in the "Wiener Journal."

Professor Bredt, whose article was an attack on Socialism, said that the industrial possibilities in the large cities are being killed and that the economic ruin threatens the Jews in the cities.

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## TO RAISE \$50,000 RELIEF FUND FOR LITHUANIAN JEWS

The raising of an emergency fund of \$50,000 to help the 65,000 Jews facing hunger in Lithuania as a result of the crop failure this year was decided upon at a conference called by the Federation of American Jews of Lithuanian Descent, held Sunday, under the chairmanship of Henry Hurwitz, president, at the Hias Building, New York. Representatives of twenty Jewish societies participated in the conference, at which an initial sum of \$2,000 was raised.

Representatives of the various societies undertook to secure contributions from their societies. An appeal will be sent to individuals throughout the country for immediate aid, it was decided.

A central committee to take charge of relief is being organized in Kovno with local committees in all the communities of Lithuania, the conference heard.

Dr. Mordecai Katz, Rabbi M. Z. Margolies, Rabbi Joseph Kanneman of Ponevez, Lithuania, Harry Lang, Israel Matz, Ephraim Kaplan, Herman Winter and Rabbi L. Predmesky, addressed the conference. Levi Kokeach was elected treasurer of the relief fund.

## DAVID A. BROWN HEADS CHINA FAMINE RELIEF

David A. Brown, national chairman of the United Jewish Campaign, was elected chairman of the China Famine Relief Board of Directors at a meeting held Saturday.

Announcement of Mr. Brown's election to the body which seeks funds here for relief of famine victims in China was announced by D. O. Lively, director of the organization.

Dr. Jacob Glass was the guest of honor at a dinner given Sunday night at the Park Central Hotel, marking his completion of forty years as a physician. Supreme Court Justice Setab B. Strong, and Congressman William I. Sivovich were the speakers.

## Trend in Communities Toward Unified Action

Toronto, Can., Mar. 25.—Measures to unite the Orthodox synagogues of Canada for the purpose of establishing a recognized Rabbinate in Canada to work in conjunction with a commission of laymen to take care of the problems of Jewish education, Kashruth, the arbitration of disputes, were taken at a conference held here. Representatives of twelve synagogues of Toronto were present.

As an initial step toward the creation of a commission for Canada it was decided to unite all synagogues of Toronto into an organized body. A permanent committee was appointed to proceed with organization of the Toronto commission.

Pittsfield, Mass., Mar. 25.—Plans for a united Jewish community program in Pittsfield were given impetus with the organization of a Jewish Community Council and the revival of the Jewish Community Chest which was originally launched two years ago. The campaign for funds to date has resulted in over \$10,000 for the participating agencies.

Karpel Halperin was elected president of the Chest. An Executive Committee, representing the principal Jewish organizations of Pittsfield has also been chosen. The following local and national Jewish causes are participating in the joint fund this year: Pittsfield Hebrew School, Hebrew Alliance Building, Local and County Social Welfare, Jewish Travelers' Aid, United Palestine Appeal, United Jewish Campaign, National Jewish Hospital.

Plans for a social, religious and educational survey of the Jewish community to be made under the direction of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research of New York City has been adopted.

Newark, N. J., Mar. 25.—Formation of a central bureau of Jewish education in Newark, will be recommended to the Conference of Jewish Charities as a result of a conference held here. Discussion at the conference was based on the report of a survey made for the Charities body by the Bureau of Jewish Social Research which recommended the establishment of a coordinated centralized body to administer Jewish education in the city.

A committee representing the Conference of Charities will meet within a few days with a committee from the United Hebrew Schools to consider the financial state of the largest orthodox educational unit in Newark.

Over \$50,000 was raised by the Israel Orphan Asylum at its annual affair held Saturday night at Madison Square Garden. Judge Gustave Hartman, president of the Israel Orphan Asylum, presided.

William M. Fleitman, director of Fleitman & Company, one of the oldest wholesale dry goods concerns in New York, died in Paris at the age of 70, according to word received in New York.

## \$110,000 RAISED IN BROOKLYN FOR U.P.A.

The sum of \$110,000 was raised for the United Palestine Appeal of Greater New York at two dinners held Sunday night.

Contributions totaling nearly \$60,000 were announced at the official opening of the Brownsville and East New York Division's campaign at Temple Petach Tikvah, Brooklyn. About 400 Borough Park residents contributed \$50,000 at the eighth annual banquet at the Menorah Temple, Brooklyn.

Dr. Nahum Sokolow, chairman of the World Zionist Executive delivered the principal address at the Brownsville division's dinner. Other speakers were Morris Rothenberg, national chairman of the board of directors of the United Palestine Appeal; Jacob H. Cohen, Morris Weinberg, Morris M. Diamond, and J. I. Rudavsky.

Albert Ottinger, Judge William M. Lewis of Philadelphia, national chairman of the United Palestine Appeal, and Rev. Hirsch Masliansky addressed the Borough Park gathering.

Plans to extend the activities of the Menorah Association to the general community, instead of being confined to the colleges and universities, were considered at a dinner of the Board of Governors held at the Biltmore Hotel under the chairmanship of Moses J. Stroock. Endowment of the Menorah Foundation, to publish a new history of the Jews by leading scholars in America and Europe, was announced at the dinner.

Professor Irwin Edman of Columbia University, former Health Commissioner Louis I. Harris, Frederick F. Greenman, Harry Starr, President of the Intercollegiate Menorah Societies, and Henry Hurwitz, Chancellor of the Menorah Association, addressed the gathering. Members of the Board who were present included F. Julius Fohs, Frederick F. Greenman, Lucius N. Littauer, Joseph Pulvermacher, Meier Steinbrink and S. W. Straus.

Otto H. Kahn has become a member of the Menorah Association and has contributed toward its work, it was announced.

The Independent Order Free Sons of Israel, a national fraternal organization of which Samuel Sturtz is Grand Master, has appropriated \$2,500 for the Menorah Association, it was declared.

## FRENCH COMMISSION STUDIES INDUSTRIES IN PALESTINE

### Deny Visit Is in Connection With French Dead Sea Claim

Jerusalem, Mar. 25.—A study of the industries of Palestine is being made by the French Technical Commission which arrived here several days ago.

Henri Chapot, who is heading the commission, which includes government electrical mining engineers, professors of Sorbonne University and of the higher technical schools in France, made a categorical denial to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent of a rumor here that the commission's visit is in connection with the French Government's claim to the Dead Sea concession.

The members of the commission visited the Bezalel school, the Hebrew University laboratories, and Solomon's Pools, remarking everywhere on the modern developments. Before proceeding to Syria, the commission will visit Tel-Aviv, Balfouria, Haifa and the Jordan electric works.

### LIBEL ACTION AGAINST ANTI-SEMITIC AGITATORS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Belgrade, Mar. 25.—The absurd charge that Theodore Herzl, founder and first president of the Zionist Organization, was poisoned by Achad Ha'am, late Hebrew philosopher, is made in a leaflet circulated here by a group of Russian anti-Semites active in Yugoslavia.

Libel action is planned against the group for publishing the leaflet, which also contains other accusations.

### SOCIETY FORMED TO ATTACK EINSTEIN

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Mar. 25.—A secret society, having as its purpose "to expose Einstein," has been formed here, it is revealed by the "Boersen Korier."

The paper, which reveals that the society has elected officers, states that it is not surprised that envy of Einstein would lead to the creation of such an organization. The purpose of the society, the paper declares, is not to disprove the Einstein theory.

### DENY AGUDISTS RESIGNED FROM VILNA KEHILLAH

Warsaw, Mar. 25.—Reports from Vilna that Agudath Israel members have resigned from the Kehillah because of the appointment as Chief Rabbi of Senator Rubinstein were denied here today.

The Club of Jewish Deputies and Deputy Gruenbaum despatched congratulations to Senator Rubinstein on his appointment.

### JOSEPH SARE, CRACOW VICE-PRESIDENT, DIES

Cracow, Mar. 25.—Joseph Sare, vice-president of the City of Cracow, died here at the age of 81. Mr. Sare, who was an engineer, established the Cracow street car system.

## MAX WARBURG URGES GERMAN JEWS GIVE 10% OF INCOMES FOR EAST EUROPEAN RELIEF

### Lauds J. D. C. for Program of Reconstructive Aid

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Mar. 25.—A suggestion that every German Jew contribute ten percent of his income toward relief work for Jews in Eastern Europe was made by Max Warburg in an address he delivered at the annual meeting of the Hilfsverein der Deutschen Juden, held at the Esplanade hotel.

The spirit of charity toward the poor Jews has now been substituted with measures for constructive relief, Mr. Warburg declared. The American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee has contributed tremendously toward this change in bringing aid to those in need. The Hilfsverein as well as the J. D. C. must now concentrate on aiding Jews in their native countries because avenues of immigration have been closed. Palestine, Mr. Warburg said, can absorb only five percent of the Jews in Eastern Europe whose economic position requires relief.

The meeting was attended by a large number of German Jewish leaders. Willy Dreyfus, presenting the financial report of the Hilfsverein, stated that over 300,000 marks were spent during the past year.

### REFUSE JEWS PRE-HOLIDAY PROLONGED TRADING HOURS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Mar. 25.—A recommendation that the trading hours of Jewish merchants be prolonged preceding Jewish holidays was rejected today by the Industrial Committee of the Polish Senate.

During its discussion of a general law project to extend trading hours on the weeks preceding Easter and Christmas, Senator Davidson suggested that the Jewish holidays, Succoth and Passover be included. The members of the committee voted against Senator Davidson's proposal.

### NAME MATHEMATICS HEAD FOR HEBREW UNIVERSITY

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem, Mar. 25.—Professor Frankel of Kiel has been named director of the Institute of Mathematics of the Hebrew University.

Professor Frankel will assume his duties in the Fall.

### ZEPPELIN STARTS ON PALESTINE FLIGHT

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Berlin, Mar. 25.—The Graf Zeppelin started on its flight across the Mediterranean to Palestine this morning. Paul Loeb, president of the Reichstag, is one of the 27 passengers. The Zeppelin will make a non-stop flight of 5,000 miles, dropping mail bags along the route.

Permission for the Zeppelin to land in Palestine was not granted, although Dr. Hugo Eckener, captain, had announced plans for a visit to Palestine sites during the trip.

## FINAL FIGURES SHOW LARGE MAJORITY FOR UNIFIED PALESTINE COMMUNITY

### 89,985 Voted for Keneseth Israel, While 4,657 Favored Separate Communities

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Jerusalem Mar. 25.—An overwhelming majority registered in the Keneseth Israel the unified Jewish community of Palestine provided by the Palestine communities ordinance, according to final figures made public here.

The number who registered in the Keneseth Israel total 89,985, as compared with 4,657 who favored separate communities as sponsored by the Orthodox world organization, Agudath Israel. Of the number who registered for the unified community, 23,945 were in Jerusalem, 29,336 in Tel-Aviv and 10,059 in Haifa.

### SENTENCED FOR ANTI-SEMITIC ACTS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Moscow, Mar. 25.—Sentences were imposed by the Nizhny Novgorod court upon three anti-Semites who were found guilty of attacking Jewish residents on November 9th. Shouting "Hail the Communist International, slaughter the Zhids," the three beat a number of Jews.

Arkalov, former officer in Denikin's pogrom band, was sentenced to six years' imprisonment; Krasnov to two years and Saxin to nine months' hard labor.

The brutal acts of twenty Red Army soldiers, better-known here: The soldiers, on a train in Siberia, hurled two Jewish soldiers from the moving car, brutally beating them. They also pillaged Jewish stores at the stations along the way. Three of the soldiers were candidates for the Communist party.

### VLADIVOSTOK REFUSES PERMIT TO BAKE MATZOTH

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Vladivostok, Mar. 25.—Unless government consent to open bakeries for the baking of matzoth for the holiday is given, hundreds of Jewish residents of Vladivostok will be without matzoth this Passover.

More than 700 persons applied to the local Kehillah for matzoth. The authorities, however, refused to grant permission to the community to open bakeries. Since other facilities for baking are unavailable, the Jews have no way to provide themselves with matzoth.

### PRESS APPEAL FOR RESCUE OF POLISH YESHIVAS

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

Warsaw, Mar. 25.—Pleas that funds from abroad be forthcoming in order to prevent the Yeshivas, academies of Jewish learning, from being closed because of financial difficulties are continued here.

Students from America come to Poland to continue their Talmud studies at the Polish Yeshivas, the committee seeking funds announced.

Jewry's support for the extended Jewish Agency.

At its meeting yesterday, the Liberal Jewish Synagogue decided to inform the Zionist Organization that although it would like to accept the invitation to participate in the conference in order to demonstrate the unity of the Anglo-Jewish community, the meeting's purpose precluded the Liberal Synagogue's participation as a congregation because its presence at the conference would indicate expression of a desire to play a part to give effect to the British mandate for Palestine.

The congregation, however, maintains to the mandate and the Zionist movement an attitude of complete neutrality. It is ready to cooperate in any effort Anglo-Jewry makes in order to help Jews in other lands establish for themselves a position which would give them adequate economic opportunities and assure them political and cultural rights.

Claude Montefiore, president of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, who was unable to attend the meeting because of illness, recommended the stand taken in a letter he sent to the meeting. "Liberals include Zionists and non-Zionists, even anti-Zionists," Mr. Montefiore wrote, "but as a congregation we should remain neutral."

Debate on the stand to be taken by the congregation developed at the meeting, some members suggesting non-committal participation in the conference. This, it was explained, was impossible and not in accordance with the terms of the invitation.

During the discussion it was disclosed that the United Synagogue is also not expected to participate in the conference, such participation being outside its scope because of technical difficulties connected with an act of Parliament.

## AUTHORIZE NEW B'NAI B'RITH OLD AGE HOME

Springfield, Mass., Mar. 25—The erection of a new building for the B'nai B'rith Home for Aged and Infirm was authorized by the General Committee of District Number 1 of the Independent Order B'nai B'rith at a meeting of the Committee held here. Maurice Bloch, minority leader of the New York State Assembly who is president of the District, presided.

The proposed new home for the Aged is to provide facilities for the former inmates of the Home in Yonkers, New York, which was recently disposed of by the B'nai B'rith.

A preliminary program for the district convention of the I.O.B.B., which is to take place in Buffalo on May 12th and 13th, was prepared. Representatives from New England, New York and Eastern Canada attended the meeting.

## NEW JERSEY MOVES TO COLLECT U.J.C. PLEDGES

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

Newark, N. J., Mar. 25—A resolution pledging support to any supplementary campaign the national organization of the United Jewish Campaign may deem necessary to inaugurate was adopted and assurance that outstanding pledges to the U. J. C. will be collected in communities throughout the state was given at an all-day conference in the Y. M. H. A. building Sunday attended by 150 leaders throughout the state to consider ways and means of securing payment of pledges.

The new catastrophe that has come over the Jews in Eastern Europe makes it urgent on the part of Jewish citizens in America to redouble their efforts to secure immediate funds to despatch abroad. David A. Brown, national chairman, urged in his address.

"We cannot appease hunger with pledge cards," Mr. Brown declared. He announced that the Joint Distribution Committee recently appropriated \$310,000 for this emergency situation and he expressed his assurance that the money would be forthcoming.

"There are many millions yet outstanding, pledged to our campaign, which we in turn have pledged to our people across the seas," said Mr. Brown. "All of us must continue until every pledge has been paid in full. This is a sacred task to which every Jew in America is solemnly committed. I assume the right to ask every community, through its leaders, speedily to collect the outstanding pledges. This can only be done by going into the highways and byways, from office to office, from home to home, until every city and state in America will have reached its goal of 100%."

The meeting was presided over by Michael Hollander, of Newark, acting chairman, who was chosen permanent chairman for the state in the election of officers during the day.

Mr. Hollander, in the morning session, reviewed the state campaign held under the direction of the late Felix Fuld, in which the state pledged \$476,000, of which \$301,000 has been collected.

Albert H. Lieberman of Philadelphia, Chairman of the Eastern Pennsylvania United Jewish Campaign, and David M. Bressler, Acting Chairman of the New York City United Jewish Campaign, described the methods employed in their respective communities in se-

curing payment of subscriptions to the campaign fund. In Philadelphia the Jewish community, which pledged over \$1,220,000, has already paid in over \$1,000,000. Mr. Lieberman announced. In New York City, Mr. Bressler pointed out, \$6,500,000 was pledged, of which sum \$3,603,000 has already been collected.

Conditions in Russia and Eastern Europe were described by Joseph C. Hyman, secretary of the Joint Distribution Committee. He outlined the reconstruction work that is being done. Although a large number of people have been aided to independence, a still larger number, Mr. Hyman pointed out, are in need of financial assistance. The emergency situation in Poland, Bessarabia and other countries is of such a nature, he added, that extra appropriations will have to be sent abroad to care for them.

Others who addressed the conference were Morris Scheck of Newark, David Holzner of Trenton, Judge William Newcorn of Plainfield, Clarence B. Levy of Freehold, Philip Dimond of Paterson, M. S. Germansky of Paterson, Emanuel Weitz of Jersey City, Elias Reznikoff of Long Branch, A. Jacobson of Lakewood, Edward Firschbaum of Lakewood and Jacob Rose of Montclair.
